

He said that respective heads of departments will be allowed to bring employees to office two or three days a week and the rest will have to work online from home.

The Prime Minister was addressing the 77th Session of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP)via video technology.

This year's meeting was conducted virtually from April 26-29, 2021, under the theme "Building Back Better from Crises Through Regional Cooperation in Asia and the Pacific." While the COVID-19 pandemic dominated the discussions this year, other issues such as climate change, debt relief, investments, equitable health access, sustainable development and regional cooperation were also discussed

"The Government also repatriated nearly 100,000 Sri Lankans and started our vaccination program in February," he said.

Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa appreciated the efforts taken by the UNESCAP to bring the Member States together for a constructive and interactive regional discussion on the COVID-19 pandemic

Sri Lanka has made remarkable progress in controlling the spread of COVID-19, recording a very low death rate and a high recovery rate through case detection, contact tracing, quarantining and patient treatment.

Even during the pandemic, economic activities continued in several sectors. The export sector continued to function, and tourism restarted in January. The Central Bank reduced policy rates and implemented several concessionary refinancing programs. "Our Government is

The Governor has taken the relevant decision based on the complaints received that a

number of activities have been held during the festival without following any hygienic procedures. The Central Province Governor said that the Nuwara Eliya Municipal Council had held this New Year celebration in defiance of the instructions given to take maximum measures to control the spread of

COVID-19. He also said that 'Wasantha Udanaya" has also been conducted without following any health guidelines.

He also said that he had received information that a 175 ml bottle of liquor had been given to Municipal Council employees with lunch during the festival.

nando appearing for the suspect, an employee attached to a pharmaceutical distribution company told court that due to the anxiety and the stress which the suspect underwent when he was apprehended by the police he went ahead with the Breathalyzer test even though the standard requirements which should have been followed when performing the Breathalyzer test such as washing the mouth before undergoing the test, ensuring that the seal of Breathalyzer test kit be opened in the presence of the suspect, ensuring that the test is conducted in a non-toxic area, and that the Breathalyzer balloon be blown by the suspect within 15 seconds were not fol-

the aforesaid improperly conducted Breathalyzer test it was termed that the suspect's blood alcohol content surpassed the limit of 0.8 % (80 mg/dl or more) concentration.

No reduction in PCR, Antigen tests conducted in SP

There has been no reduction in the number of PCR and Antigen tests conducted in the Southern Province to identify COVID-19 infected people, Southern Province Health Services Director Dr. Chandima Siritunga stated.

The SP Director of Health Services further stated that the PCR tests are being carried out continuously at selected locations together with investigations carried out on persons who are identified to be associates of corona infected persons.

"The number of PCR tests being carried out has not been reduced. As the number of corona patients decreases, the number of associates decreases. When the number of associates decreases, the number of PCR tests performed may decrease. Rapid Antigen tests as well as PCR tests are performed. The public should also act in a responsible manner at this crucial juncture by cooperating with the authorities when PCR tests are being conducted at randomly selected places," Dr. Siritunga observed.

"So far 143,575 PCR tests have been carried out in the Southern Province of which 66,852 PCR tests have been conducted in the Galle District. Moreover, 45,047 PCR tests have been conducted in the Matara District while 31,676 PCR tests have been conducted in the Hambantota District," the SP Health Services Director pointed out.





enior Civil Servant Prince Sarojini Manmatharajah (P.S.M.) Charles is the present Governor of the Northern Province. She was appointed as the Northern Province Governor by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa on December 30, 2019. Prior to this appointment, Charles has served as the Secretary to the Health and Indigenous Medicine Ministry and Director General of Sri Lanka Customs. She has also held the position of the District Secretary of Batticaloa and Vavuniya Districts. The Daily News recently interviewed her on her plans for the Northern Province. **Excerpts from the interview:**

What are the main concerns and problems in the Northern • Province?

A. We have a lot of challenges. The major problem is that the Northern Province lacks basic infrastructure facilities needed to facilitate its residents' livelihoods. We need to renovate roads, especially rural roads, to facilitate transportation. The other major problem is the lack of doctors and nurses in the Northern Province. The other long-standing problem, which is the drinking water supply to the province, has been resolved by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa who has approved several water projects in the North. There are lots of commercial opportunities for investors and we are looking for investors to invest in those projects in the Northern Province.

What are the investment opportunities available in the Northern Province?

A. Investments are the biggest expectation of the Northern people. We hope to reduce the existing unemployment rate and develop the province through investment projects. Investors can engage in many industries such as tourism, fisheries and agriculture in the area. There is a good opportunity in the tourism industry to attract local and foreign tourists to the Northern Province. There are a large number of islands in this province that can attract tourists. If a systematic investment plan can improve the infrastructure facilities of these islands and grab tourist attention to those islands, great benefits can be reaped. As a large part of the province is exposed to the sea, there are investment opportunities that can bring huge benefits to the fishing industry as well. Since our area has enough paddy, vegetables and fruits, people have many opportunities to engage in agriculture value addition and processing services.

A Northern farmer



Can you outline the development priorities for the Northern Province?

 $\boldsymbol{A.}$ When we look into the development priorities for the Northern Province, we should pay special attention to the Jaffna International Airport at Palaly (JAF) and the Kankesanthurai (KKS) Harbour. We are expecting to reactivate the defunct Paranthan Chemical Factory, restore the Elephant Pass Saltern that was destroyed by the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) in the 1980s, and reactivate the defunct KKS cement factory and in parallel to that, we expect to initiate many other new development projects in the Northern Province. We have initiated several projects to develop the reservoirs in our area. That will help expand agricultural areas and intensify cultivation. At present, our farmers are cultivating only in one season and this initiative will enable them to work in two or three seasons. We have enough resources but we need more value addition for our products. These people are producing everything but unfortunately selling those products at very low prices. We need more factories. Investors are welcome to initiate some value addition factories in the region.

What are the obstacles you face in discharging your

A. I do not think there is obstruction. But investors are not coming forward to invest in the projects that take place in the Northern Province. That is a major problem we are facing right now.

What are the ongoing development projects in the Northern Province? A. Currently, drinking water projects, road development projects and some irriga-

tion projects are in operation and we have received Rs. 150 million from the Treasury for the ongoing irrigation projects in the Northern Province.

What is the level of support you receive from the Central Government? A. President Gota-

baya Rajapaksa is extending all necessary assistance to us without delay and directs all Ministries to give priority to the development of the North. Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa also gave his blessings, and most of the ministers, especially Agriculture Minister Mahindananda Aluthgamage, Irrigation Minister Chamal Rajapaksa and many other ministers are



supporting us.



How is the financial contribution of the • Government to these development projects in the North?

A. Of course we received some funding from the Treasury for diverse subjects. I met Secretary to the Treasury S.R. Attygalle recently and he agreed to release funds for housing projects and irrigation projects in the Northern Province.

What is the level of cooperation you receive from • Northern political parties and civil society groups?

A. The civil society is supporting us withut any hesitation. Pradeshiva Sabhas, political parties, the ruling party and opposition parties also support the good development projects and I don't have any issues with them. Sometimes minor disputes arise between us but there are no big issues.

There is a lot of unemployed youth in the region. What do • you see as the cause of this problem and solutions for the same?

A. The first thing is they don't have enough educational qualifications to be employed. Secondly, most of the unemployed youth seek jobs in the region. They are not willing to move away from the Northern Province and they do not want to travel far. So, matching them with available jobs is a difficult task. Though they want to get jobs, there are not enough opportunities for them in our region. The reason is that there are no investments done in the region.

Is there any possibility of convincing the Tamil Diaspora • to actually help the Northern people instead of holding rallies and demos abroad?

A. That is why we are inviting them. Are you in favour of the devolution of powers to the provinces and in what way? A. No. we are exercising powers accord-

ing to the existing Constitution and we have to follow the directives of the Government.

The Tamil people in the North have increasingly supported National parties such as SLFP and SJB. Do you see a good trend in

A. Yes, it is a new trend that began in the past years. Some coalitions of political parties caused this trend. Now I think it has changed. People have a lot of confidence in the present Government.



Can you comment on the progress you see in the people of this region after the war

A. The war is over. We have to talk about the post-war era. We have not done anything much for the last 10 years. I do not know what happened. There has not been much progress in the people for the last five years. I could not see any progress. Resources were not shared with rural areas. Now I have changed the system. Now we are sharing resources with them. As the first step, we changed the education system. We transferred teachers, gave new appointments to the rural areas too and provided all infrastructure facilities to the schools. We shared the resources equally among rural areas like in the urban and suburban areas.

Are some organisations still carrying out covert activities in • the Northern Province?

A. There are a few hidden activities influenced by various pressure groups. People have been used by various pressure groups. I guess people are also under pressure because of those activities. They need to be taken out of these activities and shown a better way to thrive.

If the Northern Province is compared with the other • provinces, what is the level of progress you see in the Northern Province?

A. When we look at rural areas such as Mullaitivu and Kilinochchi, the living standards of the people in these areas are very low. The Northern people do not have a fixed income. Their cost of living depends on agriculture and fisheries. Some people who visit the North are shocked when they see our people. They point to us that the situation of the people in the North is tragic and we have to help these people. The media are giving the right information to the people about what happened in the North and what is happening in the North. There are a lot of discrepancies between the South and the North. We have to communicate the reality to the South, that is, what is actually happening in the North. The media must play a more active role in this endeav-





Basil Rajapaksa: An innovative political mastermind

The number of registered political parties in Sri Lanka is approximately 70. It was alliances led by the United National Party and the Sri Lanka Freedom Party which had acquired ruling power of the country from among these parties. However, the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna became a party that changed the history of politics. Anyone can register a political party. Founder of the party and National Organizer Basil Rohana Rajapaksa provided for the operation of the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna capturing ruling power of the country in a short time, together with the former executive President, present Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa.

From the defeat of 2015 onwards the people's force which was being built around the former Executive President Mahinda Rajapaksa requested that a new political party be set up and ruling power of the country be captured and to take the country towards a path of speedy development while establishing the country's security. The responsibility of creating a new political party was assigned to his brother Basil

Rohana Rajapaksa by former President Mahinda Rajapaksa. He fulfilled that responsibility. The people's attraction surrounding Mahinda Rajapaksa was methodically organized and the big brain behind the scenes which was responsible for bringing into power the current President was Basil Rajapaksa.

There were baseless allegations that it was Basil Rajapaksa who was responsible for the defeat at the 2015 Presidential Election. Basil Rajapaksa who left for America after the Presidential Election returned to the Motherland and said during a certain television programme that if anyone says that Mahinda Rajapaksa was defeat-

That was an instance where his political maturity was displayed.

Saudi to reduce cost of recruiting domestic workers from SL, Nepal, Bangladesh

It follows similar measures undertaken to lower the cost of recruiting domestic workers from the Philippines, the newspaper said, citing an unnamed official at the Saudi Ministry of Human Resources and Social Development.

The coronavirus pandemic has added to the cost of recruiting workers from overseas because of more expensive flight tickets and the need for PCR tests before travel. Saudi Arabia also imposed a travel ban on various countries, including Pakistan and India, amid the growing number of COVID-19 cases on Sunday.

They also implemented the ban on the Philippines, Sri Lanka, and Indonesia. The

Saudi Arabia is to reduce the cost of Saudi Civil Aviation Authority also issued a notification imposing a temporary travel ban on European Union (EU) countries and Switzerland. Saudi residents have been given 72 hours to return to the country.

Earlier in February, the Saudi Arabia suspended entry to the kingdom from 20 countries, with the exception of diplomats, Saudi citizens, as well as medical practitioners and their families to help curb the spread of the coronavirus, the state news agency reported.

The temporary ban that came in effect from February 3 included people arriving from the United Arab Emirates, Germany, the United States, Britain, South Africa, France, Egypt, Lebanon, India, and Pakistan. The decision was based on recommendations by Saudi health authorities.

Vaccines the key

accines are the key to ending the COVID-19 pandemic. President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, in a special statement released on Sunday, reiterated that vaccinating the majority of the country's population will help eliminate the COVID-19 threat. The release also detailed the Government's plans to procure vaccines from Pfizer, AstraZeneca and the Russian Direct Investment Fund/Gamaleya, maker of the Sputnik V vaccine.

Right now, the vaccination campaign in Sri Lanka has been suspended, pending the supply of vaccines from these parties. One major problem is that India has barred AstraZeneca/Covishield vaccine exports for the time being, due to a huge surge in cases there.

But the Serum Institute of India (SII), the world's biggest vaccine maker that manufactures the AstraZeneca Covishield vaccine, is itself facing problems due to the lack of certain ingredients needed for the vaccines. These are usually imported from the USA and some other developed countries, which had barred such exports fearing a lack of supplies for domestic vaccine manufacturing.

This prompted the SII CEO to implore in a tweet aimed at US President Joe Biden to revoke such bans and make these ingredients available to other countries that have the capacity to manufacture vaccines. It took a few weeks, but President Biden has now authorized the relevant companies to export these chemicals and ingredients.

This is exactly the spirit of cooperation that should prevail in the drive to eliminate COVID-19 globally. COVID, as we all know, is a pandemic - a disease that affects the whole globe. In fact, it has already infected nearly 150 million people worldwide, 3.1 million of whom had died. There is simply no point in one or two countries eliminating COVID, as long as it persists somewhere else. As the saying goes "no one is safe until everyone is safe". Besides, we give the Coronavirus more chances to mutate when we do not expedite global efforts to tackle it. These mutant variants can be more deadly and transmissible, as seen in India and Brazil.

As World Health Organisation (WHO) Chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus explained in an opinion piece which we published yesterday, the equitable distribution of vaccines worldwide is essential if the world is to see the back of COVID-19 at least by 2024. However, judging by what is happening, there is still no movement towards the equitable distribution of COVID vaccines, some of which were developed using public funds.

Of the more than 890 million vaccine doses that have been administered globally, 81 per cent have been given in high and upper middle income countries. Low income countries have received just 0.3 percent. This problem was sadly predictable. When the HIV epidemic erupted in the 1980s, lifesaving anti-retrovirals were developed rapidly, and yet more than a decade passed before they became available in sub-Saharan Africa.

The United Nations and the WHO did evolve a mechanism that could theoretically ensure a fair supply of vaccines to the developing world, called COVAX. As of last Thursday, Covax has distributed 43 million doses of vaccine to 119 countries — covering just 0.5 percent of their combined population of more than four billion. This is just a drop in the ocean compared to what the developed countries had ordered and


In fact, such "vaccine nationalism" threatens to derail the efforts being made to tame COVID-19 around the world. Some rich countries have placed orders for enough doses to vaccinate their entire population several times over, promising to share only after they have used everything they need. This means that they will be inoculating their younger populations much before elderly persons are inoculated in developing countries. This is a misguided effort that won't help efforts to end the pandemic.

Developed countries can take several steps if they are keen to control the pandemic. If they want an economic reason, experts have calculated that developed countries would lose as much as US\$ 5 trillion over the next few years even if COVID-19 persists only in the developing world. The first step is to address the funding gap of COVAX, which needs at least another US\$ 19 billion in the short term. The next step is to waive intellectual property rights to the vaccines, a move that has been proposed by India and South Africa. Another method is for companies to share licenses through the COVID-19 Technology Access Tool, a globally coordinated mechanism proposed by Costa Rica and started by the WHO last year. The last two proposals will enable many developing countries to ramp up vaccine production in local facilities.

In the meantime, we must take all preventive measures against COVID, including wearing face masks, washing hands frequently using soap and water or sanitizer, keeping the distance from the next person, minimizing travel, avoiding crowds and seeking medical help if any symptoms develop. Sri Lanka too has experienced a surge in cases as many people had given up these health practices after a relative lull in the disease here. But we must adhere to these health guidelines and the latest operational guidelines issued by the Government at least until a passable level of herd immunity is achieved through mass vaccination.

"t is now a fading 33 years plus, when in 1987 the Indian Defence Forces made their foray into the island nation of Sri Lanka. At that point in history, things had taken a turn for the worse with the Liberation Tamil Tigers Eelam (LTTE) a terrorist organisation embroiled in a bloody battle with the Sri Lankan Army.

The LTTE was pushed into a corner and its end appeared imminent, till India intervened to rescue the Tamils of Sri Lanka at the behest of Tamil Nadu considering their ethnic affinity. An airdrop of relief supplies under code name OP POONAMALAI on June 4, 1987 was executed by India, to break the blockade put in force by the Sri Lankan Army which had ringed Jaffna. From supposed rescuers of Tamils to the sinister epithet "Indian People Killing Force" the label coined by the local Tamils there was a sea change in perception of the Indian Peace Keeping Force (IPKF).

What had gone wrong? India in October 1987 decided to hand over a group of captured 17 LTTE militants to the Sri Lankan Government for criminal proceedings which were viewed with deep anger by the former. Most of these militants committed suicide by taking cyanide. Understandably so, as the Research and Analysis Wing (RAW) with its machinations had trained and equipped the LTTE with arms to combat the Sri Lankan Government. The militants viewed it as a betrayal of their cause. Moreover, Velupillai Prabhakaran, the LTTE leader, viewed the India-Sri Lankan Peace Accord (signed by Sri Lankan President J. R. Jayewardene and Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi) with disdain and derision in equal measure as he wanted full independence and not autonomy per the terms of the Accord.

The bad blood between the LTTE and India quickly congealed into a messy war, with the former refusing to lay down their arms to facilitate the peaceful process of elections as per the Accord. The fighting capabilities of LTTE to wage a war were discounted by the Indian Politico-military establishment an excusable lapse, considering that the RAW was their handler and the Indian Army their trainers. To add to the woes of IPKF, a dirty war of provid-



The signing of the Indo-Lanka Accord in Colombo.


cerned militant groups (there was a host of them apart from LTTE such as EPRLF, TELO, and ENDLF etc.) Not to be outdone, the Sri Lankan Government too armed the LTTE in a bid to blunt the IPKF, which became acute, more so when President R. Premadasa ascended to power.

LTTE cadres

Meanwhile, the Sri Lankan Army was confined to barracks as per the terms of the Accord. The IPKF was saddled with archival weapons such as single-shot SLR inducted after the 1962

War with China, and the useless 9mm Carbine or toy gun as it was later derisively called by the African rebels in Somalia a decade later. The LTTE was a deadly foe and gave no quarter preferring to partake cyanide rather than be taken captive. They fought with cunning and fully utilised the underprepared nature of the IPKF for the war waged by hard-core LTTE cadres which comprised amongst others non-uniformed civilians, girls and boys.

The IPKF provided considerable support to the civilian administration in Sri



The valuable respite was given to Sri Lankan Government to tackle the Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP), a Sinhalese militant group snapping at their heels. The provision of medical relief to the traumatised civilians was another accomplishment achieved with very thin resources. The stellar contributions of Brig RIS Kahlon, the then Town Commandant (Later Lt General) to restore civil administration as the town Com-

mandant was of particular note. The disastrous engagement that followed OP PAWAN, as it was christened would leave 1,158 Indian soldiers killed plus 3,000 wounded in its wake. The IPKF finally exited Sri Lanka in March 1990 after V. P. Singh became Indian Prime Minister.


The LTTE was a ruthless enemy. Later they would hunt down and eliminate the most prominent Sinhalese leaders and politicians of the times. This included Gamini Dissanayake, Lalith Athulathmudali, Ranjan Wijeratne, President R. Premadasa and later former Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi in India. They also eliminated field leaders and supporters of the IPKF from the splinter militant groups such as EPRLF

The killing of former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi was a tipping point after which the LTTE sealed its own fate. In 1997, the US banned the LTTE, flag-

ging it to be a terrorist organisation. In 1999, they attacked Sri Lankan President Chandrika Bandaranaike Kumaratunga who escaped with an injured eye. In 2000, the Norwegian-brokered Peace Initiative proved to be a failure. In 2002, the SL Army military fought LTTE to a stalemate in Jaffna.

In 2007, the Sri Lankan Courts declared the merger of the North and East Provinces as constitutionally invalid, a blow to the Indo-Lanka Accord of 1987. A supposed request by the Sri Lanka Army to the Indian Army earlier to intervene in quelling the LTTE was turned down. In 2009 the LTTE was defeated in Mullaitivu and Prabhakaran was killed by the Sri Lanka Army. The war was won at an enormous cost of loss of life. Sri Lanka to this day is still smarting from alleged human rights

allegations over unaccounted deaths and disappearances of many civilians.



Prominent Indians thought leaders and illustrious decision-makers cut their teeth in Sri Lanka. Among these are -Current Chief of Army Staff General MM Naravane, Journalist Shekhar Gupta, EAM Jaishankar, Hardeep Puri Civil Aviation Minister former COAS General Dalbir Singh Suhag and General V.

K. Singh to name a few. History is never "done and dusted". Its lessons and meanings need to be continuously distilled and imbibed and martyrs duly honoured and

their legacy preserved. The Lankan Government constructed a Memorial in Colombo in 2008, only to be reluctantly followed by the Indian establishment later in Bhopal in 2014. The memorial at Colombo constructed by Sri Lanka in 2008, aptly cites the legacy of the IPKF: "Valiant were their deeds, Undying be their memories".

However, there is no official commemoration day earmarked by India for these brave martyrs nor is there any mention of the IPKF memorial on the Indian Army's Official Website. In Army museums too, the IPKF achievements and history has been conveniently erased or overlooked. In 2012 in sharp contrast, the Indian Army finally acknowledged the role of the martyrs in the Indo China War in 1962 after 50 years of a collective memory lapse and felicitated them by wreath-laying at Amar Jawan Jyoti on October 20, 2012. It is noted that the IPKF won One PVC, plus six MVCs in Operation Pawan apart from various other awards. It is hoped that the powers that be do needful in honouring the IPKF martyrs. As the well-known cliché says "It is never too late".

Now a group of veterans have come together in a bid to restore the legacy of the IPKF. A small get together was organised in Delhi, on March 28, 2021.

It is hoped to wake up the current establishment from its "generation of forgetfulness" as China comes knocking on India's doors to the North and also in Sri Lanka. A book is being released in 2021 by veterans Lt Col BR Nair and Lt Col Atul Kochhar to honour the martyrs and preserve their

ROLE OF THE BRAIN IN PERCEPTION AND PRODUCTION **OF LANGUAGE**

our last article, we discussed that in the tradition of generative grammar (i.e. Noam Chomsky, his colleagues and followers), it is claimed that there is a specific facility in our brain/mind called LAD responsible for language acquisition and learning. It was also shown that there is a specific time window for us to acquire/learn a first or a second language. At the same time, much research into brain and language has proven that certain areas of our brain are responsible for language functions. In today's article, we are discussing this in detail.

The brain and language

As a fact we know that we learn and develop a myriad of skills such as walking, cooking, driving, typing, dancing, etc., with the help of the brain. Language is no exception in this case. In the same way as the brain is the seat for our thoughts, the brain is the seat for our language. It has been found out that certain parts in our brain are responsible for language perception and production. The term 'language centre' is used commonly to refer to the areas in the brain that are responsible for language perception and production. Much of the early (i.e., 20th century)

research of the relationship between the brain and language was based on the analysis of the speech of brain damaged patients. However, with the development of technology, noninvasive techniques and electrophysiological recordings of human brains have made significant advancements in identifying regions and their functions in tion. Three regions in the brain, namely Broca's area,

speech processing and produc- Paul Broca Wernicke's area and Angular Gyrus have been mainly identified as being primarily responsible for language matters. The general areas and processes such as Motor Cortex and Arcuate Fasciculus have also been identified to play very crucial roles



that Broca's area is responsible for phonological, syntactic and semantic processing. It has been claimed that it does not play a role in the production of single words. Accordingly, it is mainly identified as a processing centre.

Wernicke's area

German doctor Carl Wernicke in 1874 discovered this area as responsible for language comprehension. His research with patients who had damages in

located in the lower part of the temporal lobe, showed that they could not comprehend speech. He concluded that this region of the brain had an effect on speech comprehension. However, more research into language comprehension has shown that other than Wernicke's area, language perception utilizes more and larger areas of the inferior parietal lobe and left temporal.

Angular Gyrus

It is located in the anterolateral region of the parietal lobe. It transfers visual information into Wernicke's area to facilitate meaning processing out of visual symbols. Thus, it serves in retrieving verbal and visual information to convert

written language into spoken language. It is also said to serve in number processing and special cognition.

Primary auditory cortex

The auditory cortex is located in the temporal lobe. It is responsible for processing auditory information. Thus, it processes all functions of hearing analysing the inputs passed from the ear.

Motor cortex

Located in the cerebral cortex, it is mainly responsible for tasks such as planning, control and movements of body organs. With respect to language, motor cortical areas are found to play a crucial role in processing language comprehension.

Arcuate Fasciculus

It refers to the white matter (the areas of the central nervous system). It is a fiber tract that connects the processes between Broca's area and Wernicke's areas.

In today's article we discussed those specific regions in our brain play roles in language comprehension and production. Broca's area is particularly found to be responsible for language production while Wernicke's area is found to be mainly responsible for language comprehen-

Arcuate Fasciculus is found to play a role in connecting processes between Broca's area and Wernicke's areas. However, as we cannot really dig into the brain to identify the functions of different parts of the brain, the exact specific functions of these areas are not fully understood yet. With the advancement of knowledge and technology, it is hoped that we will be able to understand more about the language related roles and functions of these specific areas in our brain.

Related to brain and other body organs such as the oral and nasal apparatus are language/speech impairments/disorders. We are going to discuss this next week.

INDIA'S **ECONOMIC DIPLOMACY** IN SOUTH **ASIA**

ven though Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi touts the vision of "Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas, Vishwas" ("everyone together, everyone's development, leveryone's trust"), India has failed to deliver on its promises. Trade totals with South Asian neighbours remain low, many Indian infrastructure projects in the region are still incomplete, and its neighbours are disappointed with discrimination in aid. China, on the other hand, has extensively made inroads into the region. What are the significant issues hampering India's economic diplomacy? Furthermore, why has India not been able to resolve its challenges?

Protectionism

One major problem is that India has increased its protectionist approach since Modi's election in 2014, which has a significant impact on economic diplomacy. The Asian Development Bank, in a December 2020 report looking at 25 countries in the Asia-Pacific region, ranked India 24th on trade openness only Pakistan scored lower. Despite having implemented economic reforms with liberalization, privatization and globalization (LPG) policies starting in 1991 and signing the South Asian Free Trade Area (SAFTA) agreement for greater economic integration and free trade in 2006, India's overall trade with South Asia has been low accounting for between 1.7 percent and 3.8 percent of its global trade. India exports in bulk; however, imports are minimal, due to trade barriers.

Integrated Check Posts set up at borders have suffered under cumbersome procedures, like additional checks of trucks and delays in paperwork, that consume both time and profits. The idea behind SAFTA was that neighbours would benefit from India's economic opportunities by eliminating trade barri-

ers, but this has not been the case. Neighbours have mostly complained about the excessive amount of non-tariff barriers that India has, including clearance procedures, import policy barriers. testing and certification requirements, anti-dumping, countervailing measures and export subsidies, each of which poses an obstacle for liberal trade. Bangladeshi goods, for instance, suffer extensive tariff barriers, hindering free trade, despite the signing of the SAFTA.

India is making a deliberate effort to increase its exports to neighbouring countries. However, at the same time, New Delhi continues to protect its markets from imports, from its neighbours and elsewhere.

Discrimination in providing aid to its neighbours is another issue. India has shown extraordinary generosity toward the Maldives (with whom relations have improved), Nepal, Bhutan, and Afghanistan. In its budgets, India provided more aid to these four countries than the rest of the countries of SAARC, leading to insecurity among other neighbours. For instance, in the 2019 budget, Bhutan received 28.1 billion rupees, Nepal got 10.5 billion rupees, the Maldives got 5.8 billion rupees, but Sri Lanka got only 2.5 billion rupees. In the last decade, Bhutan has received 322.8 billion rupees, Afghanistan 48.5 billion rupees, and Sri Lanka only 2.52 billion rupees.

Scholars from Sri Lanka see this as discrimination in aid, feeling India offers more to those strategically more essential. In 2020, amid the pandemic, Sri Lanka requested a moratorium on loan repayments and an additional US\$ 1 billion in loans, reportedly from India. However, India did not respond, giving Sri Lanka no option but to turn to China, which offers faster infrastructural development and collaboration.

Nepal has shown similar concerns. India's budget allocation for aid to Nepal has varied drastically in recent years.

Nepal claims that it sees a rise in Indian assistance whenever its relations with China increase, as New Delhi tries to match the contributions that China made. India's strings-attached aid (highlighting the mercantilist approach of its India-First Policy) has also hindered the healthy growth of economic relations with the people.

A delivery-deficit nation

India's neighbours have often complained of India making big promises but suffering from a delivery deficit. This is the case with most countries in which India has taken up projects, for instance, road and railway lines, establishing integrated border checkpoints, and hydropower projects. In Nepal, the Police Academy, expected to be complete 32 years ago, is still in limbo. Several more Indian projects are still waiting completion, leading Nepal to turn to

The case is similar in Bangladesh, where many railway projects have suffered delays. This issue creates negative perceptions of India being lazy and indifferent to its commitments. Some of the projects also lack sufficient funds, which is another issue. Thus, South Asian countries have no

option but to turn to China to reduce their dependency on India. The Chinese have a proven track record of developing infrastructure abroad on time, and give added incentives by making many projects part of the Belt and Road Initiative. China has been busy completing the East-West highway that traverses Nepal and is also working on a railway line from Tibet to Lhasa. It has many projects underway in Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and Afghanistan as well. China has been increasing its investments in South Asia due to India's neglect over the years, with Beijing offering a sustained strategy on development projects and the security concerns that emanate from

India's neighbours. This has become a significant challenge for India.

Internal institutional hurdles, such as policy and bureaucratic delays, are another reason why India has been unable to meet its infrastructure targets. Visa restrictions on the movement of people have also hindered regional connectivity and economic engagement in the region. This is a significant disadvantage for India, despite its best efforts to initiate and fund developmental projects. Institutional hurdles pose the bitter truth: India has still not been able to resolve the challenges mentioned above due to decades of policy stagnation. These problems have dragged down all the efforts that India makes in its own neighbourhood, significantly impacting

India's economic diplomacy has been thoroughly suffering, impacting its image globally and in the region. Reforming its institutional hurdles and laid-back attitude is necessary if India desires to overcome its neighbours' misperceptions and compete with Chinese investments in South Asia. For this, India must eliminate non-tariff barriers and other trade barriers, stringsattached aid, and complete all the existing projects to regain the neighbours' trust. At the same time, India must increase its investments and trade with neighbouring countries to reap the benefits of greater regional and economic integration, making India open rather than being closed to its neighbours' economies. Will India rescript its approach incorporate neighbours' concerns and expectations and improve its economic diplomacy, leading to greater regional integration? The choice lies with New Delhi.

hen we talk of the evolution of the Small Team concept in the theatre of jungle warfare, we have to recall its founder Major General Charles Wingate. An officer of the British Royal Artillery, he was an exponent of unconventional warfare.

Initially, his superior officers didn't appreciate his suggestions as they were used to conventional attacks on the enemy. However, with time Wingate was able to obtain permission and train his troops in the jungles of India. These men were the pioneers of long range patrols and deep penetration attacks. Wingate named them the Chindits (after a mythical Burmese lion). The Chindits consisted of British soldiers and Indian soldiers, including the formidable Gurkhas. They trained in the mosquito-infested jungles. By 1943 the Chindits infiltrated the jungles of Burma and began raiding Japanese Army positions. The Chindits carried their own supplies and were the first to operate far away from base camp. The courage and tactics of these pioneers would soon be adopted by armies all over the world.

In the Sri Lankan theatre of combat, the need for Small Teams was envisaged during the JVP insurgency of 1988/1989. The initial STF teams were trained for surveillance. Later they were trained to operate in the jungles. In the Eastern Province, during the years of conflict, the LTTE adopted a tactic of sending two or three combatants on foot, to intimidate border villages. Most of the farmers were frightened and a fear psychosis spread among them. The Police Special Task Force was already deployed in some areas of the Eastern Province. The challenge of mitigating this new threat was boldly taken up by ASP Upali Sahabandu (who later became DIG). This unassuming officer along with some others would transform the concept of jungle warfare in Sri Lanka with the introduction of Small Teams.


In order to trace their formative years I



spoke to retired DIG K.H. Perera, who was an Inspector at that time in the late 1980s. He recalled "The concept of Small Team attacks was new. We were fortunate to have a dynamic officer like the late ASP Sahabandu. Together we trained our selected STF men to operate in a five-man team.

These teams were trained in jungle survival. They were able to deploy from a base camp, entering the forest covering 25–30km. They were armed with M-16 assault rifles, grenades and side chargers (explosives). They were able to identify LTTE camps.

They laid in ambush and shot and killed the combatants who went out on these attacks against border villages. The enemy



The pioneer Small Teams had to learn and adapt. One of the operational benefits of these teams was that they were almost invisible. Nothing was thrown after a meal. They never left any trace of their presence. Usually, large team STF operations involved the movement of men and vehicles. Certain civilians used to observe this and inform the LTTE of such movements, and an impending attack. However with the Small Teams, there was secrecy, they moved out unnoticed. This gave them the element of surprise. Besides larger teams required supplies like food. Again this movement gave the enemy some advance information. The STF Small Teams took their own rations. The team included an explosives 'master' and a lead scout who always carried a shotgun. One of their main tasks was to gather intelligence of enemy build-up and locate supply lines. When required, a STF sniper was attached to the team, to take out a tar-

Reminiscing further, DIG Jayaweera added "We went to the extent of getting the expert advice of the Veddah community. We mastered the art of tracking and recognizing animal prints. Our men learnt how to find water and food in the jungle. In some cases, we followed bees to their beehives to obtain honey. Snake bites were a threat to our men. We learnt about anti-venom. Some anti-venom bottles had to be kept cool. Obviously, there was no fridge in the forest areas, so we kept these bottles tied on a rope at the bottom of a well. We encountered dangerous lone elephants. These are the sacrifices we made to defend our Motherland."

Many of these pioneer
warriors have retired and
some died in action. The
teams bonded strongly.
Each team was given leave
on the same days, so that
they would bond together
with each other's families,
enhancing their camaraderie.
This paid off as the Small
Teams worked well displaying
high levels of confidence.

Another pioneer, SSP Faizal
Hadgie (Deputy Commandant Operations) recalled his days as an
Inspector, and said: "The Small
Teams were operating to dominate the
jungle areas. We operated in Kokkadicholai (Batticaloa) and Pottuvil (Ampara). I
was the OIC of the Pottuvil area. We operated in teams of six or eight as per requirement. We were able to keep the enemy on
the run. We carried military-grade precooked food sachets. Our teams would
remain in the jungle for eight to 10 days.
Our teams gathered vital information to
facilitate large group assaults on the
enemy."

SSP Athula Daulugala (Deputy Commandant) is an officer well versed in jungle tracking and trapping. He reminisced, "Tracking is about close observation. When we went on five-day missions into dense jungles we looked for small signs of enemy presence. This is the craft of tracking. We once found a tiny wrapper of a medicine capsule, and located a tree where medical supplies were hidden. Another of my men picked up a few drops of water in the sand, and we followed the enemy, until we ambushed them on the third day. Trapping is done to secure our position at night. We used booby traps and small mines at night. We also used sharp hard bamboo, and planted them as protection along paths where the enemy may advance. Our men carried the 60mm Commando Mortar and the 40mm multi grenade launcher. We ate from the MR8 ration packs. Our bodies were adapted to operate on minimum levels of water. Our patrols lasted six days."

with radio messages going out every two hours on predetermined channels, in this way the battery strength was also preserved. Another major achievement by SSP Daulugala and his team was the creation of a 6km road through the dense jungle of Kanchikudichiaru (Eastern Province). This 'recovery' road was cleared inside the forest using bulldozers. The road was used to quickly transport any injured STF men for treatment.

Inspector Karunaratne,
Inspector Narangoda and Inspector Liyanage were a few of the officers involved in this mission.
The Small Team concept was further refined and took on the new name of Cheetah Team. This change was implemented by ASP R.M.
Wimalaratne. The teams still train at

the STF Academy, Katukurunda. Its Director Training SSP Rathnayake explained, "We continue to train our teams with present-day requirements. The jungle training phase is carried out in Nurawa Eliya and Ampara - two extreme weather conditions. The men learn tracking and trapping techniques. Quick reaction, stealth and endurance are the core competencies of these teams, just like the cheetah. The men are taught to swim, to survive the jungle by day and night. We take the best out of the best and create very formidable warriors." The present course instructor is Inspector Kaluarachchi, and a batch is under training

"Adherence to health guidelines the key"

The Health Promotion Bureau (HPB) of the Ministry of Health has urged the public to act responsibly to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 virus by adhering to guidelines issued by the health authorities.

Issuing a COVID-19 warning, the HPB stated that there has been an increase in the number of coronavirus patients detected in Sri Lanka over the past few days and there has been a rapid increase in the number of patients admitted to the Intensive

stated that new variants of the virus had been detected in Sri Lanka in the recent past and the scientific data review on this is currently underway.

"We have all seen in the past that the spread of disease can be controlled very quickly by following preventive measures. The gradual decline in following these health guidelines over the past festive season has undoubtedly led to the creation of this new vulnerability," HPB

such as cough, sore throats, or cold." In comparison to many countries in the region, Sri Lanka has managed to a great extent, health sources said. Sri Lanka has recorded just over 101,000 cases, with 94,000 recover-

There are 6,430 active cases, while 631 have succumbed to the disease. Sri Lanka has administered close to one million doses of the vaccine, with the second phase slated to begin in May. It has also ordered 13 million doses of the Sputnik V vaccine and hopes to inoculate all eligible adults by the end of this year.

SURGE IN INDIA, BRAZIL AS GLOBAL CASES REACH 150 MN

The coronavirus surge that is driven by the devastation in India continues to break daily records and run rampant in much of the world, even as vaccinations steadily ramp up in wealthy countries and more than one billion shots have now been given globally.

On Sunday, the world's seven-day average of new cases hit 774,404, according to a New York Times database. That is a jump of 15 percent from two weeks earlier, and higher than the peak average of 740,390 during the last global surge in January.

Despite the number of shots given around the world — more than one billion, according to a New York Times tracker — far from enough of the world's estimated population of nearly eight billion have been vaccinated to slow the virus's steady spread.

And vaccinations have been highly concentrated in wealthy nations: 82 percent of shots worldwide have been given in high- and upper-middle-income countries, according to data compiled by the Our World in Data project at the University of Oxford. Only 0.2 percent of doses have been administered in lowincome countries.

Israel is far ahead of much of the world in vaccinations: More than half of the population is now fully vaccinated. In Britain, where a highly contagious and deadly variant was discovered, nearly two thirds of the population is at least partly vaccinated and the rate of new cases is now among the lowest

The United States has also partly vaccinated about 41 percent of its population and has loosened a ban on the export of raw materials for vaccines to help India control the world's worst outbreak.

India is recording more than a third of all new global cases each day, averaging more than 260,000 new daily cases over the past week.





The country's sudden surge, driven by the spread of a newer variant, is casting increasing doubt on the official death toll of nearly 200,000, with more than 2,000 people dying

Experts say the official numbers, however staggering, represent just a part of the virus's spread, with hospitals overwhelmed and lacking critical supplies like oxygen.

India is home to the Serum Institute of India, the world's largest vaccine maker. But only about 8.6 percent of India's population has received at least one shot of a vaccine. Its surge led to the Indian government's decision to withhold exports of doses that many lowand middle-income countries were relying on. The vaccine rollout in Africa, which was already slower than it is in any other continent, could soon come to a near halt because of the suspension.

Public health experts say the number of global cases is most likely surging because more contagious virus variants are spreading just as people are starting to let their guards down.

In Thailand, where cases were kept at bay for months with strict quarantines and lockdowns, the virus has spread rapidly, in part by unmasked people partying. Daily cases, still low by global standards, have increased from 26 on April 1 to more than 2,000 three weeks

later. And in India, many people stopped taking precautions after officials eased a lockdown that was imposed early last year.

"India let their guard down when the numbers fell and they thought they were over their last peak," said Barry Bloom, a research professor and former dean of the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. He added that the United States should "take a lesson from other countries before we become complacent and decide everything's OK."

As bad as India's situation is, the numbers have room to grow worse: Its daily caseloads, adjusted for its huge population, rank well below other countries'.

The rate of new cases in the United States is falling but remains alarmingly high — similar to last summer's surge.

The rates of new coronavirus cases also remain high across much of South America. In Brazil, reported cases are starting to drop but remain high after a more contagious variant tore through the country and overwhelmed hospi-

In Europe, the pace of vaccinations lags that in the United States and Canada, and the number of new coronavirus cases remains particularly high in France, Germany, the Netherlands and Sweden. Turkey, at the crossroads between Europe, the Middle East and Asia, is another hot spot.

Dr. Robert Murphy, the executive director of the Institute for Global Health at Northwestern University, said the United States had a responsibility to send unused vaccine doses to other countries as supplies increase.

"We have to start thinking on a global scale and do what we can to help these other countries," Dr. Murphy said. "Otherwise we're never going to put out the whole

GLOBAL PLEDGES OF HELP FOR INDIA

INDIA: The United States on Sunday led international pledges of support for India as the country grappled with worsening COVID-19 crisis with record daily death rates and severe medical shortages.

The Indian healthcare system has struggled to cope with a huge surge in cases, leaving patients' families begging for help on social media and the capital New Delhi forced to extend its strict lockdown.

COVID-19 has now killed more than three million people worldwide since emerging in China in December 2019.

India, which has a population of 1.3 billion, has driven increases in global case numbers in recent days, recording 349,691 new infections and 2,767 deaths on Sunday -- the highest since the start of the pandemic.

India has administered almost 141 million vaccine shots so far, but experts say the mass inoculation programme needs to be significantly stepped up.

President Joe Biden said the United States was "determined to help India in its time of need," immediately making available supplies of vaccine-production material, therapeutics, tests, ventilators and protective equipment.

Western nations including Britain, France and Germany have also pledged help.

"The United States has identified sources of specific raw material urgently required for Indian manufacture of the Covishield vaccine," a White House statement said, referring to the Indiaproduced version of the Astra-Zeneca shot.

Britain said Sunday it was sending life-saving medical equipment to India, including ventilators and oxygen concentrators, as the south Asian country reels from record numbers of daily COVID-19 infections and

The assistance is to include badly needed oxygen ventilators, a source told AFP without providing further details.

Obama had an average of 60 percent approval in his first half year and his predecessor George W. Bush had 53.9 percent.

Trump, by contrast, had an average approval rating of 41.4 percent in his first six months.

According to data from the fivethirtyeight. com site, Trump was the first President in half a century not to enjoy a honeymoon period with substantially better polling in the first six months.

Sunken Indonesian submarine found split into three

INDONESIA: An Indonesian navy submarine that sank off the coast of Bali on Wednesday has been found split into three pieces on the sea bed, officials say.

All the vessel's 53 crew have been confirmed dead. Navy officials said they had received signals from the sub's location more than 800m (2,600ft) deep early on Sunday.

An underwater rescue vehicle loaned by Singapore was sent down to get visual confirmation of the wreck-The KRI Nanggala disap-

peared after requesting permission to dive during a torpedo drill. The reason for its sinking is not yet clear. Navy Chief of Staff Yudo

Margono said more items from the submarine had been recovered including an anchor and crew safety suits.

"The KRI Nanggala is



divided into three parts, the hull of the ship, the stern of the ship, and the main parts are all separated, with the main part found cracked," he told reporters on Sun-

Indonesian President Joko

Widodo described the crew as Indonesia's "best patriots", adding: "All Indonesians convey their deep sadness over this incident, especially to the families of the submarine crew.

Akila Nuwan Hettiarachchi was called 'Hetti' in rugby circles and was born in 1988 in Kandy. His father Sunil Hettiarachchi is a businessman and was a former soccer player. Vineetha is his mother and is a house wife. He has five other siblings with Kanchana the elder sister, Sanka and Pathum elder brothers while Kusal and Deneth younger brothers. been established in collaboration with the Ministry of Sports to conduct junior and youth tournaments regularly and are hoping to conduct Asian Championship once in every two

Two beach volleyball and indoor volleyball tournaments will be held annually with the participation of foreign players and steps will also be taken to update the knowledge of coaches and umpires, including beach volleyball.

All coaches and umpires will be registered under SLVF while steps have been taken to issue identity cards. Felicitation ceremonies will be organized to pay tribute to national volleyball players, coaches and umpires to encourage them.

An "Information Centre" will be established containing information on volleyball players representing senior, junior and youth teams, including coaches, referees, administrators and special events related to Sri Lankan volleyball since the inception of the Volleyball Federation in 1951. Meanwhile, the "Volleyball Museum" will be established at the Volleyball House, Dadalla in Galle, the President of SLVF further said.

The programme will be prepared with the Ministry of Education and the Schools Volleyball Association to introduce an annual volleyball big match between two major schools such as a cricket big match. The Beach Volleyball League in collaboration with Dialog will be started from this year and steps will be taken to be hold it annu-

ally.

The SLVF also hopes to unearth talented volleyball players from the Estate Sector and encourage them to join the existing clubs in the provinces so that they would one day represent the country in volleyball bringing much joy to their parents and friends.

In conclusion he said that he hopes to request the Government to declare a "Volleyball Day" annually which would be a boon to the sport.

Private sector credit increases, State credit dips

Private sector credit has increased by Rs. 79 billion in February 2020 and the State credit growth has declined to Rs. 57 billion compared to over Rs.100 billion maintained for five consecutive months, said First Capital in their monthly economic review.

Meanwhile the Monetary Board of CBSL, at its meeting held on April 7 2021, decided to maintain the SDFR and SLFR at their current levels of 4.50% and 5.50% respectively.

The Board remains committed to maintaining the low interest rate structure, thereby ensuring continued support for a sustained economic recovery and well anchored inflation expectations in a low inflation environment. The Board states that due to the impact of monetary policy easing measures, most market interest rates declined to their historic lows. That said, some upward pressure on yields on government securities was observed recently, in contrast to monetary policy expectations. Thus, the CBSL reiterates the necessity to maintain the low interest rate structure.

The Central Fish Market Employees Federation (CFMEF) said the significant improvement of the country's health situation and also the arrival of more foreign tourists to Sri Lanka during this New Year season between January to April helped the Peliyagoda Central Fish Market to uplift its daily turnover to a record 90%.

In an interview with **Daily News Business** CFMEF, Chairman Jayasiri
Wickramarachchi (**Pictured**) said
when comparing to the 10 to 20% sale
of fish recorded during the last 18
months due to the pandemic situation
the reason for the increased sale of
fish at present is due to the healthy
environment prevailing across the
country.

He also thanked large and small scale fish distributors and traders in

the main fish market at Peliyagoda and also at outstation fish stalls for making an outstanding effort to develop the country's fisheries industry once again without getting discouraged. He said unlike in the past almost all tourist hotels in Colombo and outstations are now purchasing large quantities of fish from the Peliyagoda market which has resulted in improving fish sales.

Jayasiri further said the country's entire fisheries sector during the last curfew period faced immense hardships since the fish consumption had shown a negative impact and this situation badly hampered not only the fisheries sector but some large scale buyers. "However due to the sharp improvement in the country's health sector now we firmly believe that the fisheries sector will gradually show

fruitful results even after this New Year," he said. Jayasiri said the high fish prices currently prevailing in the country is due to few loads of fish

that are coming to the Central Fish Market from various parts.

"As we know some private sector fish traders are in the habit of purchasing large stocks from fish producing areas before dispatching them to Peliyagoda Central Fish Market and sell them at exorbitant prices in their fish outlets," he said.

He also thanked authorities for taking steps to minimize fish imports from foreign countries as it will greatly help all sectors involved in the industry.

Economically active population reaches 8.5 mn in 4Q 2020

The estimated economically active population is about 8.5 million in the fourth quarter 2020. Of which 66.3% are males and 33.7% are females. The economically inactive population is about 8.4 million. Out of the economically inactive population 27.3% are males and 72.7% are females According to Department of Census and Statistics -Sri Lanka Labour Force Survey fourth Quarter -2020,The survey report also saysthat the male participation in the labour force is always higher than that offe-

The highest participation rate for male is reported from age group35—39 years (96.8%), while that for females is reported from 25—29 age groups(46.6%). During the fourth quarter of 2020, the total number of employed persons in Sri Lanka is estimated as about 8million. Of which, about 44.8% engaged in the Service sector, 29% in the agriculture sector and 26.2% in the Industry sector. In the fourth quarter of 2020, there persons in the agriculture sector compared to the fourth quarter of 2019 by 115,138. Majority of the workforce are private sector employees followed by own account workers. Highest employment share is in the service sector and this is true for both male and female, while the lowest shares are for the

is an increase in employed persons in the agriculture sector compared to the fourth quarter of 2019 by 115,138. Majority of the workforce are private sector employees industry sector. Among employed females 32.2% is in the agriculture sector while this share is 27.5% for males.

for females is 7.5% and it is 4.1% for male. Youth unemployment rate (age 15 – 24 years) corresponding to the fourth quarter 2020 is 25.7 percent and that is the highest reported unemployment rate among all age groups. Rajeeva Bandaranaike Chief Executive Officer Colombo Stock Exchange (CSE) has sent the following with regard to the article titled "Stockbrokers to be called up on limiting corporate debt trading" published on April 23 of the 'Daily News Business.

"I wish to bring to your notice that the writer has completely misquoted comments made by me in response to questions raised by the journalist (outside the media Q&A segment) on the sidelines of a recent event held at the

The limited trading activity in the corporate debt market has not been attributed to stockbroker firms. This statement is not an accurate reflection of the comment made by me in this regard, where I only stated that improving trading in the corporate debt market will be discussed at a future meeting between the CSE and CSE Members and Trading Members as part of other capital market matters discussed during

such an engagement. No allegations with regards to stockbroker firms limiting corporate debt trading were mentioned by me to the journalist. With regards to the comment: 'The Central Bank is not letting us list government securities', I wish to bring to your notice that I did not make the said com-

As both the investor community and capital market fraternity are aware, the trading of government securities is not presently serviced in the Sri Lankan stock market. The CSE is actively in the process of exploring the technical and practical possibilities of facilitating the trading of government securities through the Automated Trading System (ATS). The Central Bank (CBSL) has in fact been supportive of this process.

On the topic of Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) which reads, 'Bandaranaike noted that the failure to list any Real Estate Investment Trusts (REIT) instruments was due to the failure of the government to gazette the promised tax structure for the products. There are many companies that are waiting to list,' too is not an accurate reflection of the comment made by me.

While the comments made by me on this topic included an acknowledgement that the tax proposals made as part of the 2021 Budget with regards to REITs are yet to be included in a Gazette notification published by the Government of Sri Lanka, this acknowledgement was not linked to a failure in listing

While the tax exemptions introduced as part of the 2021 Budget proposals add to the attractiveness of REITs in an issuer's perspective, the business case for issuing a REIT in Sri Lanka for eligible entities goes well beyond merely tax concessions.

I write this response as the article has the potential to mislead the readership on the stance of the CSE and the other organizations.

Creating a culture of creativity: The importance of Intellectual Property Rights

On the 26th of April each vear. Intellectual Property (IP) Day is celebrated to draw public attention to the impor-

tance of IP rights in fostering creativity and innovation. It is said that oil was the primary fuel of the 20thcentury economy while creativity is the fuel of the

21st century. Creative Industries Encompass A broad range of activities such as arts, craft, music, design and media which have their origin in individual creativity, skill and talent, and have a potential for wealth and job creation through the generation and exploitation of intellectual property. Creative industries are vital to many economies, accounting for 7% of the world's GDP and growing at an annual rate of 8.7% according to the latest available data. The World Intellectual Property Rights Organization (WIPO) marks IP day under specific themes, and this year, it focuses on creativity in Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) in bringing novel ideas to the market. Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs) including copyrights, trademarks, Geographical Indications(GI), patents, and sui generis systems are important in protecting and fostering creativity. This

Sri Lanka's creative industries and offers strategies to build stronger, more competitive and resilient businesses. Creative Industries in Sri Lanka Sri Lanka's creative sector can be broadly divided in three categories: arts and culture, design, and

A study by the Institute of Policy Studies of Sri Lanka (IPS) commissioned by the British Council, Sri Lanka identified 16 subsectors as creative industries: According To the available data, Sri Lanka's creative industry has shown growth of 95% between 2010 to 2014, rising from USD 433.6 million to USD 845.4million. An approximate estimate of the GDP share of creative goods and services exports in 2014 was nearly 1.1%. The IPS survey, which sought to capture the current size and scale of the creative

only 4.6% of respondents were exportoriented and the balance produced for local consumption. Thus, the 1.1% GDP share is an underestimate, as it only accounts for the exports of creative goods

The IPS survey also found that the number of employees in the sector makeup approximately 3% of the country's total labourforce.

Approximately 36% of creative workers are female and 67% of workers in the sector are between the ages of 24 and 55 years, while 71% of workers are in the private sector and the rest is in government and semi-government sec-

Self-employment is high in this sector, with 40% of the workforce identifying themselves as 'self-employed'. As is the case globally, in Sri Lanka too, the sector FGD participant

consisted mostly of SMEs and sole trad-

ers with only a few large businesses. Most importantly, the creative industries depend on the talents of individuals and the generation of intellectual property. Thus, several IPRs are relevant to the sector. For example, copyrights for literature, music, visual arts, digital creative work, trademarks for advertising and branding, GI for location-specific creativities, and patents for gaming and digital

Therefore, IPRs play a major role in driving this sector. Further, IP enforcement is important to protect the creator and/or investors to provide them with incentives to invest and further develop the sector. Creative Sector and IPRs in Sri Lanka The awareness of IPRs among the survey respondents in the above-mentioned IPS study was poor. Only 8.8% had obtained any form of IP protection, out of which 48% had copyrights, 10% had patents, 26% had trademarks and 16% had others. Copyrights and trademarks were taken up in each sector whereas patents were only adopted in a few sub sectors such as visual/performing arts, crafts, advertising, etc. (Figure 1).

However, most of the survey and Focus Group Discussion (FGD) participants were not aware of IPRs relating to their businesses and the following quotes high-

light this: Way Forward IPRs are relevant to the creative industry as it relies on the use of intellectual production to create its goods and services. Following Are a few suggestions to enhance the effective utilisation of IPRs for the development of the creative sector:

Firstly, it is important to enhance knowledge on access to IPRs in the creative industry sector through awareness programmes at the grassroots levels especially in the craft, music, dance and design sectors. Industry professional associations should take the lead in this regard. Secondly, many traditional creative industry sectors such as craft, performing arts, and visual arts are locationspecific such as Ambalangoda masks, Dumbara mats, and Weweldeniya cane products. Thus, products can use GI to indicate that the goods have a special quality, character or reputation because they originate from a specific place. This will help to protect their rights, increase product value and better visibility. As such, the National Intellectual Property Office (NIPO)must speed up the process of identifying and obtaining GIs for selected sectors while also expanding links with WIPO to protect traditional creative industries. Thirdly, at the national level, it is important to adopt a sui generis (a unique system) legal framework for protecting traditional knowledge and cultural expressions, which are ultimately the foundation from which Sri Lanka creates its unique designs. Fourth, laws need to be updated as the existing legal framework does not cater to developments in modern technology.

NIPO should also improve its efficiency and capacity to cater to modern creativities especially for IT and design sectors.Finally,Sri Lanka must modernise its IP system, incentivise grassroots innovation and promote homegrown creativity to fuel a culture of creativity. 



This 5.88% decrease in grid-connected electricity consumption led to the reduction of total Green House Gas (GHG) emissions of the Bank from 13,055 tCO2e to 12,121 tCO2e, which is more than a 7% decline over the two years.



Supernatural animated tattoos

ou might already be familiar with black light tattoos created using ultraviolet ink, but Russian artist Maxim Sipakov takes glowing body art to a whole new level. The talented 18-year-old animator digitally alters videos from tattoo artists around the world. He adds neon lights to their designs that appear to move around the skin like magic. Each modified bit of body art looks like the tattoo of a superhero!

Sipakov first began adding neon lights to soccer footage back in February 2020. Since then, he's found his forte in tattoo art. His colorful additions allow you to appreciate the original inked designs in a whole new light-literally.

From geometric mandalas to characterinspired designs, Sipakov can pretty much turn any tattoo into something that looks supernatural. Vibrant sparks of light flash, dart, and dance around the lines of the tattoo, illuminating certain areas and bringing them to life. Each neon light overlay perfectly compliments the original design, and Sipakov always makes sure to credit the original tattoo artist on Instagram.

As of writing, the skilled animator now has over 119,000 followers on Instagram, and it's clear to see why. Scrolling through his portfolio is totally mesmerizing!

team of scientists at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in the US have translated the structure of a spider web into music, which could have applications ranging from better 3D printers to cross-species communication and otherworldly musical compo-

"The spider lives in an environment of vibrating strings. They don't see very well, so they sense their world through vibrations, which have different frequencies," said Markus

Buehler, from MIT. Such vibrations occur, for example, when the spider stretches a silk strand during construction,

web with a laser to capture 2D cross-sections and then used computer algorithms to reconstruct the web's 3D network. They assigned dif-

or when the wind or a trapped fly moves the

In the study, the team scanned a natural spider ferent frequencies of sound to strands of the web, creating "notes" that they combined in patterns based on the web's 3D structure to generate melodies.

The researchers then created a harp-like instrument and played the spider web music in several live performances around the world and also made a virtual reality setup that allowed people to visually and audibly "enter" the web.

'The virtual reality environment is really intriguing. By hearing it and seeing it at the same time, you can really start to understand the environment the spider lives in," Buehler said.

The step-by-step knowledge of how a spider builds a web could help in devising "spider-mimicking" 3D printers that build complex microelectronics.

The team explored how the sound of a web changes as it's exposed to different mechanical forces, such as stretching. Further, in a bid to communicate with spiders in their own language they recorded web vibrations produced when spiders performed different activities, such as building a web, communicating with other spiders or sending courtship signals.


Although the frequencies sounded similar to the human ear, a machine learning algorithm correctly classified the sounds into the different activities. "Now we're trying to generate synthetic signals to basically speak the language of the spider," Buehler said.

The findings will be presented at the forthcoming spring meeting of the American Chemical Society (ACS).







By the time he passed away, Picasso was widely regarded as one of the greatest artists of all time, at the time of his death Pablo Picasso's net worth was equal to \$530 million to \$1.3 billion today. Both were known to have suffered from bouts of depression.

Core's advice to anyone who wants to pursue painting is to trust themselves. Because according to him, if you trust yourself you will definitely be successful.

"Usually, I'm involved in drawing engagements during weekends. Normally I spend about two to three hours and most importantly I survive the day somehow balancing my studies and art. I prefer to draw using a black pen and rarely do I use paint. This is because it takes more time than doing it with the pen. At

first, I started drawing cartoons with the help of oil paints and then I wondered what was easier? Was it using paint? Or should I use the pen? Then I recalled the time I used to draw a single cartoon figure. Finally, I decided to use my black pen to draw such cartoons," explained Core.

Amongst his many interests is reading comic books and doing stunts. However, he has abandoned the latter as he broke his forearm doing a stunt.

"I never did art as a subject in school. My class teacher never knew about my talent for art because I never participated in art programs at school. My family obviously knew about my talent since I was a kid and they have been very supportive," said Core.


sion, with a lot of young blood and local talent coming up, and performing such quality music, that they have the talent even to perform at an international level.




