"We want the people's continuous support to prevent the virus spread," she said. Asked about the Government's progress in terms of COVI-OD-19 vaccination, Dr. Fernandopulle said that the Government had so far given vaccines to over 900,000 people."In addition to the frontline health workers and Security Forces/ police personnel, most of them are

elderly persons from Grama Niladhari Divisions in the Gampaha and Colombo districts, where we found the

majority of Coronavirus patients." "We plan to provide vaccines to 60 percent of the people in the country. The problem we face now is that the Covid-19 vaccines are short in supply, although we are ready to purchase them," she said.

Asked whether one can expect COVID-19 vaccines to be available for purchase in private hospitals and pharmacies soon, she said, "the Government is handling all activities related to COVID-19 prevention, and there is no way that one can obtain COVID-19 vaccines from private hospitals and pharmacies yet".

Asked if the government had any

problems concerning adverse reactions to COVID-19 shots it had given so far to the public, she said there had not been any significant issues in this respect.

The Ministry of Health has set up a Special Medical Unit to deal with such instances immediately upon receipt of information, she added.

Taking into consideration the facts, the Supreme Court three-judge-bench comprising Justices Sisira De Abrew, Shiran Gooneratne and Mahinda Samayawardana decided to dismiss the petition in lim-

The petitioner had cited Secretary to the Ministry of Education, Chairman of Public Service Commission, members

of Public Service Commission and several others as respondents.

The Petitioner said that in 2019 he was made to aware by the Royal College Union, the Old Boys Association of Royal College that the Ministry of Education has commenced a process to appoint a new Principal under an unacceptable marking scheme made with the aim of appointing a Principal with only two years of experience and the said process of appointment was politically motivated.

Arjun Aloysius, PTL Chief Dealer Kasun Palisena, Chairman of PTL Jeffrey Joseph Aloysius, Chitta Ranjan Hulugalle, an executive officer of the Public Debt Department of the Central Bank Sangarapillai Padumanathan and an executive officer of the Employees Provident Fund Indika Saman Kumara were released on bail.

When the first case was taken up before the Colombo High Court Trialat-Bar bench comprising High Court Judges Damith Thotawatte, Manjula Thilakaratne and Mohamed Irshadeen. the panel of judges announced a twothirds split verdict and ordered to release the accused on bail.

Presiding Judge Damith Thotawatte and Colombo High Court Judge Mohamed Irshadeen decided to grant bail to the accused, deciding that Article 450 (6) of the Criminal Procedure

Code was no longer valid and that the Bail Act would be effective beyond Article 450 (6) of the Criminal Procedure Code.

The two judges also ruled that the accused' report on their illnesses as "special" could not be considered "special" and said that they would take into account the Attorney General's status to grant bail to the accused in the first bond case filed in 2019. Taking into consideration the facts, the duo ordered that the accused be released on bail, taking into account the fairness of the case and the complexity of the

Announcing his decision, High Court Judge Manjula Tilakaratne said the High Court has no jurisdiction to grant bail to an accused under Section 450 of the Criminal Procedure Code when the Attorney General opposes to grant bail and that the High Court has no power to disregard the Act.

HCJ Tillekeratne ruled that the bail application was not relevant to granting bail to the accused under the Public Property Act and ordered that the accused be remanded.

Following a two-thirds majority, the Colombo High Court Trial-at-Bar bench finally decided to grant bail to the accused.

The Colombo High Court Trial-at-Bar granted bail to each of the accused on a cash bail of Rs. 1 million and two sureties of Rs. 5 million and ordered the accused not to violate the bail conditions or to intimidate the prosecution witnesses of the case. The bench also imposed travel ban against accused from traveling abroad and issued an order prohibiting them from traveling abroad till the end of the cases.

powers that is not subject to any political or any other influence like the Examinations Department of Sri Lanka to manage affairs related to environment.

It is proposed that the above institution be given special powers in the programme carried out by environmentalists for the protection of forests and the natural environment. The appointment process will also be presented by Ranil Wickremesinghe in a statement. The declaration 'A green year to protect Sinharaja' is also to be presented.

Wickremesinghe is also expected to use the colour green of the UNP to launch environmental protection programmes throughout the country and to announce an environmental policy under a future UNP government.

They have been arrested in Colombo. One of the arrested suspects is a 31 year old resident of Wellampitiya while the other is a 32 year old resident of Thihariya.

Investigations have revealed that they have created a WhatsApp group called 'One Umma' and propagated extremist ideologies in various ways from Qatar. These people had left Sri Lanka and worked in Qatar. They were later deported from Qatar to Sri Lanka on November 21, according to a notice issued by the Sri Lanka Police. Two more persons were arrested by the Terrorism Investigation Unit on Monday (31) on charges of facilitating the conduct of extremist classes in the Muttur area in late 2018.

The police spokesman said all four suspects were being held under the Prevention of Terrorism Act and are being questioned.

The lorry, which was travelling from Nuwara Eliya to Ella, had overturned on the three-wheeler near the bend and the driver had fled after the accident. the Wildlife and Forest Conservation Minister and the Attorney General as respondents.

The petitioners maintained that the proposed Kurunegala-Habrana Railway extension project would cause irreparable loss to their livelihoods and an adverse and irreversible impact to the environment with the implementation of this project.

Petitioners state that the proposed Kurunegala - Dambulla Habarana (KDH) railway track is proposed to run to the right and almost parallel to the existing Kurunegala- Dambulla (A6) highway, after branching out from the Northern Railway line from Kurunegala and continuing towards North-East. The KDH Railway is proposed to originate from Kurunegala Station of the Colombo - Maho line, passing Galewela, Dambulla and Habarana and connecting to the current Maho - Trincomale line, with the total railway length of 82.445 km. In addition to that, this railway line passes through Panaliyadda, Omaragolla and Beligamuwa, the residential areas of the petitioners destroying large areas of forest lands.

The petitioners are also seeking an order directing the respondents to forthwith propose suitable alternatives to prevent the environmental impact and effect to the livelihood of the inhabitants including the Petitioners which will be caused by this Project.

Redefining the Classroom

SEMINAR FOR EDUCATORS LOOKS AT POST-COVID CHALLENGES TO EDUCATION

OVID-19 has resulted in a record number of students being forced to stay away from schools and universities. According to data from the UNESCO Institute for Statistics, at the peak of the pandemic's first wave in mid-April 2020, over 190 countries had implemented nationwide closures, affecting more than 90 percent of the world's student population.

Students in Sri Lanka like their fellow students all over the globe are now required to attend online lectures on their smartphone or laptop whether they like it or not. The lack of face-to-face interaction has affected all students throughout the country and for rural students' unavailability of Wi-Fi has further aggravated the problem.

The Daily News recently attended 'Back to School, Redefining Classrooms', an event held by Chokolaate Magazine in partnership with The International Schools of Sri Lanka (TISSL) in order to raise awareness on how best to cope with the problems posed by online learning and how to counteract it, as the pandemic has redefined education glob-

TISSL Chairperson Kumari Hapugalla Perera spoke about redefining the heart and soul of modern education. She pointed out that strong leadership in this time of crisis is of paramount importance. She said the leader's role in maintaining stability is key to overcoming the difficulties that we face in this day and age. The leader's ability to motivate and inspire is crucial.

"TISSL is indeed grateful to Chokolaate for volunteering to come on board and organize this event. There is no doubt that all teachers and heads of schools will approve of this event as we all seem to be groping in the dark during these unprecedented times in Sri Lanka. TISSL has always been interested in sharing and demonstrating best practice when it comes to education. We believe in fostering close relationships with other schools in the island," said Perera.

She added that long before the pandemic, there was a discourse on the need for a meaningful change in education. The pandemic is of course a force that took us all by surprise because it was unexpected. Teachers and students have had to deviate from the tradition of learning and suddenly have been thrown in at the deep end.

EMBRACING CHANGE OVERNIGHT

"Teachers and students had to embrace change overnight. They have all had to learn new skills. Now we have to embark on a journey into the future shaped by countless uncertainties. This conference raises many questions – How will our students learn? What do they need socially and emotionally? How will our teachers teach? Today we know that change is driven by technology. There are new tools to connect students across the world. Today we know that information on just about anything is at our fingertips. The teacher's role now is to guide the students. We need human beings who are confident and efficient. A human being who can be a catalyst for positive change. What better place than the classroom to begin this process? Today we need to redefine the heart and soul of modern education,' said Perera.

Perera departed with one final statement to all the heads of schools - "In crisis where major change is inevitable and uncertain, we have to listen to teachers, students and families. What are they experiencing? What do they need? Schools and educators must explore these questions together with those most impacted by the decisions they make. This pandemic has highlighted inequalities in our society that have been ignored for long. We do not have a crystal ball to predict the future but we can urgently discuss the questions that will help us prepare for the changes ahead," explained Perera.

British Council Director Education and English Education Systems Louise Cowcher said that we are indeed facing challenging times and there is a very real possibility that the world will not be the same

"Education has changed. Society has changed. And the world of work has changed. So what can we do about it? Our fundamental view at the British Council is that all young people benefit from learning opportunities provided by a fit for purpose relevant education system. This will allow them to fulfill their potential, achieve their aspirations and contribute to Sri Lanka's economic and social development. It is something that I truly believe in. It is about an individual and how he or she can contribute to society. The problem is sometimes young people may have a different view concerning their education. In 2018, we carried out research and it became clear to us when speaking to young people aged between 18 to 35 that among their concerns access to jobs was Number 2. Education was Number 7. These were school leavers and university students. They have gone through the education system and their perception was that the education system did not prepare them for the world of work," said Cowcher.

She pointed out that changes were happening anyway. The pandemic did not tell us things we did not know already. But the pandemic has highlighted the need for reform. These are issues we have known about for a long time. It is nothing new. Cowcher praised the representatives of Sri Lankan educational institutes for keeping their institutes going. She praised them for providing quality education to their Sri Lankan students while running households and

"Teaching online was something new but your teachers did it. But it is not just about the technology, it is much more fundamental. What about the learning outcomes? What about the learning outcomes for young people at the end of a certain time period? What do we want our young people to be able to do going forwards after their education? Everyone knows that there is nothing intrinsically right or wrong about pedagogy (the method and practice of teaching, especially as an academic subject or theoretical concept). The question is – is it relevant? Is it appropriate? Each of us instinctively feels that we want learner-centered outcomes. The learner should be at the heart of the process. Teaching and learning are two entirely different things. At best a teacher can facilitate learning, but the student learns. So learning has to be at the heart of the process. It is about international standards. International benchmarking. We need young Sri Lankan students to be as good as anyone else anywhere in the world. This is because we live in a global environment. So we need to think about what happens to our young people. Much of it has to do with career guidance," explained Cowcher.

She added that you just can't replace face to face teaching. "Technology is great. However, it is a tool and we exploit it. It should not exploit us." Her colleagues at the British Council have told her that they have had to teach parents on how to help their children learn about online classes. "So there is that question – how do you learn these days?"

ALIGNING EDUCATION WITH JOB DEMAND

"The world of work is changing. The British Council has carried out a lot of research during the last few years. And what becomes clear is that what employers are looking for is not always what education providers think they are. It is less of technical skills and it is more of those 21st century skills or employability skills. Issues around problem solving, collaborative working, creativity and innovation – these are the things employers are looking for. So we do our best to leave the curriculum to the world of

work. As education providers, it also helps if we understand the labour market. What are the opportunities? The tourism sector globally has just crashed. So are there alternatives? If you have learner-centered outcomes you tend to select a particular pedagogy and that type of pedagogy should emphasize those core skills of collaborative working and problem solving. So one of the things employers say they are looking for should be in your pedagogy or your curriculum. So let's make sure that they are there," Cowcher said. "This generation has a much better grasp of technology and that is something employers look for. Now we need to get young people back to face-to-face learning. You simply cannot replace face-to-face teaching. Why is it so important? Because it is part of the socialization process.'

Through coming together they learn vital social skills. Education is so much part of the socialization process. We know this. It is how they learn the rules of social engagement. This is part of the transition to adulthood. The whole school culture supports this. Also I need to touch on 'equity of access' (for years, equity of access in education has referred to the ability of all students to receive an education from qualified teachers in buildings that are safe and conducive to learning in a district with sufficient resources that are reasonably equal among other schools in the same state). If you take the British Council's original aims, it starts out with all young people. It does not matter who they are or where they are, they all have equity of access. The problem with digital only is that it is not equitable. It is not fair and impartial. So there is this challenge of equity."

She added that education professionals are absolutely instrumental. The roles they play can make a difference and create change. Our Sri Lankan institutes have not compromised on standards and have kept the learning process going on. In her words, it is a magnificent achievement. She further stated that education professionals can start changing

things fundamentally. "You need to link your curriculum to the world of work. For young people, career guidance is very important. It needs to be mandatory, professionalized and internationally benchmarked. Not everyone is going to be a nuclear physicist or be a part of NASA. So you need to help young people make informed choices. Given your positions of leadership and authority you can encourage your institutions to adopt a 'learning to learn' approach. It will make a difference. We need to help them make informed choices about where they want to go in life. As Principals you set the tone for your whole school culture. 

Cable system for transporting tea leaves in Ratnapura

A cable system was introduced for the first time in the country to transport tea leaves in Hettikanda, Pelmadulla in Ratnapura.

The system was implemented at a cost of Rs. 2.3 million by the Small Holders Tea and Rubber Revitalization Project (STaRR) under the guidance of Company Estate Reforms, Tea and Rubber Estates Related Crops Cultivation and Factories Modernization and Tea and Rubber Export Promotion State Minister Kanaka Herath.

It took much time and effort to bring the harvest from the tea plantations in the high hills of Hettikanda to the foothills in the

Accessing the plantations at the top of the hill along the footpaths and bringing the tea leaves down from the hill have been very difficult earlier.

Therefore, steps were taken to establish a tea leaf transport system to increase the productivity of tea plantations at the top of the Hettikanda hills.

The tea leaves are transported by connecting a 465-meter-long steel wire from the top of the

hill to the tea leaf collection point at the foot of the hill.

About 40 tea growers cultivate about 70 hectares of tea plantations in the Hettikanda hills area and their daily production is around 2,000 kg.

The cable system takes about just four minutes to send the tea leaf harvest from the top of the hill to the roadside collection centre 465 metres below. But it takes about half an hour to bring down about 20 kg of tea leaves in a

"Because of this, a farmer picks only about 20 or 25 kilograms of tea leaves per day. But with the cable transportation system, farmers could harvest quality tea leaves they need," SRaRR Project Director Janaka Amarasinghe

A cable system can also be used to transport fertilizer and tea plants from the bottom to the top. The State Minister said that this is an additional benefit of the cable system.

He said that because of the cable system, farmers will cultivate tea or rubber in the lands that have not been cultivated to

A shot in the arm

ri Lanka's efforts to contain the COVID-19 pandemic literally received a shot in the arm on Wednesday with the arrival in Sri Lanka of 600,000 doses of the Chinese-made Sinopharm vaccine. Significantly, the country did not have to spend a single cent on it as it was a generous donation from China, one of our staunchest friends and allies. It was just the other day that President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Chinese President Xi Jinping discussed matters of mutual interest including the vaccines over the telephone.

While the initial doses of Sinopharm will go into the arms of Chinese nationals living and working in Sri Lanka, the next round will be reserved for Sri Lankans, though the age group has not been announced at this time. An expert committee will analyse the vaccine further before this move.

The donation is timely in the present context, when India has temporarily stopped the export of the Covishield vaccine (the licensed version of the UK/Sweden Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine) as a result of the spike in Coronavirus cases there. Apart from the Covishield vaccine doses directly ordered by Sri Lanka from the Serum Institute of India (SII, manufacturer of Covishield), the temporary ban on exports will also affect shipments from WHO's COVAX facility, which also procures vaccines from the SII. Fortunately, Sri Lanka has already received one consignment from COVAX earlier, before the export blockage.

However, the Government has been prudent in its approach to vaccination, having placed orders with multiple vendors. The National Medicines Regulatory Authority (NMRA), in addition to the AstraZeneca vaccine, recently gave approval to the Russian-made Sputnik V Vaccine, which is said to be having an efficacy of 92 percent in real-world use. This vaccine has already been authorized for use in more than 40 countries. Sri Lanka has already ordered seven million doses of the Sputnik V vaccine, which should cover 3.5 million people as two shots are needed.

Sri Lanka is indeed fortunate to have begun the vaccination drive rather early in the day, just a couple of months after developed countries such as the UK and USA. The credit for this initiative should go to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa and the Government, which took quick action to secure vaccine supplies. This is a creditable achievement, given that more than 100 developing countries have not been able to vaccinate even a single individual up to now as rich countries hoard vaccines and "lock in" further orders. In fact, some rich countries have ordered vaccine doses that can inoculate their entire populations five times over.

Sri Lanka has however managed to vaccinate close to one million people, including frontline health workers and Security Forces/Police personnel. The COVAX vaccine doses are being given to those over 60, while the earlier consignment was given to those aged between 30 and 60. This avoids the whole question of age groups, with one school of thought calling for the elderly to be vaccinated first while another wanted the working age population to get the jabs. This way, both sectors have been covered. Even accounting for the delays from the SII side, Sri Lanka should be able to vaccinate everyone apart from schoolchildren and pregnant women by the end of the year or even earlier. There is hope for schoolchildren too, judging by the latest research. Trials conducted in the US among 12 to 15 year olds by Pfizer, which was the first to enter the now-crowded Covid vaccine arena with a new technology mRNA-based vaccine, has shown that the vaccine is 100 percent effective against the onset of serious disease and hospitalization. Moderna, the other mRNA-based vaccine maker, is also conducting trials among children. Both companies hope to conduct the trials all the way down to two-year-olds.

It will be vital to inoculate schoolchildren to ensure the smooth continuation of in-person classroom teaching. Online teaching has not been a roaring success even in the developed countries, due to broadband limitations and lack of access to computers. Besides, school is much more than textbook lessons, with attributes such as discipline, play, group work, obedience and punctuality also coming into the picture. Going by the "mantra" that no one is safe until everyone is safe, the teachers will also feel reassured if their students are also vaccinated.

Our health authorities should keep an eye on these developments and order vaccines for the younger generation as soon as they are authorized for use elsewhere in the world. Granted, Pfizer is expensive at nearly US\$ 20 a dose, but broadly similar results could be expected from the other vaccines too. As for pregnant women and infants, they will have to wait for some more time as research has not yet been completed.

Sri Lanka is fortunate in that there is zero vaccine hesitancy here. Nevertheless, there should be frequent Public Service Announcements (PSAs) on TV and radio extolling the virtues of vaccination, urging citizens to get the shot when their turn comes. That will help Sri Lanka achieve herd immunity within this year and see the back of the dreaded Coronavirus.

China's 'Precision Poverty Alleviation' and Lanka's

'Gama Samaga Pilisandara'

hinese President Xi Jinping, in his telephone conversation with President Gotabaya Rajapaksa earlier this week, said that China can lend a hand to Sri Lanka in the eradication of poverty adding that China succeeded in ending extreme poverty among nine million people.

President Rajapaksa said that the Hambantota Port Project and development of infrastructure facilities are continuing in a satisfactory manner and urged the government of China to complete the project work. He said he is committed to put the country on the track of prosperity within the next four years in office. "The eradication of poverty is my prime concern for which we can take a cue from China," President Rajapaksa said.

On September 25, 2020, President Gotabaya launched the 'Discussion with the Village' (Game Samaga Pilisandara) programme in Haldummulla in the Badulla district. The core intention of this programme is to meet the people of the remote villages outside the city who have not been given due attention so far, and inquire into their problems, to bring them to the notice of the officials at the same time, and provide solutions. The ultimate aim of the programme is to eradicate rural poverty.

Chinese President Xi Jinping commenced a similar programme by continuously conducting such grassroots visits since he became President of China in the beginning of 2013. His programme titled, "Precision Poverty Alleviation" began with a visit to Shi Ba Dong Village, Hu Heng County, Hu Nan province, which is a remote village, marked by rampant poverty.

Right after President Xi's visit to this village, a national campaign to alleviate poverty with precise and sustainable solutions has been developed, till December 2020. China has successfully eliminated extreme poverty in the history of its two thousand and two hundred years in existence as a state.

Based on the experiences and success achieved with the Precision Poverty campaign, China had further developed its rural development mechanism to a comprehensive system called "Rural Revitalization", launched in January 2018. In January 2021, while still being challenged by domestic and international challenges caused by the pandemic, the Chinese government issued the No.1 Government Document to set "Rural Revitalization" as the top priority of President Xi's administration. China would like to share its experiences and solutions with other developing countries through innovative international cooperation.

President Xi has emphasized that the reason why his administration has put rural livelihood development and upgrading among the top priorities is because a really healthy and strong country or a human society cannot be formed without a solid foundation of the happiness of their people coming from different geographic and social backgrounds, especially the most vulnerable ones. This is not merely a mission of China, but the vision for the next level of human civilization.

Chief Researcher of International Research Center for NeoChina Socialism, Liu Yang Sloan says there is vast potential to integrate China's RR experiences into the Sri Lankan context and form a duplicate mechanism for other developing countries. It is believed that the system will be able to integrate international support and investment directly to even the most remote corners on earth through cutting-edge technologies such as GIS and Blockchain. "We will take a close follow-up look at this mechanism and see how such a miracle is happening here in Sri Lanka," he added.

To develop a comprehensive and sound rural revitalization system which can deal with the complexity of the rural situations in each developing country is not an easy job. However,

thanks to the joint work of the International Research Center of NeoChina Socialism , National Youth Service Council, Sri Lanka Telecom, Colombo Stock Exchange and a number of other technical and social institutions in Sri Lanka and China, an integrated RR mechanism called 3DRROS is currently under development in Sri Lanka, Liu and

President Rajapaksa sought Chinese assistance for the establishment of a Technology University in Hambantota as a symbol of close and cordial relations between the two nations. With regard to cooperation in technology for economic development, Chinese Researcher Liu detailed the proposed cooperation under the academic enhancement campaign of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathe-

matics (STEM) which has been widely accepted by the world to boost human, social and economic development for any specific region. As the entire human race is facing the unprecedented challenges caused but the COVID-19 pandemic, continuous out-of-box solutions must come on stage as soon as possible to meet the urgent needs of the people, especially the most vulnerable ones, he said. All such solutions should be objective and STEM based so that they can be delivered to the people efficiently to make some real changes.

Liu pointed out that President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has a sound technical background with his academic achievement while studying as an IT student in Colombo University and working as a Unix Solaris Expert in the USA and he has a clear understanding about the importance of integrating the STEM environment into the social development of Sri Lanka.

"Ever since the establishment of the Ministry of Technology and as the Minister, President Rajapaksa has emphasized the necessity to immediately equip Sri Lankan youth with STEM related knowledge and skills to better deal with the current challenges and difficulties of their personal lives in national and international scenarios," he said.

When it comes to Rural Revitalization, STEM means to bring all the cutting-edge technology to the rural area and make the miracles happen, starting from satellite based smart agriculture to all sorts of agricultural equipment to comprehensive e-commerce mechanism which can link the rural products to the world market efficiently to smart classrooms which will pave a solid foundation for rural children so that they can have enough capabilities to change their lives and make their hometown better sustainably.

Senior Advisor Hemal Dias of International Research Center for Neochina recalled that since independence all the successive governments in Sri Lanka have focused on poverty alleviation with the introduction of many programmes such as Janasaviva, Samurdi and Gamaneguma, but many people still live below the poverty line. "The majority of our rural families are still poor and droughts, floods, diseases, and economic shocks could drag huge numbers further into poverty. To lift themselves out of poverty, rural people need to learn new skills and one of our main tasks through the Rural Revitalization (RR) project in Sri Lanka is to help rural people learn and practise new skills so they can improve their incomes from their newly acquired expertise," he explained.

During his telephone conversation on March 29, Chinese President Xi said China is willing to work with Sri Lanka to enhance the Belt and Road cooperation and contribute to the economic revival of Sri Lanka in the post-pandemic era. He said China will continue to provide necessary assistance to Sri Lanka, conduct cooperation in areas including aviation and education, and explore other potential cooperation

Chinese President Xi while assuring continuous support for the sustainable development of Sri Lanka informed President Gotabaya Rajapaksa that China firmly stands by Sri Lanka in the face of unjust pressure exerted at various multilateral forums.

President Rajapaksa thanked China for donating 600,000 COVID-19 vaccine doses to Sri Lanka. He also paid his gratitude to President Xi and the Chinese Government for standing by Sri Lanka at the 46th session of the UN Human Rights Council.

The President also appreciated the swap facility offered by the People's Bank of China to the Central Bank and reiterated that this facility will lead to Sri Lanka's financial stability.

The Concept of Equality and Elimination of Discrimination in Employment: Scope and Developments

Attorney at Law ristotle's analysis of justice shows the very close relationship between equality and the con-

cept of justice. Indeed, for many laymen, if not philosophers, justice is equality. Theoretical speculation on the concept of equality reveals its many complexities for there are numerous senses in which the concept of equality may be understood. Aristotle, when he formulated his principle of distributive equality, was speaking in terms of social goods and rewards to equals. How equality is determined is a matter for which philosophical speculation by itself can give no answer. It is also extremely difficult to decide what cases are 'like' for there are always similarities and differences.

However, in the complex social, economic and political contexts in which every individual lives, the concept of equality is an extremely difficult one for the law to apply. This does not mean however that efforts at achieving some measure of equality through law are futile. A great deal has been achieved already and will undoubtedly be achieved in the future. It is necessary that difficulties be understood and that a conscious choice be made in each discussion of the variety of equality that is being examined. To speak of equality in the abstract or in general terms often clouds the issue.

The ILO and Core Labour Standards

Income inequality between the rich and poor is increasing almost everywhere in the world, because among other factors, of the weakened bargaining strength of labour, due to multiple options available to capital in the globalized economy. Intensified global competition is adversely affecting the working conditions and labour standards the world over.

Calls for re-asserting social and labour rules relating to work environment in today's global market place, culminated in 1998 with the historic International Labour Conference of the International Labour Organization (ILO), a solemn declaration of 'Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work', emphasizing on eight ILO Conventions – No. 29, 87, 98, 100, 105, 111, 138, and 182. While all ILO Conventions are important, the international community during the late 1990s had underlined the importance of this particular group of Conventions, known as 'the core labour standards'. The core labour standards are binding on all member States of the ILO including on those states, which have not ratified the eight conventions. They are both 'universal and inalienable and are not relevant to the stage of economic development of the country' and are binding on all the member states, irrespective of their economic progress. Following this Declaration, all member States of the ILO are obliged to respect, promote and realize in good faith the eight core con-

Sri Lanka has also ratified the eight core conventions. The ILO identified these core labour standards following the Social Summit held in Copenhagen in 1995 which set the 'Millennium Goals' and the 'Global Compact' as the social floor of the emerging global economy, to counteract the erosion of worker rights. The ILO

felt that good governance of the labour market based on respect for fundamental principles and rights can contribute to a stable social and political environment and made the Declaration as the key to such an environment. Social dimension is essential to the success of the structural adjustment and good social policy is an integral part of economic efficiency.

The aforesaid ILO Declaration obliges its member States to respect the principles that are the heart of these core Conventions, which include (a) freedom of association (No.87); (b) effective recognition of the right to engage in collective bargaining (No.98); (c) elimination of forced or compulsory labour (Nos. 29 and 105); (d) elimination of discrimination in employment (Nos. 100 and 111); and (e) elimination of child labour and child abuse (Nos. 138 and 182).

The Elimination of Discrimination in **Employment Conventions**

Out of the above-mentioned eight core Conventions, two are related to the elimination of discrimination in employment. They are (i) the Equal Remuneration Convention No.100 of 1951; and (ii) Elimination Discrimination (Employment and Occupation) Convention No. 111 of 1958.

The right to freedom from discrimination is inherent in the ILO Constitution and in the labour standards. The Equal Remuneration Convention No. 100 of 1951 emphasizes the need to promote 'equal remuneration for men and women for work of equal value' while the Elimination Discrimination Employment (and Occupation) Convention No.111 of 1958 defines discrimination as 'any distinc-

tion, exclusion for preference made on the basis of race, colour, sex, religion, political opinion, national extraction or social origin which has the effect of nullifying or impairing equality of opportunity or treatment in employment or occupation' and allows additional criteria included after consultation by the Government with the employers and

worker organizations. It aims to promote equality of opportunity and treatment for men and women workers with family responsibilities.



Discrimination bars people from some occupations, denies them a job altogether at times and does not reward them according to their merit on account of their ethnicity, race, caste, sex or social background. This generates a social and economic disadvantage that in turn leads to inefficiency and unequal outcomes. Discrimination at work is a violation of human rights that entails a waste of human talents, with detrimental effects on productivity and may lead to social upheavals and may adversely affect investment and economic growth.

Discrimination may be direct or indirect direct when rules, practices and policies, exclude openly, people of certain ethnicity or of certain political party or give preference to certain individuals. Discrimination also occurs when for the same job of 'equal value' a migrant worker – an expatriate receives a higher pay than a national. Forms of direct discrimination include job advertisements stating discriminating conditions. Human resource practice that requires conditions prohibiting female employees marrying while in employment, is an act of violation of the Conventions Nos. 100 and 111. Discrimination is indirect when apparently neutral forms and practices have disproportionate effect on one or more identifiable groups without justification. Differential treatment of particular categories of workers in the form of inferior social benefits or remuneration also amounts

to discrimination. The lower protection granted to domestic servants (most of them are lower income male and female workers belonging to racial and ethnic minorities) are also tantamount to discrimination and a violation of the above two Conventions.

The State has a major responsibility in ensuring equality, not only in the public sector but also in private sector workplaces. Equally the trade unions and employers too have the responsibility to ensure that discrimination does not prevail in their workplaces. Despite a number of positive moves in terms of policies and legislation, the overall conditions of women in Sri Lanka had not significantly changed. Bias in recruitment in working conditions, gender-based low wages or salaries and cultural inhibitions, still keep the gender gap wide.

Collective Bargaining and Equality

With regard to the interface between collective bargaining and equality, one important fact is that these two fundamental principles and rights are mutually reinforcing and can together promote workplace governance which reconciles economic with social goals. Unequal access to collective bargaining is an equality challenge. Inequitable access to collective bargaining is a human rights issue that implicates systematic discrimination against historically disadvantaged groups in the work-

For equality to be advanced through the collective bargaining process, it is essential that trade unions and employers be committed to seeking it. The process of preparing for collective bargaining by both unions and employers and the setting of bargaining demands and priorities should include an assessment of existing problems of inequality and discrimination. Inclusive strategies for consultation

and participation of historically excluded and disadvantaged groups are essential to identifying and defining problems of inequality.



An important starting point for implementing equality at work is inclusion in the collective agreement of a basic commitment to equality and non-discrimination.

Equality rights clauses may also serve as interpretive aids to other provisions in the collective agreement. In the face of ambiguity or potentially contradictory provisions in the collective agreements, an anti-discriminatory clause may reinforce interpretations that are consistent with equality. There is much potential within collective agreements to promote equality. Creative bargains struck in a context-sensitive fashion can greatly enhance the promotion of


Legislation setting a floor of decent working conditions, including minimum wage laws, restrictions on hours of work, minimum rest periods as well as occupational safety and health legislative systems, serve a crucial equality role. Bringing equality to the workplace has significant economic benefits too. Employers who practice equality have access to a larger and more diverse workforce. Workers who enjoy equality have greater access to training, often receive higher wages and improve the overall quality of the workforce. The profits of a globalized economy are more fairly distributed in a society with equality, leading to greater social stability and broader public support for further economic development. Those dreaded words, 'failing to prevent an accident'



ailing to prevent an accident" is one of the most often bandied about legal terms that confound people when discussing liability for road accidents. It comes under the rubric of contributory negligence, in the branch of civil law. Oftentimes, those who have been accused of failing to prevent an accident are perplexed why they are being faulted at all. Maybe they shouldn't be, as the success of the appeal in the following case indicates. (Hemachandra v. Ayoob and Another - SLR -309, Vol. 1 of 1987 [1986] LKCA 38; (1987) 1 Sri LR 309 (26 March 1986).

The Plaintiff in the District Court was the Appellant in Appeal Court. The Court of Appeal noted the circumstances of the case in this way, in judgement: "The case of the Plaintiff briefly had been that when he was riding this motorcycle along Galle Road from the direction of Fort towards Bambalapitiya this car driven by the Second Defendant emerged from Edward Lane

into Galle Road and in attempting to cross the line of traffic to proceed towards Fort, collided with his motorcycle as a result of which he sustained the injuries which constitute the foundation of his claim. The Plaintiff had contended that the proximate cause of this accident was the negligence of the Second Defendant which gave rise to the liability of the latter to make good the damages claimed. The Defendants however had taken up the position that it was the contributory negligence, if not negligence of the Plaintiff, that brought about the accident."

The primary issue was to determine who was at fault when a driver of a motorcar cut into a main road from a by-lane and passed two rows of stationary traffic, only to crash into a motorcycle when he proceeded to cross the third lane of traffic, which unbe-

knownst to him, was moving. The Judges of the Court of Appeal explained things in this way, in judgement: "To put it precisely and with respect to the case before us I

think it was the duty of the Second Defendant to have halted his car at the top of Edward Lane before entering Galle Road (without having proceeded up to the centre line as he says he did) and then to have crossed the landside half of Galle Road to enter the seaside half only when it was possible to do so without obstructing the traffic going toward Bambalapitiya, that is, when the landside half of Galle Road was reasonably clear of traffic at this point to permit the Second Defendant to cross this half without imperilling the safety of such traffic."

The motorcyclist in this case under review was a policeman. When the car abruptly cut in before him, he took evasive action by sharply turning to his right to avoid the car getting in his way, but crashed into the left side lamp of the car nevertheless. The Court of Appeal Bench cited the case vide Martindale v. Wolfaardt ((1)-Negligence in Delict by Macintosh and Scoble, 4th Ed.

pp. 288 and 289) and noted, "În such a situation if evasive action of some kind is taken by him (such as what the Plaintiff says he attempted to do here) in my view one cannot find much fault with that or term it contributory negligence even if such action might not have been of the optimum kind that might have been taken had there been the time and opportunity to do so.'

The salient aspect of the case was that the District Court had declined to award the Plaintiff motorcyclist policeman damages on the basis that he contributed to the accident through his negligence.

However, the Court of Appeal took the view that the probabilities are that the Second Defendant drove his car up to the centre line completely blocking the path of the motorcycle which was close to it, thus rendering it necessary for the Plaintiff to move to the right in an attempt to avoid the



President's Counsel for the Respondents contended that the damage being to the left front side of the car points to negligence of the part of the Plaintiff. But the Judges of the higher Court thought otherwise. They decided that such damage is compatible with the Plaintiff having tried to avoid the impact without success, and being hit by the area of the left front headlamp of the car.

A sketch of the circumstances of the accident produced at the trial, they said, supported that view. Most offenders cite contributory negligence on the part of the victim of a road accident, and get away.

The Court of Appeal did not allow that outcome in the case under review, though the DC earlier had allowed it. The DC

judgement was set aside. "I set aside the judgement of the learned District Judge and give judgment for the plaintiff-Appellant as prayed for in his plaint. He will also be entitled to his costs in this court and in the court below," wrote His Lordship Goonewardena J, ruling in favour of the Appellant.

That was in a civil court. In a criminal action, the legal terminology may be different, though the circumstances under consideration may be similar.

A bus driver, a First Defendant in a subsequent civil lawsuit for damages was charged in the Magistrate's Court for negligent driving and failure to avoid an accident under the Motor Traffic Act. He pleaded guilty to the second count, i.e., failure to avoid an accident and the first count, i.e., negli-



gent driving, was withdrawn by the police. The details of the charge that he pleaded guilty to, as noted by the Court of Appeal subsequently were: "A cow was coming across the road, the Respondent braked his motorcycle and the toppling happened in front of the Appellant. He had the last opportunity to avoid the accident, but he could not, because he was driving the bus too fast. It was the Appellant who had the last opportunity but not the Respondent. The Respondent cannot be blamed for contributory negligence."

In short, a motorcyclist encountered a cow crossing the road, and braked his vehicle violently to avoid the animal. However, he toppled and fell, and a bus coming from behind crashed into him. He was hospitalized and had his spleen removed.

On appeal (North Colombo Regional Transport Board, Vs. Aparekkage Wasantha Pushpakumara Perea, CA 977/98 (F)) by the Plaintiff bus driver, Court of Appeal cited the case

of Daniel V. Cooray. 42 NLR 422, explaining that, "in cases where the Defendant pleads contributory negligence the inquiry resolves itself in an elucidation of the question as to which party, by the exercise of ordinary care, had the last opportunity of preventing the occurrence."

or seven decades the Sri Lanka Navy has secured our maritime domain. Apart from its ocean-going fleet the Navy has augmented its combat capability on land with elite Special Forces personnel. One of the formidable fighting units of the Navy is the Special Boat Squadron (SBS). They are the toughest and well-trained strategic combatants, with amphibious assault capacity in our country. They perform their clandestine missions with stealth and speed surprising the enemy. During a visit to Trincomalee, I was able to visit their headquarters located deep within dense forest, at an undisclosed location. The drive took me along paths where deer and monkey crossed at random. Upon reaching their camp, the first image visible was that of a mounted black statue beneath which the squadrons motto was painted 'Fortune favours the Brave'

In retrospect, as the LTTE increased its sea borne threats by using suicide boats, divers, mines and littoral attacks in lagoons and coastal water, the Sri Lanka Navy had to outsmart the enemy. One of the pioneers in the Navy who realized the need for a special force element was Lieutenant Commander Shanthi Bahar, who led a team of specially trained sailors into the jungle thickets of Trincomalee.

They searched and engaged concealed enemy positions. The history of this Naval outfit dates back to 1993 when a dynamic young officer named Lieutenant Commander Ravi Wijegunartne was inspired to form a special unit with rapid strike capability (he rose to become an Admiral and Commander of the Navy). Along with a likeminded comrade Commander Cedric Martenstvn there were 30 men who volunteered for this dangerous task at that time. The Special Boat Squadron of the Sri Lanka Navy was formally raised on January 18, 1993, at the SLN Elara Base, Karainagar, in the Northern Prov-

Later a total of two officers and

The elite naval

76 sailors also became part of the team. Training in the secluded hot beaches of Karainagar the team enhanced their skills. Cdr. Martenstyn was later killed in action. In the early stages the SBS focused their training to fight in brown waters and coastal shallows. Their first mission was to support an amphibious landing near the Pooneryn Army Camp, which they successfully did under enemy fire moving from Inshore Patrol Craft (IPC). They managed to reinforce the camp. The SBS functions under the Director General Operations, Navy Head Quarters who is assisted by the Director Marine Special Forces. The elite SBS operates in a wide spectrum of clandestine operations – they include securing a



beach head prior to an amphibious operation, beach reconnaissance, gathering intelligence in enemy dominated coastal areas (during the war), waterborne infiltrations to destroy enemy assets, offensive mining and mine clearance, antiship hijack missions and hostage rescue tasks, combat diving operations, counterterrorism operations

and even VIP protection. Joining the SBS is not an easy task. It is a process that tests your physical and mental endurance filtering the toughest sailors. Prospective candidates are enlisted persons serving in the Navy. They have to pass a hard PT test that includes swimming, which is a vital part of SBS operations by day and night. Once chosen, the aspiring officers and sailors are committed to one year of intense training. Stage 1 has six weeks of orienta-



tion where the trainee is made physically fit. During this period they do endurance marches beginning from 3Km and gradually going up to 30 Km carrying a full pack with an assault rifle. The aspiring trainees encourage each other to complete these demanding marches. The teams firing capability is increased along with swimming skills. Combat swimming is very different from swimming for recreation in serene waters. Here the Naval fighter must not make any noise or cause ripples in the water. Further the lagoon or sea area he is entering can have concealed nets and mines. The teams operate in the sea, lagoons and rivers: each area of water presenting its natural hazards. Rivers are home to crocodiles and some species of snakes. Recruits are taught to stay submerged in the water for many

any cost they must hold their position to duly finish the task. During the jungle training phase, these young men must navigate the forest paths by day and night. The jungle has its own wild threats from lone elephants, roaming bears and poisonous snakes. Each man must do a 4Km jungle trek at night alone.

Once they have completed the training the men will operate in small teams. According to an officer the eight man team has a leader, scout, gunners, communicator and medic. They have undertaken dangerous missions often going Behind Enemy Lines. During these deployments they survive on high protein ration packs. Lighting a fire and cooking will produce smoke and give away the concealed position thereby alerting the enemy. Those

sailors who excel in these tasks are absorbed into the highly covert LRRP Team (Long Range Reconnaissance Patrol). The SBS has members who specialize as snipers, combat divers and parachute jump-ers. These skills when combined extend the operational reach of the Special Boat Squadron. The present Commanding Officer of SBS is Captain Nissanka Wickramasinghe.

Over the years, the squadron has expanded its mission capability, being able to excel in jungle and maritime warfare, asymmetric warfare, urban fighting and VBSS. The VBSS teams (Vessel Boarding and Sea Search) experience high-octane action. VBSS takes place in the deep sea, where a raiding party attempts to board a moving vessel, entering the vessel by climbing on a flexible ladder. Engaging is such tasks truly requires nerves of steel. The SBS operatives also excel in anti-ship hijack operations. They train regularly to keep themselves in prime condition. In the recent past, the SBS reached new heights of excellence where they trained Naval commandos from USA, China, India, Pakistan and Nigeria. This is testament to the combat experience that the Sri Lankans have accumulated, especially in small team operations. Joining the Navy and becoming a member of the Special Boat Squadron is the ultimate Special Forces career induced with adventure, for any young man.

The lessons from the *Ever Given* saga

On Monday afternoon (March 29) in Egypt, the tide turned. An armada of tugboats, dredgers and salvage crews had toiled for days to move the *Ever Given* — a massive container ship that managed to get stuck between the Suez Canal's banks on Tuesday, March 23 — out of its rut. At last, it came free and lurched north toward the Bitter Lakes, where authorities could inspect the skyscraper-sized vessel without impeding maritime traffic.

The mishap had led to the ship choking off the Suez Canal, a manmade strait that sees more than a tenth of all global shipping pass through every year, for almost a week. While it provided no end of memes and mirth on social media, the blockage cost an estimated \$9.6 billion in daily delays and served as a reminder of the extent to which the global economy still moves on sea — that is, about of 70 percent of all international trade.

It also could take close to another week to unsnarl the traffic jam of hundreds of other ships and tankers waiting to make the same passage. The supply-chain impacts of these disruptions may play out over many months to come. WorldView considers other lessons from this latest Suez crisis:

IT'S A GLOBAL STORY

Egyptian President Abdel Fatah al-Sissi hailed the freeing of the vessel as a national success for his countrymen. "He portrayed the efforts as a patriotic victory that assured the world that Egypt could be trusted with overseeing the 13 percent of all global trade that passes through the crucial waterway," my colleagues noted.

Yet the dramatis personae of the whole episode represented a veritable floating — or in this instance, perhaps, "refloating" — United Nations. Consider the mammoth container ship itself: The MV Ever Given was owned by a company in Japan, operated by a container shipping firm based in Taiwan,

managed by a German company and registered in Panama.

The ship's journey saw it conveying goods from Asia to Europe, specifically the Dutch port of Rotterdam. It ran aground amid a Middle Eastern sandstorm and was rescued by a multinational coalition that included Japanese and Dutch salvage teams and local Egyptian tugboat operators.

Lastly, the ship's 25 crew members were all Indian nationals, part of a legion of close to two million seafarers — many from impoverished backgrounds in South and Southeast Asia — who literally keep international trade moving.

Thanks to coronavirus-era border restrictions, hundreds of thousands of sailors have languished aboard their often cramped ships beyond the terms of their contracts, invisible workers in what one captain described to the Financial Times as the "shadow sector" of the global economy. The ship's ordeal also highlighted the fragility of the global economy.A century and a half ago, the opening of the Suez Canal heralded an era of global fast shipping that has only accelerated in the decades since. Over the past half-century, meanwhile, capacity

on cargo ships has mushroomed by about 1,500 percent, expanding the range of available consumer goods and lowering prices around the world, as Peter Goodman of the New York Times observed.

But those increases in size are creating bottlenecks in highly trafficked arteries such as the Suez Canal. "The ships today are bigger than they used to be," a pilot working for the Suez Canal Authority told my colleagues, saying that navigating vessels such as the Ever Given through the canal was becoming more taxing. "This is something new. We haven't seen this before.'

The vulnerabilities of an interdependent world, where one product may be produced and delivered through supply chains threading multiple continents, are also on show. "For global trade, already reeling under soaring freight rates, equipment shortages and space crunch on ships in the wake of disruptions triggered by the pandemic, the grounding of the Ever Given could not have come at a worse time," journalist P Manoj wrote in *The Hindu*, an Indian newspaper. "The disruptions from the closure of the Canal could last for months

and port congestion, equipment shortages and capacity shortages on ships are set to intensify."

"Even shipments that don't go through Suez will be affected, as factories wait on essential components arriving from elsewhere before they can make products to send off," former merchant mariner Salvatore Mercogliano wrote for The Post's Outlook section. "Gas and oil prices will spike.

The incident also revived talk of alternate routes — from the old, far longer and more costly journey around the southern tip of Africa to the promise of a northern passage in the Arctic as melting ice at the roof of the world opens new pathways. "The incident in the Suez Canal should make everyone think about diversifying strategic sea routes amid the increasing scope of sea shipping," Nikolai Korchunov, Russia's envoy for international cooperation in the Arctic, said Friday.

A WORLD OF CHOKE POINTS

The blockage of the Suez Canal offered a potent reminder of how important a handful of key maritime passages is to the whole global economy, as well as the strategic calculations of regional powers. A

crisis there, or the Panama Canal, or the Strait of Malacca, or the Strait of Hormuz would roil global markets and — depending on the context — trigger potential standoffs between rival navies.

Some analysts saw on the relative farce of the Ever Given's foundering a glimpse of thornier crises to come. China is dependent on vast imports of oil and iron ore and has arguably structured the bulk of its foreign policy — including its ambitious Belt and Road Initiative — to secure its far-flung trade net-

"Unlike the U.S., which is a net exporter of crude these days, China imports nearly three-quarters of the oil it consumes, as well as about four-fifths of the iron ore it uses to fuel its frantic pace of infrastructure buildout — not to mention most of the goods exports it uses to obtain hard currency to pay for these commodities," David Fickling and Anjani Trivedi of Bloomberg Opinion wrote.

They added: "That makes it peculiarly vulnerable to maritime blockades.

The geography of east Asia means that the straits of Malacca and Singapore, plus the quasistraits that run through the navigable stretches of the South China Sea and those separating Taiwan from the Philippines, Japan's Okinawa islands and the Chinese mainland, are all highly vulnerable to interdictions in the event of con-

In other words, choke points such as the Suez Canal are bound to be even greater sites of geopolitical rivalry and tension. All the more reason, argued James Stavridis, a retired U.S. admiral and former supreme allied commander at NATO, for world powers to figure out a collective system for administering them.

"In all of these locations we should put significant focus on creating international authorities who manage them with an appreciation for their international character (the Suez and Panama canals both have well run authorities); conduct frequent drills and exercises to practise for disasters like the one that has just occurred in the Suez Canal; have internationally funded resources to make sure they can remain open in crisis (as was done on an ad hoc basis in the Suez); and have an international regime with regulatory powers inspect all of them frequently," he wrote in Time magazine. (Washington Post)

01. 'e-Grama Niladhari' **Project**

Accordingly, the Cabinet of Ministers has granted approval to the resolution tabled by the President as the Defence Minister for implementing the said project by the State Ministry of Internal Affairs with the consultancy of Sri Lanka Information and Communication Technological Agency (ICTA).

02. Implementation of flood minimising projects during

The Sri Lanka Land Development Corporation has recognized the flood minimising projects to be implemented during 2021 for minimising floods occurring within Colombo and its suburbs as well as out of Colombo and ensuring environmentally sustainable urbanization. The Cabinet of Minister granted their approval to the proposal furnished by the Prime Minister as Urban Development and Housing Minister for the implementation of the said projects utilising Rs. 2,800 million allocated to the Sri Lanka Land Development Corporation for 2021.

03. Implementation of a research project on the utilization of chemical fertilizer consisting of Nitrogen.

Considering the environmental impact and destruction due to nonmanagement of chemical fertilizer (especially Nitrogen) correctly within the Asian region, the International Nitrogen Management Systems-INMS) jointed with the United Nations Environmental Programme (UNEP) has planned to implement a multi- purpose research proposal based in the South -Asian region in regard to use of fertilizer with Nitrogen in various cultivation fields. It has been planned to perform the collection of data in relation to Nitrogen damage and release of greenhouse gases in the cultivation fields selected by the proposed research study (Vegetables - Nuwara Eliya and Kalpitiya) (Rice – Anuradhapura), making aware the farmers in regard to that, identification of atmospheric pollution based on the minimum diversity of vegetation in the highland forests and making aware of the farmer community and the stakeholders for creation of a better Nitrogen Management systems with the intention of reducing the Nitrogen damage within the project period of 05 years under this project. Accordingly, the proposal furnished by the Minister of Education to enter into a partnership agreement among the University of Peradeniya and the United Kingdom Research and Innovation-UKRI) Institute, Global Challenges Research Fund and the South Asian Nitrogen Hub (SANH) for the implementation of this project is approved by the Cabinet of Ministers.



04. Partnership agreement between the Peradeniya University and the **International Development** Research Centre (IDRC) in Canada.

Countries have taken numerous strategic precautions to control and minimise the impact of COVID-19 pandemic and its damage. However, a research project has been planned to be implemented in regard to the impact to women, children and minimum beneficiary social groups due to some of the strategies followed by certain countries. Accordingly, the proposal furnished by the Minister of Education to enter into a partnership agreement between the University of Peradeniya and the International Development Research Centre (IDRC) for the implementation of the said project in Sri Lanka and Malaysia as the basis is approved by the Cabinet of Ministers.

05. MOU between the Ruhuna **University's Agriculture Facul**tv and the Graduate School of **Environmental and Life Sci**ence, of the Okayama University of Japan.

It was proposed to enter into a memorandum of understanding between the Ruhuna University's Agriculture Faculty and the Graduate School of Environmental and Life Science, of the University of Okayama of Japan to enhance higher educational cooperation and international relations. It has been planned to launch student exchange programmes, faculties and staff exchange programmes and conduct corporate researches as well as exchange experimented information. Accordingly, the Cabinet of Ministers granted approval to the resolution furnished by the Minister of Education for entering into the said educational accord initially for five years.

06. Obtaining service facilities from Sri Lanka Telecom for the Motor Traffic Department.

A large number of commuters gather at the head office, the office at Werahera, and district level offices in order to obtain services from the Motor Traffic Department. Since both the commuters and the officers of the Department are suppressed by due to the prevailing circumstances, it has been planned to apply solutions by utilizing novel information and communication technology for the activities such as allocating a scheduled time ahead of time to obtain their services, obtaining a number or token for that, guiding to access the relevant divisions for services and notification of relevant information by SMS. Accordingly, the Cabinet of Ministers granted approval to the proposal submitted by the Transport Minister for the implementation of the said project in conjunction with Sri

Lanka Telecom, implementation of the project in Narahenpita, Werahera and five other District Secretariats with online facilities as the first phase and extend the project to 19 other remaining district offices under the second phase.

07. Establishment of Cyclotron-based Radiopharmaceuticals production Centre in Sri Lanka

Fluorodeoxyglucose (18F-FDG) is a radioactive drug and is being used for PET and CT Tests that conducted to diagnose cancers A special device called Cycclotron is used to produce this drug and, Sri Lanka has to import this radioactive drug since the required facilities are not available in Sri Lanka. Due to the radioactive decay, about 97% of the capacity of the drug is lost when imported from India. Only 10 patients can be treated from the remaining capacity. Although there is a need to test about 30,000 patients annually, due to this only a capacity of 1,600 patients can be tested. It costs the government around Rs. 54,000 to test one patient using the imported drug. If the drug is manufactured locally, the cost can be reduced to Rs.14,000. Considering this situation, the Government has planned to set up a Deoxy Glucose Drug Manufacturing Center at Kotelawala Defence University Hospital premises in Werahera in collaboration with the Atomic Energy Board of Sri Lanka. Accordingly the Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal presented by the Minister of Power to implement the project.

08. Allocation of lands from Regional Industrial Zones to set up industries

The Project Evaluation Committees and Regional Industrial Services Committee of the Ministry of Industries have recommended the allocation of 16 plots of land in 9 industrial to investors for commencing new industries. The 9 industrial estates above are Nalanda (Matale), Bataatha, Karandeniya, Udukawa, Embilipitiya, Kaluthara, Batticaloa and Nawagampura. The Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal presented by the Minister of Industries to allocate the said lands on a 35 year lease basis subjecting to condition that "it cannot be transferred to other parties" with other relevant conditions.

09. Introducing a method to protect petroleum consumers

At the beginning, the Ceylon Petroleum Corporation was responsible for all the activities in relation to petroleum industry. However, a number of parties are currently engaged in such activities. The Public Utilities Commission of Sri Lanka has been appointed as the regulatory body for the petroleum industry. However, the role of the agency is limited to advising and assisting the Ministry on policies and

regulation of the lubricant industry. Under these circumstances, no practical mechanism has been established to protect the rights of petroleum consumers. Therefore, it is proposed to establish an independent, transparent mechanism for receiving and resolving consumer complaints under the supervision of the Ministry of Energy and Sri Lanka Public Utilities Commission. Public Utilities Commission of Sri Lanka, Sri Lanka Customs, Consumer Services Authority, Sri Lanka Customs, Sri Lanka Police, Sri Lanka Standards and other relevant government agencies will be involved in the implementation of the proposed methodology. Accordingly the Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal presented by the Energy Minister to implement the Declaration of Consumer Rights and Responsibilities and the "Complaint Handling and Dispute Resolution Procedure" and to enter in to a MOU with other relevant Govt. Insti-

10. The procurement for designing, manufacturing, supplying, Installing, operating and delivering of a single sleeper multiple tie tamping machine for the Railways Department.

International competitive bids are called for manufacturing and delivering a single sleeper multiple tie tamping machine for the Department of Sri Lanka Railway in order to increase the volume of maintains of the Department of Railway and to minimise the maintaining expenses. Accordingly, the proposal tabled by the Minister of Transport to award the relevant procurement to the M/S Matisa Materiel Industrial.S.A.Switzerland at an amount of US\$ 4.96 Million, as recommended by the standing committee on procurement appointed by the Cabinet of Ministers, was approved by the Cabinet of Ministers.

11. Awarding the four civil work contract packages to rehabilitate, ameliorate and maintain the Colombo to Kandy (A001) Road (from 44+ KM to 100+000 KM)

Local competitive bids are called to award the four civil work contract packages to rehabilitate, ameliorate and maintain the Colombo - Kandy Road segment 44 KM to 100 KM.As per 47 bids have been submitted by 15 bidders. The Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal tabled by the Minister of Highways to award the relevant contract packages to the substantial responsive bidders as recommended by the standing committee on procurements appointed by the Cabinet of Ministers.

12. Amendments to the Firearms Ordinance, No.33 (Chapter 182) of 1916 amended by the Act, No.22 of 1996.

The Cabinet of Ministers on June 13, 2007 decided to further amend the Firearm Ordinance, No.33 (Chapter 182) of 1916 amended by the Act, No.22 of 1996. However, the Draft Bill was delayed due to the amendments adduced to it intermittently. Therefore, the proposal submitted by the President as Defence Minister to

advice the Legal Draftsman to draft the Bill by including all the relevant amendments appropriate to the present requirements.


13. Drafting the National **Community Water Supply Development Bill.**

Subsequently to the establishment of the Department of National Community Water Supply, the Department regulates and empowers community based organizations managed by the community. However, the department has to face many difficulties due to its lack of legal authority. Taking these facts into consideration, the Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal made by the Minister of Water Supply to draft the National Community Water Supply Development Bill in order to be able to carry out the role of the Department of National Community Water Supply in a systematic and effective manner.

14. Amendments to the Code of Civil Procedure

Motor Car accidents have increased dramatically in recent years. In such an accident, a case has to be filed in a civil court to obtain relief. There the victim or his heir should submit the forensic medical report and the other medical reports and they are inevitably marked as "subject to proof" records. It is up to the victim or his heir to ensure that the medical officer appears in court to testify to the contents of those reports. Since such a traffic accident case takes as long as ten or twelve years to complete, if the relevant medical officer is working in a remote area, the government will have to bear the unnecessary burden of summoning him to court and will lose the opportunity to devote his valuable time to professional purposes. Taking these factors into consideration, the Cabinet of Ministers approved the proposal tabled by the Justice Minister to advice to the legal draftsman to draft the bill to amend the Code of Civil Procedure that enabling to make provisions to consider the forensic medical report as the post- mortem report and the ex facie bed head ticket report and the burden of dispelling the medical evidence falls on the defendant whenever the defendant disagrees.

Constructing Jaffna water supply project accelerated

The construction of the water supply project for Jaffna has been accelerated by the Irrigation Department. The Project costs Rs 13,300 million.

Water will be provided to

925,000 people in Jaffna by 2028 once the project is complete. Jaffna needs 17,000 acre feet of water for a day.

The Northern Province receives water from sea water projects, Vadamarachchi Lagoon Project, Lower Paliara Reservoir Project, Upper Parangiaru Reservoir Project and Lower Parangiara Project.

The Peninsula has no rivers or tanks to be used as the main water source for the Water Project. An Irrigation Departments Spokesmen said

that the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) has been approved by the Management Service Department and a detailed estimate has been prepared. The project will be completed in three years, he said.

Japan provides USD 3 m to strengthen SL Cold Chain System

The Government of Japan has provided nearly USD 3 million through UNICEF to support the cold chain system in Sri Lanka and strengthen delivery of immunization services, including in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Sri Lanka is rolling out vaccinations now against the pandemic for prioritised groups, including the elderly population above 60 years in high-risk areas.

"As a long-standing friend of Sri Lanka, it is our great honour to provide emergency grant assistance through UNICEF in our joint combat against COVID-19. We believe that the procurement of cold chain equipment and relevant technical assistance will ensure equitable access and swift rollout of vaccination across the country," Ambassador of Japan to Sri Lanka Sugi-

yama Akira said,. This timely contribution from Japan will be used for the procurement of cold chain equipment, including walk-in cold rooms, ice lined refrigerators and vaccine carriers. The grant

will also support the operation and maintenance of the cold chain equipment, effective vaccine management and expansion of temperature monitoring system to all districts.

"Contributions like this from the Government of Japan are crucial in our joint efforts with the Health Ministry to support the delivery of COVID-19 vaccination services and strengthen Sri Lanka's health system", UNICEF Sri Lanka Representative Emma Brigham said.

Through the COVAX Facility,

in March, UNICEF brought in the first batch of 264,000 doses of the Oxford AstraZeneca 'Covishield' vaccines, which are being rolled out in line with the National Vaccine Deployment Plan of the Health Ministry.

This support from the Government of Japan comes as a boost to Sri Lanka's ongoing efforts to strengthen the overall immunization system, including toreceive, store and roll-out the COVID-19 vaccination programme.

Sputnik gains wide acceptance around the world

It is planned to roll out another one:

Despite the pandemic-related challenges, the domestic pharmaceutical companies, in conjunction with research institutes, have managed to accomplish a multitude of objectives in order to deploy new vaccine production sites in a short amount of time, Putin said during a videoconference meeting focused on increasing the manufacturing capacity of COVID-19 vaccines and the progress of vaccination in Russia.

Putin further noted that the implementation of a wide range of preventive measures, including widespread vaccination, has played a significant role in normalising the epidemic situation. Overall, 6.3 million Russians have taken the first part of the vaccine, of these 4.3 million have been vaccinated in full, that is, they have received both vaccine components.

"We can safely say, and the practical results indisputably

corroborate, the fact that the Russian vaccines are absolutely safe and dependable. Our success is recognised abroad as well. The number of countries using the Sputnik V vaccine is expanding fast, more countries around the world are showing interest in our vaccine with 55 countries having authorised its use," he told the meeting.

In addition, Russia now has a number of contracts with foreign manufacturers—these are foreign manufacturers who will be producing our vaccine on their territory—have been signed for the number of doses needed to vaccinate 700 million people per year. Of late, it has signed a contract with an Indian company for doses to vaccinate 100 million people. Indisputably, working with 55 countries means a total population of 1.4 billion. There are plans to expand the number of partner countries and that will reach estimated 2.5 billion peo-

While Russia and its pharmaceutical companies are considering the dynamics of the global market and the demand for Russian-made vaccines, and expanding their production capacities, they are also emphasis on domestic needs, supplying and vaccinating Russian citizens with vaccines. This is an absolute priority. It is estimated that at least 60 per cent of all adults in the country must be vaccinated for comstabilisation. This requires 69.8 million sets of



vaccine doses. At any rate, there are more than 20 million Sputnik V doses, according to Russian president, quoting his Prime Minister Mikhail

In his contribution at the meeting, Minister of Industry Denis Manturov informed that under the plan, 12.5 million sets of the vaccine must be produced in March. The planned figure for April is 17 million. It is planned to continue building up production so as to have over 80 millions of two-component doses by the first six months.

According to him, all these amounts will be primarily used to vaccinate Russian citizens. In order to meet the global demand for Russian vaccines, his ministry is working on scaling up production of vaccines and on transferring technology abroad. It already has comprehensive agreements on this with manufacturers in 10 countries.

Healthcare Minister Mikhail Murashko informed the meeting about organisations that keep monitoring the virus's mutations, including those in Russia. "We are analysing the efficiency of medicines for preventing the disease caused by various strains. This work is ongoing continuously and involves several agencies," he said, and further mentioned the need to increase the speed of vaccination.

Participating in the meeting, Pharmstandard Chairman of the Board Viktor Kharitonin also discussed production capability of the vaccine and pointed to the successful completion of the transfer of laboratory technology, scaled and fine-tuned the manufacturing technology abroad. "It should be specifically pointed out that, thanks to our cooperation with the Russian Direct Investment Fund, we have started supplying the vaccine to foreign markets. We have already transferred the production technology to Kazakhstan and Belarus and continue working with other countries, including India and Italy. In Italy, Sputnik V was highly praised by both scientists and our colleagues from pharmaceutical companies," added Khari-

tonin.

Taking his turn, Chairman of the Board of the R - P h a r m Group Alexei Repik talked about efforts that are currently focused on the creative of the county of the county focused on the creative of the county focus of the coun

tion and manufacturing of new forms of the vaccine that will be easier to use and also to transport. He noted that it will increase the attractiveness of the vaccines on foreign markets, including countries with a hot climate: the Middle East, Africa and Latin

Director of the Gamaleya National Research Centre for Epidemiology and Microbiology Alexander Gintsburg also highlighted a few aspects of the vaccine production and about documents for registration. According to him, the Gamaleya Research Centre

also addresses the problem of expanding the production of the Sputnik Light vaccine.

In addition, as the holder of the registration certificate, the Centre assumes all responsibility for quality control of this vaccine at all enterprises where it is manufactured in this country and abroad.

Moreover, the Centre is directly involved in launching contractual production that is mostly organised by the Russian Direct Investment

Fund. The Centre

has prepared the entire package of documents for registering the Sputnik Light vaccine in 55 countries.

Considering that each country has its own regulary system, this is not

tory system, this is not a fixed package of documents that will apply everywhere, therefore it has to adapt it to every country's regulatory system.

He further spoke about The Lancet, a highly prestigious and popular medical journal, that published two articles on the results of scientific data and clinical trials. Covid-19: How Pfizer conquered the world

When the coronavirus pandemic began, the challenge for Pfizer and BioNTech wasn't just developing a Covid-19 vaccine – they also had to make it, and by the hundreds of millions. This was no small feat. Until the very end of last year, no mRNA vaccine had ever been authorized and no such vaccine had ever been manufactured to scale by any company.

Pfizer has now shipped more than 100 million doses to the US and it said this week it has successfully met its goal of 120 million doses released and ready for shipment by the end of March.

For Mike McDermott, Pfizer's president of global supply, the mission is still more doses. Billions of them

"Our goal has been running 24/7, make as many doses as possible. I actually don't even have a production goal," McDermott told CNN Chief Medical Correspondent Dr. Sanjay Gupta during an exclusive tour of its manufacturing facility in Kalamazoo, Michigan, in March. "Our goal is to produce as much as possible to get to 2 billion doses this year as soon as possi-

Pfizer/BioNTech's global goal is 2.5 billion doses by the end of the year

Pfizer met its first milestones with substantial upfront investment, and it had no guarantees.

Pfizer was part of Operation Warp Speed as a potential supplier for Covid-19 vaccines and had a purchase agreement for an initial 100 million doses. However, the company didn't receive federal funding for the research or development of the vaccine.

So while Pfizer could repurpose some of its equipment at its main manufacturing site in Kalamazoo, most of what's there now didn't exist a year ago.

"Pfizer has spent at risk, almost \$2 billion on the overall program. From manufacturing, my team spent \$500 million, before we even got out of clinical trials. So all completely at risk. We didn't know if we had a product that was going to work," said McDermott.

Before Pfizer decided on its final vaccine candidate, it was looking into four different options. That meant McDermott and his team had to be ready to go in any direction.

"I think about like, we're going to have dinner tonight, and we need to get dessert ready, but I don't know what dessert we're having. So you just start buying ingredients," he said. "Maybe we're making a cake, maybe we're making brownies. Let's bring in the standard materials that we

need. So filling up this pantry was quite, quite expensive."

One of the biggest rate-limiting steps of this production, according to McDermott, has been the availability of raw materials and specifically lipids, the fatty substance that safely houses the mRNA until it can get to our cells.

"Lipid nanoparticle hasn't been used in a large commercial product. So the lipid suppliers weren't very large. And so we work very closely with them to build more lipids capacity, and actually making lipids in this site in Kalamazoo, Michigan," said McDermott.

Pfizer/BioNTech's Covid-19 vaccine can simply be described as mRNA housed in a lipid coating, but the successful production of that by the millions all came down to a something the size of a quar-

doses through here? So my confidence level was actually quite low. Not that it could be done, I knew it worked at this scale, but how

could you multiply it?"

McDermott's first thought was to go bigger, make a large-scale tea stirrer to allow more volume to pass through. When that didn't work, they ended up replicating the quarter-sized mixers and put technology in place to ensure efficiency

in order to scale up production.

"There's a computer system that's running the whole apparatus that makes sure you have the precise amount of flow and pressure. And that allowed us to get more production out. Even though this size is small, we were able to really scale this up our original design for this machine. We're currently operating at four times the capaci-

ability to hit its goal of 300 million total doses delivered to the US government by July.

McDermott says the last 12 months have been "like nothing I've ever experienced in my

"As a kid, my dad worked for NASA," McDermott said. "He was lucky enough to be in mission control in Houston when Neil Armstrong stepped on the moon right at that amazing moment.

"I could never imagine having a moment like that in my life. Right? Like, what's the odds that something like that would ever happen

ter. The heart of this whole machine is what's called an impingement jet mixer," said McDermott as he is twirled it around his fingers.

The impingement jet mixer, also known as the tea stirrer, works by simply pumping lipids in one side and mRNA in the other, forcing them together with 400 pounds of pressure. That's what creates the lipid nanoparticle which is essentially the vaccine.

These aren't just any lipids, Pfizer/BioNTech had to design the right combination of four different lipids that would not only protect the mRNA on the way to cells, but then release the mRNA once it gets there.

While the process of creating lipid nanoparticles is not new, McDermott said the challenge was scaling up this process.

"The first time somebody showed me this impingement jet mixer, I said, 'You can't be serious?' Like how could you put billions of In its 1,300-acre foot Kalamazoo facility, Pfizer is installing around 13,000 square feet of modular rooms that are first built in Texas

and then shipped to Kalamazoo.

"We've had planned to expand our formulation capacity. The question was, how can we do it quickly? If we built it wall by wall on site, it would have taken us a year. By doing it modularly, we could cut that in half," says McDermott.

Moving each room into place is surprisingly easy. With the help of compressed air — think of an air hockey table — you can simply slide them into place. Then the rooms are ready to be connected to electricity, sterilized and put to use.

With each of these improvements, Pfizer says it has gone from producing 3 to 4 million doses of vaccine a week to 13 million doses a week. They company expects to double that again by the middle of the year. That will mean roughly 100 million doses a month and the

The company's next giant leap is to be ready to get it to patients, if necessary.

Pfizer's goal, McDermott says: To be able to develop a new variant-specific vaccine, get it through production and get it to patients within a matter of months. (CNN)



Sharp decline in Flu and Colds: Will masks stick around?

As the COVID-19 pandemic raged in the U.S. and other countries, masks became key to reducing the virus' spread. But they did more than just prevent people from getting or spreading COVID-19 — they also appear to be the reason why cases of the flu, cold and other respiratory diseases are down significantly in the last year.

And as a post-pandemic future becomes more clear with the vaccine rollout well underway, health experts are wondering if masks will stick around in the U.S. after COVID-19 is finally in the rear view.

Recent studies and data have shown that respiratory illnesses in children have sharply declined over the last year, when most kids either did virtual learning at home or were required to wear masks at school. A study published in the *Journal of Hospital Medicine* in March looked at the number of pediatric patients hospitalized for respiratory illnesses in 44 children's hospitals across the U.S., and found that it had declined by 62% this year.

Statistics from the Centers of Disease Control on this year's influenza season show a monumental difference. Typically, around 100 to 200 children die of the flu each year — during the 2019 to 2020 flu season, 195 kids died — but so far this season, there has been just one child flu death in the U.S.

"I think that that obliteration of the flu epidemic, which was seen globally, tells us that the way that influenza is transmitted from one person to another might really have been impacted by the use of masks, more than anything else," Flor Munoz, a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics' infectiousdiseases committee, told *the Washington Post* in early March.

Adult flu deaths are also down sig-

nificantly. Depending on the severity of the flu strain that emerges each season, total deaths range from 12,000 to 61,000 a year. So far in the 2020 to 2021 season, the CDC has reported just 219 deaths.

"I think this has clearly shown that masking, distancing, hand-washing — all these things clearly work," Aaron Milstone, an epidemiologist and professor of pediatrics at Johns Hopkins University, told the *Post*. "So I think the question will be, how much appetite do people have for all that to prevent influenza, instead of just COVID."

Milstone, and other health experts, have expressed skepticism that Americans will be willing to continue wearing masks after the pandemic. Though they have been common in Asian countries long before the COVID-19 pandemic hit, it's been tough to convince all Americans to wear masks, even with the deadly virus circulating.

"I'm a little skeptical that this crisis will be enough for a widespread culture change, given how difficult it's been to achieve a reasonable culture shift in the previous months," Dr. Ricardo Franco of the University of Alabama at Birmingham told NPR.

For now, with COVID-19 once again on the rise in the U.S. as the faster-spreading variants circulate, masks are essential to reducing cases, even if people have been vaccinated. On Monday, President Joe Biden urged states to keep or reinstate their mask mandates after Texas, Mississippi, Iowa, Montana, North Dakota and Arkansas all announced in the last few weeks that they would drop theirs.

"Please, this is not politics — reinstate the mandate," Biden said. "The failure to take this virus seriously is precisely what got us into this mess in the first place." (Yahoo)

Pfizer and BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine is 100% effective against the virus in children ages 12 to 15, the companies announced in a press release Wednesday.

In a placebo-controlled trial of 2,260 adolescents, none of the participants who received the real vaccine developed COVID-19, the companies said.

Eighteen adolescents who received placebo, or fake, doses became infected with the virus, they said.

The COVID-19 vaccine was "welltolerated" by the age group, the companies said, with participants experiencing a similar range of side effects as seen in older teens and young adults.

Experts say that ensuring vaccines are safe and effective in children will be crucial to ending the pandemic. Although children are less likely to die of COVID-19, it's still possible for them to get sick and spread the virus.

Pfizer CEO Albert Bourla said in a statement that he was "encouraged" by the clinical trial data, and that the company plans to submit the data to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration "in the coming weeks" to update its emergency use authorization to include children 12 and older.

The company hopes to start vaccinating children ages 12 to 15 "before the start of the next school year," Bourla said.


Experts say it's important to test vaccines in children to ensure they are safe and effective in the youngest members of society so that ultimately everyone is eligible to receive a potentially lifesaving

Last week, Pfizer and BioNTech launched a global COVID-19 vaccine trial that will ultimately enroll 4,500 children between the ages of 6 months and 11 years old.

Their vaccine is currently authorized to be distributed in the U.S. for use in people ages 16 and up.

Other vaccine manufacturers have been moving to offer their vaccines to children. Moderna announced earlier this month that it would enroll 6,750 children ages 6 months to 12 years old in a clini-

Johnson & Johnson also has said it intends to develop trials for children. Moderna and Johnson & Johnson's vaccines have been granted emergency use authorization by the FDA for those ages 18 and older. (ABC)



Errors ruin 15 million doses of Johnson & Johnson's COVID-19 vaccine

An ingredient mix-up at a Baltimore manufacturing plant ruined 15 million doses of the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine, The New York Times in the United States, which reported. That could delay future shipments of this vaccine in the United States.

There are not any problems with the doses of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine that have

already been delivered those were produced in the Netherlands, the Times reported. But the tens of millions of the shots set to ship in April were supposed to come from this Baltimore plant.

The manufacturing plant, run Emergent BioSolutions, received \$628 million from the Trump administration last year to expand its vaccine manufacturing capacity. The plant was still awaiting Food and Drug Administration authorization of its Johnson & Johnson vaccine production lines, and this enormous mistake — which Times sources attributed to human error — will likely delay that further. It's not clear how this setback will affect the availability

of this vaccine over the next few weeks. Moderna and Pfizer / BioNTech are still on track to meet their vaccine commitments should give the country enough doses to meet the Biden administration's target of having shots available for every adult by the end of May.

But limited availability of the Johnson & John-

son vaccine could still hurt US efforts vaccinate enough people for herd immunity. who are People reluctant to get vaccinated against

COVID-19 and say they'll "wait and see" are more likely to agree to take the Johnson & Johnson vaccine than the Pfizer/ BioNTech or Moderna shots. The Johnson & Johnson vaccine only takes one dose, and is made using a more familiar technique. Only having the Pfizer / BioNTech and Moderna shots on offer could make it harder to convince some people to get vaccinated.

Around 30 percent of the US population has received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine so far. (The Verge)

Egypt gets hundreds of thousands of vaccines via Covax

Egypt has received over 854,000 coronavirus vaccines through the Covax facility for lower and middle income countries, the World Health Organization said Thursday. The AstraZeneca vaccines, the first to be provided through COVAX to Egypt, were delivered by plane to Cairo late Wednesday, WHO said in a statement.

Egypt has registered more than 200,000 cases of coronavirus, including some 12,000 deaths.

The health ministry has said frontline health workers, the elderly and people with chronic diseases will be prioritised in the vaccine effort, in line with global guidelines.

WHO said 40 million doses would be provided to Egypt -enough for 20 percent of the country's 100 million population.

The Covax programme aims to help ensure 20 percent of the population in recipient countries is vaccinated by end-2021.

Egypt began its Covid-19 immunisation programme on January 24, becoming one of the first countries in Africa to begin vac-

cinating its citizens. At a virtual press conference held by the WHO's eastern Mediterranean division, officials acknowledged the organisation faced "challenges" in reaching its 20-percent target. (AFP)

LESSONS FOR TODAY'S WORLD FROM GOOD FRIDAY

oday is Good Frilay where the Christian world will commemorate the death of Jesus Christ on the Cross over two millennia ago. Good Friday is the culmination of Lenten which began on Ash Wednesday and the intervening 40 days was marked by acts of fasting, penance, mortification and other forms of sacrifices as Christians retraced the last days of Jesus leading up His Crucifixion on Mount Calvary.

In Sri Lanka too Catholics engaged in solemn prayer and sacrifice participating in the Way of the Cross where the faithful relived the passion of Christ symbolized by the fourteen Stations of the Cross depicting Christ's each step of the way to Golgotha. Pilgrimages are also being made during the Lenten season to prominent local Easter landmarks such as Hiniduma and Mawathagama where the Way of the Cross is performed before giant lifelike statues reliving the last journey of Christ, by the faithful with much emotion and passion. Such activities are being held this year

on a low key due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

THE HOLY WEEK

The week leading to Good Friday is called the Holy Week that began on Palm Sunday which heralded Christ's triumphant entry to Jerusalem, during which there is an intensification of acts of penance and sacrifice by the faithful. There are also passion plays held at church venues in the Catholic belt - the most famous being the Duwa passion play - the brainchild of the legendary Fr. Mercelline Jayakody who was equally at home in every place of worship, regardless of religion. Distribution of alms is also common on Good Friday as acts of expiation of one's sins on this day of great importance for Christians.

The main Good Friday services will be held in all Churches in the country, subject to health guidelines, with the central feature being the 'Three Hours Agony' marking the final hours of Christ's passion. For Catholics in Sri Lanka Good Friday (and Easter Sunday) will have an added poignancy and somnolence due to the grave calamity that befell a section of their community due to terrorist bombing of churches bombings exactly two years ago, resulting in hundreds of deaths (The exact date is April 19). This nightmare is bound to linger in the minds of not just Catholics but all other Sri Lankans with the approach of every Good Friday and Easter Sunday.

MONUMENTAL SACRIFICE

Good Friday and Easter Sunday, to follow, are the single most ground breaking events in the Christian calendar, perhaps even more important that Christmas, since they mark the death and resurrection of Christ , fulfilling the word of the scriptures in the Old Testament. By his death Christ bowed to the wish of His father the Almighty God, for by this single act He purged the sins of mankind and gave hope for redemption from sin. With His monumental sacrifice Jesus banished the darkness that enveloped the world and ushered in a new light of redemption and hope for all mankind.

During his short mission on Earth, Jesus sought to change the entrenched beliefs rooted in the Old Testament and clashed with the Pharisees who saw in him a challenge to their domination. He preached love and compassion by enjoining his audience to turn the left cheek to those who slap you on the right, in place of an Eye for an Eye. This was compassion instead of revenge. He mingled with sinners and outcasts and condemned the rich epitomized by the Pharisees and the High Priests of the temples. When He was questioned of his company by the Pharisees Christ had only one word for them - "who among you is without sin let him cast the first stone". Christ also preached the virtue of selflessness and sharing and enjoined the rich to give to the poor people. His life was

mostly spent with the meek and the humble. He took to task the rich who hoarded their wealth and let the poor have only the crumbs as with Lazarus. He enjoined them the virtues of giving and sacrifice if they wished to enter the Kingdom of God.

He preached that "it was easy for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter heaven". He told Peter and the rest of his Apostles that if they were to follow Him to be prepared to leave behind all their possessions and all things they coveted. Christ preached the virtue of love and respect for one's fellow human beings and in fact, all beings. "Love thy neighbour as thine own self. Forgive those who had harmed you," was his message to the followers. Christ even forgave Judas who betrayed him in the end. In his Sermons on the Mount He also preached the virtue of humility.

TEACHINGS OF THE CHRIST

Good Friday should be an occasion for reflection on the teachings of Christ and the true meaning of His brief but everlasting mission on Earth. All that He abhorred and condemned during his short

mission on Earth are today very much evident as at no other time in a selfish and corrupt world. The race for riches and power is rampant as at no time before. This is seen not only among individuals but also among States. Rich nations today are reluctant to help their poor counterparts. One only has to look at how the rich nations are hoarding COVID-19 vaccines at the expense of poor countries, with some countries ordering vaccine doses that can inoculate their populations 10 times over. The world will be able to come off this calamity if they share such resources.

Money is spent for producing weapons to wage war whereas this could have helped feed the teeming millions in poverty stricken nations - the complete antithesis to the violence which Christ preached against. And continue our sinful lives forgetting how great he is.



Some players in the game of rugby had naturally gifted talents imbibed with them where they had the capability of occupying several positions as a utility player, later contributing immensely to his team's success. Kapila Knowlton was a robust player who performed exceptionally well in hanthe rugby ball in the three quarter line, starting his career as a centre three quarter, at times as a wing three quarter while occupying the crucial fly half berth as and when his service was needed due to his kicking skills from the time of his school career until he represented the coun-

Kapila Knowlton was born in 1975 in Thimbirigasyaya and his father was late Stephen Knowlton and mother is Cicy where both of them served in Sri Lanka Police.

He had three siblings with his elder brother late Major Charles Lasantha who died in Paranthan in 1997 during the civil war Indika is his sister and Gaya is his twin brother. Since his parents were in the Police they grew up in the Police flats Thimbirigasyaya, Havelock Town. Kapila had the opportunity of spending his free time with other children engaging in various sports.

He was admitted to Mahanama College, Colombo in 1981 as a primary student and went on to complete his schooling by 1994. Due to his healthy physique, he was able to represent multiple sporting disciplines cricket, basketball and rugby.

He launched his illustrious sporting career with cricket at school with the

under-13 team and went on to compete in the first XI team.

Basketball became his second sport which he competed from the age of 15 years until he played in the under-19 team. The game of rugby was his third sports discipline which he took up mainly because of the involvement of his friends at Police flats, where most of them opted to handle the oval shaped ball while witnessing rugby matches involving Police

which motivated him to take up rugby. With his regular academic studies and other sports, he finally joined the under-15 rugby team at school.

Just after one year, he was called to join the College first XV team at the age of 16 years and was associated with them from 1991 to 1994.

The best achievement during his tenure as a player was when they came to semi=finals of the under-19 'Premadasa Trophy knock out Tournament' defeating Royal College in 1991 under the captaincy of Nalin Dissanayake. They also emerged Cup Runner-up in the 'Milo Trophy' Schools under 19 Rugby Sevens in 1993 under Sharad Khan's captaincy. losing to S Thomas College Mount Lavinia 21- 0 in the final. He also represented the Western Province under-19 school rugby team in 1994. His coaches were Marco de Silva (former Sri Lanka and Havelocks player) and T.D. Motha (former police player) during his school rugby career.

After his eventful school career, he decided to continue his club rugby

career and joined the Sri Lanka Army 'A' team in 1995. He launched his first club league tournament in 1995 and played his first match against Kandy at Galle Face ground, at former Army headquarters under the captaincy of Prabath Naranthota, which they lost to Kandy SC 10 - 0. Subsequently, Army couldn't continue the tournament due to the outbreak of the ethnic war . This resulted in all services teams withdrawing from the tournament and joining war operations. He had to undergo his basic training in Army Military Academy in Diyatalawa in 1995 and got commissioned as a second lieutenant in 1997. From that point, he continued his rugby career with Army from 1995 to 2013 which spanned 18 years, as a regular player.

He led the under 24 Army 'A' team in 1998 and participated at the All India Rugby Tournament in Kolkata in 1999 ending up champions. He surged ahead to captain the Army 'A' team in 1999 under New Zealand coach Kelvin Farrington.

Some of their achievements during

that period was becoming runner-up in Clifford Cup Knock Out Tournament losing to Kandy SC 15 -36 (in 2000 led by Ajith Peiris),16-17 (in 2001) and 19-26 (in 2002 led by Ajith Peiris) while ending up runner-up in the Caltex League Tournament in 2001 under the leadership of prop forward J M Jayatilleke. They became Champions of the Dialog Club rugby sevens tournament in 2004 under foreign coach Rob Gibson.

He captained Defence Services team in 2006 and was awarded Army Colours, Defence Services Colours and National Collours, piling up 100 points during the 2009 rugby season by scoring tries and kicking at goal. Army team participated in the 80 x 80 International tournament in Thailand and were placed third under his captaincy in 2007.

He took over as Army coach with

MacDougall in 2013. He has an unfor- coached by Tavitha Thulagesi (Laga) gettable memory during his tenure as a player with Army beating Kandy at Galle Face ground in 2004. It all happened with him scoring a try within the first five minutes. Laga as no 8 and England player playing as centre. From the starting whistle, Army dominated play and went on to score at regular intervals. Kandy bounced back in second half but just fell short by two points after Nalaka Weerakkody's penalty kick went astray to give them a memorable 21-19 win. This Army team was under Y.P. Rajapakse's captaincy. While his tenure donning the Army jersey he got the National call in 1997 for national sevens Squad, which he competed until 1999.

With this, he established a permanent place in the National Squad in both sevens and XV's format from 2000 to 2005. He played in the under-24 National team in 1998 against Hong Kong in Sri Lanka under Harris Omar's captaincy. He participated in the Rugby Asiad in Japan in 2000 under Asoka Jayasena's captaincy coached by retired senior DIG Nimal Lewke. Became Champions at the Triangular. Tournament in Malaysia in 2001 He took part at the Shanghai Sevens in China in 2001 under Sanjeewa Jayasinghe's captaincy coached by Nimal Lewke.

Participated at the Rugby Sevens at Commonwealth Games in Manchester in 2004 under Leonard de Zilva's captaincy coached by Asanga Seneviratne. Participated in the Rugby Sevens and XV's at the Asian Games in Busan, Korea in 2002 the assistance of foreign coach Ben under Harris Omar's captaincy gurakgoda in Polonnaruwa.

Participated at Rugby Asiad in Bangkok, Thailand in 2002 under Asanga Rodrigo's captaincy coached by Tony Amit. Sri Lankan Olympic stars of yesteryear

Sunil Gunawardana - first schoolboy to run 100 metres in under 11 seconds

Herath Liyanage Don Sunil Benedict Gunawardana, who represented Sri Lanka in the 200m event at the Munich Olympic Games in 1972, was born on October 6, 1949 at Chilaw.

He was educated at St. Mary's College, Chilaw and set up several Sri Lanka records before representing the country at the Olympic Games.

In 1968, he participated in the first Inter-House Athletics Meet and from thereon, he registered victory after victory in Group Meets, District Meets, Public Schools Meets, Junior National Meets and National Athletics Championships.

When he ran the 100m in 10.9s he became the first schoolboy to have run this distance under 11 seconds. He equalled Duncan White's record of 22.2 seconds for the 200m in that year. The records for the 100m and 200m were set up by him on grass tracks.

In 1968, Sunil was selected to represent Sri Lanka in the 200m event at an International Meet held in Thailand, because he beat D. K. Podimahatmaya who was an acclaimed sprinter at that

In the actual race in Thailand, Sunil beat both Anant Ratanapol of Thailand and W. Wimaladasa of Sri Lanka registering a time of 21.6s. He was still a schoolboy at that time. From 1968 to 1978 be partici-

pated in the National Athletics Championship and won the Challenge Cup awarded to the Best Athlete several times.

In 1974, he was a member of the 400x4m Sri Lanka Relav Team which won the Gold Medal at the Asian Games in Teheran setting up a new Asian record.

After having attained the qualifying standard, Sunil was picked to represent Sri Lanka at the Munich Olympic Games. In the first heat in the 200m race he

came third and won a place in the next round.

In the second round, although beaten, he recorded a time of 21.31s which was the best for an Asian. Sunil was an Executive Committee Member of the Sri Lanka Athletics Association from 1996 to 1997 and later he became the Vice-President in

1998/1999 and was the President in 2000/2001.

In addition, he was the Coordinating Secretary to the former Sports Minister S. B. Dissanayake. Under his purview he was able to unearth many talented athletes including Sugath Thilakeratne, Damayanthi Darsha, Sriyani Kulawansa and Susanthika Jayasinghe.

Sunil also accompanied the Sri Lankan contingent as the Chef-de-Mission for the 2000 Olympic Games and has earned a reputation as a coach and administrator.

He had the privilege of following a coaching programme on short distance running in 1971 in West Germany and in Indonesia. He also had the distinction of participating in several athletics seminars conducted by Jacky Joyner and her coach in Beijing, China and also by Kathy Freeman and her coach in Australia.

Tourism to reopen allowing vaccinated guests into country

Reopening the tourism sector to foreigners, Sri Lanka will allow tourists who have taken both COVID-19 insulations to visit the country and also roam freely without additional quarantine regulations.

This will also be extended to Sri Lankans based overseas and planning to visit the country. They will only be subjected to one PCR test upon arrival, Chairperson, Sri Lanka Tourism Kimarli Fernando said at the Key Persons Forum organized by Sri Lanka Gem and Jewellery Association (SLGJA) at Shangri-La Hotel in Colombo on Wednesday. She said the health authorities have identified that people who take the vaccine 14 days prior to their arrival carry a minimum risk of spreading the virus and hence they could travel freely.

She however said that there may be some restrictions for European nations that have new virus variants for which the vaccine may not be effective.

Gem and jewellery exporters to be allowed vehicle importation

The government will allow the import of vehicles for any person in the Sri Lanka gem and jewellery sector who bring in foreign exchange to the value of USD 100,000 said State Minister of Gem and Jewellery related industries and Prison Reforms, Lohan Rat-

This is an encouragement to egg on exporters, he said at the Key Persons Forum organized by Sri Lanka Gem and Jewellery Association (SLGJA) on Wednesday.

The State Minister said that they will allocate around 900 areas of land in new locations for gem mining under strict environmental regulations. He said that there is a mega irrigation project taking place in Kumbukkan Oya and the land which is to come under water after the project would be given out for mining of gems. "We hope to start allocating around 300 acres of land from next

The Minister also said that new technology would be used to track a gemstone from the time it leaves the quarry until it reaches a buyer.

Weerasinghe, Thilak Chairman NGJA, said that this simple and practical

view point was not adopted before the land for Moragahakanda Irrigation project went under water.

He also said that they have introduced a 'one stop shop' to provide speedy approvals for issues relating to gem mining permits under three weeks.

"The gem tower will also see an addition of a mega hotel and a convention centre in the future." He said several other initiatives including tax concessions were provided to the industry to take it to a USD 1 billion forex earner soon and a USD 5 billion target by 2025.

Tourism is an important player for the industry and the estimated foreign exchange earnings through tourism are in the range of USD 200 to 250 million

Refai said. Chairman Ahsan Refai said several new initiatives by the Ministry including the gem tower in Ratnapura will help promote the industry to the world in better conditions.

"We would like to work ith the SLTDA and request the Ministry of Tourism to establish a task force consisting of the NGJA, SLTDA and the private sector to promote and oversee this cooperation.

Ceylon Electricity Board to raise up to Rs. 20 bn in capital through CSE

The Colombo Stock Exchange (CSE) has approved an application by the Ceylon Electricity Board (CEB) to issue Senior Unsecured Listed Redeemable Rated Debentures at an Issue Price of Rs. 100 amounting to a potential capital raising of up to Rs. 20 billion. The tures with an option to issue debentures will be issued for period of 5 years with a fixed coupon interest rate of 9.35% p.a. (AER 9.35%) to be paid annually. The issue will open on April 8 2021.

The initial issue will consist of 100 million debenup to a further 100 million debentures at the discretion of the CEB in the event of an over subscription of the initial Issue.

This will pave the way for CEB to raise Rs. 10 billion in capital initially with an

option to raise a further Rs. 10 billion subsequently. The debentures carry a rating of AA-(lka) by Fitch Ratings Lanka Limited while CEB is rated as AA-(lka) with a Stable Outlook by the same rat-

Inflation mutes in March


The Colombo Consumer Price Index (CCPI) remained largely unchanged as the country heads into the festive season. The all item index moved from 139.1 in February to 138.9 in March.

From the major groups of items measured restaurant and hotels saw the largest change and increase from 139.6 in February to 145.4 in March. The largest decline was seen in the food and nonalcoholic beverage group from 157.7 to 155.2. The index would suggest

that there had been a decrease in expenditure by Rs154.18 in the market basket. Food items contributed a decrease of .49% and non-food items by .31% respectively to the

The price indices of communication, recreation and culture, and education remained unchanged during the period.

The varieties of rice; Kekulu white, Kekulu red, and Nadu white saw a price increase. The Nadu white



variety of rice saw a price decrease. All major 4 categories of rice measured by the CCPI are over Rs 100 per kilogram. The overall rate of inflation as measured by the CCPI on an annual basis was 4.1% in March and 3.3% on a Y-o-Y comparison with the month of February. The Y-o-Y inflation in the food category has increased from 7.9% to 9.6% in March. The non-food group has increased from 1.3% to 1.8% in March. The moving average rate of inflation for the month of

The collection of data was hampered due to COVID-19 restrictions in February. Accordingly, the figures for February were compiled in certain instances on the basis of phone calls while the figures in March were compiled through in-person visits.

South Asian Economies bounce back but face fragile recovery

Fast and fair vaccination, preventive healthcare key for sustainable growth

Prospects of an economic rebound in South Asia are firming up as growth is set to increase by 7.2 percent in 2021 and 4.4 percent in 2022, climbing from historic lows in 2020 and putting the region on a path to recovery. But growth is uneven and economic activity well below pre-COVID-19 estimates, as many businesses need to make up for lost revenue and millions of workers, most of them in the informal sector, still reel from job losses, falling incomes, worsening inequalities, and human capital deficits, says the World Bank in its twice-a-year regional update.

Released today, the latest South Asia Economic Focus: South Asia Vaccinates shows that the region is set to regain its historical growth rate by 2022. Electricity consumption and mobility data is a clear indication of recovering economic activity. India, which comprises the bulk of the region's

economy, is expected to grow more than 10 percent in the fiscal year 2021-22—a substantial upward revision of 4.7 percentage points from January 2021 fore-

The outlook for Bangladesh, Nepal, and Pakistan has also been revised upward, supported

by better than expected remittance inflows: Bangladesh's gross domestic product (GDP) is expected to increase by 3.6 percent in 2021; Nepal's GDP is projected to grow by 2.7 percent in the fiscal year 2021-22 and recover to 5.1 percent by 2023; Pakistan's growth is expected to

reach 1.3 percent in 2021, slightly above previous projections.

The improved economic outlook reflects South Asian countries' efforts to keep their COVID-19 caseload under control and swiftly roll out vaccine campaigns. Governments' decisions to transition from widespread lockdowns to more targeted interventions, accommodating monetary policies and fiscal stimuli—through targeted cash transfers and employment compensation programs—have also propped up recovery, the report notes.

Our mother gave us boiled coriander water and vitamins and nourishing food, to keep us free from illnesses. Thus ended the lockdown, which was educational, amusing and sad as well.



Known as Breiðamerkursandur in Icelandic, Diamond Beach takes its name from the chunks of pristine ice scattered across the black volcanic sand and glistening like giant, uncut diamonds. It is located next to Jökulsárlón Glacier Lagoon on the South Coast of Iceland, about six hours away from the country's capital, Reykjavik. Although it's not part of the popular Golden Circle Tour, Diamond Beach has become one of the country's top tourist attractions in recent years, and looking at photos of it, it's easy to see

Diamond Beach is located by the Jökulsárlón glacial lagoon, which is filled with huge pieces of ice that constantly break off from Breiðamerkurjökull, an outlet glacier of Vatnajökull, the largest icecap in Europe. Bits and



pieces of these chunks of ice end up on the black sand and create a stunning visual effect.

The size of these "diamonds" can range from palm-size to larger than an average person, as can the color, which ranges from deep blue to bright white, and brilliant turquoise shades in-between.

Apart from the diamond-like chunks of ice, Diamond Beach is famous for never looking the same on two different days. As the ice melts and new chunks are washed ashore, this place can look completely different from one day to the next. In recent years, its famous nickname has made Breiðamerkursandur a very



popular place for marriage proposals, as well as a hotspot for Instagram influencers looking to impress their followers.

If you plan on visiting Diamond Beach during the winter, it's recommended to spend 2-3 days on the country's south coast, as the daylight is limited and you want to take the beauty of this place in ideal conditions. Oddity Central
