Two bowsers of sealed coconut oil seized

Dankotuwa Police had seized two bowser trucks containing coconut oil stocks, which had been sealed by the Sri Lanka Customs on suspicion of containing harmful substances. The raid had been carried out on Monday night on a tip-off through the 119 hotline.

The Police had taken into custody 27,500 litres of coconut oil. The bowser trucks were found while parked at a factory at Dankotuwa. The two drivers of the

bowsers were also arrested by the Police, but they were later released after recording statements. Dankotuwa Police said the samples obtained from the coconut oil stock will be sent to the Government Analyst for testing.

Ban on PET bottles, sachets from today

The ban on the production of four types of plastic and polythene related products by the Environment Ministry will come into effect from today.

Accordingly, able polythene and plastic, PET bottles (PolyEthylene Terepthalate), lunch sheets less than 20 microns, sachets (non-food and nonpharmaceutical), cotton buds (non-medical) and inflatable plastic toys would be banned.

COPE finds Rs.50 million amiss at Peradeniya University PGIS

Senior Assistant Bursar interdicted, CID to probe malpractices

It was revealed at the Committee on Public Enterprises (COPE) that a former senior official of the Postgraduate Institute of Science (PGIS) affiliated to the Peradeniya University had fraudulently obtained Rs.50 million from fixed deposits maintained by the university's PGIS.

The Post Graduate Institute affiliated to the Peradeniya Universityhad closed 14 fixed deposits which were under the Peradeniya Branch of People's Bank, during the period from January 1, 2009 to December 31, 2016 and obtained Rs.93 million.

Out of this amount, only Rs.37 million (Rs.37,948,865) has been invested in new fixed deposits and Rs. 50 million (Rs. 50,338,160) has been fraudulently obtained personally by the Senior Assistant Bursar of the PGIS of the Peradeniya University.

The officer involved in the financial fraud has been interdicted and is

It was noticed that some of the damaged handrails had decayed and broken, and that some of the iron bars that connect the handrail to the ground had come off. This writer's right hand was injured by a decayed part of the handrail.

Police cannot assault public, but men stressed on roads - Minister

Public Security Minister Rear Admiral Sarath Weerasekara expressing his views regarding the recent incident where a police officer had attacked a driver, said police officers have no right to assault

The Minister also noted that so far this year 72 police personnel had been injured in road accidents while 18 of them had succumbed to their injuries.

Last year 293 police officers had been injured in road accidents in the line of duty while 28 of them had been killed in such accidents. Hence, the Minister said that police officers are under severe stress in the line of duty, but added that no matter how much stress they have to endure, attacking the public in such a manner cannot be tolerated at any

The Blue railway track which is 23 km long will be constructed from Kottawa to Hunupitiya via Isurupaya, Pelawatte in Battaramulla

The Purple railway track will be constructed from the Port City in Colombo to Athurugiriya via Borella. Minister Gammanpila further added that this project is scheduled to be implemented as a Public-Private Partnership (PPP) project. This project will address the problem of heavy traffic congestion in morning and evening rush hours by luring motorists to use the comfortable, clean, speedy and punctual trains. The busiest travel corridors, some of

which do not have existing train services, have been identified in conceptualizing the train services. It will drastically cut travel times, as motorists generally spend around 90 minutes to reach Colombo from some of the urban areas. Such elevated train systems are already in operation in many countries.

The City Bus service, whereby motorists can park their cars at a designated location and then come to Colombo by comfortable SLTB A/C buses, has already become a success and the authorities expect to expand the service to cover more routes and cities in the near future.

The case was filed on charges of preparing an erroneous Attorney General's report to avoid taking legal action against irregularities committed in the purchase of lands for LECO during the period between December 1 and December 30, 2010, while Mohan Peiris was the Attorney General.

The CIABOC charged the suspects with gaining wrongful or unlawful benefit from the funds belonging to LECO, under the Bribery Act.

The three accused were acquitted as the Commission to Investigate Bribery or Corruption had decided to withdraw the case filed against them.

will seek due legal advice before implementing any of the recommendations of the Report of the said Presidential Commission.

The SPCoI was appointed by the President on January 29 to follow up on the recommendations made in the report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry into Political Victimization, which was handed over to the President on December 8, 2020.

Sanjeewa Jayawardena made these remarks when the writ petitions filed by Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP) leader Anura Kumara Dissanayaka and several others were taken up for

Jayawardena stated that the President is acutely conscious of the very serious grievances of those who made genuine complaints of discrimination and victimization to the Justice Abeyratne Presidential Commission of Inquiry.

'The President has appointed a Special Presidential Commission of Inquiry consisting of two sitting judges of the Supreme Court and a judge of the Court of Appeal. In those specific circumstances, His Excellency does not intend, at this juncture, to remit the Report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry to the Attorney General, the Commission to Investigate allegations of Bribery and Corruption or the PSC, as the President wishes to await the final recommendations of the Special Presidential Commission of Inquiry in respect of all matters,' Jayawardena added.

The petitioners including JVP leader Anura Kumara Dissanayaka and Parliamentarian Sarath Fonseka are seeking an order staying the operation of recommendations of Presidential Commission of Inquiry appointed to probe incidents of political victimization.

The Court of Appeal three-judgebench headed by Justice Arjuna Obeysekere issued notices on the respondents returnable for May 12.

In his petition, Anura Kumara Dissanayaka had cited the commissioners of the Presidential Commission, retired Supreme Court Judge Upali Abeyratne, retired Court of Appeal Judge Chandrasiri Jayatilake and former IGP Chandra Fernando, Commission Secretary Pearl Weerasinghe, Cabinet of Ministers and the Attorney General as respondents.

The petitioner stated that the recommendations and decisions made in several instances against the petitioner is purely on the basis that he was a member of the National Executive Council or Anti Corruption Unit.

The petitioner stated that the recommendations of the PCoI are unreasonable, arbitrary and breach of his legitimate expectations. He further

said recommendations would affect his political career.

Dissanayaka reiterated that the petitioner at no time whatever consented to being a member of the Anti Corruption of Inquiry. The JVP leader stated that on an overall basis the petitioner among other persons has been found guilty of the following wrongdoings.

(A). The petitioner is said to have committed the offence of corruption in terms of the section 70 of the Brib-

(B). The petitioner is said to have committed offences against Public (C). The petitioner by implication

is said to have wielded influence of the Director in charge of the Anti Corruption Committee.

The petitioner is seeking an Interim Order restraining respondents from taking any steps in respect of the petitioner based on the Presidential Commission report.

The petitioner further said the Cabinet of Ministers have taken a decision to implement the recommendations of the Commission of Inquiry dated January 18, 2021.



urrent evidence indicates that the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine is safe and effective and that the benefits of the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine in combating the widespread threat of COVID-19 continue to outweigh the risks of side effects, said WHO Country Office, Sri Lanka, Officer in Charge/ Public Health Administrator Dr. Olivia Nieveras in an interview with the Daily News.

"Sri Lanka was one of the first countries to initiate a vaccine rollout which is a commendable achievement," she said. Excerpts of the interview:

Q: Sri Lanka received the first shipment of the COVID-19 AstraZeneca vaccines through the international COVAX facility run by the World Health Organization (WHO) in early March. It was reported that the country will receive another batch of vaccines under WHO's COVAX facility. The World Health Organization has pledged to provide 20 percent of Sri Lanka's population with the COVID-19 vaccine. Could you update us on the progress?

A: COVAX is a global vaccine initiative co-led by Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), funded by donations from governments, multilateral institutions and foundations, with UNICEF leading on procurement, logistics, and storage globally. On March 7, 2021, Sri Lanka received the first batch of COVID-19 vaccines from the COVAX facility. This delivery of 264,000 doses was part of the first wave of arrivals that will continue in the coming weeks and months, culminating in 1,440,000 doses arriving through May. The additional doses to cover 20 percent of Sri Lanka's population will arrive in the second half of 2021. All these doses are donor-funded and provided at no cost to Sri Lanka.

Sri Lanka was one of the first countries to initiate a vaccine rollout, a commendable achievement. To date, the Government has vaccinated over 800,000 people with the first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Q: Initially it was said that the second jab of the AstraZeneca vaccine should be taken one month after the first dose. Of late, what we hear is that the second dose has to be taken after 12 weeks. What is the reason for extending the length of time between doses? Does it indicate that no proper research has been done on its interval?

A: Following the introduction of a vaccine, close monitoring continues to take place to continue assessing how best to use the vaccine for the greatest protective impact. This is because recommendations on best practices may evolve with emerg-

ing evidence. For the Oxford/AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine, the recommended schedule is two doses (0.5 ml). The vaccine can be administered with an interval of four to12 weeks. Studies have shown that (1) vaccine efficacy tended to be higher when the interval

between doses was longer, and (2) higher antibody levels were observed with increasing the interdose interval. Therefore, it was concluded that longer dose intervals within the four to 12 weeks range are associated with greater vaccine efficacy.

Q: Even after receiving the second dose of the vaccine, can one still get

A: It typically takes a few weeks for the body to build immunity (protection against the virus that causes COVID-19) after vaccination. That means it is possible for a person to become infected with the COVID-19 virus just before or just after vaccination and become ill. This is because the vaccine has not had enough time to provide protection, not because the vaccine was ineffective. Moreover, because no vaccine will have 100 percent efficacy, some persons who are vaccinated with COVID-19 vaccines may not develop sufficient immunity against the disease and, therefore, would remain at risk of contracting the disease. Current evidence shows that the Oxford/AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine is extremely effective against severe cases of COVID-19.

Q: It was reported that the COVID-19 vaccination does not work well for African and Brazilian variants. Please

A: The Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine has been shown in randomized clinical trials in UK and Brazil to be safe and efficacious and has received approval from a number of stringent regulatory authorities. The trial sites did not include sites with B1.351 (first identified in South Africa) circulation but did include B1.1.7.

Q: What are the WHO approved vaccines against COVID-19?

A: Currently, WHO emergency use listing (EUL) for COVID-19 vaccines has been granted for the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine, and the Janssen

The WHO EUL procedure assesses the suitability of novel health products during public health emergencies. The objective is to make medicines, vaccines, and diagnostics available as quickly as possible to address an emergency while adhering to stringent criteria of safety, efficacy, and quality. The assessment weighs the threat posed by the health emergency and the benefits of the proposed product against any potential risks.

The EUL pathway involves a rigorous assessment of late phase 2 and phase 3 clinical trial data and substantial additional data on safety, efficacy, quality, and risk management. The data is reviewed by independent experts, not by WHO authorities.

Experts from individual national authorities are invited to participate in the EUL review. Once a vaccine has been listed for WHO emergency use, the WHO engages its regional regulatory networks and partners to inform national health authorities of the vaccine and its anticipated benefits based on data from clinical studies to date.

Q: The European Medicines Agency's (EMA) which investigated on the Astra-Zeneca vaccine and thromboembolic events finally declared the vaccine to be safe. What were the committee recommendations?

A: The WHO Global Advisory Committee on Vaccine Safety (GACVS) COVID-19 subcommittee met virtually on March 16 and 19 to review available information and data on thromboembolic events (blood clots) and thrombocytopenia (low platelets) after vaccination with the AstraZeneca COVID-19

Based on a careful scientific review of the available information, the subcommittee came to the following conclusions and recommendations:

• The AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine (including Covishield) continues to have a positive benefit-risk profile, with tremendous potential to prevent infections and reduce deaths across the world.

• The available data do not suggest any overall increase in clotting conditions such as deep venous thrombosis or pulmonary embolism following administration of the COVID-19 vaccines. Reported rates of thromboembolic events after the COVID-19 vaccines are in line with the expected number of diagno-

ahead with it. Could you brief us on its importance?

A: Vaccines are a global public good: everyone benefits when anyone is vaccinated.

There will be no true health or economic recovery unless all parts of the country and world reduce COVID-19 morbidity and mortality; vaccines are a key part of that.

Developing immunity through vaccination reduces your risk of acquiring the illness because your body already knows how to fight the virus if you're exposed. Getting vaccinated may also protect the people around you, because if you are protected from getting the disease, you are less likely to infect someone else. This is particularly important to protect people at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19, such as older people and people with comorbidities.

Q: What are the after effects, if any, of the COVID-19 vaccine?

A: Like any medicine or vaccine, COVID-19 vaccines can cause mild side effects such as fever, headache, tiredness, muscle pain, and/or pain or redness at the injection site.

Mild reactions go away on their own within a few days. Severe or long-lasting side effects are extremely rare. Vaccines are continually monitored for safety, to detect rare adverse

Following the introduction of a vaccine, close monitoring continues to take place to detect any unexpected adverse side effects and further assess effectiveness among even larger numbers of people, to continue assessing how best to use the vaccine for the greatest protective impact. Therefore, it is important that vaccine recipients inform designated health authorities of any experienced side effects or adverse events.


Q: Can one get back to normal lifestyle after getting both doses? Do we have to continue wearing facemasks while also adhering to hand hygiene practices?

A: Public health and social measures are the foundation of our response to COVID-19. Vaccines are important tools, and vaccination is a key intervention, but by themselves, they will not end the pandemic. As we roll out the vaccines globally, we need to take all necessary measures to prevent the virus from spreading and causing more deaths. We need to stay the course and "do-it-all" and do it better. This means, along with vaccination, we need to continue practising physical distancing, wearing masks, washing our hands with soap, increasing ventilation, avoiding crowds, disinfecting surfaces, and staying home if asked.

Additionally, so far, vaccines appear to be efficacious against developing the disease, but we don't know their impact on preventing transmission. We need more evidence on this, and ongoing studies will help us answer these questions. Hence, it is important that a person who gets the vaccine continues to take necessary precautions in order to protect everyone in the community. This means continuing to practise physical distancing, wearing masks, washing our hands with soap, increasing ventilation, avoiding crowds, disinfecting surfaces, and staying home if

Proposed project in Sinharaja is against country's law - UNP

The United National Party (UNP) has accused the Government of acting in contravention of the laws of the country regarding the proposed project within the Sinharaja Rainforest.

UNP Deputy Leader Ruwan Wijewardena, speaking to media at Sirikotha, said that the Sinharaja Rainforest is protected under the National Wilderness Heritage Areas Act of 1988. "This Act was introduced by the UNP Government under former President J.R. Jayewardene, it was enacted to ensure the protection of the Sinharaja forest and the surrounding areas," he said.

Prior to the enactment of the Act, Sri Lanka's sole surviving virgin forest was being used for logging by the Ceylon Timber Corporation and the Plywood Corporation. Once again, the Government is threatening to return Sinharaja to the status of a timber yard, he said.

Section 4 (1) (a) of the Act states that no person shall in National Heritage Wilderness Area: cut, mark, lop, girdle, saw, convert, collect or remove any plant, tree or any part thereof or any other forest produce." The action



of the Government in pursuing this project within the Sinharaja Rainforest is in direct conflict with the laws of the

Wijewardena said that despite the Government stating that they will seek UNESCO approval, this will not exempt them from the laws of the country. "The United Nations and all their subsidiary bodies must recognise and adhere to the sovereignty of the nation, regardless of what UNESCO decides, the law of the country clearly forbids any activity within the Sinharaja Rainforest," he said.

Wijewardena said that the Sri Lankan Government's responsibilities to the natural environment are not only governed by the laws of the country but also by their international obligations. "Sri Lanka is a signatory of numerous international agreements including the Paris Climate Agreement, the Kyoto Protocol and the Rio +20 Summit. The Government must ensure that the conditions of these agreements are honoured," he said.

The UNP has stated that they will be pursuing all action possible to ensure that this heinous crime against the country is stopped. Calling on the environmentalist in the country to take the lead in this fight, Wijewardena urged all political parties to support this struggle without politicising it. "This is a national issue and requires the support of all citizens regardless of political affiliations, the UNP will provide all the support it can to those environmental groups who must lead this effort," he



National Action Plan for Healthcare Waste Management formulated

Speaking at the event, Health Ministry's Environment, Health, Occupational Health and Food Safety Consultant Dr.Inoka Suraweera stated: "We greatly appreciate the valuable contributions from all stakeholders involved, from the process of the Rapid Assessment to the formulation of the National Action Plan. This is a timely and important exercise, and while thanking UNDP Sri Lanka for its collaboration with the Ministry, we look forward to working together in implementing the National Action Plan."



The outlaw within the law

he shocking spectacle of a Police Constable brutally assaulting a civilian in the middle of a busy highway in Pannipitiya on Monday is certainly not going to enhance the already battered image acquired by the men in khaki. On the contrary it will only serve to reinforce past allegations of police brutality against suspects in Police custody. Incidents such as these no doubt lead to the entire Police Service being tarred with the same brush.

The Pannipitiva incident which went viral on social media showed the Police Constable raining blows on a hapless lorry driver who lay on the road helpless under the brutal assault. Not stopping at that, the Constable was seen leaping into the air and landing with his heavy boots onto the cowering victim, reminiscent of wrestling bouts on the popular WWF television show. The lorry driver had knocked down the OIC of the Traffic Division and the Constable who was with his boss at the time had reacted by taking the law into his hands.

But this kind of mob justice, sometimes seen in the aftermath of accidents, could certainly not be expected from a law officer, however much the driver was at fault in this instance. Perhaps the PC concerned was an ardent fan of WWF wrestling and momentarily lost his bearings in trying to emulate the exploits of one of the musclemen on screen. It appears that our policemen are beginning to take a leaf from their counterparts in the US where similar scenes of Police brutality on the streets are now becoming frequent. The much publicized police assault on African American George Floyd who succumbed to his injures was only one such instance.

The errant Constable has been suspended from service on a directive from Law and Order Minister Rear Admiral (Ret.) Sarath Weerasekera and a full investigation into the incident has been launched by Police top brass.

The firmest action should be taken against the PC if found guilty of the offence. Any leniency shown would not only send a wrong signal to others of his ilk in the Service but also create a huge dent in whatever public confidence is left in the Police. The incident is too firmly etched in the minds of the public for the offender to get away scot free. The recent police assault on a law student who went to a Police station to represent a suspect inside the Police station is also fresh in the minds of the public, though no CCTV footage of that was made publicly available. There are too many cases of police excesses reported in recent times that need serious investigation. Criminal elements in the garb of the Khaki uniform are certainly not a new phenomenon. The recent revelation by Rear Admiral Weerasekera that the certain elements in the Police were deep into the drugs business tells a

These rotten eggs that give a bad name to the entire Police Service should be hounded and weeded out. In these spaces time and again we have been arguing that unsavoury elements may have entered the Police Service during the war years when the bar was lowered for recruitment due to the manpower shortage. There could well be a sizable number of rotten apples still in the Police Service with criminal tendencies. If so remedial action should be taken without delay.

Steps should also be taken by the minister to rebuild the image of the Police which had taken a severe beating in recent times with senior officers found to be directly involved in the Narcotics business. The involvement of a senior police officer in the murder of a young women and carting her headless body around before committing suicide thereafter, too, has not exactly brought glory to the Police Service. There should be an immediate overhaul of the Service to make it a truly professional outfit with the capability to deal with the new and emerging challenges. Unlike in the past, crime has taken on a different dimension with the involvement of drugs, modern weapons and the profusion of white collar crime that would need special skills to counter. Transnational crime and religious extremism are

other facets that were not present in the past. It is not that our Police Service is entirely devoid of ability. There are exceptionally competent officers in the Service who could match their counterparts anywhere, be it the FBI or Scotland Yard. The negative image attached to the Police service due to certain events in recent times must be effaced without delay. Hopefully we will soon see a rejuvenated law enforcement body in this country which would not only be equal to the new challenges whilst also acquiring a squeaky clean image that is a must for any country's law enforcement establishment.

Substandard coconut oil issue sparks controversy

he issue of substandard coconut oil imports dominated the news cycle throughout the week whipping up controversy and thereby becoming a major topic in the political and social discourse.

With the Sinhala and Tamil New Year around the corner, this piece of news stole the thunder as most of the traditional sweet snacks that decorate the Avurudu table such as Kavum, Kokis and Mun Kavum are traditionally made using coconut oil. Compared with April last year, where there were police curfews in most parts of the country due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the people are able to celebrate the traditional New Year with some freedom amidst a relaxed mood this year, though the health guidelines are still in place. The disturbing findings related to imported coconut oil came against this background.

With or without Avurudu, coconut oil has been a major consumer item in Sri Lanka since time immemorial, and if it is contaminated with a cancer causing substance then it affects the health of the whole nation gradually if not immediately. It is used for cooking and a

variety of other purposes. The Government assured that the adulterated coconut oil stocks in question have not entered the market and those stocks would be reshipped to the destination of the exporter, although some have called for the stocks to be destroyed. It could be seen that this incident has acted as an eye- opener for the Government as well as the public as it propelled the Government to identify and rectify the existing legal and

procedural loopholes and the public to be extra careful about the quality of the food products they consume

The health risks posed by various adulterated food products in the local market has been public knowledge for some time now, but the poisonous carcinogen known as 'aflatoxin' in imported coconut oil might be a new addition to the dis-

Series of actions mooted

The issue was first brought under the media spotlight by the All Ceylon Traditional Coconut Oil Producers' Association during a press conference in Dambulla. The Association alleged that 13 containers of imported coconut oil, which the Health Ministry's Food Safety Unit declared unfit for human consumption due to high levels of aflatoxins. were being released to the market.

The Government, after checking with the Customs Department, rejected the claim that the questionable coconut oil stocks had entered the market, but it acted fast, through the Consumer Affairs Authority (CAA), to seal off the warehouses of the companies, in which those stocks were stored, until the investigations are over. In the meantime, the CAA collected random samples in all districts to test for substandard products.

The Government was transparent on the investigations on this matter and Trade Minister Dr. Bandula Gunawardena together with States Ministers Lasantha Alagiyawanna



Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) MP Nalin Bandara raising a point of order in Parliament on Friday repeated the allegation that lowquality coconut oil containing poisonous compounds were released to the market and a company involved in the recent controversy of sugar imports was behind the move. Complaining that this issue could adversely affect the coconut oil industry, he asked the Government to amend the laws to empower the Coconut Development Authority to regulate imported coconut oil.

Making a Ministerial Statement in Parliament on Friday and holding a special press conference on Monday with the presence of high-ranking officers of all relevant institutions, Minister Bandula Gunawardena vowed stern action against the offenders following a thorough investigation into the incident. Refuting MP Nalin Bandara's allegation, the Minister observed that no company involved in the recent sugar imports controversy was among the companies in question in the case of unhealthy coconut oil imports.

Taking the floor in Parliament, State Minister Fernando, whose portfolio includes coconut related products, highlighted the need to

State Minister Lasantha Alagiyawanna, who is in charge of Consumer Protection, said that the Government, learning a lesson from this incident, would put in place a foolproof mechanism to ensure the quality of all imported goods to the

country within the next two years. "When I examined the process, it came to light that only about 1,500 categories of imports out of 5,000odd Harmonized System (HS) Codes available in the country are subject to inspection by a government body. That is to say, goods belonging to about 3,500 HS Codes reach the market with no test on their standards," he said while joining in the Monday's press conference presided by Minister Guna-

High levels of carcinogens

As the Sri Lanka Standards Institute (SLSI) confirmed on Monday that the samples obtained from three coconut oil importing companies had failed the quality tests for the second time, Customs Director General Major General (Retired) Vijitha Ravipriya told the media that he ordered those companies, namely Ali Brothers Pvt Ltd, Edirisinghe Edible Oils and Katana Refineries to re-export 1.8 million kilograms of substandard coconut oil.

He said releasing the containers to the warehouses of the respective companies subject to the condition that those would not be distributed till the approval of the Health Ministry's Food Safety Unit and the SLSI had been obtained, had been the practice for a long time now as the yard lacks space to retain the stocks till the test reports come.

"If this agreement had been breached, we will not hesitate to take stern action against those companies," he commented adding that a heavy fine and blacklisting are possible in such instances.

The named companies are wellestablished in the coconut oil business for a considerable period now. SLSI Director General Dr. Siddhika Senaratne revealed that aflatoxin

carcinogens found in the test samples were three times more than the set standard of 10 micrograms per kilogram. She observed that the recent trend of importing unrefined coconut oil was after taxes were revised in September 2020 so that the palm oil tax remains higher than the coconut oil tax. Mixing palm oil with coconut oil is another form of adulteration and the adjustment of the Special Commodity Levies was meant to discourage that practice.

"We found no issue in the coconut oil stocks imported to the country in the first three months since the levies were changed. The rot set in since the beginning of this year. The SLSI started aflatoxins testing barely two months ago. The Customs Ordinance does not have provisions to impose a jail sentence for an offender of this nature. It only provides for a heavy fine, but those who can afford it tend to repeat the same offence again and again," she said underlining the importance of giving more teeth to the law.


In addition to the SLSI, the Government, to err on the side of caution, also sent the samples to the esteemed Industrial Technology Institute (ITI) and its test reports were pending as at yesterday.

This was not the first time that the quality of imported food products in the local market came into question. Similar incidents in recent memory include controversies regarding Melamine in imported milk powder in 2008, Dicyandiamide (DCD) in imported milk powder and ice cream in 2013 and 2014, adulterated imported milk powder containing "pig fat" (animal fat) and palm oil in 2019 and Arsenic in imported canned fish in 2020.

The pertinent question is whether we have sufficiently followed up those issues to prevent their recurrence. From time to time, various food adulteration scandals have stirred up controversy only to be left on the backburner in a few months' time. Considering the adverse health effects various adulterated food products pose to the public, stringent action against the offenders and closing any legal loopholes are the need of the hour. The Government should move fast on this matter.



Adulterated coconut oil imports under the spotlight





UNP stalwarts did not understand capitalism

R. Jayewardene was the king of Free Trade Zones (FTZs). This article does not seek to vilify the late President, but it aims to take a dispassionate look at his economic policy, in contrast to the Rajapaksa vision of today, and some of the policy initiatives of other regimes of various leaders before and since IR I

J.R. Jayewardene heralded the creation of Free Trade Zones as if they were a fantastic achievement, the best since man invented the wheel. After the long period of abject economic atrophy under the leadership of Sirimavo Bandaranaike, he was able to pull this off. The image, that is, not the reality. In contrast to the total stagnation of the economy in the 1970–1977 era, JRJ had "brought the robber barons in."

It is quaint that he in fact articulated that in so many words! He said, "Let the robber barons come in," as if he was Santa Claus letting in the reindeer for the sheer joy of the ride on Christmas Eve. Who on Earth in their right minds would say, "Let the robber barons come in?"

But JRJ did, because he had the naïve colonial mindset that led people of his era to believe that an exploitative colonizer or ex-colonizer was a benefactor. He appointed the dashing young tycoon Upali Wijewardene the Head of the GCEC (Greater Colombo Economic Commission), the first Free Trade Zone,

and celebrated the latter's successes in inviting chip companies such as Motorola in setting up shop here.

FTZs

Why did he put his best man on the job to be the boss of the GCEC, the first FTZ in Sri Lanka? For the simple reason that he thought the FTZ was economic salvation, that it was God's gift to the Sri Lankan nation.

There is no gainsaying that the GCEC brought some glamour and some jobs and a certain illusion of movement in the economy in those heady days, when we had opened up after years of an insular system that was not rooted in reality. But JRJ's quaint belief that the FTZ was the answer to our story of economic setback is on the whole, a sad story. It is not to say that the Free Trade Zones established by him and since then have been failures. At best, they have created many jobs, with or without workers' rights, and that has been a good thing in a country that quickly needed employment opportunities after the stagnant Bandaranaike

But to place the FTZ concept at the pinnacle of economic policy and hope that these zones will deliver like some magic lantern, was hallucinatory. It goes to show why Sri Lanka could never capitalize from the early entry into the so-called liberalized-economy territory.

The rulers of the country had no clue. They genuinely thought that

the robber barons would come and let us rob them instead of the other way around. The Free Trade Zones never encouraged the development of industry and production. They encouraged near slave labour, where the intruding capitalist takes all

No visionary leadership

There are high costs of setting up such zones, but that would have been excused if the FTZs were able to bring substantial gains to the economy. But despite all the chutzpah of the dashing late Upali Wijewardene, etc., all we succeeded in doing was to tag ourselves to the neo-liberal trend of exploiting cheap labour, and then siphoning off all the profits abroad.

Did the FTZ concept or the GCEC as it was called and the other zones create wealth for the country? The answer is an emphatic no. The zones created wealth for other countries, and a host of multinational companies, or MNCs as they are called.

This writer does not grudge the presence of the zones if they are recognized for the very limited role they can have in improving the economy by providing some jobs for unemployed youth, and putting a little money in their pockets — which would in turn shore up the fortunes of the country in a very limited manner.

But that is not production, and it is not industrialization that can be put in the same class as the massive production economies that transformed countries such as Japan and South Korea, to take two examples. Even if it is conceded that we are no Japan, we could have experimented with a production economy at an early stage, when instead JRJ simply invited the robber barons, with his limited Royal College grasp of economic fundamentals.

Paradoxically, Sirimavo Bandaranaike had before him, fantasized of a production economy of sorts, but it was within a doomed socialist framework. But at least she had the Eastern bloc countries such as Yugoslavia led by the charismatic Marshal Tito, supporting us to establish paper factories, etc., that at minimum kept us self-sufficient in some ways, without having to import everything from the motorcar down to the pencil, as with the post JRJ years. Leaders such as South Korea's Park Chung Hee would not have been caught dead celebrating Free Trade Zones as the main pivot of their economic

Their approach was to empower the 'chaebols' or the big companies to produce and innovate with the help of government agencies that were created to help with Research and Development (R&D), export development and the setting up of the necessary industrial infrastructure. Now, that is vision — by way of contrast to inviting the robber barons to come in, and putting your flamboyant jet-setting cousin to lead that initiative.

Even the most humble of strides

we are making now, with local dairy farming or domestic saffron production or what have you, is superior to the reliance on the FTZ concept, which is an invitation to suck out all the profits using the cheap and efficient labour that we are able to provide. Imagine the gains we could make for own economy if we were able to harness our abundant human talent for Sri Lankan owned industry, as opposed to foreign enterprise?

We certainly lacked visionary leadership at an early stage and JRJ was supposed to be one of our better leaders strictly by way of comparison, but with him we got a romantic notion instead of a vision. He was in troth to the West, and to capitalism, that is all. He was not able to harness the power of capitalism for the greater good of the people, and that is what it boils down to — a lack of vision. To his credit he had some economic policy, in contrast to leaders such as Ranil Wickremesinghe who had none whatsoever, except to mouth inanities about balanced budgets etc., with disastrous consequences — but that is another story

A lack of leadership

JRJ had an idea in contrast to Ranil Wickremesinghe's baby-talk, but his 'vision' was misguided, shortsighted and deeply flawed, and in that sense was not a vision at all, but a mere fond wish that the robber barons would come in and create some kind of industrial orgy here that would magically at the end of it all, develop this nation and uplift its people. Sad.

It was as absurdly romanticized as his love affair with airlines and his grand idea of a national airline just because Singapore had an iconic national carrier. That was copycat economics at its worst. We needed a solid base for our economy before we needed a fancy airline, but in JRJ's imagination we had already leapt before we could take the leap. The fact that he was invited to the White House by President Ronald Reagan and was considered a great chum by British PM Margaret Thatcher, etc., also went into his head probably, even though his invitation merely recognized the fact that he was an early advocate of economic liberalization. It was not an acknowledgment of anything he had achieved.

that he had an enormous capacity for work and did some substantial transformations, getting the Mahaweli scheme into overdrive, etc., and building a good quality of reservoirs to boot. It was definitely better than the vacuous goingthrough-the-motions leadership style that Chandrika Kumaratunga Wickremesinghe offered. Ranasinghe Premadasa had his garment factories, but these were also glorified adjuncts of the FTZ concept and not indigenous industry of the visionary type that we sorely needed. What a lack of leadership this country has been plagued with over the years.

Certainly, nobody would deny

A Robust Blueprint from UN's Largest Gathering on Women's Rights

he largest gathering on women's rights has decided to contribute to accelerating the pace of progress to ensure women's full participation and leadership at all levels of decision-making in executive, legislative and judicial branches of government and the public sector. It also appreciates that temporary special measures, such as quotas, and increased political will are needed as an enabling pathway to this goal.

Against the backdrop of a global pandemic, world leaders issued on March 26 a strong pledge for women's full and effective participation and decision-making in public life and the elimination of violence at the closing of the 65th session of the UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW65), as the countdown for the Generation Equality Forum in Mexico (March 29 to 31) begins.

The Executive Director of UN Women, which serves as the CSW Secretariat, Phumzile Mlambo-Ngcuka, said: "This is the first session of the Commission on the Status of Women in 15 years to engage with the issue of women's participation in public life and the 'Agreed Conclusions' make important advances.

The women of the world have made it very clear that the past and the status quo have not met their need for gender equality. Recalling the devastating, discriminatory impact of the pandemic, she urged all Member States to move ahead rapidly to achieve equal representation.

The Agreed Conclusions acknowledge that the COVID-19 pandemic is deepening pre-existing inequalities that perpetuate multiple and intersecting forms of discrimination, as well as racism, stigmatization and xenophobia.

Yet, recent data show that women have been mostly absent from COVID-19 government task forces around the world — women make up only 24 percent of the 225 task force members examined across 137 countries.

According to a press release, the Agreed Conclusions make strong recommendations for concrete measures which can enable women's role in decision-making, for instance:

- changing laws and policies that discriminate against women and hinder their equal participation in public life;
- innovative measures to promote women as leaders, executives and managers, in all areas;





- setting targets and timelines to achieve gender balance in all government branches through relevant measures such as quotas, appointments, or training programmes;
- and encouraging political parties to nominate as many women as men candidates and promote equal leadership in their structures.

Young women are particularly underrepresented in public life and disproportionately excluded from consultations on issues that affect them, despite being involved in activities that call for broader change and address issues such as climate change and poverty, stresses UN Women.

resses UN women. Women under 30 years of age make up less than one percent of parliamentarians globally. Recognizing this, the Commission has agreed on the need for measures that target them: from access to education, technology and skills development, to mentorship programmes, increased financial support, and protection from violence, and recognized the benefits of early exposure to women leaders as role models, as well as of legislative and policy-making spaces.

Other recommendations include measures to eliminate, prevent and respond to all forms of violence against women and girls in public and private spaces, end impunity of perpetrators, and support victims and survivors' full recovery, for instance through



access to psychosocial support, affordable housing and employment.

Recognizing women's important role as agents of change in responding to climate change, the agreement also stresses the need to reinforce women's presence and leadership in all places where decisions on climate change mitigation and adaptation are taken, and to ensure that related policies, plans and programmes account for the specific needs of women and girls.

The Commission's outcome stresses the importance of the full engagement of men and boys in this task; and of the availability of data that is disaggregated by income, sex, age, race, ethnicity, migration status, disability, geographic location, and any other characteristics relevant in national contexts.

Despite this being the first-ever mostly virtual session of the Commission, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there has been strong interest from both government and civil society participants. During the General Discussion high-level speakers included a Prime Minister, three Vice-Presidents and 93 ministers — all expressing their strong commitment to advancing gender equality.

Nearly 70 ministers from around the world participated in the Ministerial roundtables over the two weeks and more than 10,000 representatives from over 850 ECOSOC-accredited civil-society organizations registered for CSW65. Almost 150 virtual side events were organized by UN Member

States, intergovernmental organizations and UN entities, and more than 700 virtual parallel events were organized by civil society as part of the NGO CSW65 Forum.

This year's CSW65 was also an important bridge to the Generation Equality Forum, convened by UN Women and cohosted by the Governments of Mexico and France, in conjunction with youth and civil society. The Forum kicked off in Mexico City from March 29 to 31 and will culminate in Paris from June 30 to July 2. "The Forum intends to be a global inflection point for gender equality, driving major action and commitments for gender equality implementation."

The Mexico Forum kicked off the Generation Equality Forum journey by raising awareness and making a public call for action. Its opening ceremony will be attended by UN Secretary-General António Guterres, Mexico's President Andrés Manuel López Obrador, President Emmanuel Macron of France, conveners of the Forum, Executive Director of UN Women, Mlambo-Ngcuka, as well youth activist Elvira Pablo and civil society leader Sharon Bhagwan Rolls.

With civil society at its core, the Mexico Forum will reinforce the power and voice of feminist movements and youth, while highlighting the commitment and action of stakeholders, including UN Member States, the private sector and international organizations, in the drive to achieve gender equality.

He noted that all this is done in remembrance of the over 29,000 valiant war heroes who sacrificed their lives for their motherland and the over 14,000 disabled war heroes who sacrificed their tomorrow for their country. "Our ancestors had built our ancient Dagobas in remembrance of our former heroes and this gigantic Dagoba is a tribute to the war heroes of our time, which will stand tall for future generations to see as a testament to the sacrifices they made."

The Defence Secretary made it a point to pay

tribute to the Buddhist clergy for their support and assistance in realising the dream of constructing this magnificent Dagoba, adding that without their advice and guidance, this task could not have been achieved.

The initial name of this Dagoba was 'Ranaviru Seya' but it was subsequently changed to 'Sandahiru Seya' indicating that this structure will remain as a place of worship and a sign of gratitude to the fallen and injured war heroes for as long as the moon and sun rises in our land. "Although this Dagoba was named 'Sandahiru Seya I personally believe that it

would be even more appropriate to call it the 'Kala Guna' Seva (to be grateful for the sacrifices made by the war heroes)," the Defence Secretary noted.

Appreciating the donations made by the public to make the depositing of treasures to the Sandahiru Seya a significant event, he said not only the businessmen who donated, but even the public had generously contributed to make this occasion a success. "I was here to accept the donations made by a group of businessmen and members of the public came up to me and wanted to be part of the donations. Some even removed the jewellery that was on their necks, ears and even their wedding rings and donated them to be deposited in this Dagoba. I was really touched by their generosity and their love and gratefulness for our war heroes who have sacrificed so much to ensure a peaceful country for all of us to live in. In addition, the Gem and Jewellery Authority donated two containers of gems worth over 25 million which was donated by gem businessmen throughout the country."

The Sandahiru Seya in Anuradhapura was commissioned by the then President Rajapaksa in 2010. Designed to reach 85m in height, with a circumference of 244m, it will eventually rise above the ancient Dagobas of Jetavanarama and Abhayagiri (but will not surpass their original heights). Sandahiru Seya is being constructed from over 30 million bricks and will be plastered and then whitewashed when finished. While

the construction of this Dagoba was initiated over 10 years ago, its construction was stalled due to various rea-

sons. However, after the current Defence Secretary General

Kamal Gunaratne assumed office and the new Government came into power, the construction of this magnificent structure recommenced and is forging ahead in full force.

The auspicious placement of the first brick on the *harmika*, *Hathares Kotuwa* (high pavilion) of the Sandhahiru Seya Stupa at Anuradhapura took place on May 25, 2020 amid Pirith chanting and blessings of the Maha Sangha.

Major General Dhammika Jayasinghe, Com-

mander, Security Forces-Wanni, on behalf of the Defence Secretary General Kamal Gunaratne laid the first brick on the Stupa pavilion.

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa several years ago, during his tenure as the Defence Secretary, initiated the construction of this large Stupa in this sacred old kingdom of Anuradhapura as a tribute to the memory of all fallen war heroes.

Technically qualified workforce of the Tri-Forces and Civil Security Department (CSD) personnel are engaged in the project.

During a recent visit to the site to inspect the progress of the construction, Defence Secretary General Kamal Gunaratne discussed the construction of the Stupa including the erecting of the square chamber, assembly of sacred rings over the square chamber, minaret, setting of conical spire, placing of sacred symbolic crystal at the pointing tip, proposed inscriptions, engravings, sculpture and artwork.



According to Gen. Gunaratne, plans are underway for the exposition of the Sacred Symbolic Crystal for public veneration prior to setting it

He reviewed the groundwork with regard to the erection of Bo-Tree House (Bodhigaraya) during his arrival at the sacred premises.

Once completed, this would also be considered as one of the largest pagodas in the island within the 16 places of veneration.

The mega construction undertaken by the Tri-Forces is 282 feet in height with a circumference of 801 feet.


The construction of the Stupa was an idea of the fifth Executive President of the country and the present Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa built in appreciation of the noble services rendered by the Security Forces personnel to rid the country of terrorism.

Afterwards, the construction process was steered under the directives of the former Defence Secretary Gotabaya Rajapaksa who is the current President.

Ven. Maha Sanga including Malwathu Chapter Lekakadhikari Most Ven. Rajakiya Panditha Dr. Pahamune Dharmakirthi Sri Sumangala Thera, Government Ministers, the North Central Province Governor, Parliamentarians, Ministry Secretaries, Navy and Air Force Commanders, Inspector General of Police, Director General of CSD, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the National Gem & Jewellery Authority and a large gathering of devotees and invitees were also present at the event.

The Defence Secretary denoting the culmination of the construction process stated they hoped that this sacred Stupa would be vested on public in November 2021.

Scientists publish vaccine "recipe" on Web


Scientists have determined the "recipes" for two Covid-19 vaccines using leftovers in vials bound for the trash and published the mRNA sequences on Github, the online repository for software code.

The group of scientists from Stanford University were able to determine the sequences of both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, and included the mRNA sequences in a post they published on Github last week, tech news site Motherboard first reported.

Experts say the publication will help researchers around the world better identify when testing samples whether they are looking at sequences from the Covid-19 virus or vaccines to treat the virus, because they can give false posi-

In the post, the scientists state they were able to collect small portions of the vaccines from vials that would have been otherwise discarded, under Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approval for research in the United States.

The Pfizer sequence is already publicly available, meaning the scientists were able to check their work, but the Moderna mRNA sequence had not previously been published. The scientists stated they checked with Moderna before

Scientists Andrew Fire and Massa Shoura told Motherboard it wasn't simply "reverse engineering" a vaccine: "We didn't reverse engineer the vaccine. We posted the putative sequence of two synthetic RNA molecules that have become sufficiently prevalent in the general environment of medicine and human biology in 2021."

The scientists said in their Github post the sequences would be useful for allowing researchers to quickly identify whether sequences they are looking at are therapeutic in origin or infectious.

An associate professor in immunology and pathology at the University of New South Wales's Kirby Institute, Stuart Turville, told Guardian Australia it was "clever in a way" to publish on Github, and

from the virus. "I'm not sure how that would turn up in a diagnostic setting as one is injected [the vaccine] and the other is clearly up your nose [the virus acquired during diagnostic tests]," he said. "That said, molecular diagnostics are great,

but can give false positives if RNA

like this is around in large quanti-

"So it would be good to know the sequence, so if any false positives turned up, you could troubleshoot if the vaccine RNA was the source of your contamination."

He said companies do not generally like "their recipes" getting out like this, but it was just the sequences. "That would be the equivalent of baking an intricate cake with only the knowledge of the basic ingredients, with no quantities or instructions on how to cook it from these ingredients," he said.

"How they make these vaccines to the scale they are doing and then combining them with lipids to give the product is the real magic."

He said he was keen to see whether new versions of the vaccines are now made to tackle the emerging variants.

With the above sequencing drive the RNA-vaccine producers then have the ability to pivot to make new versions against the emerging variants," he said.

"It would be good to see the data on RNA vaccine candidates for the South African b1351. That variant takes a big dent out of a lot of the current vaccine responses.

Half of England's population has COVID antibodies

About half the population of England now has antibodies against coronavirus, a key development showing the impact of the vaccination drive against the COVID-19 pandemic.

According to the Office for National Statistics, 54.7% of the population would have tested positive for antibodies in the week ending March 14. It was nearly as high in the other countries of the United Kingdom — 50.5% in Wales, 49.3% in Northern Ireland and 42.6% in Scotland.

The data are based on a random sample of blood test results of individuals at least 16 years old, who can develop antibodies

by either being vaccinated or infected. The statistics agency cautioned that testing positive for antibodies doesn't mean people are immune, and it isn't yet known how many antibodies are needed to give protection. Scientists are still debating what level is needed for so-called herd immunity.

But there has been strong progress, with the 7-day average of new cases falling to just over 5,000, from nearly 60,000

Separate data find 45% of the U.K. population have had at least one dose of the vaccine. That is ahead of the U.S. on 29%, and well above France on 12%.

The U.K. was the first country to start using the vaccine from drug company Pfizer and also is using ones made by drug company AstraZeneca and biotech

'Double mutation may spread to other countries'

The double mutation of a Covid-19 variant discovered in India is of grave concern — and could spread to other countries, according to Dr. Kavita Patel, a non-resident fellow at the Brookings Insti-

"It is something to watch very closely, and something that will not be limited to India. It is something we will likely see around the world as we have with other variants," she told CNBC's "Street Signs Asia" on Mon-

India's health ministry said last week that a variant with two mutations known as E484Q and L452R — was found in the country. The mutations are not new, but the variant in India carries both of them -something that has not been seen in other vari-

The mutations could make the virus more contagious and better at evading the body's defenses.

"This double mutation, number one, it is incredibly could lead to reinfections

the double mutation strain, have not been detected in such large numbers that are sufficient to explain the spike in new infections. (CNBC)

Vaccination a lifesaver - Experts

Health experts say it's possible for some people to get infected with COVID-19 even if they're fully vaccinated, but it's still important to get vaccinated.

Experts say it takes two weeks after a person's final shot to build full immunity to COVID-19. But none of the vaccines are 100% effective at preventing infection, so some people will still contract the virus. But they won't get as sick and likely won't transmit it as easily.

When Pfizer was testing its vaccine in the fall, Dr. Amy Aobota volunteered. Two months later, she got a runny nose and then a positive COVID-19 test. "A lot of people I know were kind

of freaked out by that, saying, 'How can you test positive if you were vaccinated?"" she said.

But her response was, the vaccine

"If the vaccine turns the virus into no more than the common cold, that's a huge success," she said. Experts agreed.

"We do know based on evidence that vaccines are really effective at preventing severe disease," said. Dr. Jose Mercado, of Dartmouth-Hitch-



Pfizer, Moderna vaccines effective in real-world conditions - study



vaccines being deployed to fight the coronavirus pandemic are robustly effective in preventing infections in real-life conditions, according to a federal study released Monday that provides reassurance of protection for front-line workers in the United States. In a study of about 4,000 health-care personnel, police, firefighters and other essential workers, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that the vaccines reduced the risk of infection by 80 percent after one shot. Protection increased to 90 percent following the second dose. The findings are consistent with clinical trial results and studies showing strong effectiveness in Israel and the United Kingdom, and in initial studies of health-care workers at the UT Southwestern Medical Center and in Southern California. The CDC report is significant,

experts said, because it analyzed how well the vaccines worked among a diverse group of front-line workingage adults whose jobs make them more likely to be exposed to the virus and to spread it.

The workers came from eight locations in six states — Arizona, Florida, Minnesota, Oregon, Texas and Utah. They received vaccinations between mid-December, when the doses first became available, to mid-March, a 13-week period that included the deadly winter surge that was killing more than 3,000 people a day by January. The study is also one of the first to estimate vaccine effectiveness among participants against infection — rather than just monitoring for symptomatic cases — including infections that did not result in symp-

toms, according to the CDC. Among

2.479 fully vaccinated people, just

The Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna three had confirmed infections. Among 477 people who received one dose, eight infections were reported.

By comparison, among 994 people who were not vaccinated, 161 developed infections.

No deaths were reported.

CDC Director Rochelle Walensky said the study shows national vaccination efforts are working.

The authorized coronavirus vaccines "provided early, substantial realworld protection against infection for our nation's health care personnel, first responders, and other frontline essential workers," she said in a statement. "These findings should offer hope to the millions of Americans receiving coronavirus vaccines each day and to those who will have the opportunity to roll up their sleeves and get vaccinated in the weeks ahead. The authorized vaccines are the key tool that will help bring an end to this devastating pandemic.'

The study is ongoing and researchers will share more details on the infections in people who were partly or fully vaccinated, known as "breakthrough infections." Researchers are also studying whether people who became infected despite vaccination may have less severe or briefer illnesses and whether they shed a lower amount of virus for less time.

Infectious-disease and vaccine experts said the latest data proves encouraging.

"It's not surprising, but it's incredibly reassuring," said Paul A. Offit, a vaccine expert at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia who helps review vaccine safety and efficacy as an outside adviser to the Food and Drug Administration and was not involved in the CDC study. "It's yet another reason to



The drug companies' clinical trials of their coronavirus vaccines in 2020 were conducted when the United States was not experiencingthe biggest surges in coronavirus cases, said Monica Gandhi, an infectious-diseases expert at the University of California at San Francisco. "What we really want to do is test these vaccines in the real world, to see how well they work," said Gandhi, who was not involved in the CDC study. That study took place during "one of the most scary, most horrible surges" in the United States, she said, describing it as an important stress test for the vaccines. The results, she said, show how "it's really incredible news for how safe you can feel after vaccina-

The Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna vaccines, which require two doses, were more than 90 percent effective in preventing symptomatic covid-19 disease in clinical trials conducted before the vaccines received emergency use authorization in December from the FDA. The Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine requires special handling and must be kept at especially cold temperatures in special freezers long-term.

There was no guarantee that the vaccines were going to perform the same in the real world, where there were a lot of concerns about freezers and temperatures," said Mark G. Thompson, a CDC epidemiologist and lead author of the report. The clinical trials had large numbers of older people, but the CDC study focused more on working-age adults and the ability of the vaccines to protect against infection, regardless of whether symptoms developed. "The big takeaway here is that starting 14 days after receiving both doses of these ... vaccines, these front-line workers were 90 percent less likely to be infected with the virus that causes covid-19," Thompson said.

Reducing risk for transmissible infection, which can occur several days before symptoms appear, is especially important for health-care personnel and other essential workers who may not know they are infected,

About 72 percent of the participants were 18 to 49 years old and the majority were female. Most participants were White and healthy, with no chronic medical conditions. About half were health-care providers; 21 percent were firefighters, police and emergency medical technicians; nearly one-fourth were teachers, delivery workers and other essential personnel whose jobs required contact within three feet of the public or co-workers. About 63 percent of participants received the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine and 30 percent received the Moderna shot. Five people received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. Researchers are trying to verify what vaccine was administered among the remaining participants. Most got their first dose during the last two weeks of Decem-

Participants conducted nasal swabs weekly for 13 weeks, regardless of whether they experienced symptoms. If they showed symptoms of covid-19-like illness, such as fever, chills, cough, shortness of breath or change in smell or taste, they collected an additional nasal swab and saliva sample. All specimens were sent to one lab in Marshfield, Wis.

Thompson said the study was by far the most complicated and ambitious to design in his more than 30 years of conducting field research. It was challenging to recruit thousands of participants from a variety of backgrounds in the context of widespread

and research, he said. Researchers had never asked people to collect their own nasal swabs and ship saliva specimens, and it was unclear at the start whether busy adults working in front-line jobs would consistently respond to those tasks. "But participants have been very dedicated and so far, on average, 80 to 100 percent of participants complete these tasks every week," Thompson wrote in an

The CDC had to negotiate with FedEx and UPS to allow thousands of specimens to be shipped for testing,

The study did not provide an estimate of the vaccines' benefits against the virus variants circulating in the United States. Thompson, who is leading CDC's evaluation of coronavirus vaccine effectiveness, said the agency will have more to say in about a month when scientists have completed genetic characterization of the collected virus specimens.

As the study progresses, scientists will also analyze the effectiveness of the specific coronavirus vaccines and their effectiveness in preventing symptomatic infections or severe outcomes, such as hospitalization. Despite the strong protection afforded by the vaccines two weeks after the first dose, scientists are still trying to figure out how long someone is protected against the disease after being fully vaccinated and whether two doses provide longer-lasting protection than one dose.

Limitations of the study include the small number of confirmed infections and self-collection of specimens and delays in shipments to the lab that could reduce detection of the virus and result in overestimating skepticism and lack of trust in science vaccine effectiveness. (Washington Post)

COVID: Lab leak "extremely unlikely"

The Coronavirus is likely to have emerged in bats and spread to another animal before it jumped into the human population, according to a study from the World Health Organization and Chinese scientists that is scheduled to be released Tuesday.

The 123-page report, which NBC News obtained ahead of its release, also found that it's "extremely unlikely" that the virus leaked from a lab, a theory that has flourished among China skeptics even though it is based largely on circumstantial evidence.

The findings are the result of a joint study by Chinese scientists and a WHO-led team that was in China last month to investigate the virus's origin. The inquiry has been the centre of political tensions from its start; Biden administration officials have faulted China for what they say is a lack of transparency about how the virus emerged. Other critics said the inquiry was insufficient because many of the Chinese scientists involved with it are affiliated with government-run institutions and because the investigators didn't have full access to lab records and

In the report, the research team detailed the most likely scenarios that caused the virus to spill over into humans, but many questions remain unanswered. Identifying the source of a virus, which can take years — or even decades is an important way for scientists



infectious diseases and prevent similar outbreaks.

The most likely route of transmission, the researchers said, was from bats into humans through an intermediate animal host. Direct transmission from bats to humans was also thought to be a "possibleto-likely pathway."

The report recommended additional research for those and other scenarios, including retrospective studies of the earliest known cases that were tied to a seafood market in Wuhan, China.

The Wuhan market was the site of the first reported cluster of human cases, but the WHO report said it's not clear whether that was the initial source of the outbreak.

Marion Koopmans, a Dutch virologist who was a member of the WHO delegation, said in an

to understand the emergence of interview this month that while the first major clusters were reported in Wuhan, it's not known for sure whether the virus originated there.

> Koopmans said the investigation found no credible evidence that the coronavirus leaked from a lab. The lab leak hypothesis was touted by President Donald Trump and most recently promoted by Dr. Robert Redfield, the former director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"I am of the point of view that I still think the most likely etiology of this pathogen in Wuhan was from a laboratory. Escaped," Redfield said in an interview with CNN on Friday. "Other people don't believe that. That's fine. Science will eventually figure it out."

At a White House Covid-19 Response Team briefing later Friday, the government's top infec-

tious disease expert, Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, said Redfield "was just expressing an opinion."

Pinning down the origin of a virus can be a lengthy process, and while the WHO study said that a lab leak remains "extremely unlikely," it said it's impossible to completely rule it out.

Robert Garry, a virologist at Tulane University School of Medicine who wasn't involved with the WHO investigation, said the research team was right to largely dismiss the idea that the virus leaked from a lab.

About a year ago, Garry and his colleagues analyzed the genome sequence of the coronavirus that emerged in Wuhan and determined that the virus was likely to have evolved from nature. In other words, the scientists found no evidence that the virus was engineered or altered in a research

Garry said more research will be needed to understand the virus's origin but added that the painstaking work is crucial to protect against similar or worse outbreaks.

Understanding how the coronavirus emerged in bats or other species "will provide critical data on the evolution and ecology of potential pathogens, guidance for detecting their emergence and suggest solutions for design of appropriate countermeasures," Garry said. (NBC)

World leaders call for "Pandemic Treaty"



Global leaders have published a letter calling for a pandemic treaty to improve cooperation and transparency in the case of future outbreaks, but China and the U.S. were not among the signatories.

In the joint letter, published Tuesday in newspapers around the world, the leaders argued that the Covid-19 crisis had posed the "greatest challenge for the global community since the late 1940s.

The document was signed by more than 20 global leaders and officials from across Europe, Africa, South Africa and Asia, including U.K. Prime Minister Boris John-French President



Emmanuel Macron and German Chancellor Angela Mer-However, both China and

the U.S. — which have locked horns numerous times during the pandemic, with accusations of a lack of transparency, propaganda and misinformation — were missing from the list.

When questioned about the absence of China and the U.S. from the letter, the World Health Organization's Director General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus (one of the signatories and main champions of a treaty) played down concerns.

"I don't want it to be seen as a problem, it wasn't even a problem," he said during a

Newly married couple behind Indonesia suicide bombings

A recently married couple with suspected militant links used pressure cooker bombs to blow themselves up outside a Roman Catholic cathedral during Palm Sunday Mass, Indonesian officials said Monday.

The attack wounded 20 people, including four church guards, and broke windows at the church and nearby buildings in Makassar, the capital of South Sulawesi province.

The couple were married six months ago and police were investigating their house in Makassar, National Police spokesperson Argo Yuwono said.

Police identified them only by their initials, L and his wife, YSF. Neighbors of the couple identified the man as Lukman and his wife as Dewi and said they were between 23 and 26 years old.

The attackers detonated their bombs when they were confronted by guards outside the church.

The pressure cookers contained explosive materials and nails to increase their harm to victims, said



Urip Laksana. Police carried out capital that killed three police offic-DNA tests to determine the attackers' identities, Laksana said.

The couple were believed to have been members of Jemaah Anshorut Daulah, which has pledged allegiance to the Islamic State group and carried out a series of suicide bombings in Indonesia.

Prabowo told reporters Monday that the police elite counterterrorism squad, known as Densus 88, arrested four suspected militants believed to have links with the attackers in a raid Sunday in Bima, a city on Sumbawa island in West Nusa Tenggara province. Another suspect was arrested a day later in a separate raid in the province, he said.

Mexico revises COVID death toll

New data from Mexico indicates that the death toll from the Coronavirus is far higher than previously thought.

A report published by Mexico's health ministry showed that by mid-February there had been just over 294,000 deaths "associated with COVID-19" - a nearly 60% increase from the originally published

That figure has since risen by almost 27,000 more deaths through March, bringing the total to more than 321,000.

The new report was published Saturday with little fanfare. President Andrés Manuel López Obrador has faced significant criticism for his handling of the pandemic, the BBC reported.

Those figures put Mexico second after the U.S., but the population of Mexico is 126 million – far smaller than either the U.S. or Brazil, which previously ranked second-most: the U.S. boasts a population of over 328 million and Brazil has 211 mil-

These developments show just how deadly Mexico's second wave in January

The opposition has accused him of downplaying the severity of the pandemic, according to the Guardian.

Former President Felipe Calderón tweet-

ed Saturday that "more than 400,000 Mexicans have died, above the average for previous years ... probably the highest figure in the world." The increased numbers indicate a far

worse situation in the country than previously understood - a country through which increasing numbers of migrants have been traveling to the U.S. border. Migrants are not supposed to enter the

U.S. from Mexico without a negative COVID-19 test, yet at least 185 migrants released this past month into Brownsville, Texas, tested positive.

The city of Brownsville cannot prevent these people from traveling throughout the country, it said, and it is unclear how many of these people have utilized public transportation. (FOX)

These performances earned him a place in the team to the Moscow Olympic Games that year. The Sri Lanka team was given a training session in Bulgaria and at the Olympics they were placed sixth in the heats.





SEC calls for public consultation on corporate governance rules

The Securities and **Exchange Commission** of Sri Lanka has through a consultation paper asked market stakeholders to provide feedback on revised corporate governance rules for listed entities. The Consultation paper is broken into 5 sections. The sections deal with;

Policies, Board and Conduct, Board Subcommittees, Relations with set a policy on the mini-Shareholders and Invesmum number of meettors, and Disclosures in ings a director has to

the Annual Report. With the proposed changes companies will now have to disclose to the market how they expect to maintain a balance of representation between the executive and non-executive directors of the company. Changes will also make companies outline the manner in which they will interface with shareholders and investors. Companies will have to

attend before the position is deemed vacant.

Directors will also be capped in the number of public listed directorships an individual can have. Companies will no longer be able to have the Chairman and CEO as the same person. The Chairman will have to be a non-executive independent director. Noncompliance with the rule separating Chairman and CEO will result in the appointment of a Senior Independent Director

who would have the power to meet exclusively with other Independent Directors and subsequently report to the Chairman. The definition of a close family member shall now include any person who is financially dependent on a director.

A negative appraisal of the CEO shall have to be disclosed to the market. For companies where both the subsidiary and parent are listed entities the Audit Committee and Related Party Transac-

tions Review Committee of the parent may function as the Audit Committee of the subsidiary. Directors will now have to be made aware of any major concerns of the ization of the shareholders. Companies listed on the 'Empower Board' shall not be subject to the proposed instruments.

Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) Secretary, S.K Gupta said, "The high reliance on imported telecom equipment has been a source of concern, both financially and in terms of security, and a well-planned and centered approach to indigenous development will be the way

Gupta said, "Despite the fact that telecom networks have developed at an exponential rate, we are heavily reliant on the import of telecom equipment. Every year, telecom imports have been in the range of Rs. 1 lakh crore (US\$ 13.77 billion) or more, which is a cause for concern." TO PAGE 18

CEAT Kelani's TBR production increases by 125%

CEAT Kelani Holdings has announced another significant increase in production that will more than double the number of Truck Bus Radial (TBR) tyres reaching the domestic market by June this year, further supporting the national effort to reduce dependence on imports and conserve foreign exchange. The Company said pro-

duction of the CEAT Winmile AW in the 10.00 R 20 size widely used on trucks, prime movers, and buses will, in two phases 18.000 tyres a year to 40,200 a year. This gives CEAT the ability to supply 42 per cent of the local requirement for these tyres. Incidentally, the CEAT Winmile AW tyre is the only Truck Bus Radial tyre produced in Sri Lanka, and is the result of a phased execution of a Rs 3 billion investment begun by the Company three years ago to expand product range, capacity and quality across multiple tyre categories. CEAT's ground-breaking TBR production facility commenced production in April 2019 and the current expansion entailed the commissioning of three more tyre presses, the Company said.

"Our original investments in expansion preceded the imposition by the government of a temporary restriction on certain imports, but we have continued to invest in capacity

expansion in the tyre segments targeted by the restrictions, to meet market demand," CEAT Kelani Managing Director, Ravi Dadlani said. "There is no restriction on the import of truck and bus tyres, but by August last year we had ensured that CEAT can supply 100 per cent of the requirement in this category through a combination of bias-ply and TBR tyres, generating an annual saving of Rs 11 billion in foreign exchange. This latest increase in production of TBR tyres will result in a further saving."

Designed for carrying heavy loads and higher mileage, delivering better cost per kilometre over competitor brands, the CEAT Win mile AW has a Load and Speed Index (a numerical code associated with the maximum load a tyre can carry at the speed indicated by its Speed Symbol) of 146/143K. Consisting of a natural equilibrium carcass design with high casing durability and retreadability, the tyre offers excellent Belt and Bead durability due to a high bonding belt compound and bead consolidated with high strength rubber and steel.

The increase in TBR production at the CEAT Kelani manufacturing complex in Kelaniya comes hot on the heels of an increase in production of passenger car radial (PCR) tyres for rim sizes ranging from 12 to 14. Phase 1 of this increase has added 72,000 tyres a year to the Company's radial tyre inventory, while Phase 2, expected to come on stream in May 2021, will add another 100,000 radial tyres per annum.

FITIS calls for pricing flexibility on internet connections

In order to have a more financially viable outlay of internet connectivity the Federation of Information Technology Industry Sri Lanka (FITIS) has

advocated allowing digital connectivity providers to be able to discriminate on the basis of price on the issuance of connections. Currently price discrimination for high speed connections does exist for businesses but is not widespread for households.

Currently certain geographic areas do not have access to high speed internet and the connectivity providers are unable to provide access due to the lack of density in custom-

Residential addresses that are willing and able to obtain connections at a higher cost are also left out of access to high speed broadband.

Chairman FITIS Abbas Kamurdeen said, "Connectivity is measured as 90% of the population and not 90% of the geographic area. We currently have lots of blind spots even in major cities

Kamurdeen noted that the TRCSL is currently working very hard to ensure higher regional connectivity.

The regulator is currently working towards bringing more connectivity to Ratnapura and shall work in other cities shortly.

Economy returns to growth trajectory

The economy has returned to a growth trajectory in the fourth quarter of 2020. Figures compiled by the Department of Census and Statistics show that the economy

recorded a 1.3% growth rate in comparison with the 1.9% growth rate in Q4 2019.

Industrial and Agricultural services have grown while the Ser-

vice sector of the economy has fallen. The construction industry which normally accounts for 6.8% of industrial activity recorded a substantial contraction of 13.2%.

Water supply activity has grown by 4.8%. Due to COVID-19 the economy as a whole recorded a negative growth rate of 3.6% compared

to the 2.3% expansion in 2019. The Department of Census and Statistics faced challenges in quantifying the GDP impact of COVID-19.

Traffic in Suez Canal resumes after stranded ship refloated

Shipping traffic through Egypt's Suez Canal resumed on Monday after a giant container ship that blocked the busy waterway for almost a week was refloated. Live footage on a local television station showed the ship surrounded by tug boats moving slowly in the centre of the canal. The station, ExtraNews, said the ship was moving at a speed of 1.5 knots (2.8kmph).

"Admiral Osama Rabie, the Chairman of the Suez Canal Authority [SCA], announces the resumption of maritime traffic in the Suez Canal after the Authority successfully rescues and floats the giant Panamanian container ship EVER GIVEN," a statement from the SCA said.

"She's free," an official involved in the salvage operation said.

The 400-metre long Ever Given got jammed diagonally across a southern section of the canal in strong winds early last Tuesday, halting traffic on the shortest shipping route between Europe and Asia

After dredging and excavation work over the weekend, rescue workers from the SCA and a team from Dutch firm Smit Salvage succeeded in partially refloating the ship earlier on Monday using tug

Evergreen Line, which is leasing the Ever Given, confirmed the ship was successfully refloated and said it would be repositioned and inspected for seaworthiness

"There have been no reports of pollution or cargo damage and initial investigations rule out any mechanical or engine failure as a cause of the grounding," said Bernhard Schulte Shipmanagement (BSM) in a state-

The company said about 30,000 cubic metres of sand was dredged.

The authority said earlier it would be able to accelerate convoys through the canal once the Ever Given was freed. "We will not waste one second," Rabie told Egyptian state televi-

He said it could take from two-and-

a-half to three days to clear the backlog, and a canal source said more than 100 ships would be able to enter the channel daily. Shipping group Maersk said the knock-on disruptions to global shipping could take weeks or

months to unravel. Data firm Refinitiv estimated it could take more than 10 days to clear

the backlog of ships. Meanwhile, dozens of vessels opted for the alternate route around the Cape of Good Hope at Africa's southern tip – a 5,000km (3,100-mile) detour that adds two weeks to journeys and costs ships hundreds of thousands of dollars in

fuel and other costs. (Al Jazeera)

Biden suggests creating initiative to rival China's Belt and Road

United States President after he said on Thursday Joe Biden said he suggested to British Prime Minister Boris Johnson in a phone call on Friday that democratic countries should have an infrastructure plan to rival China's Belt and Road initiative.

"I suggested we should have, essentially, a similar initiative, pulling from the democratic states, helping those communities around the world that, in fact, need help," Biden told reporters.

China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) is a multitrillion-dollar infrastructure scheme launched in 2013 by President Xi Jinping involving development and investment initiatives that would stretch

from East Asia to Europe. The project would significantly expand China's economic and political influence, raising concerns in the US and else-

Biden's remarks came

he would prevent China from passing the US to become the most powerful country in the world, pledging to invest heavily to ensure the US prevails in the ever-growing rivalry between the world's two largest economies.

Biden plans to unveil a multitrillion-dollar plan to upgrade US infrastructure next week.

He said on Thursday this would ensure increased US investment in promising new technologies, such as quantum computing, artificial intelligence and biotechnology. While airing its con-

cerns and seeking to encourage private sectorinvestment for overseas projects to rival those of the BRI, Washington has yet to be able to convince countries that it can offer an alternative to the statebacked economic vision put forward by Beijing

under BRI.

More than 100 countries have signed agreements with China to cooperate in BRI projects like railways, ports, highways and other infrastructure. According to a Refinitiv database, as of mid-last year, more than 2,600 projects at a cost of \$3.7 trillion were linked to the initiative.

However, China said last year that about 20 percent of BRI projects had been "seriously affected" by the coronavirus pandemic.

There has also been pushback against BRI from countries that have criticised projects as costly and unnecessary. Beijing scaled back some plans after several countries sought to review, cancel or scale down commitments, citing concerns about costs, erosion of sovereignty, and corruption.



- 1) These Financial Statements are prepared and presented in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards (UAS/SLFRS) tail down by the Institute of Chartered Accountants. of Sri Lanks and in compliance with the requirements of the Companies Act No. 7 of 2007 and the Banking Act No. 30 of 3968 and arcendoments thereto. These Financial Statements, except for information on Statement of Cash Flows have been prepared following the accrual basis of accounting.
- Due to the patential regative impact of the global COVID-19 pandersic on Sri Lankan occorray, includuals and businesses. The Control Bank of Sri Lanka (CBSL) issued several. circulars and guidelines introducing different relief measures to safeguard the affected. These relief measures include deferment of repayment terms of credit facilities, offering concessionary rates of interest to eligible loan products and waiving off certain fires and charges.

The Bank estimated its Especial Credit Lass (ECL) as at 31 December 2020, based on the Probability of Default (PD), Loss Given Default (LGD) and Economic Factor Adjustment IEFA used in 2019 Audited figures is compilance with the guidance note issued by CA Sri Lanka on accounting implications of COVID 15. The significant accountings estimates impacted by these forecasts and associated uncertainties are predominantly related to expected credit losses and fair value measurement,

The Bank considered the potential impact on identified customer segments impacted due to COVID-19 in estimating the ECL and projected potential cash flow postponement bused on available information. Additionally, an EFA with a higher weight on the worst-case scenario for the collective impairment assessment was used. The Bank would reassess its portfolio post maratorium and changes would be made in impairment provisioning in line with repayments after the relief period.

The COVID 19 pandemic would increase the non-performing leans and advances of the Bank and coagled with the segative impact arising from the debt nonatarium relief granted by CBSL on interest income, fee income and cash flews will result in lower profitability of the Bank. Loss of Rs. 48 Min has been recognized as a Day one impact due to deferment. of recovery of loans arising from the moratorium relief scheme introduced by the Central Bank of Sri Lanka.

- 30. The total temporary differences arising from tax losses and tax credits amounted to Rs. 2,052 Mn, resulting in a deterred tax asset of Rs. 575 Mn, as at 31 December 2020, out of which, based on an internal assessment carried out by the Board of Directors, the recognition of deterred tax asset has been limited to 8s. 411 Mn. The unecognized deterred tax asset as at 31 December 2020 was Rs 164 Mn.
- 4) The authorities have proposed a reduction in the income tax rate applicable to the banking sector 28% to 24% which is penting formal approval from the performent as an amendment to the inland Revenue Act No. 24 of 2017. As it is not considered as substantially enacted as at the reporting date, both income tax and determed tax were calculated at the rate of 28% for the year ended 31 December 2021. Had the impact of the proposed reduction been adjusted the refl determed tax asset as at 31 December 2020 would have been reduced by Rs. 75 Mn
- The Commissioner General of Inland Revenue (ICGIR) issued a Notice of Assessment deiming Rs. 120 Mn for the Year of Assessment 2013;2014, disallowing some expenses and capital allowances claimed by the Bank, on the basis that it was not in commercial operation at the time and could not therefore make these deductions in amining at Taxable.

The Bank did not agree with the determination issued by the CGR and therefore appealed to the Tax Appeals Commission. The Bank awaits the hearing of this appeal.

- 6) There are no pending litigation of a material nature against the bank.
- 7) All known expenses have been provided in these Financial Statements.
- 8) No circumstances have arisen since the reporting date which would require adjustment to or disclosure in the Financial Statements.

FCCISL - Business Resurgence Survey Report

Lanka's business sector has been resilient

PwC-FCCISL Sri Lanka Business Resurgence Survey Report, a milestone study to address the post-pandemic challenges faced by local businesses, was officially released by Federation of the Chambers of Commerce in Sri Lanka (FCCISL) with the presentation of the first copy to Bandula Gunawardana, Minister of Trade.

The report is the fruition of a collaboration that had begun between FCCISL and PricewaterhouseCoopers, Sri Lanka (PwC Sri Lanka) that led to an islandwide survey conducted among registered businesses of all sizes during the third-quarter of 2020. The report is based on industry feedback and responses from businesses across diverse industry sectors and operating scales, broadly representative of the overall industry landscape of the country. "89% of respondents across all sectors experienced adverse impacts following the pandemic, however the key challenges, coping strategies adopted along with future support required saw marked differences once you started looking at different sectors in the economy," said Lasanga Abeysuriya, Executive Director, PwC Sri Lanka. Loss of customer sales and inadequate cashflow for working capital requirements were the most common challenges for microand small businesses, whilst reduction in overall funding available and supply chain challenges were key concerns for medium and large businesses respec-

The study provided evidence for the further support needed to develop a strong export-oriented economy, with most businesses in the microand SME segment currently focused on only serving domestic markets. Contrastingly, over two-thirds of the large businesses served export markets. Key challenges faced by export-oriented businesses were order cancellations, loss of customers, supply chain disruptions to source production inputs and working capital


shortages. Despite the headwinds, local businesses have shown tremendous resilience to remain open and protect jobs. "Much fewer companies had permanently wound-up or were in the process of winding-up due to the pandemic-induced challenges when comparing

with some of the regional markets in Asia" said Abeysuriya. Having flexibility to scale down operations and reduce costs, finding alternative supply sources and renegotiating with financiers and suppliers were amongst common coping mechanisms adopted for businesses

to navigate these challenging times. More businesses have relied on family and friends for support - both financial and other – during the current crisis. Thirty-percentof businesses relied on financial support from family and friends whilst eighteen-percent of businesses received other support such as no low cost labour, transportation, work premises from family and friends. Contrastingly, less than a quarter of the businesses had benefited from the Central Bank announced refinance schemes administered through the banks and financial institutions; eleven-percent of businesses were still awaiting approval /disbursements from such schemes as at the time of the survey whilst another eleven-percent were not even aware of financial assistance schemes available.

There is a silver lining; businesses have also identified opportunities, despite all the challenges, with fiftyfive percent of businesses seeing immediate new opportunities following the enforced COVID-19 associated movement and business restrictions. Businesses have looked at pivoting or transforming operations as well as seeking new opportunities and collaborations to utilise available resources and capabilities. Looking at business strategies and priorities before and since the COVID-

19 pandemic, growth and expansion have taken a relative backseat, whilst those with the capacity to do so have preferred seeking growth outside the country. "We see a change in priority for businesses to look at lateral diversification more favorably. However, businesses also seem more comfortable to pursue an organic growth path, perhaps due to lack of confidence or capacity to explore joint ventures or M&A routes that can be more effective and faster, particularly where new skills and expertise is required" said Abeysuriya. Over half the businesses have sought various forms of financial support remedies as the most urgent short-term requirement to recover from current challenges. Most common amongst these include financial grants for business transformation and technology adoption, collateral free credit through a governmentbacked loan guarantee scheme, faster access to cheaper working capital financing and further extensions to credit moratoriums. In the mediumterm, businesses have identified areas that can increase local market competitiveness such as reducing utility costs for industrial and commercial establishments, simplifying government services, improving the quality and quantity of semiskilled to meet the requirements of multiple industries, and improving the access to public infrastructure at competitive costs in order promote more private sector participation. Ruwan De Silva, Director and Project Chairperson for the Business Resurgence Study, FCCISL said "The study has provided a good baseline assessment of our local industry standing and gives a strong platform for future action." FCCISL has indicated future plans to engage in a series ofsector focused initiatives, with greater support from relevant sector participants, to drive a balanced, multi-sector economic revival in the country.

"With the current findings and other on-going studies to be conducted, we hope to engage with all our affiliated stakeholders that represent diverse industry sectors and professional bodies, regional business chambers as well as the public sector and government to jointly discuss, develop and implement necessary interventions to support the faster recovery of the local economy" said De Silva. "We will work with the Government and interested parties to seek support from the international community, including bilateral and multilateral lending and development agencies, to address some of the priority areas such as market development and capacity building to enable the growth of local business and economy," De Silva further added.



even Samurai is probably the only samurai film directed by the son of a samurai: Akira Kurosawa's father, Isamu, was a swordsman from Honshu. Why seven? The question has long gone unanswered, and there are, I suppose, two theories regarding it. The first is that being a fervent, zealous follower of the American cinema and Western culture, Kurosawa intended to pay homage to Aeschylus's Seven Against Thebes. I can't find much evidence for this anywhere, least of all Wikipedia. In that sense the second theory holds more water, especially because Kurosawa himself confirmed it: when asked by a member of the audience at an event honouring his work why he chose the number seven, he flippantly replied, "That's all the budget could afford." Both Lester James and Sumitra Peries participated at this event, somewhere in the early 1990s; Sumitra herself confirmed it to me the other day.

At three hours, Seven Samurai is more exciting, more exhilarating, I daresay more invigorating and thought-provoking, than half the sequels it inspired. The Magnificent Seven comes tantalisingly close to the original in terms of sheer excitement, but not even the sight of Yul Brynner and Steve McQueen readying themselves against those bandits in some poor 18th century Mexican village compensates for Toshiro Mifune and his band of ronin - or samurai without masters – displaying their swordsmanship against another set of bandits in some far-off mountain village in 16th century Japan. I don't credit the great Pauline Kael for being right all the time, but she was right most of the time, and like other critics who preferred the original to the remake, she got it right about this one: "the greatest battle epic since The Birth of a Nation" is how she described it when she saw it in 1961.

BREATH-TAKING

It's far from his greatest work, of course - I would rank Throne of Blood, Ran, and Kagemusha, all three inspired by Shakespeare, the first two explicitly so and the latter figuratively, at the top – but it shows the kind of erratic, unflappable auteur he was. There are sequences in it which take your breath away even on a first viewing: the bandits pillaging the village, Mifune making his dramatic entrance, the samurai getting ready for the first fight. Some of them remind you of the battle scenes in Laurence Olivier's adaptation of Henry V (released the same year Kurosawa's father passed away, in 1948). Yet at their best, they bring to mind John Ford's Westerns and, if we are to push it a bit further, the battle scenes of Sergei Eisenstein and Dovzhenko, from Stalin-

What makes Kurosawa's battle scenes so profoundly unique is the backdrop against which they were made: unlike Olivier and Ford, who enjoyed the benefit of a commercial industry, and Eisenstein and Dovzhenko, who enjoyed the







patronage of the Soviet bureaucracy, Kurosawa's best movies came out after Hiroshima, Nagasaki, and the ravages of war. I can think of one or two other film industries that survived the complexities of a major war, especially a world war - like France - but Japan's was, and continues to be, a distinctive case: it had to start literally from scratch, amidst American occupation. It is true its performing arts industries escaped this fate – especially cinema – but in the aftermath of the war the more popular media – and in Japan there was one, film – incorporated new styles. This is true particularly of Kurosawa's work, all the way from *Rashomon*, the film that took Japan to Venice and then the world; it was true of many other directors too, but they came later.

The cinema has always been the art most susceptible to change and continuity. This is especially true when considering Kurosawa's career before and after the war. In his pre-war work (much of which, I concede, seems plagiarised from American gangster and Western

thrillers), there is almost a shy and reticent attitude, as though the director is not too willing to reveal his flamboyance. The war pushed Kurosawa, and his peers, to experiment, question boundaries, discard old styles, and incorporate new ones. It's the sort of daring style that crops up in the sequence where the bandit first comes across the samurai's wife in Rashomon: dappled in light and shade, a gust of wind awakens the sleeping outlaw the very moment it lifts up the woman's dress and hat.

EXEMPLIFYING MUSIC

There's a question film critics ask: to what extent was Kurosawa's art derived and to what extent was it original? Why this question is difficult to answer in the context of not just Kurosawa's work but the Japanese cinema in general is that there is no sharp line dividing the derived from the original. To me, this is best exemplified by *Rashomon*. The music is derived: it's based on Ravel's Bolero (which the Japanese composer Ryuichi Sakamoto reworked into the heist sequence in Brian De Palma's Femme Fatale). So, I suppose, are the camera angles, though it's hard to say. But what of the story? One can say the plot in a film like Seven Samurai is derived, but then Japanese folklore does have its share of heroic ronin. You can't make that excuse in Throne of Blood, which borrows directly from

Macbeth. Yet Kurosawa, whose acquaintance with the English language wasn't top-notch, famously chose not to read Shakespeare's play, concentrating instead on its outline; it could have been based on anything, not necessarily the tale of a Scottish prince and three witches.

As critics, we are always on the hunt for symbols, for lines that demarcate reality from fiction, and of course the borrowed from the original. In Kurosawa's case it's difficult to draw such lines, and if you do, it turns out to be unwieldy. What's even more unwieldy in Kurosawa's work is that he remains, as he was back then also, the most plagiarised Japanese filmmaker in the West. In the history of cinema I can't think of another non-Western director who paid homage to Hollywood so fervently, only to have Hollywood pay homage to him in return. It's not merely Seven Samurai, of course: from Rashomon to The Hidden Fortress, even Yojimbo (Pauline Kael: "the first great shaggy-man movie"), US directors have been busy, if not ripping off from him, then paying tribute to him. Such tributes crisscross time and space: The Hidden Fortress is set in 15th century Japan, yet two decades after its release, it made its way to "a long time ago, in a galaxy far, far away", in Star Wars.

In this I believe Kurosawa was the superior of the two other auteurs associated with post-war Japan's cinematic

renaissance: Yasujiro Ozu and Kenji Mizoguchi. Both Ozu and Mizoguchi, the former more than the latter, have been described by European and American critics as being "too Japanese." In that sense, Kurosawa's work lends itself to appropriation and allusion more easily, as it has: I cannot think of a single Ozu or Mizoguchi film that American directors felt compelled to pay homage to. That does not lower the works of these two – some of which to me remain superior even to those of Kurosawa – but it does show how the latter's work has become far more adaptable than theirs.

Everyone has their favourites, and my personal Kurosawa favourite remains Kagemusha. Kagemusha went rather unnoticed in the West, partly because of its length but more importantly, I think, because of its deep, unyielding cynicism. Western audiences could relate more easily to the ending in Ran, his tribute to King Lear (and one for which he actually read the play). But Kagemusha – which like Seven Samurai takes place in 16th century Japan, during the Sengoku Period – doesn't quite have the karmic payoffs the "villains" get in Ran. That deprived Kurosawa's film of the type of ending European and American audiences had grown to expect, even of an art-house work.

The final scene of our hero, the lone survivor of the Battle of Nagashino, attacking the enemy – even though the side for which he's fighting discarded him after they made use of him – is shot from a long distance, separating us from not just the violence, but also the emotion. His final lunge is to no avail: the enemy finishes him off, and he dies, lonely and unloved, the river washing away his blood after he falls into it. The war is over; so is everyone involved in it. Kurosawa made many tragedies, both old and contemporary, but Kagemusha stands, I'd say, as the most Shakespearean among them: an irony, given that it was not based on Shakespeare. That's as Japanese, or Western, that Kurosawa could get: of both worlds, but firmly rooted in the land of his birth.

THE TRUTH OF THE BODY

It is better to be hated for what you are

To be loved for something you are not. -Andre Gide

'The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River' is Ravindhu Mahendra's maiden novel in English. It is novel that invites close attention. I say so primarily on account of four reasons. Firstly, it boldly ventures into an experiential terrain that is not normally selected for fictional exploration by Sri Lankan writers. Second the author has a clear ability to generate narrative energy through collocation of diverse wellrealized incidents connected to emotional entanglements and manipulations of time and memory. Third, the author has sought to employ a metaphorically dense and poetically charged language. This can be described as a poetic novel in the sense that the woks of Andre Gide, Virginia Woolf, Toni Morrison or Amit Chaudhuri can be termed poetic novels. Fourth, the author's desire to clear new pathways of feeling towards the nerve-centres of being. Intricate emotional entanglements, both overt and subterranean, are at the core of the novel.


In a good poetic novel, the metaphorically rich language works at different levels of artistic apprehension and in different registers. The poetic language is no surface and external ornamentation; it has an epistemological value in the sense that it promotes a deeper inquiry into ways of understanding the world. In the case of The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River, the metaphorically driven language opens up another layer of meaning - the need to extend the margins of quotidian reality. This enlargement of the consciousness is part of the aim of the novelist. It is not, as is exemplified in the protagonist's character, a disembodied consciousness; rather, it is a defiantly embodied consciousness.

Fictional attention

The narrative discourse of the novel The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River is constructed around the character of Sujatha. He is the centre of fictional attention. His arc of growth is marked by encounters with ambivalences - he is impulsive and thoughtful, sensual and spiritual, stubborn and flexible. His joy is linked to anguish and inner calm linked to inner turbulence. Sujatha is represented as a complex character who is battling antithetical forces, the central topos being that of the duality between body and spirit that guides everything. His homoerotic desire, which he both acknowledges and evades, courses through the novel giving it definition. Sujatha's character emerges both as an extension of, and in opposition to, a number of forces. The memory of his deceased mother, the fraught relationship with the father, complex attachment to his cousin Hasantha, and the tender mutualities between him and his fellow monk the reverend Ananda are among them. This is a felicitous novel that takes us into the intricate inner workings of the human mind and heart. Part of the novelist's agenda is to map the treacherous terrain of human emotions. Interestingly, the protagonist's homoerotic desires and the narrator's textual desires coincide in their respective quests for locus of au-

The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River can be read through diverse optics. I have chosen the optic of the human body which, it seems to me is the dynamo of the novel, although, I concede, there other equally compelling perspectives that could be

pressed into service. The body is generally regarded as a physiological entity, which is true so far as it goes. However, to restrict our understanding of the body solely to this facet of it id to deprive it of its diverse layers of meaning. The body is more than a biological object. It is also a linguistic product, a cultural construct, a site of conflicts of meaning. Ravindhu Mahendra, as an imaginative writer is fully cognizant of this fact.

The way he has semioticized the body, that is to say, the way in which he has converted it into an intricate signifying system deserves careful analysis. Superficially, a perfunctory reading might convince us that body and mind are in tension. This is obviously true. However, Mahendra is saying that at a deeper level of understanding they are mutually nurturing. The predicaments of Sujatha can be comprehended through this critical approach. In humanistic and social scientific inquiry, the body has always been regarded as being ancillary to the mind. However, in more recent times, thanks to the writing of thinkers such as Mary Douglas and Michelle Foucault the body has been placed at the centre of humanistic and social scientific inquiry. Ravindhu Mahendra, in his novel, implicitly endorses and validates this approach.

Our analysis of the human body need not be confined to western formulations. For example, the human body has played a central role as a symbolic construct in classical Indian philosophy, religion, and literature. According to the purusha hymn in the Rig Veda, the cosmos and everything in it arose from the body of the Brahman. In the Upanishads we come across vivid imagery describing the power of the human body Similarly, in classical Indian poetry, notably in the writings of Kalidasa, nature was textualized in terms of the vibrancy of the body. Ravindhu Mahendra, in his novel, has made the body into an object of imaginative apprehension as well as an instrument guiding the narrative. Throughout the novel, the idea of consciousness repeatedly makes its presence felt. However, it is important to note that what Mahendra is proposing is an embodied consciousness. Here

the consciousness is guided by somatic imperatives, the dictates of the body.

Elizabeth Grosz has written insightfully on the body. She says that the subject's psychical interior needs to be understood as an introjection, a form of internalization of the meaning and significance of the human body. This admonition of Prof. Grosz is deeply germane to the experiential richness of Ravindhu Mahendra's novel. In her book titled Volatile Bodies, Elizabeth Grosz asserts that her aim is to displace the centrality of mind, the psyche, interior, consciousness through a reconfiguration of the body. Indeed, this displacement, the according of a position of centrality to the body, is central to intentions of the author of The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River.

Prof. Peter Brooks in his valuable book Body Work: Objects of Desire in the Modern Narrative claims the following. 'I consider the body as an object and motive of narrative writing- as a primary concern with the life of the imagination.' He says that his aim throughout is with the

creation of fictions that address the body, that imbed it in narrative, and that as

a consequence embody meanings. These observations are relevant to Mahendra's efforts. The locution stories on the body and the body in story is pivotal to the life experience of Suiatha and the narrative experience of the omniscient narrator of the novel. I have

dealt at length with the concept of the body and its centrality in Mahendra's novel because it opens up, what I think is a very productive pathway of inquiry into this novel.

The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River is a felicitous poetic novel executed with conviction and assurance. The author has, as I pointed out earlier, adopted a metaphorically dense style. His newly-minted metaphors fly off the page startling us into answer awareness of human living and imaginative possibilities. This is a poetic novel both in the superficial sense that it contains poetic passages added onto the narrative to beautify it and that it is also a poetic novel in the deeper sense where the entire novel has been conceived and executed in poetic terms. The metaphorically driven poetic passages have a way of expanding our awareness of the quotidian world, pushing its margins, and alerting us to the vital reciprocities between nature and human beings. Certain tropes such as the thunderstorm, fires, moonlight recur throughout the narrative like a leitmotiv imbuing it with symbolic significance. The metaphors, therefore, carry an epistemological burden.

I wish to comment briefly on the structure of the novel as well. There is rhythmic movement to it; the narrative consists of memories selected and rearranged so as to emphasize various defining incidents from Sujatha's past. Memory, which plays a crucial role, in the narrative, is social in origin and effect. The author would concur with Maurice Halbwachs' viewpoint that the memory is collective rather than personal; the stitching of incidents projected my memory into a narrative flow has been done so as to enhance the rise and fall of emotions and the conflict of the protagonist's self-denial and self-actualization.

The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River

is not a confessional novel; confessional novels are normally written from the first person point of view. However, in this novel how the omniscient narrator presents the driving incidents of Sujatha's life carries with it a certain shade of confessional striving. It is a confession at one remove, a mediated confession. The notion of confession calls attention to four important imperatives. First, it presupposes a mood of human guilt. Second, it is important to recognize that there is a larger moral order against which the guilt is defined. Third it recognizes the existence of authoritative figures or norms which underline the misdeeds, actual or imaginary, committed by the individual. Fourth, the existence and availability of diverse frame works for discussing the confession. Sujatha has not committed any crime. Still a certain guilt clouds his feelings. His confession-tinged ruminations carry instances of self-depreciation and self-justification in equal measure. The reader can bring in the idea of confession to his or her reading of the novel to make greater sense of the flow of narrative. This raises the question whether a first person viewpoint, rather than an omniscient one, would have been more impactful. But then I fully recognize the limitations of the

first person point of view As I stated earlier, one of the strengths of the novel is the author's desire to create a vibrantly rich and metaphorically evocative language. However, if one is not restrained, this effort can degenerate into over-writing and over-metaphorizing. The aesthetic of excess almost always results in an undermining of its very effort. Even outstanding poetic novelists such as Toni Morison, as in her novel Paradise, have occasionally fallen victim to the impulse to poeticize excessively. We all need to remind ourselves that there is a fine balance that needs to be achieved between anaemic prose and over wrought prose. Hence, lyrical novels demand discipline and parsimony as much as vigorous imagination.

Emotional honesty

The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River is a novel that valorizes emotional truth. The protagonist's quest for emotional honesty takes place on the terrain of the body which has become a sight of conflict and meaning. To attain emotional honesty is to validate authentic living. The eminent French philosopher Gilles Deleuze once remarked that the act of creation is an act of resistance. He was deploying term resistance largely in a metaphysical sense. There are other possible meanings of resistance. In Ravindhu Mahendra's novel, the achievement of emotional liberation signifies a resistance offered by Sujatha. It is a measure of his self-realization. A one sentence summary of the novel would be, this tells the story of a young man who became a Buddhist monk and after a while decided to give up robes.

In between these two momentous events, the author has given figurality to a complex and intricate network of emotional entanglements. The novelist has ably foregrounded the agonies of dislocation and joys of relocation. At the dead centre of all these tensions and conflicts is a radiant tenderness which lends the novel a moral authority. I started out this article by asserting that The Saffron Robe by the Flowing River is an absorbingly meditative novel that merits the close attention of lovers of literature. It signals the welcome arrival of a new talent on the local literary landscape.

re the two terms, *knowledge* and *wisdom* imply the same meanings generally or conceptually? An average scholar in linguistics may state that they are the same in the day to day conversation. But if the two terms are regarded from a wider perspective, they may imply religious and spiritual meanings that transcend the mere barriers of sensory perception. Such an attempt is

seen interpreted by the learned monk, Venerable Dr Pategama Gnanarama Thera, in the work titled Glimpses of Buddhist Wisdom published in Singapore (2004).


But the reader sees a certain degree of penetrative peep into subdivisions in each of the cited categories. The subdivisions number into smaller groups in each category. They all tend to target the central issue of knowledge and wisdom. At the outset, the scholar researcher attempts to trace the place of Buddhism and Buddhist teachings are compared with the other well-known religions like Taoism, Shinto, Confucianism, Hindu-

ism and Brahmanism. In this direction, the work takes the shape of a handbook or a manner for the student and teacher of comparative religious studies. In each of these religious teachings, one central or pivotal point happens to be the right mindfulness and right concentration that leads to a clearer understanding of the sensory world, in which we live or exist.

Taking a synoptic stand-

point, the venerable scholar points out that Buddhism as a religion based on ethics and philosophy began to spread beyond India from the 3rd Century BC. Its contribution to Asian culture as a peaceloving process is underlined. The Buddha wanted all his disciples to be quite vigilant about the surroundings that disturb the mind that culminates in the Right Mindfulness or Samma Sathi.

The learned writer then follows his trend of thought to several other religious teachings. Coming on to the second segment on Individual and Society, the scholar takes the reader on to another dimension of wisdom, taking a more liberal thinking pro-





cess on such matters as positive thinking, adversity, turmoil and social interaction. The underlined factor is the varying aspects of wisdom as utilised by particular individuals in their day to day activities. Venerable writer too lays down parables culled from the popular Buddhist canons in order to throw light on the subject.

REALIST PERSPECTIVE

One significant fact that the reader comes to feel the way the subject area of psychology had been linked to the way the people think and perform day to day work in a given climate, overcoming pain, agony and turmoil.

In this context, Venerable Gnanarama Thera quotes a saying of Albert Einstein that goes as follows:

"If there is any religion that would cope up with scientific needs it would be Buddhism." Furthermore, Friedrich Nietzsche said: "Buddhism is hundred times more realistic than other religions."

In this manner, there are quite a number of quotes from scholars of philosophy and allied areas who comment on the central area of teachings of the Buddha. Coming on to the third segment on Psychology and Education, the writer outlines some of the basic perspectives of wisdom as linked to the central points of view in psy-

chology and education. He takes into account the need for the training of teachers from the Buddhist standpoint referring to the basic concepts of Buddha's teaching methods. The reader is often referred indirectly to Dhammapada in a lighter vein. In this direction, emphasis is made on the concept of stress management, a term utilised in psychology. It is cited that the popular psychologist William James was impressed by the psychological sophistication of Buddhism and predicted that it would be a major influence on western psychology.

Summing up, I feel that it is just not a Dhamma gift, but a gift of knowledge and wisdom needed for the right time.

Male only!

he folk theatre of India is a combination of dance and drama mixed with vocal music and a different variety of musical instruments. This folk theatre is very popular among the village masses and tribals.

Yet this folklore is a colourful entertainment based on history, tradition, religion, and social customs. Some folk dances are connected to religious functions; religious festivals and some are agricultural functions such as harvest.

Some of the folk dances are performed by males alone, and some of the folk dances are performed only by females, and some are performed by

males and females together. Some states of India have theme-based annual seasonal folk dance dramas like Ramlila.

Female roles

Therukoothu in Tamil Nadu is quite popular basically based on ancient epics. The theme of the story is sung by the actors and dialogue take place in between the play. Distinct make-up and costumes are adopted, even the female roles are played by the males.

Similarly, Purravai Aattam or Poei Kal Kutherai Aattam (dummy horse dance) is one of the traditional male folk dances of India. In this dance, form horses are made out of paper or colourful cloths with glitter-



ing golden or silver borders. Through a slit, in the back, the man appears.

The men dress up themselves as grooms and hold swords in their hands. They dance to the accompaniment of the Nathaswara musical band. This is a common dance form during religious functions and festive seasons.

Another male dance form is Oyilaattam or Oyil Kumi Aattam which is widely practised in Tamil Nadu by men. Oyil Kumi during the Thai Pongal festival the men hold the handkerchiefs and dance; the men form two rows in equal number and dance. It is a dance performed by the men alone therefore it resembles beautiful attractive majestic Thandava stances.

Temple festivals

Kavadi Attam is another folk dance mainly practised by menfolk but some kavadis like Paal (milk) Kavadi is performed mainly by the women which are totally associated with temple festivals. But Para-

vai Kavadi is performed by men alone during the temple festivals.

Sillampattam is another fork art practised by men from the Chola period. It is based on martial art methods and is used for self-defence. Devaraattam is widely practised in Tamil Nadu by a clan called Kampala Nayakar. An instrument called Devathunthurki (a drum) is used in this dance.

It is claimed that there are 103 adavus which are called Aattam, in Devar Aattam. There is another dance form called Servai Aattam. It is practised by the same clan.

Bhangra is the most popular dance form of Punjab. Steady firm and vigorous movements could be seen. The drummer plays the important role, he occupies the central position and the others; (the dancers) form a circle around him and dance. The drummer's beating is accompanied by the singing by one or two singers in this art form. The verses for the dance are often taken from the Punjabi poetry called Boli or

Fast tempos

The drummer plays the drum (dhola) with sticks. First, the drums beating start with slow tempos and lead with fast tempos. The dress for this dance is pure Punjabi dress including dhoti, beautiful colourful turban, waistcoat, and kurta.

Chhau, dance is another form of dance that exists in three different regions of India. The Chhau dance practised in West Bengal is called Serikala Chhau which is a very vigorous martial art and suitable for males only. Royal patronage was given to this art

Even the princes were not only dancers but excellent mask makers also. Purulia Chhau exists in the south-east of Orissa which is considered a highly tribal area.

Various factors were responsible for the formation of this art form, such as Hindu religious mythology. Vedas, tribal customs, and martial art. The theme of the art conveys the triumph of good over evil. Other variety of Chhau is Mayubbanj Chhau. Like Serikala Chhau this also flourished under royal patronage. Vocal music in Chhau dances is not used. But varieties of instrumental music are used in Chhau dances. Dhol, Dhumba, Chadcbadi and Nagada, all are drum instruments used in these dances

In Kerala, Kuddiaattam and Chakiar Koothu both are performed by male dancers. However, all these male dance forms are more entertaining, colourful and well.
