

"But Sri Lanka will continue administration of the Oxford AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine in Sri Lanka since only one batch of the vaccine has been temporarily suspended in certain European countries. Sri Lanka does not receive that particular batch of vaccine doses that have been suspended.'

Dr Pathirana further said that the COVID-19 vaccination programme is successfully continuing and the country will be able to control the virus in the next three months. Vaccines provided under the World Health Organization's COVAX facility are being used to vaccinate elderly people above 60 and another batch of vaccines is scheduled to arrive soon. As it was reported by international media Ireland, Bulgaria, Denmark, Norway, Netherlands, Germany, Italy, France, and Spain have decided to halt the rollout.

During his regular media briefing the World Health Organization's (WHO) Director General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said on Monday (15) that more countries have suspended the use of AstraZeneca vaccine as a precautionary measure after reports of blood clots in people who received the vaccine. That systems meant to protect public health were working, as several countries suspended the use of AstraZeneca's COVID-19 vaccine to investigate possible side-effects.

"This does not necessarily mean these events are linked to COVID-19 vaccination, but it's routine practice to investigate them, and it shows that the surveillance system works and that effective controls are in place," he said.

A WHO advisory committee plans to meet on Tuesday to discuss the vaccine, which Germany, France and Italy said on Monday they were pausing after several countries report ed serious conditions in people who had received the shot.

Denmark and Norway had stopped giving the shot last week after reporting isolated cases of blood clots, bleeding or a low platelet count. Iceland and Bulgaria followed suit and Ireland and the Netherlands announced suspensions on Sunday.WHO Chief Scientist Soumya Swaminathan stated that there had been no documented deaths linked to COVID-

"We do not want people to panic and no association has so far been found between the "thromboembolic events" reported in some countries and COVID-19 shots." she

Two held for printing Rs. 5,000 notes

Two suspects were arrested in possession of 124 counterfeit notes of Rs 5,000 denomination during a special raid conducted in Oluvil and Nindavuur in the Akkaraipattu Police area on Monday, Police Spokesperson DIG Ajith Rohana said. The face value of the fake notes exceeds Rs. 600,000. He said another 20 partially printed counterfeit notes of Rs 5,000 denomination were also found in their possession along with a vehicle and equipment such as a printer, scanner, and ink.

The raid was conducted on the information provided by the Army Intelligence. The suspects are residents of Oluvil and Adalachchenai. The Police Spokesman said the suspects along with the seized items would be handed over to the Criminal Investigations Department (CID) for further investigations. He also requested the public to be vigilant on fake notes as the circulation of such notes usually increases during festive seasons. He advised the public to check the watermark and the security thread in the currency notes to verify the

It has been declared as a national heritage by the gazette notification on February 7, 2019 to secure the Thripitaka while it has been prohibited to be conserved, provide erroneous definitions or translated without permission of the Govern-

Co-Cabinet Spokesman, Minister Ramesh Pathirana yesterday said that reports including highly confidential ones on the multiple terrorist attacks on churches and hotels at several locations of the country on Easter Sunday have already been sent to the Attorney General's Department on the promise to keep the information confidential.

Minister Pathirana was responding to a journalist at the weekly Cabinet Media Briefing yesterday

at the Government Information Department.

The Minister said that only the Attorney General's Department has the authority to institute legal action against the culprits and the Cabinet Sub Committee appointed to look into the Easter Sunday attacks has no power to take legal action.

Minister Pathirana said that the Cabinet Sub Committee was appointed to scrutinise the ways to prevent such incidents in the future and it is now examining the measures

that need to be taken to prevent such incidents in the future.

The Committee headed by Minister Chamal Rajapaksa was appointed by the President to study in depth the findings and recommendations contained in the report on the Easter Sunday attacks and to advise on the next course of action. Ministers Johnston Fernando, Udaya Gammanpila, Ramesh Pathirana, Prasanna Ranatunga and Rohitha Abeygunawardena are the other members.



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urope's medicines regulator has moved to stifle spiralling concern about the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine, saying the shot's benefits outweigh the risks after four major EU countries announced they were suspending its use.

Germany, France, Italy and Spain temporarily halted inoculations with the vaccine on Monday after reported incidents of bleeding, blood clots and a low count of blood platelets in some people who had received the AstraZeneca

The European Medicines Agency (EMA) said in a statement that "many thousands of people develop blood clots annually in the EU for different reasons" and that the number of incidents in vaccinated people "seems not to be higher than that seen in the general population".

It said it was working closely with AstraZeneca and national health regulators, including the MHRA in the UK, where 11 million people have received the shot, to analyse all available data and establish whether the vaccine might have contributed.

The MHRA, which collects reports of side-effects on drugs and vaccines in the UK through its "yellow card" scheme, told The Guardian it had received more notifications up until February 28 of blood clots on the Pfizer/ BioNTech than the Oxford/ AstraZeneca vaccine - 38 versus 30 – although neither exceed the level expected in the population.

"Such reports are not proven side effects of the vaccine," a spokesman said. "Blood clots can occur naturally and are not uncommon."

The EMA's safety committee will meet on Tuesday and a decision on any further action will be announced on Thursday, it said, adding that it "currently remains of the view that the benefits of the AstraZeneca vaccine in preventing Covid-19, with its associated risk of hospitalisation and death, outweigh the risks of side-effects".

Amid fears that the suspensions might lead to people refusing to have the vaccine, Downing Street said the AstraZeneca jab "remains both safe and effective". Boris

Germany's health ministry said earlier the country's vaccine authority, the Paul Ehrlich Institute, "considers further investigation necessary after new reports of cerebral brain thrombosis in connection with vaccination in Germany and Europe".

It said the EMA should decide "whether and how the new findings will affect the approval of the vaccine". The health minister, Jens Spahn, said seven cases of cerebral vein thrombosis had been reported.

While this was a "very low risk" compared with the 1.6m jabs already given in the country, Spahn said, it would be above average if a link to the vaccine was confirmed. "The decision today is a purely precautionary measure," he said.

French President Emmanuel Macron said France would also stop administering the AstraZeneca shot "out of precaution...in the hope we can resume quickly if the EMA gives the green light" after this week's meetings.

Joining a growing number of European countries to temporarily halt the use of the vaccine in recent days, Italy's medicines authority Aifa said it was also suspending inoculations as a "precautionary and temporary measure" before the EMA decision. Spain and Slovenia later followed suit.

Denmark and Norway last week reported incidents of bleeding, blood clots and a low count of blood platelets in several people who had received the AstraZeneca shot, prompting Ireland and the Netherlands to join them on Sunday in making tempo-

A World Health Organization spokesperson, Christian Lindmeier, on Monday said it would communicate its findings and "any unlikely changes to current recommendations" as soon as it had investigated the incidents in Europe.

However, "as of today, there is no evidence that the incidents are caused by the vaccine, and it is important that vaccination campaigns continue so that we can save lives and stem severe disease from the virus," Lindmeier said.

Karl Lauterbach, a professor of health economic and epidemiology at the University of Cologne and a German MP, criticised Germany's decision. "Based on the data available, I consider this to be a mistake," Lauterbach said.

"Testing without suspension of vaccination would have been better because of the rarity of the complication. In the third wave, which is now picking up speed, the first vaccinations with the AstraZeneca vaccine would be lifesavers.'

The Netherlands clarified on Monday that it had recorded 10 cases of "noteworthy adverse side-effects" from the AstraZeneca vaccine, while Denmark said "highly unusual" symptoms were seen in a 60-vear-old recipient who died from a blood clot.

The agency said in a statement that the woman had "a low number of blood platelets and clots in small and large vessels, as well as bleeding". Norway also spoke of "unusual symptoms" in three people under 50 being treated in hos-

Two health workers in Norway have since died of brain haemorrhages, the national medicines agency said, adding that it could "neither confirm nor exclude that it has something to do with the vaccine".

Austria stopped using one batch of the AstraZeneca vaccine on March 8 after a 49-year-old nurse died from "severe bleeding disorders", and prosecutors in the northern İtalian region of Piedmont on Monday seized a batch of 393,600 doses after a 57-yearold music teacher fell ill and died.

In the UK, Ruth Rankine, the primary care director at the NHS Confederation, said health leaders were concerned the decisions from some European countries "will affect how confident people in England are about getting immu-

Rankine said this was "particularly worrying as it is coming at a time when national lockdown restrictions are beginning to be relaxed, when our vaccine stock has increased this week, and when we can see the benefits of the vaccinations coming through in reduced transmission".

Prof Andrew Goddard, the



president of the Royal College of Physicians, said: "As far as we are aware, there has been no demonstrable evidence of an increase in thromboembolic events, such as blood clots, among those who have been vaccinated in the UK.

Goddard said there was "evidence to suggest that those who are hospitalised with Covid-19 are at much higher risk of having a blood clot than the rest of the population, so we'd urge people to act responsibly and continue getting vaccinated when they're invited to.'

AstraZeneca said 17 million people had so far received the jab and the 15 incidences of deep vein thrombosis (DVT) and 22 events of pulmonary embolism recorded were "much lower than would be expected to occur naturally in a general population" and "similar across other licensed Covid-19 vaccines".

Adding to the pharmaceutical firm's problems, AstraZeneca said at the weekend it would not be able to meet its delivery targets to the EU in the first quarter and could have problems in the second quarter too.

The company's initial target was for 120m doses in the first quarter of the year and 180m in the second. It then lowered its first-quarter target to 40m, citing "lower-than expected output from the production process", but is now looking at just 30m.

Although it still aims to supply 100m in the second quarter, leaked documents suggest that figure may now

The US is refusing to release 30m unused doses even though the vaccine has not been approved by US regulators, while the head of Sweden's vaccination programme said at the weekend there were clear "contractual obstacles" to AstraZeneca exporting supplies to the EU

No proof Oxford vaccine causes blood clots

tories about people getting blood clots soon after taking the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine have become a source of anxiety among European leaders. After a report on a death and three hospitalisations in Norway, which found serious blood clotting in adults who had received the vaccine, Ireland has temporarily suspended the jab. Some anxiety about a new vaccine is understandable, and any suspected reactions should be investigated. Butin the current circumstances we need to think slow as well as fast, and resist drawing causal links between events where none may exist.

As Ireland's deputy chief medical officer, Ronan Glynn, has stressed, there is no proof that this vaccine causes blood clots. It's a common human tendency to attribute a causal effect between different events, even when there isn't one present: we wash the car and the next day a bird relieves itself all over the bonnet.

Typical. Or, more seriously, someone is diagnosed with autism after receiving the MMR vaccine, so people assume a causal connection – even when there isn't one. And now, people get blood clots after having a vaccine, leading to concern over whether the vaccine is what caused the

Call it luck, chance or fate - it's difficult to incorporate this into our thinking. So when the European Medicines Agency (EMA) says there have been 30 "thromboembolic events" after around 5m vaccinations, the crucial question to ask is: how many would be expected anyway, in the normal run of things? We can try a quick back-of-the-

envelope calculation. Deep vein thromboses (DVTs) happen to around one person per 1,000 each year, and probably more in the older population being vaccinated. Working on the basis of these figures, out of five million people getting vaccinated, we would expect significantly more than 5,000 DVTs a year, or at

least 100 every week. So it is not at all surprising that there have been 30 It would be so much easier if we

had a group of people exactly like those being vaccinated but who didn't get jabbed. This would tell us how many serious events we could expect to happen to people that were the result of sheer bad luck. Fortunately, we do have such a group. In the trials that led to the vaccines being approved in the UK, volunteers were randomly allocated to receive either the active vaccine or a dummy injection. Everyone then reported any harms they experienced, but crucially nobody knew if they had received the real stuff or an inert injection. By comparing the numbers of reports from the two groups, we can see how many "reactions" were really owing to the active ingredients, and how many were linked to the vaccination process, or would have happened anyway.

Some kind of adverse events were reported by 38 percent of those receiving the real vaccine but, rather remarkably, 28 percent of those who received the dummy also reported a side-effect. This shows that the vaccination process itself causes about two-thirds of all the reported harm. Of more than 24,000 participants, fewer than one percent reported a serious adverse event, and of these 168 people, slightly more had received the dummy than the active vaccine. So there was no evidence of increased risk from taking the Astra-Zeneca vaccine. The Pfizer trials had similar results, with more mild or moderate adverse events in the vaccine group but almost identical numbers of serious events.

Trials are short and comparatively small, and tend to include healthy people, so we need to collect real-





adverse reactions are reported using the "yellow card" system, which dates back to the days when doctors filled in yellow cards to report side-effects. Up to February 28, around 54,000 yellow cards have been reported for the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine, from around 10 million vaccinations given (the Pfizer vaccine has a slightly lower rate). So for both vaccines, the overall reporting rate is around three to six reports per 1,000 jabs. That means a far greater number of side-effects are reported in the trials than through the yellow card system (of course, one factor in this underreporting may be the yellow card website, which appears designed for medical professionals rather than patients experi-

The vast majority of the side-effects reported through the yellow card system and in randomised trials are reports of direct reactions to the jab, such as a sore arm, or subsequent general flulike symptoms of headache, tiredness, fever and so on, which subside in a few days. The most serious problem is anaphylactic reactions, and the

advice is not to inject anyone with a previous history of allergic reactions to either a prior dose of the vaccine or its ingredients.

So far, these vaccines have shown themselves to be extraordinarily safe. In fact, it's perhaps surprising that we haven't heard more stories of adverse

extremely rare event that is triggered by Covid-19 vaccines, but there is no sign of this yet. We can just hope that this message gets through to those who are still hesitant because of the misinformation that has been spread about the supposed harm of vaccines, and the unhelpful comments made by some European politicians.

Will we ever be able to resist the urge to find causal relationships between different events? One way of doing this would be promoting the scientific method and ensuring everyone understands this basic principle. Testing a hypothesis helps us see which hunches or assumptions are correct and which aren't. In this way, randomised trials have proved the effectiveness of some Covid treatments and saved vast numbers of lives, while also showing us that some overblown claims about treatments for Covid-19, such as hydroxychloroquine and convalescent plasma, were incor-

But I don't think we can ever fully rationalise ourselves out of the basic and often creative urge to find patterns even where none exist. Perhaps we can just hope for some basic humility before claiming we know why something has

The interim order will be effective until March 18.

Court of Appeal twojudge-bench comprising Justice (President) Arjuna Obeysekera and Justice Mayadunna Corea made the order consequent to a writ petition by Ranjan Ramanayake claiming his

rights to function as a Parliamentarian.

The petition will be taken up for further support on March 18.

Additional Solicitor Gen-

eral Indika Demuni de Silva appearing for the Attorney General raised preliminary objections challenging the maintainability of the writ petition. She submitted to court that the petitioner cannot invoke Court's jurisdiction since Secretary General of Parliament has performed his ministerial duties as per the judgment delivered by the Supreme Court, convicting Ramanayake for committing the offence of Contempt of Court.

President's Counsel Faiz Mustapha PC appearing for the petitioner Ramanayake argued that Contempt of Court is not a criminal offence and thereby his Parliamentary seat would not

be vacated. On January 11, the Supreme Court convicted Ranjan Ramanayake for the offence of Contempt of Court and sentenced him to four years' rigorous

imprisonment. Ranjan Ramanayake is seeking an order restraining Secretary General of Parliament from taking any steps to inform the Election Commission that he has vacated his seat as a Member of Parliament.

Ramanayake said that irreparable harm and damage will be caused to him unless the interim relief is granted to the Petitioner inasmuch as he will be deprived of functioning as a Member of Parliament.

The Petitioner further stated that the People's franchise would also be adversely affected if he is wrongfully prevented as functioning as a representative of his electorate. Ramanayake alleged that

Secretary General of Parliament has not taken any step in terms of section 64 (c) of the Parliamentary Elections Act in respect of Premalal Jayasekara, who was elected as a Member

of Parliament from the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP), which is the governing party and continues to sit and vote as a Member of Parlia-

ment despite his conviction of the offence of murder and has been imposed a sentence of death. He alleged that Secretary

General of Parliament would be acting illegally, unlawfully, and inter alia in violation of Article 12(1) and Article 12(2) of the Constitution, which guarantee the Petitioner the equal protection of the law and freedom from discrimination on the grounds of political opinion.

04. Programme to initiate Home shop comprised of both a house and a shop in one household in every Grama Niladhari division targeting young women entrepreneurs selected from Samurdhi families.

The Highways Ministry has planned to implement a Home - shop in every Grama Niladhari division in association with other relevant line ministries targeting 25,000 young women entrepreneurs selected from Samurdhi families to strengthen the food distribution network. National level guidance for the project will be



rendered by the task force for the economic revival and eradication of poverty while monitoring the project will be carried out by the State Ministry of Samurdhi, House Economic, Micro-Finance, Self - Employments and Entrepreneurship Development. This programme is planned to be implemented by the 100,000 kilometers highways development programme covering the entire island. The proposed houses and shops will be constructed adjoining the roads those are proposed to be constructed under 100,000 kilo meter of roads development project whereas, those Home Shops are to be constructed in the sizes of 200, 300, 400 and 500 square feet. Accordingly, the Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal submitted by the Minister of Highways for the implementation of the said programme.

05. Obtaining goods transport aircraft for Sri Lankan Aviation Company Limited (SLA) on lease.

The fleet of Sri Lankan Aviation Company Limited is comprised of a large number of economical narrow body aircrafts. As a result of that, more attention has been paid on the passenger air routes network in the recent years. This has led to under utilization of aero goods transportation potential due to lack of suitable aircraft that cater the goods transportation facility. With the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic most of the aircraft companies have paid attention on aero goods transportation since passenger transportation became limited. Sri Lankan Airlines currently operates freight operations to 26 destinations. Considering the current market changes, it has become a fine opportunity for the main aeronautical companies to enter into goods transportation market via main air routes seeking the goods transportation market share. Therefore, paying attention on the potential for air goods transportation, it has been planned to change the available Sri Lankan company structure strategically. Accordingly, the Cabinet of Ministers granted approval to the resolution forwarded by the Tourism Minister on obtaining an air raft for goods transport on lease to Sri Lankan Aviation Company Limited subject to international competitive procurement methodology.

06. Imposing a Thripitaka (Three Doctrines) Conservation **Act.** This country has been recognised as the centre for Buddhism whereas it is a responsibility of the Government to safeguard the 'Buddha Sasana' and nurture it by giving the priority to Buddhism. Commemorating the 2,500 year Sri Sambuddhathwa Jayanthi (Buddhist Anniversary) in the year 1956, the Thripitaka has been translated to Sinhala language and been printed thereby. Thripitaka has been declared as a national heritage by the gazette notification dated February 7, 2019 with the objective of securing the Thripitaka while it has been prohibited for

conservation, providing erroneous definitions or translations without the permission of the Government. The Cabinet of Ministers have given their consent to the resolution furnished by the Prime Minister as the Minister of Buddha Sasana, Religious and Cultural Affairs for passing a "Thripitaka Conservation Act' in the Parliament for the security of the Thripitaka for the sake of the future generations and thereby instruct the Legal Draftsman to prepare the draft act / bill in this connection.

07. Implementing the new tax proposals

A Bill has been drafted by the Legal Draftsman to amend the Inland Revenue Act, No.24 of 2017 and the Value Added Tax Act, No.14 of 2002 in order to implement tax reforms adduced by the " Economic Revival Origins " presented to introduce a simple, transparent and an effective tax system as pledged by His Excellency President to the people and the tax revisions and policy decisions relevant to the budget proposals submitted by the 2021 budget. Clearance from the Attorney General has been received for the above mentioned acts and the Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal tabled by Prime Minister as the Finance Minister to publish this bill on the gazette and subsequently submit to the parliament.

08. Procuring construction machinery, equipment and goods transporting vehicles and supply them to the government institutions.

The government has planned to implement many development projects in Highway, irrigation, Building



A positive proposal

proposal by Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa for State intervention to bail out businesses and commercial enterprises which have been unable to repay their loans obtained from banks, due to the collapse of these ventures during the COVID-19 pandemic would be welcomed by the business community who had fallen on bad times.

At a meeting with heads of banking institutions on Monday the Premier appealed to them to be flexible and desist from seizing the assets of failed businesses and instead allow them a reasonable time to get back onto their feet. He, therefore, urged them to temporarily halt the seizure of assets of the businesses in dire straits. He also called for a joint decision to be taken by the Central Bank and relevant banking institutions in collaboration with the Finance Ministry to ease the burden on stalled businesses vis-à-vis their loan repayments.

The PM also stressed on the need for striking a balance whereby both parties (businesses and banks) would not be placed at a disadvantage. In this respect he proposed that a separate State body or a Competent Authority be appointed to sort out details so that no party would stand to lose by the decisions arrived at.

At the outset of the Coronavirus, President Gotabaya Rajapaksa too appealed to the banking sector and leasing companies to go slow on their demands for repayment given the plight of the businesses as a consequence of the pandemic. How far this Presidential edict was complied with of course remains a question. Obviously the Banks and other lending agencies cannot afford defaulting on a large scale, if they are to remain in business and complaints of instances of non-compliance with the President's directive should also be viewed in this context. Thus the proposal for State intervention via a Competent Authority would see all the grey areas being addressed and matters sorted out to the satisfaction of all parties.

The PM's suggestion for the banks to hold their fire instead of resorting to auctioning the assets of businesses at this stage may also have been influenced by the hope that with the country now reverting to full activity the failed businesses could also pick up and reach a stage where before long they would be able to meet their commitments to the banks. However, it is difficult to predict how long it would take for certain enterprises to get going – for example, businesses connected to the tourism sector. True, the country has been opened to outside visitors, but it will be quite a while before the usual traffic materializes.

Most businesses which were forced into shut down one year back with the outbreak of the contagion are yet to resume. These enterprises have to pay back bank loans and pay compensation to any laid off workers. A majority of these businesses are small-time outfits and it would be a considerable time before they get back on their feet. Besides, some of these businesses are those dependent on other business activity and trades which are themselves in the doldrums, in a typical domino effect scenario.

The proposed Competent Authority would be in an unenviable position having to sort out this tangled web and devising an even-handed solution. The onus no doubt would be on PM Rajapaksa, who is also the Finance Minister, to use his undoubted persuasive powers to get the banks on to his side in throwing a lifeline to failed business enterprises. There is also the issue of mass scale unemployment resulting from the closure of businesses. This at a time the Government has embarked on a programme to provide 100,000 jobs to unskilled categories besides also absorbing graduate trainees in to State sector placements. The programme is bound suffer a setback if, on the one hand, the Government is providing employment in the State sector only to see this being frittered away by the loss of employment in the private sector.

With the steep rise in the Cost of Living, the problem also has the potential of getting out of hand. Hence, there is a need for a combined effort by all relevant sectors to come together in devising a solution to the

It is not only the established and/or small time businesses and commercial enterprises that have suffered but also the self employed who have no recourse to compensation. A typical example is the school van service which was the worst hit and continues to take a beating with schools only opening in fits and starts in the Western Province which has the largest number of schools in the country. School vans also have been dealt a double whammy in having to ferry restricted numbers as per the prevailing health guidelines. Ditto for the Office Van services. Many of these souls suffer in silence what with families to maintain and mouths to feed. Hence the urgent need for the Government to come up with viable solutions to these myriad issues thrown up by a deadly pandemic which still keeps dogging the population, a massive vaccination drive notwithstanding.

he Sugar Tax revision done in October last year with the stated intention of bringing down the prices of sugar in the local market landed the Government in a political minefield last week.

The Government was under fire by the Opposition that the benefit of sugar import tax cut did not trickle down to the public, but instead one large-scale businessman in particular, who had imported large volumes of sugar and sold them at higher prices than the cleared rate, unduly benefited from the

The topic soon became a political weapon for the Opposition camp which was waiting in the wings for fresh controversies to demerit the Government.

The Government however played above board at this instance by presenting the relevant facts and figures without alteration to the Public Finance Committee (PFC) of Parliament through a Finance Ministry Report presented on March 9. The Report was submitted on the instructions of the PFC headed by ruling party MP Anura Priyadarshana Yapa.

This indicated that the Government respected Parliament's authority over public finance and did not try to sweep the relevant information under the carpet

Part of fiscal policy

As the media spotlight on the Report led to a flood of comments, mostly of political nature, Finance Ministry Secretary and Treasury Secretary S.R. Attygalle was given the not-so-easy task of taking the bull by the horns and confronting the misinterpretations of the figures.

Coming forward to speak to the press directly, Attygalle last Friday took great pains to clarify that it was not correct to say there was a "loss" when levies were deliberately lowered to bring down the prices of commodities in the market. He emphasised that the decision to reduce the sugar import levy from Rs. 50 per kilogram to 25 cents was a Government policy decision to ease the Cost of Living.

"The PFC had asked for the import data from October 13 to February and the figure of Rs. 15.9 billion had been arrived at by multiplying the import volume by Rs. 49.75. It is inaccurate to see it as a 'loss'. The Government from time to time changes taxes for reasons such as preserving foreign reserves, protecting local producers and controlling cost of living, etc."

"Even though there was not an immediate change in sugar prices, sugar prices did gradually come down in the market. Today a kilogram of sugar is about Rs. 115 but if the levy remained unchanged, it would have been around Rs. 175 per kilogram," Attygalle explained also pointing out that the import levy on several other essential items including canned fish and B-onions were also revised on the same day.

Having said that, the Treasury Secretary did not rule out the possibility that certain businessmen might have made profits due to overnight tax cut on sugar, but he tried to normalize

the situation stating that, "it is the way the market works here and around the world".

"Prices tend to be sticky downwards, partly due to the oligopolistic nature of the market. However traders raise the prices overnight if taxes are hiked," he commented.

Interestingly, even though 60-odd traders are registered for sugar imports, Attygalle pointed out that large-scale sugar imports are in the hands of about six importers.

"This kind of tax changes had been made overnight in the past as well. For example, the import levy on sugar which was Rs. 30 per kilogram in 2015 was brought down to 25 cents in July 2016 and it was again raised to Rs. 15 in the same year. During that short period 145,000 MT of sugar had been imported. The very same importers were in this business during that period too," the Secretary remarked.

"The accusation would be justified if taxes were raised after the imports were made, but in this latest instance the levy still remains 25 cents," he contended.

Allegations

On behalf of the Opposition, the Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP) actively picked up the topic to score a few political marks long before the main Opposition party, the Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB), turned its head to it.

The JVP constantly raised the matter in political discussions and pocket meetings and it was the first to take the matter to the Courts of Law. JVP frontline member and former MP Sunil Handunnetti, who had received praise from all quarters over his contributions as the Chairman of the Committee on Public Enterprises (COPE) in the last Parliament, especially to uncover the Central Bank Treasury Bonds scam, filed a Fundamental Rights petition on Friday seeking an order from the Supreme Court on the controversial matter.

Addressing a press conference on Sunday, JVP Parliamentarian Vijitha Herath questioned the rationale of the sudden drastic tax reduction when there was no shortage or higher demand for sugar. "This decision

turned the Government policy of uplifting national economy on its head," he commented

He also raised concerns whether there had been a leak of information ahead of the tax revision also alleging that Pyramid Wilmar (Pvt) Ltd, the Company in question, has close links with the ruling party.

with the ruling party.

"About 8,200 MT of imported sugar stocks, which had been at a bonded warehouse at the time of the Gazette, had been cleared at revised rates and sold to state-run Lanka Sathosa at higher prices. This is similar to how the Treasury Bonds, which were bought at low prices by the Perpetual Treasuries, had been dumped on the Employees Provident Fund," he further

SJB MP Dr. Harsha de Silva, an economist and allegedly an active member in the infamous "Footnote Circle" in the last Parliament that attempted to cover up the now widely-known Bond Scam, saw the matter of sugar tax in a different lens and was keen to question on the controversy surrounding it.

He raised concern that the Company in question had imported 39 percent of the total volume of sugar imports to the country from October 2020 to February 2021, the period under review by the Finance Ministry Report to the PFC.

The Central Bank's 'External Sector Performance -January 2021' Report, which came out last week, added fuel to the Opposition's allegations as it revealed that the expenditure on imports of sugar and confectionery items had increased by 187 percent in January this year compared to the same period in 2020.

Digging deeper

As the allegations gathered steam, Cabinet Spokesman Minister Keheliya Rambukwella speaking to media in Kandy over the weekend took his time to dispel the doubts cast on the Government, explaining that reducing the sugar tax was intended to benefit the public.

Defending the Government's fiscal policy, the Minister observed that any tax revision would ultimately result in some factions gaining profits and others incurring losses. He spurned the Opposition's accusations of wheeler-dealing stating that those were propagated to gain political mileage.

It was also reported that the Auditor General's Department has undertaken a special audit on the incident. That report will also find its way to Parliament, and in the meantime, the PFC will also delve deep into the matter in the coming days based on the information it has gathered.

Clearing the air of vagueness on the whole episode will help the Government to maintain its credibility and transparency. The Bond scam was like hara-kiri for the former Government and the people expected the succeeding Government not to repeat similar mistakes, but to take a hard-line on financial malpractices. In the post-Bond Scam scenario, the Government has a responsibility not to encourage 'business as usual', but to strive for positive transformations in all spheres to close existing loopholes in the system.

Has the UNHRC become a marionette show?

anjiv Goonawardena of International Consultants who is an ardent defender of Sri Lanka had a virtual meeting with Lord Naseby on March 13. During the meeting, Lord Naseby outlined substantial errors of a report from the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights on Sri Lanka. The following are his observations:

LTTE terrorist enterprise estimated to be valued over **US\$1** billion

UN High Commissioner - Michelle Bachelet, failed to recognise that the transnational terrorist group the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE), was one of the world's most ruthless and wealthiest terrorist groups. The Group is estimated to be worth over US\$1

It is understood that the group raised funds from human smuggling, made associations with other terror groups by selling and smuggling weapons and was involved in money laundering, drug trafficking, credit card fraud, financial crimes and other illegal activities. Other means of raising money was under duress from the Tamil businesses community and providing financial loans to Tamil businesses.

To prevent British soldiers being subject to allegations of war crimes, the UK Government is bringing in new laws to safeguard them

It is significant to highlight here that the UN Human Rights Council proceedings have been encouraged by the UK Government as the Chair of the Core Group. These proceedings attempt to take action against Sri Lankan soldiers on the basis of war crimes allegations. Britain's actions can be deemed as duplications and inconsistent as it is about to bring new legislation to effect, called the Overseas Operations (Service Personnel and Veterans) Bill, which was introduced to the UK Parliament in March 2020.

The main feature of the Bill is that no charges except for those heinous, evidencebased war crimes, may be laid after the lapse of five years of the date of the incident. This implies the UK cannot be a party to supporting any allegations of overseas war crimes other than those of the same type. In particular, it should not be applied for a fellow member of the Commonwealth, especially for one who stood alongside the UK in the Second World War as Sri Lanka did. Furthermore, Sri Lanka stood with the UK during the Falklands War, one of the very few countries to do so.

People have failed to remember the contribution Sri Lanka made with more than 12,000 in the Ceylon Volunteers Force which was mobilized in 10 Infantry units and three artillery regiments.

Incidentally, the UK Government is a major donor to the Human Rights Council, at US \$1,709,532. It has therefore become notably evident that powerful countries seem to have a different approach and mechanism, with regard to alleged human rights abuses by adopting a different way of mitigating and distancing themselves. The ICC has been under fire by Washington for opening a full-fledged investigation into war crimes allegedly committed by US



Everything has to be based on facts, evidence, due process and due diligence has to be carried out. Cornucopia of CRAFT

How Niroshini Rathninda uses indigenous materials like corn husk to empower a winning entrepreneurship

f women are self-employed and goal-oriented, it will make them more courageous and independent. Empowerment of women is not just the duty of a government but also could be achieved by women themselves. The contribution of the female population towards the economy of the country is as important as the contribution by men. But, fewer opportunities, policies discriminating women, social attitudes and also traditional gender roles prevent women from standing tall as independent human beings.

Despite such obstacles, there are instances where women have identified their strength, talents and opportunities to overcome these challenges. They can be either artistes, professionals, entrepreneurs or seek employment in other avenues. The path a woman takes towards employment or entrepreneurship is different for each woman. The life stories of such courageous women are interesting in some cases, while others are total tragedies.

Today we talk to one such woman who is an entrepreneur in an interesting industry which is the first of its kind in Sri Lanka. She is export-oriented entrepreneur Niroshini P. Rathninda, founder of S.A.P. Kultura Private Limited. This is a company that has been registered under the "2000 New Exporters Establishment Programme" with the Central Provincial Office of the Sri Lanka Export Development Board (EDB).

Could you introduce yourself?

I am an entrepreneur who introduced something unique to the Sri Lankan market based on a concept that originated in the Philippines.

What made you an entrepreneur?

It is actually a gift that was given to me somewhere in 2015. People might have received various special gifts in their lives. But this particular gift is special for me as it changed my whole life and finally became my winning path.

A gift?

Yes. It was a ladies' wallet. An officer of the EDB gifted it to me. It was brought from the Philippines and she asked me whether I could guess what it was made of. I had no idea. Then she told me it is made of corn husk and also encouraged me to inspect it thoroughly as to how it had been created. That was interesting. So, I started undoing the stitches step by step. That gave me an idea as to how it had been crafted.

What happened next?

At that time, I had no knowledge about stitching and knitting of this nature. Therefore, I met Mrs. Soma, an expert of this field, in 2016, and within a few hours learned to do the stitches and knitting following her instructions. For that I had to travel to Polonnaruwa. Thereafter, I started collecting the required material for my product, the corn husk. I went to several maize vendors and collected some husks. Using them I made my own product, the first one similar to the gift I had received.

What was the response to that?

I sent the first one to Mrs. Soma to inspect. There were some short-

comings, but she was satisfied with it. When the maize vendors knew that I was producing this wallet, they were hesitant to provide me the husks, as they usually throw it away. However, the EDB wanted me to develop this product. They sourced small supply groups in the rural areas which would supply me the materials.

What are your products?

I did not restrict my products to only the wallet, but experimented making other products such as flowers, baskets and bags using corn husk. Later, I thought of making these products using other similar materials too.

I wanted to try them with banana coir, reeds and water hyacinth.

Training in progress



The EBD had facilitated her to participate at the Sri Lanka Design Festival held in November 2018. She has also participated at training/ exposure visits and B2B meetings and product displays at the Manila FAME 2019 Exhibition held in Manila, Philippines in October 2019. As an entrepreneur, Niroshini has trained and inspired more than 3,000 women across the country.

Some of Kultura's creations

Currently, I have over 70 kinds of products made of all of these materials. Each and every product consists of my own designs

Moreover, I made the use of YouTube to study more and more about these products. YouTube was really helpful. The entire process of producing a creation is done by hand and no machinery is used except for one. We have plans to experiment with other plants too. In addition, we expect to increase the use of machines to speed up the production.

How did you add value to you products?

I was dedicated to developing my dream step by step. At the beginning I just wanted to add a new product to my collection and had no idea of selling

anything. It was an interesting hobby for me to make such products on my own, but amidst various obstacles, discouragement and criticism. Sometimes my attempts failed as I had no proper knowledge of how to preserve these natural materials. In this case, the EDB, the National Crafts Council and the Industrial Development Board (IDB) assisted me to learn those techniques.

So now you have a registered business?

I had no idea if people will like the products of this nature. But, I started using my own products. Then people were very interested in my products and were keen to use them.

Accordingly, I thought of starting a business. My business Kultura Private Limited was registered in January 2019. The word 'Kultura' means 'handicrafts' in the Philippines.

With the business I shifted from my hometown Matale to Colombo.

At the beginning I was not in a position to pay for my supply chain properly. But I did not give up my attempts. I paid them with money I had for my own expenses.

How many are working under you?

My production process has three phases. The material suppliers, knitters and the final product is made by me based on my own

designs.

There are about 100 individuals from various parts of the country including Matale, Mannar, Galewela, Kegalle and Bentota working with me.

Most of them are women aged

over 50.

The younger generation are reluctant to engage in these industries. My employees earn over Rs. 30, 000 a month. This is an extra income for them. They work from

These groups are specialized in different materials. So we are able finish a product within one or two days.

I visit them every week. As our materials are available anywhere in the country, production can be done throughout the year. Finally, extending a supportive hand for women is also my intention, as I know how helpless women are when they are economically weak.

What is Lady-Green? Lady Green is the

brand name of Kultura Private Limited.
My shop is located at the Nawinna Junction along the Old Kottawa Road.

We assure a guarantee of more than three years for our products for which we use only human-friendly preservatives. We are about to export our products to the US in the coming months. Kultura is a company that has been registered under the "2000 New Exporters Establishment Programme" with the Central Provincial Office of the Sri Lanka Export Development Board (EDB).

As a woman entrepreneur, how do you feel today?

My journey was not a bed of roses. I have suffered a lot due to my weaknesses and various obstacles, discriminations and criticisms for being a woman. There were sleepless nights and nights I cried throughout.

However, those challenges were the main factor that gave me courage in return. I am happy with where I am today.

What I am doing is giving value to a bulk of garbage. The EDB was the place which changed my life.

We cannot blame anyone for not helping us. We have to dedicate ourselves to be successful. But it is good if somebody lends a helping hand.

Here I must be grateful to my supply chain, my family, the government institutions and the Chief of IGC Sanath Vidanagamage for being my strength.



Wildlife farms in Southern China likely source of pandemic

Health Organization investigative team says wildlife farms in southern China are the most likely source of the COVID-19 pandemic.

China shut down those wildlife farms in February 2020, says Peter Daszak, a disease ecologist with EcoHealth Alliance and a member of the WHO delegation that traveled to China this year. During that trip, Daszak says, the WHO team found new evidence that these wildlife farms were supplying vendors at the Huanan Seafood Wholesale Market in Wuhan with animals.

Daszak told NPR that the government response was a strong signal that the Chinese government thought those farms were the most probable pathway for a coronavirus in bats in southern China to reach humans in Wuhan.

"They take exotic animals, like civets, porcupines, pangolins, raccoon dogs and bamboo rats, and they breed them in captivity," says Daszak.

The agency is expected to release the team's investigative findings in the next two weeks. In the meantime, Daszak gave NPR a highlight of what the team figured out.

"China promoted the farming of wildlife as a way to alleviate rural populations out of poverty," Daszak says. The farms helped the government meet ambitious goals of closing the rural-urban divide, as NPR reported last year.

"It was very successful," Daszak says. "In 2016, they had 14 million people employed in wildlife farms, and it was a \$70 billion industry."

"What China did then was very important," Daszak says. "They put out a declaration saying that they were going to stop the farming of wildlife for

The government shut down the farms. "They sent out instructions to the farmers about how to safely dispose of the animals — to bury, kill or burn them — in a way that didn't spread disease.'

Why would the government do this? Because, Daszak thinks, these farms could be the spot of spillover, where the coronavirus jumped from a bat into another animal and then into people. "I do think that SARS-CoV-2 first got into people in South China. It's looking that way.'

First off, many farms are Then on Feb. 24, 2020, right located in or around a southing ones in the Yunnan region, when the outbreak in Wuhan ern province, Yunnan, where are part of a unique project that was winding down, the Chi-virologists found a bat virus

rus that causes the disease COVID-19. Second, the farms breed animals that are known to carry coronaviruses, such as

civet cats and pangolins. Finally, during the WHO's mission to China, Daszak said the team found new evidence that these farms were supplying vendors at the Huanan Seafood Wholesale Market in Wuhan, where an early outbreak of COVID-19 occurred.

The market was shut down overnight on Dec. 31, 2019, after it was linked to cases of what was then described as a mysterious pneumonia-like ill-

"There was massive transmission going on at that market for sure," says Linfa Wang, a virologist who studies bat viruses at Duke-NUS Medical School in Singapore. He's also part of the WHO investigative team. Wang says that after the outbreak at the Huanan mar-

there and looked for the virus.

"In the live animal section, they had many positive samples," Wang says. "They even have two samples from which they could isolate live virus."

And so Daszak and others on the WHO team believe that the wildlife farms provided a perfect conduit between a coronavirus-infected bat in Yunnan (or neighboring Myanmar) and a Wuhan animal market.

"China closes that pathway down for a reason," Daszak says. "The reason was, back in February 2020, they believed this was the most likely pathway [for the coronavirus to Wuhan wet market spread to Wuhan]. And when the WHO report comes out ... we believe it's the most likely pathway too."

The next step, says Daszak, is to figure out specifically which animal carried the virus and at which of the many wild-



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New Dead Sea Scrolls discovered

Israeli archaeologists on Tuesday announced the discovery of dozens of new Dead Sea Scroll fragments bearing a biblical text found in a desert cave and believed hidden during a Jewish revolt against Rome nearly 1,900 years ago.

The fragments of parchment bear lines of Greek text from the books of Zechariah and Nahum and have been radiocarbon dated to the 2nd century AD, according to the Israel Antiquities Authority. They are the first new scrolls found in archaeological excavations in the desert south of Jerusalem

in 60 years. The new pieces are believed to belong to a set of parchment fragments found in a site known as "The Cave of Horror" — named for the 40 human skeletons found there during excavations in the 1960s — that also bear a Greek rendition of the Twelve Minor Prophets. The cave is located in a remote canyon in the Judean Desert south of Jerusalem.

The fragments are believed to have been stashed away in the cave during the Bar Kochba Revolt, an armed Jewish uprising

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
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
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

Anna was born with the right todual citizenship, because she has a Japanese mother and American father. She spent her life traveling between both countries, and says she felt deeply connected to the two

But Japan requires those with multiple passports to pick one by the age of 22 -- an impossible choice for Anna, who requested a pseudonym for privacy rea-

I'm mixed race, I've lived both in Japan and the US, I speak both languages, I am completely split down the middle in terms of my identity," she said. "It's like asking someone whether they love their mother or father more. It's such a cruel question.'

The past few decades have seen people travel and live abroad more, with the number of international migrants - people who changed their country of residence for at least a year tripling from 1970 to 2015, according to the International Organization for Migration.

At the same time, tolerance to dual citizenship has generally increased. In 1960, less than one-third of countries allowed citizens to acquire a second nationality, compared to threequarters today,according to a 2019 paper by Maarten Vink, professor of political sociology of Maastricht University in the Netherlands.

Asia is an exception to that trend. It is the world's most restrictive region in terms of dual citizenship, with only 65% of countries and territories permitting it, according to the Maastricht Center for Citizenship, Migration and Develop-

Increased focus on dual citizenship in Asia

ment. To put that in perspective, 91% do in the Americas, which rank as the most liberal.

And some Asian countries are tightening their immigration laws. Japan reinforced its strict stance in January when a court upheld the country's ban against dual citizenship, rejecting a lawsuit filed by Japanese citizens living in Europe. Hong Kong took a harder line in February, barring dual citizens from receiving consular protection -- a step never before taken in the Chinese city, where dual citizenship is not legally allowed but had been tolerated.

"Dual nationality is not recognized in the Chinese Nationality Law," said Hong Kong leader Carrie Lam in February. "That is very clear. We are strictly enforcing or implementing that particular policy.'

There are a number of reasons why the region is so resistant toward dual citizenship, including histories of conflict and colonialism. But in some countries, critics say the ban on dual citizenship also reflects a tilt toward nationalism - and the desire to maintain a monoethnic, monocultural iden-

In Asia Pacific, only a few places accept dual citizenship



with no caveats, including Cambodia, East Timor, Australia, New Zealand and Fiji.

Most countries are against it, although some choose not to strictly enforce their policies, allowing people to keep multiple passports by simply not declaring them. Others allow dual citizenship in restricted forms: the Philippines permits it for those who were born Filipino citizens, but not for naturalized Filipinos. South Korea

allows children born to its nationals abroad to hold the passport of both their birth country and their parents.

One reason why many Asian countries oppose dual nationality is a belief that it can create divided loyalties among citizens, said Jelena Dzankic, codirector of the Global Citizenship Observatory (GLOBALCIT), an internation-

al citizenship research network. "The reason why, historically

and traditionally, countries have not been permissive of dual nationality is because, whom are you going to defend if the two of our countries go to war?" she said.

Japan drafted its current nationality laws shortly after World War II, when many Japanese Americans were put in internment camps in the US; other dual citizens renounced their loyalty to the Japanese Emperor for their own safety, said Atsushi Kondo, a law professor at Japan's Meijo Universi-

In one famous case, a USborn Japanese-American dual citizen worked in Japan for a company that oversaw American prisoners of war. Upon his return to the US after the war, he was sentenced to death on treason charges. He was eventually pardoned and deported to Japan -- but for decades afterward, Japanese lawmakers pointed to this case as an example of the conflicting obligations that came with dual nationality.

"In wartime, double citizenship showed disadvantage," Kondo said. "But in peacetime, dual citizens have many advantages" -- including visa-free travel to more countries, greater

international employment opportunities, potentially cheaper university education, and more. There are modern downsides, too- for instance, US dual citizens have to pay double taxation, but that's not the case for most countries.

The international context has now changed, and Japan's "beliefs are a little outdated," he added -- yet the government is reluctant to open up immigration laws and risk upsetting conservative voters.

China's ban on dual nationality is also to ensure that its nationals are "only giving undivided loyalty to the government," said Low Choo Chin, a history lecturer at the Universiti Sains Malaysia. During the Cold War era, China's efforts to normalize relations with neighboring countries and end international isolation were hampered because "overseas Chinese were associated with revolutionary activities" and Communist uprisings, Low wrote in a 2016 paper. So, the Communist government formulated the current nationality

law in 1980 to resolve "diplomatic frictions" and to "end divided loyalty among the overseas Chinese.

Under Chinese President Xi Jinping, the government has cracked down on dual citizens, encouraging the public to report people secretly holding two passports. Those caught can find their access to public services curtailed. The crackdown is part of the

government's anti-corruption efforts against "dual nationals taking advantage of the grey areas in the law, and trying to evade legal sanctions with (their) foreign nationality status ... fleeing abroad, transferring their assets," said Low, pointing to estimates by the Chinese central bank that 18,000 corrupt officials may have fled the country with 800 billion Yuan

(\$122 billion) between the mid-1990s and

The matter of citizenship was thrust to the fore during the Covid-19 pandemic. In the midst of a crisis that transcended national boundaries, govern-

ments were suddenly faced with questions like: Which citizens do we claim as our own? For whom are we responsible? Who do we protect?

Because China doesn't recognize dual citizenship, many Chinese nationals were forbidden from evacuating back to their country of second citizenship -- even if that was their place of birth or primary residency. (CNN)

Only a few patients receive promising COVID treatments

Only a minority of patients are receiving some of the most promising coronavirus treatments.

COVID-19 is almost certainly going to be part of our lives for a long time, even with high vaccination rates. Antibody treatments could make it much less deadly but only if patients get them.

Two still-unpublished studies found that two specific antibody therapies can prevent hospitalization and death among high-risk people with mild or moderate COVID-19 infections, Nature

An antibody developed by Vir Biotechnology and GSK reduced the likelihood of hospitalization or death among clinical trial partici-

bamlanivimab

pants by 85%; The second, an antibody cocktail developed by Eli Lilly, reduced the risk of hospitalization and death by 87%; "It is not a replacement for vaccines, but it is a plan B," Jens Lundgren, an infectious-disease physician at the University of Copenhagen and Rigshospitalet, told Nature.

Only about 1 in every 6 or 7 coronavirus patients eligible to receive antibody treatments are actually receiving them, said Janelle Sabo, who leads COVID-19 therapeutics

That's an improvement from December and January, when only 1 of every 20 to 30 high-risk patients were receiving the tr ments, she said. "The majority are

not being treated with the neutralizing antibody, despite the wide availability of it," Sabo said.

The federal government put the number higher, saying that 37% of outpatients at high risk of developing severe symptoms and hospitalization nationally now receive the antibody therapies.

"We are actively working to increase awareness of therapeutics and to provide them to more types of sites such as urgent care clinics, physician's offices, and ambulatory infusion sites," an administration official said.

Antibody therapies — like the Regeneron treatment that then-President Trump received when he caught the coronavirus — are most effective when they're administered early.

That means patients would need test positive soon after they are infected. But people often don't get tested until they are feeling sick, which could be too late; Once confirmed positive, a patient then has to have a conversation with a doctor who can connect that patient with a treatment center that infuses the therapies; "The issue is people aren't going to their primary care physicians to get tested. They're going to community centers and the pharmacy," Sabo said. That "puts a burden on the patient that typically in the health care transaction they don't have."; Finally, that patient has to get to the infusion center.

"We still don't know much about long haulers and reinfection rates and variants," Sabo said. "I think it would be premature to say [COVID]'s become manageable if you're not vaccinated." (Axios)



Facebook teams up with News Corp

Facebook is teaming up with News Corp Australia just weeks after the country passed a groundbreaking law requiring tech companies to pay for news content.

The three-year partnership was announced on Monday.It will allow content from much of Rupert Murdoch's local media empire, including The Australian newspaper, to be featured on Facebook News — a section of the platform that curates coverage from selected publishers. Terms of the deal were not disclosed. The agreement adds to a stream of new partnerships News Corp

has signed in Australia in recent weeks.

Sky News Australia, a broadcaster owned by a local News Corp subsidiary, has struck a separate deal with Facebook (FB), which "builds on an existing arrangement," News Corp (NWS) said in a statement Monday.

Last month, the conglomerate — which includes much of Australian media and some UK outlets, as well as the Wall Street Journal and New York Post in the United States — also unveiled an agreement with Google

News Corp's US, UK and

(GOOGL).

The partnership allows

Australian publications to be featured on Google's News Showcase platform. But it also is expected to include developing a subscription platform, sharing ad revenue and investing in audio and video journal-

Google declined to share terms of that deal, but News Corp has claimed that it would receive "significant payments."

News Corp is already collaborating with Facebook in the United States, where its publications are paid to be featured on the social network. But the company had been pushing for new rules in Australia, where debate had been fierce about a media code that forces Big Tech to pay publishers for news shared on their platforms.

The debate came to a head last month, just days before the law was passed. That was when Facebook decided to ban news content in Australia in anticipation of the law, forcing the pages of media organizations and even some unrelated essential services to go dark. It eventually restored news content there after the government agreed on making some changes to the legislation.

Scientists stunned by fossils found deep beneath **Greenland's ice sheet**

Looking through the back of your freezer can unearth all manner of goodies that you'd likely forgotten about, but probably nothing quite as surprising as a discovery made at the back of a freezer at the University of Copenha-

A 15-foot tube of ice and dirt from Greenland, recovered in 1966 by a US military team that'd drilled over a mile down into the ice, was analyzed for the first time in 2019 - and there was much more than just sand and dirt in the samples.

In a study, published in the journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences on Monday, the international team of researchers describe the discovery of "perfectly preserved" twigs and leaves locked within their extracted ice cores. The existence of these plants implies that there was once vegetation in that spot now buried by ice, which shows that a decent portion of Greenland must have been ice-free within the past million years. Scientist Andrew Christ reported that the samples are like a time capsule of Greenland before the ice. "Ice sheets typically pulverize and destroy everything in their path," he said, "but what we discovered was delicate plant structures. They're fossils, but they look like they died yesterday.'

The implications of the discovery could be huge for studies on climate change, given that analysis of Greenland's ice sheet could help scientists predict how it will behave as temperatures rise and the ice melts as a result of human activity. It may also help them estimate how long the ice sheet will take before it melts completely, affecting sea levels world-

wide.

In addition, the discovery suggests that Greenland could be more vulnerable to humaninduced climate change than we first thought, given evidence that



most of the ice sheet has melted away at least once before in history - and that was without the aid of human greenhouse gases and emissions.

Now that the levels are higher, the ice could melt faster and with more extreme results. Greenland's ice sheet holds enough water to raise global sea levels by 20 feet,

which would have dire consequences for coastal populations as

Lead scientist Paul Bierman was emphatic about the need to address Greenland's ice problem immediately. "This is not a 20-generation problem," he said. "This is an urgent problem for the next 50 years." (CNET)

US doing better on Covid vaccines

Coronavirus developments in Europe are likely no longer early indications of what will happen weeks later in the U.S., due partly to America's progress vaccinating its population, Dr. Scott Gottlieb told CNBC on Monday. The former Food and Drug Adminis-

tration commissioner's comments on "Squawk Box" come one day after White House Chief Medical Advisor Dr. Anthony Fauci said the situation in Europe shows why U.S. states should not completely ditch pandemic precautions right now.

Italy is imposing more severe restrictions on business in certain parts of the country after a rise in new infections, including an upcoming nationwide lockdown for Easter weekend. Health officials in Germany also have warned about a rise in Covid cases.

"Earlier I said we were sort of four to maybe six weeks behind Europe, and we pretty much were," Gottlieb said, referring to previous phases of the global

health crisis. "Everything that happened in Europe eventually happened here. Now I think the tables have turned. We're ahead of Europe."

"I don't think the conditions in Europe and the situation in Europe is necessarily predictive anymore of what's

> going to happen here because we have much more immunity in our population both from prior infection — which they have as well — but also now from vaccination," added Gottlieb, a board member of Pfizer, which makes a Covid vac-

About 9.5% of the vaccine-eligible population across member states in the EU and European Economic Area have had at least one Covid shot, according to the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control. Roughly 7.5% of Italians aged 18 and up and 8.5% of Germans aged 18 and up have had at least one Covid vaccine dose, per ECDC data. (CNBC)

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

Medical Officer of Health, Boralesgamuwa, Dr. Inoka Liyanage said that all surgical needles used in the vaccination process are collected hygienically after use and sent to Homagama Medical Waste Collecting Centre from where they are re sent to Avissawella Clinical Waste Disposal Unit both of which are maintained by the Ministry of Health.

The plastic syringes as well as cotton waste too are also disposed under international health guidelines to ensure that there is no spread of any germs to the society from this vaccination process.

She said that the Colombo District has several vaccination programmes and Boralasgamuwa Medical Officer of Health is carrying out part of the Colombo District Programme to vaccinate senior citizens over 60 years of age under the United Nations 'Vaccine grant' programme.



UN launches *Only Together* campaign

11 MARCH, NEW YORK — The United Nations today launched a new global campaign, Only Together to support its call for fair and equitable access to COVID-19 vaccines around the world.

The campaign stresses the need for coordinated global action to ensure vaccines are accessible in all countries, starting with health-care workers and the most vulnerable.

"Over the past year, we've all missed out on doing the things we love to do with others- eating, hugging, and going to school and work," said UN Deputy Secretary-General Amina J. Mohammed.

"Millions of us have lost someone we love or had our livelihoods taken away. An unprecedented global scientific effort for vaccines has given us hope to defeat the virus — but only if we work together to ensure everyone, everywhere has access to COVID-19 vaccines. Only together can we end the pandemic and transform a new era of hope." More than 2.5 million people

around the world have died from COVID-19, according to the World Health Organization. The COVID-19 vaccines will stop people from dving prevent new variants from emerging, reignite economies and offer the best hope to end the pandemic.

The biggest vaccine roll out in history is now underway with millions of doses being delivered around the world, including to some of the world's poorest countries, through the efforts of COVAX, the global vaccine equity mechanism. But these doses will initially only cover a small segment of the populations - healthcare workers and the most vulnerable.

By the end of 2021, COVAX aims to offer vaccines to nearly 30 percent of each participating country's population. But that progress pales compared to ten rich countries who possess nearly 80 per cent of all COVID-19 vaccines, with some planning to vaccinate their entire population within the next few months.

COVAX, which is led by the World Health Organization, GAVI and the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), and in partnership with UNICEF, has 190 participating countries. It needs more than US\$2 billion to fully meet its goal to vaccinate those most in need by the end of the year.

Pledging new funding for COVAX is critical, but more can be done to scale up vaccine access by sharing excess vaccines, transferring technology, offering voluntary licensing or even waiving intellectual property rights.

Prop' forwards are usually the largest and heaviest players in a team. In attack, their size and strength means that they are primarily used for running directly into the opponents defence, as a kind of battering ram to simply gain metres. Saranath Nuwan Hettiarachchi was a player who with his height and hefty build locked horns to play a key role occupying the prop forward position in all the teams he played starting from school, club and national team.

Saranath was born in 1981 in Kandy city and Nimal Hettiarachchi was his father a businessman while Kumari Marambe his mother was a housewife. He had two siblings with Ruwan his younger brother who represented the same school later locked horns for CR and FC and another brother Dinesh lives in Italy. He enrolled himself as a primary school kid at Dharmaraja College, Kandy in 1986 and went on to complete his higher studies by 2000. It is noteworthy that Dharmaraja College is another prominent school located in the hill capital which played a phenomenal role in the field of education and sports producing several per-

and fame to their 'Alma Mater' and the country.

Well known as Saranath in the sporting arena, he was very particular in maintaining a brawny frame from his small days. He launched his rugby career from the under-13 and went on to play in the 15 age group under the watchful eyes of coach Janak Samarasinghe, who was instrumental in teaching him the basics of the oval shaped ball. His under-17 coach was C.S. Ekanayake while the under-19 head coach was former Rajan and National sonalities, who brought honour player Hemantha Yatawara with

G. B. Ekanayake as the fitness coach. His involvement in rugby was an interesting one. He was highly captivated by weightlifting and played rugby as a secondary sport. Since he was performing exceptionally well in weightlift-ing, his coach pressurized him to focus purely on weightlifting rather than concentrating on other disciplines to give his best to the sport, But he decided to concentrate on rugby leaving out weightlifting, which was the stepping stone to his illustrious rugby career. He also took part in the under-13 cricket team while being a member of the weightlifting team. While being engaged in weightlifting he represented the college team in the 96kg weight class. In1996, he won the first place whilst establishing a National record at the Junior National Tournament held in Negombo in the same weight class. Due to his quality performance in sports in 1997, he won school colours for weight lifting and also spared his free time in school to take part in soccer and

He started his rugby career with the under-13 age category and continued all the way up to play with the first XV team after representing the school teams in 1996 (under-15) and in 1997(under-17). He played a dual role representing the first XV team drafting in as number eight and at times as a prop forward in the1998/ 1999/ 2000 seasons. In 2000, he was awarded the "Dagoba" at the school Colours Nite for being the first ever rugby player in Dharmaraja history to represent the under-19 Sri Lanka National team. In the same year, he was appointed as games captain of Central Province and represented the winning Central Province team in the provincial league organized by

In1999 he, represented the Junior Asian Rugby team in Taiwan under two great personalities with S.W. Chang as Manager and Ananda Kathuriarachchi as head coach who guided them to win the Plate Championship in that tournament for the first time in history. In 2000, halfway through the school season he was selected by Kandy SC to play for them as a second row forward under the captaincy of Indrajith Bandaranayake. He then donned the Kandy jersey from 2000 to 2008 representing Kandy SC as prop forward under the captaincy Indrajith Bandaranayake, Sajith Mallikarachchi, Pradeep Basnayake, Sanjeewa Jayasinghe, Nalaka Weerakody, Radhika Hettiarachchi and Jeewa Galgamu-

During his peak playing for Kandy in 2001, he was called to join the Sri Lanka National Rugby team as a prop forward under late George Simpkin's tenure as the national coach and had a memorable career till 2007, playing in several tournaments for Sri Lanka under different captains including Viraj Prasantha, Haris Omar, Pradeep Basnayake, Sajith Mallikarachchi, Indrajith Bandaranayake while the coaches were Tony Amit, Tavita Tulagaesi (Laga), C. P. Abeygunawardena and late George Simpkin. In 2008, he won National colours for his contribution to Sri Lankan Rugby. In the same year he opted to hang up his boots with the intention of migrating to Australia. He is living in Melbourne, Australia since 2008 and working at Woolworths LTD as a manager building up and developing his career in Education. Wimalasena ran the Mexico marathon after 36 injections

Rupasinghe Arachchige Wimalasena Perera, participated in the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico in the marathon event and was an excellent long distance runner during his time.

The city of Mexico where the marathon was held was 7,347 feet above sea level and the climatic conditions resulted in Wimalasena falling sick and being hospitalised for three weeks.

He was given 36 injections and yet, considering that he was sent for the Olympics with great expectations, Wimalasena participated in the marathon without heeding medical advice. He competed with 87 others and came in 51st place.

Born on May 30, 1945 he had his early education at Wedamulla Maha Vidyalaya, Kelaniya and secondary education at Sri Dharmaloka Maha Vidyalaya.

During schooldays he was popular as a football player. Before and after football practices it was a habit for him to run one mile.

Wimalasena, won the 1,500 metres at the Western Province Schools Sports Meet held in 1962 at the Royal College Grounds. In 1962, he came seventh in the marathon conducted by the Ceylon Track and Field Club as a 17-yearold schoolboy.

In 1963, at the Junior Athletics Championships he won the 1,500 metres event in four minutes 12.7s and created a junior schools athletics record.

In 1964, his entry form to participate in the trials for the Olympics in Rome for the marathon was rejected because Wimalasena was too young at that time.

In 1964, he left school and joined the Army which was a decisive turn in his life. He received training under Colonel P. D. Ramanayaka and became the Army champion defeating the National

champion R. J. K. Karunananda, who participated in the 1964 Olympics. In the same year, he participated

in the 10,000 metres event at the National Championships and won it in 32.0 minutes. He was awarded the Governor's Cup for this victory.

Wimalasena was successful in improving on the existing Ceylon marathon record of two hours and 33 minutes established by Linus Dias by returning a time of 2 hours 27 minutes and 17.8s at the trials for the Asian Games in 1966.

At the Asian Games he came seventh in the marathon. Although he participated in the Commonwealth Games in 1966, he had to retire from the event due to a shoulder injury.

In 1967, he set a new marathon record while improving on his earlier record by completing it in 2 hours 22 minutes and 5s. He was

also able to win Silver Medals in the Open 3,000m and the 10,000m events in 1967 in Singapore.

Wimalasena who won the National Marathon Championship in 1969 came in fourth place the same year at the marathon event held in Hong Kong.

Wimalasena retired from athletics in 1973 after the Army Inter-Unit Athletics Meet and since then, he has been devoting his time and experience to coaching the younger generation.

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Local motor industry targets USD 1.5 bn export revenue

The government temporarily halted the import of vehicles not to create any hardships to the public but to create a new business vertical from Sri Lanka in the automobile sector, said Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa at the launch of the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) for automobile Manufacturing and Assembly in Colombo on Monday.

He said that when the decision was taken there was a buffer stock of imported vehicles in Sri Lanka sufficient for two years. He said that due to the import ban of vehicles today several local investors have moved in the assembly of vehicles and also component manufacturers have reinvested to increase production.

"With the launch of SOP we anticipate a new dimension in the local motor industry and we anticipate an export revenue in the excess of over USD 1.5 billion in the next two years and create over 20, 000 new high paying employment opportunities."

The Prime Minister said that though there were talks of a SOP in the past 10 years such a scheme was never initiated before and thanked the Minister of Industries Wimal Weerawansa for speeding up the SOP and making it a reality. He also assured that policy decisions and concessions offered by SPO are to stay and applied to local and foreign entrepreneurs to aggressively move and invest in this sector. The longterm objective of this SOP is also to save the annual Rs. 1,820 billion in foreign exchange for the importation of vehicles.

Minister of Industries, Wimal Weerawansa said that the SPO defines the government policy framework formulated to give confidence for investors to create a new revolution in the motor industry. The automotive, vehicle assembly and auto parts manufacturing industries are not isolated. "They are associated with the rubber manufacturing industry, metal and nonmetal manufacturing industry and

the electronics manufacturing industry. For all these industries to develop, a country's vehicle manufacturing, vehicle assembly and auto parts manufacturing industries must be developed first and this is the objective of launching this SOP."

As and when this industry gets stronger in Sri Lanka it will also help to reverse the brain drain allowing young students graduating from universities with degrees in engineering and technology to be employed in these industries at high paying positions."

A skilled workforce too will be created targeting this segment when this industry expands rapidly.

"The launch of the SOP has set up a solid government policy framework to give confidence for investment for the automotive industry with this new turnaround we hope that companies already in the automotive industry as well as new companies will add their investments to this sector."

Purchasing Managers' Index expands in Feb.


Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) sustained its expansion in February 2021 recording an index value of 59.4, owing to the expansion in production and new orders.

Further, stock of purchases and employment as well as suppliers' delivery time remained expanded to sustain the overall manufacturing sector PMI at an elevated level. Production sub-index increased during the month, especially in the manufacture of food & beverages sector, anticipating the upcoming festival demand while new orders recorded a high index value.

Further, the manufacture of textile and the apparel sector also recorded healthy index values with regard to New Orders and Production.

Employment expanded at a higher rate in February compared to January, particularly in the manufacture of food & beverages sector, in-line with increase in production. However, employment in the manufacture of textile and wearing apparel sector remained in the neutral threshold during the month.

Although production



expanded at a higher pace, the Stock of purchases expanded at a slower rate mainly due to the piled-up stocks during the previous month, owing to anticipated supply disruptions due to Chinese New Year holidays. A protective boundary of 3,750 mangrove saplingsis to be planted around Kath Duwa, an island in the Koggala Lake, with the continued support of the Commercial Bank of Ceylon to the 'Koggala Mangrove Restoration and Conservation Project' of Wildlife and Ocean Resource Conservation (WORC) of Sri

Phase 2of this project follows the immense success of the first phase, during which the Bank funded the planting of 2,000 mangrove plants,750 mangrove associates and 500 terrestrial plants on this 13.5-acre island in Habaraduwa, which is situated close to 'Madol Duwa,' the island made famous by Martin Wickramasinghe's novel. The first phase took two years to complete in conformitywith conservation and habitat restoration methods, as promised by WORC.

It's safe to say that Shyamalan's love affair with the mainstream press is over. When you go through the all too tepid reviews of his later efforts, you discern a feeling of betrayal in the critics; it's as though, having staked everything they had, they just couldn't bear seeing him descend to the lower depths. It is precisely because you can't rely on these writers to give us an objective account of his rise and fall, of the supposed drop in quality of his recent work, that we must look at his films from a different, I would say radically different, perspective. For the pleasures of Shyamalan's early work are not completely absent in the work he churns out now. There's still a bit of magic left in him.

MADAPATHACHINTAKA

Indians haven't really fared badly in Hollywood. Mira Nair didn't, and neither did ShekhaKapur. M. Night Shyamalan didn't either, for a while. But while Nair and Kapur came from a distinctly Indian setting – and it shows, even in as mundane a work like Kapur's Elizabeth (1996) - Shyamalan, who was only six when he arrived in the United States, does not seem to have imbibed the Indian-ness that crops up in the films of those two auteurs.

In that sense Shyamalan shares a great deal with another émigré Indian director known for dazzlingly uneven plots, Tarsem Singh; though they operate in completely different genres, both have a

track record of making critics want more and giving them much less, and in the narratives they opt for, both have a tendency to transform the most mundane material into something exciting, even evocative. How else can you describe Shyamalan's Signs, which combines a pastor flirting with doubt with a possible extraterrestrial invasion? Or Sigh's The Cell (2000), where Jennifer Lopez tries to enter the mind of a serial killer?

It may be just my opinion, but I believe most critics have not really explored how Singh, and more pertinently Shyamalan, have "transcended" their land of birth without totally evading, avoiding, or exiting it. Indian-American cinema doesn't get more Indian-American than Mira Nair's Mississippi Masala (1992); indeed the very title of Nair's film conjures up an evocative, if not enigmatic, cultural melange. It's the kind of melange you don't get or seem to get in Shyamalan's movies. There's a trace of it in some of Singh's movies: not just in the weirdly surreal visuals of The Cell, but also the Bollywood-style songand-dance sequences in his reinterpretation of Snow White, Mirror Mirror (2012). I suppose the difference between these two is that one has stayed longer in India than the other: unlike Shyamalan, Singh obtained his education in New Delhi and only then migrated to California.

This in contrast to even Singh, Shyamalan's films have a distinctly Ameri-

can feel to them. It's tempting to rationalise the plot of The Sixth Sense as an Americanised version of an Indian film about reincarnation – I can think of at least one that bears a comparison, Bimal Roy's Madhumati (1958), which incidentally came out at around the same time Hitchcock's Vertigo did – but really, such rationalisations don't stand a first viewing of that film. The Sixth Sense is in, and of, America in much the same way Unbreakable is in and of it.

Unbreakable is even more American in mood and conception in that it delves into the most American of all genres, the comic book. In the two sequels that followed it – the fascinating Split (2016) and the much inferior Glass (2019) – he expands on these thematic concerns until he reaches breaking point. Shyamalan is at his eclectic best when he keeps back and stands ground: he does so in Unbreakable, even more so in Split, and hardly at all in Glass. There's a big gap between the profundity of his themes and the tricks of his trade that he uses and deploys to reduce those themes to their barest essentials: he gets the job done on that count in Signs – arguably his best work – and fails to do so in The Village (2004), which couldn't survive even a stellar cast (including the great William Hurt).

Critics generally point at Shyamalan's penchant for twist endings as his Achilles Heel, and in this they are, more often than not, right. The disjuncture between the profundity of his stories and the lack of any discernible effort to provide a



footing for those stories come out mainly, if not only, on account of his obsession with the twist. Without revealing any spoilers, the twist works sufficiently well enough in The Sixth Sense, Unbreakable, and Signs, and deteriorates with The Village, Lady in the Water (2006), and The Happening (2008), before going down completely in The Last Airbender (2010) and After Earth (2013). Even an interesting an effort as The Visit (2015) misses the bus at several points; to give one example without revealing too much, how can two children spend a week at their grandparents' without their mother getting to know how those grandparents look like?

Those who take Shyamalan to task over these weaknesses argue that he's an egotist. To a not inconsiderable extent they are right: from the messiness of his plots to the cameos he so carefully stages, he seems to be aspiring to the ranks of a Hitchcock. But as Brian De Palma learnt well on his own, you cannot be another Hitchcock if all you do is imitate his style: there must be something more, and the difference between De Palma and Shyamalan is that, in his weaker films, the latter lazily lets go of inserting that "something more" into the story. De Palma may be pretentious, but he's less an egotist than an ardent

cinephile; Shyamalan, on the other hand, seems to enjoy himself most when he is full

of himself. Even Signs, taken today as his last great work (it's my personal favourite), suffers from the convulsions of egotism.As Doug Walker ("The Nostalgia Critic") has shown in his review on YouTube, the begins to sag, literally, when Shyamalan makes his appearance – a cameo the plot does not call for – and engages in a spot of philosophising that neither contributes to nor supplements the storyline. Moreover, when you think about it, the twist – "Swing the bat!" – tends to compare

unfavourably with the twists in Unbreakable and The Sixth Sense – still the best twist ending of them all – in how it tweaks an insignificant plot point and boosts it, to put it charitably, beyond proportion. When the solution to the story lies in two words uttered by a character who dies in a different time and setting, the director must engage and interest his audience, showing that this revelation actually means something. Earth-shattering as it may be to Shyamalan, the effect of swinging the bat - literally and metaphorically - is lost on audiences simply because that twist never gels with the rest of the plot.

I suppose it's easy to pin down this failing on Shyamalan's infamous egotism, and for once, I would agree with the critics. Shyamalan has become so confident of himself at this point that he feels that anything can, and will, go: even a weak twist. And why? Because according to Newsweek,he's supposed to be the next Spielberg.

In the history of the cinema I can't think of another director whose reputation the press inflated so much, only to deflate it later on. Brian De Palma offers a tentative comparison here, but for all his faults, De Palma never fell victim to mass media hysteria. Au contraire, throughout his career he found favour with just two major critics (Roger Ebert and Pauline Kael). The gushing tones of the reviews that greeted The Sixth Sense, Unbreakable, and Signs, on the other hand and viewed in retrospect today, border on the emotionally overthe-top. Peter Bogdanovich enjoyed asimilar reputation in the 1970s,but even Bogdanovich had hisunforgivingcritics, most notably Pauline Kael. Shyamalan did not.

Whether the praise got to Shyamalan's head so much that he chose to overdo himself after Signs, of course, is a moot point; as The Visit and Split clearly show, he is not incapable of producing a truly effective horror-suspense film, if he tries hard enough. I sincerely hope he gives us at least a passing glimpse of his early work - the meticulous craftsmanship and the narrative power - in his upcoming film, Old. Slatedfor release this July, Old promises much (it's about a group of islanders who realise they're aging rapidly on the beach they've trekked out to). Will it revert to the same old - pun intended or will it give us the kind of enigma that Shyamalan proved himself capable of, once? I'm not entire sure, but to be on the safe side let's not trust Newsweek on this.



he two volumes of Sinhala books lying before meare a welcome variant of the existing pattern of other encyclopaedia published by any book publisher. They are academic surveys as well as popular reading material needed for several purposes at a given time. I am referring to the two volumes as compiled by the well-known film director, lyricist as well as the academic known to the world as Professor Sunil Ariyaratne. The two volumes are titled Sinhala Chitrapata Gitavaliya, the first volume containing the songs of Sinhala films from 1967 to 1971 and the

At a glance, a reader who is bound by a desire to be familiar with the details of aparticular song belonging to the particular period cited, has to just scan the index of these two books that are meticulously arranged. I use the term 'meticulous' as the two hefty or bulky volumes are meticulously arranged in the manner of a postgraduate research project in the social sciences.

second volume from 1972 to

The two volumes too are supplemented with long prefaces on several topics such as the type of films for which the songs are created, the previous places where the lyrical compositions or the songs were printed, some factor pertaining to the type of recipient or the audience to which the song was catered, some of the scenes for which the particular song came to be written or cre-

Perhaps all these could go as significant factors for the reader. All these factors go on to say that the compiler, Professor Sunil Ariyaratne, has left no stone unturned in the process of collecting items or material for his two volumes. The material thus collected are predominantly archival sources or collector's items that lay hidden in various places. This also goes to say that the venture of the investigative process had been arduous or at least time-consuming. Professor Arivaratne had been engaged in this type of survey from his days of development as an erudite scholar.

For example, he is credited to be the indefatigable collector and compiler of all the plays of the celebrated Tower Hall dramatist John de Silva and a few others. Here too he is seen as a scholar delved in a certain function perhaps unseen as a resourceful process that eclipses the various learning processes in Media and Communication Studies. The attempt cannot be overlooked or undermined as futile either in Social Sciences or in Humanities. The two volumes will come as learning material as well as good teaching material in creative communication as well as language teaching and the use of language that comes as suitable expressions of a particular event in a visual medium. To the best of my awareness, this kind of compilation has not been performed by any academic belonging to any local university or any other seat of learning in our country. In this respect, this attempt on the part of Professor Sunil Ariyaratne is commendable and a media tribute.

ment of source material the teaching of cinematography. As a film director, Professor Ariyaratne may have a sensitive grasp of the need for a song, and the type of content it should embrace and who would sing it with whose creative direction. Why a particular song is remarkable and why another is not so could be discerned.

In this direction, the need for songs in films too is underlined as a guiding line of interest. Who sings what type of song for what purpose could emerge as a theory of communication from the two volumes. A reader who is avidly fond of songs and lyrics of films in our country may find solace from this compilation. The photo copies of most of the documents from which the songs are collected too are embedded. They too go to express various nuances of the contents of the particular films.

As such, those who take an active interest in the film aesthetics too are helped indirectly. From a historical perspective, the two volumes may need the scrutiny of the local film aesthete. A discriminative teacher could make use of these songs in order to make use of practical lessons in creative communication. This may result in the gradual taste-building process.



Roots and routes of Bharatha Natyam

haratha Natyam originated from the ancient temple art form called Sathir. The origin of Bharatha Natyam could be traced back to the 19th and 20th century. Earlier temple female Sathir dancers, of South India, and Northern queen of Abinaya' in 1943, along with her troupe Sri Lanka were called Sathirkaaris. They danced in the temple festivals, and temple occasions, these Sathir dances were called Sathir Kacheris. Devadasis were the sathirkaaris. Their dance took place throughout the night.

It was good entertainment for devotees as well as for the audience. Northern Sri Lanka is divided from India by eighteen miles' sea called Palk Strait. Hence Sri Lankan Tamil music, dance, devotional music, Pun music, temple paintings, temple sculptures, are very much influenced by the South Indian culture, practices, and traditions, not only the Sri Lankan Tamils but all the Tamils living outside India, are also influenced by the Indian culture and traditions.

Today Bharatha Natyam is regarded as the Tamil Nadu state classical dance, and it is also regarded as a Tamil cultural dance form that is totally based on Hindu philosophy and Hindu religion.

ART REVIVAL

With the passage of time when the Devadasis lost their reputation due to certain reasons in South India and consequently practising Sathir in Temples, was also legally banned in India. In Northern Sri Lanka Sathir gradually lost the reputation, yet it was practised in the Jaffna village temples till the nineteen seventies.

When the art was waning Rukmani Devi Arundale and Krishna Iyer, revived the art and renamed it as Bharatha Natyam. Bharatha Natyam dance started growing in a steady stable and new dimension form. Earlier there were four different styles in Bharatha Natyam, but later two different styles only flourished. One is Pandanallur style and the other is Vazhuvoor style. Rukmani Devi was the student of the guru Panhandler Meenakshi Sundaram Pillai. Rukmani Devi established the institution Kalashethra in 1936 and after, many students from Sri Lanka studied at Kalashethra. Several others studied at the Vazhuvoor School. The Vazhuvoor School does not have any particular institution, but the students studied under the individual outstanding Gurus, most of them studied under Vazhuvoor

Most of the students went from Colombo, and Jaffna to India to learn Bharatha Natyam. Even

many of the outstanding individual dancers from India and dance troupes from India visited Sri Lanka and had numerous programmes, and conducted a few lecture demonstrations. Among them who visited Sri Lanka was Balasarswathi, 'the and gave a performance at the Jaffna Townhall.

FUSION WITH OTHER ART FORMS

Later, Travancore Gopinath and Thankamani also gave a performance that was not a pure classical Bharatha Natya show, but it was an admixture of Kathakali and Bharatha Natyam. Similarly, the famous Mrinalini Sarabai visited Sri Lanka with her husband and gave a performance. In 1954, Kamala Lakxman gave an excellent performance under the guidance, of her Guru Vazhuvoor Ramiahpillai at

the Saraswathy Hall, Colombo, and Jaffna Traditional dance forms in any society must have certain norms and defined links with cultural, lin-

guistic, regional, and religious factors. These traditional dance forms generally have a certain long-standing historical background, and historical developments, in different periods. Almost all the traditional cultural dance forms are systematically categorized into different steps, different hand gestures, eye movements, and neck movements and different names for different foot positions, and different foot movements. Traditional dancers vehemently are supposed to stick within a certain limited framework.

Even some of the traditional dance forms like Russian Ballet, western dance forms, Eastern dance forms, South American dances, Far East Asian dance forms, and South-East Asian dance forms, are systematically confined into defined dance techniques. Each traditional form has its own distinguish makeup, and stage decorations, distinguish costumes, and selective ornaments. Most of the ornaments have certain names, as well as certain significance for the purpose of use. Some of the traditional dance forms are only performed by solo dancers, some are only by female dancers alone, and some are by female and by male dancers together.

TRADITIONAL DANCE FORMS

At the end of the last quarter of the 20th century, a new trend of dance form has developed by modern choreographers. They insert numerous ideas of their creativity into these dances and also borrow techniques from numerous other traditional dance forms. They mainly borrow the nuances, techniques, steps, costumes, ornaments, and makeup from various, different traditional dances, and along with these dances, they also combine their creativity dances and name these as modern dances. The choreographers borrow techniques from Russian Ballet, Gymnastics, circus, and body movement


No proper clarified, defined, categorized steps are followed in these so-called modern and fusion dance forms. Besides these, they add jumps, hops, twists, and sudden turns in these dances. These dances are called 'modern dances or fusion dances'.

Kanthas are treasured as family heirlooms and there is nothing but the creative instinct of the craft women who are constantly making more and more beautiful examples of this craft.

AUTHENTIC HANDCRAFTED

Katha or Kantha is a simple stitch embroidery that originated in Bengal in the 18th century. This traditional embroidery is now fancy for many designers and couturiers to create authentic handcrafted costumes. Though the story of the origin of Katha is as humble as it can be. The farmer and commoner in colonial times had limited resources, the people of Bengal found a way to create something useful and beautiful from the old fabric that would, in a richer part of the world, be thrown away.

The poor could not afford to throw anything away so they collected used torn sarees and old cloth and sew them together in a running stitch to make Kanthas. These Kathas were handcrafted by grandmothers for their future generationsgrandchildren. There are more than one reason for crafting and creating the Kantha- first one was as mentioned earlier- lack of resources, secondly the used cotton cloth would be very soft and adding layers would not make it bulky yet it will become like soft -cushions to be used for a newborn and lastly and symbolically the fabric

In addition to studying in the language target country for half a year, students can also take courses in other majors in the school on a voluntary basis and obtain a second professional degree or minor certificate according to their individual learning conditions.
