Award under Section 17 of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950

By his letters dated January 16, 1958 and February 10, 1958, the Commissioner of Labour referred to me for settlement by arbitration an industrial dispute which existed between the Ceylon Estates Employers' Federation for and on behalf of the Superintendent of Goorookoya Group, Nawalapitiya, and the Ceylon Workers' Congress. The statements which accompanied these letters indicated the matters in dispute as shown at 'A' and 'B' below,

- 'A'—The termination of employment of—
 - (1) Mariaie
 - Muthusamy
 - Velupillai
 - Perumal (4)
 - Vellayan (5) (6)
 - Thaniklaas C. Arumugam
 - Muthuveeran, and
 - (9) Mariaie of Halgolla Division.
- 'B'-The demand made by the Ceylon Workers' Congress that Perumal Kg. and his son Arunasalam should be dismissed in view of the findings of the Labour Officer, Nawalapitiya.

Since the two matters in dispute 'A' and 'B' were between the same parties, these matters were dealt together by me. Sittings were held at the Circuit Bungalow, Nawalapitiya on 10th, 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th of February 1958. On the request of the Union, the case of C. Arumugam was dealt with first and evidence of several witnesses was recorded up to the 14th of February 1958. On this date the parties informed me that there was a likelihood of arriving at a settlement and they made application that the proceedings be stopped to enable them to finalise a settlement which they undertook to convey to me

Although the parties could not arrive at a speedy settlement, they have now conveyed to me the settlement which they have reached. The terms of the settlement are as follows:-

- A'—(a) C. Arumugam and Muthuveeran will leave the estate with their families within 10 days of the Management making a payment of Rs. 2,000 to the President of the Union for distribution in his discretion.
 - (b) The 7 labourers, viz.-
 - (1) Mariaie
 - (2) Muthusamy Velupillai
 - Perumal
 - Vellayan

 - (6) Thaniklaas, and (7) Mariaie of Halgolle Division

will be employed immediately on a casual basis on their apologising to the Superintendent in the presence of Mr. Arunachalam, the District Representative of the Ceylon Workers' Congress, and undertaking in writing to give no cause for complaint in future.

- (c) A meeting will be held early on the estate at which Mr. Thondaman, the President of the Ceylon Workers' Congress, will attend and at which the labour will be advised to work in co-operation with the Management.
- (d) Following upon the meeting, the 7 labourers, mentioned under (b) above, will be permanently registered on the estate. As a gesture of goodwill, the Superintendent will recognize the past services of these 7 labourers on the estate for any purpose in which service is a relevant consideration.
- 'B'—Perumal Kg. and his son Arunasalam will not be employed on the estate and arrangements will be made for them to leave the estate at a very early date.

The labourers, Perumal and Arunasalam have themselves agreed to leave the estate and arrangements have been made to find employment for them on Nagastenne Estate, Dolosbage.

I feel confident that the above settlements have been reached in a spirit of friendship and co-operation which I feel will augur well for the future industrial peace on the estate. In my opinion, the settlements reached are fair and reasonable and I make award accordingly.

1950, and published in Ceylon Government Gazette No. 11,259 dated February 14, 1958, and Ceylon Government Gazette No. 11,275 dated March 7, 1958, for settlement by an Industrial Court, is hereby published in terms of section 25 (1) of the said Act.

INDUSTRIAL COURT AT COLOMBO

I. D. Nos. 44 and 58

Mr. B. Harison E. Peiris, the Proprietor of "Harisons", 111, Galle Road, Panadura

THE AWARD

This is an award under section 24 of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950 (as amended by Acts Nos. 25 of 1956, 14 of 1957 and 62 of 1957). It relates to a dispute between the All-Ceylon Commercial and Industrial Workers' Union (hereinafter referred to as the Union) and B. Harison E. Peiris, the Proprietor of "Harisons", Panadura (hereinafter referred to as the Proprietor). The Proprietor is engaged in the business of the building of bodies for buses and lorries at Panadura since March, 1948.

- 2. The Hon, the Minister of Labour, Housing and Social Services, by his Order dated 7th February, 1958, made under section 4 (2) of the Industrial Disputes Act, referred the dispute to this Court for settlement. The order of reference embodied the statement of the matters in dispute between the parties made by the Commissioner of Labour on the 6th February, 1958. According to this statement the matters in dispute are-
 - (a) The non-employment of—
 - (1) D. C. Tudugalla, (2) U. K. David,

 - (3) M. S. Cooray, (4) T. C. Peiris,

 - (5) W. D. Soysa,(6) P. Wilson Fernando, and
 - (7) Manuel Silva.
 - (b) the following demands submitted by the said
 - (1) The skilled workers to be paid Rs. 3.50 per day as starting wages.
 - (2) Annual increment: At the rate of five cents for an hour with retrospective effect.
 - (3) Provident Fund Scheme to be inaugurated. Management should consider the payment for the past services on the basis of one month's wages for each year of service.
 - (4) Eight public holidays to be granted.
 - (5) Privilege leave of 14 days.
 - (6) Sick leave of 14 days.
 - (7) Double pay on Sundays and Public Holi-
 - (8) To increase the lunch interval from 45 minutes to one hour.
 - (9) Free mid-day meals to be supplied or meal allowance.
 - (10) A suitable place to be arranged for taking meals and pure water to be supplied.
 - (11) Wages to be paid from the date of accident, in case of accident.
 (12) A wall clock to be hung up, in order to
 - assist the workers.

- (13) Number of lavatories to be increased.
- (14) A room for dressing and keep the clothes.
- (15) The workers engaged in injurious trades to be given all protective appliances and garments.

The reference relating to these disputes was numbered No. I. D. 44.

- 3. The Honourable the Minister by a subsequent Order dated 27th February, 1958, also made under section 4 (2) of the Industrial Disputes Act, referred to this Court for settlement other matters in dispute between the parties as detailed in the statement of the Commissioner of Labour dated 25th February, 1958. This statement relates to the non-employment This statement relates to the non-employment of 202 persons whose names are reproduced in the schedule annexed to this Award. This reference was numbered I. D. 58 and was amalgamated with case I. D. 44 as they both related to the non-employment of persons in the same business.
- 4. At the commencement of the inquiry the parties endeavoured to come to a settlement with regard to the question of the non-employment of the persons referred to in both cases. They came to a settlement with regard to all these persons except with regard to 3 persons out of the 7 mentioned in case I. D. 44, viz., W. D. Soysa, P. Wilson Fernando and Manuel Silva. With regard to the other persons, it was agreed that the total number of persons in respect of whose nonemployment the matter was referred to this Court in I. D. 58 is 195 and not 202 as the following 7 names appear twice in the list, viz:-
 - (1) No. 67—Gunadasa Peiris, also appearing against No. 71.
 - (2) No. 68—H. Bodipala Fonseka, also appearing
 - against No. 72.
 (3) No. 70—G. A. Piyasena, also appearing against No. 73.
 - (4) No. 124—V. O. Silva (work No. 231), also appearing against No. 155.
 - (5) No. 177-R. Tanoris Peiris, also appearing
 - against No. 195.

 (6) No. 184—L. Esamon Silva, also appearing against No. 197.
 - (7) No. 187-M. Siemon Fonseka (work No. 17), also appearing against No. 196.

It was agreed that out of these 195, 14 persons were already working, viz:-

With regard to the remaining 181 workers, those who had worked during the 3 months, November and December, 1957 and January, 1958, would be given employment before 31st July, 1958. The rest would be given employment before the end of September, 1958. 30 persons on the list had originally not been identified; 13 of them have now been identified, and as they have worked for the 3 months specified above, they would be given employment before 31st July, 1958. 113 workers have worked for 3 months and they would be given employment before 31st July and, together with the 13 persons mentioned above, the total number of persons who would be given employment is 126. 32 persons who have worked only

for short periods would be given employment before the end of September 1958, thus bringing the total to 158 (i.e., 126 plus 32). 17 workers whose identity is presently in doubt would be given employment before 31st July, 1958, making a total of 175 (158 plus 17). The remaining six persons whose names are on the list are in respect of demand No. 1 in I. D. 44, namely:

- No. 9—P. Wilson Fernando.
 No. 20—W. D. Soysa.
 No. 97—T. C. Pieris.
 No. 189—K. Manuel Silva.
 No. 85—Tudugalle.
 No. 31—U. K. David.

Out of these six No. 97 T. C. Pieris, No. 85, Tudugalle and No. 31, U. K. David would be given employment before 31st July, 1958. It is also agreed that the remaining person in demand No. 1 in I. D. 44, namely M. S. Cooray, would be given employment before 31st July, 1958.

We are of opinion that the above settlement is fair and equitable. We approve of it and make order accordingly in respect of the employment of the persons referred to. As no agreement was reached with regard to the other three persons referred to in I. D. 44, the inquiry thereafter proceeded with regard to—

- (a) the non-employment of W. D. Soysa, P. Wilson Fernando, and K. Manuel Silva (Nos. 5, 6 and 7 in I. D. 44), and
- (b) the 15 demands listed by the Union in I. D. 44.
- 5. W. D. Soysa, P. Wilson Fernando and K. Manuel Silva. The Proprietor states that he discontinued these three persons early in January 1958. In his evidence he stated his position with regard to them as follows:-
 - " As these three workers were inefficient and could not carry on the work to my satisfaction, I could not keep them as my business would be affected. I am not prepared to keep them.

In support of his statement he produced the record sheets of these three workers marked R4, R6 and R9 containing entries which he says he got recorded on them on the occasions on which they were found fault with. They also contain entries made on the 8th and 9th January, 1958, relating to the termination of their services. These entries, it was alleged by the Union, appear on the face of them to have been written up for the purpose of this case, and most of the incidents are denied by the three workers in question, except two relating to the concealment of tools and the running of a cheetu. The reason for the discontinuance of their service, as stated by the Union and by the workers themselves in their evidence, was that the Proprietor was displeased with them for having taken an active interest to form a branch of the union among the workers of this establishment. W. D. Soysa was the Secretary of the Union which was formed in the establishment of the Proprietor about October 1957, and the other two were members of the Union.

The Proprietor in his evidence stated that he was not aware of the formation of a Union in his establishment till 18th January, 1958, when the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Kalutara, requested him to attend a conference in his office regarding representations made by the Union about the discontinuance of the services of the seven workers who are referred to in I. D. 44. This conference was subsequently postponed for the 22nd January, 1958. At that conference, the Proprietor took up the position that he had not discontinued the services of the first 4 persons who had kept away on their own but had only discontinued the services of the three persons now under consideration, and that he was not prepared to re-employ

them. According to the notes of the conference marked R12, "on a suggestion from the Chair the employer on a suggestion from the Chair the employer agreed to take in all seven workers in the order in which they had left if the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Kalutara, and a technical officer from the Transport Board would state that work was available to absorb these workers. The Union agreed to consider this proposal and conveyed the decision to the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Kalutara, by 10 a.m. on 23rd January, 1958. "Inspection by the two officials referred to did not take place, and the matter appears to have ended there.

6. The conditions of employment contained in the record sheets already referred to marked R4, R6 and R9 purport to be signed by W. D. Soysa, Wilson Fernando and Manuel Silva. Wilson Fernando admitted his signature on R6, but W. D. Soysa and Manuel Silva denied having signed R4 and R9. Another record sheet marked R1, purporting to have been signed by M. S. Cooray, the President of the Union, was shown to him when he gave evidence on behalf of the Union. He too denied his signature on this document. He, however, admitted that according to the terms of his employment he could be dismissed with only one day's notice, which is one of the conditions stated in the document. The proprietor in his evidence stated that he started keeping these record sheets in August, 1956, on the suggestion of the Labour Department. He has called a clerk, Charter Fernando, who says that these record sheets were signed in his presence by all the workmen in the establishment at that date. We have also been shown a large number of similar record sheets signed by various employees of this establishment. We are satisfied that the record sheets R4 and R9 were in fact signed by W. D. Soysa and Manuel Silva.

The witness, Charter Fernando, has also said that he made the entries on these record sheets relating to the faults found with these three employees on the These entries have instructions of the Proprietor. been signed by the Proprietor in green ink. They have, however, not been signed by the persons against whom the observations were made. The three persons, Soysa, Wilson Fernando and Manuel Silva, deny that they were found fault with or warned as recorded in these record sheets, except that Wilson Fernando admitted that he was asked not to carry on a money cheetu and also not to hide tools, which he admitted he had hidden to prevent others using the tools which he needed. We have examined the entries in all three record sheets relating to the alleged misdeeds of these workers. From the uniformity of the spacing and the appearance of the ink they are open to the suspicion that they were not written on the respective dates on which they are purported to have been made, but to have been entered together on a subsequent date. view of this fact and as these entries have not been signed or initialled by the workers concerned, we are not inclined to place any reliance on them. Apart from these entries and the evidence of the Proprietor no other evidence was placed before us to establish the faults alleged against these three persons.

7. At the conference with the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Kalutara, held on 22nd January, 1958, the Proprietor produced a document which he said had been signed by 187 workers complaining that they had been misled and stating that they did not wish to be members of any union—(vide minutes of conference marked R12). Counsel for the Proprietor said in his opening address that the Proprietor had also informed the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Kalutara, that these 187 workers objected to the re-employment of these three persons. None of them, however, have been called as witnesses before us to establish any allegations against the three persons concerned. In view of the active steps that were being taken by some of the workers prior to January, 1958, with regard to the formation of the branch union, we

find it difficult to believe that the Proprietor was totally ignorant of what was going on and that he did not know of the formation of the branch union amongst the workmen till 18th January, 1958, as he states. These three persons may or may not have been discontinued by the Proprietor on account of their union activities; there is no proof of that before us except the statements of the three persons themselves. The burden, however, was on the Proprietor to satisfy us that he had sufficient reason for discontinuing their services; this, he failed to do. We, therefore, find that the discontinuance of these three persons was not on sufficient grounds. In view of their long service with the Proprietor we order that these three persons too should be treated in the same manner as the first four persons referred to in demand No. 1 of I. D. No. 44 regarding re-employment under the Proprietor.

8. Fifteen demands listed by the Union.

Before we consider the demands individually, it is necessary for us to deal with the position taken up by the Proprietor that all the persons working in his establishment are casual workers. His Counsel stated that many of the demands could not be granted owing to their being casual workers. In the Propretor's statement filed in this Court on 27th February, 1958, he states as follows in regard to these demands:—

"My workforce consists of casual workers who present themselves for work when they please and who absent themselves from work at their pleasure. None of the demands are such as can be ordered against me, or have even been ordered against an employer in circumstances comparable to those in which I work."

Counsel for the Proprietor argued that, in view of the fact that the services of the workmen could be terminated by giving one day's notice in terms of the entries in the record sheets to which we have already referred, their employment must be considered to be temporary. He also relied on admissions made by the workers who had given evidence, that they could keep away or work whenever they pleased and received payment only for the days on which they actually worked. He, therefore, argued that this showed that they were not permanent but casual employees.

This Proprietor's business is one of body building for buses and lorries and was started in 1948. He admitted in his evidence that his business is the largest next to the body building section of Rowlands Limited, Nawinna. It is impossible for us therefore to accept the position that for carrying on a business of this size and nature his entire labour force consisted of casual workers. Some of the workers have been employed by him almost from the commencement of his business; their names are entered in checkrolls, which we have examined, and, as already stated, record sheets have been maintained in respect of all the workers since August, 1956. The fact that these workers are not employed on a monthly contract of service or that they are only paid for the days on which they work is quite insufficient to show that they are casual workers. According to section (3) of the Contracts of Hire and Service Ordinance (Cap. 59) verbal contracts for service shall be deemed and taken in law to be contracts of service for one month unless otherwise expressly stipulated." According to the Standing Orders for the Engineering Trade enforceable among the members of the Employers' Federation of Ceylon "The period of the contract of employment shall be from the normal time of commencing work at the beginning of the week to the normal time of finishing work at the end of the week. The contract may be terminated (other than by dismissal for misconduct or some such cause) by one week's notice on either side." In the present case the agreement between the Proprietor and the employees is that the contract may be terminated by one day's

notice, but that does not make the nature of the employment casual. As usually understood, a casual employee is one who is engaged to do a particular job of work for a short period of time and is paid for on the completion of the job or on the expiration of the period. In the present case the workmen are paid at the end of each week for the number of days they have worked during that week and their names are retained in the checkroll unless they keep away for a long period of time. Further, these workers have continued coming regularly to work in the Proprietor's business for several years. In view of this position we hold that the employment of these workers was of a non-casual nature. Dr. N. M. Perera, when he addressed us referred to these workers as "regular employees " and we agree with him. It may, of course, be that every workman employed will not fall into this category, but it seems obvious that the Proprietor must depend on a nucleus of regular employees in order to carry on his business. In times when he gets excess of work it may so happen that he employs casual workers to cope with the extra work within the period in which it has to be finished.

We shall now deal with the demands as such.

9. Demand 1. The skilled workers to be paid Rs. 3.50 per day as starting wages.

There was no dispute with regard to this demand. The Proprietor said that according to the decisions of the Wages Board for the Engineering Trade the daily wage came to Rs. 3.52 and that he never paid less than this amount and that some of his workers were even receiving as much as Rs. 4.50 per day. The wages paid to his skilled workers (inclusive of allowances) ranged from Rs. 3.52 to Rs. 4.50 per day. All that we need say in respect of this demand is that no evidence was placed before us for ordering the Proprietor to pay his employees a minimum wage higher than that determined by the decisions of the Wages Board for the Engineering Trade.

10. Demand 2. Annual increments: At the rate of five cents for an hour with retrospective effect.

The Proprietor said that he used to give increases in salary to his workmen who worked well and this was admitted by the workers who gave evidence before us. The demand is for a definite rate of annual increment at 5 cents per hour with retrospective effect. Counsel for the Proprietor argued that the Court could not order increments in view of the fact that the work was of a casual nature, but we have already held that it is of a non-casual nature. Counsel for the Union in his address referred to the Walker's Award where certain incremental scales have been fixed and asked us to examine the conditions obtaining in other establishments in the Engineering Trade and grant a reasonable scale of increments. It is obviously not possible for a smaller business like the Proprietor's to adopt the scale awarded in that case, and it is not possible for us to examine conditions prevailing in other establishments and fix a scale independently of what has been discussed in Court. We make no order on this demand.

11. Demand 3. Provident Fund Scheme to be inaugurated. Management should consider the payment for the past services on the basis of one month's wages for each year of service.

No evidence was placed before us that provision for a provident fund is in existence in business undertakings comparable to the Proprietor's. Counsel for the Proprietor stated that if the provisions of the Employees' Provident Fund Act, No. 15 of 1958, which has now become law, are applicable to the Proprietor's business, he would be perfectly willing to comply with those requirements. In view of this we make no order for the formation of a provident fund scheme in this establishment. With regard to the claim

for a gratuity—payment in respect of the past services—it was not indicated to us whether this claim was independent of the claim for a Provident Fund Scheme. We presume that the gratuity asked for, if granted, was to be paid into the contemplated Provident Fund for the workers. In view of what we have stated above regarding the Provident Fund Scheme and in the absence of any data on which this claim is based, we make no order on the gratuity claim as well.

12. Demand 4. Eight public holidays to be granted.

We order that the public holdiays fixed by the Wages Board for the Engineering Trade be granted to the employees of this establishment.

13. Demands 5 and 6. Privilege leave of 14 days. Sick leave of 14 days.

In view of the fact that these workers are not casual workers they would be entitled to all the holiday privileges granted by the Wages Board for the Engineering Trade. We order that the employees of this establishment should be entitled to the leave privileges granted by the Wages Board for the Engineering Trade.

14. Demand 7. Double pay on Sundays and Public Holidays.

There is no dispute on this demand. The Proprietor stated that he pays the employees at double rates for any work done on Sundays or public holdiays. We therefore order that he continue to do so.

15. Demand 8. To increase the lunch interval from 45 minutes to one hour.

There was no dispute with regard to this matter also, but there appeared to be some uncertainty with regard to the ringing of the bell to notify the workers of the termination of the lunch interval which commences at 12 noon. The Proprietor stated that the bell was rung after 45 minutes in order to enable the workmen to get ready to come for work at 1 o'clock. It was agreed between the parties that in addition to the ringing of the bell after 45 minutes of the commencement of the lunch interval a second bell would be rung after a further 15 minutes to indicate the commencement of work after the lunch interval.

16. Demand 9. Free mid-day meals to be supplied or meal allowance.

In the statement filed by the Union with regard to this demand, the following appears: "This is a system adopted in most workplaces today, but no provision of any kind has been made in this connection to these workers." No evidence, however, was given by the Union as to the amount they claimed for each person. but the Counsel for the Union in his address referred to the well-known firm of Walkers who supply a free mid-day meal to their workers. It has been pointed out in the awards in certain cases previously heard in this Court that "this practice of giving free mid-day meals by some of these well-established firms carrying on essential services during the period of the emergency has been organized as a result of the last war, and these firms had voluntarily continued the practice of giving this free mid-day meal. The considerations that weighed with these firms for giving such a free mid-day meal to their workers in certain trades in Colombo was undoubtedly the promotion of the war effort and the existence of the war emergency. A big engineering firm like Walkers may be in a position to afford to grant their workers a free mid-day meal, but in the case of a business like the Proprietor's, we have no evidence as to whether this business can afford to bear the cost of supplying a free mid-day meal, in addition to paying the legitimate wages. The Counsel for the Union at the end of his address stated that the Union was not pressing this particular point. The business of the Proprietor is located in the heart of an important town like Panadura and it cannot be said that the employees would have to go very far away from the place of business in order to secure their midday meals. We therefore disallow this demand.

17. Demand 10. A suitable place to be arranged for taking meals and pure water to be supplied.

The Proprietor in his evidence stated that a canteen had been provided in the premises for the workers about six months ago, and this statement was not disputed by the Union. In view of this fact and also as the workers have their mid-day meal in hotels or boutiques close by or at their houses if they live close by, and go out of the Proprietor's premises to do so, we see no reason to grant this demand.

With regard to the demand that pure water should be supplied to them for drinking, the Proprietor stated in his evidence that apart from providing water for washing purposes, he obtains suitable drinking water from outside for the use of the employees. It is therefore not necessary for us to make an order on this demand. If it be the fact that wholesome drinking water is not supplied to the workers, it is a matter on which they can make representations to the Labour Department.

18. Demand 11. Wages to be paid from the date of accident in cases of accident.

Counsel for the Proprietor urged that this was a matter that was governed by the Workmen's Compensation Ordinance and that as there is legislative provision in regard to compensation for accidents, the Court should not depart from its provisions. A claim of this nature has been considered by Industrial Courts in this Island on several occasions previously and the Court had always held that it was not prepared to make an order contrary to the policy of the law as contained in the Workmen's Compensation Ordinance. From the evidence in this case it appears that accidents at the Proprietor's business have been rare and the Proprietor has in his evidence stated that in one case where a workman was injured he paid him compensation very liberally. We therefore refuse this demand, but of course it is always open to the Proprietor to consider making payment for the waiting period in any suitable case

19. Demand 12. A wall clock to be hung up, in order to assist the workers.

There was no dispute with regard to this demand. According to the evidence it was admitted that there was a clock but it was not hung up in a prominent place. The Proprietor said in his evidence that there were two clocks and he had no objection to providing facilities to the workmen to see the time. It is not necessary for us to make any specific order on this matter.

20. Demand 13. Number of lavatories to be increased.

This is not a matter on which it is possible to make an order on the evidence placed before us. Those labourers who gave evidence complained that the lavatories provided were insufficient; the Proprietor said that they were sufficient, but if they are found to be insufficient if new workers are recruited, he would take steps to have extra lavatories constructed. If it is contended by the workers that the lavatory accommodation is still insufficient, then it is for them to make representations to the Labour Department or the Public Health Authorities at Panadura. We therefore make no order on this demand.

21. Demand 14. A room for dressing and keep the clothes.

It is not possible for us on the evidence to decide whether the accommodation which the Proprietor says

he has provided is sufficient or not. It is of course the duty of the Proprietor to provide a suitable place for the workmen to change their clothes and keep the clothes from which they change while they are working in the establishment. If the facilities provided for this purpose are inadequate, it is a matter that the Union should take up with the Labour Department.

22. Demand 15. The workers engaged in injurious trades to be given all protective appliances and garments.

The Proprietor in his evidence stated that he had provided the necessary protective appliances for the workmen who are engaged in types of work which might cause an injury—particularly to those working with the electric drills and doing welding work. According to the evidence of sores of the workmen, it was admitted that certain protective appliances were provided. We are unable on the evidence to decide whether what has been provided by the Proprietor is sufficient or not. If the Union maintains that the appliances are insufficient, it is a matter that should be taken up with the Labour Department or with the Chief Inspector of Factories of the Labour Department. We therefore make no order on this demand.

 - (b) Temporary and permanent authorised buildings erected on permits issued by me or an Authorised Officer along and facing the Bibile-Aluthnuwara-Soraborawewa P. W. D. road, north of the Resthouse, Aluthnuwara and east of the Willowewa;
 - (c) Temporary buildings erected on permits issued by me or an Authorised Officer in the Camp Area reserved for pilgrims opposite the Willowewa;
 - (d) Temporary and permanent buildings authorised by me or an Authorised Officer along and facing the Aluthnuwara-Meegahakiula P. W. D. road, south of the Willowewa Aluthnuwara-Meegahakiula Tank.

For the purpose of this notice every building whose road frontage is less than 50 feet from the centre of the road shall be deemed to be a building along the road.

- (d) Prohibit cooking within the Devale premises and Vihare Maluwa and Devale road or Palle Veediya, Meda Veediya and Bomalu Veediya.
- (e) Appoint the following places for the sale of only flowers, joss sticks, candles, incense, cam-phor and images as offerings at the Devale,

Temporary buildings erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer in front of the Sangawasa and on the Meda Veediya.

- (f) Appoint the following places in which any commodity except an article of food or drink may be sold subject to the provisions of the Regulations-
 - 1. Temporary buildings erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer along the Maima Road,
 - and temporary buildings 2. Permanent erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer along and Bibile-Aluthnuwara-Sorabora facing P. W. D. road, north of the Resthouse, Aluthnuwara and south of the Willowewa Tank;
 - temporary buildings and 3. Permanent erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer facing and along Aluthnuwara-Karametiya-Meegahakiula P. W. D. road, south of the Willowewa Tank.
 - 4. Licensed permanent buildings facing and along Bibile-Aluthnuwara-Sorabora P. W. D. road between Willowewa Tank and the Resthouse, Aluthnuwara, and facing and along Aluthnuwara-Meegahakiula-Karametiya P. W. D. road between Willowewa Tank and the Resthouse, Aluthnuwara.
- (g) Except in regard to the sale of articles described in para. (e) at the appointed places above, prohibit the sale of any commodity of any description, in the Sacred Area at Mahiyangana subject to the provision of the Regula-
 - 1. Devale Road or Palle Veediya;
 - 2. Meda Veediya;
 - 3. Bomalu Veediya;
 - 4. Devale premises;
 - 5. Vihare Maluwa.
- 2. No vehicles including bicycles and carts will be allowed within the Camp Area without a permit from me or an Authorised Officer.

- 3. Available Crown sites will be released by the D. R. O. Bintenna, at his discretion for the purpose of boutiques on payment of rent as usual by the D. R. O. No trade will be allowed on such premises unless the building conforms to the requirements of the Sanitary Authorities. All such boutique keepers should provide one or two latrines, if so directed by me or an Authorised Officer.
- 4. No temporary buildings can be put up within the Camp Area at Mahiyangana without a permit from me or from an Authorised Officer.
- 5. Crackers and fireworks, &c., in the Camp Area are prohibited.
- 6. The attention of the public is specially drawn to the undermentioned Regulation and strict compliance of the same is kindly requested:—

Regulation 15

"No person shall without the previous sanction of the Government Agent, construct any booth or any sort of building or extend any building so as to encroach on any land used or set apart for use as a street within the Camp Area or any land forming the banks of the river within the Camp Area.
