The launch of the official website of the Women Parliamentarians' Caucus in line with International Women's Day is scheduled to take place today (9) at the Parliament Complex.





The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) on Sunday (7) delivered the first shipment of 264,000 doses of the Oxford AstraZeneca vaccine provided to Sri Lanka under the World Health Organization's COVAX

As per the statistics of the Epidemiology Unit of the Ministry of Health, Sri Lanka has already given the AstraZeneca vaccine to more than 729,562 people.

Meanwhile, the total number of patients receiving treatment for COVID-19 has been reduced to 3,134.

The total number of COVID-19 positive cases detected from the country reached 85,695 by yesterday morning and 82,059 of them have fully recovered.

Meanwhile, the country confirmed five more COVID-19 related fatalities on Sunday (7) raising the death toll from the viral disease to 502.

The Public Security Minister said this at the ceremony organised to establish Public Security Committees in the Southern Province.

He said the three main factors that contribute to the increase in crime in Sri Lanka are the lack of discipline, restraint and a feeling towards the country. He said that the main rea son he had proposed military training for the youth was to instill that sense of discipline, restraint and sense of patriotism. However, he said that some people misunderstood his proposal and thought he wanted to militarise the country.

Minister Weerasekara also noted that some elements in the Opposition in order to gain political advantage are trying to point fingers at the Government over the Easter Sunday terror attacks which took place during the previous regime. He said that everyone connected with the previous regime should take responsibility for destabilizing the intelligence units of this country.

"The authorities have arrested almost 7,600 in connection with the Easter Sunday terror attacks and upon interrogation, almost 300 of them have been identified as having had direct and indirect connections to the Easter Sunday attacks. Of them conspiracy and murder charges have already been filed against 32 suspects while 241 are detained under detention orders for their indirect

involvement in the attacks. Filing charges against those connected with the Easter attacks was delayed as we had to wait for the Presidential Commission report. However, now that we have received the report, charges will be filed against those responsible without

Additional Solicitor General Priyantha Nawana appearing for the Attorney General sought further time to decide whether they will continue to appear on behalf of several respondents who were implicated through the report of the Presidential Commission appointed to probe Easter Sunday

On a previous occasion, the Attorney General had informed the Supreme Court that he would no longer represent two respondents former President Maithripala Sirisena and former Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe since they do not hold such positions.

On October 2, 2019, the Supreme Court decided to grant leave to proceed in terms of Article 12(1) of the Constitution in respect of former President Maithripala Sirisena and former Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe, former IGP Pujith Jayasundara and former Defence Secretary Hemasiri Fernando.

Former Minister Patali Champika Ranawaka, his driver Dilum Thusitha Kumara and former Welikada Police OIC Sudath Asmadala appeared in Court when the case was taken up before Colombo High Court Judge Damith Thotawatta and the Judge issued summons to 1st to 5th witnesses and the Secretary to the Finance Ministry, who has been named as the 20th witness in the case to appear before the Court on the next hearing.

Deputy Solicitor General Dileepa Peiris appearing on behalf of the Attorney General sought from the Court to issue an order to the Secretary to the Ministry of Finance to produce the vehicle bearing No WP KT 7545 which was involved in the accident, which was under the Ministry of Power and Energy at the time of the accident in 2016 and which is now under the Ministry of Finance, to the Court as a case production item in the next hear-

Accordingly, the judge issued an order to the Secretary to the Ministry of Finance to take steps to produce the vehicle in Court at the next hearing.

The 'B' Report of the Colombo Additional Magistrate's Court related to this case was presented to the Court by the prosecution

yesterday and the Deputy Solicitor General informed the Court that steps will be taken to provide copies to the defense as well.

The Colombo High Court judge ordered the prosecution to keep the 'B' Report submitted to the Court as it is in the custody of the prosecution and to present it before the Court if necessary.

Attorney-at-Law Rajika Kodithuwakku appearing for Former Minister Patali Champika Ranawaka informed the Court that a preliminary objection will be filed on behalf of the accused Ranawaka in the future regarding the continuation of this case.

The Deputy Solicitor General stated that if the accused intends to file a preliminary objection before the Court, the prosecution should be informed beforehand.

Accordingly, the Colombo High Court Judge ordered the defence to give advance notice if there was a preliminary objection and fixed the trial on May 31.

On July 10, the Attorney General had filed two separate indictments before the High Court against former MP Patali Champika, his driver Thusith Dilum Kumara and ASP Sudath Asmadala over the hit-and-run accident at

Patali Champika on charges of causing grievous injury to a youth named Sandeep Sampath while driving a vehicle in a reckless

manner. The second indictment comprising 16 charges was filed against all three accused on charges of fabricating false evidence, conspiracy of fabricating evidence and sub-

mitting false reports to the Court. The main charge relates to conspiring and fabricating false evidence to claim that it was Dilum Thusith Kumara who was driving the vehicle which caused the accident and another charge relates to him allegedly conspiring to conceal evidence in order to protect MP Patali Champika from legal

penalty. ASP Sudath Asmadala was charged with producing a false report to the Colombo Magistrate's Court in order to protect former MP Patali Champika from legal penalty.

On previous occasions, indictments were served on all three accused who were released on a cash bail of Rs.10,000 and two sureties of Rs.500,000.

Twenty women from Matara celebrated International Women's Day yesterday by participating in an innovative entrepreneurship training programme supported by the U.S. Government in partnership with Sri Lanka's Department of Samurdhi Develop-

Phase two of the project will provide training for another 1,500 women in Matara and will be rolled out to 6,000 trainees in five additional districts. The project,

called YouLead, will also launch free online entrepreneurship training modules that are accessible to anyone with entrepreneurship aspirations via www.youlead.lk.

"We are pleased to continue our partnership with USAID's YouLead project to build the capacity of women entrepreneurs in rural communities," said State Minister for Samurdhi Minister Shehan Semasinghe. "This partnership has proven highly effective and will empower women across the country over the next two years through training workshops. It will increase female participation in our econo-

Too early to comment on UNHRC Resolution - TELO

JAYATILLEKE DE SILVA - the perennial quest for the truth

ayatilleke de Silva, who passed away two years ago (February 2019), was the quintessential journalist. He brought his vast experience in education, politics, academia, literature and wider society into the journalistic world. This versatility enabled him to embellish his work as the Editor of both the Daily News and the Sunday Observer. He was widely read, always well-informed and in touch with reality.

Although his primary focus was politics, which he reflected through his editorials, columns and features, he had an ear to the ground with regard to all contemporary issues. As the editor, he advised his journalists to

give priority to human interest stories, instead of always hunting for politically-oriented stories.

He knew the power of words and excelled in combining words in a superlative manner, be it Sinhala or English. Thus, his columns in both languages were eagerly awaited by the readers and sometimes loathed by politicians and other bigwigs, as he reserved his sharpest words for them. But fear was not a word found in his vocabulary. He fought for what he believed was right – once when a superior found fault with him for running a copy which angered a big advertiser, he stood his ground, stood by his reporter and resigned.

Journalism was in his very veins. Even a few hours before his death, he asked a nurse to bring him the day's newspapers to keep up to date with the day's events. In fact, he continued to write columns to newspapers until a few weeks before his demise.

Although he was not in the Editor's seat of the *Daily News* when it celebrated its centenary in 2018, it was a very happy moment for him. Despite his illness, he came to the celebrations and made it a point to talk to everyone at the *Daily News* where he once mentored them. He invited me to his home to discuss about

the 100th anniversary of the *Daily News* and journalism in general. The following were gleaned from some of his observa-

That *Ceylon Daily News* enjoys a prominent standing as an established, respected and much-revered flagship newspaper in the industry is a fact. The newspaper provides the official standpoint of the incumbent Government without distorting the state of affairs. Jayatilleke de Silva deemed it a privilege to be Editor-in-Chief of a newspaper of that calibre on three occasions.

"I enjoyed all the three periods as the paper's Editor-in-Chief. That is simply because of the team I had to work with. They carried on well with me."

De Silva, however, was quick to point out the limitations naturally imposed on the paper because of its government stakeholders. The political interference reached a hegemonic state at times, based on the personality of whoever calls the shots.

"Defending diverse opinions was not much welcome at times. That made it difficult to relay proper information to the reader." The political interference to a greater extent served as a hurdle in maintaining the readership trust. What was the solution to that?

"I wanted to make the paper a wideranging platform. So I introduced various light-reading materials to kindle the readership."

Jayatilleke de Silva occupied the Editor's chair in 2000, 2003 and 2009. He fought tooth and nail to uphold the journalistic integrity while his contemporaries sought the rosy path of being 'too friendly' with the political masters. While others chose to toe the line, he dared not to. And the result: he was the cornered one among 'chosen editors'.

"As a government newspaper, we are supposed to present the government opinion. There is no question about that. But I was not ready to go over the top."

A Parliamentarian once made use of Parliamentary time to criticise another person on a certain wrongdoing. The news appeared on page one of Lake House newspapers, except for the *Daily News*. On the *Daily News*, it was in the Lobby column. The following day, de Silva was summoned to offer an explanation as to why he failed to give it page one publicity. It was not page one material, de Silva had explained.

During another different political period, a media advisor to a VVIP wanted his write-up to appear as an editorial in the *Daily News*. "If I am the editor, it's my responsibility to decide which story should go in which section. That said, I have the final say in the editorial as well. That seemingly brash conduct developed into an unsavoury relationship between de Silva and the political bosses of the day. They grew furious when he was not ready to play to their whims

"The thing with the political apparatus is that they see everything in black and white. They fail to notice the grey

areas. They do not want us to

produce the truth all the time."

Jayatilleke de Silva had to pull out all the stops to keep the paper from losing its esteem. But the job before him was not that easy. Restricted terminology was an added hurdle to the editor's sovereignty.

editor's sovereignty.

The editorship posed him quite a challenge, yet Jayatilleke de Silva braved the odds all the time upholding the integrity of the Fourth Estate.

Born in Ambalangoda in 1938, De Silva was a graduate of the Colombo University. His first profession was teaching. After a brief stint as the Principal of Deniyaya Central College, he left the teaching to pursue a full time career in politics from the Sri Lanka Communist Party,

of which he was an active member for a few decades.

His first foray into journalism was from the Aththa newspaper of the Communist Party. He soon earned a reputation as an author and translator of several seminal works on socialism and other trends in politics. His most well-known work is the massive three-volume Sinhala translation of Karl Marx' definitive treatise on the socialist model "Das Kapital".

The entire print run of the three volumes was sold out. After retiring from politics, he re-entered journalism, joining the *Daily News* in the late 1990s and becoming its Editor-in-Chief in 2001. He was appointed Editor of the *Daily News* again from 2003-2004 and also held the post of Chief Editor, *Sunday Observer* for a few years. He was well known for his sharp editorials and journalistic acumen

After leaving Lake House, he continued to write political columns to both English and Sinhala newspapers. A fearless writer and a critical analyst of contemporary politics, his Cross Currents column in the *Daily News* was eagerly awaited by readers.

He also spoke regularly at political forums and discussions on current issues. There are plans to issue some of his yet unpublished works.

He knew the power of words and excelled in combining words in a uperlative manner, be it Sinhala or English. Thus, his columns in both languages were eagerly awaited by the readers and sometimes loathed by politicians and other bigwigs, as he reserved his sharpest words for them. But fear was not a word found in his vocabulary. He fought for what he believed was right – once when a superior found fault with him for running a copy which angered a big advertiser, he stood his ground, stood by his reporter and resigned

his tribute is in remembrance of my father-in-law, the late Dr. Neville Fernando who would have celebrated his 90th birthday today (9). He passed away unexpectedly on February 4, this year due to the deadly COVID-19 virus.

His birthday will be remembered with an almsgiving to the priests at a temple in Kotikawatta to invoke merit on him to attain the Supreme Bliss of Nibbana. Religious observances on his birthday were an annual occurrence even during his lifetime.

As I ponder about his memories, being 'no more' is the saddest thought that crosses my mind. I believe you also understand what I mean. Death means that our loved ones never grow a year older, although logic does little to clear up our confusion when the birthday continues to happen every year.

His memories and good deeds done by him throughout the life brought back towards the day I joined his family, when I was just a medical house-officer at the Nawalapitiya Hospital in 1982, through marriage to his only daughter. Even then, he was known to be a real legend and an honest politician. Today I am in this position as a cardiologist due to his encouragement, loving care and continuous assistance in whatever means. My mind is full of memories of those loving moments shared together. He was a loving, kind and straight gentleman. I may also use the words "handsome" and "charismatic" leader. He will inspire us throughout our lives though he is no longer with us. His pleasant disposition would charm anyone and uplift everyone's mood.

He led a good life and now has left a good legacy of four children (three boys and a girl) whom any father would be proud of, nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren loved by everyone. He is no more and no one can fill the void nor bring back the warmth and love he exuded.

We all have the courage and we have our convictions, but rarely have the courage of our conviction. Kindness and compassion were the key attributes that made him so special. He had been a good general practitioner before coming to Parliament defeating a formidable Leftist politician Leslie Goonewardene who represented Panadura for decades. It was a landmark victory for the United National Party (UNP) in 1977. He was a kind and compassionate doctor who served the rich and the poor alike in Panadura for many years and was sought after by his patients for his well-known 'ath gune' (healing hands). This is where he earned his loyal fan base to enter into politics

Among many things he achieved in Panadura, establishing the Kethumathi Maternity Hospital, the only one of its kind outside Colombo, helping Sri Sumangala Girls School Expansion Programme, starting the Agamathi Balika Vidyalaya and Janadhipathi Boys School and self-funding the Sri Saugatha Vidyalaya Pirivena building at Rankoth Viharaya in Panadura are a few.

He also started an industrial zone on an abandoned marshy area in Modarawila, Panadura. He provided the

first computer laboratory and two acres of additional land to expand the Sri Sumangala School which is still spoken with gratitude by the students of his Alma Mater.

He was a fearless, principled and honest man who opposed former President J.R. Jayewardene's motion to strip former Premier Sirimavo Bandaranaike of her civil rights, as he never wanted to compromise his basic human qualities over politics. Very soon he left the Government before any attempt to expel him and formed a small party with a few other honest politicians. Later, he joined the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP) at the invitation of Sirimavo Bandaranaike and worked in the party as an assistant secretary for the progress of the country.

He was a maverick par excellence, an entrepreneur, extraordinaire and a businessman with a foresight. As one of the pioneers in the hospitality industry, he built the Hotel Swanee, subsequently, he started JF&I, one of the most modern printing and packaging factories in the country to date. He also pioneered the porcelain factory, Royal Fernwood Porcelain, in Kosgama, Avissawella which provided many employment opportunities and helped to economically develop the area.

Continuing his political career, he entered Parliament again as an SLFP opposition member. In 1994, he decided to give up politics. His divestments in the porcelain factory enabled him to purchase the Asha Central Hospital which was developed with the latest equipment and brought to international standards. This is the time I had

to make a difficult decision to leave the Government as a consultant cardiologist and join the Asha Central Hospital in 1998 to help him in his endeavour. He developed and managed this hospital till 2007 and subsequently sold it to start his new venture, the South Asian Institute of Technology and Medicine (SAITM) with the encouragement of the then Higher Education Minis-

ter Vishwa Warnapala. I was very much concerned about the new development because of the past experience in the country with the North Colombo Medical College. He always used to tell, "Every child should have the right for a decent education either in a government or non-government organization." His main vision was to give a higher education opportunity for students. Therefore, apart from medicine, he also established nursing, engineering, IT and management programmes with the help of esteemed academics who believed in his vision. He established Dr. Neville Fernando Teaching Hospital (NFTH) in Malabe to provide clinical training for his students at the medical faculty. It was an impressive state-of-the-art hospital with 1,002 beds and the latest medical equipment. All these achievements were made during his 80s which is remarkable.



At 89 years of age, he was an avid Facebook warrior and used to keep abreast of what was going on in the social media. He was a big cricket fan and never missed watching a cricket match day or night.

Writing about this unique personality cannot be limited to a few words. His life is a monumental story full of new chapters. He dreamed big

Share of Women Parliamentarians Reaches

'All-Time High'

here is a long way to go to achieve gender parity. But a new report reveals that the share of women parliamentarians worldwide reached more than 25 percent in 2020 marking a historic step.

Women in Parliament report was launched on March 5 ahead of the International Women's Day on March

wide," Secretary-General of UN partner the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU) Martin Chungong said at the UN Office in Geneva. "The global average of women in parent." now reached 25.5 percent." "While we celebrate and welcome this all-time high, we feel that pro-

gress is painstakingly or even excruciatingly slow," Chungong said. "At the current rate, it will take another 50 years before we can achieve gender parity in Parliament. And of course, we all agree that this is not tenable, it's not acceptable.'

The global organization of national Parliaments, the IPU, has been tracking women's participation in Parliament for decades, enabling it to

measure progress and setbacks. The global proportion of women in Parliament increased by 0.6 points following the elections in 2020 compared to the previous year.

The IPU chief singled out Rwanda, Cuba and the United Arab Emirates for having achieved gender parity, with women accounting for 50 percent or more parliamentary seats.

Mentioning Rwanda as a role model for women's participation in government, Chungong said, "we have seen evidence that countries have come out of conflict and have had the opportunity to re-found the foundations of society, the legal framework of society, there is a greater chance of promoting gender equality because this is something that has been articulated at the international level and it's an opportunity for the society as a whole to sit down and say 'this is what we want in the Constitution'."

The IPU considers quotas as the key to progress, as evidenced by elections held in 2020. Electoral gender quotas were applied in 25 of the 57 countries that had parliamentary renewals last year. On average, Parliaments with quotas elected nearly 12 percent more women to single and lower chambers and 7.4 percent more women to upper chambers.





President provides grants to homeless families

Families who had been in possession of government lands without clear ownership started receiving grants under the patronage of President Gotabaya Rajapaksa at the Presidential Secretariat, yesterday, the President's Media Division stated yesterday.

The government's objective is to ensure that every family owns a land with undisputed ownership as envisioned in the National Policy Framework 'Vistas of Prosperity and Splendour'. Under the provisions of the Land Development Ordinance and the State Land Ordinance, grants will be awarded to 20,000 persons based on legal criteria covering the island during the first phase of the programme, the statement read.

The programme prioritises lowincome families whose livelihood is cultivation. The government intends to empower and encourage them by providing with ownership rights to their lands in order to increase their level of income, the press release added.

The recipients of these lands can use them to build a house, for agricultural purposes, and business activities. It is expected to strengthen the national economy with the contributions made by the recipients of these lands as well, the statement read.

The grant, awarded by the President, is considered a deed, indicating undisputed ownership of specific lands. The beneficiaries of this grant can obtain a bank loan placing them as collateral. The President stated that he expects to issue 100,000 ownership grants before the end of this year, the President's Media Division added.

President Rajapaksa provided grants to 19 persons from different provinces to symbolise the launch of the programme yesterday. It is jointly carried out by the Presidential Secretariat, the Ministry of Lands, and the Ministry of Mahaweli. Minister S.M. Chandrasena, State Ministers SiripalaGamalath and Anuradha Jayaratne, Secretary to the President P.B. Jayasundera, Principal Adviser to the President Lalith Weeratunga, as well as secretaries and officials of line ministries were also present at the event.



Indian **Coast Guard** seizes three Lankan boats with narcotics

Twelve persons detained

Three Sri Lankan boats carrying narcotics were seized by the Indian Coast Guard off Kerala's Vizinjam coast and 12 people were detained on Sunday, a senior official said.

Two hundred kilograms of cocaine, 60kg of hashish, and other equipment were seized from the boats, a senior official of the Coast Guard said. He said details would be known only after questioning the detainees. The **Indian Coast** Guard did not reveal the market value of the seized drugs.

According to initial reports, large quantities of drugs were dumped into the sea when the Coast Guard encircled the three boats. The boats were carrying 19 people at the time, but seven of them had jumped into the sea.

A search is ongoing with the help of local fishermen to locate them. Preliminary reports suggest that the vessels were bound for the Karnataka and Goa coasts.

How far away is 'normal'?

lobal behaviour patterns have been dictated to a great extent by the Covid pandemic, and we are only seeing the tip of the iceberg of changed pandemic induced trends. For example, though many people would have suspected that there is a tendency to squirrel away money during a pandemic, few thought there would be a record breaking increase in the number of savings deposits. This trend was also replicated in the large companies that were able to stash money for a rainy day — even though smaller businesses did not have that choice.

The question then is, how long will these tendencies remain — and how salutary is it for the economy to have people resort to this trend of stashing cash, if the country is to recover from the Covid ravages?

Behaviour patterns that have been entrenched during the pandemic have to change in all areas of civic life — and not only in the area of business and economy. With the vaccine programme now in full swing, people are more confident than they used to be in public spaces. Of course there is a danger inherent in that situation, because the health authorities say the vaccine *per se* will not spell an end to Covid related dangers — at least not in the short term.

In the long term, behaviours such as the wearing of masks, social distancing etc. will have to change, and there should be adequate preparation for such a return to the pre-Covid normal, which seems a distant memory now. Would people have to be retaught the fundamentals of social intercourse? This may sound a rather absurd query, but decisions will have to be made about how people would interact in society, particularly in work related contexts. Will there be a continuing trend to conduct business remotely, or are individual businesses poised to return to the pre-Covid normal of an office based working environment?

There would be many who would retort, saying that such considerations would be the least of our problems. There are issues that are of an entirely different league — such as the overall economic security of the people, and health related issues such as whether the level of herd immunity is safe enough at some point to officially declare that the pandemic is over, and that life can return to normal.

At the moment, these questions are almost academic, as this is the first phase of the vaccination programme and there is much to be done before we reach a comfort level that allows for decision making on such matters. Yet, there are certain issues with regard to which people cannot wait much longer.

People cannot wait for the economy to improve — they need that aspect of their lives to transform into pre-Covid levels at least in a few months. Considering the level of urgency, the practice of stashing money in banks should probably give way to freer spending as the economy gradually picks up.

The resultant increasing money circulation is not something that we should desire as a matter of choice — it is something that society should collectively demand as mandatory. In other words, people should encourage each other to spend more, and that means to spend reasonably, as opposed to stashing away money in banks with unseemly miserliness, that the circumstances in fact do not warrant.

The markets have not exactly started moving after the Covid induced stall and that is a matter of great concern. If Real Estate values are considered, it is reported that prices have shot up in that market, but it doesn't appear that there is much movement in the land sale and resale business. People are slow in making purchases, and the newly-formed Covid induced habit of stashing away money in banks may be a reason for such caution.

There is however, little that can be done in terms of messaging that will change people's minds. The confidence that would induce people to return to normal levels of transacting business has to come from within the system, and that is something that can be prodded on, but not carried out on command.

It requires a determined collective effort to bring everything back to normality, not just the economy, and a return to normal lifestyles — in everyday human interactions — is the surest way to ensure that life comes back to business as usual, particularly for businesses and their customers. To this end, the 70th Anniversary Show by the Sri Lanka Air Force was a happy augur. It was a healthy signal that the Government is keen on a return to normal, but within the parameters of specific controls. The Air Show was in the skies, but the spectators were gathered on the vast Galle Face esplanade, where the threat of virus spread is not acute as to be considered dangerous. It is a different story altogether in closed-door environments, and the phased return to normal closed-door events would accordingly be much more gradual. But already, in all aspects of life, we are seeing light at the end of the tunnel, and that is what matters.

INDIA, SRI LANKA: STRATEGIC REALISM IN BILATERAL TIES

y reciprocating Sri Lanka's past declaration of following an 'India First' foreign policy, New Delhi has now said that the southern neighbour is the nation's 'Priority One' defence partner. This should clarify the Governmental-level approach to the strategic community and the local media in the two countries.

The Indian High Commission in Colombo employed the 'Priority One' terminology while announcing the participation of the Indian Air Force (IAF) in the 70th anniversary celebrations of the Sri Lankan counterpart, Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF). A section of the Tamil media in the island-nation sought to precipitate the issue by claiming that the IAF aircraft doing acclimatisation sorties over the nation's near skies was New Delhi's way of 'telling Colombo to behave.' They did not have the guts to apologise.

IAF boss, Air Chief Marshal R.K.S. Bhadauria, was on hand for the inaugural ceremony. He also met Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa and Defence Secretary, Gen. Kamal Gunaratne. As could be anticipated, a Sinhala-Buddhist 'nationalist' group questioned the need for involving foreigners in a Sri Lankan celebration. They had forgotten that in the early years of the LTTE war, Israeli pilots had reportedly participated in SLAF operations and British

mercenaries trained army commandos. In context, the High Commission statement also recalled how visiting National Security Advisor (NSA) Ajit Kumar Doval had reiterated the Indian assurance of fullest cooperation in the field of defence and security during his Sri Lanka visit. Doval was in Colombo to co-chair the meeting of the tri-nation maritime cooperation discussions, also involving common neighbour Maldives. They decided to upgrade the threenation 'Maritime Security Agreement' into 'Maritime and Security Agreement,' encompassing all aspects of trilateral security.

Significantly, Colombo was chosen for locating the secretariat for the new arrangement. This meant that implied Indian concerns about a greater Chinese role in Sri Lanka was being addressed effectively on the security front. This was one aspect that did not get adequately highlighted by either the Indian strategic community or their media counterparts.

From ECT to WCT

New Delhi's 'Priority One' statement comes at a time when critics of China in India and elsewhere were over wrought with the Rajapaksa dispensation in Colombo withdrawing earlier consent for a tri-nation MoC (memorandum of cooperation), also involving Japan, for developing the Colombo Port's Eastern Container Terminal (ECT). Sri Lanka has since announced that the Cabinet of President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa has cleared a proposal from the Adani Group — the Indian partner identified by New Delhi — and a Japanese firm — to be proposed by Tokyo — for trilateral development of the Western Container Terminal (WCT) in the same port-front. However, adding a new twist to the tale,

India has now clarified that Sri Lanka's claim of Indian approval for WCT was 'factually incorrect.' Colombo had claimed Indian High Commission attestation to the 35-year pact between the Adani Group and the nation's Special Economic Zone company. "Our High Commission in Colombo has already conveyed to the Government of Sri Lanka that their media release insofar as the reference to the approval of the High Commission was concerned, is factually incorrect," Anurag Srivastava, Spokesman for the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), said in New Delhi. He clarified that the WCT arrangement was the "Government of Sri Lanka [who] has engaged directly with investors on this project."

Indications are that India, along with Japan, will press Sri Lanka for living up to its ECT commitment, which was an international agreement. Yet, the perceived confusion attending New Delhi distancing itself from the chosen ECT nominee purportedly doing the WCT business behind the Government's back, with the very same party, is not unlikely to cast a shadow, if not as much as the earlier cancellation.

As may be recalled, the Rajapaksas' regime had repeatedly claimed that the cancellation of the ECT deal owed (also) to the Indian partner's request/ position. Translated, it could refer to the Adanis, along with a Japanese entity, ipso facto being denied a majority stake in the ECT deal, and had to share 49-per cent share between them. Against this, in the WCT deal, the overseas partners would get 85-per cent stake as was with China in the Colombo International Container Terminal (CICT), which is already in operation and confer freedom of decisionmaking on the overseas entities.

Security concerns

Notwithstanding the ECT front, Colombo has held back approval for a Chinese firm to set up renewable energy projects in three islands off the Jaffna Peninsula in the North, closer to the Indian coast. Now, it has seemingly accepted a US\$ 12-million Indian grant (against an ADB loan), when offered, but only after the Beijing

decision became known.

Through this decision, Colombo seemingly wanted to send home the message that it really appreciated Indian security concerns flowing from China and/or Pakistan, from Sri Lankan soil. This has been the Rajapaksa position, too, on 'non-regional powers' playing their strategic games in the shared Indian Ocean waters. Hence, also the continuing Sri Lankan decision, along with that of Maldives, to stick to India on the security suberce

There were apprehensions that Sri Lanka may go the China way, especially after India signed into the US-promoted Quad and the Maldives recently signed its first overseas defence pact with the US in September last year. The US defence deal entails military-level cooperation and training, possibly also on Maldivian soil. In comparison, the Indian pact, signed during the recent Male visit of External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar, is limited to a US\$ 50 million grant for building a dockyard for use by the Maldivian Coast Guard.

Friend and relative

However, all of this has not dissuaded Sri Lanka from declaring China as its 'closest friend.' Foreign Minister Dinesh Gunawardena made the statement in a telephone conversation with his Chinese counterpart. It was not an occasion for him to reiterate the oft-repeated statement of Mahinda Rajapaksa, as war-time President, that "India is a relative, and all others are friends."

As only one of the two P-5 members in the UN Security Council (UNSC) supporting Sri Lanka, the other being Russia, China especially is said to be overworking its diplomatic machinery to garner support for Colombo, against the Core Group resolution on the 'war crimes probe,' coming up for vote later this month. China's Permanent Representative at Geneva defended Sri Lanka and its human rights record.

In contrast, the Indian statement at the UNHRC has at best been neutral. It did not side with the West-led Core Group to condemn Sri Lanka on human rights violations and war crimes. Nor has it sided with the Rajapaksas, and backed them blindfolded. It abstained from a discussion on the Sri Lanka resolution draft, along with Japan.

The current Indian position has added an element of suspense to the final Indian vote, later this month. Sri Lankan leaders, both governmental and of Tamils, have been seeking a clear Indian vote in their favour, eschewing 'abstain' as a choice. In a loaded statement, meant to recall India's past engagement with the LTTE in particular, Foreign Secretary, ex-Navy chief, Admiral Jayanath Colombage told *The Hindu*, "India cannot abandon us."

China extended unqualified support to and defence of the human rights record of Sri Lanka at the UNHRC. Instead, India has carefully calibrated its entire statement on the inevitability of a political solution, centred on and flowing from the 13th Amendment, facilitated by the slain Rajiv Gandhi dispensation as far back as 1987. Coming from the incumbent Narendra Modi dispensation, such a stand should also send out a clear message that ruling parties at the Centre do not take their domestic political rivalries, overseas.

For all this, however, Sri Lanka — even while approaching China for a further US\$ 2.2 billion credit to try and tide over the deep economic crisis facing the nation — has outright rejected the "closest friend's" Sinopharm vaccine to tackle the COVID-19 pandemic. Instead, it preferred the India-gifted vaccine, and has also ordered Covishield — the AstraZeneca vaccine — for large-scale purchase from elsewhere. Colombo has also cleared Russia's Sputnik-V vaccine that had undergone a third trial, for Emergency Use.

China, for its part, lost no time in denying Minister Gunawardena's claim that it had a 199-year lien on Hambantota port, and not just 99 years as believed. No Sri Lankan political party or leader has thus far questioned the government on the contradiction.

To conclude, India and Sri Lanka have injected pragmatism into bilateral relations, which began disappearing after China's entry through the Hambantota port deal a decade ago. Now, there is a greater understanding of India's strategic concerns and what Sri Lanka seems to perceive as 'commercial transaction'. This could mean that after a brief hiccup, if it came to that, the two nations would be able to take forward bilateral relations, independent of the Indian decision on the UNHRC vote, and Sri Lanka's greater reliance on China for the purpose.

HOW DO WE **ACQUIRE A LANGUAGE?**

A LANGUAGE MATTERS

'n the last article we discussed what is referred to as the 'problem of language acquisition/learning'. We discussed two of the dominant approaches to language acquisition/learning, namely behaviourism and innatism. We reached the conclusion that neither approach on its own is able to account for the full range of facts pertaining to language acquisition/learning. I hope this discussion served to understand the nature of the processes involved in language acquisition/ learning in a better manner. Another notion related to language acquisition is language competence. What actually happens in the acquisition/learning of a particular language is that we gain competence of that language. However, Noam Chomsky marked a difference between competence and performance of a language. We are going to discuss this in detail now.

Competence of a language

Competence of a language refers to what we know about our language. In other words, it refers to our tacit and subconscious knowledge of the sounds, words, phrases, sentences, meaning and contextual use of our language. It also refers to our tacit and subconscious knowledge of the grammatical rules, patterns and structures of the sounds, words, phrases, sentences, meaning and contextual use of the language. For instance, it is my competence of the English language that enables me to produce (speak or write) a sentence like the



following. It is also your competence of the English language that enables you to understand this sentence. Your competence of the English language also enables you to speak or write a sentence like this.

Mary enjoys reading novels.

At the same time, my competence of the Sinhala and Tamil languages enables me to produce sentences like the following. In fact, I know that some of the speakers of Sinhala are not able to understand the sentence in Tamil and some of the speakers of Tamil are not able to understand the sentence in Sinhala. This is due to the lack of competence in one of the languages. Some of you are also not able to produce similar sentences in Sinhala or Tamil. This is also due to your lack of competence in one of the lan-

Gita padi-th-athu vingnaanam-aa Most of all, it is the competence of a particular language that enables us to make judgements about the grammaticality of a certain sentence or utterance. For instance, if you are able to say whether the following sentence in Sinhala is grammatical or not, you have the competence in the Sinhala

Kamal gedara-da giya? At the same time, if you are able to



sav whether the following sentence in Tamil is grammatical or not, you have the competence in the Tamil language.

Unakkupadam pidikkuma

Thus, competence refers to our tacit and subconscious knowledge of the form, grammatical rules, patterns and structures of the sounds, words, phrases, sentences, meaning and contextual use of the language. It is the competence of a particular language that enables us to produce and comprehend sentences or utterances in that particular language.

Performance of a language

Performance of a language refers to the actual use of language in speaking or listening. For instance, the actual production of the following sentence by me is an instance of performance

in the English language. The actual comprehension of the following sentence by you is also an instance of performance in the English language. Mary enjoys reading novels.

Thus, when we use language, we are actually performing in that lan-

The performance of a particular language may be hindered by external factors such as physical impairments like loss of teeth or illness or external conditions like fatigue or boredom. For example, the following is an instance that relates to the performance of a language by a speaker. In this scenario, Mary is not able to produce grammatically correct sentences as her performance is hindered by the damage in the brain. However, even though her brain is damaged, we cannot assume that she has lost her competence in Sinhala. Once, she recovers she might perform in Sinhala building on her competence in Sinha-

Mary who is 20-years-old is a speaker of Sinhala and recently had an accident and damaged her head. She is not able to produce grammatically correct sentences now.

However, *competence* is not affected by extraneous factors such as the ones mentioned above. For example, the following is an instance that relates to the competence of a language by a speaker. In this scenario, Ranjith is not able to produce grammatically correct sentences in English yet as he lacks competence in the English lan-

Ranjith is a native speaker of Sinhala. He is learning English and is not able to produce grammatically correct sentences in English yet.

This also shows that the performance of a speaker in a particular language depends on his/her competence in that particular language.

In today's article we discussed the difference between the competence and performance of a particular language by a speaker. I hope this discussion served to understand the nature of language ability and production by a speaker in a better manner. In today's article, we also discussed that part of what is involved in the competence of a particular language is our subconscious knowledge of the grammatical structures/patterns/rules associated with sounds, words, phrases and sentences of the language. Now, with respect to the grammar of a language we mark a difference nepura)

China's export growth highest in over two decades

CHINA: China's export growth jumped to the highest in over two decades, official data showed Sunday, with imports also surging in a sharp bounceback from the coronavirus outbreak that had brought activity to a near halt.

Electronics and textile exports such as masks contributed to the spike in outshipments, as demand for work-fromhome supplies and protective gear against the virus outbreak soared during the pandemic.

Exports spiked 60.6 percent on-year in the January-February period, well above expectations, while imports rose 22.2 percent, official data showed Sunday.

The latest figures stand in stark contrast to last year's fall of around 17 percent in exports and 4 percent drop in imports.

The country struggled to contain the spread of COVID-19 early on, with consumers staying home and businesses seeing a slow return to operations.

The customs administration said comparison to last year is also likely to have bolstered the latest figures, saying in a statement that the "low base is one of the reasons for the larger increase this year."

On Sunday, official data showed that electronics exports rose 54.1 percent, while textiles including masks rose 50.2 percent.

China's overall trade sur-

Senate clears Biden's COVID rescue plan

US: The US Senate on Saturday voted to approve a \$1.9 trillion relief package in what President Joe Biden called a "giant step" towards reviving the pandemic-stricken American economy, capping frenzied negotiations and a marathon overnight voting

Passed by 50 votes to 49 in a strict party line vote, the sweeping legislation now heads back to the Democratic-majority House of Representatives, where it is expected to be adopted, barring a last-

"I promised the American people help was on the way," said Biden in an address from the White House, after the plan was approved along strict

"Today, I can say we've taken one more giant step forward in delivering on that promise," he said. "It obviously wasn't easy. It wasn't always pretty. But it was so desperately needed."

Even without the progressive priority of a minimum wage increase to \$15 an hour, the stimulus bill marks a victory for Biden's Democrats as they put their stamp on the recovery from a pandemic that has killed more than 500,000 people in the United States and hobbled its economy.

Top Senate Democrat Chuck Schumer vowed that the bill "will deliver more help to more people than anything the federal government has done in dec-

The legislation would send out \$1,400 stimulus checks to most Americans and allocates \$350 billion to state and local governments and \$130 billion to

It would also provide \$49 billion for expanded COVID testing, tracing and research, and \$14 billion for vaccine distribution.

Steny Hoyer, the Democratic majority leader in the House, said the Chamber would take up the amended bill on Tuesday, with a view to sending it to Biden for his signature early next week. - AFP

Francis frenzy trumps pandemic fears in Iraq

IRAQ: Amid the excitement to see Pope Francis as he held his last public mass in Iraq on Sunday, the hopes of the faithful outdid the coronavirus precautions of the prudent.

"I don't know why people don't wear masks," said Bayda Saffo, an Iraqi woman attending the Pope's largest mass of his trip to Iraq, gripped by a resurgence of COVID-19.

Authorities in the Kurdistan regional capital of Arbil had feared the open-air liturgy at the Franso Hariri Stadium would become a "super-spreader" event for

the virus. They restricted attendance by issuing a limited number of tickets that meant the stadium was half full, with around 10,000 people attending.

Saffo and her teenage daughter wanted to take extra precautions -- each wore a double-layer of medical masks, a plastic faceshield and gloves. As excited as they were

to see the Pope, it was better to be safe than sorry, Saffo told AFP.

Francis and his entourage have been vaccinated, but Iraq only began its modest inoculation campaign days ago, with 50,000 jabs distributed to medical staff.

Iraq has documented more than 720,000 infections and more than 13,500 deaths - making it one of the nations hardest hit by the coronavirus in the Middle East.

Many observers had expected worse in a country, whose health infrastructure has been hit by decades of war and little invest-

Some believed that its overwhelmingly young population -- with 60 percent of its 40 million people aged under 25 -- had perhaps helped keep cases down. Following a long lock-

down last year, the numbers of new cases dropped to around 800 per day in late 2020. But they skyrocketed this year, with 5,000 daily infections in the days leading up to the papal

To stop the spread, authorities imposed overnight curfews and weekend lockdowns, extended to include the entirety of the Pope's visit, which lasts until Monday. It's not Iraq's first religious occasion under COVID-19. - AFP

GEORGE FLOYD'S UNCLE WANTS JUSTICE

US: Deeply wounded and forever changed by the death of his nephew George Floyd, Selwyn Jones is apprehensive about the trial starting Monday of the police officer charged with his murder, his doubts fueled by a legal system that historically has been friendly to law enforcement.

"I want justice to prevail," said Jones, a maternal uncle to the Black man whose death under the knee of white Minneapolis officer

Derek Chauvin sparked outraged protests around the world. obviously want conviction," Jones told AFP. But he said he worries about "the system."

Chauvin, who kept his knee on the neck of the prostrate Floyd for nearly nine minutes on May 25, 2020, faces murder and manslaughter charges in the trial in a Hennepin County district court, where jury selection begins Mon-

lives in the small town of Gettysburg, South Dakota, hundreds of miles to the west, said he hopes to attend part of the trial, though social distancing rules imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic mean only one family member can attend at a time.

To him, the video of the fateful episode - filmed by a passerby and now seen by millions around the world -- left no doubt: Chauday. The 55-year-old Jones, who vin is "guilty as hell."

Jones first saw the video on television, he didn't know who the Black man was lying facedown under a police officer's knee. "Damn," he said he thought at the time, "that gonna kill this dude!"

When his distraught sister called him with the news, Jones said, it was as if someone had "put their hands through my chest and ripped my heart out."

At the end of his school career, Ranjit, his father, and I went to meet a paternal uncle of mine to enquire whether he could accept Ranjit as a creeper on one of his estates. He went through Ranjit's credentials and suggested that it was better for him to become an accountant than become a planter.

Ranjit then followed a Chartered Accountancy Course and passed its intermediate examination. This qualification enabled him to become an accountant of the Ceylon Fertiliser

Corporation. After some time, he was promoted to Shipping Manager. He left the corporation after rising in ranks to become its General Manager. Thereafter, Ranjit joined CIC Holdings PLC as its Human Resources Manager and later continued as a Human Resources Consultant. He captained the respective cricket teams at both places and played cricket for Moratuwa SC under D.D. Jayasinghe. He later captained Moratuwa

Ranjit was a prominent member of S. Thomas' College Old Boys' Association. He helped them with their



payroll work for 10 years. He was ing in South Africa and the UK, also a guest of honour at the 136th 'Battle of the Blues', which was held on March 15, 2015. He had a long and close association with his alma mater from 1950 until his demise.

Ranjit married Preetha, daughter of J.H.L. de Silva and Julie de Silva. They became an exemplary and loving Christian couple. He was a devoted father to his two daughters Rammika and Shehara, as well as to his two sons-in-law Mandana Abeywardena and Samitha Fernando.

Ranjit was also an adoring grandfather to Devishka, Ramishka, and Shenura. They all knew how much he loved them. They were a united and closely-knit family. His sudden passing was painful to all his family and friends. It was especially heartbreaking for Rammika and Shehara and their families as they could not say their final goodbyes to him due to COVID-19 restrictions; they are livrespectively.

On June 29, Ranjit and Preetha attended the 7:00 a.m. Holy Mass at St Matthias' Church and returned home after the service was over. He had later collapsed while giving his dog a bath. A versatile policeman

Lewellyn Sinnott Bertus was a pioneer in the formation of a Police Dog Division in Sri Lanka. It was Sir Richard Aluvihare who initially established the police dog kennels in Colombo in 1948 with only three police constables under him, one of whom was Lewellyn Sinnott Bertus. Two of them left after a few months, but Bertus stayed until his retirement from the Police Department, serving for over 37 years.

In 1949, the police dog kennels were moved to Asgiriya in Kandy under Bertus' directions, as the climate there was deemed more suitable for dogs. Another factor was the availability of a Veterinary Faculty and Department at the University of Peradeni-

Bertus was initially trained in Scotland Yard in 1967 on a Colombo Plan Scholarship: he spent six months of intensive training under the programme and was subsequently appointed Officer-in-Charge of the Police Canine Division.

Bertus was instrumental in training handlers and dogs for locating narcotics, which was slowly growing in the country. He was instrumental in deploying police dogs at the Talaimannar Pier, which was an important transit point for tourists arriving in the country from India.





GLOBAL PLAYERS TO BOOST COVID VACCINE OUTPUT

SWITZERLAND: Global players are gathering online from Monday to brainstorm ways to rapidly boost vaccine production and fight a still-virulent coronavirus that has hobbled the world for 14 months.

Giving impetus to the meeting is a warning from the Geneva-based World Health Organization (WHO) that the pandemic will not end unless poor countries can keep up with accelerating mass vaccination campaigns in rich nations.

Partners of the Covax vaccine distribution initiative, led by the Gavi vaccine alliance and backed by research arm the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations as well as the WHO will meet online.

Government delegates, scientists and representatives of

the pharmaceutical giants as supply chains have been diswell as smaller drug makers from developing countries will also participate.

The aim is "to shine the light on the gaps that we have currently in the supply chain, of reagents, of raw material, of products that you need to make vaccines", WHO's chief scientist Soumya Swaminathan told a news conference on Friday. The pharmaceutical industry aims to produce 10 billion COVID-19 vaccine doses this year, which is double the 2019 manufacturing capacity for all kinds of vaccines.

Manufacturing these jabs requires not just an unprecedented quantity of ingredients, but also items such as glass for the vials and plastic for their caps - at a time when global

rupted by the pandemic, Swaminathan said.

"So the summit is really focusing on that upstream area, the gaps, how they can be filled and for solutions to be found."

Such interventions "can make a difference in the short term" even as WHO and others are already eyeing the longer-term course of the pandemic, she added.

Pressure from governments and public opinion has helped push the pharma groups, who usually jockey for a competitive advantage, into deals to produce more vaccine doses.

With its own vaccine development lagging, France's Sanofi will produce both the Pfizer-BioNTech and the John-

son & Johnson versions.

the Pfizer-BioNTech and Curevac vaccine, while Germany's Bayer is also set to help Cure-

Such deals are "very welcome", Swaminathan said. Efforts at boosting vaccine production should help the worst-off nations - who lack the cash to buy direct from pharma companies -- get their people immunised.

Virus reaches previously **COVID-free New Caledonia**

NEW CALEDONIA:

The remote Pacific territory of New Caledonia, one of the few places on the planet to have avoided COVID-19, is to go into strict lockdown after detecting nine cases, local officials said Sunday.

The outbreak on the French archipelago was detected after a school headteacher fell ill on the Wallis and Futuna islands -- another French territory in the Pacific -leading authorities to screen for cases.

"According to the first indications, the patient developed symptoms in mid-February and could have been infectious in Wallis and Futuna from the end of January," the head of the local government in New Caledonia, Thierry Santa, told



between the two French territories had previously been unrestricted, while anyone arriving from elsewhere had to undergo a strict 14-day quarantine in a hotel.

Santa announced a two-week lockdown for New Caledonia starting from Monday evening, to "break the transmission of the virus while there is still time".

The islands had previously succeeded in stopping community transmission of the novel coronavirus, which has reached almost all corners of the globe.

New Caledonia, which lies off the northwest coast of Australia, was once used as a penal colony by French authorities owing to its remote location.

Danish Navy transports COVID vaccines to remote Greenland areas

DENMARK: Denmark's military has started delivering Covid vaccines to remote settlements along Greenland's west coast, part of efforts to vaccinate isolated communities in the vast territory where logistics are complicated by extreme cold weath-

A naval patrol ship set out in mid-February to visit two settlements, fitted with a specialised refrigerator to store doses of the vaccine and ter them at the request of Greenland's health authorities.

The autonomous Danish territory's 56,000 inhabitants are spread over some 772,000 square miles (two million square kilometres), with a limited road network and the Arctic weather throwing up hurdles to air travel.

Greenland's health authorities have barred entry to the territory until April 18, with 31 transporting civilian cases of the infection

Vaccinations started on January 4 and Greenland's authorities asked the Danish military's Joint Arctic command in the capital Nuuk to help with settlements unreachable by air or due to the weather.

MYANMAR: Hein Yar Zar grimaced as a tattoo artist etched onto his chest the features of his first love, a young protester whose death has become a symbol of resistance against Myanmar's junta.

Mya Thwate Thwate Khaing was shot in the head during a demonstration in the capital Naypyidaw, becoming one of the coup's first fatalities on February 19 after 10 days in hospital.

Her image has since become synonymous with the bloody fight to wrest power from the military, which toppled Myanmar's civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi and knocked the country off the path for democracy last month.

For 21-year-old Hein Yar Zar, the abrupt end to his girlfriend's young life has filled him with resolve to keep protesting, even as he grieves.

"We had so many plans for this

was so near," he told AFP. "I got a tattoo of her portrait as I'm missing her -- it's a memory for us.

"She gave her life for this revolution -- as her boyfriend, I will keep doing it for her," he said. "I will keep fighting for this revolution to win." - AFP

Over 800,000 attend Modi rally before key state poll

INDIA: A crowd of up to 800,000 turned out for a state election rally by Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi as he sought to unseat one of his fiercest critics in a campaign hit by vio-

Modi's Hindu-nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has been seeking to expand its power at the state level, and is eyeing the eastern state of West Bengal where the larger-than-life Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee has ruled for a decade.

The state, home to more than 90 million people with some 73 million eligible to vote in the staggered polling that kicks off on March 27, has so far eluded the BJP.

The next 25 years of development are very important for West Bengal.

We want it to lead India when it celebrates 100 years of its independence,' Modi told the rally at the Brigade Parade Ground in the capital Kolkata, which can hold up to a million people.

Supporters held up life-size cardboard cutouts of Modi's image under the blazing sun. Hundreds also watched the rally from the rooftops of high-rise buildings overlooking the



Sri Lankan Olympic stars of yesteryear

Winston Van Cuylenberg was a threat to reputed boxers

Boxer Winston Van Cuylenburg who participated in the Tokyo Olympics in 1964 in the flyweight contest was popularly known as the 'Little Cat'.

While a student at St. Michael's College, Polwatte, his coach was Anton Jones. Under Jones' guidance Winston took part in the Stubbs Shield and Indo-Ceylon Schools Boxing Meets and showed his capabilities becoming a threat to competent local boxers.

It was a morale boost for him to have his brothers Ernest, Hans and Bunty too

Their house was fully committed to boxing. It was a common sight the house to be seen scattered with punching bags, weight sets and gloves.

It was a tradition for the brothers to box each other while at home. Their mother apart from keeping the house tidy found it most difficult to control her children. At the time of winning the flyweight National Championship, Winston was yet at school going age.


In 1963, at a boxing meet in Pakistan,

he won the Best Boxers award. In the local scene Winston defeated P. G. Neil, Farook and others of equal repute. Since there were enough boxers in flyweight class, Winston always fought in heavy-

weight classes. At the Tokyo Olympics in 1964, 19-year-old Winston lost to Constantin Ciyuka of Romania on points. In the Layton Cup events in 1965 he won the trophy awarded to the champion boxer.

In August, 1965 at a boxing meet in Singapore, he

defeated the British Army and Security Service bantamweight champion Bruce Woodcock while knocking him out. At this event, he won the trophy for the Best Boxer. Everyone thought that Winston would win a Gold Medal at the Second Asian Boxing Championships held in

on points to Korea's Fun I. Hawang but went on to win a Silver Medal. He resigned from the Army in 1965 and left for England to obtain training prior to competing in the ommonwealth Boxing Meet in 1966. In England, in the face of financial constraints he gave up amateur boxing and became a professional boxer.

One of his brothers Geoff was also by then a professional boxer in

England. The 'Ring' Magazine, which is considered as the Boxers Bible in its 1967 edition, carried Winston's name in the 10th position.

In 1967 he participated in seven boxing meets in the bantamweight class and won four of the games losing three. (C.D)

B.M.Dharmapala the boxer turned ruggerite

It is rare to witness a player occupying several positions in the pack, in the game of rugby, unless he has some extraordinary talent with well-maintained fitness levels, to play for quite a long time. Brahakmana Mudiyanselage Dharmapala was one of them who never held a rugby ball in his school career but later turned out to be an exceptional player during a career spanning almost two decades including clubs and at National level.

Dharmapala was born in 1967, in a remote village in the outskirts of Wariyapola in Kurunegala district. He was called as 'Dharma' in the sporting circles and his father was Appuhami Brahakmana and mother was Ukkamma. He was born with eight other siblings which included five sisters and three brothers. Due to his living area, he was admitted to Horrombuwa College,

Wariyapola until grade five and was later enrolled at Sri Sumangla College, Wariyapola, where he ended up completing his G.C.E. Ordinary Level examination. He was unable to continue further studies due to the burden of his family where he was forced to hunt for a job to take care of them. One of

his elder brothers was already in the Sri Lanka Police, and at the age of 18 years, he decided to join the Sri Lanka Army Singha

Dharmapala engaged in Putt Shot and Discus throw in the under-15 and was also active in the game of volleyball in the under-17 age categories, . He finally joined the Army in 1987 and was included to the Boxing team of the Army in Heavy weight category. He became a highly skilled boxer and was called to the National Boxing pool which he refused to join due to various reasons. In 1987, Major Jaliya Nammuni serving as the commanding officer had observed him closely and entrusted him to another colleague, Captain Wickremasinghe in his regiment, who was in charge of rugger to include Dharmapala to the Army rugby pool. As a novice in handling the oval shaped ball, he was a bit reluctant to play due to lack of knowledge of the game. He was initially coached by Colonel Kalu Weerasinghe and subsequently, P.G. Gunawardena, a wellknown figure in the rugby arena was instrumental in transforming him into a top player. Brigadier Japana Jayawardena and General Sarath Foneska played a pivotal role in mak-

ing him comfortable and gave the necessary support to continue his career, which was interrupted on various occasions due to the civil war, where the Army kept away from playing competitive rugby. From 1987 to 2004, he donned the Army jersey playing in all positions in the pack which was a unique

achievement.. During the disturbances in the country, he was released to play for Havelocks from 1989 to 1994 at his peak. Then he was requested by then Army Commander to cross over to the hill capital to lock horns for Kandy in the 1995/96 season while he was in the Army. He captained the Army rugby team for two years in 1996 and 1997 seasons. Ajith Abeyratne and Asanga Seneviratne also coached him in the Army. In 1990, he got the National call to represent the country and occupied all the positions as a utility player in the pack, and played for the Sri Lanka team for 13 years with distinction

He played for 'Bridge/Ends' club in Wales in 1997 and continued to play in all tournaments which the National team took part in his tenure as a player. The other unique feature of his career was playing for Sri Lanka in five Rugby Asiads consecutively starting from 1998. Jeff Matheson, Ajith Abeyratne, Tony Amit, retired senior DIG Nimal Lewke, Ana Saranapala and Late George Simpkin were his coaches in the Sri Lanka team

After his retirement he started his coaching career with the Army sevens rugby team and coached in 1992/1993 seasons, coached several schools like Prince of Wales (1996 -1997), Maliyadewa (2005 - 2008), St. Anne's (2008 - 2010 and 2014 - 2016), St. Anthony's forward coach (2017 - 2018), Air Force forwards coach (2009), Sri Lanka team supporting coach (2009 - 2010), Sri Sumangala College Kandy head coach (2016 - 2019)

Under his coaching he started rugby at Wariyapola Rugby and Sports Club in 2013, At present he is coaching St. Sylvester's and Singha Regiment in the Army. He worked as Wayamba rugby development officer (2005 - 2015). He followed a IRB level -2 coaching course in Australia 2002, a high performance and rugby sevens level-1 and level -2 coaching course in Malaysia while completing a referring course in 2004. His wife is Kumari and has two sons, Bawantha playing rugby for Trinity and Nimnada while Vishmi is the elder daughter who has graduated in Australia while Nishadini is the other daughter.

Sri Rahula College is a school with a history of over 130 years and one of the famous mixed schools in the country. It was established in 1890, by the Buddhist Theo sophical Society led by Colonel Henry Steel Olcott. They were founded as Kandy High school on a piece of land at Katugastota. Later it was renamed Sri Rahula College, and at one time was well known for athletics, football and hockey and later in the field of mini rugby and today they are a major force in cricket too. Thanks to the efforts of their old boys, who have turned them into a top sporting school

Sri Rahula College is one of Kandy's oldest cricket playing schools, started the game of cricket in 1890's but gave it up a few years . However, in the 1970's they came back into cricket. One of their best products was Asela Gunaratne who played in the years 2002-4. He became the first Rahula cricketer to represent the country when he was selected for the tour of Zimbabwe. He was guided correctly by one of the top school coaches lateAubrey Kuruppu, a well-known person in the coaching field. Asela

joined the Army and improved his cricket and went onto represent the country. Some of the cricketers learnt their finer points at this school and later crossed over to other schools to gain more recognition in their cricketing careers, and they never say they started the game at this school.

Sri Rahula College should be proud of Ishara Rangana Hewage who was selected as the "Most Popular Cricketer of the Year" by the Sri Lanka Schools Cricket Association. In 2019 they qualified to play in the semi-final of the under 19 Singer division III level one cricket tournament.

The Rahula cricketers beat St. Mary's College Matugama in the quarter finals on first innings. The players who excelled and helped the team win were Dilshan Arambegedera, Tharindu Fonseka, Thushan Senarath, Lahiru Wijeratne, Krishantha Dilshan, Shairi Ranatunga, Janith Maitipe and Akash Ghariyawasiri. In the early years late T.M A.

Cooray coached the Sri Rahula cricketers and gave his best for the game and produced some knowledgeable players.

A few years back late Aubrey Kuruppu gave a big hand and helped the school in a big way in cricket

Today Sri Rahula cricketers play their matches at Prisons Grounds Pallekelle and Police Grounds. AsgiriyaTheir own ground at Katugastota is only fit for practices, because the length and breadth of the ground is

The players right now are handicapped without a turf wicket. This school has a rich cricketing history.

Allen leads Windies to three-wicket win, T20 series triumph over SL

ST. JOHN'S, MONDAY: All-rounder Fabian Allen clobbered three sixes off the penultimate over to lead West Indies to a nervy three-wicket win against Sri Lanka in the final Twenty20 International on Sunday.

Chasing a modest target of just 132, the two-time world champions struggled in the run chase as their star trio of Chris Gayle, skipper Kieron Pollard and Dwayne Bravo all flopped.

Allen's three sixes came off spinner Akila Dananjaya as the 25-vear-old Jamaican smashed a desperately needed 21 off just six balls faced at Coolidge Cricket Ground. West Indies finished on 134-7, clinching the threegame series 2-1 after a fourwicket win in the first match followed by Sri Lanka's 43-run victory in the second.

Dananjaya was again the victim of some explosive West Indies batting after Pollard hit six sixes off one of his overs in the first game on Wednesday.

"I prepare for everything, including bowling in the powerplay," said Allen, who earlier took 1-13 opening the bowling.

"When I look in the dressing room we have a lot of batting

"I told (batting partner) Jason Holder that I'm not comfortable batting against (Wanindu) Hasaranga, so I told him to bat him out and I'll be finishing. I just backed myself in the end. It was a good performance overall."

The home side were cruising after limiting Sri Lanka to 131-4. Openers Evin Lewis (21) and

Lendl Simmons (26) gave them a solid start before Sri Lanka leg spinner Hasaranga (2-13) dismissed them both for a series haul of eight wickets.

Wrist spinner Lakshan Sandakan clean-bowled Gayle for 13, completing a poor international return for the 41-year-old who made just nought and 16 in the first two games. Gayle has now gone five years without a fifty in T20 internationals.

Pollard, who became only the third man to hit six sixes in an international over on Wednesday, was bowled by seamer Dushmantha Chameera for

Bravo too went for a duck, a second wicket in two balls for Sandakan having also sent back Rovman Powell.

Sandakan finished with 3-29 to follow his 3-10 from Friday's

Justice Minister Mohamed Ali Sabry focused attention towards improving working conditions of Sri Lankan women and highlighted certain barriers posed by Labour laws that restrict women's ability to enter and sustain themselves in the workforce.

The Minister made these comments during a high level panel discussion titled "Sri Lanka's Gender Discriminatory Labour Laws". The discussion was made both in Sinhala and English Languages

The discussion was moderated by Advocata Institute, Researcher Sathya Karunarathne. Members from policy circles, respective government departments,



social activists and members of the public also attended.

Opening the session Minister Ali Sabry said during the 1950's governments in Sri Lanka brought very important laws and regulations to protect the employment conditions of Sri Lankan women.

This discussion also focused towards understanding discriminatory laws for women in Labour Laws, Land laws and tariffs.

Hama, a student of the Joshibi University of Art and Design, in Kanagawa, Japan, has been exhibiting his stunning stone sushi at various universities across his country, to great success. And it's easy to see why; his work is absolutely amazing, with some bite-sized pieces looking so realistic that you can hardly tell them apart from the real thing.

The stone-shaping enthusiast told Japanese magazine J-town that he got into making stone sushi completely by mistake.

He was messing with a piece of red granite in class a few years back, and he thought that it looked like a piece of tuna.



After shaping it into a piece of sushi, Hama realized that it had turned out a lot better than he had anticipated, so that inspired him to continue experimenting.

Hama also had a part-time job relating to fish when he first got into stone sushi, which helped him better observe the qualities of the fish he was trying to emulate in his unique art. Even so, putting together such an impressive collection of inedible delicacies was far from easy.

For example, it took the artist a year just to find the stone that became the pink Dotoro sushi, and another year to shape it into the realistic masterpiece it is today. Hama uses fine dremels and polishing tools to mold the hard stones into delicious-looking treats, but relies solely on their natural colours.

The green "leaves" on one of his sushi pieces is naturally green stone, as are the pink, red, and grey stones in his collection. Finding the right coloration wasn't easy, but doing so was a big part of what made this project so fulfilling.

Asked what he was hoping to convey to viewers with his stone sushi collection, Hama said that he hoped people would notice and appreciate the different patterns of the stones he used.

"Each stone has a different texture and pattern, so I want you to take a closer look at the expression of the stone," the college student said.



His dad played many songs for him, Sri Lankan music, American music, and his own songs was a blessing to his ears and soul growing up. As a kid he was surrounded by music, being born to a musical background, and nevertheless, music was his first love which made him become what he is today. Mahesh always wanted to be like his father, and he guided him on a musical path filled with magical aspirations.

This as a result of his dad's inspiration and his dedication, he was able to perform in front of the world's best personalities in various fields, performing with Stevie Wonder in the Henry Mancini Orchestra with the famous John Williams conducting the first week opening Disney Hall, Performed for Ray Charles and Quincy Jones at a prestigious charity event for the blind at the Prestigious Beverly Hilton, for many prestigious personnel at major events, especially some major fundraising for a good cause. Oscar De La Hoya, Phil Ramone, President Clinton, Hilary Clinton, Richard Rodin, Al Gore, Gray Davis, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Robert Deniro, James Brown, and many others. He was selected as one of two pianists, out of millions, worldwide competition for the Henry Mancini orchestra consisting of unforgettable historical concerts, with the some of the major legends in the industry, Christian Mc Bride, Vinnie Caliouta, Larry Goldings, Roy Hargrove, John Clayton, and many more. He has won numerous international accolades and achieved so many prestigious positions as an outstanding musician ever since he was a 12 year old. His list of accolades is endless, he has worked with all the big names in the international scene, and of course this talented musician makes us proud to be Sri Lankan. On one hand, he can be named as an unofficial ambassador, or rather, a musical ambassador who spreads Sri Lanka's name all across the globe, and he has worked with the legendary Engelbert Humperdinck as pianist and music director, worked with numerous bands and symphonies, including the Prague Symphony, San Diego Symphony, Cleveland Symphony and Clayton /Hamilton big band, to performing in prestigious venues such as the Royal Albert concert hall

He even performed a Sri Lankan song, 'Unmada wu Premadare' to the Dubai audience while he was at the Versace hotel residency working under Quincy Jones, and received a huge response by 340,000 views on Facebook, just a few months ago. He states that he has never felt the pressure when performing, and he's excited to share his spiritual healing and inspiration through music for all his

He is privileged and blessed to share his gift to the world, and takes the utmost pleasure in what he's sharing with his talent. We could go on about his amazing musician, but let's listen to Mahesh now to share his experiences, memories and his best moments as a musician with us on today's T&C.

Excerpts: Q: Tell us a little about youself?

I was born and raised in the US, Los Angeles, CA. Son to Gamini and Ayesha Balsooriya, brother to Shamen Balasooriya. I grew here with no extended family my whole life.

Q: You started acting at a very young age , performing in many TV shows, even attending classes in Beverly Hills and being a part of the SAG and afra acting guild'. What made you switch to music?

> kids at my school loved to see me on TV every week, it was a few tv series that aired weekly. I really enjoyed acting, I was getting very busy with more work, but it was contradicting with my school schedule. So I decided to focus on my studies. But I would always love to do it again.

> Q: You had the opportunity of per-forming at many prestigious events, and also performing in front of celeb-rities such as Robert DeNiro, Arnold Shwarzenneger, and Ray Davis, to personalities like president Bill Clinton, Hillary Clinton, President Obama and many more. How would you reflect

Yes, performing for the presidents was an absolutely exhilarating and honourable experience. It was ecstatic to meet the presidents and shake their hand. I was truly blessed to be a part of both experiences.

Q: Out of these experiences, what's the most memorable performance?

Playing with Stevie Wonder and John Williams was an unforgettable experience. I was 18 at the time playing with the Henry Mancini Orchestra, during the first week opening of the prestigious Disney Hall. It blew me away because I didn't know he was going to perform with us, he made his appearance during the soundcheck, and I was completely blown away !we performed the song Moon River, Stevie Wonder alongside with Take 6 conducted by John

Q: What was it like, working with famous artistes and directors, and also the famous Natalie Cole?

Performing with late great Natalie Cole was absolutely an incredible experience. We got to fly in a private jet, performed at the most prestigious venues around the world, work with some of the major symphonies around the world including Prague Symphony, San Diego Symphony, and got to explore all of the countries we visited. Most particularly in the musical sense, she was an absolute professional. We never had one rehearsal, 350 songs, and she would call the set list of tunes 10 minutes before the show! it kept me on my toes as a musician! Plus working with her taught me the art of being an accompanist in many different genres

But I still am working safely and providing healing through music as much as possible. During this time all musicians should stay safe and channel inspiration and positivity in preparation for giving healing to world through music.
