

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Karannagoda's writ petition inquiry on May 17

The Court of Appeal two-judgebench comprising CA President Justice Arjuna Obeyesekere and Justice Mayadunna Corea fixed the petition to be taken up for inquiry on May 17.

On a previous occasion, the Court of Appeal had issued an Interim Order staying Trial-at-Bar proceedings against the former Navy Commander, Admiral of the Fleet Wasantha Karannagoda until final determination of this writ petition. The Attorney General had

filed indictments against former Navy Commander Wasantha Karannagoda and 13 others in connection with alleged abduction, torture, extortion and conspiracy to murder 11 persons in 2008 and 2009.

In his writ petition, Karannagoda stated that the interest of Nishantha Silva who conducted investigations was to embarrass Prime Minister Rajapaksa and President Rajapaksa on the basis that the Petitioner is perceived to be a close associate of theirs.

The petitioner also states that the said Nishantha Silva had offered to release suspects under criminal investigation if they would testify against the petitioner and the former Defence Secretary Gotabaya Rajapaksa.

The petitioner stated that Nishantha Silva had acted with evident bias and mala fides against the petitioner.Karannagoda states that the said Nishantha Silva is now a fugitive from justice and is said to have claimed political asylum in Switzerland. The petitioner main-

tained that he is being victimised for political reasons and as a political vendetta. He further stated that there is no evidence whatsoever to charge him of an offence.

The petitioner states he verily believes that officers of the Attorney General's Department have entered minutes stating that the Petitioner cannot be indicted on the evidence.

The petitioner stated that there is not an iota of evidence to prove his any involvement into the abduction and

murder of these eleven persons. He further said CID investigations conducted into these incidents for a period over 10 years have not found evidence against him even though police had interrogated about 150 persons.

He further states that the entire investigation of the Petitioner inter alia by Nishantha Silva was characterized by malice and mala fides and was motivated by improper considerations including political considerations.

The Petitioner maintained that in

the circumstances, the Petitioner's right to a fair trial has been irrevocably violated. He further said he had been named as a suspect solely based on a statement made by former Navy Commander Admiral Travis Sinniah on

Accordingly, indictments consisting of 667 counts under Penal Code were served on thirteen accused except former Navy Commander Wasantha Karannagoda who has been named as the fourteenth accused.

It uses a cold-type virus, engineered to be harmless, as a carrier to deliver a small fragment of the coronavirus to the body. Safely exposing the body to part of the virus's genetic code in this way allows it to recognise the threat and learn to fight it off, without risking

The NMRA granted their consent for the Emergency Use of the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine in the third week of January this year.

Accordingly, Sri Lankan health authorities are already administering the Oxford-Astra-Zeneca "Covishield" vaccine manufactured by the Serum Institute in India (SII), the world's biggest vaccine manufacturer.

The country received 500,000 doses of the vaccine as a donation from India under its "Vaccine Maitri" programme on January 28. More than 550,000 persons around the country have already received the vaccine.

At a previous occasion accused Ranawaka was released on bail by the Colombo High Court on a cash bail of Rs.10,000 and two sureties of Rs.100,000, after serving the indictment.

FR against releasing non-forest lands fixed for support

A Fundamental Rights petition filed challenging the legality of a joint Cabinet Memorandum to hand over the management of Other State Forests to Divisional Secretaries was yesterday fixed for support on May 18 by the Supreme Court.

Supreme Court three-judge-bench comprised Justices Sisira de Abrew, Kumuduni Wickremasinghe and Janak

This petition had been filed by G. Kapila Renuka Perera, an engineer by profession through counsel Dharshana . Weraduwage.

The petitioner Renuka Perera stated

that a Cabinet decision had been taken on October 26, 2020 giving effect to the Joint Cabinet Memorandum said to be presented by the Wildlife and Forest Conservation Minister and the Environment Minister on October 12, 2020 to the Cabinet titled "Releasing of Non Forested lands among the other State Forest lands but Conservation and Reserved Forests which are vested with the Forests Conservator General to the Land Commissioner General in order to handover to Divisional Secretaries".

The petitioner stated that during a meeting held on 2020-07-01, Cabinet decided that it would be appropriate to introduce a simplified mechanism of granting permission to engage in such economic activities to minimize the hardships faced by those temporarily engaged in chena farming and other economic activities in such lands.

The petitioner has cited Wildlife and Forest Conservation Ministry Secretary M.K. Bandula Harischandra, Lands Ministry Secretary R.A.A.K. Ranawake, Environment Ministry Secretary Dr. Anil Jasinghe, Lands Commissioner General G.D. Keerthi Gamage, Wildlife and Forest Conservation Minister C.B. Rathnayake, Lands Minister S.M. Chandrasena, Environment Minister Mahinda Amaraweera

and the Attorney General as respond-

The petitioner states that the lands concerning said circulars largely consist of forest lands and not residual bear lands and consist of environmentally sensitive areas and other ecosystems, cultural, historical and archeological places, places which provide habitat for endangered species, etc which must be preserved in Trust for this generation and to the Generations to come. The Petitioner states that unless the respondents are stayed from implementing the said programmes irreparable damages shall be made to the environment, sensitive ecosystems, flora, fauna, cultural and religious heritage, which shall have great, severe and irreparable impact on the Fundamental Rights of the Petitioner and on the Fundamental Rights of all the citizenry of the Republic as well as the said rights of the generations to come.

The petitioner is further seeking an order directing the respondents to take immediate legal action against those who are responsible for the illegal possession of said lands and to take remedial actions to restore the destruction caused to the said lands and regain possession of all the said lands which are subject to said circulars in terms of the law.

Ban on exorcism at Kataragama

Of vaccines and priority lists

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has agreed to accord 'next in line' eligibility for the new shipment of the Corona vaccine to factory workers and those engaged in the tourism sector, it is reported. The first consignment of the COVID-19 vaccine under the COVAX programme of the World Health Organization (WHO) is to arrive in Sri Lanka on Sunday (07). According to WHO, 25 percent of the Sri Lankan population will receive vaccines under COVAX.

It is reported that already 20,000 names of employees in hotels approved by the Tourism Development Authority, including drivers and tourist guides, etc. have been sent to the Health Ministry for consideration. In addition, the vaccine will also be given to others closely engaged in the tourism industry. The new vaccine will also be given on a priority basis to over 130,000 factory employees in the 250 factories under the 14 Free Trade Zones and also the 1,700 factories outside the FTZs with the entire programme to be concluded before March end.

The selection of factory workers and those attached to the tourism industry at the head of the next round of vaccines is indeed a prudent move given that the origin of the Coronavirus here was traced to these two groups. It was a garment factory in Minuwangoda that set the ball rolling, so to speak. There are armies of employees working in garment factories, who belong to a high-risk group. Those involved in tourism too are naturally vulnerable given the nature of the business, not least of which is coming into direct contact with those arriving here from countries where the virus is raging.

However, the vaccine is not the be all and end all and a dire warning has already been given by health authorities that it takes over a month for the immunization to fully set in, in an individual who had received the vaccine. The prevailing health guidelines should be observed to the letter in the meantime. This is a timely warning, given the tendency of people to relax after the initial danger is seen off, a point that was driven home by the circumstances that led to the second wave of the virus in the country after no cases were reported for two months.

The authorities must ensure that such a mistake is not repeated this time. If not, even the much touted vaccine as the panacea for the virus would be of no use. In this regard the stepped up vigilance by police in apprehending those flouting health guidelines is a move in the right direction. So are the repeated warnings issued over TV by the health experts

It appears that these efforts have paid off with the public coming to appreciate the dangers and risks and are more on their guard, following the necessary precautionary measures this time around. The massive response to the calls for vaccination without fear or misgivings shows the seriousness displayed by the public in warding off the virus threat. In fact, long queues for the jab at designated locations shows the enthusiasm of the public, and the faith reposed in the vaccine despite some negative vibes. So much so, there are even desperate attempts to jump the queue, to use a common parlance, by sections of the public by recourse to various ruses.

The issue has come to such a pass that there are accusations that the privileged, including sports stars and celebrities had jumped on the priority list bypassing the stipulated roster that has prioritized the vaccine based on age and other vulnerability factors. It is reported that an official attached to the Health Ministry had received marching orders for allegedly facilitating a former cricketing icon to receive the vaccine "out of turn". If this indeed is the case, it is a misconceived action. Several Heads of State have already led the way in being the first among the their countrymen to get the jab on a voluntary basis chiefly to allay any lingering fears entertained by the people about the vaccine. The yesteryear Sri Lankan cricketing star may or may not have had the same motive. But his action, even unwittingly, could have cleared the doubts among those who had stayed away from the vaccine so far. In that context, he would have done a service in redeeming people from a dire fate and deserves kudos for the act. In the same way, the official who facilitated the jab too ought to have been appreciated rather than being shown the door for his trou-

In any event the vaccine ought to be spread on a rational basis. There is still a school of thought that those above 60 should receive priority. There are others who contend that this group is approaching the end of their tether and that the young who have their lives before them and constitute the country's workforce that contributes towards the economy must be given priority. Well, there is much to be said about both opinions and we are sure the authorities will weigh the pros and cons of both approaches.

PRABHAKARAN CONDEMNED TAMIL YOUTH TO DEATH AND UNTOLD MISERIES

he suicide bomber who killed President Ranasinghe Premadasa on May 1, 1993, was Kulaveerasingam Veerakumar (23) alias Babu, from Jaffna and a suicide bomber known as Kalaivani Rajaratnam alias Dhanu killed former Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi on May 21, 1991. Both the suicide bombers also died on the spot.

Those two suicide bombers sacrificed their lives, blindly believing in a dream of a megalomaniac, Velupillai Prabhakaran, leader of the most ruthless terrorist organization in the world, the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE). Prabhakaran misled scores of Tamil youths into their death, torture and imprisonment and one generation of the Sri Lankan people suffered untold miseries due to him.

A large number of Tamils are serving prison sentences, some for longer than 30 years for terrorist acts conducted on the orders of Prabhakaran. While suicide bomber Dhanu and mastermind Sivarasan killed themselves, others involved in the Rajiv Gandhi assassination continue to suffer in Tamil Nadu jails even after three decades. Murugan, Santhan, Perarivalan, Nalini, Jayakumar, Ravichandran and Robert Payas have not seen the outside world since they were found guilty in 1991.

Tamil youth A.G. Perarivalan who delivered battery cells for the suicide bomb, was merely 19 years old when he was arrested in June 1991. The 30 years that he has spent in prison have been a long tale of twists and turns with multiple rounds of litigation. Perarivalan had remained on death row for 23 years, before the Supreme Court of India commuted his death sentence, along with two other convicts –Nalini and Murugan – to imprisonment for life in February 2014.

Although they appealed for mercy, Indian Presidents from Shankar Dayal Sharma to Ram Nath Kovind refused to release them. In January 2021, Tamil Nadu Governor Banwarilal Purohit had given his assent for an amnesty for them, after a query was made by the Supreme Court, the highest judicial authority, which is yet to give the green light for their pardon.

Former Norwegian peace negotiator Erik Solheim, who defended Tiger terrorists and their so-called 'Tamil cause' for over three decades, finally acknowledged that he knew Tiger Leader Velupillai Prabhakaran had ordered the killing of former Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi. Solheim, in a twitter message last year, said that during discussions he had with LTTE theoretician Anton Balasingham, the latter had admitted that Prabhakaran had ordered the killing of Rajiv Gandhi.

Norway was one of the countries that backed the UNHRC Resolution which called for 'international investigations' and punishment of Armed Forces members who commanded the last stages of the battle to eliminate the terror outfit LTTE in 2009.

As the Sri Lankan issue is debated at the UNHRC in Geneva now, this is the most appropriate occasion for the international community to take stock of the human sufferings due to LTTE terrorism and the vast improvement of the human rights situation and the lives of the people of all communities in Sri Lanka after the elimination of terrorism.

terrorism.

When it was revealed that Rajiv Gandhi was killed on the orders of Prabhakaran, a former Foreign Secretary told me in New Delhi that India will never forgive the LTTE for directly interfering with the Indian democratic system by killing a leader of the main political party that was about to come to power once again. This senior officer, a Tamil, had predicted that every future Government, whether Congress or BJP or any other party would not deviate from that policy.

That is even evident today from the

Modi Government's reluctance to pardon the Rajiv killers even after they served more than 30 years of prison terms. Neither New Delhi nor Colombo, for that matter, will forgive Solheim for covering up the LTTE crimes for 25 years since the Norwegian peace envoy commenced peace negotiations in 1996.

Now it is for the Western nations and the UNHRC members supporting them to understand the nature of LTTE cruelties and the imperative need which existed then to free the country and the people from the dreaded terrorists, instead of condemning the Sri Lankan Government's Armed Forces on alleged human rights violations at every forum.

The West always displayed their partially towards the LTTE by trying to find reasons for their terrorist actions. The West-approved negotiator Solheim refrained from disclosing true facts such as Prabhakaran's direct involvement in the Rajiv Gandhi assassination.

"Balasingham told me Prabhakaran admitted to the killing of Rajiv Gandhi in their private discussions. Bala was not in the slightest doubt as to who ordered the attack. Bala never lied to me. I see no reason why he would have lied on this," Solheim finally revealed last year.

After the collapse of the peace process too, Solheim played a different tune. When Indian journalist Padma Rao Sunderji asked him if he was acceptable to New Delhi he said there was a lot of skepticism in Delhi initially. "What will these pink, Christian Europeans with no real knowledge of South Asia make of problems on this continent? But at the end, we were not only acceptable to India, we had the closest relationship. After every visit to Sri Lanka, I went to New Delhi to inform the political leadership and the Indian

intelligence about what I have achieved or not achieved."

While India accepted him, he betraved them by keeping the evidence of the Rajiv assassination to himself. Solheim added that when he met Foreign Minister Jaswant Singh in New Delhi he asked if Solheim was a patient man. "I said, no, no, I'm not patient, how can we be, when people are dying in Sri Lanka every month? Mothers are crying, children are dying, how can we be patient?" To that, Singh said: "Do you know the way to the Indira Gandhi International Airport? Go. Buy a ticket making sure it is a one-way ticket — to Europe. Because if you are not patient, you will only run into problems here. If you take a 10 to 15 year perspective on the Sri Lankan conflict, then you may do something good. "Of course, he (Singh) was

right, I was wrong. We learned our lessons and became patient."


Solheim revealed that the LTTE had refused to accept a Federal Solution from the beginning. "Neither we, nor India, US, China, EU or anyone else would have agreed to divide Sri Lanka. The aim of the peace process was a Federal Solution to Sri Lanka. The vast majority of Tamils would have been happy with that," he said. He failed to give any reason for the purpose of his peace process when he knew that the LTTE would never agree to a Federal Solution.

In his twitter message Solheim also accused Prabhakaran of failing to compromise by not accepting an offer to evacuate Tamil civilians during the final stages of the war in 2009. "I accuse Prabhakaran of failing to compromise and not accepting the offer to evacuate Tamil civilians." Then he put the blame on the Government: "It was the Sri Lanka Army who indiscriminately shelled and bombed people to death. I wish we, as mediators, had the powers to influence the parties to make wiser decisions."

Solheim's reluctant revelation of facts proved the predicament of the Sri Lankan Armed Forces due to the intransigence of Prabhakaran. When a terrorist was not ready to surrender and decided to fight, what could the Armed Forces do? Solheim has an obligation to tell the truth and explain why the Armed Forces were compelled to eradicate terrorism to his friends representing the West at the UNHRC.

The challenges facing Buddhism in Asia

new report released by the Sydney-based Lotus Communication Network (LCN) on February 26 warns that Buddhism is under threat across Asia, both from within and outside, and calls for concerted action by Buddhists across the region to empower themselves.

The 238-page report produced as an eBook identifies six issues that threaten Buddhism in Asia, a region whose identity over the centuries has been built around what is called the 'Indic-Buddhist' civilization. These issues include proselytism targeting Buddhist communities, particularly by Evangelical Christian groups and lately Wahabi Islamists.

An Australian Buddhist monk who has spent 30 years in Sri Lanka and Thailand is quoted as saying: "Sri Lanka and other Buddhist countries are up against an incredibly well financed, carefully designed and extremely determined scheme to destroy Buddhism."

Other issues include poverty among grassroots Buddhists, who constitute the majority of the poor in Buddhist countries like Sri Lanka, Myanmar, Cambodia and Laos, which is exploited by the Christian and Islamic groups.

Another serious issue is youth from Asian Buddhist families drifting away from Buddhism and the report blames Buddhists for paying too much attention to rituals and neglecting the philosophical teachings that is very relevant to the 21st century.

Distortion of Buddhism by wayward monks and temples is another issue identified as a threat from within. The monastic system that has been the lynchpin of the Buddhist community for centuries is also under threat because not enough young people are willing to become monks.

The book is a result of an 18-month study over 2018 and 2019 by Dr. Kalinga Seneviratne, a Sri Lankan born communications scholar, who visited most of the Buddhist countries and communities in South and Southeast Asia during this period. He was commissioned to do the study after the first Asian Buddhist Media Conclave held in New Delhi in August 2018 organised by the International Buddhist Confederation (IBC).

After much discussion about media bias against Buddhists, hate speech accusations, lack of Buddhist media networks in the region and the drifting away of Buddhist youth from Buddhism, it was suggested that a study be undertaken to look at the communication needs of Buddhist communities in South and Southeast Asia. The report is designed to be a consultative report to IBC and other

the issues identified in the document. "During my consultations, some Buddhists, especially in Southeast Asia, told me that worrying is a form of suffering in Buddhism. So why worry about the social-economic problems of the world. You need to cleanse yourself," Dr. Seneviratne notes. "I don't really agree that this is the essence of Buddhism. We need to look at how to solve socio-economic problems that bring so much suffering to people."

Dr Seneviratne believes that the essence of Buddhism is mindfulness, "which the whole world accepts now". He sees mindfulness as not worrying about something, but mindfully understanding the root causes of the problem and doing something to empower the people to solve their own problems. "It is called Engage Buddhism — we need to address the


problem and work out the path to help solve it — that is the path I took in doing the study," he argues.

The 15-chapter report dedicates 12 chapters to specific countries that include predominantly Buddhist countries such as Bhutan, Cambodia, Myanmar, Laos, Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Singapore and Thailand; and also formerly Buddhist countries such as Indonesia, Malaysia and Nepal.

There is a lengthy chapter on India looking at a possible Buddhist revival there and also efforts to develop Buddhist tourism. East Asian countries, where substantial Buddhist communities exist such as China, South Korea, Taiwan and Japan, are not included in the study. Each country chapter includes a substantial discussion on the historic background to its Buddhist heritage and culture that should be a very valuable resource for education in Asia, where most modern youth lack a good understanding of their own cultures and heritage.

"The book is very comprehensive and it surveys all development trends and problems, paradoxes facing Buddhism in the region," says Dr. Palphol Rodloytuk, Assistant to the President and former Dean, School of Liberal Arts, of Shinawatra University in Bangkok. "I particularly like the mindful communication and Buddhist communication model dis-

cussed in Chapter 2, and the chapters on Southeast Asian countries such as Malaysia, Singapore, Myanmar, Laos and Thailand are an eye-opener."

In Chapter 1 there is a lengthy discussion on how Buddhism spread through the ancient trade routes known as the 'Silk Route'. Its peaceful exchange of ideas and philosophies is offered as a lesson for modern-day missionaries who create conflicts.

In Chapter 2, Buddhist communication strategies over the centuries are discussed starting from the Buddha's sermon on 'free inquiry' — the Kalama Sutra — to Ashoka edicts and to modern-day communications using Facebook and music concerts.

"I will use part of the book in my PhD class on world wisdom and traditions for communications," says Dr. Rodloytuk.

The country chapters give a uniquely Buddhist perspective on pressing socio-economic, political and cultural issues facing Buddhist communities. Such as in Bangladesh, how a minority Buddhist community around the Cox Bazaar area is living in fear on the shadows of the Rohingya crisis, while in Myanmar, why the Buddhists feel that global media's coverage of the Rohingya issue is highly biased and does not take into account the socio-economics of a

development issues that fuels such a crisis.

The Laos and Vietnam chapters give an interesting perspective on how a "Communist" Government has come to a historic accommodation with Buddhism, where the religion thrives at the moment with the support of the state. Interestingly in Laos, Buddhist temples have become development delivery vehicles for government rural development policies — a role not that different to what monasteries have traditionally played in Asia.

The Indonesian chapter gives a good insight into how the Sriwijaya Buddhist civilization diminished in the face of a peaceful Islamic incursion. It provides a good discussion on lessons contemporary Buddhist communities could learn, when the religion (and monks) become corrupted. It also discusses how the current Indonesian government wants to develop the Borobudur temple complex into a major Buddhist pilgrim centre.

The report points out that most Buddhist media in the region is mainly broadcasting sermons by monks seated in front of a camera or chantings. It also points out that in many Buddhist countries the media practitioners lack a good knowledge of the Buddhist philosophy to do pro-

grammes with Buddhist themes. It recommends that music, drama and other forms of cultural expressions attractive to modern youth should be used to present Buddhism to Asian youth — even suggesting that lessons could be learned from how Evangelical Christians use gospel music that is attracting Asian youth to Christianity.

Many examples are given from various countries of how monks and Buddhist media practitioners are using modern digital communication tools to repackage the Buddhist message, which the report strongly encourages. The final chapter includes a number of recommendations, while also pointing out some initiatives being taken by LCN and IBC


"Asian Buddhists are fond of building grand temples," notes Dr. Seneviratne. "We have enough of them now and if we do not empower the Buddhist communities to apply the teachings to improve modern life, by the end of the century, these temples will be like Borobudur with no Buddhist communities to serve and existing merely as historic monuments," he warns. INSURERS MAY TRY TO EVADE, BUT COURTS STAND FIRM

plaintiff who suffered serious injuries in a motor vehicle accident causing him permanent disability, tried through correspondence with the insurer and the owner of the vehicle to recover damages for the injuries he suffered, after obtaining a decree in 1990 in an *exparte* judgement for payment of damages to him by the insurer.

However after protracted correspondence with the two parties, he still was not able to recover the damages and therefore decided to file action in the District Court in 1995.

However, the insurer appealed the District Court judgement of 1995 that decisively awarded damages to the defendant, in *Sri Lanka Insurance Corporation Ltd vs Chrysantha Fernando* – SLR - 229, Vol 1 of 2005.

This is how the Appeal Court judges described the action filed before them:

"The plaintiff-respondent instituted the instant action against the defendant-appellant the Sri Lanka Insurance Corporation Ltd. (the successor of the

Insurance Corporation of Sri Lanka)

bearing No. 16598/M on 07.07.1995 praying for a judgment and a decree against the defendant appellant for the decreed sum (Rs. 3,35814) with the legal interest thereon from 27.03.1990, on the basis that the defendant-appellant corporation had issued a policy of insurance in relation to the use of the said vehicle (which met with the accident), to the registered owner of the vehicle, and the said policy was valid at the time of the accident."

As stated earlier the bottom line was

As stated earlier, the bottom line was that the plaintiff had to file action in order to recover damages, even though contractually he should have received such damages as of right. The lawyers for the defendant insurance Company however argued that since there is no stipulation in the law governing the prescription period for acting upon a Court decree, that Provisions of Section 10 of the prescription Ordinance should apply to the case filed in 1995.

This proviso is for prescription on anything not mentioned in the Prescription Ordinance to be prescribed after three years. For laymen's purposes, prescription is when the right to sue lapses due to effluence of time.

The Appeal Court judgement held *inter alia*:

"The contention of the defendantappellant was that the instant action which had been filed by the plaintiffrespondent on 7.7.1995 praying for a judgment and a decree against the defendant-appellant (The insurer) a decreed sum obtained against the insured (the owner of the vehicle) on 27.3.1990 is prescribed in law, under the provisions of the section 10 of the Prescription Ordinance, as the Prescription Ordinance does not specifically provide a prescriptive period within which an action based on a decree of court could be instituted. As such the instant action had been instituted after 3 years from the date of the decree had been prescribed in law."

Court of Appeal judges held that an insurer is legally bound to compensate the third party for damages, under terms of an insurance policy, and that the Motor Traffic Act also stipulates the same.

Further, Gunawardene, J observed that "under a contract of insurance, insurer is legally bound to compensate the other party. The added feature for the law (under section 105 of the Motor Traffic Act) itself commands the insurer to pay directly to the injured third parts."

third party."

Therefore Court held that prescription runs from the date the contract was breached and should therefore as it concerns a matter of contract, be resolved under terms of Section 6 of the prescription Ordinance under which prescription runs for six years for breach of contract.

for breach of contract. Court held: "It is relevant to note that, in terms of the contract of insurance between the insured and the insurer, (the Sri Lanka Insurance Corporation Ltd) the insurer had admittedly undertaken to pay damages or compensation on the occurrence of damage or injury to a third party arising out of the use of the vehicle having a policy of insurance, belonging to the insured. Also, the policy of insurance obtained in favour of the insured, protects him, from liability to a third party, as a result of the operation of the relevant vehicle. The law demands and binds the insurer to indemnify the insured against the insured's liability to pay damages that had been awarded by court to a third party."This obligation begins from the date the contract of insurance is breached, i.e., refusal to pay, until six years lapse, as per Section 6 of the prescription Ordinance. The Court of Appeal therefore upheld the judgement of the District Court.

In a separate Court action *Ruparatne* vs. *Manufacturers Life Insurance Co. of Canada*, (C.A. (S.C) 48017) it was decided that English law does not apply in case of prescription in the matter of recovering life insurance. In the English case of MacGillivray it was held that prescription runs from the day the person who took out the life insurance policy died.

The Court of Appeal in Sri Lanka however held that this position does not apply here in Sri Lanka as Court is bound by the Prescription Ordinance, a specific legal provision that governs prescription.

It was held: "We cannot however adopt this reasoning because we have a local statute dealing with the question, that is, the Prescription Ordinance where the relevant provision is different. In terms of Section 6 of our Prescription Ordinance, prescription will

begin to run upon breach of the contract. The word 'breach' with reference to the case we are considering refers to an act by the defendant-company. The plaintiff is entitled to maintain his suit within the period of six years from the date of the breach. The terms of contract cannot make the death of Don Benjamin Appuhamy alone a breach by the defendant company of its contract of insurance. Therefore prescription cannot begin to run from the date of the death. The requirement of breach of contract as the starting point of prescription laid down by our Prescription Ordinance makes it impossible to adopt the test formulated by MacGillivray and Lord Esher."

Court decided that refusal to pay — or the date on which the insurance Company refused to pay under a Life policy — is the day from which prescription runs. However, this refusal should have occurred "upon approval of proof of death" of the insured party.

Unlike in the English case, the judges here considered death was a prerequisite event, to the breach from which prescription begins to run, i.e., breach by refusal to honour the life insurance policy.

It was held: "The requirement of receipt of due proof of death connotes a demand for payment. And not only that. There should be approval of due proof of death. These stipulations make this a case which falls into the third category in my earlier classification. This is a case where the happening of the event (here death) is a prerequisite to the right to demand performance. Therefore prescription will run from the date of the refusal to pay."





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






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BRAZIL'S COVID SITUATION ALARMS WORLD

Covid-19 has already left a trail of death and despair in Brazil, one of the worst in the world. Now, a year into the pandemic, the country is setting another wrenching record.

No other nation that experienced such a major outbreak is still grappling with record-setting death tolls and a health care system on the brink of collapse. Many other hard-hit nations are, instead, taking tentative steps toward a semblance of normalcy.

But Brazil is battling a more contagious variant that has trampled one major city and is spreading to others, even as Brazilians toss away precautionary measures that could keep them safe.

On Tuesday, Brazil recorded more than 1,700 Covid-19 deaths, the highest single-day toll of the pandemic.

"The acceleration of the epidemic in various states is leading to the collapse of their public and private hospital systems, which may soon become the case in every region of Brazil," the national association of health secretaries said in a statement. "Sadly, the anemic rollout of vaccines and the slow pace at which they're becoming available still does not suggest that this scenario will be reversed in the short term."

And the news just got worse for Brazil — and possibly the world.

Preliminary studies suggest that

Preliminary studies suggest that the variant that swept through the city of Manaus is not only more contagious, but it also appears able to infect some people who have already recovered from other versions of the virus. And the variant has slipped Brazil's borders, showing up in two dozen other

countries and in small numbers in the United States.

Although trials of a number of vaccines indicate they can protect against severe illness even when they do not prevent infection with the variant, most of the world has not been inoculated. That means even people who had recovered and thought they were safe for now might still be at risk, and that world leaders might, once again, be lifting restrictions too soon.

"You need vaccines to get in the way of these things," said William Hanage, an epidemiologist at Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, speaking of variants that might cause reinfections. "The immunity you get with your cemeteries running out of room, even that will not be enough to protect you."

That danger of new variants has not been lost on scientists around the world. Rochelle Walensky, the director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, pleaded with Americans this week not to let their guards down. "Please hear me clearly," she said. "At this level of cases with variants spreading, we stand to completely lose the hard-earned ground we've gained."

Brazilians hoped they had seen the worst of the outbreak last year. Manaus, capital of the northern state of Amazonas, was hit so hard in April and May that scientists wondered if the city might have reached herd immunity. But then in September, cases in the state began rising again, perplexing health officials. An attempt by Amazonas governor Wilson Lima to impose a new quarantine ahead of the Christmas holiday was met

with fierce resistance by business owners and prominent politicians close to President Jair Bolsonaro.

By January, scientists had discovered that a new variant, which became known as P.1, had become dominant in the state. Within weeks, its danger became clear as hospitals in the city ran out of oxygen amid a crush of patients, leading scores to suffocate to

Doctor Antonio Souza remains haunted by the horrified faces of his colleagues and relatives of patients when it became clear his Manaus hospital's oxygen supply had been exhausted. He thinks about the patient he sedated, to spare her an agonizing death, when the oxygen ran out at another clinic.

"Nobody should ever have to make that decision," he said. "It's too terrible."

Maria Glaudimar, a nurse in Manaus, said she felt trapped in a nightmare early this year with no end in sight. At work, patients and their relatives pleaded for oxygen and all the intensive care beds were full. At home, her son caught tuberculosis after contracting Covid-19 and her husband shed 22 pounds as he fought the virus.

Since then, the coronavirus crisis has eased somewhat in Amazonas, but worsened in most of Bra-

Scientists have scrambled to learn more about the variant and to track its spread across the country. But limited resources for testing have kept them behind the curve as they try to determine what role it is playing.

Anderson Brito, a Brazilian virologist at Yale University, said

his lab alone sequenced almost half as many coronavirus genomes as all of Brazil had. While the United States has done genetic sequencing on roughly one in 200 confirmed cases, Brazil sequences about one in 3,000.

The variant spread quickly. By the end of January, a study by government researchers found it was present in 91 percent of samples sequenced in the state of Amazonas. By the end of February, health officials had reported cases of the P.1 variant in 21 of 26 Brazilian states, but without more testing it is hard to gauge its prevalence.

Throughout the pandemic, researchers have said that Covid-19 reinfections appear to be extremely rare, which has allowed people who recover to presume they have immunity, at least for a while. But that was before P.1 appeared and doctors and nurses began to notice something strange.

João Alho, a doctor in Santarém, a city in Pará, a state that borders Amazonas, said that several colleagues who recovered from Covid-19 months ago had fallen ill again and tested positive.

Juliana Cunha, a nurse in Rio de Janeiro who has been working at Covid-19 testing centers, said she assumed she was safe after catching the virus last June. But in November, after experiencing mild symptoms, she tested positive again.

"I couldn't believe it," Ms. Cunha, 23, said. "It must be the variants."

But there is no way to be sure what is happening to people who are reinfected, unless both their old and new samples are kept, genetically sequenced and compared. (NYT)

Convalescent plasma trial discontinued in USA



The US Government discontinued a research trial of convalescent plasma for COVID-19 saying the blood product from recovered patients doesn't prevent atrisk people visiting emergency rooms from getting sicker.

Convalescent plasma has been used widely to treat patients with COVID-19,under the assumption that the immune cells in a recovered person's blood would help the next patient fight off the virus. The Food and Drug Administration authorized the emergency use of convalescent plasma last summer for hospitalized patients during the pandemic, though it said further research would be needed to confirm its effectiveness.

A trial run by the National Institutes of Health was stopped early Tuesday, because an independent group of reviewers determined it was not providing benefit to COVID-19 patients treated and released from emergency rooms.

"We do not see any sign that convalescent plasma had a benefit" in ER patients at risk for more serious disease, said Dr. Simone Glynn, program scientist for the

Plasma from recovered patients contains antibodies or proteins generated by the immune system to fight disease. In some conditions, such as the flu, antibodies from a recovered patient are widely believed to help someone who has been infected.

For COVID-19, convalescent plasma "just doesn't look like it's providing any significant impact on things that count: mortality and hospitalization," said Dr. Daniel Griffin, an infectious disease specialist at ProHEALTH Care in New York.

In science, a treatment's effectiveness is ideally determined by a series of studies that show whether it did or didn't work and in what context. Griffin said the majority of studies he's seen have found convalescent plasma ineffective.

There are more than 180 trials underway for convalescent plasma in COVID-19, including one led by Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee, using plasma in early hospitalized patients, and two at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore looking at whether convalescent plasma reduces the risk of developing symptoms for people exposed to the virus that causes COVID-19 and whether it can be useful for those visiting doctors' offices for COVID-19.

Dr. R. Scott Wright helped run a large convalescent plasma trial last summer out of the Mayo Clinic that concluded plasma can be helpful. The study of more than 100,000 patients, all of whom received some form of convalescent plasma, found there were 7.3% fewer deaths among patients who received plasma with high levels of antibodies than among patients who received plasma with few antibodies. The Mayo Clinic study did not include a placebo group, so technically, it did not meet the gold standard for clinical

trials, but it effectively did, Wright said, because getting plasma with low levels of antibodies is akin to receiving a placebo.

The trial led to the FDA's authorization of high-antibody-level convalescent plasma in hospitalized patients early in the course of their COVID-19 disease.

Wright criticized the new federal study as too small to provide any conclusive evidence of convalescent plasma's effectiveness.

"We know it takes more than 1,000 patients to show a benefit of effectiveness," Wright said. The government's trials have involved too few patients and haven't enough potential COVID-19 treatments, he said.

The federal trial, dubbed the Clinical Trial of COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma of Outpatients (C3PO), was done at 47 hospital emergency departments and had enrolled 511 participants out of its goal of 900. Planning for the trial began in

April and enrollment in August.

Researchers included patients who had COVID-19 symptoms for a week or less, when convalescent plasma is believed to be most effective. Later, the disease is generally driven by an immune overreaction to the virus rather than to the virus itself.

An independent data and safety monitoring board (DSMB) met Feb. 25 to look at whether those patients needed further care, had to be hospitalized or died within 15 days of receiving the plasma. The board determined that convalescent plasma was probably safe but unlikely to provide benefit and recommended that the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute stop enrolling patients in the study, which it did immediately.

Glynn and a colleague who helped lead the study said they'd like to wait until the data is fully analyzed before drawing any further conclusions about convalescent plasma's effectiveness.

A negative trial is still important, said Dr. Nahed El Kassar, program officer for the C3PO trial and a medical officer with the NHLBI.

"You don't do a clinical trial just to have a positive answer," she said, and participants who donated their plasma should feel proud to have contributed to this expansion of knowledge. "They have advanced the science, and because of them, we have what we have now, which is an answer to a very important clinical trial."

It's "incredibly important" to identify treatments that don't work, so patients aren't given therapies that won't help them, said Dr. Rajesh Gandhi at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston.

"If you don't do these trials, you don't make progress," said Gandhi, whose hospital has used convalescent plasma only as part of clinical trials. "Any drug that's being talked about a lot just needs to be studied and settled once and for all."

COVID: Researchers learn more about 'brain fog'

As larger numbers of people recover from COVID-19, researchers are learning more about "brain fog" in those affected by the virus.

For months, doctors and researchers have been aware of a range of longer-term symptoms afflicting people after recovering from an active COVID-19 infection. One such symptom, generally referred to as "brain fog," can take the shape of confusion, difficulty thinking and concentrating, short-term memory loss, and in severe cases, has even been reported to cause delirium and psychosis.

While scientists still don't know for sure what causes brain fog, they're zeroing in on a few theories. Mainly, scientists increasingly believe brain fog happens when cells that are involved in response to an infection make their way to atypical places, such as the brain.

A key finding emerged when researchers autopsied brains of COVID victims, discovering certain cells that shouldn't have been there. These large cells, known as megakaryocytes, might be taking up precious space, leaving less

room for blood to pass to the

This phenomenon might be unique to COVID, according to David Nauen, MD, PH.D, a professor of pathology at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.

"To have megakaryocytes in the brain has never been seen before, I couldn't find any reference in my search this past summer with megakaryocytes noted in human brain capillaries. This is very new for COVID that they are doing this," Nauen told ABC News. "This could help us bring up a better picture of what's going on."

If these massive cells are indeed blocking blood flow to the brain, it would starve the brain of enough oxygen and nutrients to work at full capacity.

"The brain cortex is richly vascularized with capillaries, if some proportion of capillaries are blocked or occluded by these cells, it blocks some level of blood flow. An alteration in flow of blood in a system that is so precisely delivering oxygen based on time and need could be leading to impaired cognitive function, like a brain fog picture," said Nauen, who led the research into the topic, which was published in the Journal of American Medical Association Neurology.

In fact, the cells seen were not in small number, "the findings on autopsy suggest that the burden could be significant," Nauen said.

The next question Nauen said is about how these megakaryocytes are getting there and what sort of communication the cells are using in the process.

Other scientists have theories, which may add to Nauen's findings.

According to Adrienne A.
Boire, MD, PhD, a Neuro-Oncologist & Neurologist at Memorial
Sloan Kettering Cancer Center,
people who experience brain fog
may have inflammation in the
brain evidenced by a protein
called 'cytokines' swirling around
the tissue that surrounds the
brain and spinal cord. These proteins are usually associated with
the immune system, which leads
to inflammation and can damage

vital organs. Now, researchers like Boire say they're finding these proteins in cerebrospinal fluid, or CSF.

"We did find a large influx of cytokines in the CSF. Cytokines are small proteins that cells use to communicate with each other," Boire told ABC News.

Severe COVID infections are known to cause inflammation in the body. It's possible that this process causing inflammation in the brain can cause the brain to not function normally.

For now, these new findings lead to more questions.

For Boire, people who recover from COVID without any lingering problems may hold the key to unlocking the mystery of why some people develop "brain fog."

"The question of how this finding affects patients without severe disease is still an open question," Nauen said.

"These 'unaffected' patients are key to understanding why some people avoid "brain fog" and why others are disabled by them," Boire said. (ABC)

Europe to assess Sputnik jab

The European Medicines Agency said Thursday it will start assessing the Russian coronavirus jab, Sputnik V, as the bloc looks to speed up its vaccination program.

"EMA will assess Sputnik V's compliance with the usual EU standards for effectiveness, safety and quality. While EMA cannot predict the overall timelines, it should take less time than normal to evaluate an eventual application," the regulator said in a state-

The EMA is using a rolling review to study the data for the jab developed in Russia. This allows the European medical authority to assess its efficacy as it receives all the necessary information, before the vaccine maker can apply for a formal authorization. By analyzing the studies ahead of the application, the EMA's potential approval could come quicker than usual.

The news comes after a number of European countries indicated that they could start administering Sputnik V, bypassing the regulator. Slovakia and Hungary have already ordered doses of the Russian jab while the Czech Republic and Austria are considering the vaccine.

In January, German Chancellor Angela Merkel said she was "open" to the idea of producing Russia's coronavirus vaccine in the European Union.

European countries are under pressure to speed up the rollout of Covid jabs as their program is clearly lagging behind other parts of the world, such as Israel, the United States and the United Kingdom.

The region is still mostly closed due to social restrictions, which is taking its toll on



the economy and on people's livelihoods. Austria and Denmark have also recently joined forces with Israel in the production of second generation vaccines, aimed at dealing with variants of Covid-19. At the time of the announcement, Austrian Chancellor Sebastian Kurz mentioned that the EMA has been too slow in approving vaccines to fight the pandemic.

The institution has so far approved three vaccines: Pfizer's, AstraZeneca's and Moderna's.

In addition, European countries have criti-

cized pharmaceutical firms for some hurdles in the production and the delivery of the vac-

European nations have agreed that coordinated action would be the best way to deal with the health emergency and have tasked the European Commission with negotiating contracts with the pharmaceutical firms.

However, EU member states are still allowed under European law to approve their own vaccines without waiting for approval at the EU level.

Sri Lankan Olympic stars of yesteryear

Maurice Coomarawel was a star cyclist in 1960

It was in 1960 that a Sri Lankan cyclist was sent for the first time to participate in the Olympics.

Morris Coomarawel who was blessed with this distinction remained a star cyclist for almost a decade. He commenced his career in cycle racing in 1957, when he came third in a

50-mile cycle race organised by the Wing Wheel Cycling Club that year. The same year he won a 30-mile cycle race with the

determination that he would never again face In the years 1960, 1962, and 1963 Maurice won the

Tour de Lanka Cycle Race against several hundred contestants.

In fact, when he won the 1960 Tour de Lanka he was only 19 years old. Although

Olympics that year, he could not participate due to an illness.

In 1962, the Tour de Lanka covered 282 miles. He won the event in 15 hours and 27 minutes. In 1963 the course was 290 miles. He won the race once again in 15 hours and five minutes.

In 1965, Maurice covered the 240-mile course in 12 hours and 38 seconds to win the event. It was after 26 minutes that the second placed cyclist finished the course.

The course of 190 miles was covered by Coomarawel in six hours 19 minutes to win the event in 1967. Maurice was thus able to

win the Tour de Lanka consecutively on three occasions. He served in the



Royal Ceylon Air Force and resigned in 1965 to join the Ceylon Transport Board as a mechanical foreman.

As a routine, Maurice used to get to bed early and rise early to practice cycling for two hours in the morn-

During the weekends he cycled to Kandy and back.

As training for the Tour de Lanka, it was part of his programme to cycle from Colombo to Nuwara Eliya and back.

Maurice participated in 418 cycle races during the period from 1957 to 1977 and won 384 events.

He has received 287 cycles as gifts and won 200 trophies. In 1975, he was promoted as a mechanical engineer and was posted to the CTB Depot in Angoda.

Maurice Romaine a former student of St. Joseph's Convent, Nugegoda. But on 27 January 1977, Maurice his wife Romaine and daughter Jenny, Migrated to Australia to accept an appointment as an Engineer in the Mechanical Division of an Australian Airways Compa-

Low interest rate regime and market liquidity for banks



CBSL to pursue economic growth, investment promotion

Sri Lankan economy is still recovering from the downturn caused by the COVID- 19 pandemic. In such a situation, it is important to take the economy out of COVID-19 pandemic situation and subsequently work towards the growth of the economy and investment promotion, the Central Bank of Sri Lanka, Governor Professor W.D. Lakshman said.

Speaking on the current status of the economy, Prof. Lakshman said, "Other conditions are being created to promote investments. Main monetary policy instrument for this is the low interest rate regime and also market liquidity for banks. That is being provided and also requesting the banks

to increase their lending for productive activities. In this context and also given the low inflation environment, the monetary Board considers the current policy stance as appropri-

Prof . Lakshman also emphasised

the need to channel bank credit towards sectors that could generate high growth and sectors that have potential but are still underfunded.

"Mechanisms to promote this are being examined by the monetary board and actions will be taken soon to implement some of the decisions made in this regard."

He said further that the second factor to be noted is the uptick in certain market rates such as yields on government securities which is not in line with the monetary policy stance.

"Although we don't expect a further decline in market inflation rates at this juncture, we certainly don't expect them to increase either in the future.

Elaborating on the new economic model that the country is pursuing to support the production economy to enhance non debt creating foreign exchange earnings, Prof. Lakshman said the process is continuing and the CBSL has actively TO PAGE 14

'Lankan economy expected to make notable recovery'

Director of Economic Research at CBSL Chandranath Amarasekara, said the Sri Lankan economy is expected to make a notable recovery in 2021, supported by policy stimulus and improved business sentiments.

"Positive sentiments felt by COVID vaccination programme and the impact of growth promoting policies is expected to support the economic revival over the short to medium term. Hence we're expecting a growth of around 5.5 to 6 per cent in 2021.

We are confident about the growth of 5.5-6 per cent in 2021 and beyond that to sustain that

growth; we will need more growth supportive policies to be pursued," Amarasekara noted.

When asked if there are any plans to extend the debt moratorium, Deputy Governor of Central Bank T.M.J.Y.P Fernando said, "That is also currently under consideration. We have already received a few requests from sectors and also there was a budget proposal relating to the tourism industry.'

"As far as the transport sector is considered, a proposal in this regard has already been submitted to the Monetary Board. We are hopeful that we will receive a

favorable decision very soon. What we're trying to do it not to overburden the customers with several payments .But in the same time, we have to understand that businesses are now being revived. As a result we cannot give a total moratorium, because the banks also have to get their income, if they have to continue with their payments of deposit interest. We have also received positive responses from banks and the Finance Houses Association. They are being very cordial in helping us to develop this structure. Very soon that will be released and we will be making an announcement," the Deputy Governor added.

Five large Lankan banks rated at 'AA-(lka)'

Five large Sri Lankan banks are now rated at 'AA-(lka)' following Fitch Ratings' national scale recalibration, reflecting the rating compression for the banks on the national

Fitch revised the National Ratings of Commercial Bank of Ceylon PLC (CB) and Hatton National Bank PLC (HNB) to 'AA-(lka)'/Stable from 'AA+(lka)'/Negative. Bank of Ceylon (BOC) and People's Bank (Sri Lanka) (PB) were downgraded to 'AA-(lka)'/Stable from 'AA+(lka)'/Negative and are now driven by their intrinsic credit profiles rather than sovereign sup-

Sampath Bank PLC (SAMP) was already rated at 'AA-(lka)'/Stable.

The Operating Environment (OE), which is constrained by the sovereign rating, assesses the level of risk of doing banking business in Sri Lanka and affects the banks' financial and non-financial rating factors.

Discussions to relax tile and bathware imports restrictions held

In an effort to become a self-sufficient nation in a post-COVID economy and to safeguard the currency, the Government recently took a policy decision to impose a set of stringent import restrictions on nonessential goods, where the imports of tiles and bathware were temporarily suspended.

With a request to revoke these restrictions the Tile Importers Association met Treasury Secretary, S.R. Attygalle on March 1, 2021, with local manufacturers to discuss a way forward where there would be an opening for some imports while nurturing local manufacturers. The meeting was successfully concluded with all parties agreeing key points on the future of the industry.

Sri Lanka's Tiles and Bathware Manufacturing Industry - a vital player in the construction sector, currently consists of three local large-scale tile manufacturers and 7 bathware manufacturers with a current combined annual production capacity of 17 million sqm of tiles and approximately 700,000 bathware pieces. Further plans to increase

tile production capacities by another 3.5 million sam this year will result in a total local production output to 20.5 million sqm by mid 2021. Being a key contributor to the local economy and government revenue, these large-scale local manufacturers have invested over Rs.35 billion throughout the years, paying over Rs. 5.5 billion government taxes a year.

At present these manufacturers employ over 7,500 Sri Lankans.

The local industry is well-equipped with the latest manufacturing technology that's among the best in the world, capable of producing any high-quality tiles and bathware across a range of different sizes, designs, surface finishes and variations that are on par with global leaders of the industry.







Causes of Black dog excreta

DR GCS KURUGALA, Veterinary Surgeon.

(B.V.Sc; M.Sc Poultry Science; Master of Public Administration & Management)

e have already discussed the colour code of dogs' excreta. Black Excreta is a danger signal. Excreta gets its normal colour from bile pigments, food they eat and things added from the intestine while it passes through the track. All food is digested and absorbed at the lower part of the small intestine and water is absorbed at the large intestine. The process is quite similar to the normal function of a human's gut. Finally the movements of the large intestine form the shape of the excreta.

Excreta turn black if it is mixed with digested blood. From where does the blood come into the intestine?

To answer this question we should know the structure of the gastrointestinal tract of dogs. Human Gastrointestinal tract consists of the esophagus, stomach, small intestine, large intestine and anus. Digestion takes part within the stomach and small intestine. Same structures are present and the same functions are happening in dog's gastrointestinal tract also, even though there are changes in shape and size.

Black excreta means it contains blood which is digested. To get blood, it should be added at the upper part of the gastrointestinal tract. That indicates there can be ulcers in the stomach and upper part of the small intestine. Ulcers are small or big wounds in the wall of the gastrointestinal tract and these ulcers ooze blood into the tract and get mixed with the food that is being

Why do dogs get ulcers in the gastrointestinal tract?

Ulcers due to kidney failure

Dogs also can get kidney failure. This disease is much more common in older dogs. But young dogs may get acute kidney failure. Due to failure of the kidney urea will accumulate in the blood which would cause wounds in the mouth, esophagus, stomach, intestines.

Ulcers due to poisoning

Ulcers can develop due to intake of poisons. Dogs sometimes accidentally eat rat poison, mosquito coils. Some people poison dogs on purpose. Dogs may develop wounds in the mouth, esophagus, stomach, intestines as a result.

SIGNS

Black excreta may be linked with some other types of illnesses as well. Hence you have to inform the vet

DIAGNOSIS

The vet may test a blood sample of your pet which can give a more detailed picture. Sometimes ultrasound scanning also helps for diagnosis.

If more dangerous poison is ingested it will be life threatening. Severe kidney damage is also very dangerous as in Sri Lanka there are no facilities for kidney transplant for pets. Your vet will do accurate treatment to save the life of your pet. It is the owner's responsibility to seek the vet's advice as soon as you see your dog passing black excreta as it is a "dangerous symptom."

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Note 1. Statement of Compliance The consolidated financial statements of the Group and the separate financial statements of the Bank have been presented in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards 34 (LKAS 34) "Interim inancial Statements" issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka (CA Sri Lanka) and in compliance with the requirements of the Companies Act, No. 07 of 2007 and the Banking Act

Note 2. Accounting Policies and Accounting Estimates
There were no changes to the accounting policies and method of computation since the publication of the last annual financial statements other than below.

The Group applied Definition of a Business (Amendments to IFRS 3) to business combinations whose dates of acquisition are on or after 1 January 2020 in assessing whether it had acquired a business or a combination of the combination of thegroup of assets. The amendments do not have a material effect on the Group's financial statements because the Group has not acquired any subsidiaries during the year. However, the Group has amended its accounting policies for acquisitions on or after 1 January 2020.

The Government has announced a reduction of the income tax rate applicable to the Banking Sector to 24% from 28% with effect from 1st January 2020. As provided in LKAS 12 - Income taxes, deferred that assets and liabilities should be measured at the tax rate that are expected to be applied in the period in which the asset will be realised or the liability will be settled, based on the tax rate that are expected to be applied in the period in which the asset will be realised or the liability will be settled, based on the tax rate (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. As the said amendment to tax rates is yet to be approved by the Parliament and cannot be considered to be legislated, the proposed changes to the tax rates have not been considered to be substantially enacted as at the reporting date. Accordingly, the prevailing income tax rate of 28% has been used for current tax and deferred tax computation as at 31 December 2020.

 $The Bank has a cumulative net deferred tax asset of Rs 252 \, Mn \, recognized \, through \, the \, Statement \, of \, Profit \, or \, Loss \, and \, net \, deferred \, tax \, liability \, of \, Rs \, 804 \, Mn \, recognized \, through \, OCI.$

Had the Bank applied the reduced income tax rate of 24% to calculate deferred tax assets/liabilities as at 31st December 2020, the net deferred tax liability would have been decreased by Rs 35 Mn and the resulting charge to Statement of Profit or Loss and the reversal to Other Comprehensive Income for the year would have been Rs 120 Mn and Rs 155 Mn respectively. Further the income tax charge recognised in the income statement would have been reduced by LKR 181 Mn.

The Group Financial Statements comprise the Bank and its subsidiaries DFCC Consulting (Pvt) Limited, Lanka Industrial Estates Limited and Synapsys Limited and group interest in associate company National Asset Management Limited and group interest in joint venture Acuity Partners (Pvt) Ltd. Note 4.1 31 March Financial Year Company

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose serious public health threat. It has interrupted the movement of people and goods throughout the world with many jurisdictions having imposed restrictions on individuals and businesses. Further, the quarantine measures taken by respective Governments have curtailed global supply chains and brought pressure on global trade, in turn affecting a large cross section of the Bank's clientele in various industries and sectors. The Bank expects the debt moratorium and concessionary working capital loan schemes introduced by the Central Bank of Sri Lanka to enable the businesses to address their short term liquidly crisis and recover back to normalcy over a period.

The fact that there will be minimal cash inflows during the moratorium period and delayed payments by customers who are not eligible for moratorium schemes are expected to have a negative impact on the earnings, cash flows and liquidity position of the Bank, however, based on the internal assessment undertaken by the Bank, there is no significant adverse impact to the regulatory capital ratios

Required adjustments have been made for the potential implications on the operations of the Bank in these financial statements taking into consideration the negative economic trends based on the available information as at Reporting date. The Board will continue to monitor the implications and make adjustments, if required.

Expected Credit Loss calculation

During the year additional focus was made on the assessment of adequacy of provision for Expected Credit Loss (ECL) recognized in the financial statements based on the internal models, management overlay computed based on stress testing the exposures to risk elevated sectors, to address the potential implications of COVID-19 Pandemic and the moratorium schemes introduced to support the
