# **SPEAKER MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT IN HOUSE**

The Election Commission was informed that the Parliamentary Seat of MP Ranjan Ramanayake has been rendered vacant, Speaker Mahinda Yapa Abeywardena informed the House yesterday (07).

The Secretary General of Parliament had informed the Chairman of the National Election Commission that Ranjan Ramanayake had ceased to be a Member of Parliament and accordingly there is a vacant Seat in Parliament with respect to the electoral district of Gampaha in terms of the Article 66 (d) of the Constitution, the Speaker announced.

This notice has been issued by the Secretary General of Parliament in terms of Section 64 (01) of the Parliamentary Elections Act No.

01 of 1981. Following the announcement, a heated argument broke out between the Opposition and the Ruling party regarding the decision given on MP Ranjan Ramanayake who is presently imprisoned on a charge of Contempt of Court.

# **MANNAPPERUMA TO REPLACE RANJAN**

Former State Minister Aiith Mannapperuma is the next in line in the Gampaha District preferential vote list of the Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB).

He came in fifth among the SJB contestants from the Gampaha District obtaining 47,212 preferential votes in the General Election 2020. His name is expected to be gazetted to fill Ranjan Ramanayake's Parliamentary Seat after the District Returning Officer submits his name to the National Election Commission.



recorded 58,651 passenger arrivals and 73,513 passenger departures. However, due to the previous Government using the Mattala Airport for storing paddy, its operations were hindered and some of the equipment installed at the Mattala Airport was taken to Katunayake," Minister Prasanna Ranatunga said.

Responding to MP Withanage, the Minister outlined the government's plans in order to upgrade the facilities at the cargo terminal and improve cargo handling activities, recommence the operations of the Duty Free shopping complex and provide all required infrastructure facilities in order to attract commercial frights etc.

The CEJ and its Executive Director Director Hemantha Withanage filed this petition naming the Central Environmental Authority, Urban Development Authority, Director General of Wild Life, Chairman of Araliya Group W. Sirisena, Habaraduwa Divisional Secretary, Marine Environment Protection Authority and several others as respondents.

The Petitioners state that a massive hotel project which includes over 250 rooms covering an extent of 10 acres and 6.1 perches at Yaddehimulla in Unawatuna in the Galle district was constructed recently. The hotel project belongs to the Araliya Hotel Beach Private Limited. The Petitioners state that this edifice of a hotel has posed devastating consequences on the globally renowned Rumassala sanctuary, Unawatuna beach and exotic coral reef of Rumassala-Beuna Vista with the hotel being

built no less than 15 metres away from the Unawatuna beach and situated right next to the famous "Walle Devalaya" (shrine on the beach) and the Rumassala conservation site.

It has been declared as a sacred area and it is cited as "Historical Welledewalaya in Unawatuna Sacred area" by the Extraordinary Gazette Notification No.1877/80 dated 29.08.2014.

Joining the fourth day of the debate on the report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry into the Easter Sunday attacks in Parliament yesterday, he said former Cabinet Minister Wijeyadasa Rajapakshe had made a statement in 2016 in Parliament that there were reports of several persons having links with the ISIS organization. "The Cabinet is a very small group and when a member makes such a statement in Parliament, as a responsible Government the previous Government should have deployed the law enforcement units to investigate this claim. Hence, now those same members of the previous regime are questioning the present Government whereas I would like to ask them why they failed to take action at the time where they could have prevented this terrible attack.'

Abeygunawardena is a member of the Special Committee appointed to study the recommendations of the report,

#### under the leadership of Minister Chamal Rajapaksa.

'The aim of Zaharan and his group was to spread Wahabism and ISIS ideology within the country by destroying other races and creating a Muslim state. Further, the Kattankudy Police and other police divisions in the area were informed about Zaharan Hashim and their activities. But, the previous Government's failure to take action is definitely a reason that led to this attack," he noted.

He further questioned as to under whose instructions was the law not enforced against Zaharan Hashim? "This is what needs to be investigated. Today the same Members of the previous Government are asking why action is not taken against the masterminds behind the Easter bombers. What did they do to prevent this incident ?"

He noted that not all Muslims are terrorists or support such extremism, but

the Muslim leaders had given a warning to the then government that they had assisted in bringing them into power and therefore action could not be taken against these groups.

Referring to the 2017 the Ginthota Sinhala-Muslim clashes, he said Zaharan had posted a message on his FB account that it was time to set up an Islamic State

"Why was this not investigated by the intelligence units? Now they are blaming the intelligence units, but it was the previous government that broke the back of the intelligence units and made them inactive," he said, adding that the entire responsibility for the Easter attacks should be taken by the members of the previous Government.

Minister Rohitha Abeygunawardena said that the current Government has taken all measures to ensure a peaceful country for all races and religions to live in peace.

Opposition Leader Sajith Premadasa pointed out that the Speaker should have first made the announcement to the House before sending the letter to the Election Commission. Premadasa questioned as to why the letter was sent in a hurry, and why the House was informed about it only later. At this juncture, State Minister Nimal Lanza said the Opposition Leader should not be wasting time trying to argue about the ruling given by the Speaker of the House regarding Ramanayake.

"Both announcements regarding this case were done by the Speaker in accordance with the Constitution. What is the point of arguing about it once again ? Why waste the time of this House,?" Lanza said.

Following State Minister Lanza's Point of Order, **Opposition MP Nalin** Bandara questioned the Speaker if the ruling on Ramanayake was given based on his absence in the Chamber. However, the Speaker denied the allegation. "There was no such thing. The ruling is already given and now there is no use of bringing it up again," Speaker Abeywardena told MP Bandara.

The Opposition MPs kept protesting against the announcement made by the Speaker and throwing verbal punches at the Government MPs who expressed their displeasure against the Opposition's conduct.

Leader of the House Minister Dinesh Gunawardena then stood up to request the Speaker to continue with the affairs of the House. However, several Opposition MPs kept interrupting the House affairs

while standing in the middle of the Chamber. Speaker Abeywardena instructed the said MPs to go back to their seats while pointing

out that causing a commotion is only a waste of time. Speaker Abeywardena then

requested State Minister Arundika Fernando to make a statement as the agenda permits. However, Fernando was not able to carry on his speech due to the interruptions made by the

Opposition MPs. At this point, the microphone was given to the Opposition MP Nalin Bandara and he requested the House to give the due

time allotted to the Opposition Leader to talk about Ramanayake's matter.

"As you all know, the role of an Opposition Leader is very important. The time allotted to him should be used. If you can allow Lanza to speak, why can't you allow the Opposition Leader to speak? You cannot give him five minutes to talk and give us only a minute. We would like to request the Speaker to discontinue his ruling on MP Ramanayake. We believe it to be incorrect. You did not allow us to request leave of absence for MP Ramanayake and you take a

decision like this," MP Nalin Bandara said.

The Speaker then requested the State Minister Arundika Fernando to continue with his statement.

Meanwhile Speaker of the House, issuing a statement, denied all the allegations leveled against him by the Opposition concerning his decision on MP Ranjan Ramanayake.

The statement said that the Opposition is trying to create a wrong opinion among the people regarding the decision taken on Ramanayake's Parliamentary Seat.

The statement said: "The Opposition alleges that under Article 66 (e) of the Constitution, MP Ramanayake's seat has been revoked. According to that article, a Member of Parliament is suspended for failing to attend sittings of Parliament for three consecutive months without the prior permission of Parliament. However, Speaker Abeywardena pointed out that Ranjan Ramanayake's Parliamentary Seat was revoked in accordance with Article 66 (d) of the Constitution. According to that Article, a Member of Parliament shall be disqualified if he becomes disqualified in any way referred to in Article 89 or Article 91."

The Speaker pointed out that hence the opinion that the Opposition is trying to popularize is completely wrong and such false impressions are completely rejected by him.

# Culprits will be severely punished - Johnston

Unmasking of real culprits responsible for the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks will take place gradually once the judicial process gets underway, Chief Government Whip and Highways Minister Johnston Fernando said yesterday.

Addressing the media after a meeting held at his Ministry, Minister Fernando said that the judicial process would help identify the persons who aided and abetted the terror attacks and also those who had shirked their duties putting National Security in jeopardy.

"The Presidential Commission Report into the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks has made recommendations and suggested that legal action be taken. Once that process commences the culpability of those who committed offences as well as those who deliberately failed in their duties in acting to prevent the disaster will be made known," he said.

"If some of those in the Opposition think that criticising the Presidential Commission or trying to find loopholes in the Report would exonerate them from their crimes, they are mistaken," Minister Fernando said. The Minister said that he was also a member of the Cabinet Sub Committee appointed to study in depth the facts and recommendations on the course of action contained in the Final Report of the PCoI into the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks.

The Minister said that the main task of the Cabinet Sub Committee headed by former Speaker and Minister Chamal Rajapaksa was to study in-depth the findings and recommendations contained in the PCoI report and to advice on the next course of action. The Committee also comprised Ministers Udaya Gammanpila, Prasanna Ranatunga and Rohitha Abeygunawarde-

"We studied the report on the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks at length and have identified 78 recommendations. We thereafter submitted a report to the President outlining how those recommendations are to be implemented and which agencies are implementing them," he added.

"Since the day the Presidential Commission of Inquiry completed its investigations, Opposition



members shouted and demanded that the report be released. Since the day it was released, the

Opposition again demanded that it be tabled in Parliament. Since the day that has been done, they are making various allegations about the process of the PCoI and about the contents of the Report. Yet it seems that they have forgotten who is responsible for the incident that needed to be investigated by the PCoI. In the first place, it was the mistakes and wrongdoings of the then Government of which the present Opposition Leader was a member that gave way for the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks.

"These vociferous leaders now in the Opposition were not seen when the country was facing anarchy soon after the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks. While there was no leader, it was Archbishop His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith who came forward and appealed to the people to desist from possible violence and prevent another bloodbath in this country. The nation must be thankful to him for his brave action on that day. I do not think that they could just escape from their wrongdoing by changing their name from the UNP to SJB and shifting from the 'Elephant' symbol to the 'Telephone' symbol. They placed the country's National Security in jeopardy by making structural changes in the Police to form special units and divisions such as the FCID to suppress their political oppo-

nents," Minister Fernando added. "There had been Five Secretaries to the Ministry of Defence within a period of four years. Such was the time before the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks took place. The Yahapalana Government had the chance to investigate the April 21 terror attacks. They too appointed Committees including a Parliamentary Select Committee. What were their results? Instead of finding those responsible for this heinous crime, the PSC summoned the intelligence officials before it further compromising the country's National Security.

"Those now accusing the PCoI of failing to identify the masterminds of the attacks were in that PSC then. Why could they not make such identifications? Did the Yahapalana Government implement at least a single recommendation made by that PSC?," he asked.

"Soon after receipt of this PCoI report, the President presented it to the Cabinet and then to Parliament. A Cabinet Sub Committee was appointed to make further suggestions on the implantation of the PCoI recommendations. We have completed those tasks and now all is set for the judicial process which will unmask the wrongdoers and offenders responsible for the Easter Sunday Terror Attacks," the Minister said.

# 'Revitalising the agriculture sector, our aim'

Paddy and Grains, Organic Food, Vegetables, Fruits, Chillies, Onion and Potato Cultivation Promotion, **Seed Production and Advanced Technology Agriculture State Minis**ter Shasheendra Rajapaksa is a humble and amiable politician with a strong social conscience who has been striving to revitalise the agriculture sector.

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His foray into politics was not a mistake but the choice of people of the Uva Wellassa region where thousands laid down their lives during the Uva-Wellassa rebellion against the British colonials in 1818.

Rajapaksa who prefers fair justice and equity for his people, in an exclusive interview with the Daily News, says that the Government is making every possible effort to end the rice mafia in the country.

"Time has come to end the era in which the rice market is manipulated by a few mill owners," he said while asserting that the Government lacks an effective mechanism to counter false allegations against it. The State Minister also said a subtle campaign with ulterior motives is underway to embarrass the Government.

The full interview:

Several development projects were in progress • when you were the Chief Minister of the Uva Province. These projects were suspended by the previous Government after they came into power in 2015. Are you going to restart these projects?

A. We had a massive plan for the development of the Uva Province, particularly the Moneragala District, which is represented by me. We focused on the development of infrastructure facilities including roads and supplying of electricity, and potable water to the people of the two districts in the province. Over 92 percent of the households in the province have received electricity under the Uva Udanaya (Uva dawn) programme which began in 2010. At present over 95 percent of households in the province have electricity. The Government led by then President Mahinda Rajapaksa succeeded in developing the road network connecting major towns with the villages and bringing dividends of development to the villages by the end of 2014. The farmers at grassroots level had a problem in bringing their produce to the market due to lack of transport facilities. The development of the road network helped them find market avenues for their products. A plan was in place from 2014 to 2018 for the provision of potable water to the people in the Badulla and Moneragala Districts. Thirty-four projects were identified under this plan. We managed to complete two water supply projects, namely the Kumbukkan Oya Project and the Kataragama Project. Over 45,000 families living in Buttala, Okkampitiya, Nakkala, Moneragala and Siyabalanduwa are benefited by the Kumbukkan Oya Project and 42,000 acres of arable lands are under the plough.



trict to look into the possibility of recommencing these abandoned projects.

The education sector has undergone several waves • of reforms during the past three decades. What is your programme for the uplift of educational standards in the province?

A. We have focused on promoting educational standards in the province for which over Rs. one billion has been allocated by the Government. A meeting was held with the Governor and other stakeholders in the province to discuss how these funds are utilised for the uplift of education as a large number of schools in the district come under the Provincial Council's purview.

When I was the Chief Minister of the Uva Province, we succeeded in introducing an early childhood development policy and a special authority was also set up for the development of this sector in the province.

A new syllabus was also formulated with the help of the experts in the field and all preschools are bound to follow this syllabus. Preschool teachers are also required to meet a certain level of educational standards as per the registration process.

Over 80 percent of preschools in the province which have met the necessary criteria are registered with the authority. President Gotabaya Rajapaksa should be given the credit for establishing a State Ministry for the Uplift of Early Childhood Education under the Education Ministry.

Why do you focus more on the development of the Moneragala District than **Badulla District?** 

The country annually requires 24 metric tonnes of paddy for consumption and the monthly rice requirement in the country is only two metric tonnes which include white raw, samba and steamed rice. The harvesting of paddy has started.

The Government is purchasing paddy from farmers at Rs. 55 per kilogramme with the intention of ensuring a better price for farmers. The farmers at the grassroots level are benefited from this move. The Paddy Marketing Board (PMB) together with agricultural research officers at the village level started purchasing paddy at Rs. 55 per kilogramme from farmers and our target is to have a

stock above 300,000 metric tonnes which is above the country's average requirement.

When we announced a maximum price of Rs. 55 for a kilogramme of paddy to buy from farmers, the private sector started purchasing paddy from farmers at Rs. 57–60 per kilogramme. The Government recently decided to purchase paddy at a fixed price of Rs. 57 per kilogramme from farmers.

Farmers are reluctant to sell their paddy harvest to the Government or the private sector either, expecting that their produce would receive a higher price later. If we purchase paddy at above Rs. 57 per kilogramme, the rice prices will have to be increased. The Government recently decided not to allow any force to increase rice prices above Rs. 100 per kilogramme.

There are one million paddy farmers in the country but we have to feed 22 million people in the country. If rice is not sold below the controlled price, the Government is ready to issue 25,000 metric tonnes of rice to the market every week to keep the rice prices below Rs. 100.

The PMB will process paddy stocks from time to time through small-scale mill owners and release these stocks to the market through Lak Sathosa, if rice prices do not come down.

There are more than 400 small-scale rice mill owners whose businesses are on the brink of closure as a few mill owners are dominating the market. The PMB will venture into rice processing soon with the support of small-scale rice mill owners and the Board has a plan to erect paddy silos too even though a silo cost Rs. 200 million to the Government.

The paddy purchasing drive is continuing and the Sri Lanka Army renovated more than 300 paddy stores in the country on the directive of the President with the intention of storing more stocks. We expect to fill all stores belonging to the PMB with paddy.

which Rs. 200 million has been allocated by the Government. The private sector is far more ahead of us in terms of producing organic foods

The Agriculture Ministry has drawn less attention towards the production of organic fertilizer and some officials are also responsible for this situation.

When we imposed a ban on the import of several items that can easily be grown in the country, there was a hue and cry in the society. Prices of turmeric and undu went up. But now the situation has changed and the farmers find it difficult to market their turmeric harvest.

We will not allow the Opposition to build political platforms against the Government. The President has allowed the constituent party members in our fold to air their views, grievances and concerns. The President is giving a patient ear to their concerns.

The ruling alliance comprises many political parties and they have different views. Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa can endure hurtful and intense criticism with patience as a politician.

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa is not a politician and his decisions may sometimes be not popular. But he is making the right decision for the benefit of the country. When the ban on many agri produce including turmeric was imposed, he came under heavy criticism by many parties. But the country has benefitted from this move as farmers started growing them locally.

Various guarters blame the Government for the • alleged surge in deforestation and they say effective measures are not in place to arrest the situation. What is your view?

**A.** The Government refutes factually inaccurate and false allegations. There is a subtle move to embarrass the Government by making false allegations that the Government is involved in clearing forestlands. A girl who participated in a TV programme had claimed that lands belonging to the Sinharaja Forest Reserve are being destructed. But the officials confirmed that the land in question does not belong to the Forest Conservation Reserve and it is located 11 Km away from the Sinharaja forest boundary. The Government has never allowed any person to clear lands belonging to the Forest Conservation Department and engage in Chena cultivation. A person can complain to the Environment Police if any sort of destruction is caused to the environment. But the complainant should be able to give full details of the incident and the area where it is taking place. There was an era in our country in which massive destruction was done to the environment due to the acceleration of the Mahaweli Development Project by the UNP Government but no one raised such issues at that time. The Mahaweli Authority is presently involved in a massive reforestation drive. The Government has been faced with several al- legations which included deforestation, reduction of sugar tax benefiting a trading company and soaring rice prices in the market. Why does not the Government have an effective mechanism to counter these allegations? A. That is true. We do not have an effective mechanism to counter these allegations. But concerns raised by the public in some instances are correct. If people have money in their hands, over 60 percent of problems faced by them are over. No one is asking why a ban has been imposed on imports. We have obtained massive loans for the development projects implemented by the Government and we have to save foreign exchange to repay these loans. The Government has already planned the repayment of another loan instalment by the end of this year. A colossal amount of money is spent a day for the prevention of COVID-19 and nobody is thinking about this. All incomegenerating sectors have been affected due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The tourism industry collapsed and the employees in the sector do not have an income.

#### Why were these projects suspended by the previous • Government in 2015?

A. I do not know why these projects meant for the benefit of the people in the Uva province were suspended by the Yahapalana Government. They may not have had an interest in implementing these projects or maybe they were not capable of implementing this type of development drives for the benefit of the people. I personally believe that the previous Government was incapable of bringing development to the village.

#### Are development activities taking place in the Uva Province at present?

**A**. Yes. The present Government led by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has focused on completing the road development drive which was begun by our Government before 2015 and almost all major construction companies in the country are presently engaged in road development projects in the district.

We are going to recommence the water supply projects which were halted by the Yahapalana Government. Water Supply Ministry Secretary Dr. Priyath Bandu Ŵickrama along with the other officials recently inspected all parts of the Moneragala Dis-

**A.** I think the political leaders in the Moneragala District may have not properly identified what the people in the district want. Some think that the people in the district are dependent on subsidies. The Moneragala District had been receiving stepmotherly treatment under UNP and Yahapalana Governments. The people in Wellassa do not want subsidies. They could make their ends meet without any issue as they have coconut, jak, and breadfruit trees in their gardens. They are not starving. What they want is to have proper education for their children.

#### There is an allegation that farmers in the Moneragala • District find it difficult to market their produce. What is vour view?

**A.** I do not think that there is any difficulty in marketing their produce. Informal cultivation has become the root cause for farmers to undergo difficulties in marketing their produce.

The agriculture officer at the village level should actively be involved in regulating crop cultivation in the country. This will help farmers to find a better market for their produce. The tradition of raising a single crop by all farmers should be dispensed with immediately. Crop diversification should take place.

Agricultural research officers coming under the purview of the Agrarian Services Department have failed to suggest to farmers what crops should be cultivated.

A dedicated economic centre along with a processing unit will also be established in the province with the objective of providing market avenues for the agricultural produce in the Moneragala District.

This proposed economic centre will also serve farmers in the adjoining districts and the farmers' produce will also be sorted and graded at this centre to cater to customers' needs.

#### There are serious allegations against the Agricul-• ture Ministry for failing to keep a buffer paddy stock to regulate the rice prices in the market. What is the Agriculture Ministry's role in the control of rice prices?

**A.** The Agriculture Ministry does not hold any responsibility over rice prices in the market but we are responsible for the cultivation, purchasing and storing of paddy. stores in almost all parts of the country and we will issue paddy stocks to these mills to be supplied to Lak Sathosa.

For the first time in history, 24 institutions have been brought under the Agriculture Ministry to provide streamlined service to the public, particularly the farmers, and institutions related to agriculture, trade and consumers are also interlinked.

#### You are the State Minister in charge of potatoes. • How are you going to tackle the shortage of potato seeds every season?

A. The shortage of potato seeds is not a new issue. When farmers are faced with financial issues, they are in the habit of selling their seeds.

We are going to set up a seed bank at the agrarian division level to help the farmers who fail to keep seed stocks.

The capacity of the Potato Research Centre in Seetha Eliya has been augmented by three-fold for the production of Generation I potato seeds by investing Rs. 300 million. There may be less progress this year. But the programme will bear fruits from next year. We expect to fulfil 60 percent of the potato requirement of the country within a very short time.

The fertilizer subsidy introduced by your Gov- ernment benefitted thousands of farmers and that subsidy helped make the country self-sufficient in rice. But, some politicians alleged at the 2015 Presidential Election that fertilizer subsidy had caused chronic kidney diseases. What is your plan for the promotion of organic farming in the country?

A. The organic farming project is underway in 50 agrarian services divisions and paddy, vegetables and fruits are grown under this project. The Agriculture Ministry is purchasing the crops produced using organic fertilizer by these farmers.

There are two Government entities that are responsible for importing chemical fertilizers to the country. We will turn one of such institutions for the production and import of organic fertilizer to the country. A laboratory will be set up in Makandura for testing of organic foods and fertilizer for

A number of companies producing valueadded products out of turmeric have decided to grow their turmeric requirement within the country.

#### How are you going to ensure a constant supply of agricultural produce while maintaining a stable price for them in the market?

**A.** All institutions related to agriculture, trade, and irrigation are making a concerted effort to ensure that there is no shortage of agricultural produce in the market.

Farmers should adopt a timetable in terms of ploughing and harvesting and the Irrigation Department should also have a proper mechanism to release water to farming lands. Stability in price can be maintained and the shortage of agricultural crops can be avoided when crops are cultivated according to a timetable.

The Agriculture Department is obtaining international assistance including from the World Bank for the modernisation of the agriculture sector aiming at increasing our production. Seven processing units are also to be set up covering all parts of the country. We are getting expertise from many countries including Israel to develop modern farming technology.

Some political parties within the Government • fold are criticising the Government's policies and these parties seem to be forming a faction within the Government. Does this mean that cracks are developing within the ruling alliance?

A. No, not at all. There may be lapses on our part and no one is perfect. It is better if our lapses are pinpointed by our own family members rather than outsiders. Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa's politics are very different from others in the game. We are always in the regular process of rectifying our shortcomings and marching forward. Although we are treading on different paths, we will be together at last. It may sometimes be the day prior to the election.

Complaints by the children of a family do not imply that these children are against the father. The father is listening to the demands made by the children. Even if a child thinks he wants to leave the family, that never happens. Even if he leaves, it will not make much difference.

# **Proposal to absorb provincial scribes** to Wages Board for Journalism

Silva has proposed to absorb provincial correspondents and journalists who play a major role in the field of journalism in the country to the Wages Board for Journalism.

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The Minister recently informed the Commissioner General of Labour Prabath Chandrakeerthi to take the necessary steps in this regard.

The Minister also told Chandrakeerthi to change the structure of the Wages Board

# World Health Day 2021: "Building a fairer, healthier world"

"These individuals are disproportionately vulnerable to exposure to the disease, less able to access the health services they need, and more likely to experience adverse consequences as a result of measures implemented to contain the pandemic.

Therefore, some people are able to live healthier lives and have better access to health services than others - entirely due to the conditions in which they are born, grow, live, work, play and age.

Members of the former government that did nothing to find the culprits of the Easter Sunday attacks are alleging today that the government used it in their favour to come to power, Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna Parliamentarian Susil Premajayantha said in Parliament yesterday. He said so during the Adjournment Motion on the report of the President's Commission on the Easter Sunday attacks.

**Refuting Opposition** allegations, the MP said that as the report of the President's Commission on the Easter Sunday attacks pointed out that the conflict within the

Good Governance Gov ernment weakened national security, paving

the way for the attacks. He said the public had understood that the economy, development, and the security of the country had collapsed under the Good Governance Government long before the Easter Sunday attacks and expressed their confidence on the victory of the SLPP. Premajayantha added that at the time of the attacks, there was no intention to hold elections in the country

under the previous regime. He said that the Presidential Commission was appointed seven months



after the attacks. Even at the Parliament, the affiliated members were appointed to a committee and engaged in discussions, rather than taking the necessary measures to bring the culprits to book.

delays in investigating and prosecuting would affect a case against culprits even in an ordinary crime as evidence could be concealed, witnesses could die, or related persons might hide or go abroad.

Premajayantha added that the same lackadaisical nature exhibited by Good Governance Government with the setting

up of the Financial Crimes Investigation Division (FCID) through gazettes to arrest and file cases was not exhibited in taking action against the Easter Sunday suspects. He assured that the current government is taking the necessary measures

in that regard. He asked as to how those members could make allegations against the government. The MP said that the

Presidential Commission is not a body that could go after suspects, but to hear the evidence brought before it. He added the evidence and the report of the Commission should be directed to the Attorney-General, police, and other institutions to take action following detailed investigations.

He added that in this endeavour, everyone should get together as the attack affected the faith between the communities, the economy, and the tourism industry.



# **Easter Sunday attacks:** Sabry says all culprits directly or indirectly involved should face justice

'The UNP will undertake efforts to safeguard Sri Lanka's environment and natural resources. thereby ensuring a sustainable future for our citizens. Our priority is the protection of the Sinharaja Rainforest, which is facing a threat from the unchecked actions of the Government," the declaration said. "The existing laws in the country must be enforced, and through them further deforestation and destruction to the environment will be halted. The campaign should not end here. We must go on to build a consensus on a new framework to give effect to the Paris Climate Agreement. These should include protecting the Carbon Sink," the UNP added. The existing Forest Ordinance in the country would be strengthened under this declaration, the UNP said. "It is proposed that stronger laws be introduced to safeguard and increase forest cover, as well as tree cover. This can be accomplished by amending the Forest

Ordinance, based on the Forest Law Act of 1991 (Switzerland), the Karnataka Preservation of Trees Act of 1976 (India), the Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation Regulation) Act of England, and the Tree protection laws adopted by the State Parliaments of

# 'Steps underway to make all State institutions present annual reports on time'

Chief Government Whip Johnston Fernando said that the government would take measures to make all its institutions present their annual reports on time. He said so in Parliament yesterday when SJB Parliamentarian Buiddhika Patrhirana said that the Sri Lanka Standard Institute (SLSI) had failed to

present its annual reports since 2016. Fernando said that most public institutions have not submitted their annual reports since 2015. He added that it was the duty of the government to get those institutions to present their annual reports in the Parliament, which the former government failed to accomplish.

PMB bought no rice from local farmers in 2018/19 - Aluthgamage

The Paddy Marketing Board (PMB) had not bought a single grain of rice from local paddy farmers in 2018 and 2019, Agriculture Minister Mahindananda Aluthgamage said in Parliament yesterday. He added that the certified rice price, which was Rs.30 under the former government, has been increased to Rs.50 by the current government.

The PMB was established to ensure that paddy is bought at a proper certified price to enhance the living of the farmers, see to consumer needs, and maintain a secure flow of paddy stock



to the market, the minister said. He added that the PMB, at a competitive rate, buys the harvests of paddy farmers who get fertiliser at the concessionary rate from the government. Aluthgamage said that

'samba' rice could be bought at PMB centres at a rate of Rs.56.50. He added that the Good Governance Government let private mill owners control paddy prices.

"The Paddy Marketing Board had not bought a single grain of rice in 2018 and 2019 during the Good Governance Government's rule. Paddy stores had been handed over to two former ministers to set up garment factories. Moreover, the former Minister P. Harison sold quality rice as cattle food and incurred a loss of Rs.20 billion in 2015.

"There will be a limit on non-agricultural practices and a prohibition of the commercial fragmentation of agricultural land. # 50 police personnel dead in road accidents in 15 months

"What we can say is that the appraisal that we have for the moment, and this is under consideration by the experts, is that the benefit risk assessment for the vaccine is still largely positive," said Dr Pinto de Sá Gaspar. He reported that "thrombolytic events" are rare, and are now being categorised in terms of their distribution within the population.

<sup>•</sup>For the time being, there is no evi-

dence that the benefit risk assessment for the vaccine needs to be changed," he said. "We know from the data coming from countries like the UK and others that the benefits are really important in terms of reduction of the mortality of populations that are being vaccinated," he added.

WHO's Global Advisory Committee on Vaccine Safety was due to meet on Wednesday, which also will look at the data, with a conclusion expected later in the week. WHO continues to work with a group of scientists worldwide to develop nomenclature for variants of the new coronavirus.

Many people, including health experts, have been referring to the variants by the

countries in which they were first detected—something the UN agency wants to change.

"We need to make sure that any of the names that are used do not further stigmatise a person, or a last name, or a location, inadvertently," said Dr Maria Van Kerhove, WHO's Technical Lead on COVID-19, responding to a question from a South African journalist. "There should be no stigma associated with these viruses being detected, and unfortunately we still see that happening," she added.

Currently, there are three variants: B117, first identified in the UK; B 1.351, which was first identified in South Africa; and P1, a variant first detected in Japan, but is circulating in Brazil. (UN News)

# **COPE instructs Sports Ministry to take legal action** against former SLC ExCo if irregularities are found

The Committee on Public Enterprises (COPE) yesterday instructed Sports Ministry Secretary Anuradha Wijekoon to take legal action if any of the former members of the Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) Executive Committee are found guilty of fraud. Committee Chairman Prof. Charitha Herath stated that the assistance of the Attorney-General could be obtained for the purpose. The COPE Chairman said so at the COPE meeting con-

vened to examine the Auditor-General's report and its current performance for the financial years 2017 and 2018 of the SLC. The committee pointed out that 123 of the 162 approved cadre are contract positions, which is a serious question. The committee also pointed out that the posts of Head of Finance, Legal Officer, Information Technolo-

gy Officer, and Internal Auditor should be permanent positions. The committee recommend-

ed that the procurement process of the SLC be streamlined and that a proper system be introduced to streamline it. It was also discussed at the committee meeting that the intervention of the Director-General of Sports should be at a higher level than the current one.

The committee also recommended that Sri Lanka Cricket should develop a proper format for disbursing funds to sports associations. They directed the Ministry of Sports and the SLC to take immediate action to amend the Sports Act.

Prof. Herath said that the reason for the massive collapse of cricket in the country was not the fault of the players, but the weaknesses of the cricket administration. The committee questioned the non-recovery of Rs.29 million in revenue due for sponsorship of the South Africa-Sri Lanka Cricket tour in 2018

SLC Executive Officer Ashley de Silva informed the Committee that the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) has commenced an investigation

into the matter. It was revealed at the meeting that the money had been deposited in an American bank account named 'Diamond Channel', and that investigations were focused on how it happened.

Prof. Herath instructed Wijekoon to conduct an inquiry and submit its report to the committee within three months.

It was also revealed at the meeting that Rs.30 million has been spent to take legal action against former SLC Head Coach Chandika Hathurusinghe due to the shortcomings of his agreement.

Although Rs.132 million has been spent for the construction of a National Cricket Stadium and a Multi-Sports Complex in Hingurakgoda, Polonnaruwa, the committee paid special attention to the fact that a title deed has not yet been obtained for the relevant land.

The committee directed the Ministry of Sports to take immediate action to resolve the issue.

# Nineteen injured in bus accident

# SL's G7 partners to support Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment for COVID-19 recovery

The year 2020 marked 20 years since the adoption of the United Nations Security Council Resolution 1325 on 'Women, Peace, and Security'—a groundbreaking resolution that enshrined the essential role of women in securing and maintaining peace, UN Women stated in a press release.

In doing so, promoting the Women, Peace, and Security Agenda in Sri Lanka is a key priority."

The G7+ Working Group was established to take forward the 'Women, Peace, and Security' Agenda in the country, through the development and implementation of a National Action Plan to respond to the needs and priorities of women affected by conflict.

Reiterating their commitment, Kitamura Toshihiro, Minister and Deputy Head of Mission at the Embassy of Japan in Sri Lanka, stated, "Japan has been supporting peace and development in Sri Lanka for many years, and become a partner country of Sri Lanka under the G7 Initiatives on 'Women, Peace, and Security' in 2018, to contribute to the achievement of gender equality and women's empowerment, as well as to strengthen women's rights in Sri Lanka. "As the partner and lead



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# Clarity still needed on effectiveness of COVID-19 vaccine passports: WHO

Being vaccinated against COVID-19 may not prevent its transmission, and vaccination passports may not be an "effective strategy" for restarting travel, the World Health Organisation (WHO) cautioned on Tuesday.

"At this stage, we would not like to see vaccination passports as a requirement for entry or exit because we are not sure at this stage that the vaccine prevents transmissions," said WHO Spokesperson Dr. Margaret Harris ahead of World Health Day on April 7.

Dr. Harris added that vaccine passports may not be an effective strategy as "not everyone has access to vaccines and there are groups in society who are excluded... We are still waiting on adequate supplies to provide the vaccines to all the countries that need them."

Highlighting how COVID-19 has impacted



some people more than others, Dr. Harris said that the virus "has really exposed the stark inequities in access to and coverage of health services... Groups who already faced discrimination, poverty, social exclusion, difficult living, and working conditions were the hardest-hit by the pandemic".

For this year's World Health Day, the UN agency has urged countries to build a fairer, healthier world post-COVID-19. Dr. Harris called for action to "put in place policies and allocate resources so the most vulnerable groups can see their condition improve faster".

This means "improving living conditions for all", tackling "poverty and health inequities", building sustainable societies and strong economies, and promoting "a more equitable sharing of resources, ensuring food security and nutrition" and turning "the tide on climate change". There is so much work to do, she said.

The latest WHO data from April 6, at the time of posting, indicates that there have been 131,309,792 confirmed cases of COVID-19, including 2,854,276 deaths globally, reported to WHO. By the end of April 5, a total of 604,032,357 vaccine doses had been administered.

Regionally, infections and deaths remain highest in the Americas, with 56,880,123 confirmed cases, followed by Europe (46,085,310), South-East Asia (15,438,907), Eastern Mediterranean (7,785,717), Africa (3,126,037), and Western Pacific (1,992,953). - UN News

# A prudent move

he latest move by the Police to arrest the alarming trend of road accidents, it is hoped, would put an end to the mayhem on our roads. According to Police Spokesman DIG Ajith Rohana, beginning on April 10 they would be checking vehicles to detect those driving under the influence of liquor in round-the-clock operations. He said so far this was being done in the evenings and nights since it is reasonable to assume that alcohol is consumed mostly in the late hours of the day. However, now it has been decided to extend this to the daytime as well considering that during the New Year season drinking bouts could take place even in the early hours.

It has also been decided to check drivers for drug use. The DIG said a law has been in place since 1979 to arrest those driving vehicles under the influence of alcohol as well as drugs, but the lack of expertise and equipment for the detection of drivers who are after drugs has stymied this effort. Now special teams have been trained to look for signs of drug use by those at the wheel, which would go a long way in arresting the rising incidents of road mishaps. Perhaps, the Police could start with drivers of private buses and they are sure to net in a rich harvest of drug addicts at the wheel. The president of the country's main private bus operators union himself has confessed that as many as 60 percent of the private bus crew in the Western Province were drug addicts. It is also more likely that bus drivers on long distance services are deeply into drugs. Fatigue and drudgery may well induce these men to seek solace in the oblivion of drugs to keep them going.

Taking drugs could also induce sleep while at the wheel and the police who are now equipped to identify drug users among vehicle operators should look for such signs. It is not known if the truck driver who knocked down a Traffic OIC in Pannipitiya was into drugs. But he has confessed to Police that long hours on the road transporting fruits and vegetables from the hill country on a daily basis without a break left him over-fatigued which made his head slump over the wheel moments before the mishap.

Here lies another recipe for disaster. A majority of road accidents involve heavy vehicles such as tippers and monster trucks on long haul non-stop journeys. The drivers of these vehicles perhaps are forced by the owners to make the maximum number trips per day to earn more profits like the Pannipitiya truck driver. A law should be introduced to make it compulsory for drivers of all long


# **THE JVP** from insurrection to democracy

failed first insurrection staged by the Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP) passed almost unannounced this week but provides an opportune moment for reflection on the role of the party in Sri Lanka's political landscape, its past attempts at gaining power and its future prospects.


The JVP was founded by its first leader and ideologue, Rohana Wijeweera in 1965. Its objective was to stage a socialist revolution in Sri Lanka. Wijeweera had returned to Sri Lanka from Russia, where he was a medical undergraduate at the Lumumba University in Moscow.

Wijeweera began his political life affiliated to the Communist Party (CP) which, along with the Lanka Samasamaja Party (LSSP), constituted the major leftist parties in Sri Lanka at the time. The LSSP and the CP joined forces with the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP) to form the United Front (UF) in 1970.

In the lead up to the 1970 general election, Wijeweera supported the UF but on the condition that Ms. Sirimavo Bandaranaike should address the issues raised by them. As a result of this, the United National Party (UNP) government had Wijeweera arrested prior to the poll which was held in May that year.

The UF was returned to power with a resounding majority at the general election in 1970 with Sirimavo Bandaranaike as Prime Minister. Magnanimous in victory, Bandaranaike facilitated Wijeweera's release from custody. It was then that the JVP leader began preparations for the 'revolution'.

paraya (DJV) which was effectively the military wing of the party. It staged a series of attacks on military camps aimed at seizing weapons. This time around, its campaign for the 'revolution' was decidedly more brutal.

The JVP targeted those connected to the then ruling UNP. Among those assassinated were Minister Lionel Jayatilleke and Secretaries General of the UNP Harsha Abeywardena and Nandalal Fernando. Actor politician Vijaya Kumaratunga and artiste Premakeerthi de Alwis were also killed by the JVP.

The party also launched a series of strikes and 'curfews' throughout the country and began killing members of the Armed Forces. It is believed that the latter strategy alienated the party from the people even though the UNP Government had been in power for over a decade and was not very popular.

The JVP actively sabotaged the 1988 Presidential Election but the UNP candidate Ranasinghe Premadasa emerged victorious. Following his victory, Premadasa ordered a ruthless crackdown on JVP activities. Spearheading this was the then State Minister of Defence, Ranjan Wijeratne.

The insurrection effectively ended with the capture of JVP leader Rohana Wijeweera. He was arrested at an estate in Ulapane where he was masquerading as 'Attanayake', a planter. Wijeweera was brought to Colombo and made a speech on television before the Government announced his death.

#### Wijeweera's death

The exact circumstances regarding Wijeweera's death remain controversial to this day. Minister Wijeratne announced at a media briefing that Wijeweera was taken to a JVP hideout and was shot dead by a colleague. However, many other theories about his death have circulated in the media.

There was a lull in JVP activity thereafter until the advent of Chandrika Kumaratunga as President in 1994. The person responsible for resurrecting the JVP was Somawansa Amarasinghe, the only member of the JVP's Politburo to survive the events of 1989. He then assumed leadership of the JVP.

Under Amarasinghe, the JVP reentered the democratic mainstream and eschewed violence. The JVP's candidate at the 1994 presidential election, Nihal Galappaththi withdrew his candidature from the poll after extracting a promise from Kumaratunga that she would abolish the Executive Presidency, though this turned out to be a broken promise. Since then, the JVP has contested Presidential and General Elections and has had mixed results. While it has been able to maintain its status as the third largest political party in the country after the then major parties, the UNP and the SLFP, it has never had a real prospect of forming its own Government. In late 2001, faced with a Vote of No Confidence, Kumaratunga formed a 'Probationary' Government, offering the JVP four portfolios. Kumaratunga famously said that she would do a 'deal with the devil' to ensure that her Government remained in power. This arrangement was however very shortlived. The JVP's best performance in terms of Parliamentary representation was in 2004, when it contested in coalition with the SLFP-led alliance. Using the tactic of nominating only a few candidates in each electoral list, it secured 39 Seats in Parliament and became a crucial partner in the government. Since then, however, the JVP has shown promise of becoming the 'third force' in Sri Lankan politics from time to time but has not lived up to that promise. This is despite its members subscribing to the principles of being free of allegations of corruption or involvement in other scandals. Somawansa Amarasinghe retired as JVP leader in 2014, following a series of internal disputes in the party and Anura Kumara Dissanayake has since led the party. A forceful orator with a reputation as an honest and hardworking politician, Dissanayake has however failed to elevate the JVP's standing. After not offering a candidate at the 2015 presidential election in a strategic move that enabled Maithripala Sirisena to win the poll, Dissanayake contested the 2019 election. He polled over 400,000 votes or over 3 per cent of the vote, a percentage that was less than what Wijeweera polled in 1982. In analysing the JVP's role in Sri Lankan democratic politics after two failed attempts at gaining power through armed struggles, it is noted that the JVP has not realised its potential as a third party despite disaffection with the major political parties - and is unlikely to do so in the near future as well. This is because the party has stuck to its leftist ideologies at a time when the world is moving away from them. It may also be because the JVP has never really acknowledged that its actions in 1971 and 1989 were flawed and apologised to the nation. It would do well to reflect on these issues, even now.

haul vehicles to break journey for a rest and recommence only after being fully awake and refreshed.

The Odometer should tell the Police checking such a vehicle the number of Kms travelled and if the time taken for the journey fits with the mileage indicated. Business owners deploying such vehicles too should be compelled to maintain regular hours and stiff penalties levied for any breaches. There is no knowing how many lives were lost and the numbers maimed due to drivers falling asleep during long journeys. Equally there is no knowing how many road accidents resulting in fatalities have occurred as a result of driving under the influence of drugs with the police only now acquiring the expertise to detect such offenders.

Now that the Police have taken another positive step in their quest to arrest the steep rise in road accidents they should go the whole hog and look for other aspects that contribute to the mayhem on our roads. For instance, the road worthiness of vehicles too should be looked into. Needless to say, faulty mechanisms too are responsible for accidents and vehicles losing control and going down ravines. All rickety jalopies should be removed from our roads and put to pasture. An age limit too should be imposed for driving, for poor reflexes too lead to drivers losing control of their vehicles ending in disaster. This is not to say that the young are safe drivers. Recent incidents where youth barely out of their teens being responsible for countless deaths by their reckless driving tell a tale.

This brings us to the whole business of driving schools. Some of these so-called driving schools are hastily put up affairs one could encounter at almost all street corners in the cities and suburbs. Their competence has been called into question countless times. They are known to send their students for the driving exam after a few cursory lessons. This is seen mostly in cases where youth are in a hurry to leave for foreign jobs as drivers. All such driving schools should be brought under scrutiny and made to fall in line. It is hoped that the latest drive by the Police to check the rising spate of road accidents in all earnestness would bear fruition and our roads will be made safer for the public – both motorists and pedestrians.

which he conducted which became known as the 'five classes'. It comprised of a succinct analysis of the socio-political issues at the time, explaining why the 'Old Left' had failed and arguing the need for a 'revolution'.

The classes were conducted clandestinely and Wijeweera succeeded in convincing significant numbers of youth to join the JVP. By 1971, Wijeweera believed he had sufficient cadres after about an estimated 10,000 youth were recruited. Several bank robberies reportedly funded these operations.

The attack on the Wellawaya Police station on the morning of April 5, 1971 heralded the launch of the insurrection. Later that day, dozens of other Police stations throughout the country were attacked. The worst affected were the Southern districts of the country, where the JVP had its strongest presence.



#### Second insurrection

This second insurrection began towards the end of Jayewardene's second term. The main impetus came after Jayewardene signed the Indo-Lanka Accord creating Provincial Councils to devolve powers to minority communities. The Accord, unpopular with the public, became a rallying cry for the JVP.

# **World Bank: Impunity for disability discrimination**

The 15,900-strong World Bank, which has funded over 12,000 development projects worldwide since 1947, is an international institution with a superlative reputation for its sustained efforts to end poverty in the developing world—with loans, interest-free credit and outright grants.

But it has come under heavy fire for its blatant violations of disability rights—an area where no US labour laws are applicable because the Washington-based institution enjoys diplomatic immunity.

Speaking on condition of anonymity, a spokesperson for the Disability Support Group at the World Bank told IPS the Bank has been hiding behind its diplomatic immunity for decades to cover up abuse of staff ranging from sexual harassment to institutional discrimination against its most vulnerable disabled staff.

"There is absolutely no national or international accountability framework that the World Bank can be held accountable to – neither the UN Convention on the Rights of the Persons with Disabilities nor the American with Disabilities Act (ADA)."

#### Lack of transparency and accountability

"We have cases and irrefutable evidence of serious and consistent disability abuse and harassment of staff, conflict of interest, lack of transparency and accountability – the very values and conditionality for World Bank projects."


Andre Hovaguimian, a former Director of the International Finance Corporation, Middle East & North Africa, a sister organisation of the World Bank, told IPS: "The World Bank's treatment of staff injured in the line of duty has been and continues to be deplorable."

"Staff injured in the line of duty, taking risks to do the Bank's business, should be treated with care and respect. The Bank's diplomatic immunity should no longer be used to abuse the disabled," said Hovaguimian.

Currently more than one billion people worldwide – including an estimated 800 million in developing countries – experience some form of disability, according to the *World Report on Disability* authored jointly by the World Bank (WB) and World Health Organisation (WHO).

"Persons with disabilities face stigma, discrimination, and exclusion from accessing jobs and services, such as education and health care, and they consistently fare less well than their non-disabled peers in development gains," said the study.

The charges of discrimination have come up at a time when the World Bank is holding its annual 2021 Spring Meetings in Washington DC. The meetings, which began on April 5 will continue through April 11.

"When I was denied worker's compensation against the findings from five reputable doctors, I was told that "As an international organisation established under its Articles of Agreement, the World Bank Group has been granted certain privileges and immunities under U.S. laws."

"I feel discouraged, bullied and abused. It is a case of David against Goliath, with the most vulnerable and handicapped having to fight a disability programme that has no proper Governance, Accountability or Transparency. There is no justice for the disabled at the World Bank", he complained.

"The World Bank is evading accountability and oversight of its disability programme by saying it is not subject of either UN Conventions or US disability laws while keeping its own Executive Board in the dark". The other former staff member who has previously been disabled confirmed: "I was harassed to the point of breakdown. The disability programme is managed completely

arbitrarily with secret procedures not shared with staff but used against them".

"I am really sick of this hypocrisy where the World Bank lectures developing countries on disability inclusion while it discriminates shamelessly against its own disabled. While an independent grievance mechanism is mandatory for all projects, the WB refuses to allow its

disabled staff the same opportunity," he declared.

#### Health and safety

Asked for an official reaction, a World Bank spokesperson told IPS: "The World Bank Group is committed to ensuring the health and safety of our staff and their families. Our benefits, policies and track record over the years demonstrate this commitment".

"Our self-insured insurance programmes include disability and worker's compensation programmes, which provide comprehensive benefits to staff injured in the line of duty, or those that are unable to work due to a disabling condition occurring outside of the work environment".

"Given the global footprint of the organisation, as well as its presence in a number of port or be present in many of the markets in which the Bank Group operates, which are amongst the poorest nations in the world."

"We regularly review our benefits and processes to ensure we meet the needs of staff and their families, taking input from plan beneficiaries and stakeholders," the spokesperson added.

"The World Bank integrates disability issues into its operations around the world across a wide range of sectors, including promoting access to infrastructure facilities and social services, rehabilitation, skills development, creating economic opportunities, and working with Organisations of Persons with Disabilities. This is at the core of the World Bank's work to build sustainable, inclusive communities, aligned with the institution's goals to end extreme poverty and promote shared prosperity," the Bank's spokesperson declared.

Providing more specifics, S. Gonzalez Flavell, a former Special Assistant (retired) to the Director General of Evaluation and Senior Counsel WBG

ior Counsel WBG Legal Department told IPS:

"I was a disabled staff member under the World Banks self-funded disability programme for eighteen over months. The experience was significantly demeaning and disturbing, my status carried stigma and it was made clear to me by Bank numerous Senior Management staff that my career and professional reputation

would be adversely affected.

The programme lacks clarity in requirements and transparency in application, and I repeatedly had to require procedures to be correctly followed, actions were taken by the Disability Administrator that would have been unlawful had any of the US protective laws for disabled persons applied and a copy of the operating guidelines applying to the programme was denied to me despite reasonable request.

The disability administrator did not act in accordance with known disclosed programme requirements and instead made arbitrary decisions capriciously without respect for my health or concern for me, my treating physicians treatment plan or my recovery and return to work.

The Bank's HR team, which should have overseen the Disability Administrator's actions, acted throughout as if my health and benefits which I had to fight through the justice system before they corrected) and leave rules and even allowed my job to be affected and declared my position redundant while I was on disability (again disallowed under US law). Despite my health issues I had to take on HR to prevent financial benefits and career and leave abuse significantly affecting my health wellness and recovery.

On return to work I, as I knew had happened to many other returning disabled staff, faced hostility and retaliation every effort was made to exclude me and deny any right to reintegration with the work force.

#### **Disability programmes**

Having discussed and now researched several disability programmes, including those of other international organisations, including with disabled persons, the World Bank's disability programme remains the most lacking in integrity, compassion or equitable treatment and that it continues to exist in its current form is a failure to care adequately for staff from whom it demands so much, a failure to understand sound management and the hard realities faced by disabled staff and, without recourse to an independent grievance redress system, is an abuse of human rights," he declared.

Meanwhile, the World Bank Group has raised USD 82 billion for IDA19 (International Development Association, member of the WBG) to support the world's poorest and most vulnerable countries with a particular focus on disability.

The Disability Support Group said IDA19 will do more to expand equitable opportunities for people with disabilities." Disability is therefore a major focus of this IDA19 replenishment, with World Bank seeking funding from donor countries because "investing in people, and especially in people with disabilities who are often poor, is also critical to (sustainable development goals) progress". "Yet what the World Bank fails to disclose to donors who are asked to dish out USD 82 billion, is that the World Bank itself has a very poor track record with its own disabled staff", says the Group.

In the past three years, there have been a record number of complaints and problems with the World Bank's Disability and Workers Compensation programmes, which the World Bank has conveniently ignored, it says.

"The number of complaints has risen exponentially, both to the World Bank's Ombudsman and to the World Bank's Staff Association, leading the later to retain additional outside counsel to address the flood of complaints."

high-risk environments, the Bank Group made the decision many years ago to selfinsure these benefits. # A road to reconciliation in Sri Lanka

ri Lanka's bitter, 30-year war continues to cast shadows of grief, loss, and sectarian tension over an ethnically diverse population of Sinhalese Buddhists, Tamil Hindus, Muslims, and Catholics. As the country attempts to navigate the post-conflict period, there is no more urgent task than restoring inclusiveness and social cohesion to public life. The schools are a key to meeting this challenge, and it has been a mandate of governments past and present to reform the education system to foster greater tolerance and ensure that inter-communal conflict and violence do not recur.

The introduction of classroom subjects on civic education in 2008 seemed promising, but it has not resulted in any meaningful improvement in inter-communal relations, and values education generally has been perceived as a matter of spiritual well-being related to religious affiliation. The absence of a valuesbased approach, and the need for a secular space in which to engage it, inspired The Asia Foundation to launch Promoting Shared Values in Sri Lanka, a project to improve inter-communal relations in the country. The project has introduced its own values curriculum to youth leaders and activists in the districts of Kalutara, Kurunegala, Ampara, Trincomalee, Mannar, and Vavuniya, as well as more broadly via social media.

The values curriculum was developed by the Foundation in 2012, and is also available as an Android mobile application and through its own website. It seeks to cultivate values in children and youth that support a pluralist and tolerant approach to issues and problems that arise with other communities and within their own. These include core humanistic values such as active listening, peace, respect, tolerance, compassion, honesty and sincerity, and cooperation.

#### Inter-communal, ethno-religious relations

Two important studies conducted by the project underscore the need to institutionalize valuesbased education, and they provide

some interesting insights into how to pursue the endeavour. One, a survey conducted from May to August last year, was a follow-up to 2018 research into youth perceptions of inter-communal, ethnoreligious relations. The second, from May to September last year, was a qualitative assessment of the impact of values curriculum training on participating youth.

Key findings from the follow-up survey include some hopeful trends since 2018 in perceptions of peace and of ethnic and religious groups in the country, and insights into how youth perceptions continue to be shaped by the internet and social media, by their level of activism, and by the communities they live in.

Almost all respondents (94 percent) continued to believe that peace education should be embedded in the school curriculum. Respondents were equally likely in 2018 and 2020 to identify honesty (72 percent), peace (68 percent) and respect (64 percent) as the most important values to foster in children, but the proportion mentioning open-mindedness and coexistence increased. Eighty-five percent of the young people polled felt that children from diverse ethnic and religious backgrounds had opportunities to interact in school. Of those, 70 percent mentioned the classroom, 40 percent cited sports activities, and others mentioned extracurricular activities, clubs, and associations as places where these interactions could occur. However, the survey also captured a significant level of acceptance of verbal aggression (53 percent) and physical violence (51 percent),

especially when defending one's religion.

#### Youth Clubs and Associations

Youth activism is attracting growing interest across the country and is considered an avenue for greater interaction among ethno-religious communities. Eighty-one percent in 2018 and 78 percent in 2020 said that youth clubs and associations have improved their views of people from other ethno-religious backgrounds. Interestingly, there was no change in perceptions of parents and teachers as key influences, while the media was surpassed in influence by religious leaders between 2018 and 2020.

The influence of local television



has increased in parallel to internet usage, and social media is perceived as contributing to an increase in online hate speech. The study also shows that youth are more responsible and circumspect in their use of social media. Seventy-three percent of respondents agreed that making offensive statements about other religions and ethnicities is not acceptable on social media, and 68 percent called such posts unreliable. However, more respondents in 2020 experienced offensive online responses (27 percent), cyber-violence (17 percent) and hate speech (31 percent) due to their religious and ethnic backgrounds than in the 2018 baseline survey.

The qualitative assessment was based on a series of focus-group discussions with 165 participants, 90 of them trained youth facilitators and the rest one-day participants. These discussions sought to determine how the rollout of the curriculum, from August 2019 to May 2020, contributed to shared values among youth. A key indicator was the improvement in attitudes and behaviour toward peers from other ethno-religious communities. Case studies collected through this assessment show that the experiences of facilitators over the year significantly affected their personal growth, in particular by improving their ability to resolve conflicts among peers and by increasing their empathy for other communities. However, while the one-day participants shared similar experiences of personal growth and improved relationships with peers and family, they were unable, unlike their peer facilitators, to identify any significant long-term benefit from the programme, due to their limited exposure to the project.

More than a decade after the end of the war, Sri Lanka is at a turning point where it must begin to address issues of national reconciliation. Current efforts to renew the nation's social cohesion are commendable, but they lack foundational support from a reformed education system. These findings show that values education, based on a values curriculum, can be one of the steppingstones to a more tolerant, inclusive, and cohesive society in Sri Lanka.

### **Culturally Responsive Online Teaching:** The Best to make the Best Best practices in OTL

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and learning environment forever, not only in Sri Lanka, but also in the whole world. As we all are aware, the COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in the closure of schools and universities across the world.

Accordingly, education has changed significantly with the distinctive rise in online learning, through which teaching is undertaken remotely and on digital platforms. Even before the outbreak of COVID-19, there was already high growth and adoption of online learning globally with the use of language apps, virtual tutoring, video conferencing tools, and online learning software. Online learning has power to move towards a more effective and efficient teaching and learning process in any situation, if we use it correctly with clear understanding. However, this fully online teaching and learning culture has popularly been put into practice in schools, universities, and all other teaching organisations of Sri Lanka from this interim crisis period.

This unplanned and rapid move to online teaching and learning with lack of understanding, no training, insufficient bandwidth, and little preparation has caused poor user experience in online learning in Sri Lanka.

Commonly, one family of our society consists of primary and secondary schoolchildren and university students, as well as there are adults who work from home. Zoom has become a very popular online video conferencing platform by now, and people are now used to say that they are going to 'Zoom School'. They wake up to begin Zoom lessons or meetings, and until late evening, they live with Zoom or other social media apps such as WhatsApp, continuing their education or work. This exhausting nature has been created due to less experience in online educational practices. Primary and

secondary level schools have somehow started online teaching to ensure uninterrupted education during this crisis which should be highly appreciated. However, they are used to conduct online sessions according to their normal school timetables which has resulted in students staying online the whole day. Moreover, they assign too much homework as well. Hence, children find it difficult to manage their time and they also lose their leisure time. Many children are struggling, and parents are unsure how to help them. Hence, we have to be careful and understand how big and difficult this change has been for kids and their families. Some children tend to skip assignments or play online games during online studies as many of them are not used to learn in isolation. Like what was practised in physical classrooms, the teacher should provide guidance allowing students to feel connected to each other, and this sense of belonging influences students' engage-

ment in online classes. In order to reap the best results through online teaching and learning, teachers should know the best practices in online teaching. For example, using new technology for online learning/e-learning require teachers to take on new roles such as facilitator and mediator. Teachers need to prepare for changing roles, from being an instructor who dispenses knowledge to a facilitator who guides and supports learning. Also, learners need to be reassured by teachers as they confront technological challenges. As an Asian country, introducing online teaching and learning methods into existing educational systems could be a challenge for Sri Lanka because of the behavioural patterns and attitudes such as cultural respect for the teacher, textbook dependency, and the test/exam-focused style of learning. Therefore, innovations or pedagogical methods and learning environments should be placed at the intersection of teachers' and students' educational philosophies, institutional systems and national cultural context. These requirements highlight the importance of having a culturally responsive online teaching and learning environment in Sri Lanka.





Culturally responsive online teaching and learning is the idea of being responsive to students' academic and social-emotional needs. Therefore, primary, secondary, and tertiary level or higher education providers and their teaching or academic staff should offer "Culturally Responsive Online Teaching and Learning" procedures to make a new, more safe, enjoyable, and supportive learning environment. Giving considerable attention, care and planning, any educator who teaches online can create a culturally responsive virtual classroom, one that can provide a space where students feel welcomed and valued every day.

Following four elements of the "Motivational Framework of Culturally Responsive

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- Planning for the culturally responsive online classroom starts with course development.

#### 2. DEVELOPING ATTITUDE

- Helping learners to feel positive about the content and the learning process is facilitated by building on students' personal experiences and knowledge.

#### **3. ENHANCING MEANING**

- Making the learning process meaningful and engaging students in reflection and critical inquiry.

#### **4. ENGENDERING COMPETENCE**

- Use of effective assessment tools that relate to the students' backgrounds and allow them to demonstrate mastery in a variety of ways i.e. performance-based or portfolio assessments, student-invented dialogues, focused reflections, and journals.

Teachers, academics, or educators who teach online can examine their teaching practices using the following questions to see whether they have implemented a culturally responsive online teaching and learning environment or not (adapted from Christy M. Rhodes and Steven W. Schmidt):

1. To establish inclusion, how do lacknowledge the cultural identities, such as racial, ethnic, religious, sexual, and gender identities of my students?

• How do I learn about my students and what they feel about the learning experience? • How do I encourage my students to connect with their classmates?

• How do I ensure that students feel free to point out class policies that they feel are discriminatory or biased?

2. To develop attitude, how do I help learners to feel positive about the content and the learning process, in addition to the incorporation of learner autonomy into curricular planning?

• How do I encourage students to communicate with each other and with me on a deep and meaningful level?

• How do I incorporate materials and resources that represent the diverse backgrounds of my students?

3. To enhance the meaning, how do I help students to connect to the material in ways that are based on critical reflection and critical inquiry?

• How do I incorporate a variety of learning activities and instructional practices?

• How do I integrate practical applications into learning activities?



• How do I require students to examine the curriculum from multiple perspectives? 4. To engender competence, how do l use an authentic and effective assessment that allows them to demonstrate mastery in a variety of ways?

• How do I encourage students to take ownership of the learning process?

• How do I create space for students to assess their own learning?

Constructing trust in learning relationships is the foundation of culturally responsive instruction. So that high-trust, low-stress environments can help even marginalised students effectively and retain learned information. When students feel safe and trustworthy, we will have true learning partnerships with them; they will be more likely to take the necessary risks needed to learn.

Therefore, teachers should realise the importance of the social aspect of students for conducting online sessions. They can look for more ways to incorporate a collaborative online learning environment, including the Zoom breakout feature for smaller groups. Apart from that, teachers can use new engaging gamified options.

The use of the Quizizz platform to create free gamified quizzes and interactive lessons to engage any learner, use of annotation and whiteboard features for students to express their responses in real-time are a few such options. Furthermore, educators can use online systems such as GoSoapBox or Mentimeter to collect student responses. They can also use the chat function as a relay race where students take turns answering questions.

There is no argument that online teaching and learning is the best solution to face the prevailing situation in the world due to COVID-19 or beyond. Therefore, any educator who teaches online should take the necessary steps to introduce a culturally responsive online teaching and learning environment to make this new learning environment more safe, enjoyable, and supportive for our learn-

# **EU on track** for late summer *'community* immunity'

THURSDAY, APRIL 8, 2021

**BELGIUM:** The European Commission believes Europe is on track to achieve "community immunity" to COVID-19 by late summer thanks to speededup vaccination dose deliveries, a spokesman said Tuesday.

The EU should meet its mid-September target of fully inoculating most of its adult population, given that deliveries over the next three months should be more than triple those of the first quarter, Stefan de Keersmaecker told journalists.

"We believe that, on the basis of this, we will have enough doses of the vaccine to reach our very important target of about 70 percent of the adult population," he said.

'That would leave us in a situation where we have sufficient community immunity to fight the virus."

He confirmed commission figures showing that first quarter vaccine deliveries to the 27-nation bloc amounted to 107 million doses -- far below what was expected.

But there should be "about 300 to 360 million doses" supplied between now and the end of June. The EU has a total population of 450 million, of which 365 million are adults.

To reach the 70 percent adult population target, 255 million people would need to be fully vaccinated -- meaning two jabs in most cases, or just one jab with the Janssen vaccine produced by Johnson & Johnson.

According to a confidential document used by EU diplomats to monitor vaccine deliveries, seen by AFP, 23 of the 27 member states should have vaccinated more than half of their populations based on total deliveries in the first half of this year. - AFP

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# Jayasuriya Chief Guest at 42nd Observer **School Cricketers of the Year Awards Show**

Former top award winner and the highest scorer for Sri Lanka in the recent veterans World Cup final, Sanath Jayasuriya will be the Chief Guest at the 42nd Observer School Cricketers of the Year awards show to be held at the BMICH, Colombo 7 on April 20 commencing at 5.30 p.m.

The long postponed event on a couple of occasions due to the Covid-19 pandemic will finally be a reality. But this time, the heath authorities have given a firm guarantee to host the event, in keeping with strict guidelines.

It is with those fresh memories that the 42nd edition of the Observer School Cricketers of the Year will be held giving new hopes for the Sri Lanka sports community.

Fresh memories of Sri Lanka's World Cup1996 triumph - exactly after 25 years, came to surface at the recently concluded World Cup Legends final. Jayasuriya, who was adjudged the Most Valuable Player of the Tournament in 1996 World Cup, once again showed that he still had some talent left cracking a blistering 43 off 35 balls in the Legends World Cup final.

Sri Lanka lost by a mere 14 runs. But if Jayasuriya or Tillakaratne Dilshan had faced less than one more over, the Lankans would have painted a different picture.

Batting first, India Legends, led by Sachin Tendulkar made 181 for 4 in their allotted 20 overs with Yusuf Pathan (62 not out) and Yuvaraj Singh (60) scoring half centuries in the final played at Shaheed Veer Narayan Singh International Stadium, Raipur.

In reply, Sri Lanka went down gallantly, scoring 167 for 7 in 20 overs with Jayasuriya top scoring with 43. Despite undergoing three operations including two knee surgeries and putting a stent for his heart element, Jayasuriya showed that he still has his old magical touch.

It is with this most recent form that Jayasuriya will grace the Observer Mobitel School Cricketers of the Year on April 20.

The only schools cricket awards show until the last couple of decades, the Observer-Mobitel School Cricketers of the Year mega show is now considered the Mother of all school cricket award shows in its 43rd years.

What is unique in the show is that it had developed a new culture by recognizing the raw talent, at a time when there had not been any organized tournament for First X1 cricket.

When none of the other competitive school cricket awards shows which had begun lately had failed to commend the performance of schools last season, only the Sunday Observer is able to host its 42nd awards show. This proves the commitment and dedication of the Sunday Observer and Sri Lanka Telecom Mobitel to honour the school cricketers when it matters the most.

When all other sponsors of rival school

Ever since then, he became a vital ingredient in the Sri Lanka team's successful recipe until he retired from ODIs on June 28, 2011. By then, he had aggregated 13,480 runs in 445 ODI matches, cracking 28 centuries and 68 fifties. He had also captured 323 wickets in ODIs.

Jayasuriya's contribution was not only confined to ODIs. Though he was branded a limited over cricketer during the early part of his career, he has proved his credentials in the established game beyond reasonable doubts. Jayasuriya's career best 340 against India became the highest individual innings by a Sri Lanka batsman in Tests at the time.

He has a rich aggregate of 6,973 runs in 110 Tests inclusive of 14 centuries and 31 fifties at an attractive average of 40.07. His all-round qualities as a Test player include 98 wickets and 78 catches.

Jayasuriya said the young schoolboy cricketers should be focused on the game so that success would come their way if they play their heart out. Jayasuriya who had later become the Chairman of Selectors, feels that a good cricketer must devote a lot of time to become a successful player.

Jayasuriya said he never thought he would go this far and achieve such success for Sri Lanka cricket when he began his career. Apart from the loads of trophies that had been added to his rich collection after the Observer Schoolbov Cricketer of the Year trophy, Jayasuriya was adjudged the Most Valuable Player of the Series when Sri Lanka won the World Cup in 1996 under another proud recipient of the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year title, Arjuna Ranatunga.

Jayasuriya said that the Sunday Observer and its publisher Lake House has done yeoman service to the young cricketers and promotion of the game in conducting the mega awards show since 1979. "It is a fine gesture on the part of Lake House and the Sunday Observer to host the show uninterrupted so that the young boys across the country will have something to look forward to when they end their school career," he observed.

He said the Observer SLT Mobitel School Cricketers of the Year would take outstanding young players closer to the Sri Lanka 'cap'.

"When I won the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year outstation title, I thought I should stand a greater chance of playing for Sri Lanka, if I continue to focus on the game with dedication and devotion. It inspired me to go places. Once you win this coveted title,

all vou need is commitment and dedication to find a place in the Sri Lanka team," Jayasuriya recalled.

He said the country's school cricket structure, once considered to be the best in the world, needs a complete overhaul to meet today's challenges.

Jayasuriya said the Sri Lanka Schools Cricket Association (SLSCA) and Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) should make a joint effort to uplift the standard of local school cricket while adding that the Under-19 tournament structure of the SLSCA should be reviewed to focus more on producing quality cricketers to the national pool.

"We only had 12 First X1 inter-school matches at that time. But some schools play over 20 inter-school matches in each season, including their third term matches. That's too much. Scoring 1,000 runs in 20 to 24 matches is not a big deal, compared to the 10 to 12 matches most schools played in the past," he said.

"The present schools tournament structure has a good and bad mixture. It has given an opportunity to some top school teams in the outstations to play against the leading Colombo schools. That's a positive sign. But at the same time, I have some concern about the competitiveness and standard of cricket that is dished out in some matches," he said.

"We see too much school cricket now. There are too many matches for a team to honour during a season. That does not sound good for the game. The SLSCA has a big responsibility and a bigger role to play to further improve our school cricket standards," Jayasuriya said. dropped. But it has not improved from the

"The standard of our school cricket has level it was, compared to other teams in the world. It has stagnated, instead of going further up from the point we were. We must pay serious attention to that," he added.

"About two to three decades back, our country's school cricket structure was considered to be the best in the world. For example, India was far below us then. But now, India has a good under-19 structure which is capable of feeding the youth and Indian national team. A couple of other Test nations have made vast improvements in their youth teams. We must also change our strategies and restructure our tournament to meet the future challenges," Jayasuriya said.

Paying a glowing tribute to the Sunday Observer and Lake House for conducting the country's first-ever school cricket awards show for four decades, Jayasuriya said every schoolboy who wins the prestigious Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year award stands a good chance of representing the country, if they continue the game with dedication.

The 51-year-old dashing opener, who introduced the art of pinch -hitting during the 1996 World Cup tournament and underlined his supremacy as one of the best batsmen in world cricket, has proved his class in both the Tests and ODIs.

# **IESL Annual Session today**





The much awaited 114th Annual Session of The Institution of Engineers. Sri Lanka (IESL) will be held from 8.30 a.m. onwards today at the Main Hall of Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall (BMICH). The much looked forward to event of the engineering fraternity scheduled to be held in Last October was forced to be rescheduled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The governing body of IESL is the Council, elected by the general membership annually and led by the President. The apex professional body for the engineering profession in Sri Lanka, will also make way for present President for the session 2020/2021, Eng. K P I U Dharmapala and President-Elect Eng. Arjuna Manamperi to take over the reins of the body.

Widely known as IESL, is the successor to the Engineering Association of Ceylon formed in 1906 and in 1956, the Association was reconstituted to become 'The Institute of Engineers, Ceylon' and from then on only engineers opted to be its members.

The Institution obtained the membership of the Commonwealth Engineering Conference in 1958 and in 1968 it was admitted to be a member of the World Federation of Engineering Organizations. It was in the same year that the Institution was incorporated by an Act of Parliament. In 1996, the name of the Institution was changed as The Institution of Engineers, Sri Lanka by an amendment to Act 17 of 1968.

The activities of IESL has become broader and diversified with time, and at present it has a significant number (IESL Member Directory) of engineering professionals of all branches of engineering serving in all parts of Sri Lanka and abroad.

One of the key functions of IESL is to ensure the quality standards of engineering professionals practicing in Sri Lanka, by conducting Professional Review of suitably qualified members for the status of 'Chartered Engineer' and 'International Professional Engineer'.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic the IESL was very active and agile and carried on their duties expected from them to the nation. During the Pandemic and extended lockdown period the IESL members came forward to assist in the repair of the Air conditioning system of the IDH hospital taking huge health risks as well.

Extending their honorary services outside Colombo they provided their services to help in repairing much needed ventilators in several hospitals in Puttalam and North Western Province hospitals which in turn helped to save many lives for which the people are still grateful to the engineering fraternity. In a bid to provide a safer environment for health workers who were nursing the COVID-19 patients IESL members of IESL together with undergraduates of engineering faculty of University of Peradeniya, designed and presented a robot to take medicines to the patients.

Taking another step further they also engineered Personnel Protective equipment (PPE) to safeguard the health and others which also came in to high praise from the public. The IESL skills and opinion were also sought for burning national issues such as the East Container Terminal episode when their members went up to the extent to meet

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and other senior members of the Parliament to express their views and make their recommendations. After discussions with the SLPA Engineers' Association in this regard the government subsequently reversed its decision and implemented what IESL has suggested. Lack of a proper National Transporta-

tion Policy is one of the major issues in the Sri Lankan transport sector. The IESL Council has taken an initiative to gather the experts and stakeholders in the transportation sector to draft a National Transportation Policy through the IESL policy forum. Similarly several other public and private entities like Urban Development Authority, (on high rise buildings) Environmental Authority, Colombo Port City, too sought their opinion on several issues for which suggestions and solutions were provided.

With the UDA intending to revise the Planning and Building Regulations, IESL Council immediately formed an expert committee of engineers from the related sectors to study the proposed draft regulations to propose improvements to its content.

The final report with the suggestions of IESL will be forwarded to UDA soon. While helping to keep the health aspect in good shape the IESL also continued with their other services and a huge shift towards digital was witnessed.

"We did not want to keep our students and also member's idling and we provided our services on line and kept the momentum going," said President, Eng. K. P. I. U. Dharmapala. Adapting to the 'New Normal', IESL has set an example by successfully completing their examinations (IESL General Qual-

ifying Examination and IESL Part I/II/ III examinations) starting from January 19, 2021 following safety measures opted by the government. One of the key functions of IESL is to ensure the quality standards of engineering professionals practicing in Sri Lanka, by conducting Professional Review of suitably qualified members for the status of 'Chartered Engineer' and 'International Professional Engineer'.

'Through the IESL Policy Forum, IESL Council has taken initiative to develop a national engineering education policy. Since the inputs of both academia and the industry professionals are valuable, the initial discussions with engineering-related industry professionals were held and discussions with academia and other relevant stakeholders to be held with time.

The IESL conducted long and short term Continuing Professional Development programs, seminars, learned lectures and orations and also recognizes organizations that provide training for the charter candidates after a rigorous evaluation process. "Most of them were conducted on Zoom." Several amendments to the SLIA Act are proposed by the Sri Lanka Institute of Architects recently.

On the invitation of the Ministry of Rural Housing and Construction, IESL has given its inputs, both in writing and verbal form, on the proposed amendments to the SLIA Act with the prime objective of safeguarding the integrity of the engineering profession and the national interest. Moving the quarterly Provincial Chapter Liaison Committee to a local chapter and giving prominence to regional and national engi-

neering matters. This historic move degree programs in the future. The took place in Kurunegala under the initiatives taken by the Wayamba Chapter in March 2021.

Overseas chapters participated via zoom and the President, President Elect and many Council members participated in person and via zoom. The energy level and enthusiasm for the new initiative to more prominence to local PCs was well received.

This is one of the many steps taken by the council to strengthen and engage PC and DC in the development of the country and being engineering know how to the society at large Engineering Council, Sri Lanka recently completed preparing the Draft of the 'Roles, Responsibilities and Competencies of Engineering Practitioners' as per subsection 39 (2)(e) for each category that falls under ECSL. As member of the International Engineering Alliance (IEA), the global body governing educational accords and competence agreements, IESL accredits, on the latter's behalf, engineering degree programs for the Washington Accord (WA) and registers International Professional Engineers for the International Professional Engineers Agreement (IPEA), giving international recognition. IESL is also a provisional signatory to the Sydney Accord of the IEA which will pave the way for accrediting engineering technology

s more people across the world are encouraged to work from home, televised news, social media and online forums combined can either be an enlightening or fear-mongering source of information.

With social distancing now a thing, one can only look at their phone or laptop so many times a day for accurate updates about the spread of COVID-19. Fortunately, a few tech enthusiasts are looking to make a contribution to eradicate the spread of the virus, using an app backed by data from official health organisations and medical institutes.

"The Rotary District 3220, with the support of Rotaract District 3220, initiated a project 'Stop the Spread'. We decided to make an app that could track those who have been exposed to COVID- 19. Therefore, the Rotaract Club of University of Kelaniya thought of implementing an IT based solution which can help the Government to control covid-19," Rotaract Club of Kelaniya University 2020/21 President Rtr

Nipuna Rambukkanage explained. He noted that he and his team pondered overt the situation of the nation and came up with what they recog-

nized as the 'deal solution' – a mobile application system. "There are two mobile apps (flutter-based solutions) which is an elite system that is supported by a web application that will work as an admin panel for the Ministry of Health in Sri Lanka. Therefore there are three components in this elite software system. They are namely, Mobile application for quarantined persons

2. Mobile application for public health officers 3. Web application for the Ministry of Health for data analysis. This system can be used to support the Government to control

need of this software system. "Finally we received the permission of Ministry of Health to conduct a pilot project at Central Colombo area," he added with a note of triumph on their well deserved victory. With their sights focused on "Disease Prevention and Treatment", Rambukkanage notes that the team's main objective was to build an

information technology-based solution for the Ministry of Health of Sri Lanka to monitor and control COVID-19 in the country. "We wanted to make the lives of people in quarantine easier by providing them various benefits because people in quarantine have many needs and they need constant care. Therefore, we wanted to present them a mobile application to fulfill their day-to-day needs such as banking, ordering medicine, counseling, bill payments and checking their health status daily. And the second objective was to reduce the risk of Public Health Inspectors when monitoring quarantined people. To increase the effectiveness of their service, we wanted to provide them with a mobile application to effectively do their investigations. Another objective that we had was to help the government to maintain a database of COVID-19 related data with all the relevant information which

can be used to eliminate COVID-19 in Sri Lanka," Rambukkanage said. The team has applied for copyrights for the software system and are hoping to receive the copyrights soon.

"As per the discussion held on November 20, 2020 at the Ministry of Health, we conducted a training session and an introduction session for the MOH of Central Colombo, Dr. Dhammika Adhikariwattage and the PHIs of Central Colombo area to implement the pilot project in the ground level to track the first-line contacts and returnees from quarantine centers and hospitals. Since Dr. Adikariwattage is a fellow Rotarian and our project advisor from the very beginning, he is cur rently piloting the project at the central Colombo area. The system is handy in tracking the vaccinations as well. After these tests have been completed, the software system will be market ready," he disclosed.

Hailing from Dehiwala, Rambukkanage is a past pupil of Ananda College, Colombo. He is currently reading a Bachelor of Science degree in Computer Science at Kelaniya University, specializing in Artificial Intelligence.

The team is planning to complete the user testing (beta testing). This is currently taking place at the central Colombo

area "We want to see how the actual users will take in the app, and their response towards it. Thus, we are planning to carry out the testing on a selected wide area with at least 100 users for this. If there's anyone who'd like to volunteer as a Technical-writer, developer, content creators or anyone interested in software development, they are welcome to join hands with us," Rambukkanage said. His advice to youths with flair for innovations is to think out of the box whenever possible. "You can't allow tradition to get in the way of innovation. There's a need to respect the past, but it's a mistake to revere your past," he opined.

# Can dark chocolate improve your immunity?

Studies suggest antioxidant-rich dark chocolate with at least 50 to 70 percent cacao enhances blood flow, improves gut health, and eases stress — all effects that may indirectly strengthen your immune system

ark chocolate is one of the anomalies of nutrition. Researchers have been intrigued by the bittersweet superfood for years, not only because it is incredibly delicious and satisfies your sweet tooth, but also because there are dozens of scientific studies suggesting there are an overwhelming number of health benefits in this nutrient- and antioxidant-rich treat.

"Chocolate would be delicious no matter its health properties. So, the idea that something so good can also be good for us is both appealing and compelling," David L. Katz, MD, MPH, the president of True Health Initiative and the founding director of the Prevention Research Center at Yale University Griffin Hospital, who has spent much of his career studying the health benefits of chocolate. "Chocolate is the decisive rebuttal to the 'If it's good for me, it can't taste good' mentality."

As for the science, dark chocolate is derived from Theobroma cacao, aka, the cacao tree. Dr. Katz says it's a uniquely concentrated

source of bioflavonoid antioxidants, ranking high on the ORAC (oxygen radical absorbance capacity) scale relative even to many fruits and vegetables

In 2011, Katz coauthored a study published in Antioxidants & Redox Signaling focusing on the many benefits of the superfood. In it, he and his colleagues explained that cocoa powder contains up to 50 milligrams of polyphenols per gram, with a single serving containing more phenolic antioxidants than most foods and drinks, including apples, cranberry juice, red wine, and black tea. The main flavonols found in cocoa are epicatechin and catechin, as well as procyanidins, which provide the most antioxidants.

"In addition, cocoa is a concentrated source of fiber, magnesium, potassium, and arginine an amino acid that helps blood vessels dilate," Katz says. And then there are psychoactive compounds like theobromine, which may help explain the COVID-19 pandemic, providing our bodies chocolate's unique allure as an aphrodisiac (the perfect Valentine's Day treat), but that area remains under study, he points out.

So how do flavonoids work such magic? Deanna Minich, PhD, the vice president of scientific affairs at Clean Program, whose study areas are human nutrition and medical sciences with a focus on the application of science in nutrition and lifestyle, explains that those phytonutrients or polyphenols called flavonoids (aka antioxidants derived from plants) essentially help blood vessels expand and relax. "You might imagine that when your brain and heart have enough oxygen

and blood flow, they work better," she points out. An article published in December 2016 in the Journal of Nutritional Science linked the brainboosting amino acids and plant-based compounds to a possible role in the prevention of cancer, improved heart health, and even weight loss. Previous research also suggests that dark chocolate may help stabilize blood pressure and positively influence gut microbiota, improving digestion and metabolism.

In addition to all the physical benefits, dark chocolate may be a boon to the mind. A study slated for publication in May 2021 in Food Chemistry focuses on the bioactive amino acids tryptophan, phenylalanine, and tyrosine, all of which may help shift our neurochemistry, resulting in that "feel good" effect that a piece of chocolate usually provides. Research published in November 2019 by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) found that dark chocolate may also improve memory and cognitive function.

Scientists have become increasingly interested in the relationship between dark chocolate and immunity. And, during

with the tools to fight infection has never been more crucial.

Generally speaking, inflammation is the immune system's response to an irritant. When inflammation is severe, it can trigger reactions in the body leading to more serious health issues. An article published in August 2016 in Oxidative Medicine and Cellular Longevityexplains how oxidative stress, an imbalance between the production of reactive oxygen species (ROS) and their elimination by protective mechanisms, can encourage chronic inflammation.

As an October 2016 article in Oxidative Medicine and Cellular Longevity notes, the resulting inflammation has been established as a major factor for the progression of various chronic diseases and disorders - diabetes, cancer, cardiovascular diseases, eye disorders, arthritis, obesity, autoimmune diseases, and inflammatory bowel disease included.

The idea that dark chocolate could bolster immunity is founded in the science that antioxidants offer anti-inflammatory benefits. Specifically, polyphenols can inhibit molecular signaling pathways that are activated by oxidative stress, combating the effects. "Research has suggested that dark chocolate improves immune function because it is packed with flavonols," explains Keri Gans, RDN, a nutrition consultant and the author of The Small Change Diet. "Flavonols specifically are known to have antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties.'

Katz brings it back to blood flow. "Im-



munity is critically dependent on blood flow, and dark chocolate is known to improve flood flow by enhancing endothelial function, and perhaps by other mechanisms as well," he says. "Antioxidants help with immunity because they protect our own cells while the immune system fights the 'enemy.'

While Dr. Minich agrees that "more antioxidants are needed to keep oxidative stress and inflammatory processes at bay, both of which are connected to immune function," she maintains that "no specific direct effect of dark chocolate on immune health in humans has been demonstrated." For example, there is no direct evidence that dark chocolate can protect you against the common cold, flu, or novel coronavirus. But she does believe there could be an indirect relationship between dark chocolate and this type of immunity.

Daily News spoke with Dharmasiri Alahakoon, Chairman and Managing Director of Cerestar (Pvt) Limited, - the manufacturers of Nutrimate products, to find out more about his innovative range of breakfast cereals and cereal products containing Kurakkan rice and pulses.

#### Q. What made you interested in food technology?

A. Although I have an engineering background, I was interested in food technology from my early days. I think that this interest sprang up through assisting my mother in preparing various food items and beverages at home. In the early days, we manufactured some beverages using locally available fruits. But, the market reception of those beverages was not much encouraging. The attitude of the consumers was, "Can you compete with well-established big companies such as....?" But, we persevered in our efforts. Industrial Technology Institute (ITI), formerly Ceylon Institute of Scientific and Industrial Research (CISIR), also gave us a lot of assistance towards this effort.

#### Q. How did you get involved in the manufacture of breakfast cereals?

A. Ten years ago, I ventured out on my own and acquired a company manufacturing breakfast cereals using Corn and Soya, because I was very keen on preparing foodstuffs from locally available grains and pulses. I am grateful to that gentleman because, 10 years ago, he thought as I did and laid the foundation for this industry. I invested on this knowing the potential. That was the new beginning of Cerestar (Pvt) Limited.

In my researches, I found out that Kurakkan (Finger Millet) and Corn (Bada Iringu), grown in abundance in Sri Lanka are very high in nutritional value while containing sufficient dietary fiber. These do not contain gluten. So far, Kurakkan was used to prepare foods such as "Halapa," "Thalapa," "Pittu" and "Kurakkan" porridge. The preparation of all these food items involves long and time-consuming processes, which has become a hassle for today's busy housewives. I was looking for an easier

alternative and settled on breakfast cereals as a quicker way of delivering the goodness of Kurakkan, Corn & Soya, especially to growing children.

#### Q. Developing the process of manufacturing corn flakes must have involved in burning a lot of midnight oil, speaking figuratively?

A. Yes. Initially, I concentrated on one product. The company I purchased had several products but I concentrated mainly on breakfast cereals. Earlier, my platform was locally grown fruits. In changing over to locally grown grains and pulses, I had to perform lots R&D. Then I introduced three breakfast cereal products, mainly concentrating on children. A. Not totally. But it gave an opening for our new product - Corn Flakes. During the COVID 19 Pandemic when the whole country was undergoing lockdown, the government curtailed

some imports. With the import restrictions, we had to work with what is available in the country. Now, if we are to survive, we have to stand on our own. without being dependant on imports. One may say that was the good side of the COVID 19 Pandemic; I saw new opportunities for locally manufactured breakfast cereals.

#### Q. What made you concentrate on manufacturing corn flakes?

Corn flakes are a very popular breakfast cereal, and we grow corn in Sri Lanka. Other countries also use corn to manufacture corn flakes and other breakfast cereals. We were lacking the proper technology to manufacture corn flakes. I did some research and read through technical publications and started manufacturing corn flakes in Sri Lanka. I also had to invest very heavily. The technology was improved by us. While developing the process, we had to destroy of several batches of corn flakes that did not meet our expected standards. Then we had to slightly vary the mixture and start anew. Overcoming all obstacles, we developed a product, I am happy to state that the people who did the sampling mentioned those are even better than imported ones. That was the silver lining in the dark cloud.

Q. What made you manufacture a breakfast cereal containing Kurakkan?

A. According to health sources, over 15% of Sri Lanka population are suffering from diabetes. Diabetes sufferers in the country include even very young persons. Unlike the other food items, Kurakkan (Finger Millet) is a very healthy food choice for people suffering from diabetes. Kurakkan flakes are ideal for young as well as geriatric people, as it is a product that can be used exactly like corn flakes. I am very happy to have set the benchmark for Kurakkan flakes, which is a product that is not available, as far as I know in any other country. People have developed various other food items using Kurakkan, but, I can confidently state that we are the first company to develop Kurakkan Flakes. As I stated earlier most Lankans are used to consume Kurakkan based products in the form of "Halapa," "Thalapa," "Porridge" or "Pittu." All these food items require a great deal of labour and time. And in fact, today's housewives mostly have no idea of preparing such food items. For a

housewife in the morning rush of sending children to school and preparing food for her husband, preparation of such food items from Kurakkan is impractical. Because of this, the consumption of Kurakkan has decreased in Sri Lanka. Compared to bread, which is a fastdigesting food item, Kurakkan is slowdigesting. In Sri Lanka, except the Veddahs' community, I do not see anybody promoting their own things. Only that community is proud of their own produce. They value their own culture above all.

Culture is very important. We must not forget our culture. But, traditions should be subjected to change. We should not go by the same traditions. If vou take Kurakkan as an example, we have been making "Halapa," "Thalapa," Kurakkan porridge or "Pittu" from it. But, that tradition is not suitable for the present day. We must change. We must have something new. As in most present day households, both the wife and the husband are working and their life style is quite self-centered. So that they cannot have more than one child. In the olden days, women did not work and they had time to bear and bring up six, seven, eight or even 10 children. But, nowadays, even one child is too much as both husband and wife is working and they do not have enough time to bring up more healthy children. I am trying to do something for them by producing foods that are conveniently prepared. That is where I have placed my footprint for the betterment of the future generations. No preservatives, MSG, genetically modified ingredients or any other harmful things are used in the manufacturing of Nutrimate products. And Nutrimate products do not contain any synthetically produced vitamins and minerals but, retain only natural vitamins and minerals present in them. Our products are freely available in prominent supermarket chains. We are an ISO 22000:2018 compliant company. I still remember a
