

The case filed against former Central Bank Governor Arjun Mahendran and nine others in connection with the first Central Bank Bond Scam that took place in February 2015 was yesterday postponed for June 7 in the face of prevailing COVID-19 situation.

The Permanent Trialat-Bar Bench comprising High Court Judges Champa Janaki Rajaratna, Damith Thotawatta and Namal Balalle decided to fix the case for June 7, adhering to the circular issued by Judicial Service Commission taking into consideration the present COVID-19 related situa-

tion. The Permanent Trial-at-Bar bench has already issued a warrant written in English through the Interpol for the arrest of former Central Bank Governor Arjun Mahendran who is currently evading Courts by residing overseas in connection with the Central Bank Bond Scam case. TO PAGE 02

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# COVID-19 recoveries top 100,000

The total number of COVID 19 positive patients detected in the country remained at 115,590 as at yesterday morning, the Epidemiology Unit of the Health Ministry

At present, 100,075 of them have recov-

ered while 14,795 are remain in hospitals. The Health Promotion Bureau (HPB) urged the people to avoid crowded places, closed spaces and close-contact settings to stop the spread of COVID 19.

The Bureau further urged people to continue to practice COVID-19 prevention

guidelines including handwashing, wearing masks, maintaining social distancing and avoiding crowded gatherings, and staying home if one experiences symptoms such as cold, cough, fever and sore throat.

The HPB has singled out indoor spaces with poor ventilation as potential infection

hotspots and conversations in close - contact settings could spread the virus through droplets.

"One of the most contagious and high risk areas for COVID-19 are crowded places. Because some people can be asymptomatic and may show mild to no symptoms, so it is difficult to detect the infection and prevent contracting.

At a time when COVID 19 is spreading rapidly across the country, be sure to avoid the above risk factors as much as possible for the safety of everyone," the Bureau urged.

# Alleged environmental pollution within Muthurajawela Sanctuary; Wildlife Dept. files report

The Wildlife Department in a report submitted to the Court of Appeal has revealed that many privately owned lands can be found within the Muthurajawela Sanctuary. The Wildlife Department submitted to the Court that filings of lands and waste disposal have taken place as this area has become more densely populated through illegal acquisition of lands.

In its report, the Wildlife Department has revealed a number of illegal constructions and filling of lands within the Muthurajawela Sanctuary and feared that this situation could bring adverse effects to both animal and human community as a whole. The Wildlife Department had

filed this report in connection with the writ petitions filed by Colombo Archbishop Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith and Centre for Environmental Justice.

According to the report, it includes an incident in which a village consisting of 15 houses (Kindigoda Village) had been constructed within the Muthurajawela Sanctuary.

The Wildlife Department further informed that Seeduwa-Katunayake Municipal Council is dumping garbage to a private land located within the Muthurajawela Sanctuary and a case had been filed in this regard at Negombo Magistrate's Court.

The Wildlife Department further said removal

Referring to a 700-acre land which brought attention to the society, the Wildlife Department said that a private owner is claiming his rights for the land. The report further revealed that a massive wall had been built in a private land located within Muthurajawela Sanctuary at Kindigoda area.

Meanwhile, taking into consideration the prevailing security situation, the Wildlife Rage Officer in Charge of Muthurajawela Sanctuary has highlighted the necessity of having an official firearm in order to discharge their duties.

The Court of Appeal two-judge-bench comprising Justice (President) Arjuna Obeysekera

and Justice Mayadunna Corea fixed two petitions for July 12.

In their petition, Centre for Environmental Justice and its Executive Director Withanage Don Hemantha Ranjith Sisira Kumara named Central Environmental Authority, Minister of Environment, Minister of Wild Life and Forest Conservation and nine others as respondents.

The petitioners are seeking an interim order directing the respondents to stay any further dumping of waste and the filling of lands within the Muthurajawela Sanctuary.

Filing this petition through counsel Ravindranath Dabare, the petitioners alleged that a land filling racket has been going on for years

mainly due to the fact that the said sanctuary is situated at a prime location, in the close vicinity to Port City, highway, other development projects and Colombo.

The Petitioners state that Muthurajawela and Negombo lagoon wetland complex is located 10 km North of Colombo in the Gampaha District, of the Western Prov-

A considerable number of health personnel, Divisional Secretaries, Police personnel, Grama Niladhari Officers and Military personnel are also infected with the virus leading to a problem of continuing public services in some areas.

In the meantime, the number of COVID-19 recoveries surpassed the mark of 100,000 yesterday as 922 more patients were discharged from hospitals after full recovery.

The total number of recoveries stood at 100,075 with yesterday's figures.

About 14,700 patients were still

receiving treatment at hospitals and intermediate care centres. As at 6pm yesterday 1,259 new

COVID-19 cases were reported increasing the total number of cases in the country to 116,849.

About 928,100 individuals had received the first dose of COVID-

19 vaccine and 140,700 frontline workers had also received the second dose as at yesterday.

Meanwhile, State

Minister of Production, Supply and Regulation of Pharmaceuticals (Prof.) Channa Jayasumana assured parliament yesterday that by December 31 this year 10.3 million of the population of the country would be vaccinated.

He also denied claims made by certain factions that Indians are being quarantined in Sri Lanka, adding that there are no Indians under any quarantine procedures in the country.

"We have a plan for the vaccination programme and we are working according to that plan. However, due to the situation in India we have faced certain difficulties in obtaining the vaccine supplies from India. By the end of the year, we will receive 13 million doses of the Russian Sputnik V vaccine for which we have already signed agreements," he said.

He also noted that 2,500 Chinese nationals in Sri Lanka have been given the Chinese Sinopharm vaccine and they have not shown any complications.

The National Cyber Security Index (NCSI) is a global index which measures the preparedness of countries to prevent cyber threats and manage cyber incidents.

Sri Lanka has secured the 69th place this year out of 160 countries. This is an improvement of 29 positions compared to last year.

"Accordingly, Sri Lanka has developed its capacity in Cyber security policy development, Education and professional development, fight against cybercrime and Military cyber operations capacities "the SLCERT said

tions capacities," the SLCERT said.

The above were the indications considered for the Index.

"Sri I salve is correctly in the area.

"Sri Lanka is currently in the process of implementing the Nation's first Information and Cyber security Strategy (2019-2023) and it is expected that the successful implementation of the Strategy will shoot up country's position not only in NCSI but also in all the other global Information Security related indexes," it added.

The Index report said that Sri Lanka had recorded the 83rd position when it comes to the Global Cyber security Index, 117th position in the ICT Development Index and the 63rd ranks in the Networked Readiness Index.

Greece recorded first place in the Index and South Sudan ranked the last. India recorded 37th place while the United States recorded the 16th place.

The DIG said Night Clubs, Gaming Centres and spas could not operate according to the health instructions issued on May 1.

Among the arrested are seven managers and 19 employees of such institutions.

The remaining 50 are those who visited those places in violation of quarantine regulations. The arrested persons were to be produced before the Magistrate Courts yesterday. The DIG said they would be dealt under the Quarantine Law and the Penal Code.

During the special operation conducted from 4 pm on Tuesday till 1 am on Wednesday, 47 nightclubs, 105



gaming centres, and 133 spas were inspected by the Police. The DIG also said that the Police on Tuesday arrested

another 173 persons for not wearing face masks and not maintaining social distance. He added that nine sus-

pects were arrested for illegal gambling in Welipenna and Kalutara North Police areas.

The Police have arrested a total of 5,248 people since October 30, 2020 for violating quarantine regulations.

"Everyone, every institution, and the public, should be mindful of the new guidelines. If they violate those, they could be charged under sections 4 and 5 of the Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance, and section 264 of the Penal Code," he commented.

The Police Spokesman also said that passengers in public transport buses should be limited to the seating capacity of those buses, and the motorcars and three-wheelers can only carry two passengers in addition to the driver according to the new guidelines.

"A Circular was issued by the Police Department on Tuesday to apprehend any driver, conductor, assistant, owner or a passenger who violates the above regulations. They will be dealt with under the law and the vehicle(s) will be taken into Police custody," the DIG said.

lence or imminent harm.

Misinformation at "Facebook: Keeping our Community Safe and
Informed" via Zoom yesterday morning.

"Facebook has built a strong partnership with Sri Lanka's Health Promotion Bureau (HPB) to help build capacity, raise awareness about COVID-19-related health measures and support the vaccine rollout".



She added that the company succeeded in launching a public health education campaign to tackle misinformation and will continue to direct people to the Health Promotion Bureau's website for latest information.

Budisatrjjo while stressing that the people should have access to credible information said misinformation around COVID- 19 and false claims related to vaccines will be removed from the platform.

"For example, if content in the Facebook suggests that COVID-19 vaccine causes autism or miscarriage, such content will be removed because the WHO has said that there is no scientific evidence to prove the claim," she said.

She said that the company is always gathering information from health authorities and the World Health Organization in particular when dealing with misinformation with COVID-19.

However Budisation

However, Budisatjjo emphasized information with regard to the efficacy of vaccines and experiences of those who were vaccinated based on their experience or evidence will not be removed.

"We know how essential it is for the people to have access to credible information and for us to

remove harmful content," she said. She also said that the users can always report, if their information is removed by Facebook or when they disagree with the decision made by Facebook.

We have three pillars of strategy: We don't want to remove all of them, we will not remove all, we will remove the content that could mislead the public in the context of COVID-19 pandemic.

She said that the company has a three pronged strategy to deal with misinformation on Facebook.

"We have a three-part strategy for addressing misinformation on Facebook - Remove, Reduce and Inform. A part of this strategy is our third party fact checking programme," she said.

**Bamboo and Kumbuk planting** project covering Mahaweli River Basin

# First ever MoU to be signed today

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for the first ever Bamboo and Kumbuk planting project in Sri Lanka covering the Mahaweli River Basin, the longest river in the country, will be signed today, the Environment Ministry said in a press release.

The Ministry has taken steps to name each river a "River Conservation Zone" for the protection of Sri Lanka's 103 rivers. Plans are afoot to plant bamboo (Bambusoideae) and Kumbuk (Terminalia Arjuna) saplings in the river basin.

The Mahaweli River, which originates at the sacred Samanala Mountain flows into the ocean from Trincomalee Bay. It is one of the highest natural resources in the river system like the Ganga river in

The total river basin of the Mahaweli River is 10,448 square kilometres. The largest irrigation projects and agricultural zones in the country are being implemented under the Mahaweli River Development Project. Under this, there are several major irrigation dams which include Victoria, Randenigala, Rantambe, Polgolla, Bowatenna, Kotmale and Moragahakanda. 

The miracle of "Shenzhen" inspired governments globally to find ways and means out of adverse situations that plague countries in terms of their economic performance, especially in the post-second world war era.

Shenzhen was well-regarded the world over as the most judicious and prudent way of experimenting with fundamental economic reforms the Chinese leaders wanted to introduce to the country's economic structure.

It was more of a litmus test of how market reforms such as liberalisation of the economy works within the global economic context.

The man behind the Shenzhen success story was Chairman Deng Xiaoping. The story of Shenzhen began in May 1980 and spread its wings rapidly across various parts of China, making dramatic and dynamic changes in that country's economic growth

There was a similar success story in respect of economic growth in our own country when President LR Javewardene strategically placed Sri Lank; in the global open market by introducing the Greater Colombo Economic Commission (GCEC) through a Parliamentary Act even before China embraced the market economy in a more phased out manner. Sri Lanka gradually lost its clout as a pioneering nation in the region to introduce market reforms, perhaps due to unforeseen and unknown reasons and internal political squabbles that led to economic instability.


At one stage former President Jiang Zemin, as a young engineer and a Vice Minister of China, visited Sri Lanka to study the pros and cons of a liberalised economy taking President Jayewardene's model as a case study before launching Shenzhen in 1980.

Former Foreign Secretary Bernard Goonetilleke who was assigned to Beijing as our ambassador had a personal tete-a-tete with Chairman Jiang Zemin when he presented his credentials some years ago. Goonetilleke had this interesting story to relate on Chairman Jiang's visit to Sri Lanka.

"I presented credentials as Ambassador of Sri Lanka to the People's Republic of China to President Jiang Zemin in early 2000 as the successor of Ambassador R.C.A. Vandergert. Usually, several newly appointed ambassadors present their credentials to the Head of State at the same time. The usual practice is that the Chinese President makes use of the opportunity to have a short discussion with the newly appointed ambassadors.

When the opportunity came for me to present my credentials to the President, he took approximately 40 minutes to engage in a discussion with me which was unusual. The intimate discussion demonstrated not only China's interest in Sri Lanka as a friendly nation but also his affection towards our country.

The backdrop to the discussion was twofold. The first was the security situation in Sri Lanka resulting from the separatist war which was quite intense around that time. He wanted to get an overall picture of the security situation and how the Security Forces were managing it, in particular who was

responsible for supporting the LTTE. His interest was justifiable on two counts. One was that China was among the few countries that were supporting Sri Lanka against the LTTE, supplying arms, ammunition and heavy artillery weapons to fight the guerrilla group. The second was that China itself was facing a similar security situation in the Xinjiang autonomous region which was getting intense at that time.

The second area of discussion related to Sri Lanka's experience with the open economy introduced by the Government of the late President J.R. Jayewardene. As you would recall, China itself was moving in the direction of an open market economy and welcoming foreign investments during the latter part of the 1970s. The new administration in Sri

Lanka wanted to open up the economy and sought the assistance of the UNDP to get it moving in a new direction. For this, in 1978, the Government sought the support of the UNDP and through it obtained consulting services from Shannon Free Airport Development Company Ltd. Phase I of the GCEC project started in June 1979 and lasted till April 1980 whereupon phase II started in mid-1982 and lasted till 1983. Phase III of the project started

in August 1984. Around this time young Jiang, with a degree in electrical engineering and having worked as an engineer in several factories, had become Vice Minister of the State Commission on Imports and Exports (1980) and become a member of the Central Committee of the Chinese Communist Party (1982)

During the conversation, President Jiang said that in the early 1980s China was looking for a suitable model to open up its economy and sought the help of the UN (I presume it was UNDP) and decided to dispatch a team of experts for a study. For this purpose, they had selected two countries viz. Malaysia, which already had an open economy and Sri Lanka, which was moving from a closed to a free market economy with the establishment of the GCEC assisted by the UNDP.

During the discussion, he said that the Chinese team first went to Malaysia and later visited Sri Lanka. He said that the Government accorded them with all facilities and the GCEC officials were very cordial and helpful and requested the Chinese team to ask any question they wished to ask. After a successful visit, the Chinese team had returned home.

As an afterthought, President Jiang inquired from me whether I knew who was in the Chinese delegation and who headed it. While I knew of the visit, I was not privy to the details of the visit and I told

him so. What followed was a burst of loud laughter and thumping of the chest by President Jiang, loudly saying "I", meaning that that delegation was led by none other than him.

While I do not recall when this visit had taken place, it would have taken place around 1980 or 1981, in between Phase I and Phase II of the GCEC project. The rise of the Chinese economy commenced with the opening up of foreign trade and investment and the implementation of free-market reforms in 1979 which coincides with the establishment of the GCEC. There was no looking back so far as China was concerned, returning a real annual Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth averaging 9.5 percent through 2018, a pace described by the World Bank as "the fastest sustained expansion by a major economy in history".

Not even President Jayewardene would have thought that the young Vice Minister would become the President of China at a later stage.

President Jayewardene by all means was acting contrary to the assertions of the closed economic concept of Prime Minister Sirimavo Bandaranaike and cracked open the economy to compete with external market forces.

He was aware of the intricacies that would crop up with controversial legislation where the Commission was empowered to amend or suspend certain laws stipulated in a Schedule of the Act.

President Jayewardene was mindful to enact the Greater Colombo Economic Commission (GCEC) Act when the 1972 first Republican Constitution was still in force and the National State Assembly, which was later replaced and named as the Sri Lanka Parliament under the constitutional reforms introduced by him in September 1978, was in existence.

The GCEC Act came into being in March 1978 under which Sri Lanka's first Special Economic Zone (SEZ) was established.

Through the 1978 Constitution, among other things, the then UNP Government in power added an entrenched provision which stipulates that the 'Sovereignty of the People' that included the legislative power of the people is exercised through Parliament. Article 3 of the 1978 Constitution makes the Sovereignty of the People inalienable and Parliament in that context is unable to abdicate its power of suspending or amending Acts of Parliament and delegating the legislative power to another institution. Therefore, where the Colombo Port City Economic Commission (CPCEC) Bill is concerned, the Government must take a fresh look at some of the provisions which would enable the Commission to exercise legislative power and which may fall outside its ambit. Legal experts are of the view that to make it workable, the Government may have to go before the people for approval unless it finds another way out to surmount this difficulty.

With the GCEC Act, President Jayewardene nevertheless circumvented a foreseeable difficult situation by passing it when the 1972 Constitution was in force. A two-thirds majority was sufficient to bring or introduce any reform necessary to make the GCEC workable. In the absence of the referendum clause linked to sovereignty in the Constitution, President Jayewardene fulfilled the required tenets of granting the Commission the power to make necessary amendments to the Parliamentary Acts specified in the Schedule. However, in the present context the Government has to exercise caution in dealing with this specific situation.

There are many arguments that it will be a separate entity and a pseudo-Chinese colony, but this argument does not hold any water.



# CEA to probe companies violating Gazette on plastic, polythene ban

**Environment Minister Mahinda** Amaraweera has instructed the Central Environmental Authority (CEA) to carry out immediate inspections on companies that have violated the Gazette Notification banning several products made of plastics and polythene. The Ministry has decided to take legal

action against companies that have violated the gazette notification issued on March 31 on disposable single-use plastics and polythene.

The CEA has received a complaint regarding a company that issued 24 gramme sachet packets to the market in violation of several matters mentioned in the Gazette Notification.

Since March 31, five polythene and plasticbased products, (without pharmaceuticals and food sachets) weighing less than 20 grammes, have been banned.

A discussion in this regard was held at the Ministry on Tuesday under the patronage of Minister Amaraweera. Ministry Secretary Dr. Anil Jasinghe, CEA Chairman S. Amarasinghe also participated.

The Minister instructed the CEA to immediately carry out inspections and enforce the law against companies violating regulations regarding the management of disposable plastic and polythene waste.

The Minister said that he was not ready to act as required by the multinational com-

The Minister also stated that it is the responsibility of all parties to implement the decisions taken by the Government for the environmental protection of the country.

"Many of the Opposition MPs raised their concerns regarding the monetary allocations done to fight the COVID-19 pandemic. As a Cabinet Minister, I can assure that the government has enough financial strength to purchase medical equipment, PCR test kits, vaccines, and other supplies needed to mitigate the pandemic; there is no shortage of money to buy vaccines. We initially purchased vaccines from India, but now India itself is facing a shortage. Therefore, it is not possible to purchase vaccines from India," he said.

"We have now opted for Russia, and the first stock is already in the country. We have received another stock

from China, but we have not gotten the necessary approval yet. Over 200 million people, including those in Middle-Eastern countries, have used this Chinese vaccine. Therefore, we should inquire as to why we are yet to receive the approval. Some people ask as to why the private sector is not allowed in the vaccination project," he

"The problem here is that countries do not provide vaccines to private companies. Moreover, the government does not have to charge people money to give this vaccine either. We have enough financial strength to carry out this project. Around 52 countries have not even started a vaccination project. At the initial stage of the third wave, there was a shortage of ICU beds.

However, this matter is now resolved," the minister said.

Minister Amaraweera said, "Many Opposition MPs request to lock down the country. However, when lockdown was imposed before, the Opposition was going around questioning that move as well. We should not politicise this matter. If any lockdown is needed, our health and defence authorities will reach that decision. If we go for a total lockdown, how can people sell their products? How will people purchase the necessary supplies?

"Countries that have faced the worst stages of the pandemic have not gone for total lockdowns. Therefore, it is obvious that the Opposition is looking forward to take advantage of the situation. The government shall

not hesitate to take crucial decisions to save the country from this pandemic, with or without the support of the Opposition. However, we strongly believe that the responsibility of an Opposition is to support the government when it is on the correct path," he added. 

# Respect the health measures

he Government is duty bound to probe the abrupt lifting of the lockdown clamped in the Piliyandala Police area on May Day, exposing its residents to the runaway pandemic. This is all the more serious since the Piliyandala area was highly congested during the recent Avurudu shopping spree, with a large number of positive cases emerging in the post-festive season.

Director General of Health Services Dr. Asela Gunawardena had received inputs of the situation in the area from provincial health authorities and acting on this advice decided to communicate with Army Commander General Shavendra Silva who heads the anti-COVID drive, to clamp the lockdown in the Piliyandala Police area, on May Day commencing at 6 a.m. However, a few hours later, the lockdown was lifted arbitrarily, endangering the whole area.

No doubt the intention of lifting the lockdown was permitting the people to go about the daily chores without let or hindrance particularly business activities that would suffer as a result of the lockdown or isolation. If this logic was to be applied across the board then it will be open sesame to give the welfare of their people pride of place ensuring that they will not be constrained in whatever way and particularly not making businesses suffer as a result of cumbersome lockdowns.

Will this also not give the public the license to do as they please, acting with disdain with regard to an authoritative Health Ministry edict? Why are the health authorities exhorting the public over the media to follow health guidelines and the police pouncing down on violators if lockdowns are lifted in an arbitrary manner? This at a time when the daily count of positive cases has topped the 1,000 mark for one week running and the cumulative death toll has exceeded 700. The Intensive Care Unit (ICU) bed capacity in hospitals is also fast running out and health staff driven to the wall.

What is the whole point in the authorities clamping lockdowns and imposing movement restrictions when such rash decisions are taken? The WHO has sounded the alarm over the surge in Sri Lanka with a warning that our public is likely to face their most challenging chapter and that vaccination alone will not help in the short term.

The lockdown in Piliyandala has obviously been imposed following a close study of virus trends in the area by health experts and PHIs and the risk of even one individual getting infected would be sufficient to trigger a domino effect that could spread over an entire electorate given the potency and virulent nature of the new variant. Acts such as these could lead to major catastrophes.

It is time that a line is drawn here. It is only the health authorities who should decide if a lockdown in a certain area is to be lifted or not. Others should not interfere. The country is paying dearly for going against health advice and giving a free rein to the public to celebrate the festive season, failing to learn the lessons of the past when partial lockdowns were lifted during the Christmas festivities only to see a huge surge in the pandemic. True, lockdowns and restrictions suffocate the lives of people and it is only natural that some decision makers take the side of the people in such instances and act to ease their misery. Difficulties such as poor access to essential goods, life in confined spaces etc. naturally evoke resentment and the wrath of the public is directed at the decision makers. Their intentions could be genuine, but the results could be disastrous.

Therefore, under the circumstances there is no alternative but to grin and bear. The situation in India is all too stark for even a semblance of a chance to be taken. This, we should know by now. In fact our decision makers should be seen in the vanguard in the fight against the pandemic and not be a party to the spread of the virus. In India it is such personalities who were largely responsible for the sorry pass that country has come to, holding mass election rallies and staging roadshows during the just concluded elections. Let it not be said that community and civic leaders in this country were to blame if a similar catastrophe were to befall this country, which certain health experts have not ruled out.

Regardless of stature, all must adhere to health guidelines. Partial lockdowns are imposed for the greatest good of the greatest number and they should be implemented to the letter and also respected to the letter. It is in everyone's interest to do so. No lives can be saved by going against a lockdown or the prevailing health guidelines. From wearing a face mask to complying with a strict lockdown, it is our duty to cooperate with the health authorities and the Security Forces/Police to keep the virus at bay. That is the only way to fight the raging contagion, at least until we manage to vaccinate around 65%-70% of the population and achieve herd immunity.

# An all-out battle against the Third Wave

'third wave' of the COVID-19 pandemic remains a threat to Sri Lanka this week as the number of infections continues to rise exponentially, even as the Government enacted a series of measures to avoid a catastrophe of epic proportions such as the tragedy presently unfolding in neighbouring India.

At the time of writing, over 1,900 infections were being recorded in a single day and all indications are that the daily number of infections would surpass 2,000 for the first time shortly. The total of number of persons infected in Sri Lanka now stands at 114,000 with 709 persons succumbing to the

This time last year, Sri Lanka was in a strict lockdown. That was after the first Coronavirus infection was detected in March last year. That lockdown helped curb the spread of infections spectacularly and the country was hailed as a model of managing the pandemic with limited resources.

The lockdown measures which were in place until late last year kept Sri Lankans safe from the coronavirus while countries with more advanced health systems such as the United Kingdom and the United States suffered thousands of deaths. However, it damaged the nation's economy consid-

More developed countries which enforced long term lockdowns were able to sustain their populations through benefits, subsidies and financial handouts to those who became unemployed as a result. Being a developing nation, Sri Lanka is not in a position to do so for a lengthy period of time.

That was why the Government decided that a long-term lockdown was not sustainable for a country such as Sri Lanka. President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has said that, given Sri Lanka's economic structure and its preponderance of daily wage earners, long-term lockdowns are not viable.

With the gradual re-opening of the country, a second wave emerged, initially in two clusters at a garment factory in Minuwangoda and at the wholesale fish market in Peliyagoda. While the second wave continued for several months, it did not reach the proportions seen in the current third

# **Challenging task**

Now, with the third wave of the virus very much established, the government has to perform the delicate act of balancing economic sustainability with the health needs of its population, a difficult and challenging task. This is what it is trying to do, but public cooperation is vital in this effort.

The warnings from health experts have been unequivocal. They believe the third wave of the pandemic is due to the British variant of the virus which is known as 'B.1.1.7'. The virulence of this particular type of the virus is much greater, resulting in a higher number of infections in a short time.

"The B.1.1.7 variant spreads much faster, causes more severe disease, causes re-infection in those who previously had infection and can escape vaccine induced immunity. Its transmission is 50 per cent higher than other variants," Prof. Neelika Malavige of the University of Sri Jayewarde-

"Several studies have also shown that the British variant of the virus may cause illness in younger individuals as well. As a result, they can be more susceptible to this variant than the 'original' coronavirus," Prof. Malavige cautioned, urging the public to practice social distancing whenever

The President of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) Dr. Padma Gunaratne echoed these thoughts. "When 1,800 plus COVID patients are detected daily, there are three to four times that number undetected in the community," Dr. Gunaratne said, noting that the health system is under

"As the number of COVID patients increases, the capacity in hospitals is gradually reduced. They have now almost reached their full capacity and consequently, some COVID-19 patients have to remain at home due to delays in taking them to hospitals," the SLMA President observed.

### **Workforce to remain** productive

The Government has responded with a series of measures. Although a countrywide national lockdown is not being enforced at this time, several restrictions are in place. This strategy is aimed at allowing the workforce to remain productive while at the same time minimising the spread of the pan-

These controls include a ban on all public functions and gatherings and restrictions imposed on selected localities such as Police divisions. Schools which were due to re-open on May 3, have been kept closed until further

notice. Travel in public transport is also subject to restrictions.

The Government aims to combat the virus by enhancing its vaccination drive against the Coronavirus. Health Minister Pavithra Wanniarachchi said it is planned to vaccinate over 60 per cent of the population by the end of the year. Currently about 900,000 persons have been vaccinated (first dose).

"The Government has ordered 13 million doses of Russia's Sputnik V vaccine of which 15,000 have already arrived. The balance will be received within this year in stages. Sri Lanka will also receive 8.4 million vaccine doses from the COVAX facility and five million Pfizer vaccine doses within this year," the Minister said.

Minister Wanniarachchi also said the Government was in discussion with India's Bharat Biotech (Covaxin) and Johnson & Johnson (single dose Janssen vaccine) to purchase more vaccines. China has agreed to provide Sri Lanka with more doses of Sinopharm vaccine, soon after World Health Organisation (WHO) grants its approval, the Minister said. This approval is expected as soon as next

Minister Wanniarachchi, who herself recovered from being infected with the coronavirus some time back, said that sufficient beds were being made available to treat COVID-19 patients islandwide. "About 13,800 beds have been allocated already and 10,000 additional beds would be allocated during the next two weeks," she said.

The minister also dispelled fears of a shortage of oxygen for hospitals as being seen in India. "The requirement for oxygen in our hospitals is 25 tonnes. It can be increased up to 80 tonnes. The issue is the shortage of cylinders. We have ordered 7,000 more jumbo cylinders," Minister Wanniarachchi noted.

Meanwhile, State Minister of Production, Supply and Regulations of Pharmaceuticals Prof. Channa Jayasumana has responded to speculation that pressure was being brought on the Government to use the Chinese manufactured Sinopharm vaccine in Sri Lanka. Minister Jayasumana has denied this. It has already been given to around 4,000 Chinese nationals residing in Sri Lanka, but it has not been given to Sri Lankans.

"As a responsible State Minister, I can assure you that there is no pressure

it. It is a safe vaccine as per the data we have," Minister Jayasumana said, noting it can be used when it is approved by the WHO for Emergency

# **Public health experts**

Minister Jayasumana also noted that none of the vaccine-related decisions was taken by politicians. "All the decisions were taken by medical experts including virologists, immunologists, physicians and public health experts. They have assessed all the available information," the Minister said.

Minister Jayasumana also defended the decision to open Sri Lanka's borders and the gradual lifting of the lockdown previously. "More than 30,000 people returned to Sri Lanka in April. We isolated and quarantined them. We did extensive PCR testing. We took every preventive measure," he

The Minister was also confident that a crisis such as that seen in India will not occur in Sri Lanka. "The Indian variant is double mutated and it has not been detected in Sri Lanka. There is also a difference between the two societies in terms of literacy rate and adherence to health practices," he said. State Minister of Primary Health

Services, Pandemics and COVID Prevention, Dr. Sudarshani Fernandopulle also addressed the issues related to vaccines in Parliament. Sri Lanka was

also exploring the possibility of combining different vaccines in the same person (Mix and Match option) to meet the current demand, she said.

Minister Fernandopulle acknowledged there was a shortage of 600,000 doses of the Oxford AstraZeneca Covishield vaccine to be given as a second dose. "There is nothing to hide. It is not related to the Government. The issue has arisen due to the manufacturer's (Serum Institute of India) inability to supply stocks to other countries," the Minister said.

"Research is in progress on the possibility of vaccinating for the second dose with another brand of vaccine for those who were vaccinated with Astra-Zeneca for the first dose. We cannot decide on that. However, based on the results of research, we may be able to do so," Minister Fernandopulle noted.

Health experts agree that Sri Lanka is also likely to see a further spike in COVID-19 infections in the month of May and possibly in June when the pandemic is expected to reach its peak. This could result in a rush of hospital admissions and the distinct possibility of more fatalities in the coming few

### **Selective lockdowns**

The Government is taking all possible measures such as increasing PCR testing to 20,000 per day, purchasing more vaccines, enhancing hospital bed numbers and enforcing selective lockdowns in a bid to curb the epidemic. However, the ultimate responsibility of adhering to these health measures lies with the general public, medical experts say.

Previously Sri Lanka has demonstrated that it is a highly health literate nation. Its free health system is a frequently cited model of care not only in South Asia but also internationally. These factors are in the country's favour as it gears to face the full brunt of the third wave of the pandemic.

The next few weeks will be extremely critical for the health of the nation and its citizens as Sri Lanka faces arguably its greatest health crisis since the malaria epidemic in 1935 which cost some 80,000 lives (Today, the country has eliminated malaria). The country waits both in hope and in trepidation for these weeks to pass.

# **Australians blast Government for** "racist" Indian flight ban

controversial ban on flights from COVID-hit India landing in Australia, has blocked around 9,000 Australians from returning home. Most of them are Australians of Indian origin, while there are also a handful of Australian elite cricketers, coaches, and other officials currently taking part in the Indian Premier League (IPL) cricket extravaganza.

This unprecedented move of banning its own citizens from returning home has angered many Australians, who have also branded this move by Prime Minister Scott Morrison's Government as "racist" because no such bans were imposed on flights from the UK and US during the peak of the pandemic there.

The ban came into effect on May 3 and will be in force at least until May 15. Those who ignore the ban and come to Australia through other routes such as via Doha, face a fiveyear jail sentence or a fine of AUD 66,600 (USD 51,500).

Prime Minister Morrison said in a radio interview on May 3 that the ban is only a temporary measure, and it is to "ensure that we don't get a third wave here in Australia and that our quarantine system could remain

While supporting the travel ban, Australia's Chief Medical Officer (CMO) Paul Kelly has admitted that these restrictions may result in the death of some Australians who are stranded in India. These comments have attracted fierce criticisms from Australians from both sides of the political spectrum.

Former Immigration Minister Amanda Vanstone from Morrison's own Liberal Party speaking on ABC TV's Drum on May 3 defended the Government arguing it is not a racist policy. "It's not a ban on people of Indian origin", she argued, pointing out that Australians currently in India, went on their own accord. "Australians will not forgive them if they bring the virus back. They have no right to bring virus here.'

### Western allies

But, disability advocate, Nicole Lee appearing on the same programme pointed out to Vanstone, "we didn't

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stop our citizens from the UK and the US coming back (at the peak of the pandemic there) and spreading the virus here—and they did. Now we are blocking the lifting of patents on vaccines". This is a reference to Australia supporting its Western allies at the WTO in blocking the Indian and South African resolution to lift patents on COVID-19 vaccines.

Fellow panelist, Pawan Luthra, CEO of India Link Media Group, pointed out that when Indians like himself took up Australian citizenship they had to renounce Indian citizenship. He argued this is a morality issue and "we have no rights to live in India as citizens" and Australia is their home now. He pointed out that in the Australian passport it says in its first page to other governments "to allow the bearer, an Australian citizen, to pass freely without let or hindrance and to afford him or her every assistance and protection of which he or she may stand in need".

### **Human rights**

The Australian Human Rights Commission has issued a statement saying the decision to use the Bio-security Act to impose a temporary ban on citizens returning home "raises serious human rights concerns". In a statement, it said, "the need for such restrictions should be publicly justified (and) the Government must show that these measures are not discriminatory".

Dr. Kylie Moore Gilbert, an Australian who was held in an Iranian jail for two years and released late last year said in a Tweet: "I know what it means to be rescued from a COVIDriddled overseas hellhole and brought back to Australia (yes into quaran-"Protection is what Australians in tine). This outrageous policy is



Foreign Minister Marise Payne rejects such accusations. She said that the "temporary" ban was put in place because of high rates of infections among Australians returning from India, and arguing it was placing a "significant burden" on the quarantine system.

The Australian Guardian has refuted this claim, pointing out that India has far fewer cases per capita than the UK and US at their peak in December last year, and the Australian Government did not stop flights from there at the time. It also noted that the variant found in India is not as serious as the one that came out from the UK into Australia.

"The UK and US were responsible for a greater share of the overseas

acquired cases in Australia at the height of their outbreaks," said Guardian Australia, adding, "significantly more residents returned from the UK and US in the three months to January than from India."

Melbourne General Practitioner and health commentator Vyom Sharma told ABC TV that the move appears inconsistent with Australia's response to peaks of the virus in the US and Europe. "What strikes me as bizarre is that the US in January was returning to us Australians, in much higher quantities of people, who were testing positive, yet there was no talk of a plan to ban those flights then."

Former Australian cricketer Michael Slater, who was commentating in India for the IPL savaged Mor-

rison for banning Australians from returning to their homeland from India, saying he will have "blood on his hands". In a social media post, Slater, who has been blocked from returning to Australia and threatened with a jail sentence said: "How dare you treat us like this? How about you sort out (your) quarantine system? I had Government permission to work on the IPL but I now have government neglect. It's a disgrace".

Responding to Slater's comments in a TV interview today, Morrison argued that the rapid escalation of cases arriving from India has put enormous pressure on the quarantine regime but denied it showed the system's weakness. "Every system is going to face its stresses and I'm not going to break the system," Morrison said. "What I'm going to do is take proportionate action to protect the system so I can bring more Australians home and keep Australians safe for the longer term."

Slater meanwhile has gone to the Maldives, to spend time there until Australia lifts the ban on those flying back from India. He may be able to fly back to Australia in 14 days' time, with a negative PCR test for COVID-19. Meanwhile, there are 9,000 other Australians in India waiting to return home, with about 650 of them considered vulnerable according to the Government's own estimates.

### **Quarantine facilities**

With Morrison trying to tone down his rhetoric to jail or fine returning Australians, former Labour Party leader Bill Shorten told Channel Nine TV that what Slater is saying is what a lot of people in Australia are thinking. "Morrison should have created special quarantine facilities here. He's had 16 months. Michael Slater is just telling the truth," Shorten told Nine Network.

Meanwhile Amnesty International (AI) has slammed the Morrison Government for the treatment of stranded Australians in India. "It's not just breaching human rights, but, it is just an utter disregard and contempt for the way they are working with stranded Australians," AI's Australian spokesman Joel MacKay said in a media interview over the weekend.

# Central Asia's Afghan route to prosperity

or the first time in centuries, there is an opportunity to connect Central and South Asia via modern transport and energy corridors through Afghanistan. Once completed, these projects would transform Eurasian security, significantly increase regional economic activity, and potentially bring peace at last to Afghanistan. They may even revive the Great Silk Road.

Progress on the planned schemes should therefore interest the region's influential neighbours — Russia, China, and India and the United States, which has spent at least US\$ 2 trillion in Afghanistan over the last 20 years. But most of the world regards Central Asia as terra incognita, and has so far paid little attention to significant recent developments.

In February, for example, Uzbek Foreign Minister Abdulaziz Kamilov visited three Central Asian countries — Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan, and Tajikistan — to secure their support for transport projects with Afghanistan and South Asian countries. Kamilov was travelling at the behest of Uzbek President Shavkat Mirziyoyev, who, in his December 29 message to the country's Parliament, highlighted cooperation with South Asia and promotion of peace in Afghanistan as his main regional priorities.

Specifically, the talks were about construction of the Kabul Corridor railway from Termez in Uzbekistan to the Pakistani city of Peshawar via Mazar-i-Sharif and Kabul in Afghanistan. The railway could transport up to 20 million tons of cargo per year, and the section from Termez to Mazar-i-Sharif, built by Uzbekistan, is already operational. The remaining 573-kilometre (356-mile) stretch to Peshawar will have to cross the Hindu Kush mountain range, where the passes are more than 3,500 metres above sea level, making it one of the world's highest mountain railways.

### International financial institutions

The section of the railway from Mazar-i-Sharif to Kabul, at a preliminary estimated cost of US\$ 5 billion, will be built mainly with borrowed funds. In late December, Uzbekistan, Afghanistan, and Pakistan jointly appealed to international financial institutions to support the project. Subject to financing, construction could begin in September

The existing highway between Mazar-i-

Sharif and Kabul will ensure the delivery of equipment and construction materials, while Uzbekistan and Tajikistan's power lines to the Afghan capital run along the same route, making it possible to electrify the rail link.

In Peshawar, the railway will connect arriving trains with the Pakistani transport system, thereby linking the Central Asian and Eurasian railway networks to those of South Asia and providing access to the Pakistani ports of Karachi, Qasim, and Gwadar. It is estimated that the new railway will reduce goods transportation times from Central Asia to Pakistan from 30 days to 15 and cut transportation costs by 30% to 35%.

The apparent reason for giving access to

Pakistani ports priority over other options is that the Mazar-i-Sharif-Kabul-Peshawar route is the shortest one. But there is a more important one: the Kabul Corridor, together with the China-Kyrgyzstan-Uzbekistan transport corridor, will connect four economically powerful Eurasian regions — Europe, China, Russia, and South Asia — via Central Asia.

Today, the main transport route from Central Asia to the southern seas, through the Iranian port of Bandar Abbas, is no longer considered the most attractive. Economists calculate that transporting a container from Tashkent, the Uzbek capital, to Karachi would cost approximately US\$ 1,400-1,600, about half the price of transporting it from Tashkent

to Bandar Abbas (US\$ 2,600-3,000). Besides, international economic sanctions against Iran will complicate any projects

At the end of 2020, construction began on the Afghan section of another mega-project linking Central and South Asia: the TAPI gas pipeline, named after the four countries through which it will pass — Turkmenistan, Afghanistan, Pakistan, and India. The 1,814-kilometre pipeline will run from the Galkynysh gas field in Turkmenistan to the Indian city of Fazilka via Herat and Kandahar in Afghanistan and the Pakistani cities of Quetta and Multan. It will have a capacity of 33 billion cubic metres of gas per year and cost an estimated US\$ 8 billion to US\$ 10

Although security concerns have long cast doubt on the TAPI pipeline's viability, completion is now scheduled for December 2023. Crucially, a high-ranking Taliban delegation visited Turkmenistan on February 6, promising to support the project. There are indications that the U.S., which has long backed the pipeline, may have facilitated the trip.

# **Geopolitical positions**

Central Asia has always been a politically sensitive region, part of what former U.S. National Security Adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski called the "grand chessboard." When implementing such large projects, therefore, one should consider the geopolitical positions of major regional players such as America, Russia, and China.

But for now at least, it appears that everyone has an interest in Central Asia and Afghanistan being economically dynamic and politically stable, rather than poor and a source of conflict.

For all the importance of new landmark projects, further Central Asian cooperation is essential. Historically, the region has prospered most when it acts as a "crossroads civilization," channeling and transforming Eurasian trade and economic and cultural

In fact, Central Asia became a world leader in economic development, trade, technology, manufacturing, and intellectual life during the period referred to as its golden age, when it was open, dynamic, and willing and able to learn and adapt from oth-

There is no reason why Central Asia cannot succeed again. Practicing a form of open regionalism, Central Asians found many reasons to cooperate over several centuries. A return to that role would be good news for the entire world — and deserving of its leaders' attention.

# How China Eradicated Extreme Poverty

hina's experience in poverty alleviation indicates that poverty is not predestined, nor is it unconquerable. With strong will and determination, as well as practical action, one can make steady progress towards overcoming poverty and realising common prosperity. I would like to focus on the practices of China in reducing poverty and try to sum up a few experiences for Sri Lankan friends.

### I. Key Strategy of Targeted Poverty Alleviation

Identifying those truly in need is a universal problem in countries with a large population in poverty. In its poverty elimination effort, China has actively learned from international experience, fully considered its actual conditions, and launched a series of guidelines and measures to increase efficiency, summarised as accomplishing "Targeted Efforts in Six Areas" (This refers to efforts to identify the poor accurately, arrange targeted programmes, utilise capital efficiently, take household-based measures, dispatch first Party secretaries based on village conditions, and achieve the set goals.), taking "Five Measures for Poverty Eradication" (The measures include: boosting the economy to provide more job opportunities, relocating poor people from inhospitable areas, compensating for economic losses associated with reducing ecological damage, improving education in impoverished areas, and providing subsistence allowances for those unable to shake off poverty through their own efforts alone.), and addressing "Five Questions in Poverty Alleviation" (This refers to these questions: who should help, who should be helped, how to help, how to evaluate whether someone has emerged from poverty, and how to ensure those people stay free from pover-

Firstly, identifying people in need to know whom to help. China has developed a set of standards and procedures to accurately identify the poor. Grassroots officials have spent time in villages analysing the distribution of the poor population, the causes of their poverty, and their needs. The individuals and villages confirmed as poor are then registered and a file is created in the national poverty alleviation information system. Every poor household has the causes of their poverty and their needs registered with the government. With dynamic management, the national information platform provides powerful IT support for targeted measures to realise the set

goals. Secondly, strengthening lead-

ership and team-building to know how to offer help. China has established a poverty eradication management network with the central government acting as coordinator, provincial governments taking overall responsibility, and city and county governments overseeing implementation, and has strengthened its team of grassroots officials working in poverty alleviation. As of the end of 2020, 255,000 resident teams and more than three million officials had been dispatched as first secretaries and resident officials to poor villages, fighting on the front line of poverty alleviation.

Thirdly, applying targeted measures for different groups to know how to help. In practice, China has adopted categorised "Five Measures for Poverty Eradication" to reduce poverty, based on the situation of individual households, local conditions, and the causes for and types of poverty. China has also implemented many other forms of support

counties, villages, and individuals. The government has worked out a poverty deregistration plan and an annual poverty alleviation plan to ensure procedure-based, rational and orderly exit from the registers. The criteria and procedures have been strictly enforced, for example, by conducting a public review in the case of individuals and government examination in the case of villages and counties, and the results of poverty exit have been disclosed for public evaluation and review. Supervision and inspection have been strengthened to ensure accurate

Fifthly, conducting follow-up monitoring to help people stay out of poverty. Counties have been given a five-year period of grace from the day they emerged from poverty. During this period, they will continue to enjoy the main support policies, which will be adjusted and optimised by category. China will improve its dynamic monitoring of any trends indicating a return to poverty, and improve associated support measures so that these people do not fall back into poverty. Efforts will be intensified to help those who have emerged from poverty build up self-belief and have access to education, so that they can create a better life through their own hard work.

### II.Exploring a New Path of Poverty Alleviation

Countries subject to different national conditions and at different stages of development adopt different poverty reduction criteria, methods and approaches. Bearing in mind its prevailing reality and understanding the nature of poverty and the status of poverty alleviation, China has embarked on a path of poverty alleviation and designed an approach with Chinese characteristics. At the same time, China has accumulated some valuable experience that might offer enlightenment to the international community in their battle to reduce

Firstly, sticking to people-centred philosophy. The problem of poverty, in essence, is how the people should be treated: the people-centred philosophy is the fundamental driving force behind this cause. Only with this philosophy, can a country identify those who are poor, adopt concrete measures, and deliver genuine outcomes; only with this philosophy, can it draw on inexhaustible motivation, set a clear direction, and find the right approach.

Secondly, highlighting poverty alleviation as top agenda of governance. Poor conditions for development in impoverished areas and a lack of capacity for self-improvement among the poor population determine that poverty cannot be eliminated by relying solely on the efforts of individuals, local governments, or non-governmental forces. Poverty elimination must be taken on as a responsibility of the ruling party and the country; it requires will and action at national level, and it must be elevated to a national strategy. It is of utmost importance that the leadership have devotion, strong will and determination, and the ruling party and government assume their responsibilities to the people, play a leading role, mobi-

lise forces from all quarters, and ensure policies are consistent and

Thirdly, eradicating poverty through development. The root cause of poverty is inadequate development. Development is the most effective way to eradicate poverty. Only development can lead to economic growth, social progress and higher living standards. Only development can better guarantee people's basic rights and meet their desire for a better life.

Fourthly, pressing ahead with poverty alleviation based on reality. The occurrence and evolution of poverty has its own features and trends. To achieve success in reducing poverty, a country must follow a path in line with its national conditions, identify and remove obstacles to poverty allevi-

ation, find driving forces for this cause, and constantly adjust and reform its strategies and policies as circumstances and local con-

ditions change. Fifthly, letting the poor play the principal role. Poverty alleviation requires both external and internal forces to form a synergy by enhancing their ability to participate in development, share the fruits of development, and achieve endogenous development. 

Terry added some humour and asked if we can translate this in English to imply as the bun of wisdom. There were doughnuts and soft sponge cake as well. Every evening my mind was subject to some serious decision making, as I decided which

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in a folded leaf), kalu dodol (the prince among Southern sweets), lavaria (string hoppers steamed with coconut and oozing with caramelized sugar). Another delight that would not be known by children of this digital generation, is called "wandu appa" which is a local variant to a muffin, steamed in a leaf. The type of leaf remains a mystery to me even after three

Modestly taking the third slot on our topic was an old man, perhaps of Indian origin. As a child I gazed at him as a captivating magician, not fully understanding his culinary skills. He accentuated his image by wearing a cloth turban. He used to push a steel cart with wheels, after sunset. The cart had a burning lamp. The cart was modified to hold a kerosene oil stove (a safety hazard by today's standards). When stopped the mobile cook would take stacks of kneaded rotti and heat it on the stove using a black iron skillet. He also sold boiled gram garnished with fiery red chillies, which was relished by some retired seniors who would attain realms of joy, aided by their distilled delights under the branches of a massive tree. In a way, the rotti cart was an 'action station' that brought the older folk for an extended pre-dinner chat.

On the weekends there was a short soul who sold his alluring "Bombay mittai". I think the origins of this sweet candy has its roots in India. Again, this worthy enticed us by ringing a small brass bell. The strands of finely shredded cotton candy were wrapped in newspaper or between two soft thin wafers. My

mother used to warn me that this man's fingernails were not that clean. However, the innocent desires of childhood often yield fully to such temptations. Many of these vendors walked about ringing their bells. Even tourists ate from them. Another vendor who came also pushed a cart. His signature dish was the godamba rotti, which he made with effortless dexterity. Again this item went well with any curry, including tempered potatoes dusted with chilli flakes. I recall another old woman coming down the lane once in a while. She used to sell achcharu. This complex combination had boiled olives (veralu), chopped green mangoes and ambarella. Today this combination is sold by some vendors at Galle Face Green.

It rained incessantly that night. The wheels of time kept turning. As the years rolled by our choices for tea were redirected towards other forms of food. I never counted my calories. The services of the bakery did adapt as they sent a tricycle with a large red plastic box. We did patronize this, but somehow the young rider did not have the aura or sales competency of our beloved old baker, who probably retired afflicted with varicose veins after all those years of walking. The vendors of that era always engaged in humour filled carefree conversation. They did not mind the heat of the evening. Somehow, they mildly influenced our childhood with splendid memories. Today I have had all sorts of cuisine, including high tea. Every form of cuisine is indeed a reflection of its present timeline. In retrospect, as we travelled life's highway these vintage vendors came along and made our journey enchanting, even as they faded into the sunset.



# The number of COVID-19 **COVID** disaster in India 'could well happen in other countries,' warns UK scientist

The COVID disaster in India "could well happen in other countries," a top UK scientist has warned.

India's infection rates have skyrocketed since February with the official coronavirus infection count surpassing 20 million on Tuesday after the health ministry reported 357,229 new cases.

The true number of cases is far higher due to limited test-

COVID-19 deaths have also risen at an alarming speed with the country reporting 3,449 deaths on Tuesday, bringing the total toll to more than 220,000 - although the true

figures are believed to be considerably higher.

The crisis in India has seen oxygen supplies depleted, hospitals overwhelmed and mass cremations unfold as bodies pile up.

Dr Adam Kucharski, an epidemiologist at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, has warned that the situation in India could be seen in other countries if the world doesn't adopt a "global view"

on vaccines. He told BBC Radio 4's World at One programme: "Unfortunately we could well see the situation in India unfold elsewhere because we have a num-



tries. Kucharski said that a "massive concern" is the limited capacity of healthcare because even just a small outbreak can put "huge stress on their systems." "I think really we need

to be thinking proactively about how to avoid these situations emerging in other places," he added. Kucharski said the world

needs to be thinking about vaccine equitability to avoid a situation where there are "rich countries selectively choosing vaccines or vaccinating younger groups while humanitarian crises are unfolding in other

He said: "We can have vaccines that are working well domestically, but if you have variants emerging globally that's going to be an ongoing threat.'

His warning comes after repeated pleas from the World Health Organization (WHO), who have urged wealthier countries to share their vaccines with poorer countries.

Dr Soumya Swaminathan, WHO's chief scientist, last week warned that the outbreak in India is a global crisis.

# **Indian Government introduces** new rules for COVID testing

The Indian Government has revised the country's coronavirus-testing rules to reduce pressure on diagnostic labs amid a spurt of coronavirus cases. "Healthy" inter-state travellers and COVID patients being discharged from hospitals after recovery must not be tested, it said.

The centre said the over 2,500 labs in the country are working under tremendous pressure because of the rapidly growing caseloads.

"The need for RT-PCR test in healthy individuals undertaking inter-state domestic travel may be completely removed to reduce the load on laboratories," the centre said in a circular to states.

'No testing is required for COVID-19-recovered individuals at the time of hospital discharge," it added.

The centre said people who tested positive once - either by rapid tests or the gold standard RT-PCR - must not be tested again. Non-essential travel of peo-

ple with COVID symptoms should be avoided to reduce the risk of infection, the government added.

All asymptomatic individuals undertaking essential travel must follow Covid-appropriate behaviour.

India has been reporting over 3 lakh daily coronavirus cases for over a week. On Tuesday, the country's singleday Covid numbers were 3.35 lakh cases and 3,449 deaths in 24 hours.

Several badly affected states have reported shortages of medical oxygen, life-saving drugs and hospital beds.

India's Central Bank released \$6.7 billion in cheap financing for vaccine makers, hospitals and other health firms on Wednesday, to counter the devastating coronavirus surge gripping the coun-

Reserve Bank of India Governor Shaktikanta Das said cheap loans would be available until March 31 next year, and vowed to deploy "unconventional" measures if the crisis worsens.

He spoke as India announced a record 3,780

"If you take the nation as a whole, our prediction is that we may see a decline coming by the end of this week, which is by about May 7. Cases should start declining, but different states will peak at different times. India could see the peak of the second wave huge relief for the country to cross the national peak of the second wave by this weekend.

'We take the seven-day rolling average because the daily numbers keep fluctuating. As a result, we should not just look at the raw numbers but also at a daily moving average. That number will begin to decline by the end of the present week," Prof. Vidyasagar said.

Speaking about the situation in various states and the trend therein, Prof Vidyasagar explained that different states would attain their peak at different times, and see a decline in their cases, as is currently being seen in the case of Maharashtra.

rashtra. States that are located far away from Maharashtra will see a slow peak and the decline will be slower. States that are closer to Maharashtra will attain their peaks soon and their graph will start declining sooner," he

Asked if there could be states that would reach their peaks after May, Prof Vidyasagar said that's unlikely.

"We are expecting the all-India total to peak by this week. Maximum by another 10-15 days, we expect every Indian state to peak and begin a downturn. There could be outliers as well. But by and large, that is what we expect,"

curves of the first and second wave, one would find that in the first wave the rise in cases was very gentle.

"It took about 3.5 months to reach the peak and the drop was equally gentle. In the second wave, on April 1 we had 75,000 cases and exactly a month later, we breached the 4-lakh mark. We expect that the decline will be more or less as rapid as the rise was. The nationwide caseload by the end of May should be something around 1.2 lakh per day.'

### **EXPERTS DIFFER ON 2nd WAVE PEAK ANALYSIS**

Prof Gautam Menon, Prof of Biology at Ashoka University, on the other hand, anticipates the peak will come towards the second week of May or around mid-May.

Dr Ashish Jha, Dean at the Brown University School of Public Health, disagrees with Prof Vidyasagar's idea that the number of cases will drop as quickly as they rose in the second wave in India.

"That depends on policy. If the policy is effective in bringing cases to control, then they could decline quickly. If it is not, then the experience of many countries is that you peak, but very slowly meander down which could take months. I am not confident that we could see a dramatic decline in cases. We may end up being at a very high peak for a long period of time," he said.

"The second wave basically started in Maha- he said. Prof Vidyasagar said if one compares ond wave would depend on how well we do in regard to testing and vaccination, along with preventing further spread of the virus.

"My take is that it is going to take through the month of May. Probably through a large part of June. We could end up getting into July too. Sometime in June, we could get into the figure of 1 lakh cases per day," he said.

### **PROJECTION OF A POTENTIAL 3rd WAVE**

While India is still grappling with the second COVID-19 wave, there have been concerns about the possibility of a third wave hitting the country.

Prof Vidyasagar said even though in the second wave a large number of people tested positive for Covid-19, there could be those who were infected and were asymptomatic, but have not been tested.

"These are the people who are going to remain immune for at least six months. They will begin to lose immunity towards the end of that period. So, that is when we need to have our vaccination programme well-under-

Even if they begin to lose their immunity, they should not remain susceptible to catch the virus. If we vaccinate a substantial part of the at-risk population in about six months, then the third wave could end up being a third bump instead of the horrific wave that we are seeing at present," he said.

# More people diagnosed with COVID-19 in past two weeks than in first 6 months of pandemic - WHO

As Americans continue to take steps toward normal life, India and several other countries are dealing with an explosion of new coronavirus infections likely to delay the world's recovery from the deadly crisis, health authorities warned Mon-

The number of COVID-19 cases reported around the world in the last two weeks was higher than the total of confirmed infections in the first six months of the pandemic, according to the World Health Organization. India and Brazil, which are going through their worst days since the pandemic began, account for more than half of last week's cases, the agency

director-general, Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, said many other countries also face "a very fragile situation" and are running out of basic hospital supplies.

"What is happening in India and Brazil could happen elsewhere unless we all take these public health precautions that WHO has been calling for since the beginning of the pandem-

ic," he told reporters during a news briefing in Geneva.

Ghebreyesus said vaccines are "part of the answer," but he called on the world's richest countries to lead a global effort to help nations with limited vaccine supplies.

"We face a shared threat that we can only overcome with shared solutions," he said. "Sharing financial resources, sharing vaccine doses and production capacity and sharing technology, know-how and waiving intellectual property."

# COVID cases at Everest base camp raise fears of serious outbreak

**NEPAL:** Mountaineers and authorities at Everest base camp in Nepal have told the BBC they are seeing rising numbers of climbers with Covid-19 symptoms and rising numbers of positive tests, raising fears of a serious outbreak.

Base camp officials said they had received reports of 17 confirmed cases from hospitals in the capital Kathmandu, where a number of climbers have been sent from the base camp and higher camps to be

And staff at a private hospital in Kathmandu, the CIWEC clinic, confirmed to the BBC that patients had tested positive for coronavirus after arriving from Everest base camp.

The Nepalese government has so far denied having any knowledge of positive cases at Everest base camp, raising concerns that officials are downplaying the extent of the situation out of

Foreign climbers are a major source of revenue for the Nepalese government, which shut Everest last year during the

pandemic. Authorities are mandating that visiting climbers quarantine in Nepal before proceeding to base camp, but concerns have been raised within the climbing community that a serious outbreak at the mountain would be devastating.

The number of coronavirus Nepal in recent weeks, and the

country has the highest rate of infection among the countries neighbouring India, where a second wave has sparked a full-blown crisis.

Officials from Nepal's Department of Tourism, which directly oversees expeditions, could not be reached for comment, but Prem Subedi, the under-secretary at Nepal's Ministry of Culture, Tourism and Civil Aviation, told the BBC the ministry was not aware of any coronavirus cases at base camp.

"None of the Covid cases at Everest base camp have been reported so far to the Ministry of Tourism,"

The Himalayan Rescue Association, which runs a governmentauthorised medical clinic at the base camp, told the BBC it had received confirmation of positive cases in some climbers flown out to Kathmandu by expedition teams.

'We have just received from Kathmandu confirmation of 17 positive cases [in climbers flown out of Everest]," said Lhakpa Nuru Sherpa, an official with the Himalayan Rescue Association.

'We have now asked expedition teams to first let us know before they fly out their members [to Kathmandu] who fall ill so that we know what is going on," he said.

Lhakpa Nuru Sherpa's colleague at the Everest base camp clinic, Dr Prakash Kharel, said the number of people showing coronavirus-like symptoms, such as a persistent cough and fever, was rising daily.

# Fear pervades Mexico City metro after deadly crash

**MEXICO:** Commuters riding Mexico City's metro just a day after one of its worst ever accidents said they worried for their safety but had little choice other than to use the network.

"We were already afraid when traveling, but now even more so," said 30-year-old Brenda Gonzalez.

"They say they do maintenance, but it doesn't seems like it to me. They steal the five pesos (\$0.24) that we pay" per trip, she added indignantly at the Candelaria station near the historic district.

The shoe factory worker said she was shocked by the images of rescuers trying to free people from the train carriages left hanging from an overpass on Monday night.

"Everything happens to this metro, but there's no other choice," she said. Line 12 of the metro where the accident struck had already suffered problems in the design, operation and maintenance of the tracks, according to a 2014 study commissioned by the city mayor's office.

The wider network has also been plagued by safety issues. In March 2020, two subway trains collided in Mexico City, leaving one dead and around 40 injured as panicked passengers fled through thick smoke.

In January of this year, one person died and 29 suffered smoke inhalation injuries in a fire in the metro's control center. Standing next to a window of a carriage on Line 4, which is also elevated in some sections, 42-year-old security guard Fernando Dominguez said he too feared an accident.

"I've used this same line to go to work for more than 10 years and I've never seen anyone doing maintenance

on anything," he said. "And right in this section everything shakes as if it's going to fall," he added, sweating forming on his brow.

The other passengers on the same metro train with Fernando were silent and exchanged nervous glances when the train braked gently.

"It's one thing taking the metro down below, but when it comes up here after what happened yesterday it scares you more," said Agustin Suarez, a 70-year-old retired accountant.

Almost 80 people were hospitalized after Monday's accident, including

28-year-old Daniel Hernandez, who was admitted to the Belisario Dominguez Hospital in the east of the city near the scene of the disaster.

"He's in a very delicate condition. They operated on him at night," said his uncle, Jorge Hernandez.

'The blood went to his lungs -- that's what they told my sister," he said.

His nephew was transferred by helicopter to another hospital and the family was waiting for more information about his condition, the uncle said. At the Tlahuac General Hospital, a couple was looking for their neighbor who was feared to have been crushed in his car when the concrete columns collapsed.

"We don't know if he's dead or alive. His stepfather told us that he had already died, but a reporter filmed a video where he is trapped and asks for

help," Jose Luis Vigil told AFP. "The car is still under the column. We know that she (the wife) is alive," he added. The metro is the main means of public transport in Mexico City and the surrounding suburbs home to 20 million people -- and complaints about its lack of maintenance have been common among users for

Chauvin, who was captured on video kneeling on Mr Floyd's neck for more than nine minutes, was found guilty of murder and manslaughter.

His lawyer says his client was deprived of a fair trial.

# Landmark tree in Sammanthurai cut down

A tree which was described as a landmark in Sammanthurai was cut down on Tuesday by the relevant authorities under Police protection due to protests by the people.

It was brought to the notice of the Sammanthurai Divisional Secretary that the tree has begun to lean towards residents' houses and was in danger of falling on them at any time if there is strong wind. It was suspected that its roots had begun to rot in a number of places. Hence, the relevant authorities took action after inspection and to cut the tree on an earlier occasion. The history of this tree was that it was planted by a popular personality of that era, Meeralebbe Podi Vanniar popularly known to the people as Neerpatcha Vanniar somewhere during the 1870's after his marriage in Sammanthurai. This Vanniar was from Ninthavur and his father too was a Vanniayar. He was the one and only Neerpacha (Irrigation) Vanniar appointed by the British Government and was in charge of all irrigation matters in this very large area. The age of this large tree is estimated at around 150 years.

This tree was planted in a junction and to this day this junction is known as Poomarathadi Junction.

# **MONLAR** appreciates **Cabinet Decision to ban** chemical fertiliser

Land and Agricultural Reforms (MONLAR) appreciates the Cabinet Decision to ban chemical fertilisers and has requested the President to establish a mechanism to face the practical issues that will occur with the usage of organic fertiliser.

MONLAR in a letter addressed to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, has requested to prepare short term, midterm and long-term strategies to face practical issues and challenges with the usage of organic fertiliser and arrange a programme addressing attitudinal changes to use organic fertiliser.

"The Agricultural Department and the Agrarian Development Department are opposing the decision of promoting Organic fertiliser. These are the two main departments that are responsible for taking agricul-

ture forward. Therefore, their disagreements will hinder the promotion of organic fertiliser," the letter read.

The letter further said that the move to organic fertiliser must not be a mere political move as the past Government too did not continue to take the organic fertiliser programme further. 18,000 metric tons of chemical fertiliser that contained heavy metals was released by the previous government. Sustainable farming must be promoted with proper strategies and longterm plans if not the farmers will be dragged into a difficult situation", the letter added.



# Sri Lanka cricket and bringing back its past glory

It is evident that our standard of cricket is very low. Those in authority do not know how to bring back or regain our past glory. If office bearers are constantly being changed then Sri Lanka Cricket will automatically suffer and deteriorate. What is the point of having experts in the Cricket Board if players cannot deliver the goods? It is very pathetic to see the way our players play the game. Consequently, certain issues regarding Sri Lanka Cricket need to be addressed and tackled. In this article I intend to highlight some of those issues that require immediate attention. I sincerely hope that something will happen.

1. A committees of individuals, who love both country and cricket, should be in charge of

Sri Lanka Cricket. They must be free of any 'hidden agendas'. Their primary purpose ought to be the uplifting of Sri Lanka Cricket to a very high standard. If, however, they are first and foremost motivated by money or self honour, then Sri Lanka Cricket will go from bad to worse. Such people ruin the game. We need men of high calibre who will be willing to do everything in their power to put our country on the Cricket World Map once again.

**2.** Only those players who are prepared to give their best for the glory of Sri Lanka Cricket should be selected. How can a player commit himself wholeheartedly to our National Team and its ideals if his primary focus is predominantly financial rewards? At present, money is a major component of cricket and it has a big influence on



players and their attitudes. Many of them are 'in the game' only for the money! So, how can you expect anything extraordinary from them? When things are not 'rosy' they readily cave in and lose the will

**3.** Most of our players are not mentally fit to play the game. Before entering the field of play they need to be prepared psychologically to handle any situation or pressure they encounter during the game, especially when things are not going their way. Therefore, some psychologists should be employed to ensure that the proper 'frame of mind' is nurtured within our players' psyche prior to any encounter with foreign teams.

**4.** A pre-condition for selecting about 15 players is that each one of them must be able to put runs on the scoreboard! Even the Number 11 player should contribute to the team's overall score with his bat. For example, if Sri Lanka's score is 110 for 8, then the last three batsmen should have the cour-

age and backbone to bring the team's score to at least 300. They must not 'throw' their wickets and, in so doing, surrender the match to their opponents. Gone are the days when only Numbers 1 to 7 scored runs for the team!

**5.** It is essential that every player is a very good fielder. During practice sessions cricketers must be serious, determined and consistent about their fielding skills and techniques. They must not underestimate the importance of fielding in a cricket game.

A catch missed or a run not taken can cost the match. Good fielding can cause panic in the opposition team and make the players 'throw' their wickets. Therefore, fielding practice sessions must not be taken lightly by our cricketers.

6. It is unpardonable for any

batsman to be run out. Consequently, it is vital that our cricketers practice running between wickets. Failure to understand this can lead to the loss of a game. Indeed, a team can lose a match if two of its batsmen are run out! Some of our National players do not practice running between wickets and, as a result, they are worse than schoolboy cricketers. If they do not give due importance and seriousness to this fundamental cricket skill then they will not go far in the game. Good running between wickets can destroy a bowler's length.

7. Our cricketers must be trained to play in any conditions. If a team only wins on its home soil then it is wrong to say that the team is a 'good' side. International players must be prepared to 'show their colours' in foreign countries, irrespective of the pitch or climate. Consequently, those in authority must ensure that our players are given the opportunity to travel abroad and become accustomed to a wide range of playing and climate conditions before they undertake a tour. Prior to leaving the country they should be exposed to fast bouncy pitches, in cold climates. Also, they should become familiar with pitches where the ball swings a lot. If not, then they will be 'fish out of water' on foreign soil and will be forced to 'eat humble pie' on the World Cricket Stage.

I am sure that the men in authority will give serious consideration to points I have made in this article and earnestly try their best to bring back or regain our past glory as a World Class Cricket Nation!

# **Trinity - Antonian postponed due to Covid-19**

This year's 103rd Trinity-Antonian cricket encounter known as The Hill Country Battle of the Blues which is one of the most looked Big Match in the hill country which is played since 1914 and the sixth oldest Big Match in Sri Lanka, which was scheduled to be played on May 15th and 16th at Katugastota, has been postponed. Out of the 102 games played, the Trinitians have won 23 with 11 ending in favour of the Antonians and 68 draws. Due to a disagreement between the two schools, regarding the age rule resulted in the cancellation of the match in 1956 and 1957. Also, in 2001 the match did not play as the Trinity stopped playing mid way during that season due to disciplinary reasons and also last year Corono halted the

match. The last outright win for the Antonians was in 1992 and Trinity won last under Niroshan Dickwella in 2012 after the 1986 win under Thushara Weerasuriya. The victory came after 36 years. St. College, Anthony's Kandy are the current holders of the trophy after their 1st innings win in 2019 as they managed to restrict Trinity College to 173 after posting 298 for the loss of 8 wickets.

This encounter is playing for the John Halangoda Memorial Trophy. But a first innings win will not go into the records as a win to the relevant team. And the one day winners get the Sir Rich-

The first encounter was played at the Bogambara Grounds in March 1914; where the Antonians won. Trinity won the next match, and a long-contested series has followed. 1918 to 1929, during the World War I, St. Anthony's College premises (the present st. Sylvester's College premisses including the practice pitches and the playingfield (Brracksnow called Police Grounds) were occupied by the British Army. As a result, Antonian cricket deprived and they had lost to Trinity for 11 times consecutively. Without a playground of their nie Stevens had an own, The Antonians were no match for the

Trinitians even with the like of legendary Jack Anderson in the team. The post-war period (1929-1947) was inauspicious for the Antoni-

ard Aluwihare Trophy. ans, as they had a poor hat-trick. Lalith Ramarun in the field. Trinity during that time had C. Dharmalingam, a leftarm bowler who for two consecutive nagged the Antonians with his left-arm spin. 

# HOW SHOULD SRI LANKA FINANCE COVID-19 VACCINATION ROLLOUT?

n effective vaccination strategy is a necessity for countries to move beyond COVID-19. However, it also requires careful policymaking to balance the financial cost of purchasing and delivering vaccines while stimulating economic growth. This article, based on a recent IPS analysis, provides an overview of the approximate costs associated with the COVID-19 vaccination rollout in Sri Lanka and evaluates policy options to finance the initiative.

Assessing Costs

While there is no universally agreed level, considering the emergence of new variants, many experts agree that a country should vaccinate around 80% of its population to achieve herd immunity against COVID-19. This translates to 17.5 million Sri Lankans. Thus far, Sri Lanka has received or is expected to receive vaccine donations and other financial assistance from the likes of the World Health Organization's COVAX Facility to cover approximately 20% of the population.

Based on publicly available proxy data, as detailed in Table 1 below, assuming that 20% of the population will be financed through the WHO COVAX scheme, the total cost of self-financing another 60% of the population is USD 139.1 million. These costs include both the cost of purchasing the cheapest vaccine (AstraZeneca-Oxford) and the immunisation delivery costs.

In arecent study, the World Bank estimates that for the South Asian region, the average per person vaccination cost amounts to USD 12 to receive one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, under certain assumptions. This costing consists of the full vaccine deployment cost per person, which includes the vaccine dosage cost along with the international airfare and other delivery

Using this basis of costing, financing two doses of the vaccine for 60% of Sri Lanka's population would amount to USD 336 million. This is over double the minimum estimate made earlier using local proxy data. As such, a range of USD 140-336 million (LKR 27-66 billion) can be treated as a minimum and maximum estimate range for financing the long-term vaccination strategy in Sri Lanka. This amounts to 0.6-1.4% of total

government expenditure for 2020, which is a relatively small proportion of the country's total government expenditure. For context, the health sector was allocated 4.8% of total government expenditure in 2020. That said, the estimated costs range between 12 and 29.5% of the Ministry of Health's total expenditure for 2021.

Furthermore, given difficulties in securing all necessary vaccines from a single producer (e.g. AstraZeneca) due to supply shortages, Sri Lanka has already moved towards purchasing Sputnik V and Pfizer vaccines, which are more expensive than AstraZeneca, and therefore will increase costs. The cost increase will be significant given that other vaccines are two to six times more expensive than a dose of Astra-Zeneca (Table 2).

Given these realities, Sri Lanka will need to cover these costs through one or a combination of: (a) reallocating existing budgetary commitments; (b) receiving more bilateral and multilateral vaccine donations or financial assistance; or (c) self-financing through targetted tax policies and future borrowings. Reallocating Budgetary Commitments Notably, the gov-

ernment did not budget for a vaccination strategy in its National Budget for 2021. As such, any spending would have to be allocated through an emergency budgetary allocation. The government could potentially reallocate funding from other sectors or even reallocate from within the health sector. These reallocations, for example, could occur through built-in fiscal space for public investments in the budget, postponements or revisions to nonessential government

spending initiatives such as non-essential small-scale infrastructure projects.

However, the extent to which such revisions can be incorporated is greatly limited by the economic conditions under which this vaccination initiative is taking place. Some of these small-scale infrastructure projects, for instance, are geared towards stimulating the economy.

Sri Lanka's post-COVID-19 economic recovery is dependent on adequate government spending to stimulate growth, and there has already been a significant amount of spending rationalisation that has taken place. Furthermore, the government will be required to ensure that the broader public health sector is not compromised in any form simply to fund the COVID-19 vaccination initiative as that may have further severe long-term repercussions.

### **Self-Financing**

Given the current economic climate, the government is unlikely to increase direct taxes in the immediate future. Increasing indirect taxes such as import tariffs are also likely to be counter-productive since imports are restricted. Rather, a tax rationalisation on luxury goods and a sin-tax rationalisation on alcohol and cigarettes could generate a significant amount of revenue that can be directed towards the vaccination drive.

For instance, a recent study by IPS estimated that government revenue could be increased by LKR 17 billion by 2021, and LKR 37 billion by 2023, if taxes on cigarettes are streamlined and raised in line with inflation. This additional revenue can finance the vaccination strategy such that it

reaches the midpoint of the study's cost estimation range of LKR

20-67 billion.

A targetted tax intervention achieves the dual aim of raising the required funds to vaccinate the public while simultaneously ensuring that the government's broader macroeconomic stimulus initiatives can continue unimpeded. If the government is unwilling to finance the entire cost through a targetted tax intervention, even a partial self-

financing measure would reduce the necessity for the government to depend on further loans to cover the cost.

# **Best Option**

A basic economic impact analysis by IPS found that the vaccination rollout would generate an additional 30.6 billion in national output, and an extra value addition of LKR 26 billion. Besides, the country's economy will benefit additionally due to the indirect impacts associated with the public health benefits of a vaccinated populace.

Considering these factors, the government is best off pursuing a medium-term selffinancing option through targetted tax interventions and if required, through external financing. The challenge for Sri Lanka is to secure adequate funding without compromising on its investments in broader public health and social welfare initiatives as weaknesses on those fronts can undermine the success of vaccinating the public from

From a budgetary perspective, the cost of vaccinating the public fast will also be



cheaper than the cost of continuous PCR testing, managing quarantine centres and cluster associated lockdowns over a prolonged period. In addition to securing funding, receiving an adequate supply of vaccine doses for the country to reach its vaccination coverage targets remains uncertain as we progress further into 2021

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# ComBank increases interest rate on 'FC Plus' foreign currency accounts

Customers can now deposit foreign currency notes too to this account, after vali-

dating the source of funds according to the stipulated criteria, and funds can be withdrawn at any time, the Bank said.

Commercial Bank's FC Plus account holders are saved the hassle of maintaining a passbook, and receiveperiodic account statements for added flexibility and convenience. 





Commenting on the show, Ambassador Lavertu said, "The Bonsoir French television programme, hosted by our Embassy, very successfully took France to all corners of Sri Lanka, both in English and in Sinhala, from the mid-1980s, the pre-internet era, to 2010.
