

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

clinical studies have been published confirming that high doses of Vitamin D administered early in persons with COVID-19 significantly reduce complications and the need for ICU admissions.

Additionally, five Randomised Controlled Clinical Trials (RCTs) were published using high-dose Vitamin D in COVID-19 patients, and over 20 other large RCTs are ongoing. To obtain benefits, however, doses high enough must be administered early in the disease.

Among others, few examples of countries where these RCTs conducted were Brazil (Murai et al, 2021), India (Rastogi, et al, 2020 ; Lakkireddy, 2021), and Spain (Castillo, et al, 2020 ; Nogués et al, 2021). The Vitamin D3 doses used were between 130,000 IU to 300,000 IU or the equivalent of 25-hydroxyvitamin D [25(OH)D, also known as Calcifediol] as used by Castillo et al in Spain.

As shown in the meta-analysis, Figures 1 and 2, at https://vdmeta.com, even with slightly less optimal doses of Calcifediol resulted in over 50 percent (95 percent confidence interval, 14 to 71 percent) reduction in severe adverse outcomes by preventing the development of cytokine storm and death.

The effect of early treatment with high-dose Vitamin D in persons with COVID-19 illustrated in Figure 1 (adapted from https:// vdmeta.com).


There are no adverse effects of high-dose Vitamin D3 supplementation of up to 600,000 IU administered as single or divided doses. Also, long-term supplementation of 50,000 IU/ day Vitamin D3 has not reported adverse effects (McCullough, et al, 2019).

In the examples below, the expected death rates is adjustable with 75 percent reduction following Vitamin D; so as the cost of Vitamin D per patient:

· Admissions or transfers of symptomatic COVID patients to a hospital: n=2,000

- Administer 200,000 IU dose to 1,000 and a placebo to 1,000 (i.e., every other person) - Expected death rate without Vitamin D: 8%; i.e., 80 people die out of 1,000



- Expected death rate with vitamin D, "four-times" less, 2%; 20 people die out of

- 60 fewer deaths for 1,000 symptomatic COVID persons treated with Vitamin D

- Assume, one dose cost, US\$ 1.00: So,

1,000 persons cost, US\$ 1,000 - So, 60 fewer deaths in 1,000 patients: to save 60 lives, cost US\$ 1,000

#### Conclusion

Vitamin D, 200,000 IU dose in single or divided doses is safe and highly cost-effective in reducing complications and deaths in persons with SARS-CoV-2 infection. Early use of Vitamin D (100,000 to 600,000 IU) can reduce

ICU admissions by ~80 percent. Therefore, Vitamin D can greatly reduce the need for expanding ICU beds AND cost less than 0.001 percent of using an ICU bed/day.

#### **Additional information regarding** D3 and oral calcifediol:

There is little Vitamin D3 (cholecalciferol) in food and multivitamins, including fortified food. Without passing through glass or sunscreen, skin exposure to ultraviolet-B from high-elevation sunlight can produce sufficient D3 for bone and immune system health.

However, low elevation sunlight in winter, clouds, pollution, clothing cover, melanin-rich skin and concerns about skin cancer mean that most people are Vitamin D deficient unless they take Vitamin D supplements.

Conversion of D3 in the liver to the circulating form, 25(OH)D, and for the immune cells to function takes two to five days. 25(OH)D is measured in the blood test and has a half-life of approximately three weeks. Recent research shows that the immune system requires at least 40 ng/ml (100 nmol/L) circulating 25(OH)D to support autocrine (inside each cell) and paracrine (to nearby cells) signalling. In the long term, such levels can be attained, on average for 70 kg adults, with 0.125 mg (5,000 IU) D3 per day. This is 72 IU per kg body weight per day and 100 IU/kg for

Some of the trials mentioned above attempted to do this with bolus D3 doses, except that in the Murai et al trial, given too little treatment, too late (i.e., faulty study design).

The urgency of 25(OH) D repletion is acute for all those suffering from, or at risk of,

hyper-inflammatory immune dysregulation (i.e., cytokine storm), which causes severe COVID-19 and death.

The primary mechanism of this recently elucidated by McGregor, et al, 2020-Th1 regulatory lymphocytes remain stuck in their initial pro-inflammatory programme and fail to switch to their anti-inflammatory shutdown programme due solely to lack of 25(OH)D.

and Canada without prescription: gram tablets for US\$ 30 (Rs.6000 approx) contain 1.2 mg Calcifediol - more than twice the single initial dose used by Castillo et al.

In that trial, 0.266 mg Calcifediol was also given on days 3, 7, 14, etc. However, maintenance of the initial boost to 25(OH)D can most easily be achieved with 5,000 to 10,000 IU D3 per day.

We have urged the Governments of Sri Lanka and India, in particular, to seriously consider obtaining Calcifediol tablets to prevent severe complications, ICU admissions, and deaths from COVID-19, which is highly cost-effective. (IPS)

## **Vitamin D:**

# What you need to know about staying healthy



itamin D is an important component of health, without which the body cannot function properly. But as many people continue to be in lockdown, the absence of sunlight can cause some serious Vitamin D deficiency.

Why is Vitamin D3 important?

Dr Harish Naik, consultant neurosurgery, Hiranandani Hospital, Vashi-A Fortis Network Hospital says, "Citamin D3 has

many mechanisms by which it improves bone health, controls neurological problems, reduces risk of microbial infection, increases cellular natural immunity, and adaptive immunity."

What is Vitamin D?

It is a steroid hormone, activated endogenously with the effect of ultraviolet radiation received from the sun, or from food sources and dietary supplements. Our body must have Vitamin D to absorb calcium, to be able to promote and maintain bone health. We also

need Vitamin D for other important body functions, the doctor explains.

Vitamin D deficiency

According to Dr. Naik, Vitamin D insufficiency is a public health problem affecting over a billion people across India. "Too little Vitamin D results in soft bones in children (rickets) and fragile, misshapen bones in adults (osteomalacia), and it can lead to serious medical conditions, too."

"Vitamin D deficiency has now been linked to breast cancer, colon cancer, prostate cancer, heart disease, depression, weight gain, and other mala-

dies. During this pandemic, lack of sunlight minimised activities, and isolation greatly impacted people. We have come across many patients who developed bone problems, depression, and neurological issues — all of which are linked to the deficiency of Vitamin D,"

#### Symptoms of Vitamin D deficiency in adults

Tiredness, aches and pains, and a general sense of not feeling well, severe bone or muscle pain, weakness that may cause difficulty climbing stairs or getting up from the floor, or a low

chair, stress fractures, especially in your legs, pelvis, and hips, are symptoms of Vitamin D deficiency, cautions the doctor.


**Food sources of Vitamin D3:** Fish, cod-liver oil, egg yolk,

shrimp, milk (fortified), breakfast cereal, yogurt (fortified) and orange juice (fortified). "Besides appreciating food

sources, people, especially women and the elderly, need to

regularly screen for Vitamin D deficiency through a pathological blood test and bone density test. This is significant for overall health and wellbeing," Dr. Naik said. (Indian Express)



#### ICG probe into alleged torture of Lankan

The Indian Narcotic Control Bureau (NCB) has come up with the details of the official of the Indian Coast Guard (ICG), who handed over a Sri Lankan detainee allegedly inflicted serious burn injuries while in its custody — to the Bureau.

The revelation of the NCB official attains significance in the wake of the complaint that some ICG officials forced L.Y. Nandana, 46, of Nakulugamuwa, Sri Lanka, to lie on a hot iron sheet, which was used to cook food in the vessel, after keeping a lighted gas stove beneath the metal sheet.

Nandana and five others, who were on board the fishing vessel, Ravihansi, were intercepted by the Coast Guard last month in Minicoy and 323 kg of heroine, five AK-47 rifles and 1,000 cartridges were seized from the vessel. The accused were later handed over to the Bureau for further investigation.

The allegations of torture surfaced after the prisoner raised the issue when he was produced before Court. Taking note of the burn injuries on the backside of the foreign national, the Additional Sessions Judge 1 of Thiruvananthapuram, had directed the Chief Judicial Magistrate, Thiruvananthapuram, to take cognisance of the incident and provide him adequate medical treatment.

The Hindu had earlier reported

that the detainee complained to Court that some officials of the ICG forced him to lie in a supine position on a heated iron plate used for cooking in the patrolling vessel. He had also complained that some personnel forced his body to the sheet with their shoe and beat him up with iron rods.

In his report to the Chief Judicial Magistrate, Thiruvananthapuram, Aashish Kumar Ojha, the NCB official, submitted the other day that an Assistant Commandant of the ICG, who was the Boarding Officer of the vessel Samarth, handed over the Sri Lankans along with huge quantities of narcotics substances and arms and ammunition to the Bureau officials. - The Hindu

# Shift focus to estates

hile all activities for combating the virus appear to be concentrated in Colombo and the suburbs a veritable time bomb is ticking in the plantations with a sudden burst of the pandemic reported from the upcountry estate community. According to the Moderator of the Movement for Land and Agriculture Reform (MONLAR) Chinthaka Rajapaksa, the return of persons to the estates from Colombo during the Sinhala and Tamil New Year had triggered mass infections in the estates. He warned that given the congested living environment in the estates a catastrophe could be unleashed if immediate measures are not taken to halt the spread of virus there.

Given the living conditions in the estates where several families dwell in a single line room it would be inviting disaster to let things continue as they are. The vaccine programme now concentrated elsewhere in the country should be immediately shifted to the estates to contain the spread to a manageable degree. Estate hospitals and other health infrastructure are woefully inadequate to cope with an emergency of this magnitude. There is also the time factor involved in dealing with the emergency in the estates and the current short supply of the vaccines to contend with.

It is time to take a serious view of what is unfolding in the estates which has largely gone under the radar of the authorities. The teeming numbers to contend with, will pose a major problem to the authorities. But the sooner the situation is brought under control the healthier it would be for the economy. Any crippling of the estates as a result of the pandemic going out of control is going to drastically impact on the nation's economy. It will need only one carrier to ignite a blaze given the sheer numbers and the ignorance of this community from whom strict adherence to health guidelines such as abiding by the distance rule would be too much to expect. Besides they would not have the luxury of "Working From Home" as their job requires them to be outdoors the whole day plucking tea leaves carrying with them the danger of spreading the virus to fellow tea pluckers. Their long fought struggle for the Rs. 1,000 daily wage having borne fruit, they certainly would be all the more eager to get to work, the risk notwithstanding.

Considering the vulnerability of the estate community they should have been among the first in line for the vaccine along with the Security Forces, medical staff and the other first responders. With children too now in the high risk category how things are going to pan out in the estates with its teeming masses of children is anybody's guess. A high rate of infections in the estates, needless to say, is going to have a domino effect with the risk of the virus spread being carried far and wide even beyond the plantations. The chilly climate in which the Coronavirus has a tendency to thrive, according to medical opinion, could further facilitate the spread.

Considering the emergency situation in the estates the authorities need to make a complete reassessment of the entire COVID control programme and shift the focus to this vulnerable segment of our community. No time should be lost in rushing emergency medical supplies to the plantations and the hospitals must be re-equipped to handle the new challenge.

Estate hospitals will not otherwise be able to cope with the sheer numbers that could be expected in the event of a drastic outbreak of the virus. Immediate steps should be taken handle a potential emergency by setting up makeshift hospitals, even making use of the abandoned tea factories for this purpose. The Estate Management Companies, perhaps, could step into the breach and offer their collective largesse on behalf of the estate workers whose sweat and toil had brought them rich dividends.

Certainly the situation looks grim considering that large numbers of estate youth who work either as domestics or are engaged in other trades and businesses in Colombo converged en masse on their home territory to be with their loved ones taking advantage of the long Avurudu holiday. Like their counterparts in the rest of the country, they too would have indulged themselves to their heart's content during this once-in-a-year break from the drudgery of their chores.

Only that in the case of estates, their inhabitants being a close knit community where fraternal feelings are high entailing close contact, the chances of infection could be much higher than in the rest of the country. Hence there is bound to be a subterranean mass among the estates who are carriers of the virus that had gone undetected and continue to remain undetected. The estate community being who they are, there is a very good chance that a large majority of them have escaped quarantine and hospitalization and are freely circulating among the rest creating a chain of infections among the community. Hence the need for the authorities to act fast by turning their attention to the salubrious hills which may be hiding the macabre spectre of pestilence.

# JUDICIAL CHECKS AND BALANCES WITH DOUBLE PCols

buse of power and position to settle personal scores or to take revenge from political opponents and public servants is a crime as bad as treason or aiding and abetting terrorism and robbing resources of the country. Hence, retribution to political victims is a prime need.

Fulfilling a campaign promise, President Gotabaya Rajapaksa appointed a Presidential Commission of Inquiry on Political Victimization (PCoI) on January 9, 2020, to look into alleged political victimization during the period 2015–2019. The Commission was chaired by retired Supreme Court Judge Upali Abeyratne and comprised Retired Appeal Court Judge Daya Chandrasiri Jayatilleka and Retired IGP Chandra Fernando as members.

Attorney General Dappula De Livera pointed out thatthe mandate of the PCoI as set out in the Notification published in Gazette Extraordinary No. 2159/16 dated January 22, 2020, is to inquire into allegations of political victimization of "public officers, employees of public corporations, and members of the Armed Forces and Police service who held such office prior to the Presidential Elections and/or General Elections held respectively in January and August 2015, being persons who had either resigned from or otherwise ceased to hold public office with the change of Government or continued to hold such office after such change, during the period commencing January 8, 2015 and ending November 16, 2016."

The final report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry probing political victimization was handed over to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa by its Chairman retired Supreme Court Judge Upali Abeyratne at the Presidential Secretariat on December 7, 2020, and the report was tabled in Parliament by Leader of the House, Foreign Minister Dinesh Gunawardena in March 2021.

Though these steps were taken to fulfill the campaign promise, many opponents and NGOs with their own agendas took up arms immediately. Following the placement of a Motion on the Order Book of Parliament on April 9, 2021, to implement certain decisions made by the Cabinet of Ministers on February 15, 2021, based on the Report of the PCoI, the Executive Committee of the Bar Association of Sri Lanka (BASL) requested Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa to refrain from pursuing with the said motion.

According to the BASL, this Motion was placed before Parliament whilst certain proceedings challenging the said PCoI report are pending before the Superior Courts. One area of utmost concern to the BASL is that the Motion seeks to implement the recommendations of the Commission to withdraw certain ongoing criminal cases.

Further, the BASL is of the view that the said Motion, if passed, would be inimical to the Doctrine of Separation of Powers and an affront to the Rule of Law and the Independence of the Judiciary and would set an unhealthy precedent with regard to due process.

The Centre for Policy Alternatives (CPA) too expressed concern that the implementation of the recommendations of the PCoI would potentially undermine the Independence of the Judiciary, the independence of officers of the Attorney General's Department and investigators who have investigated and initiated proceedings into matters of human rights abuses and corruption. Such action will have significant impact in the future on cases considered politically sensitive and further entrench the climate of impunity in Sri Lanka, the Non-Governmental Organization said.

Human Rights Watch (HRW), after criticizing the plans to implement the PCoI recommendations said Parliament should reject the resolution to exonerate officials implicated in human rights abuses and to prosecute police and prosecutors investigating them.

They further state that if the Motion is passed, it would and should not have any effect or influence on any Court of Law or on the Department of the AG or on the Commission to Investigate Allegations of Bribery or Corruption.

The Government thought it fit to obtain further opinion of the judiciary

regarding the issue. Taking the views expressed by different sections, President Rajapaksa appointed another three-member Special Presidential Commission of Inquiry (SPCoI) on January 29 to implement the recommendations of the final report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry into Political Victimization. Supreme Court Judges Dhammika Priyantha Samarakoon Jayawardena and Khema Kumuduni Wickramasinghe and Court of Appeal Judge Rathnapriya Gurusinghe are the members of this Committee.

The President has expanded the powers of the three-member Special Presidential Commission of Inquiry. Accordingly, the Commission is entrusted to further investigate and report whether the following malpractices have been done and to what extent the respondents are responsible:

I. Violating the provisions of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka, while destroying the oath which had been given in accordance with the provisions of the said Constitution.

II. Abuse or misuse of power, interference, fraud, corruption, criminal misuse, criminal breach of trust or nepotism.

III. Political retaliation against someone when (a) making any appointment or transfer,

(b) Granting a promotion, (c) Terminating the service of someone due to any type of disorder, and (d) violating of any written law.

The Special Presidential Commission of Inquiry is required to submit a report to the President on the suitability and the justifications, if any, for the implementation and enforcement of the said findings, decisions and recommendations contained in the said Report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry, as well as for the adoption of any action in respect thereof, according to the Gazette notification.

Under Section 9 of the Special Presidential Commissions of Inquiry Act No. 4 of 1978, SPCoI is authorized to recommend civic disabilities where it finds at the inquiry and reports to the President that any person has been guilty of any act of political victimization, misuse or abuse of power, corruption or any fraudulent act, in relation to any court, tribunal or public body, or in relation to the administration of any law. The President shall cause such findings to be published in the Gazette and direct that such report be published.

The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (UNHRC) declaration of Basic Principles of Justice for Victims of Crime and Abuse of Power clearly states the need for the political victims to receive restitution. The Declaration says, "Where public officials or other agents acting in an official or quasi-official capacity have violated national criminal laws, the victims should receive restitution from the State whose officials or agents were responsible for the harm inflicted. In cases where the Government under whose authority the victimizing act or omission occurred is no longer in existence, the State or Government successor in title should provide restitution to the victims."

The Declaration adds that victims should be treated with compassion and respect for their dignity. They are entitled access to the mechanisms of justice and to prompt redress, as provided for by national legislation, for the harm that they have suffered.

It is strange as to why the HRW, CPA and other NGOs attack the Government, when it has taken every possible step to check and double check with legal luminaries before implementing the recommendations of the PCoI. President Rajapaksa pointed out that several specific findings, decisions and recommendations have been made against and/or in respect of the specific persons identified in the PCoI Report.

Prior to implementing the recommendations, the President appointed another SPCoI with the mandate to further inquire into "such specific findings, decisions and recommendations contained in the said Report, in respect of all such identified persons, should inter-alia in the public interest and for purposes of greater scrutiny, be further inquired into by you, and to report to me on the suitability and the justifications, if any, for the implementation and enforcement of the said findings, decisions and recommendations contained in the said Report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry, as well as for the adoption of any action in respect thereof." This, indeed, is a correct step as inquiries by the two Commissions would certainly avoid any legal errors and it would finally ensure justice to the political victims.



dragged into Court when her husband died - of natural causes — after having caused serious injury to several persons in a car accident. The plaintiffs were the victims of the motor accident.

The District Court held that the widow was the legal representative of the deceased driver of the car, and was therefore liable for damages from the estate of the deceased car driver. However, the widow — Mrs. Nilamdeen — appealed before the Court of Appeal challenging the DC judgement which named her as the legal representative of the driver of the car - Nilamdeen who had since passed away. (Nilamdeen v. Dayananda and Others - SLR - 160, Vol 1 of 2002 [2001] LKCA 40; (2002) 1 Sri LR 160 (June 1, 2001))

The Appeal Court judgement ponders the following: "The only matter, which was argued before this Court, was whether a cause of action had been made out against the first defendant-appellant and if so whether the first defendantappellant was liable in law. In other words has action been properly constituted against the widow of Nilamdeen?"

The widow Mrs. Nilamdeen's Counsel argued that liability of the estate of a deceased person extended only to the "legal representative" or representatives of such a deceased. Counsel argued that this fact, i.e., that Mrs. Nilamdeen, the first defendant (now appellant) was the legal representative of the driver of the motor car involved in the accident was not established, and that she was therefore not liable for damages from the estate of the deceased Nilamdeen.

Appeal Court in judgement

WANT TO BE HEIRS observed that the caption of the original plaint dated 24. 01. 89 describes the first defendant-appellant as "the heir of Nilamdeen

deceased".

It appears that the Counsel of the first defendant had cooked her goose in the District Court. The first defendant strenuously denied in the DC that her husband's estate was liable for damages accruing from the car accident. The Judge of the Court of Appeal held that this very denial, i.e., her jealously guarding her husband's estate, was indeed a sign that she was the heir to such estate, and was indeed the deceased husband's legal representative.

Justice Tilakawardana observed in judgement: "In fact, she appears to have known about the estate as she speaks to the ownership of the vehicles that were purported to be under his control, (paragraph 3 of the answer at page 84 of the brief). She had knowledge that his cars had been sold (page 156). She admits that having received the summons. she made inquiries and took all steps on behalf of her deceased husband to file an answer (page 158). She has also taken up the position that her husband's estate was not liable to pay any damages. She has denied that there was a cause of action against her late husband. By her categorical disclaimer of the liability of her late husband she has acted at all times as a party interested in safeguarding the rights of the estate of her late husband."

CHOOSE WHEN THEY

Court held that Section 394(2) of the Civil Procedure Code is relevant. This defines a "legal representative" to be (i) an executor or (ii) administrator (iii) or the next of kin who had adiated the inheritance in an estate below the value of Rs. 50,000 as stated in Act No. 14 of 1993 (earlier Rs. 20,000).

It was also pointed out in judgement that it has been held in decided cases that an executor de sontort is also liable to be named as the legal representative of the deceased in matters of substitution. Executor de sontort is someone who intermeddles in the estate of a deceased without a proper Court order naming the person as an executor, i.e., individual who benefits from the estate of a deceased without proper legal authority to do so.

In a separate case, Justice Nawaz decided that a deceased person's wife's son — not his own son — cannot be substituted as a plaintiff in a case. The case was with regard to the use of State land with a permit. The deceased plaintiff had a valid permit, but squatters had usurped the State land he was using.

Justice Nawaz held: To deal with adiation which finds expression in Section 394 (2) of the CPC, it is the process of inheriting or inheritance, the word being referable to Roman Dutch law. For adiation to come into play, the deceased parent (original plaintiff) should have had a proprietary interest in the property, be it noted, at the time of his death."

If such a proprietary interest was present, the substitution can be done and it should be of a family member. It was held: "Proprietary interest should devolve on the person or persons (next of kin) who are substituted in consequence of death or by reason or by virtue of death of the original Plaintiff. As explained at page 2104 (Civil Procedure Chitaley



and Rao, second edition vol. 2) "legal representative must be a person on whom the estate devolves on the death of the party suing or sued." In this particular case Walpola Liyanage Belin Perera v. N.K. Kiribanda (C.A. Case No. 1164/2000 (F)) before the Court of Appeal, the deceased person's wife's son had been substituted, but it was held that such a substitution was not valid:

"In the case before this Court nothing devolved on Belin Perera who had been substituted as the substituted Plaintiff. No proprietary interest passed to him on the death of the original Plaintiff because Belin Perera was admittedly not wan heir of the original Plaintiff."The substitution was not valid because the wife's son was not an heir — a lineal descendant — of the deceased.

## COVID-19:

# The Geopolitical Dimensions

he intensification of the COVID-19 pandemic in India has caught New Delhi on the back foot in more ways than one. While it continues to deal with the fallout of the second wave of the pandemic, its domestic travails inevitably have an impact on the dynamics of its foreign policy. On the one hand, instead of emerging as a regional powerhouse supplying vaccines to its neighbours, it has stopped almost all vaccine exports and has had to rely on overseas medical assis-

On the other hand, it has forced an element of normality in its relations with China. This is evident from President Xi Jinping's letter to Prime Minister Modi offering help to India to cope with the pandemic. This is the first known communication between the two leaders following the onset of the pandemic in early 2020 and the Sino-Indian border crisis of April–May last year.Simultaneously, there was a telephone conversation between India's External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar and Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi. The Indian Minister spoke to his counterpart on the importance of China's transport corridors and cargo flights remaining open to facilitate the movement of materials to deal with India's COVID upsurge. As part of the conversation, he did mention that the process of disengagement along the LAC remained "unfinished"

and it should be "completed at the earliest". Meanwhile, China seems to be headed for a sweet spot. Its relatively undamaged economy is doing well and its national mood was manifested by the April 28 launch of the core module of its planned international space station, which is a major indicator that business has returned to normal there. Beijing hopes to have its space station running by the end of 2022. And incidentally, China has moved to fill the gap created by India and has promised vaccines and other supplies to countries like Bangladesh and Nepal.

On April 27, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi hosted a video conference with counterparts from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka, where Beijing proposed a number of measures to promote anti-pandemic cooperation among them, as well as to promote economic recovery to get on with the Belt and Road cooperation. India was invited but chose not to attend.

The return of normality in China is important, because that is something that has so far

eluded the US and India. This will have an impact on geopolitical dynamics, especially the revised Indo-Pacific strategy of the Quad nations. China is the principal trade partner of Australia and Japan, while it is number two for the US. Incidentally, according to Chinese data, bilateral trade in goods between India and China touched US\$ 27.7 billion in the first quarter this year, being a whopping 42.8 percent year-on-year increase.

With the Japanese ratification of RCEP, things are on track for the agreement to come into force in January 2022 as the biggest trade bloc in history. Beijing is the trade bloc's key anchor with north-east Asia, comprising fellow members Japan and South Korea, making up three of the largest four economies of Asia.

Elsewhere too, Beijing is on the move. At the end of April, China's Defence Minister General Wei Fenghe toured the South Asian region, with visits to Bangladesh and Sri Lanka. A major feature of the visit was the assistance China has given to Colombo to deal with its COVID-19 crisis which intensified in recent weeks. Beijing has extended over US\$ 2 billion in loans and a currency swap facility to Colombo to deal with the economic strain of the pandemic. Sri Lanka has an outstanding debt of over US\$ 5 billion owed to China. In the remarks in the Dhaka leg of his visit, General Wei spoke of the importance of countries in the neighbourhood resisting "powers from outside the region setting up military alliances in South

Before coming to South Asia, General Wei visited Vietnam, where he met the Communist Party General Secretary Ngyuyen Phu Trong and President Nguyen Xuan Phuc. In his remarks, President Phuc said that Vietnam would oppose "any forces' interference in China's internal affairs"— a reference to Taiwan. He added that Vietnam "will never follow other countries in opposing China.' The unstated subtext of the tour seems to be the need to counter the activities of the Quad, which had moved aggressively to declare an all-around strategic competition with China in the Indo-Pacific region.

As for the US, it continues to maintain a tough stance on China, as was evident from

the Alaska talks. But it is focused on a longerrange competition. Speaking in the recent Aspen Security Forum, US National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan declared that the goal of the Biden policy was "not to contain China." Indeed, he went on to add, "the Quad is not fundamentally about China. It is about this affirmative agenda that these four capable democracies can set."

The Biden team is acting along the Interim National Security Strategic Guidance which says, "the core strategic proposition" is that: To be strong abroad, "requires the United States to build back better at home". This process has barely begun and the US is not likely to be interested in further destabilising ties with a key trading partner. A comprehensive review of US strategy on China is still being worked out, so the Biden administration policy could well see a great deal of continuity, as well as some cooperation, and even accommodation, with China.

A new Indo-Pacific strategy was outlined at the Quad virtual summit on March 12 by President Biden, who indicated that what the US was looking for was achieving stability in this important region, roiled by Chinese actions in Hong Kong and the threats to Taiwan. In his remarks, he spoke of the importance of kick-starting the US economic recovery, though he framed the commitment to an Indo-Pacific "governed by international law,

and committed to upholding universal values,

and free from coercion."

The goal of the US policy is to manage China's future behaviour, rather than undo things that have already happened. In his first speech to Congress at the end of April, Biden pledged to maintain a strong military presence in the Indo-Pacific. He said that as China was "closing in fast" and the US had "to develop and dominate the products and technologies of the future."The US economy is also doing well and Biden had put forward an ambitious plan for national rejuvenation. The problem is that the US remains a politically divided society and getting plans to work on the ground is not going to be easy. Writing in the Financial Times, Demetri Sevastopulo pointed out that there are two key events in 2022 that are important for both China and the US. Biden must win the mid-term elections against the ongoing challenge from Donald Trump. And Xi Jinping must keep the Communist Party of China united as he seeks another five-year term at the National Party Congress scheduled next year. Both are likely to find that they need to play tough till then, but that does not mean we will see the kind of confrontations that took place in the western Pacific in the last year of the Trump administration. Indeed, American officials have signaled that there could be some guarded engagement as well.

All of this provides little comfort to New Delhi which is in the midst of negotiating a pull back by China in the eastern Ladakh area. Prime Minister Modi's remarks in the recent Quad summit were suitably anodyne and low key, though New Delhi could be a major beneficiary of the new American posture. Since then, India has been overwhelmed by the COVID tsunami which reduces the room for manoeuvre. Given the intensity of the current wave of the pandemic, it will be a while before the Government can focus on external diplomacy. The current wave is yet to recede and even when it does so, New Delhi will have to focus on plugging the dangerous holes that have shown up in its administrative and public health systems and anticipate further waves. All this is even as India grapples with China in eastern Ladakh and seeks to persuade Beijing to restore status quo ante there. The message from Beijing seems to be that India better be prepared to accept the fait accompli. This could mean pressure on New Delhi to escalate the situation there as in the case of Pangong Tso. That has its own risks. (Observer Research Foundation)

#### **Balanced Scorecard:**

# A novel way to measure performance of Government employees

rganizations in today's dvnamic, highly competitive environment must offer significant time, energy, and human and financial resources to measure their perfor-

mance in achieving strategic goals. Increasingly, many organizations have realised that measurement is more vital than ever and that their systems for capturing, monitoring, and sharing performance information are critical.

Performance management is a recent development which adopts a future-oriented strategic focus on managing performance and is applied to all employees in a workforce to maximize their current performance and future potential. The increased focus on performance at all levels in an organization arises from the pressures of globalization and the associated requirements to create a competitive advantage to survive in an international marketplace.

Human capital, the value-creating skills, competencies, talents and abilities of an organization's workforce are essential components in creating such a competitive advantage. Organizational changes arising from competitive pressures, including flatter structures, staffing levels and multi-skilled crossfunctional teams operating with considerable autonomy have a great impact on performance management.

When considering most government organizations in Sri Lanka, there is no proper performance evaluation system established within the organizations. Most of their performance evaluation processes consist of filling the work sheets done by the particular employees throughout the period with the intention of computing the yearly incentives.

The public frequently questions the productivity and the quality of services that such organizations offer. That is due to the fact that the performance evaluation of government employees is not carried out in a proper manner for enhancing the quality and productivity aspects.

As a result, Government organizations are not in a position to evaluate the actual performance levels of the employees in a comprehensive manner. As a result, the overall productivity level has dramatically deteriorat-

Government employees do not have a favourable perception of the performance evaluation as they are inherently used to be redundant. As a result, the management is reluctant to change to a new system of performance evaluation. Therefore, it is vital that government organizations adopt the Balanced Score Card (BSC) performance evaluation tool which is a widely used technique comprising broader evaluation perspec-

#### **Concept of Balanced Scorecard**

The Balanced Scorecard has emerged as a proven and effective tool to capture, describe, and translate intangible assets into real value for all of an organization's stakeholders. It was developed by Robert Kaplan and David Norton. This simple methodology translates an organization's strategy into performance objectives, measures, targets, and initiatives in four balanced perspectives: Financial, Customer, Internal Processes, and Employee

While many government organizations have used a mixture of financial and nonfinancial measures in the past, what sets the Balanced Scorecard apart is the concept of cause-and-effect linkages. A well-constructed Scorecard will tell the story of an organization's strategy through a series of linked performance measures merging through the

four perspectives. Normally performance management includes activities which ensure that organization goals are consistently being met effectively and efficiently.

mance appraisal is a review and discussion of an employee's performance of assigned duties and responsibilities. Intangible assets such as employee knowledge, customer and supplier relationships, and innovative cultures are the key to producing value in today's economy.

Therefore, individual objectives should be linked together for different aspects of human resource development, employee reward and organizational development to form a coherent approach to people management and development. Hence, it is concerned with performance enhancement in order to achieve both individual and organizational effectiveness. Further, the principle underlying the concept relates to communication and understanding the fact that performance management is based on an agreement between a manager and an individual.

As we generally know, several performance measures are being used in different Government organizations but it is intended to integrate the Balanced Scorecard with the existing performance measurement framework that is currently in use by most developed countries.

Government employees normally do not participate and are not consulted during the strategic planning process and during the formulation of departmental objectives and work plans. Consequently, there is a lack of ownership among the employees. Due to inadequate skills and training, employees have not conceptualized the whole process of performance evaluation and therefore have difficulties in preparing work plans and setting smart targets. There is no linkage between organizational objectives and individual objectives. Employees, find the process of submitting yearly performance progress reports as cumbersome and time consuming.

#### **Key challenges**

The common Government organization's structure is bureaucratic and emphasizes an administrative system and Chain of Command. Consequently employees are not free to engage with the management in performance-related discussions and make suggestions on further improvements. Employees find the instruments used to evaluate performance as complex and lacking objectivity. Since some public entities have not institutionalized a reward framework, most hardworking employees are demoralized. Also, the biggest problem attached to this process is that the output of the performance evaluation cannot be linked with the reward system as it follows the typical public sector salary

Due to the traditional systems, most of the public entities in Sri Lanka do not use a proper performance management system appraise the performance of their employees. This limits the aspects of aligning individual staff performance with the overall goals and vision. The Balanced Scorecard is an appraisal tool which can be based on results obtained by the employee in his or her job, not on the employees' personal characteris-

The principle underlying the **Balanced Scorecard** concept relates to communication and understanding the fact that performance management is based on an agreement between a manager and an individual.

At present, many government organizations in Sri Lanka are struggling with performance management because their evaluation systems consist of little more than a form which the staff use to conduct annual evaluations. This does not work because performance management should be an ongoing conversation between supervisors and employees that supports the accomplishment of strategic objectives. Rather than only considering the process once a year, the management should be using it throughout the year to set clear objectives to evaluate the results and deliver continual feedback to employees about their perfor-

#### **Way forward**

The Government should therefore come up with policies that recognize the employees as the driving force behind successful implementation of the Balanced Scorecard system. It will also provide useful insights to managers and practitioners about the

Balanced Scorecard as a performance management tool and the employee perceptions in performance, motivation and overall success of an organization.

Accordingly, efficient and complex employee performance measurement systems are crucial to the success of measuring performance. Hence, the Balanced Scorecard system provides a comprehensive approach to evaluate employees. It is not enough just to pick a few areas, use random indicators and expect to obtain the information needed for managing innovation.

It ends up mostly in a situation where competent managers are overwhelmed with analysis and results that they do not use in their work or that they use in a completely inefficient manner.

In relating to bonus payments, private companies adopt discretionary bonus schemes, in which an objectively-determined bonus pool is allocated to employees based on subjective evaluations of their performance by allowing the top management to use such non-contractible information as non-quantifiable or 'soft' measures whilst achieving an optimal improvement in managerial effort. But unfortunately, in government organizations, the bonuses are stagnated and only Government-approved allowances are being paid.

Thus, without the proper measurement of the organization it is not possible to record success. The Balanced Scorecard (BSC) helps in this case. Without the proper implementation and perfect measurement, management cannot take any decisions about the organization. Besides, it is important to know about what is going on and what is necessary for the organization.

Hence the Balanced Scorecard system helps public entities in reducing all sorts of problems. The Balanced Scorecard system is the proper solution for the measuring of the perfect employee performance.

#### **Conclusion**

The aim of this article was to critically analyze the current performance management system used by most Government organizations in Sri Lanka in order to propose a proper performance evaluation system and find a mechanism to link the outcome of such a system with incentives and compensation.

It has revealed that implementing the Balanced Scorecard system for evaluating the performance of Government employees the Balanced Scorecard does not suffer the fate of previous attempts at change, Government organizations should therefore engage in a number of organizational change activities. The rationale for the change should be clearly communicated, along with what will be expected of employees once the Scorecard system is initiated.

After implementing the proposed evaluation system, it is expected that the overall productivity and the profitability of the public entities will gradually increase and the outcome can be easily measured in line with the performance targets set through the Balanced Scorecard system.

Nevertheless, the top management of the Government organizations will have to face at least one of the following Balanced Scorecard implementation issues.

They are premature links to management processes, lack of cascading, terminology use, no new measures, consistent management practices, timing, lack of training and education, and no executive sponsorship. Hence, the management should be alert about the aforesaid implications for the successful completion of the implementation process. Also, when considering linking the outcomes of the proposed system with incentives and compensation, the Balanced Scorecard provides a clear platform for integrating the rewards with performance of the employees. Then the Government employees will achieve the required level of scale given by the new system. Then they would have earned the points and be rewarded accordingly. It is a transparent reward process and therefore no one can challenge it. (The writer is a Fellow Member of the

# Army to add over 10,000 beds for COVID-19 Care Centres - NOCPCO Head

new beds to hospitals shortly and the Army Seva Vanitha Unit will provide 1,200 more beds, after converting a building to be a care centre, National Operations Centre for Prevention of COVID-19 Outbreak (NOCPCO) Head, General Shavendra Silva

He said so at a review session of COVID-19 Task Force members on the control of the epidemic, chaired by General Shavendra Silva, together with Health Services Director General Dr. Asela Gunawardena held (4) at the National Operations Center for Prevention of COVID-19 Outbreak (NOCP-CO) in Rajagiriya on Wednesday.

During this discussion, General Shavendra Silva updated on the present status of the pandemic and behaviour of the new COVID-19 variant during the Third Wave as well as new isolated areas of the country, designed to prevent further transmission.

"The Armed Forces would supply normal beds and make camps available to function as Intermediate Care Centres for COVID-19 patients while simultaneously increasing the number of ICU bed capacity in hospitals. The government adopts two options at this moment,



either to go for a total lockdown or to manage with the situation while running the country. At times, PCR numbers had to be increased to 15,000 to 20,000 in order to locate new patients and isolate specific areas as necessary, considering the serious need for it.

"The COVID-19 Center

(NOCPCO), now manned with more officers will monitor developments throughout day and night and collect details about new patients from every MOH. Similarly, affected people who cannot find transport or other requirements to proceed to Care Centres can contact Hotline 1906 at NOCPCO and seek assistance for coordination. The Army will get 10,000 new beds to hospitals very shortly, and similarly the Army Seva Vanitha Unit after converting a building to be a Care Centre will provide 1,200 more beds, the NOCP-CO Head said.

Talking about COVID-19 vaccination process, he told the gathering that the first

consignment of 15,000 doses from Russia has arrived here and if scientific recommendations are okay, another stock of 185,000 vaccines could be brought down within a week. More stocks can be brought down in future, accordingly.

General Shavendra Silva also commented on the role of some Social Media elements who are working against national efforts at this critical juncture of the nation and cautioned against their false publicity gimmicks. He also instructed the Police to closely monitor the quarantine work, occurring at home fronts as it is necessary to be kept them in quarantine for seven days to two

The Director General of Health Services Dr Asela Gunawardena emphasised that the human behaviour will remain the most critical factor in today's context which would eventually decide the future of the nation. Other stakeholders also discussed mattersrelated to isolation, readiness of health sector, preparedness of essential services, oxygen supplies, health staff, arrival of expatriates, quarantine centres, procedures and process of vaccination, including second phase of the vaccine for all members who had already received the first

# SRI LANKA NAVY'S FAST MISSILE VESSELS

# AFLOATING PLATFORM OF FIREPOWER

he vast ocean surrounding our island consistently patrolled by various craft of the Navy. Each vessel and crew has been assigned their role and task, with specialized officers and sailors. It was a privilege to experience two of these vessels, namely SLNS Nandimithra (P-701) and SLNS Suranimala (P-702). Both these vessels have rendered a significant service over the past two decades. Designed and built in Israel, they were commissioned into active duty in the Sri Lanka Navy in December 2000. They are empowered with missile-carrying capability. Both these Fast Missile Vessels (FMV) can accurately deliver sea skimming antiship missiles.

Gallantly cruising the ocean at a speed of 28 knots *SLNS Nandimith*ra is a floating platform of firepower with an array of guns. I was able to board this magnificent vessel and witness the disciplined teamwork of her able crew. This missile boat is commanded by Captain K.N.D. Walpola. We proceed to the wardroom after walking through a hatch. The wardroom is the place where officers have their meals, and relax after duty.

As I looked out the porthole, the turquoise waters of the ocean reminded me that sailing is a special profession. SLNS Nandimithra has a battle history laden with many accomplishments at sea according to her Commanding Officer. Today the vessel goes out on independent maritime patrols that usually last about five to

seven days. The crew maintains an alert watch to thwart non-traditional threats and stop human smuggling, drug trafficking and piracy. The FMV is smaller in size compared to an OPV (offshore patrol vessel) in the naval fleet. It has a confined but practical working space and the men live and work as a strongly knit team that understands each other. The vessel has a length of 58 metres and a breadth of 7.62 metres with a displacement of 445 tons. An officer showed me a cabin: it has space for a bed, washroom and writing desk.

On a vessel designed for specialized combat weapons delivery there is no room for fancy living. The cabins of all the officers are the same. At sea the sailors maintain a high morale and face every situation thrust upon them. Not everyone is capable of handling these conditions at sea. This is what makes the crew of a Fast Missile Vessel unique, their working routine is one of sacrifice. Her sister vessel SLNS Suranimala also has the same design and capacity. The men proudly represent the following naval branches: engineering, navigation, administration, supply and logistics, electronic warfare and weapons.

The sunlight bounced off the waves on this beautiful morning as we walked along narrow corridors and I got the feeling of being in a combat action movie. Sailors were moving back and forth, as the quartermasters' pipe made shrill whistles rising above the noise of the engine. The FMV is powered by four MTU 16 engines, which propel the vessel to top speed to confront enemy ships

or engage hostile targets. On both vessels, her gunnery officers have an important duty. As we walked on Deck Level, I realized the firepower at the disposal of this sleek vessel,

which cruised with power. SLNS Nandimithra is armed with a heavy calibre 76 mm gun, 40 mm gun and 14.5 mm guns in addition to other advanced weapons systems. The 76 mm gun is a display of naval engineering. It can rapidly take in 40 shells via an ammo feeder (loaded manually by sailors) and delivers a devastating hit that can decimate any target. Aided by optical directors the vessel enhances its visual and target acquisition by a 360 degree spectrum, giving the Captain a better scope when engaging the enemy. Radar plotting is another vital duty performed on deck, and this charts the voyage.

An officer added, "At sea we constantly engage in various drills, search and rescue, man overboard drill, fire fighting, etc., to keep our men primed and ready." Maintaining such a high-tech vessel is a challenge and an honour. Every night the Executive Officer walks around the entire vessel inspecting each compartment, to ensure all is well. Every naval vessel has her routine. By 6.00 am all crew wake up (not to forget that one shift has been on night watch). They muster at 6.15 am and then proceed to shower and eat breakfast. The crew cabins displayed bunk beds suspended at various angles: again not everyone can get used to sleeping in this manner. After this we indulged in a tea break.

On most naval vessel lunch is served at 11.30 am and dinner is served to the crew by 6.30 pm. The energetic sailors have free time to chat and watch TV or read a book. The duty officer ensures that its lights out at 9.15 pm.

The Master at Arms is the man who maintains discipline of all sailors on these vessels. He also acts

like a father to junior sailors on their first voyage and mentors them. Sailing is an adventure and there maybe a few mild injuries now and then and sailors have access to first aid at a first aid station.

As they engage in patrols the crews have witnessed dolphins and whales, dominating the marine domain which is an absolute delight to any nature lover.

During the years of conflict both these vessels made their aggressive interceptions and combat engagements at sea, inflicting losses on the enemy. The Sri Lanka Navy has its own traditions at sea loaded with pomp and decorum, coming down from the British Admiralty. I was able to witness one such naval tradition: a farewell tea party on deck for some of the crew leaving the vessel, on completing their tour of duty. A senior sailor made a moving speech, thanking his comrades. The snacks made in the galley (kitchen) were tasty and enriched the aura of fellowship. Cooking on board a cruising vessel is a skill: as the ship will 'pitch and roll' with the waves. SLNS Suranimala (P-702) is commanded by Captain S.P. Kathriarachchi and has a sailing complement of 85 crew, including 11officers. As we neared the jetty, I heard the quartermaster's pipe, once more. The sunset dominated the sky. The men dedicatedly serving onboard SLNS Nandimithra and SLNS Suranimala are a special clan of naval warriors. It was an honour to be among them and observe their sailing routines and dignified tradi-

# Navy enables remote schools to sail into brighter future

connection with the 70th anniversary of Sri Lanka Navy, the sea-going arm of the country has launched another social responsibility initiative, under the directives and guidance of Navy Commander Vice Admiral Nishantha Ulugetenne, to develop selected underprivileged schools in the country, in 2021.

The prime motive of the project is to create a more conducive learning environment for the children the future generation of the country. Accordingly, this project was launched in the Western, Eastern, North Central, Northwestern, Southeastern, Southern and Northern Naval Commands on April 19, 2021. Financial contribution extended voluntarily by all officers and sailors from their monthly salaries is utilized for the project, while the Navy also enables its able manpower required for the construction

After contributing to the success of the humanitarian operation to liberate the nation from the brutality of LTTE terrorism that battered the country for nearly three decades, the Navy throws its weight behind various development projects of the government, to help achieve the National Policy Framework 'Vistas of Prosperity and Splendour', by contributing the Navy's skilled manpower and other resources.

Against such a backdrop, going by a concept of Navy Commander Vice Admiral Nishantha Ulugetenne, the Sri Lanka Navy marked the beginning of a school facility development project by embarking on a social responsibility mission to develop facilities of underprivileged





schools which lack some of the basic amenities. Accordingly, in line with the 70th anniversary of the Navy, a financial allocation of Rs. 4.5 million was made available to each Naval Command to develop eight underprivileged schools, selected by seven Naval Commands islandwide to support the education of children schooling in remote areas, with meagre facilities.

Under this project, the Western Naval Command has planned to renovate four new classroom buildings, repair plumbing and toilet facilities and construct a children's playground at Kelinkanda Primary School in Agalawatta in the Kaluta-

Meanwhile, the Southern Naval Command is to develop Sooriyawewa Weeriyagama Maha Vidyalaya and Hungama Ethbatuwa Junior School in the Hambantota District.

The Navy is to construct two spacious classroom buildings for these schools, as those children are studying in temporary classrooms with roofs of tin and cadjan.

Further, the Navy Commander April 3, 2021 made an inspection visit to the Roman Catholic College on Mandaitivu Island, Jaffna, which has been selected for development in the Northern Naval Command, under this naval social responsibility project. During this visit, the Navy Commander was warmly welcomed by the Parish Priest of Catholic Church on Mandaitivu Island, Principal of the college, teachers and students. Vice Admiral Ulugetenne made the school staff aware of the developments to be carried out by the Navy at the school.

The project includes construction of a two-storied building for the library and computer laboratory, which are two dire needs of the school, partition of classrooms as well as for the provision of computers, computer chairs, tables and sports gear.

#### **Biden backs** patent waiver for **COVID Vaccines**

The Biden administration came out on Wednesday in support of waiving intellectual property protections for coronavirus vaccines, siding with international efforts to bolster production amid concerns about vaccine access in developing nations.

The United States had been a major holdout at the World Trade Organization over a proposal to suspend some of the world economic body's intellectual property protections, which could allow drugmakers across the globe access to the closely guarded trade secrets of how the viable vaccines have been made. But President Biden had come under increasing pressure to throw his support behind the proposal, drafted by India and South Africa and backed by many congressional Democrats.

Katherine Tai, the United States trade representative, announced the administration's position on Wednesday afternoon, as the pandemic continues to spiral in India and South America.

"This is a global health crisis, and the extraordinary circumstances of the Covid-19 pandemic call for extraordinary measures," she said in a statement. "The administration believes strongly in intellectual property protections, but in service of ending this pandemic, supports the waiver of those protections for Covid-19 vaccines.'

Support from the White House is not a guarantee that a waiver will be adopted. The European Union has also been standing in the way, and changes to international intellectual property rules require unanimous agreement. Ms. Tai said the United States would participate in negotiations at the World Trade Organization over the matter, but that they would "take time given the consensus-based nature of the institution and the complexity of the issues involved."

Standing against her will be the pharmaceutical industry, which responded angrily to the extraordinary decision. Stephen J. Ubl, the president and chief executive of the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America, called the announcement "an unprecedented step that will undermine our global response to the pandemic and compromise

"This decision will sow confusion between public and private partners, further weaken already strained supply chains and foster the proliferation of counterfeit vaccines," he said in a statement, adding that the move would

have the effect of "handing over American innovations to countries looking to undermine our leadership in biomedical discovery."

The pharmaceutical industry has argued that a suspension of patent protections would undermine risk-taking and innova-

"Who will make the vaccine next time?" Brent Saunders, the former chief executive of Allergan, which is now part of AbbVie, wrote on Twitter. Global health activists, who have been pressing for the waiver, praised the administration's decision. It is "a truly historic step, which shows that President Biden is committed to being not just an American leader, but a global one," said Priti Krishtel, an executive director of the Initiative for Medicines, Access & Knowledge.

But the activists said a waiver alone would not increase the world's vaccine supply. It must be accompanied by a process known as "tech transfer," in which patent holders supply technical know-how and personnel. Activists are also demanding that Mr. Biden use his leverage to ensure that manufacturing is scaled up around the globe, and not just by the pharmaceutical companies that now hold the patents.

"No U.S.T.R. has made a pronouncement like this," said Asia Russell, the executive director of Health GAP, a global AIDS treatment advocacy group, using the abbreviation for the trade representative. "And now the actions have to match the words.'

The United States' announcement is only one step toward a potential international agreement on suspending intellectual property rights. Negotiating the fine print of an agreement that satisfies countries around the world is a tall order. If an agreement can be reached at the World Trade Organization, it is far from clear what would happen next.

Lisa Larrimore Ouellette, a patent law professor at Stanford Law School, suggested that the Biden administration's move may help sway the drug industry to reach "deals that they can live with."

Ana Santos Rutschman, a health law expert at Saint Louis University School of Law, said the drug industry now has a clear incentive to "shift the debate to the global equity problem in accessing doses that we can actually produce, as opposed to getting into this enormous fight." The best bet for companies, she said, may be to take steps like donating more vaccine doses or selling them on a nonprofit basis to lower-income countries in need.

The debate over whether to relax intellectual property rules has stretched on for months. India and South Africa proposed the waiver last fall, seeking to suspend portions of an international intellectual property agreement dealing with issues like patents, copyrights and trade secrets. Under President Donald J. Trump, the United States opposed the effort. Other opponents have included Britain and the European Union.

The pharmaceutical industry argued that waiving intellectual property rights would not speed up vaccine production, pointing to other barriers like access to raw materials and distribution issues. Pfizer has said the company's vaccine requires 280 components from 86 suppliers in 19 countries, as well as highly specialized equipment and personnel. (NYT)

# India's health crisis could affect whole world

India's Covid-19 cases spiked in April to daily record highs, and experts warn the country's worsening health crisis could scuttle efforts to end the global

The South Asian country — home to around 1.4 billion people or 18% of the world's population — accounted for 46% of new Covid cases globally in the past week, the World Health Organization said Wednesday. One in every four deaths in the past week came from India, the UN health agency said.

India has reported more than 300,000 new cases daily in the last two weeks, and overtook Brazil in April to become the second-worst infected country in the world. Cumulatively, coronavirus infections in India reached around 20.67 million with more than 226,000 deaths, according to health ministry data on Wednesday. Several studies of India's data, however, found that cases were likely severely underreported.

There are alreadysigns that India's outbreak is spilling over to other countries. Its neighbors Nepal and Sri Lanka have also reported increases in infections, while other regional economies including Hong Kong and Singapore have seen imported Covid cases from India.

Developing countries are lagging advanced nations in securing vaccine supplies in what the WHO has described as a "shocking imbalance" in distribu-

A delay in vaccine exports by India could therefore leave lower-income countries vulnerable to fresh outbreaks of the coronavirus. India is the world's sixth largest economy and a major contributor to global growth.

Some economists have downgraded their growth forecasts for India. But they remained optimistic about the economy's outlook for the year given that restrictions to curb the virus spread have been more targeted compared to the strict nationwide lockdown last year.

The International Monetary Fund last month said it expects India's economy to grow 12.5% in the fiscal year ending March 2022, after shrinking 8% in the prior fiscal year.

Still, the renewed outbreak in India has led several countries to tighten travel restrictions — and that's bad news for airlines, airports as well as other businesses that depend on the travel industry, said Uma Kambhampati, an economics professor at the University of Reading in

Meanwhile, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce has warned that the health crisis in India could drag down the U.S. economy. That's because many U.S. companies hire millions of Indian workers to run their back-office operations, according to the report. (CNBC)

# **COVID:** Nepal takes turn for the worse

Covid-19 cases are skyrocketing, hospitals are overwhelmed, and the country's Prime Minister is pleading for help from other nations.

Nepal is now reporting about 20 daily Covid-19 cases per 100,000 people about the same number as India was reporting two weeks ago.

Last weekend, 44% of Nepal's Covid tests came back positive, according to government figures quoted by the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC), as it warned of an impending

"What is happening in India right now is a horrifying preview of Nepal's future if we cannot contain this latest Covid surge that is claiming more lives by the minute," Nepal's Red Cross chairperson, Dr. Netra Prasad Timsina, said in a statement.

The virus' rapid spread has raised fears Nepal is teetering on the brink of a crisis just as devastating as India's - if not worse.

Nepal has a fragile health system, with fewer doctors per capita than India, and a lower vaccination ratethan its neighbor. The country's high test positivity rate suggests it isn't catching nearly enough cases.

Mass public events, including festivals, political gatherings and weddings, have allowed cases to spread, along with general public complacency and slow government action.

"The situations are worsening day by day and it may go out of control in future," Dr Samir Adhikari, a spokesperson for Nepal's Ministry of Health and Population, said Monday.

Although Nepal has tightened borders and imposed lockdowns in its worst-hit regions - including the capital -- some fear that won't be enough to contain the virus as it spreads through the capital, and even as far as Everest Base Camp.

# Scientists baffled by low case numbers in Haiti

Haiti has one of the lowest death rates from COVID-19 in the world, and scientists are mystified about why. Most people have given up on masks, or

don't believe the virus is real.

Large crowds, dancing and music on a warm Friday night in Cap-Haitien. Locals call the city O-Cap, one of the country's largest and most attractive for young

People still greet each other by shaking hands, with no social distancing. Restaurants don't require facial coverings.

It's a world that we in the United States knew before the COVID-19 pandemic. Weeks into the initial spread of the virus,

Haitian President Jovenel Moise said, "Some decisions we made early. We decided to completely shut down the country for four months."

But scientists say even that doesn't explain Haiti's stunningly low COVID-19 death rates. There have been 260 deaths and 13,149 infections out of the approximately 11 million people in Haiti, according to the latest data

compiled by **Johns Hopkins University**.

That's for the entire pandemic. By now, the worst predictions had Haiti in a second wave, like India, which is in the grips of a COVID-19 crisis that's killing a hundred people by the hour, and a weak health care system that is collapsing.

Haiti's dramatically low Covid count and death rate may be a combination of the government's poor record keeping, and not enough testing sites.

But Moise said there is a relationship Hai-



tians have with nature that protects them from coronavirus, and a plant that produces certain tea that's made with ginger root.

The Moise administration missed the first round of nearly a million free AstraZenca vaccinations several months ago, but Moise said even when his country accepts them, he can't force people to get the shot.

Meanwhile on stops in small towns, the

president, who wears a mask, is a magnet for big crowds of people standing side by side, gathering with no protection from COVID-19.

And so if the Haitian proverb is really true, that behind every mountain is another mountain, or behind a problem is another problem, then Haiti may not have been spared after all by the worst of the virus. (Local10)

#### Bangladesh and SL eye chance to climb Super League standings

Sri Lanka and Bangladesh will look to improve on their ICC One Day International (ODI) Rankings when they begin a three-match series from May 23 in Dhaka. Sri Lanka will depart for Bangladesh on May 16 and will play their Day/Night ODI matches on May 23, 25 and 28 at the Shere Bangla National Stadi-

The series will also present both teams with the chance to move up the ICC Cricket World Cup Super League lad-

Sri Lanka are currently placed 12th on the standings with -2 points and can climb as high as ninth if they win the series 3-0 while Bangladesh could skyrocket to the top of the ladder with a series

The Tigers currently sit sixth but only trail top-placed England by 10 points. A 2-1 series win would lift them to 50 points, 10 more than England, Pakistan and Australia, who all have 40 points. Sri Lanka will play an intra-squad practice match on May 21 before the series commences two days later. This will be Bangladesh's third ODI series within the ICC's World Cup Qualifying campaign. They are currently in sixth place, having beaten the West Indies 3-0 at home in January but lost to New Zealand 3-0 in

March. Sri Lanka lost to the

West Indies 3-0 last month and are now in 12th place.

The two teams played out their final World Test Championship series last week, which Sri Lanka won 1-0 after a 209-run win in Pallekele. Sri Lanka will become the second international team to arrive in Bangladesh since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The BCB successfully hosted the West Indies in January-February this year in a three-ODI and two-Test series in Dhaka and Chattogram.Bangladesh will be without their fast-bowling coach Ottis Gibson, with the team opting to use a local coach instead.

However, fast bowler Trent Boult and Black Caps Trainer Chris Donaldson will return home briefly to see their families before reconnecting with the Test Squad in early June.

Boult will consequentially miss the first Test against England but will possibly be available for the second Test, and certainly the ICC

commentators, Boult is scheduled to depart New Delhi today on one of two charter flights, arriving in Auckland on Saturday before undergoing managed isolation. All going as planned, Boult will leave managed isolation and quarantine on May 22 and will spend a week at home with his family, training at

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# MRIA secures Rs. 500 mn revenue, attracts 687 flights in Q1 2021

#### Five-year development plan for Mattala Airport

The Mattala Rajapaksa International Airport (MRIA) has been able to secure revenue in excess of Rs. 500 million in the first three month of operations in 2021. By March 31, 687 flights had operated from the Mattala Airport and more than 33,450 air passengers had obtained flight facilities and the revenue was generated through them.

Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga said that a special programme is being implemented to attract new air traffic to MRIA.

"Accordingly, discussions were held with all airlines arriving in Sri Lanka regarding commencement of trips to the Mattala Airport."

A five-year development plan for the Mattala Airport

has been prepared. Accordingly, increasing the number of flights, developing further passenger goods terminals and facilities at warehouses and facilities for the maintenance and repair of aircraft will be done.

Currently a duty-free shopping complex has already been established at the passenger terminals. Ranatunga said that arrangements will be made to further develop facilities there. The Minister also said that it is intended to implement future activities in connection with this subsequent to bringing under control the present COVID situa-

As a strategy of attracting arriving airlines and air passengers to the Mattala International Airport, scheduled airlines have been exempted from embarkation and parking fees. These airlines have been exempted from paying embarkation taxes for a period of two years.

Ranatunga said that initial discussions with airline companies such as Lot Polish, Lion Air, Air Astana, Ukraine Airlines, Indigo, Alliance Air, Air India, Emirates, Air Vistara, Maldivian Air and Salaam Air have already been concluded.

"As a result, eight Airline companies have engaged in new flights through the Mattala Airport, from time to

These companies include Scat, Air Astana, Maldivian Air, Ukraine Air, Indigo Air,

Salaam Air and Emirates. He further said that he was invited for many conferences which could be used to promote MRIA.

"However, in the face of the prevailing pandemic it had not been possible to participate in these conferences, he also mentioned that in the future these events will be attended and the Mattala Air-

## **PNF** stands by govt decision on fertiliser ban

The Professionals National Front (PNF) has come out in firm support of the government's decision to impose a ban on chemical fertilisers. The PNF bases its support on the harmful health impacts of fertiliser usage and the adverse impact to the economy of costly fertiliser impor-

PNF and Government Medical Officers Association representative Dr. Samantha Ananda noted that his support for the ban crossed all political and cultural divides in the country. He noted that he had seen first hand the health crisis caused by the widespread usage of fertilis-

Dr. Ananda was speaking at a Press Conference convened by the PNF at the Government News Department on May 3.

Fertiliser usage has contaminated the water supply and is a leading cause of chronic kidney disease in the country. Dr. Ananda said, "This is not just in Polonnaruwa and Anuradhapura. Come to the state hospitals and see.

Dr. Ananda noted that the scale of the crisis was widely ignored. He said, "We have a COVID-19 crisis and a poison crisis."

Dr. Ananda criticised the long-term government policy of giving fertiliser to farmers in terms of subsidy. He noted that such a support mechanism made them reliant on a poisonous substance and weakened their capacity to build nutrient delivery mechanisms domestically. Dr. Ananda said, "We give them fertiliser instead of giving them money.'

Dr. Ananda explained the economic system as being one of many large interconnected businesses. The fertiliser importation business has a knock on-demand on the demand for medicines to cure the health consequences

of large fertiliser usage. He noted that with such a high level of co-dependence it would take significant political will to implement policy in the public interest. Dr. Ananda warned the

government of the difficult task ahead in maintaining the ban on fertiliser imports. "These aren't people who will just wait. They will do everything to change this and they are willing even to change governments. They will give us an incorrect world view and this is not a big thing for them."

US\$ 400 million is spent on fertiliser each year. He said, "This is a big business that has large dollar revenues. They don't want this business to go away. They don't care about food production. This is the work of a mafia."

Dr. Ananda called on the public to be sceptical of any protest against the movement to ban chemical fertiliser. He said, "It would be extraordinary if our farmers protest this. Why would they protest something that is poisoning them?"

Dr. Ananda added, "We have to talk about food safety as well when we talk about food security. Because we need to eat doesn't mean that we should eat poison."

Dr. Ananda called a continuation of the policy of fertiliser importation as an effective means to carry out a silent genocide of the Sri Lankan people.

# "Asia, can emerge from pandemic Stronger Than Before"

The Asia and the Pacific region can emerge from the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic "even stronger than before" by focusing on five areas to help achieve a prosperous, inclusive, resilient, and sustainable future, Asian Development Bank (ADB) President Masatsugu Asakawa said in remarks to the ADB Board of Governors at its 54th Annual Meeting today.

"I believe the path we have laid out help lead our region out of these uncertain times," Asakawa said.

"We will continue to deliver ADB's unique synergy of finance, knowledge, and partnerships. And we will prioritize the quality of our assistance over quantity, meeting nearterm needs with a clear vision for the future. If we stay on this course, I am confident the

region will emerge from the current crisis even stronger than before." Asakawa outlined a five-point agenda

for the region covering areas critical to achieving a lasting and equitable recovery for Asia and the Pacific: Place ambitious climate actions at the center of development, with increased focus on adaptation and resilience, and with full commitment to the goals of the Paris Agreement: Address inequality including the gender gap—which has worsened during the pandemic—by investing in health, education, and social protection: Promote high-quality green and digital infrastructure, enabling economies to rebuild smartly while closing the digital gap and attracting subregional cooperation and integration, so

> developing member countries can seize the opportunities of renewed globalization and strengthen regional health security and strengthen domestic resource mobili zation, to ensure that governments have the resources they need to finance sustainable growth and respond effectively to future crises.

Action on these priorities can build on ADB's response to COVID-19 in 2020. Its total commitments in 2020 reached a record high of \$31.6 billion, with just over half sup-

#### ADB's net allocable income reaches US\$ 1.13 bn

The Board of Governors of the Asian Development Bank (ADB) today approved the bank's annual financial statements. It also adopted a resolution to allocate \$1.13 billion in net allocable income from 2020 ordinary capital resources, the highest in ADB's his-

The 2020 net allocable income is \$62.5 million higher than in 2019, largely led by an increase in income from equity investments and sovereign lending operations.

ADB's ordinary reserve will be allocated \$734.3 million to support the bank's capital adequacy and provide an earnings base to generate net income. The Asian Development Fund, which provides grants to ADB's low-income developing member countries (DMCs), will receive \$292.4 million.

The Technical Assistance Special Fund, which provides a stable and predictable funding source for ADB's technical assistance, will receive \$90 million.

The Asia Pacific Disaster Response Fund, which provides assistance to DMCs for lifesaving purposes in the immediate aftermath of major disasters triggered by natural hazards will receive \$15 million.

Fernando faced stiff opposition not only from multinational competitors but also domestic tea traders as he began his brand. His endeavour amongst others was able to bring down the bulk tea exports by around 60-70%.

Fernando used the opportunity to reiterate his call for a single origin guarantee for all Ceylon Tea accompanied by the crest.

Fernando highlighted that

differences in elevation bring about variations in the flavour of the tea. His company was able to use this to effectively market different varieties of tea to the international market.

Fernando is not opposed to innovation in the tea industry. He however maintains that nothing should be done to dilute the quality of the final product. In launching his flavoured tea range he was adamant to only use natural flavourings and to ensure there was no diluting of Ceylon Tea. He said, "It had to maintain the taste and quali-

His strategy worked as though he initially only launched 6 flavours he was able to remain in the market while his multinational competitor with 30 flavours at half the cost had to withdraw. Fernando called on his children and the broader Dilmah family to continue operations with his vision in

mind. All companies under the MJF group have to set aside a proportion of their profits for philanthropic ventures. The commitment to philanthropy predates the formal establishment of the Sustainable Development Goals and is part of the business ethos of the Dilmah group.

Fernando said, "I decided to take the humble path and share my profits with the needy."

Fernando was a great admirer of the British tea drinking tradition in his vouth but noted that this had come into a significant decline in the modern age.

The modern British consumer has no discernment for quality tea. Fernando has noted that New Zealand has developed a strong appreciation for quality tea.

#### **US backs waiver on COVID vaccine** patents to boost supply

The US has thrown its support behind a move at the World Trade Organization (WTO) to temporarily lift patent protection for coronavirus vaccines.

India and South Africa proposed the plan, which they said would increase vaccine production around the world. But drugs manufacturers

argue it may not have the desired effect. US Trade Representative Katherine Tai said that "extraordinary times call for extraordinary measures". Tai said the US would now embark on negotiations at the WTO to try to secure the

waiver, but warned this could take time. One hundred of the WTO's 164 states are said to be in favour, and a panel on intellectual property is expected to discuss the issue next month. India and South Africa were the leading voices in a group of about 60 countries which for the last six months has been trying to get the patents on

vaccines set aside. However, they met with strong opposition from the previous US administration of Donald Trump, the UK and the EU. Biden had proposed a waiver during the 2020 presidential election

Reacting to the latest US move, the European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen said "the EU is also ready to discuss any proposals that address the crisis in an effective and pragmatic manner".

French President Emmanuel Macron has changed his position, now saying he is "absolutely in favour". A UK government spokesperson said the UK was "working with WTO members to resolve this issue" and was "in discussions with the US and WTO members to facilitate increased production and supply of Covid-19 vaccines".

The head of the World Health Organization called the US announcement a "monumental moment" in the fight against COVID-19. The prospect of a waiver hit shares in the pharmaceutical companies Pfizer, Moderna and Novavax. (BBC UK)

# **SANASA** opens model spice processing plant

SANASA Entrepreneur Financial Expertise Centre (SEFEC) continues to empower rural communities through its latest initiative of constructing a Model Spice Processing Plant at Rideegama in the Kurunegala District.

The opening ceremony of the plant was graced by the presence of the Governor of the North-Western Province Raja Kollure, Former Chairperson of North Western Provincial Council R.D. Wimaladasa, Provincial Co-operative Commissioner North Western Province K.M.H.S.K. Jayalath, and Director-General of the Department of Export Agriculture Dr A.P. Heenkenda, and the Chairman of the SANASA Trust Company Polgahawela B.R. Abeywickrama Bandara.

SEFEC's goal is to empower rural economies by reinforcing cooperative enterprise through the value chain development concept in Sri Lanka.

This processing plant, facilitated by the SANASA Trust Company, Polgahawela, is part of a nationallevel plan implemented as a result of value chain analysis and research conducted by all institutions and divisions of the SANASA network, mainly Rideegama SANASA Union, Kandegedhara SANASA Primary Society and GAP Certified Pepper Producer Organization, Orgodapola, all institutions related to the pepper industry in Sri Lanka, governments and local bodies such as the Department of Export Agriculture, Sri Lanka Standards Institution, Export Development Board as well as local exporters and farmers.

This project has identified regional pepper-grown areas or pepper



knowledge, technology, and support to design high-quality products for the international market while helping our local farmers gain maximum benefits from this process. The main objective of building a processing plant is to increase the availability of quality certified pepper to meet the requirements of the international markets through exporters and processors, thereby ensuring a premium price for farm-

The plant is equipped with the dehydration machine called Ozone Redfarm, which is powered by ozone technology and will be able to completely remove the highly toxic fungal bacteria and bacteria called Aplotec that can attach to crops during storage, and can also dry up to 1,000 pounds in about 6-7 hours.

The facility will also be used to improve the quality of other spices such as clove, nutmeg, turmeric, ginger, jackfruit and lemongrass. The plant is owned by the Rideegama Sanasa Union, which has leased it to the Orgodapola Pepper Producers Organization for operation over 10 years.

Dog ownership is a wonderful thing, but it is also a huge responsibility and a commitment that spans way beyond lockdown: as the saying goes, "A dog is for life". As

restrictions ease and the resumption of normality begins, it's important we consider the implications for our canine companions and give them a hand to help them adjust.

Having a dog around has helped many people cope with lockdown. Our dogs mostly love us being around too: going for longer walks, having more playtime, and resting by our side. Nevertheless, it's safe to say life has not been normal for our dogs for most of the past year. Few have met other dogs, and if they have seen them, it would have been from afar or on a lead, meaning that they were unable to interact or play. There have also been fewer visitors coming into the home, but probably more deliveries, with people coming to the door carrying parcels and going away again. This is all particularly concerning for puppies acquired during the pandemic, as their expectation of "normal" is lockdown life, and they may never have seen visitors inside

the house or have been left home

We are all longing for a great British summer in which we can go on dog-date walks with a friend and their dog, have family round for garden barbecues and take our pooches to the pub or cafe, and of course, we need our dogs to be able to cope calmly with all of that. A return to normal is something humans are able to process, understand and prepare for. But our dogs - especially young ones - won't understand why everything has changed. As far as our dogs know, normality for them has been enjoying time with family only – so to be expected to cope with groups of people, children and other dogs, both in and out of the home, could be overwhelming for them.

A big worry for dog owners is the long-term impact of lockdown on their ability to cope with being left at home on their own.

Dogs who had separa-

tion anxiety before the lockdown are likely to get worse when left again as owners head back to work - but we also expect to see new cases developing, because other dogs, and particularly puppies, have learned to expect company all day.

One of the biggest reasons why dogs are rehomed is because of behaviour-related issues. A rise in problematic behaviours after lockdown could mean families have no other option but to give up their dog. And, really sadly, most of these problems can be prevented with the right early experiences.

Our message to owners is to start preparing now, rather than waiting until things return more to normal. It's easy to do: start building up experiences of all the things we will expect them to do once the lockdown eases. For instance, start building in minimal periods apart, initially just being briefly separated

from you by a door or child gate. If they

stay calm, build up the time separated really gradually, so they start to adjust to not being with you all the time. If your dog gets worried when separated - barking, whining, panting, or scratching at the door you have progressed too fast. Go back to a shorter period to help them adjust. By gradually increasing your time apart, you can ensure they are able to settle on their own and help them prepare for the time when you need to return to work or study.

Our dogs will also need help when it comes to seeing friends and family, both outdoors and indoors. Teaching your dog how to greet new people calmly, how to settle when guests visit or when you're in a cafe are key skills. Coming back when called, walking on a loose lead and not barking when the doorbell goes are also vital skills that will set them up for suc-

It is much easier to prevent prob-

lems than treat them, and it's not too late to help prepare your dogs for the changes coming. To support dog owners, there is online training, so dogs and their owners can equip themselves with the skills they can put into practice as nor-

mality resumes.

When people take on the responsibilities of dog ownership, they do so with the best intentions to care for them in the long term. But the pandemic will have devastating effects on some people's lives, including their ability to care for their dogs. While we provide lots of support to help keep dogs and owners together, we're also here for when things aren't going so well, and owners may be having trouble seeing a future with their dog. In general, cats seek out a few basic needs when they sit on a human's lap. There are other factors that play into cats sitting on you, like your clothes. Let's look at some answers to "Why do cats sit on you?" here.

#### YOU'RE WARM!

Cats like warmth, and people's laps are generally warm, Marilyn

They crave connection. Cats gravitate toward people they like, and they seek connection with their favorite people, Marilyn adds. Sometimes they're seeking petting, because people often pet the cat on their lap. Petting resembles their mom's grooming, so most cats love receiving petting from their favorite people.

Some cats also knead while they sit on someone's lap. When they're kneading, they're simulating their neo-natal days when

they did that to their mothers to stimulate milk flow. "It can be a self-comforting behavior, as can purring," Marilyn

#### IT MAKES THEM FEEL SAFE!

One of the answers to "Why do cats sit on you?" is that some cats feel safer when they're on their favorite person's lap, Marilyn

Smell plays into it.

If you have a bathrobe that smells like you, your cat might sit on it whether you're wearing it or not, Marilyn says. And if you've been to an animal shelter, your cat might detect a lot of other animal scents on you and avoid you. Don't take it person-

Marilyn, who has three lap cats, noticed that her cats won't sit on her when she's wearing a plastic raincoat. My husband, Mark, noticed that when he wears his soft bathrobe, our cat Maddie, who usually sits on me, will sit on him instead.

lap. Cats want to be comfortable and warm, Marilyn said when I told her this story, "and she trusted you."

"When you give them that choice of sitting on your lap or not and leaving when they want to, they become more trusting of you.'

NPS Monthly Lecture titled Conserving Horton Plains: What the Science Tells Us will be delivered by Dr Rohan Pethiyagoda on May 20,2021 at 6 pm via Zoom.

Just about everyone who visits a protected area in Sri Lanka comes away with many ideas of how its management could be improved, and Horton Plains is no exception. Dr Rohan Pethiyagoda Despite its small size, Horton



Plains is one of our country's most unique and priceless biodiversity assets—and sadly it faces graver threats than most other protected areas. Over-visitation, fires, alien species, pest species, illegal mining, forest dieback, population declines, pollution, climate change... the list goes on and on. While a great deal of research has been done on most of these problems, translating scientific findings into management interventions remains a formidable challenge. In this lecture, Rohan Pethiyagoda explores the threats that confront Horton Plains and discusses how he could respond to these. The solutions he proposes are often provocative, controversial, and perhaps even aggressive—but unless these recommendations are openly discussed among serious-minded conservationists, the decline of this jewel in the crown of Sri Lankan biodiversity is set to continue. The 40-minute lecture will be followed by an extended discussion time so that listeners can ask questions or challenge the solutions he offers.

Dr. Rohan Pethiyagoda is a biodiversity scientist who has published widely on Sri Lanka's fauna and flora. He has published more than 60 research papers, in addition to authoring several books on Sri Lanka's fauna and flora, through the Wildlife Heritage Trust (WHT), a foundation he endowed in 1991. WHT built up Sri Lanka's largest specimen collection for research, which was gifted to the National Museum in 2009. WHT has also helped several outstanding young biodiversity researchers expand their careers by undertaking postgraduate research and some 150 new species were discovered and described through this work. Rohan is also an editor of the journal Zootaxa, has headed several state entities, served as Environment Advisor to the government, and as deputy chair of the Species Survival Commission. He has won wide international recognition for his work, including a Rolex Award.

Conducted successfully over two decades, the Wildlife and Nature Protection Society's Monthly Lecture series plays an important role in sharing scientific information and knowledge with the public and also acts as a launchpad for conservation initiatives. 



leksandr and Maria Dmitriev, a young couple from Penza, Russia, have been sharing their home with a mountain lion for the past three years.

Cats are in the top two most common pets worldwide, but the cat Aleksandr and Maria Dmitriev live with in their small one-bedroom apartment is a little different. Messi is a 3-year-old cougar, the second-largest feline in the Americas, after the Jaguar. In the wild, it is considered an apex predator, but Messi was born in a petting zoo and has spent most of his life as a house cat, so he basically behaves like an overgrown cat, for now. The Dmitriev's are aware that Messi is a predator that will, at some point, test their strength to establish who is in charge of the house, but they have taken steps to keep his wild side in check.

Aleksandr and Maria, both trained psychologists, have always loved cats, but never dreamed of actually sharing their home with a mountain lion, Their hairless Sphynx, Kira, had always been enough for them, but in 2018, when they heard that a newborn cougar cub at the local petting zoo in Penza was in serious need of medical attention, they couldn't just sit by. The two describe the petting zoo where the animals live in small enclosures where visitors come in to pet them, so they decided to give this ill cub a better chance at life.

The young couple knew that if they didn't rescue the young mountain lion, it would likely die, but they also knew that

the zoo wasn't just going to give it to them. So they decided to buy him, and were surprised when the petting zoo actually accepted. They brought Messi home and managed to nurse him back to health, but it didn't take long for them to realize that if they wanted to keep him, they had to make some adjustments around their home.

For the most part, Messi acts like a big cat, but it's this size that posed some problems. Aleksandr and Maria converted the hallway of the apartment into the feline's headquarters, lining the walls with bamboo panels which are better suited to withstand its sharp talons and can easily be replaced.

They also brought in a large tree trunk that it could climb, complete with its own little hiding place at the bottom. But Messi's favorite place in the house is the bathroom window, from where he can see the endless grasslands around the apartment building.

Aleksandr and Maria Dmitriev quickly realized that they needed a way to keep Messi in check if they wanted to live

together in harmony, but training a mountain lion wasn't something they were prepared for. Luckily, they found a dog trainer willing to include their unusual pet in one of their classes, and the results were impressive. 

# Real-life sleeping beauty

7-year-old Indonesian girl who occasionally falls asleep for several days at a time has been dubbed a "real-life Sleeping Beauty" or the "sleeping daughter of South Kalimantan.

Interestingly, the girl reportedly chews and swallows food in her sleep, if fed by her parents, and gets restless when she needs to use the bathroom. Mulyadi said that she urinates when taken to the bathroom and seated on the toilet seat.






