MORE COVID JABS HERE IN TWO MONTHS

THREE MILLION DOSES TO BE DELIVERED

Mass Media Minister Keheliya Rambukwella said that the required number of COVID-19 vaccines for controlling the disease in Sri Lanka will be brought to Sri Lanka within the next two months.

Accordingly, three million doses are expected to be delivered to Sri Lanka soon and Kandy and Kurunegala districts will be given priority in providing the vaccines, he added.

He was speaking to the media after a special meeting held on controlling

the spread of COVID-19 at the Kandy District Secretariat yesterday. He said the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank (ADB), which is now chaired by Sri Lanka, have stated that they will intervene to provide vaccines tailored to Sri Lanka's needs and strongly denied the allegations made by some parties that the Government did not have the required funds to obtain the vaccine.

He said that the Government has enough funds to purchase the vaccines and there is no need to pay in advance

He said the relevant agencies have informed the health authorities that the vaccines will be delivered soon.

He said it has been decided to give this vaccine to about 7,000 national and provincial journalists all over the island. It is the intention of President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to give the vaccine to all the eligible citizens. Schoolchildren and pregnant women are not yet eligible to receive the vaccine anywhere in the world. TO PAGE **02**



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COVID monitoring: Nine DDGs for all Provinces

Nine Deputy Director Generals (DDGs) of Health Services have been appointed to all Provinces by Health Minister Pavithra Wanniarachchi to coordinate the COVID-19 prevention programme. Health Ministry sources said they have been assigned to monitor the COVID prevention programme in each province and to take necessary measures to provide all the facilities required for the prevention of the spread of the virus and also to treat COVID-19 positive patients.

Remnants of rocket lands in Maldives sea

BEIJING - A large segment of a Chinese rocket re-entered the Earth's atmosphere and disintegrated over the Indian Ocean on Sunday, the Chinese space agency said, following speculation over where the 18-tonne object would come down.

Officials in Beijing had said there was little risk from the freefalling segment of the Long March-5B rocket, which had launched the first module of China's new space station into Earth orbit on April 29.

"After monitoring and analysis, at 10.24 on May 9, 2021, the last-stage wreckage of the Long March 5B Yao-2 launch vehicle has reentered the atmosphere," the China Manned Space Engineering Office said in a statement, providing coordinates for a point in the Indian Ocean near the

It added that most of the segment disintegrated and was destroyed during re-entry. Monitoring service Space-Track, which uses U.S. military data, also confirmed the re-entry. "Everyone else following the

#LongMarch5B re-entry can relax. The rocket is down," it tweeted.

The segment's descent matched predictions by some experts that any debris would have splashed down into the ocean, given that 70 per cent of the planet is covered by water.

But the uncontrolled re-entry of such a large object had sparked concerns about possible damage and casualties, despite there being a low statistical chance. American and European space authorities were among those tracking its orbits and trying to determine when and where it may come down. (CTV News)

Sri Lanka starts Sinopharm and Sputnik V vaccination drive













he Health Ministry on Saturday began administering the Sinopharm vaccine, soon after the World Health Organization (WHO) approved it for Emergency Use worldwide. The Ministry earlier began administering the Russian-made Sputnik V vaccine in the Gothatuwa area off Colombo.

The Sinopharm vaccine was administered at the Panadura Health Office in the Kalutara District, an area which has reported a rising number of COVID-19 patients in recent days. It was also administered in the Jinthupitiya area in Colombo on Sunday.

Speaking at the launch of the vaccination drive, State Minister of Production, Supply, and Regulation of Pharmaceuticals Prof. Channa Jayasumana thanked the Chinese Government for sending 600,000 doses of the Sinopharm vaccine to Sri Lanka and said this would add to the efforts of the Sri Lankan Government to vaccinate at least 70 percent of its population against the COVID-19 virus by the end of the year. The vaccine has already been administered to around 4,000 Chinese nationals residing in Sri Lanka.

"Today is a very special day for the Panadura MoH office. We want to thank the Chinese Government as well as the WHO for approving the Sinopharm vaccine under Emergency Use. Today we began administering the Sinopharm in the Panadura area and want to thank President Gotabaya Rajapaksa for approval to start this programme in the Kalutara district," Prof. Jayasumana said.

State Minister of Primary Health Care, Epidemics and COVID Disease Control Dr. Sudharshani Fernandopulle also said at the launch of the vaccination drive that with the WHO and the National Medicines Regulatory Authority (NMRA) approving the Sinopharm vaccine under Emergency Use in Sri Lanka, authorities will now look to get more vaccines from China to vaccinate the local population. The WHO is expected to approve novac, another Chinese vaccine, soon,

"Today we began administering the Sinopharm vaccine in the Panadura Health Office for locals above the age of 30 and below the age of 60. From tomorrow we will also identify the areas which have reported the highest number of COVID-19 patients in recent days and will begin to administer the

Sinopharm vaccines in those areas as well," Dr. Fernandopulle said.

She said some of the areas worst affected by the COVID-19 virus were Colombo, Kalutara, Gampaha, Kurunegala, Kandy, and Matale, and authorities were making arrangements to vaccinate the people in these areas as soon as possible.

"The best way for protection from the COVID-19 virus is to vaccinate the people and this Government led by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa is aiming to vaccinate the local population as soon as possible," Dr. Fernandopulle said. The President had earlier declared that vaccination would be the best answer for controlling the pandemic.

The Sinopharm vaccine arrived in Sri Lanka last month, under a special grant by the Chinese Government to the Sri Lankan Health Ministry. The Sinopharm vaccine can be stored at normal refrigerator temperatures, unlike some vaccines produced in the

The residents of Panadura who lined up to receive the vaccine on Saturday thanked the Chinese Government for sending the vaccine to Sri Lanka.

Sri Lanka now has three vaccines - Astra-Zeneca, Sputnik V and Sinopharm for Emergency Use. The Health authorities have also approved and ordered the US-German Pfizer/BioNTech COVID vaccine for Emergency Use. The Government plans to order Astra-Zeneca vaccines from countries other than India, which has barred exports due to the virus surge there.

Sri Lanka has now given the first dose of vaccine to nearly one million people and hopes to complete the process by the end of this year, except for schoolchildren and pregnant women, two categories who are not given vaccines at present. Trials are successfully underway in this regard. Sri Lanka is among the few developing countries that has inoculated close to one million people.

Worldwide, more than one billion vaccine doses have been administered, the vast majority of them in the developed world. Some developing countries have not even started their vaccination campaigns yet due to delays in the WHO/COVAX programme which aims to provide vaccines to 20 percent of the developing world's population. Sri Lanka too has received a consignment of vaccines from COVAX and more stocks are expected in due course. Developing countries have called for a patent waiver for boosting vaccine production, which has been backed by the US.

Sinopharm, Sinovac: Vaccines for the World







World Health Organization (WHO) on Friday approved the Sinopharm Covid-19 vaccine for Emergency Use – the first Chinese jab to receive the WHO's green light.

The UN health agency signed off on the twodose vaccine, which is already being deployed in dozens of countries around the world including Sri Lanka

The WHO has already given Emergency Use listing to the vaccines being made by Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna, Johnson and Johnson, and the Oxford AstraZeneca jab being produced at sites in India and in South Korea, which it counts separately.

This afternoon, the WHO gave Emergency Use listing to Sinopharm, Beijing's Covid-19 vaccine, making it the sixth vaccine to receive WHO validation for safety, efficacy and quality," WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told a news confer-

"The Strategic Advisory Group of Experts on Immunisation or SAGE, has also reviewed the available data, and recommends the vaccine for adults 18 years and older, with a two-dose sched-

An Emergency Use Authorization listing by the WHO paves the way for countries worldwide to quickly approve and import a vaccine for distribution, especially those states without an interna-

tional standards regulator of their own. It also opens the door for the jabs to enter the Covax global vaccine-sharing scheme, which aims to provide equitable access to doses around the world and particularly in poorer countries.

Covax call

"The addition of this vaccine has the potential to rapidly accelerate Covid-19 vaccine access for countries seeking to protect health workers and populations at risk," said Mariangela Simao, the WHO's Assistant Director General for access to health products.

"We urge the manufacturer to participate in the Covax facility and contribute to the goal of more equitable vaccine distribution."

Currently only AstraZeneca and some Pfizer jabs are flowing through the scheme.

Bruce Aylward, the WHO lead on Covax, said Sinopharm was "looking at trying to provide substantial support, make substantial doses available. It has been very interested in looking at playing a role to help with the global response, which is encouraging." The WHO recommended that the two Sinop-

harm shots be taken three to four weeks apart.

The vaccine's efficacy for symptomatic and hospitalised cases of Covid-19 was estimated to be 79 percent when all age groups are combined, it said.

The agency said few adults over 60 were

enrolled in clinical trials of the vaccine, so its efficacy could not be estimated in that age group.

Nevertheless, "there is no theoretical reason to believe that the vaccine has a different safety profile in older and younger populations," it said.

The Sinopharm vaccine is already in use in 42 territories around the world, fourth behind Astra-Zeneca (166), Pfizer-BioNTech (94) and Moderna (46), according to an AFP tally. Besides China, it is being used in Sri Lanka, Algeria, Cameroon, Egypt, Hungary, Iraq, Iran, Pakistan, Peru, the United Arab Emirates, Serbia and the Seychelles, among others.

Second Chinese vaccine next

A clutch of other vaccines are on the road towards WHO Emergency Use listing.

A WHO decision is expected within days on Sinovac, a second Chinese-made vaccine already being used in 22 territories.

But WHO experts said Friday they have now asked Sinovac for additional information and are waiting for answers before they can make a recommendation. Behind Sinovac, Russia's Sputnik V vaccine is the next furthest ahead in the process.

But Simao said the WHO was still analysing data, receiving additional information on the dossier and conducting site inspections that will end

in the first week of June. Approving Sputnik V could happen after that, she said, "but it depends on the inspections being made and the dossiers being completed".

China's Sinopharm has sent 50 million vaccine doses for COVÎD-19 overseas so far and analysts predicted that China will become the country that sends the most vaccine doses to other countries, with many of them being distributed to developing nations.

The Global Times has learned from Sinopharm that the 50 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines it has sent overseas included donations and pur-

Sinovac, another vaccine producer in China, and Sinopharm have become China's main companies that have sent vaccines overseas.

Yin Weidong, CEO of Chinese vaccine producer Sinovac Biotech, said on April 20 at a seminar during the 2021 Boao Forum for Asia that Sinovac has produced 260 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines, of which 60 percent have been provided to other countries. At least 160 million doses have been administered, proving the safety of the vac-

Analysts predicted that China may become the country that sends the most vaccine doses overseas, with most of them distributed to developing countries, a concrete action fulfilling its promise of making vaccines "public goods."

Following pressure from the international community, the US announced it will share 60 million doses of AstraZeneca vaccines with other countries, but no details or actions have been unveiled vet. (NDTV. Global Times)

National Operation Centre for Prevention of COVID-19 Outbreak (NOCPCO) Head, Chief of Defence Staff and Army Commander General Shavendra Silva together with several Senior Officers inspected the country's biggest Armyimprovised COVID-19 Hospital in Seeduwa last Saturday morning.

The Army-improvised COVID-19 Hospital in Seeduwa, fully backed by the Army Seva Vanitha Unit (ASVU) with 1,200 beds, equipped with all vital health facilities, consequent upon the generosity, extended by Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Brandix Group Ashroff Omar, is the first-ever biggest COVID-19 Hospital in the country, improvised by the Army in less than a week to be in line with the Government's decision to increase the bed-capacity.

"The Army initiated an island-wide hunt for suitable locations and buildings and as a result, Security Force members at all regional levels are improvising new places to serve as Intermediate Care Centres or Hospitals, exclusively reserved for COVID-19 treatment as capacities in Government Hospitals are already overwhelmed. We expect to open this state-of-the art facility centre shortly in Seeduwa," General Shavendra Silva

comed by Major General Sujeewa SenerathYapa, General Officer Commanding, 14 Division, together with Major General Sanjaya Wanasinghe, Adjutant General of the Army and Brigadier Lal Wijethunga, Commander, 141 Brigade, at the entrance to the new facility, made availa-

ble by Brandix Group. The facility with emergency treatment unit, isolation sections, resuscitation units, ICU, medical stores among others is the first of its kind in Sri Lanka that came up in less than a week on an initiative taken by the Army to face with any contingency in

the wake of resurgence of the 3rd COVID-19 wave in the country.

The Seeduwa new facility is the third such handed over by Brandix to the worthy cause of combating COVID-19 in Sri Lanka, apart from similar quarantine facilities they made available at their sites in Punani and Rambukkana. This Facility was also the first to receive the international recognition as the world's first Apparel Manufacturing Facility along with the LEED Platinum Certificate.

This improvised new COVID-19 hospital in Seeduwa has been equipped with Army-produced 1,200 beds and we will primarily have 5,000 beds ready and the target is to increase it to 10,000 beds around the country within the next couple of days.

"In this place, isolated medical facilities with separate cubicles and space could cope with 1,200 patients on an emergency basis. The military has already added more beds to the hospital capacity, intermediate care centres and provided even ICU beds, having established the ICUs by the Army itself. Out of some 86,000 beds in island-wide State hospitals, initially we used only about 5,000 beds since capacity for contingencies like COVID-19 is minimal," General Shavendra Silva said.

India's C-19 tally tops 22 mn, 403,738 new cases, 4,092 fresh fatalities

The coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic continued to worsen in India as the trajectory maintained an upward trend. On Sunday, the nation added 403,738 to its tally as the national capital Delhi and other metro cities continue to report fresh infections, according to the Union ministry of health family welfare's daily bulletin.

It is the fourth consecutive day when the number of daily infections is hovering above the 400,000 mark after recording a slight dip in daily cases. The daily fatalities remained above 4,000 as 4,092 people died due to the viral infection, pushing the death toll to 242,362. With the latest addition, the total Covid-19 caseload has now soared to 22,296,414.

The number of active cases jumped to 3,736,648 and 18,317,404 people have recovered with 386,444 were discharged in a span of 24 hours, figures updated at 8am on the health ministry's dashboard showed.

Commonwealth Summit postponed

Secretariat Friday said that the Commonwealth Heads of Government Conference (CHOGM-2021) that has due to take place in Rwanda on June 21, has been further postponed.

"Paul Kagame, President of Rwanda, and Commonwealth Secretary-General, The Rt. Patricia Scotland QC, are today announcing the postponement of CHOGM 2021 as a result of the continuing impact of the Covid-19 pandemic," the Secretariat said in a statement.

It said that having reviewed all available evidence and risk assessments including with the World Health Organization (WHO) and their risk assessment tool, and after close consultation member countries, the decision had been made to postpone the CHOGM in Kigali for a second time.

"The decision to postpone CHOGM for a second time has not been taken lightly. The health and welfare of all Commonwealth citizens at this critical time must take precedence. We look forward to welcoming the Commonwealth family to Kigali for CHOGM at the appropriate time," said President Kagame said:."

Scotland QC said the COVID-19 pandemic is continuing to have a "hugely damaging impact on our member countries, many of whom continue to face huge losses to lives and livelihoods.

"And while it is with deep disappointment and regret that we cannot bring Commonwealth leaders together at this time to discuss many of these critical issues, we must be mindful of the huge

risks large meetings pose to all. "I want to thank the Government and

The London-based Commonwealth people of Rwanda for their professionalism, support, patience and their impeccable readiness to hold CHOGM. And I want to thank all our member countries and, in particular, the United Kingdom as our Chair-in-Office and India, who have suffered so grievously in these trying times. I look forward warmly to a time when we can be reunited with the Commonwealth family, face-to-face, in Rwanda when the conditions allow for us to do so safely and securely."

Scotland, who is the sixth Commonwealth Secretary-General, is facing opposition to her re-election to the post.

The Dominican-born, who was elected in 2015, is the second Secretary-General from the Caribbean and the first woman to hold the post.

Last year it was disclosed that Commonwealth governments have rejected a fresh attempt to give Scotland an automatic second term of office.

Britain's Prime Minister Boris Johnson in a letter noted that a "significant and diverse number" of heads of government "from across the Commonwealth" opposed the idea of Scotland being reappointed for another four years without facing re-election.

The prime minister - who is the current "chair-in-office" for the Commonwealth - said that he hopes the heads of government can instead agree just to extend Lady Scotland's contract temporarily until they meet next year. The 54 heads of government had expected to decide on Scotland's future at their biennial summit in Rwanda in January but the meeting was postponed because of the coronavirus pandemic. - Caribbean news

Burqa ban, a wise decision - MP Raheem

The proposed ban on the Burqa will help the members of the Muslim community to pave the way for peaceful coexistence with other communities in the country, MP Ali Sabry Raheem from the Puttalam electorate told the Daily News on Saturday.

Reacting to government's decision to ban the Burqa, Raheem said it is a wise decision that would help Muslims to absolve themselves from any offences committed wearing Burqa and also it would prevent criminals from using the Burqa as a tool for their destructive efforts.

Raheem also pointed out that less than ten percent of Sri Lankan Muslim women wear Burqa. "It is the opinion of religious scholars that

wearing Burqa is not something that is obligatory in Islam. It is the traditional clothe worn by desert women to suit their climate."

"Some can use Burqa to conceal their identity, which can be often witnessed at guest houses during check ins," he said, adding that it is obligatory for Islamic women to cover all areas except their wrists and faces.

The Cabinet's decision to ban the Burqa has been submitted to the Attorney General's Department for the drafting of the Bill. Once it is completed, the Bill is likely to be presented in Parliament in June.

There was a temporary ban on Burqa in Sri Lanka following the Easter Sunday bomb blasts in April

Sri Lanka welcomes Saudi Arabia's green initiatives

Sri Lanka has congratulated Saudi Arabia on its Saudi Green and Middle East Green initiatives and called for regional cooperation to tackle the environmental challenges facing Saudi Arabia and the wider region.

Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman announced at the end of March the Saudi Green and Middle East Green initiatives, which aim to reduce carbon emissions in the region by 60 percent and plant 50 billion trees in the world's biggest afforestation project. "Sri Lanka would keenly follow the ambitious projects designed to reduce carbon emissions in the region by 60 percent and the initiatives (aimed at preserving) marine and coastal environments, the latter being much closer to our heart as an island nation," the Sri Lankan Ministry of Foreign Affairs said in a statement on Saturday, as it expressed the country's willingness to cooperate with the Kingdom on climate issues.

"Sri Lanka would express its

support to Saudi Arabia and is looking forward to working with the Kingdom in our common approach to deal with climate change," the statement said.

Justice Minister Ali Sabry said the initiative by the Saudi crown prince "would set the road for sustainable development in keeping with environmental values."

Experts also welcomed the Saudi projects. "This is one idea I dreamt of when serving in Gulf Cooperation Council countries

such as Kuwait, KSA, Bahrain, the UAE, Oman and Jordan," Seyed Abdul Cader Mohammed Zuhyle, former Sri Lankan ambassador to Kuwait and Bahrain, told Arab News.

"The large extent of land could

be converted into greeneries with careful planning and execution," he said. "Thousands of hectares of land are available to be brought under this initiative."

Dr. Hameed Mohammed Rafeek, a former president of the Sri Lankan Expats Society in Jeddah who has worked for three decades in Saudi Arabia, told Arab News that Saudi Arabia's green initiatives should be supported by the global community, including Sri Lanka.

"Sri Lanka should consider extending its support for and cooperation with this initiative," he said. "It is blessed with a rich natural environment and possesses expertise in virtually every area. It thus has the potential to share its experience.

Bureaucrats and Covid prevention

reat policy can still be sabotaged before the people are benefitted. The Dehiwela-Mount Lavinia Municipality staff for instance, is a putrid example of how those in positions of authority seem to be determined to contribute to the spread of Covid, under the guise of

preventing it. That is a tragedy, because the sort of misguided protocols they have put in place not only undermines the Government's diligent Covid prevention work but also sabotages the good intentions of the Mayor and the Members of the Dehiwela-Mount Lavinia Municipal Council who are fighting Covid.

The paid permanent staff however seems to be totally tone deaf to the Covid prevention policy of the State and the Municipal Council. In the name of Covid prevention protocols, the staff insists that people queue up outside the offices that issue licences and certificates such as Street Line Certificates, and other similar documents. They are either too obtuse or too unconcerned to realize that crowds, whether they gather inside the room or outside the door, are still crowds. There is hardly any monitoring of social distancing as long as they are out of the room and outside the door. A few chairs are provided, but after that queue-standers end up in a huddle. It is as if the staff is only concerned about themselves being protected from Covid in their rooms.

Yet the staff expects those who queue for certificates to stand in line on two, sometimes three separate days. For example, if all the documents have been submitted and the payments have been made for obtaining a street line certificate, that means the ratepayer has done everything, and all he or she has left to do is to collect the document in question.

However, he or she is asked to come another day — and even if that is fair — the returnees are asked to stand in line with all of the others who are yet to give documents in the line the returnee stood in the day before. Is this preventing Covid or doing the utmost to spread Covid? What is the rationale in asking people to run the risk of being in a queue with questionable social distancing, on yet another day, for an additional couple of hours sometimes close to three to four hours factoring in the one hour lunch interval for staff — when people only have to collect certificates that are already available and ready, and which they have paid for.

Not to labour the point, but these people have only returned for collection. They have to be handed the document over the counter, and told to leave the premises as fast as they could, if the staff has a modicum of good sense about the prevention of Covid, because preventing infection entails keeping crowds to a mini-

This should be the most elementary of common sense, obvious even to a four-year-old. But the Dehiwala-Mount Lavinia Municipal Council staff insists that people queue up a second or third day for a document that is ready and can be collected over the counter.

Why does the Municipal staff do this? It is suspected that it is just because they can, and they are able to throw their weight about with all the riff-raff they employ at the door to herd the hapless ratepayers.

This is the situation in the Municipal Council, but it is suspected that there are many other Government offices in which they do this type of thing which worsens the Covid risk.

Staff in Government, semi-Government or corporate institutions should be disciplined if they needlessly expose visitors and clientele to Covid risk by unreasonably keeping them in queues for two to three days. They do this at normal times too — but in these times of a virulent pandemic, this sort of obnoxious behaviour is almost criminal. Indeed, in some countries, there are criminal penalties for those who needlessly expose others to Covid risk.

These behaviours are totally contrary to the Government's policy on Covid prevention which is to minimize exposure of persons in public settings. That is why there is Work From Home, for instance — protocols that mandate even those gainfully employed to stay at home so that they do not expose themselves and others to risk. If the Government and the Municipal Council Members can follow and promote such pragmatic policy, it is outrageous that paid staff couldn't care less about following elementary disease prevention wisdom at such a crucial juncture with the State trying to balance the need for disease prevention with the imperative of keeping the economy functioning.

The Covid prevention arm of the State has been scrupulous about detail, and has gone out of the way to ensure that the public is not inconvenienced in any sphere of public activity, be it working, schooling or running a business. This needs to be supported by administrators and bureaucrats in particular, who are the conduit between policymakers and the public.

Policymakers are often stymied by bureaucrats and other panjandrums. The public could be well served by bringing Covid-prevention unfriendly administrative practices to an end.

Discipline key to curbing COVID

ri Lankans know how the Government controlled the first COVID-19 wave in March last year. We saw it with our own eyes. Now we see and hear everything very clearly and there is a very clear difference between then and now. But this is not about the difference. This is all about the bitter hidden truth exposed here in Sri Lanka with the outbreak of the 'third wave' of COVID-19 which came at the end of the Sinhala and Tamil New Year.

Sincerely trusting and believing Sri Lankan citizens, the Government even gave Rs. 5,000 for needy families to celebrate the New Year. But the outcome exposed the real nature of almost all Sri Lankans no matter whether they are rich or poor, educated or uneducated, Sinhalese or any other ethnicity or belonging to whatever religion. They exposed their real nature last month.

Although the Government, Armed Forces, health authorities and all highly praised the Sri Lankan people all the time for cooperating with COVID-19 health guidelines, it was not their discipline, understanding or willingness that saved the country from COVID-19 last year. It was blood, tears and sweat of health authorities, Armed Forces and all relevant public servants and strict rules and regulations which saved the country. The public contribution towards controlling COVID-19 in Sri Lanka last year was minimal and it was not visible to the country and the world due to strictly imposed rules and regulations. The fear of an unknown disease also contributed to the excellent control. But the reality was sadly exposed at the end of last month (April).

The real nature of Sri Lankans is now clearly visible. They do not have any control over their own behaviour. They maintain mindfulness rarely. The only thing they are waiting for is strict rules and regulations just because individually they do not have any control over themselves. They do nothing themselves. The best examples for this situation can be seen right now. Almost all want to lock down the entire country or provinces or at least districts. Without locking down no one is willing to control themselves.

This is because of their nature which was hidden for almost one year. The ugliest part is that they make fun of the Indian people who are suffering from a deadly outbreak of COVID right now.

The private hospitals have already announced that they do not have any more capacity to accommodate COVID-19 patients and the same fact was announced by the Chief Epidemiologist last week in connection with State hospitals and other State health institutions. But still the number of COVID-19 patients detected from Sri Lanka is rapidly increasing. It means no one is interested in those crucial announcements which have a direct impact on every Sri Lankan's life. The people seem to be deaf and blind. Oxygen will be useless without medical care and it is shown on television through visuals obtained from India 24x7. But still the COVID-19 patients detected from Sri Lankan keep going up day by day.

The other ugly side of some Sri Lankan people was displayed recently in Piliyandala. It was the residents who demanded that the area politicians keep their highly affected areas open to carry on their businesses, etc. They are a part of the society and not a group that came from another planet. Unfortunately the media only sees the role of the politician and does not

see the connection of the public to the same issue. If the people of Piliyandala are well disciplined and behaved well during this pandemic, keeping or locking down an area will not make any difference. If all concerned people lock their homes down, the businessmen and all who are making money will have no place to go and there will be no one to buy their stuff. But the irresponsible behaviour of the people makes all the difference. How can people come into streets and sell things if all households are tightly locked and all family members stay inside? Traders do business because there are customers. Well-disciplined people can teach good lessons to all. But our society is waiting eagerly to sneak out and move freely without following any health guidelines. They are waiting for the loopholes of the

While people are struggling desperately to save themselves from COVID-19 the relevant authorities who provide private and state-owned transport to people are making it hard by reducing the number of buses and trains deployed to transport passengers. Even the State and private sectors have been asked to use a minimum staff. Still some people need to go to work because they want to save their jobs during this hard time. Therefore they risk their lives to travel in congested buses and trains. It was clearly visible on almost all television channels and newspaper photographs published last week. It seems making money out of people's plight is still going on without any change no matter how hard one tries

to stop it. The other lucrative business is introducing various Western and Ayurvedic drugs claiming that they save lives from COVID-19. Almost all social media feeds are full of posts for such 'drugs'.

Some people have already spent thousands of rupees to buy those useless but expensive substances which do not harm the body and do nothing to prevent or reduce the severity of COVID-19. Almost all relevant authorities and institutions responsible to protect people from such products keep mum about those products. Consultants from IDH have to come forward and educate the people about them in the middle of their battle to save the lives of COVID-19 patients.

Last week some foreign media reported how an Indian female television announcer was stabbed to death on the road in broad daylight after she pointed out how a certain festival spurred the spread of the latest COVID-19 wave in India which now has a significant impact on neighboring countries such as Nepal, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh. The visual of this murder shows how people simply ignored the incident and just look away and walk away without rescuing

In the past we saw how thousands of Sri Lankans from all walks of life violated almost all health guidelines and gathered to buy a strange syrup concocted by a person apparently using supernatural powers 'given' by a goddess. By now almost all relevant authorities have proved (through science and verification) that this 'magic potion' cannot heal COVID-19 patients. When we consider these incidents we can realise how both Sri Lankans and Indians believe myths and chase after myths totally ignoring science. But so far in the world no myth has performed a miracle. Healers in all religions have failed to cure COVID or for that matter, any other

According to the international media, there are loads of all required medical equipment and stocks of oxygen in Indian airports and other stores for over a week without clearance. Those media reports pointed out how the existing political and administrative system of India prevents such essential life-saving stuff from reaching the innocent people. The same media reports pointed out how the Central Government and States of India which combine to form a federal system prevent life-saving essential items from reaching innocent people who are dying in the thousands day by day since the start of the new COVID-19 wave. The politicians are busy with their personal

Fortunately Sri Lanka will not face the same situation or may be such a situation can be controlled successfully due to the non-operation of Provincial Councils save for the Governors. Fortunately COVID-19 has postponed the comeback of this troubled system. Otherwise this unsuitable system which was introduced into the Sri Lankan administrative system by force in 1987 under the UNP regime in the middle of a huge protest by almost all Sri Lankans will add fuel to the destructive fire kept alive by the bureaucracy in Sri Lanka.

We have only one question for all Sri Lankans. Why are some health officials and people shouting from their rooftops demanding a countrywide lockdown when New Zealanders can control it even without full vaccination? (The country has so far inoculated only around 90,000 out of a five million population). If New Zealanders can wear masks properly all the time and keep the social distance why cannot Sri Lankans do it? If New Zealanders can keep hand hygiene why cannot we do it? Masks used in New Zealand are the same ones available in Sri Lanka and the soap varieties are no different. It is the same set of health guidelines that applies all over the world. It is same cost and the same way. There is no difference at all. The only difference is in the discipline of the people.

Trying to be a New Zealander these days will save lives while trying to be an Indian will definitely offer a lonely end. This is what every Sri Lankan should keep in mind until vaccination is completed and the latest COVID-19 wave fades away.

Colombo Port City:

Towards another Asian Financial Hub

he Supreme Court's (SC) determination on the proposed Colombo Port City Economic Commission (PCEC) Bill will be placed before Parliament on May 18, paving the way for the Act to establish the Commission, with any amendments in accordance with the Judiciary's verdict. The Supreme Court conveyed its decision to Speaker Mahinda Yapa Abeywardena, who will discuss with Party Leaders on May 18, on fixing a date to debate the Bill.

The Bill provides for the establishment of a Commission empowered to grant registrations, licenses, authorisations, and other approvals to carry on businesses and other activities in the Special Economic Zone (SEZ) to be established within the Colombo Port City. Several petitions were filed in the SC challenging the Bill on grounds that some of its clauses are inconsistent with the Constitution. A high-powered five-member Commission to administer the Port City will be set up after the Bill is approved by Parliament

While the Government stressed the need for a powerful commission to attract foreign investments, some of the petitioners stated that the setting up of a separate commission is unconsti-



tutional and the zone would become a 'Chinese Colony'.

The Additional Solicitor General, appearing for the Attorney General's Department, informed the Supreme Court that the Government had decided to add several Amendments to the Bill at the Parliamentary Committee Stage. The Additional Solicitor General presented the amendments to the five-judge bench via a document and said that the proposed Bill does not reduce the powers of regulators, such as the Central Bank.

Chief Justice Jayantha Jayasuriya making short remarks at the end of the submissions said the Bill does not seek to give concessions directly to investors and that the Port City Commission will be required to get tax holidays approved by the Cabinet and these will also be submitted to Parliament.

The Supreme Court ruling will open the pathway for the Government to take required steps to modify the Bill if the Supreme Court rules that any of its clauses are in contravention of the

Constitution. The Court will also decide if the Bill could be passed by a simple majority or a two-thirds majority in Parliament or whether further approval at a national referendum and/or approval by the Provincial Councils is required.

The early passage of the Colombo Port City Commission new law governing a reclaimed extension to the capital's Central Business District (CBD) is vital for the economy as it would pave the way to sell 20 plots of land bringing about US\$ 5 billion worth of investment to Sri Lanka.

The Bill, titled Colombo Port City Economic Commission, was tabled in Parliament last week, outlining proposed laws for the US\$ 1.4 billion Port City being built on reclaimed land at Colombo's seafront. Three Opposition parties, Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB), Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP) and the United National Party (UNP), a foreign-funded NGO and some labour organizations have challenged the constitutional validity of the proposed legislation.

Government took effective steps to expedite the Port City project, which would attract US\$ 15 billion in initial investments, and emerge as a leading business, retail, residential and tourist destination in South Asia. CHEC Port City Colombo, a joint venture with the State and the China Harbour Engineering Corporation has 100 hectares of land ready for construction. In the next five-year strategic plan, 20 plots in a total of 60 hectares of land adjacent to Colombo's CBD have been identified for the pilot projects.

The Colombo Port City Commission Bill envisages giving extensive powers to approve investments without going to the Board of Investment (BOI), give tax breaks and regulate businesses in the most far-reaching one-stop-shop designed so far. It is expected to address several problems in Sri Lanka's ease of doing business indicators that had kept back Foreign Direct Investments (FDI).

A spokesman for CHEC Port City Colombo said 40 out of 74 buildable plots of land are allocated for commercial development which will bring investments and business activities while 34 plots are for residential use. Out of 269 hectares reclaimed, China Harbour will get 113 hectares, 91 will be common areas vested in the Government and the balance 60 odd hectares are land the Government can sell and earn revenue.

In designing the Port City plan, significant emphasis was given to create a vibrant Business Hub District, because of its extension to the Colombo CBD. It is no secret that Sri Lanka's current economic growth would not be sufficient to drive demand. Therefore, businesses have to

International trade, logistics operations, hospitality and tourism are considered natural strengths of Sri Lanka. The Port has identified ICT/ BPM, offshore banking, private equity, wealth management and investment banking as priority sectors, the CHEC spokesman stated

However, all these plans for project implementation could only commence after the legal aspects are cleared in accordance with the Supreme Court decisions on the petition. Then the Port City Bill, as it is or with amendments, if any, could be proceeded with.

The Colombo Port City Special Economic Zone (SEZ) is expected to create a conducive and competitive environment for attracting FDIs. Urban Development via SEZs is not unique to Sri Lanka and there are many successful SEZs in the world. SEZs have been a useful tool for developing nations to upgrade infrastructure, human capital and institutional frameworks and test out policies and their impact before they are selectively implemented outside the SEZ in the rest of the country.

Once the Commission Bill and other modalities are completed, Sri Lanka has the potential to offer market connections across the Middle East, East Africa and Asia-Pacific, with the Port City offering access and opportunities for groups and corporate figures across all of these regions. The Porto EU-India summit:

Let's not forget South Asia

In Porto in Portugal, where for the first time all the leaders of the EU and its member states will meet (albeit virtually) Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, there is an opportunity to add a new impetus to the relationships between Europe and India. There is also a chance to provide practical guidance to the EU Commission and the high representative for the joint communication on the EU Strategy for Cooperation in the Indo-Pacific – to be published in September.

The way this document will be finalised will represent the key test against which the real ambitions of the EU in the Asia-Pacific region will be assessed.

Once central question: Will the formal pledges and generic ambiguity of the Council conclusions be turned into an ambitious agenda of action, blending together different visions for a very diverse and vast region?

On the one hand, there are now major efforts being undertaken in an increasingly relevant south-east Asia where the EU has recently stepped up its cooperation with the ASEAN community and, on the other hand, there is the strategic need to bring to even further level the relationships with Japan and South Korea in the defence and foreign affairs domains without

forgetting the Pacific where China has shown signs of greater assertiveness.

Amid this urgent need to reconcile and meld together different subregional interests, the EU should not set aside its commitment towards South Asia and the summit in Porto could help reassert the role Europe can play in promoting stability, prosperity and respect for human rights within the sub-continent, more from a strategic view rather than only through a sole developmental lens so far dominating the relationships.

There might be a problem here as India has always been jealous of its special relations with its neighbourhood, always acting, despite some pushbacks from its regional counterparts, as the dominant player, at least till the rise to power of President Xi Jinping of China.

With China reclaiming its role in South Asia, it might be the time for Prime Minister Modi to welcome a stronger engagement of the EU there, endorsing a more strategic role of the Europeans in the region.

That is why it is of absolute importance that the discussions in Porto also cover the entire South Asia from a strategic perspective, promoting the 'multidimensional' approach (though inevitably less ambitious) that India and the EU were able to forge together in the last five years.

The now widespread consensus

that expanding what was just an economic cooperation into a much more complete and strategic relationship (though, legally speaking, there is still an obsolete Cooperation Agreement signed in 1994 in place) is in the strategic interests of both India and EU, and should also pave the way for a joint partnership between the two in the South Asia.

Such collaboration could be aligned to the some of the anchors upon which the EU and India are building their relationship, namely green connectivity and climate action and sustainable development.

For example, a country like Nepal has an ambitious social and economic development agenda and the private sector there is eager to do its part with billions of dollars of investments to achieve its National Economic Transformation 2030.

Foundational to a new EU's engagement in the region is the huge demand for infrastructural financing as interregional connectivity projects struggle to take off due to tensions in the past between Pakistan and India, general lack of political will and bureaucratic paralysis.

Flooding and forest fires

Equally daunting is the challenge to cover the massive costs of climate action as the region is one of most

vulnerable in the world to climate change with recurrent patterns of flooding and forest fires.

According to the World Bank "between 1990 and 2019, more than 1,000 climate-induced disasters in south Asia affected 1.7 billion people and caused more than US\$ 127 billion (€106 billion) in damages", creating more poverty, as "climate change could drive 62 million people in South Asia into extreme poverty; floods alone could cost an estimated US\$ 215 billion annually by 2030".


Estimates from the Asian Developing Bank hold that "infrastructure needs in developing Asia and the Pacific will exceed US\$ 22.6 trillion through 2030, or US\$ 1.5 trillion per year" and South Asia has some of the weakest levels of connectivity.

While both India and China have ambitious plans in the region from the infrastructural point of view, the EU through the European Investment Bank (EIB), could play an important role as well in South Asia especially now that there are high expectations that the EIB will further step in to support the EU's connectivity agenda in India, enlarging its already consistent portfolio of projects there.

Moreover now that the pandemic has once again struck the region in a much stronger fashion, there is an overall case for the EU to further engage South Asia, helping "build forward better", backing a re-booting of national economies of the region of advance this agenda.

Forging an EU 'Partnership Framework for South Asia' with the full buy in of India will surely be seen with suspicion and perhaps hostility by Beijing but this development instead could be framed in the logic of mutual interest, a chance to help a region in need through less cut throat competition and more cooperation.

Lastly, being explicit with Prime Minister Modi on the interest of an enhanced presence of Europe in the Sub-Continent might also induce India to bring the South Asian Association of Regional Cooperation (SAARC) out of life support. (EU Observer)



Roots of Maldives' Violent Politics

The May 6 attempt on the life of Speaker and former President Nasheed is the latest in a political history of intense factionalism and Islamic radicalism

he Maldives, which is an Indian Ocean archipelago, is a tiny country of only 530,000 people. Its politics is dominated by a few elite families, many of whom are related to each other. Yet, it is intensely faction-ridden and violence-prone, to boot.

Added to the combustible mixture is Islamic radicalism. According to the US State Department, an estimated 200 Maldivians, were fighting in Syria and Iraq in 2019, making their country the world's second largest supplier of foreign fighters per capita, after Tuni-

The latest in a long of series of violent political incidents was the blast which occurred on Thursday, May 6, at the capital Male. At 8.23 pm, a nonmilitary Improvised Explosive Device (IED) fixed to a motorcycle parked near Parliament Speaker Mohamed Nasheed's car, went off, critically injuring him and three others including a bodyguard.

On Friday and Saturday, as Nasheed was undergoing multiple operations at the ADK Hospital to remove shrapnel from

the head, chest and other parts of his body, the Police said that they had identified the two arrested suspects as Thahmeen

Ahmed (32) and Mujaz Ahmed

(21). But the main suspect, the

man who triggered the blast, is

still at large. The Head of the Crime Investigation Department, Assistant Commissioner of Police Mohamed Riyaz said both Thahmeen and Mujaz have past crime records. While Mujaz is suspected to be directly linked with the person who detonated the IED, Thahmeen is the owner of the motorcycle to which the IED had been strapped.

Police Commissioner Mohamed Hameed said the two suspects belonged to a "dangerous extremist ideology" and would not hesitate to kill. He did not elaborate in the absence of precise information.

The police released three images of the main suspect taken from CCTV cameras. He was in direct view of Nasheed's home street when the explosion took place. The police believe that it was he who detonated the IED and have asked for public assistance to establish his

The medical team that treated Nasheed said on Saturday that the metal ball bearings used in the blast had caused significant internal damage, but had missed major organs and arteries. Maldives' first democraticallyelected President, was deposed and exiled in 2012 in what he called a 'coup'. In 2015, former President Abdulla Yameen escaped unharmed after an explosion on his speedboat. In 2007, a blast blamed on Islamist militants targeted foreign tourists and injured twelve.

On Thursday night, Nasheed's supporters in the ruling Maldivian Democratic Party (MDP) gathered outside the ADK Hospital and shouted slogans calling for the ouster of the police and army chiefs and also the resignation of President Ibrahim Solih, local sources said.

The demand for Solih's resignation reflects deepening factionalism in the MDP, with one group supporting Nasheed and another supporting Solih. The Maldivian police chief is a close relation of the President. The Army Chief too is the President's appointee. In the Maldivian system, the Army (Maldivian Defense Force) is responsible for the personal security of top leaders. Hence the demand for the army's chief's scalp.

It was perhaps to deflect p sible accusations of bias in the investigations that President Solih announced that the Government would get the assistance of the Australian Federal Police.

Citing the report, Speaker Mohamed Nasheed said that the Police knew the facts at the time of the murder but claimed that the killing was politically motivated and tried to blame the main opposition Maldivian Democratic Party. Nasheed said that the report named NGO Salaf and a YouTube channel among other groups which incited hatred against Dr. Afrasheem, who was dubbed "Dr. Ibilees" (Dr. Satan).

The inquiry commission revealed that the same radical group was behind the Sultan Park bombing in Male in 2007, in which 12 foreign tourists were wounded. Islamic zealots had abducted journalist Ahmed Rilwan in August 2014 and had murdered blogger Yameen Rasheed in April 2017.

Sections of the MDP believe that both the Army and the Police have been infiltrated by Islamic radicals. "Nothing will come out of the on-going probe," one of them, who is holding a government position, said dejectedly.

Human Rights Watch had said that senior officials, police, and judges had actively derailed earlier investigations into abduction and murder cases. Among them was a former Vice President Ahmed

According to the US Department of State, the Presidential Commission's draft report had alleged that Adeeb intervened with the then Criminal Court Judge Abdulla Didi to free individuals who assisted and carried out journalist Rilwan's abduction in 2014. Adeeb was arrested on suspicion that he was linked to the attempt to assassinate President Abdulla Yameen in 2015. (Eurasia Review)

Bomb blast in Sultan Park

The first bomb blast in the country occurred in Male's Sultan Park at the height of the pro-democracy movement and protests in 2007, injuring 12 foreign tourists. Though the administration of President Maumoon Abdul Gayoom sought to link it to the fledgling democracy movement that supposedly wanted to 'wreck [the] tourism economy', the police arrested a few Islamic radicals from an island, not long after, thus, acknowledging it as an act of radicalism.

Since then, international analysts have been talking about increased fundamentalism and extremism in the archipelagonation. The Yameen administration acknowledged that Maldivian youths were fighting with the ISIS in Syria, and put the number at around 50, including some dead. The collapse of the ISIS in Syria meant that some of the disillusioned militants returned home – purportedly to lead a new life.

Earlier in 2015, the Malaysian police revealed that three Maldivian youths were being prepared to target the US and Israeli consulates in Chennai and Bengaluru, both in South India. The US armed forces had detained a few Maldivian youths fighting with the Al-Qaeda along the Afghanistan-Pakistan border.

Ever since these two episodes and one another in Mumbai occurred, the Indian security agencies have been on high alert, and have been working with their Maldivian counterparts to thwart all such moves.

In April last year, ISIS claimed responsibility for an arson incident in the island, in which four speedboats, a sea ambulance and two dinghies that were docked adjacent to each other were burnt at night. The Maldivian police initially dismissed it as a "retaliatory attack for recent investigations into drug trafficking and religious extremism". In doing so, the authorities acknowledged the existence of religious extremism in the country but denied ISIS presence or involvement.

The incident occurred months after the August 2019 report of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry that delved into the spread of fundamentalism and extremism in the nation. Holding Al-Qaeda and ISIS affiliates responsible for the disappearance and assumed killing of a 'liberal' journalist in 2014, the Commission said 'Al-Qaeda and ISIS affiliates' operated in the country, and that the latter was only a breakaway group of the former.

The Solih Government began following up on the Commission report by identifying island families that followed radical Islam to the point of keeping their children, especially girls, out of schools, and also conducted MNDF exercises in preparation for possible assaults on terror dens. They also began a re-education programme for these 'radicalised' youths and parents. The government, especially senior police officers, also addressed a national conference of local council members - who are the men on the ground - to create awareness on related matters.

COVID-19 pandemic and its rapid spread seemed to have directed the government's efforts away from tackling Islamic radicalisation. While it is understandable, the injuries to Speaker Nasheed now have revived memories of what remains undone - whatever be the final verdict of the blast investigators.



He called in the Australian police without any loss of time, to assist in the investigations.

As the incident occurred in the midst of the Islamic fasting month of Ramzan, the incident has triggered speculation on extremism in the island, given the Indian Ocean archipelago's growing quota of news and analyses on international Islamic terrorism. Nasheed is the nation's first President to be elected under the multi-party democracy election of 2008. His term ended abruptly in February 2012, in the midst of the nation-wide protests for his

Soon after the blast, Nasheed was wheeled into ADK Hospital in the city which reported that he had suffered multiple injuries but his 'vitals were stable'. At least four other people – three from Nasheed's security detail from the Maldives National Defence Force (MNDF) and one European – also suffered injuries. They



Even as President Solih and other leaders condemned the incident, Parliament met in an emergency session under Deputy Speaker Eva Abdulla, to take stock. Parliament's National Security Committee met to discuss the development even as President Solih called a meeting of the National Security Council (NSC). A clearer picture about the real cause for the blast, the men and their motives – if any behind the episode – will be known only after the investigations make some progress. This is, however, likely to be pushed until after the weekend as the Australian team will arrive on Saturday.

Second VVIP to be under threat

At 53, Nasheed is the second VVIP to face a blast threat of whatever kind in the country. In 2015, Fathimath Ibrahim suffered injuries and President

COVID has pushed away 40 million children from schools - report

Forty million students do not have access to education because of the COVID pandemic, the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund Office of Research (UNICEF)

and the World Food Programne (WFP)

The latest estimates highlight that 24 million schoolchildren are not attending schools throughout the world because of the COVID pandemic.

The report says even before COVID-19, malnutrition has taken a large number of children away from

schools. The 2016 Demographic and Health Survey says the acute malnutrition affects one in six children below five. One in 10 schoolchildren between 6-12 suffer from anemia as well, it says

A research by the UNICEF, WFP and the Health Ministry in 2017 revealed that 40 per cent of children between 6-12 were too frail while 22 per cent between 10 -18 were iron deficient and girls in the same group suffered from an iron deficiency rate three times higher than that of the boys of same age.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, the UNICEF has supported governments to provide nutritious meals for schoolchildren and adolescents. Last year around 25 million children have benefited from programmes that UNICEF launched to prevent anemia among schoolchil-

In Sri Lanka, the UNICEF is assisting the Education Ministry to develop guidelines for authorities and teachers to provide psychosocial support to children. They urge governments to open schools while making sure that the health, food and nutritional needs of children are fulfilled through a comprehensive school healthcare and feeding programmes.

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SOCIETY AT THE INTERSECTION OF SCIENCE, ART AND CULTURE



EXCERPTS FROM A LECTURE DELIVERED BY PROF. ARJUNA PARAKRAMA, SENIOR PROFESSOR OF ENGLISH, UNIVERSITY OF PERADENIYA AT STATE LITERARY AWARDS

n Sri Lanka the State Literary Awards are almost the equivalent of the Oscars. The State Literary Awards are a set of annual literary prizes by the Government of Sri Lanka under several categories. The awards cover fiction, poetry, translations and songs. Works from the Sinhala, Tamil and English languages are reviewed. Here, outstanding individuals who have excelled in these fields are honoured and appreciated for their endeavours annually. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19, the awards ceremony could not be held in 2020; however, it will be held this year with pomp. It is already underway.

The keynote speech is very much a part of the awards ceremony. Throughout the years, it has been a precursor to the awards ceremony itself, both events which are highly anticipated by people from all walks of life, both laymen and scholars. This has become somewhat of a tradition. The keynote speech is of great importance and relevance.

The keynote speech of the State Literary Awards is organized by the Department of Cultural Affairs in partnership with the State Literary Awards Advisory board.

The *Daily News* attended the keynote speech of the State Literary Awards 2020 which was delivered by Prof. Arjuna Parakrama, Senior Professor of English, University of Peradeniya at the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute. The keynote address was delivered in Sinhala on the theme Literature, Criticism and Society: The Need for New Theoretical Approaches and The Challenge They Present.

Prof. Parakrama began his speech with a quotation from the Kalama Sutta which is a discourse of the Buddha. He pointed out that here the Buddha makes a very revolutionary pronouncement saying - "Do not accept something just because it is in a book. Do not accept something just because your teachers say so. Do not accept something just because it is written in some religious books or it is part of your culture. Do not accept something just because someone you respect says so. If one day you realize that it is injurious to society, you should give it up. Accept it if it is beneficial to you and society.'

"In order to do that you have to train your mind. In order to accept something it should not be second hand or third hand information. After you have trained your mind you must be able to determine what is good for you and society. That requires self-understanding, understanding of the world and critical awareness. That is what we need to develop. I also call it training of the imagination. This is what makes the humanities unique. This is what raises the humanities beyond the mundane sciences. There is an argument in the world that the sciences are useful and important and the humanities are a waste of time," said Prof. Parakrama.

He then brought up a couple of points. The training of the humanities imagination or the humanities training of the imagination is different from an appreciation of literature. An appreciation of literature can be just an understanding of the history of literature, such as Shakespeare or Milton. That is not the humanities imagination. The human-





Facets of culture

"Language is not a neutral medium, it is in language that gender issues, ethnic issues, class issues, regional issues and educational issues are fought over and also covered over. Culture is both positive and negative. Just because something is cultural does not make it right or wrong. There are fantastic and wonderful things in any culture and there are also terrible and hierarchical things in any culture. You still have to explain what is the good part and the bad part. I also say that unfortunately or fortunately culture reflects the views and values and benefits of the elite and the authoritarians. Those in power and those who are elite determine culture. That is the danger we have to look out for. If you find that what is cherished really benefits the elite and not the poor and general population, then we have to be able to deconstruct it. It means you pull it apart. Try to examine it on a fundamental basis. That is part of this humanities imagination."

He then added that culture is valuable but it also presents caste and prejudice. It is culture that says that women are unclean during their period and says that virginity is important for women but not for men. Culture entrenches all these hierarchies. And we tend to worship culture. Every culture is evolving but there are parts of the culture that are dying away. So we have to determine what is inappropriate and what is emergent that we must look at. Emergent parts are things that would adapt to the new society. A good example would be a nuclear family as against the extended family. The extended family is suited for farming communities and agrarian communities who are in the same location all their lives. But with modernization, when people have to come to the cities to work and people go abroad then the nuclear family becomes more important. Sometimes you don't meet your relatives for years. So that is a change which is not good



When things are enforced on us we call it dominance. You need the police to enforce traffic rules. Hegemony is when we internalize a belief. Hegemony is the way we are governed. We are governed after we are convinced that it is good for us. That is a big issue. We are taught to think it is good for us but it might really not be very good for us. We believe, for example, through hegemony, that if everyone studies they can be doctors and engineers. We believe this story. Of course, if you think carefully you know that

that is impossible. "Every mother and father tells their children you have to study and become a doctor. But that is humanly impossible. But if you believe the myth that is an incentive for the more foolish of us to study for. But there are people who don't buy into this hegemony and for whom there is no hegemony. Then there is no acceptance. The acceptance of these things that control us makes us easily governable. We have bought into the idea that the more people support something the better it is. The people who don't buy into hegemony and who are not fooled by hegemony are the least educated and the least sophisticated of us. They are ostracized. This is because they do not understand our stories. For example, that democracy is a good thing; we have to listen to what the majority says. They do not buy into this. So let us study this group of people to try to unlearn some of these ideas that we have started learning and we believe in, but which is not the truth or may not be the truth," explained Prof. Parakrama.

A lack of creativity

"It would be nice if studying humanities makes someone better but that does not happen. There is nothing inherent in humanities that make them better. You can be a wonderful poet and a horrible human being. Humanities are not magical that the moment you learn it you become a good person. What it is, is a training of the imagination. A training of the imagination to bypass and avoid the pitfalls and traps of things like hegemony. It is something like what the Buddha said

in his Kalama Sutta. Ven. Walpola Rahula Thera is very tough on that point saying that we are creating slaves. We do not encourage creativity and we do not encourage innovation. We don't encourage criticism. This is

what the humanities should be doing." "One of the facets of humanities is to undermine the idea that Nationalism, particularly Dominant Nationalism is somehow inherently good. That it is natural, that it is trans-historical (transcending historical boundaries) and that it is non-ideological. It is natural to love your country, it is natural to think your country is the best, it is natural to defend your country against everyone else, it is natural to think that Nationalism affects everybody equally. Nationalism like culture can be unequal, discriminatory, hierarchical and plain and simple wrong. It is the humanities that can undo this. It is humanities imagination that can imagine a world outside of this petty Nationalism, that can imagine a world that is international. We cannot accept without question the idea that the nation is important," added Prof. Par-

Here he quotes Hugo of St. Victor, who is a 12th century monk. He says, 'The person who loves his country is a novice. He is a beginner. The person who loves the whole world as his own is better. But the complete person is one to whom every place is like a foreign place.' Prof. Parakrama presents the following argument: "The first assumption is common, thinking that yours or ours is the best. According to the second assumption, it is better and more enlightened to say that every place is home. The third assumption is that even my home and my non-home are both foreign to me. That third assumption is complicated to understand, that is, that the familiarity of a home (and even if the home is the whole world) is both misleading and problematic. To tread even in your home as a foreigner – then you tread with care, then you will see the new in the old, old in the new and habits will not blunt your insight. When you are familiar or too accustomed to something, then it blunts your insight. Your critical faculties are at its best when you see everyone as a foreigner or as an outsider."

Science

"Nationalism is what is killing us. There are different kinds of Nationalism. All equally horrendous and tearing us apart. Otherwise intelligent people are not thinking clearly because of Nationalism. Whether something is local or foreign does not matter. The origin is important but not too important. There are local aspects which are terrible and local aspects which are wonderful. There are things that are foreign which are terrible and things that are foreign that are wonderful. We cannot say because it is foreign it is bad and because it is local it is good. Do not get misled by who brings the message. Whether it is local or foreign. It is our duty

to examine the content of the message and not blame the messenger," said Prof. Parakrama


He explained that this idea of saving the nation and national security is used in the US in order to curtail the freedom of American citizens. That won't do. The humanities imagination should see through that. Nationalism is not the greatest good in the world. Nationalism can be good or bad. Hermann Wilhelm Göring, at the Nuremberg trials, was asked how did you manage to get the Germans to come to war? He said, 'It is very easy and in fact it will work in any country in the world. All you have to say is that our country is being invaded by a foreign power. All those who are patriots will defend the country. And all those who don't are traitors. It will work anywhere.'

"Can you see how simple the formula is? All you have to say is that they are invading. No one will bother to ask, are they really invading or not? All you have to say is that they are invading. People make a mistake when they say that scientists can govern a country. This is because they think governing a country is based on facts. But when you are dealing with human beings you need more than facts. You need to understand society. You need to engage with society. And what you need is judgement and science cannot give you judgement, because there are no rules for judgment."

He went on to say that sometimes as human beings we act in our best interests sometimes, we act in our worst interests, we do both at the same time and we are confused sometimes. So what is required is not really scientific people but people who can make judgement.

"Science is used in two senses. It is used to describe physics, biology and chemistry and other branches. Science was also used from the 14th century to the 19th century to mean evidence based. So when we say scientific we are not referring to those branches, we mean it is evidence based. This is a part of humanities as well. We can even argue that humanities are more scientific. If you take the idea of clarity, now we all think clarity is a universal good. We think that things must be clear."

"So here I use the example of Mona Lisa. Leonardo Da Vinci took a lot of time on that picture. The hands are perfect and then he took about three months to blur the mouth. The power of the picture is that you do not know if she is smiling or not. Whether she is sad or whether she is not. The lack of clarity is its beauty. If somebody is clear about a thing like death then their work is viewed as simplistic or the work of a nutcase. Just think about the sunset. The beautiful colours are blurred into each other. If someone said the scene is not clear and he or she wants to see the colours separately, you would think to yourself – what a fool. The beauty is its lack of clarity. The beauty is in blurring it. Some of the nicest portraits I have seen are portraits which are blurred. This is because they capture something else. So even the

COVID-19: The worldwide battle for Oxygen

The latest horror of the pandemic is that large numbers of people around the world are dying for lack of access to medical oxygen, especially in India. Each day, tens of thousands of people are admitted to hospitals with Covid-19, driving the demand for the oxygen far beyond the supply.

Oxygen makes up 21 percent of the atmosphere. A handful of companies capture and purify it in bulk, but they sell most of it to industry. Many poorer parts of the world lack the infrastructure needed to deliver or make use of the medical grade supplies those companies sell, which are designed to be delivered via pipes to hospital rooms.

Some hospitals and clinics have machines that produce purified oxygen at a much smaller scale, but they are in short supply. So many hospitals and patients in poor countries and in remote areas rely on the most expensive option: oxygen tanks that have became scarce in the countries hit hardest by the virus.

The shortages affect patients with every kind of respiratory ailment requiring oxygen, not just those with Covid.

The World Health Organization said in February that \$1.6 billion would be needed to remedy the oxygen shortage for a year; now that estimate is up to \$6.5 billion. Efforts to raise that money have faltered, though it is a small fraction of what has been spent on vaccines and financial support for businesses and workers.

Here are answers to some of the questions being asked about the oxygen crisis.

Given the enormous, and obvious, need for oxygen during a pandemic affecting the respiratory system, the crisis should not have come as a surprise. But in a year when policymakers lurched from one pandemic challenge to another — P.P.E. shortages, lockdowns, the threat of economic collapse, remote schooling, therapeutics, vaccines — oxygen supply never rose to the top of the list.

"Oxygen hasn't been sufficiently prioritized," said Robert Matiru, program director at Unitaid, one of the global public health groups working to address the shortage with the World Health Organization.

Even before the pandemic, some poorer regions were unable to ensure adequate supplies. But it was not until early this year, when lethal oxygen shortages hit northern Brazil, Mexico and elsewhere, that it became clear that what had been seen as a potential problem was becoming a dire emergency. The World Health Organization created an emergency task force on the oxygen shortage and called for money to address it.

Then the pandemic surged in India, where it had been relatively contained, pushing xygen supplies to the center of the world's attention. India's official count of new coronavirus infections leapt from an average of about 11,000 a day in mid-February to a daily average of more than 370,000 in the past week — and experts say the true figure is far

In the last two months, the unmet, global need for medical oxygen has more than tripled, from less than 9 million cubic meters a day to more than 28 million, according to a coalition of aid groups that are tracking the crisis

About half of that unmet need is in India. And health advocates warn that the calamity there could be repeated in other countries.

In wealthy countries, hospitals generally rely on tanker trucks to make bulk deliveries of liquid oxygen, far denser than regular air, that is stored in large containers. A system of pipes draws out the gas, allows it to expand to ordinary density and delivers it to each bedside.

This is by far the most cost-effective way of supplying oxygen, and companies that supply bulk oxygen have enough production capacity to meet the global medical demand for it. In just the last few weeks, some of them have begun ramping up their production of medical gas by diverting some from industry, whose gas has somewhat different requirements.

India's government has ordered the producers there to temporarily direct all of their oxygen output to medical needs.

But many hospitals around the world are not equipped to make use of liquid oxygen, lacking the pipes to distribute it to patients, and there is no delivery system in place for many remote loca-

Oxygen can also be obtained in less dense gaseous form, in cylinders that need to be refilled more often. This is often the most expensive option — it can cost 10 times as much as bulk liquid oxygen — but it is the only one available to many parts of the developing world.

tions.

In many countries, people have scrambled to buy or refill such cylinders for their family members, but demand has far outstripped

Some hospitals have their own plants to extract oxygen from the air, a technology known as pressure swing absorption, or P.S.A. But the systems are expensive, and a hospital that buys one would also have to install a system of pipes to deliver the oxygen to bedsides.

There are also small devices called oxygen concentrators that can serve a single patient or a few. Though one can cost several hundred dollars, a high hurdle in poorer countries, demand for them $\,$ has so ared faster than manufacturers can produce them.

Public health advocates say hospitals should have P.S.A. plants and the piping to go with them, but in poor countries that solution can be cost prohibitive, achievable only with international aid. India's government plans to install the equipment in hundreds of hospitals, but that could take months. Companies that make P.S.A. plants and oxygen concentrators are ramping up production around the world, but that, too, takes time.

Bulk oxygen producers and governments are still trying to adjust supply chains to get the lifesaving gas where it is needed most. In India, the government is using trains and even military transport planes to get oxygen to the sick.

If enough money were available, governments and international groups could have advance-purchase agreements with bulk suppliers, and emergency stores of oxygen could be stationed in various parts of the world and deployed as needed.

If nothing else, the last few months have made clear the difficulty of trying to increase oxygen supplies on short notice, amid a cri-

Instead, Mr. Matiru said, the world should invest in preparation, "so that if there's a surge we can press 'Go."

Pakistan begins nine-day lockdown

Pakistan on Saturday began a nine-day shutdown affecting travel and tourist hotspots in a bid to prevent a surge in COVID-19 cases during the Muslim holiday of Eid al-Fitr.

Already battling a third wave of infections and increasingly nervous about the crisis across the border in India, the government has imposed the most severe restrictions since a one-month lockdown in April last year.

"From today all businesses across the country will be closed. People will not be allowed to go

into the markets to do their shopping for Eid," Al Jazeera's Kamal Hyder reported from the capital, Islamabad. Hyder said the Pakistani government feared that it will not be able to cope due to a possible lack of ventilators and oxygen if the "situation sees the likes of which India is confronting".

Asad Umar, the planning minister who is responsible for leading Pakistan's pandemic response, said Pakistan was facing a "dangerous situation".

"These measures have been necessitated by the extremely dangerous situation which has been created in the region with the spread of virulent mutations of the virus," Umar said on Twitter, add-

ing the country needed to "unite".

Eid, which comes at the end of the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, usually sees the mass movement of people around the country and tourist spots crowded with Pakistanis. Last year the country saw a spike in cases in the weeks after the celebrations.

Businesses, hotels and restaurants, as well as markets and parks will be closed, while public transport between provinces and within cities has been halted.

The military has been mobilised to monitor the restrictions.

Mosques, however, will remain open. Authorities fear curbs on places of worship could ignite confrontation in the deeply conserva-

tive Muslim republic.
Impoverished Pakistan has recorded more than 850,000 infections and 18,600 deaths, but with limited testing and a deprived healthcare sector, many fear the true extent of the disease is much worse. (Al Jazeera)

Vaccine confidence rises

The US has an opportunity to get ahead in the Covid-19 pandemic by getting more people vaccinated -- and three key things can help address ongoing concerns, one

"People were worried about safety, we now have hundreds of millions of doses out there, so we have great data on safety," emergency medical physician Dr. Anand Swaminathan told CNN on Saturday. "People were worried about efficacy," he said, adding there is now real-world data showing how effective the vaccines are.

And finally, Swaminathan said, some Americans were concerned that the vaccines didn't have approval from the Food and Drug Administration and had only received emergency use authorization. But Pfizer/ BioNTech announced Friday they have initiated an application to the agency for full FDA approval of their vaccine for people 16 and older -- making it the first Covid-19 vaccine in the US to be assessed for full approval from the FDA.

'What's the difference between FDA emergency use authorization and full approval? It's really time and money," infectious disease specialist and epidemiologist Dr. Céline Gounder told CNN on Saturday.

"But for some people, seeing a full approval from the FDA will indeed give them more confidence that these vaccines

More than 151 million Americans -roughly 45.6% of the US population -- have received at least one Covid-19 vaccine dose, according to data from the Centers for Dis-

More than 112 million Americans -- nearly 34% are fully vaccinated. For officials across the country, getting more Americans vaccinated will now be an uphill battle, as experts say the US has reached the crowds who weren't as eager to get a shot or still have questions. (CNN)

That was despite increasing evidence that tiny virus particles could remain suspended in the air even after the infected person left a location. "C.D.C. has now caught up to the latest scientific evidence, and they've gotten rid of some old problematic terms and thinking about how transmission occurs," Linsey Marr, an aerosol expert at Virginia Tech, tells the New York Times. Despite the change, some aerosol experts continue to say the CDC hasn't gone far enough because it continues to say that transmission from far away is "uncommon," which Marr said was "misleading and potentially harmful" because "if you're in a poorly ventilated environment, virus is going to build up in the air. and everyone who's in that room is going to be exposed." The CDC's wording "will lead people to continue to think that maintaining distance is sufficient to prevent transmission," reads an open letter signed by seven experts, including Marr. "We know that transmission at distances beyond 6 feet occurs because of superspreader events, careful studies of smaller outbreaks, and the physics of aerosols. It can easily happen indoors in a poorly ventilated environment, when people are not wearing masks.'

The change in wording has important implications and illustrates how good ventilation in indoor spaces is key to prevent transmission of the virus and people can stop worrying about cleaning surfaces so much. But the basics remain the same. "Although how we understand transmission occurs has shifted, the ways to prevent infection with this virus have not," notes the CDC. "All prevention measures that CDC recommends remain effective for these forms of transmission." (Slate)

Ivermectin a potential cure for COVID

A peer-reviewed research has claimed that global ivermectin use can end the COVID-19 pandemic, as the medicine significantly reduces the risk of contracting the deadly respiratory disease when used regularly.

The common antiparasitic ivermectin is being touted as a miracle cure for COVID-19 by doctors and campaigners the world over.

Peer reviewed by medical experts that included three US government senior scientists and published in the American Journal of Therapeutics, the research is the most comprehensive review of the available data taken from clinical, in vitro, animal, and real-world studies.

Led by the Front Line COVID-19 Critical Care Alliance (FLCCC), a group of medical and scientific experts reviewed published peer-reviewed studies, manuscripts, expert meta-analyses, and epidemiological analyses of regions with ivermectin distribution efforts all showing that ivermectin is an effective prophylaxis and treatment for COVID-

"We did the work that the medical authorities failed to do, we conducted the most comprehensive review of the available data on ivermectin," said Pierre Kory, MD, president and chief medical officer of the FLCCC. "We applied the gold standard to qualify the data reviewed



before concluding that ivermectin can end this pandemic."

A focus of the manuscript was on the 27 controlled trials available in January 2021, 15 of which were randomised controlled tri-

Consistent with numerous meta-analyses of ivermectin RCT's since published by expert panels from the UK, Italy, Spain and Japan, they found a large, statistically significant reduction in mortality, time to recovery, and viral clearance in COVID-19 patients treated with ivermectin.

"Our latest research shows, once again, that when the totality of the evidence is examined, there is no doubt that ivermectin is highly effective as a safe prophylaxis and treatment for COVID-19," said Paul E. Marik, founding member of the FLCCC and Chief, Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine at Eastern Virginia Medical School.

In the same year he participated in the Malaysian National Athletics Championships, World Junior Athletics Championships held in Canada and the Asian Junior Athletics Championships held in Singapore.

Thereafter, he participated in an invitation meet in Malaysia and won the Gold Medal in the 100metres and 200metres events.

Sriyantha's coaches were Lakshman de Alwis and S. M. G. Bandara. He served as a Cadet Officer in the Army for a short while and later joined Ceylinco Group as a Junior Executive.

Thiwanka who left the country on a scholarship last year to Texas A and M University-Commerce, has also achieved Sri Lanka's Elite National Pool Qualification mark of 2.22m, which qualifies him to be included in the Elite National Pool as well as in the top high-performance pool of the Sports Ministry. wanka started his athletics career at Karunaratne Buddhist School in Ragama and was able to develop his skills at Maris Stella College under the guidance of his coach Sanarath Fernando.

Thiwanka of course, had a difficult childhood while growing up as both his parents suffered from polio.

However, that did not stop him from achieving great heights in his life, and he is now a step closer to his Olympic dream.



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Port City to boost the economy, employ 100,000 - *Cabraal*

The Colombo Port City and the enabling legal framework is expected to bring about an immediate boost to the economy and sustain a growth trajectory going forward. Construction within Port City alone is expected to bring about 100,000 jobs shortly. State Minister of Capital Markets Ajith Nivard Cabraal cited the project as a turning point in the economic history of Sri

Cabraal was speaking on May 8 at an International Chamber of Commerce organised a webinar on Colombo Port City.

Cabraal was confident of the political and economic vision of the Port City. 'IMPROVING LONGER STORAGE KEY PILLAR FOR STRENGTHENING NATION'S FUEL SUPPLY'

Capacity in Kolonnawa storage facilities to increase by 30%

or centuries Sri Lanka was set to be an energy hub with a storage facility of fuel for the entire South Asian region and this was well executed by the British during World War two.

During that time, the then Ceylon had stored ample fuel storage for many months to face any kind of emergency through fuel terminal storage facilities in Kolonnawa, Trincomalee and other regional depots. However, these positive sentiments were not maintained and carried on by successive governments since independence, so much so that the fuel storage facilities have now evaporated to just 22 days storage. The global average fuel buffer stock storage per country is a minimum of 60 days, although deferring from country to country.

Fuel is one of the key factors that keeps the economy going as it's used for power generation, transport, aviation, industries and many more areas, and a past industrial action in this sector almost brought the nation to a standstill with fuel queues in pump stations running into several kilometers. Not only the COVID pandemic, even wars and prolonged political unrest in fuel producing countries can halt the supply of fuel to Sri Lanka plunging the country into total lockdown.

"Hence improving the longer storage was identified as a key pillar towards strengthening



The servicing of this buoy before and after

the nation's fuel supply and measures were taken to address this area," said the new Chairman/ Managing Director Ceylon Petroleum Storage Terminal Limited, (CPSTL) M. Uvais Mohamed.

He identified that the storage was not improved to match the growing 5% average annual demand of the nation and swift action was initiated to add 9 storage tanks urgently. "This is task that had not been untaken since the British colonial era.'

"During the LTTE attacks, a storage tank was damaged in the terminal, this remained unrepaired to date. This is under repair currently. To build a new one it would have cost around Rs. 600 million. However now we are investing around Rs. 100 million to restore this and put it to use. Similarly the terminal is embarking on building 9 more storage tanks for which around Rs. 3.5 billion is allocated and is now in pro-

CPSTL is a profit making venture and part of the income will be used for this investment rather than going in for borrowings. With the completion of this project in 2023, the capacity in Kolonnawa storage facilities will increase by

This will result in an additional storage capacity of 75,000 metric tons, to the current total storage capacity of 475,000 tons across the

Ceylon Petroleum Storage Terminal Limited has also focused their attention in adding more infrastructure and increasing efficiency for their storage terminal in Muthurajawela.

At present there are two unloading p

known as Single Point Mooring (SPM) buoys, one off Colombo Harbour and other at Muthurajawela, which are both maintained by CPSTL. The unloading process from 8 miles out of

the sea, from the Single Point Mooring (SPM) buoy at Muthurajawela, took around 60 hours to complete and now the process is narrowing down to 30 hours making it one of the fastest fuel unloading facilities in the region. "In-depth studies also found out that the SPM

buoy that is used in the unloading process was not serviced for the past 10 years. The servicing of this buoy was undertaken and completed at a cost of Rs. 500 million". Overhauling work was done at Colombo

One of the other advantages of this project is that fuel bowers load fuel and use the highway network for transport. The increase of storage capacity initiatives in both Kolonnawa and Muthurajawela terminals will increase island wide capacity by 15%.

Storage to further increase with KKS facility

In a bid to increase storage facilities the CPSTL has also embarked on a project to build eight more storage tanks at their Kankesanthurai (KKS) facility.

Four will store around 6,000 and the balance four 10,000 metric tons of fuel fulfilling the demand of North East for a week in case of emergency. The tanks would be built on 6 acre land and many other facilities would be introduced giving a major economic boost to the area creating new employment opportunities as well. Fuel would be transported from train to this venue.


The bowser cost of transporting fuel from Colombo will also drastically reduce from this venture. "When the KKS Port is fully operational we will also explore the possibility of unloading fuel from the sea."

Many firsts

"We will invest over Rs. 100 million to install CCTV and use drones at the Kolonnawa, institution mainly to enhance security and check on fraudulent activities. CPSTL has also moved towards solar adaptation on their rooftops. "We also hope to invest more towards this segment in the future."

For the first time in the history of the company, it adopted Internal Audit Standards of Institute of Internal Auditors (IIA) recently. The Audit Committee expressed its keen interest to see the compliance with the manual in future in all internal audit activities.

The Company also encouraged bowsers to use the highway and the toll entry/exit toll was paid by the CPSTL. Another first was the manufacturing and presenting hand and floor sanitizers to the staff, health workers, tri forces and the public as a CSR initiative.







They also exchanged views on global challenges related to the fight against hunger and all forms of malnutrition, the need to preserve biodiversity and natural resources, as well as the importance of food safety and the One-Health approach for the prevention of pandemics.

Commissioner for International Partnerships, Jutta Urpilainen said: "In the context of the global COVID-19 pandemic, more and more people are facing growing food insecurity. This is a complex issue and we will continue working on the world stage to tackle the root causes. Our long-standing partnership with



the FAO is critical to help us address global challenges. I welcome our continued close cooperation on agriculture, fisheries, forestry, biodiversity, food security, food crises and food safety." FAO Director-General

QU said: "We underscore our continued determination to defeat hunger and poverty and to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Through this Strategic Dialogue, we are entering into a new chapter of our relationship marked by the urgency to act in a coordinated manner to support the much needed agrifood systems transformation."

Commissioner for Health and Food Safety, Stella Kyriakides said: "The Farm to Fork Strategy, at the core of the Green Deal, sets a strategic vision to transform the way we produce, distribute and consume food. We need to act quickly and globally to make our food systems sustainable. The FAO will have a leading role in the international work to achieve the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals. Our joint priorities include the fight against antimicrobial resistance, the

COVID vaccine patent waivers divide EU leaders

European leaders discussed a US proposal for a waiver on intellectual property protections for COVID-19 vaccines at an informal EU summit in Portugal on Friday.

Though Germany came out strongly against the idea, others in the European Union (EU), such as France, Italy and Poland initially signalled support.

Still, French President Emmanuel Macron, said the most pressing obstacle to vaccine programs was actu-

ally distribution. "What is the problem right now? It isn't really intellectual property protection. Can we really entrust laboratories that don't know how to produce [these vaccines] with this intellectual property and expect them to be producing tomorrow?" Macron said. Macron's words underscored comments made earlier on Friday by German Health Minister Jens Spahn, who said: "The main issue is not the question of patents. The main issue is the question of production capacity," noting that more complex vaccines like the mRNA jabs produced by BioNTech-Pfizer "can't sim-

On passenger seats and in overhead bins

Emirates SkyCargo is marking the first anniversary of loading urgently required PPE, related supplies and other vital cargo on the seats and inside the overhead bins of its Boeing 777-300ER passenger aircraft.

Responding to the pressing demand for transporting PPE during the first wave of the COVID-19 pandemic in late April 2020, the freight division of Emirates adjusted its operating model to load select goods inside the aircraft cabin on passenger seats and in overhead bins to make additional room for urgent cargo on its flights.

Over the course of one year, the air cargo carrier has now operated more than 3,100 flights with cargo on seats and in the overhead bins transporting more than 11,000 tonnes of vital cargo, equivalent to cargo transport-



nce upon a time, not many moons ago, when Corona was a town in Los Angeles and no one thought twice about jumping on a train to move from point X to point Y, I found myself travelling in a train heading from Bandarawela to Nanu Oya. But not for long. Suddenly somewhere at Pattipola the train came to a halt. It was then that I heard the 'ping' of an incoming text message on my phone. "Hello, this is X of the Book Awards Foundation. Am I writing to the author of '10:34'?" "I'm afraid so," I wrote back. (Book Awards Foundation? I wasn't sure I had ever heard of it). "I'm writing to let you know that your book has been selected as a finalist for the Super Book Award for Literature." "Oh. That's nice." I smiled and frowned at the same time. (Super Book Award for Literature? Was there such a thing?) Then came an even longer message saying the award ceremony will be held in New York graced by writers like Zadie Smith and Neil Gaiman and my publisher had agreed to fly me to New York to collect my award... Bang! I was jerked out of my seat. To my dismay the train was moving again, and I had not even had the time to decide what I would wear when I got to New York and to that ceremony...End of another daydream.

Admit it, if you belong to that somewhat bizarre segment of the human race who spend the best part of their lives sweating in front of a computer smiling and frowning, tearing your hair and typing as if the world depended on how fast you typed, until you have produced thousands of words about an event that happened only in your imagination, you simply have to be guilty of daydreaming about the ever elusive book awards, too.

Remember how it all started? After several mishaps and delays your manuscript becomes a published book with an adorable cover and you feel you are about to reach the top of your world...except, something seems to be missing. Ah yes. You haven't received an award yet for this piece of 'sparkling word formulation' that in your mittee, judges of the Booker, wake up!

Ernest Hemingway

never to the hundred billion of us who also like to call ourselves writers. How do they do it? What kind of magic wands have they got that the rest of us do not have?

Ask Zadie Smith and she will tap her fingers on her desk, sway her head to imaginary music and say, for her, it's dancing. Dancing? Yes, she thinks her writing is connected to dancing. "One of the most solid pieces of writing advice I know is in fact intended for dancers - you can find it in the choreographer Martha Graham's biography. But it relaxes me in front of my laptop the same way I imagine it might induce a young dancer to breathe deeply and wiggle their fingers and toes.'

To Orhan Pamuk, winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature, 2006, however, it is childhood memories that inspire him to write what he writes. "In my childhood, I felt happy, painted a lot, and all the grown ups were constantly smiling at me. Everybody was gentle, polite and tender. I wrote all about this in my autobiographical book, Istanbul. After the publication of Istanbul, some people asked me this question: Aren't you a bit young to write your autobiography? I kept my silence. Literature is about happiness, I wanted to say, about preserving your childishness all your life, keeping the child in you alive ...'

For Alice Munro it was seclusion that brought out the best in her. "I think any life can be interesting, any surroundings can be interesting, I don't think I could have been so brave if I had been living in a town, competing with people on what can be called a generally higher cultural level. I didn't have to cope with that. I was the only person I knew who wrote stories, though I didn't tell them to anybody, and as far as I knew, at least for a while, I was the only person who could do this in the

Ernest Hemingway, however, when asked what makes an award-winning writer, refused to answer. Instead, he said, "I have spoken too long for a writer. A writer should write what he has to say and not speak it."

that transforms an ordinary writer to an award-winning

legend on par with the likes of Neruda and Rushdie. And the best people to turn to, it seems are the writers who judge other writers. According to Michael Cunningham, the winner of the Pulitzer Prize in 1999 and later a judge of the Pulitzer committee, if you want to win an award you must 'go big', be ambitious and write a national size story that deserves a national award. " [We agreed] we would tend to favor the grand, flawed effort over the exquisitely crafted miniature. We preferred visionary explorers to modest gardeners, and declared ourselves willing to forgive certain shortcomings or overreaching in a writer who was clearly attempting to accomplish more than can technically be done using only ink and paper," explains Cunningham.

It appears judges of book awards also look for stories where something "happened": they are drawn to writers who told a gripping and forceful story. They "wanted something to have happened by the time they reached the end, some sea change to have occurred, some new narrative continent discovered, or some ancient narrative civilization destroyed." In other words, good stories require change. Great stories require colossal transformation. Think about it when you are working on your writing. How much transformation do your characters go through from the beginning of your story to the end? How can you inflict more change upon them?"


To win any kind of award, every sentence must be beautifully written too, says Cunningham: " I could forgive much in a book if it was written with force and beauty, if its story was told in a voice unlike anything I'd heard before, if the writer was finding new and mesmerizing ways to employ the same words that have been available to all ... writers for hundreds of years.'

This could mean writing long sentences. Long sentences that make beautiful, complex prose you want to read again and again. Hemingway, Faulkner, James Joyce, were known for their long, run-on sentences, full of conjunctions and lacking "correct" punctuation. Contemporary writers, like Cormac McCarthy and Tim O'Brien, do the same. But remember to keep your sentences precise too, and if you can, include your story within a story the way Rushdie does in Midnight's Children, to enhance your plot.

Of all the criteria, surely these tips on technique may be the ones you can master the most. After all, beautiful writing can be achieved through dogged editing, the willingness to write and rewrite a thousand times until each sentence is perfect. Or if not perfect, at least well

If you are thinking, so what's the big deal? Is this all that you need to write an award-winning story, read Cunningham's last piece of advice. "Fiction involves elements of magic; it works for reasons we can explain and also for reasons we can't. If novels or short-story collections could be weighed strictly in terms of their components (fully developed characters, check; original voice, check; solidly crafted structure, check; serious theme, check) they might satisfy, but they would fail to enchant. A great work of fiction involves a certain frisson that occurs when its various components cohere and then ignite. The cause of the fire should, to some extent, elude the experts sent to investi-

Which basically means one thing: all great writing is.....a mystery. And I believe that's what it should always be...a mystery.












Steps to Grow **Green Chilli from Seeds**



Step 1: Choose The Right Growing Conditions

Temperature:

Chillies grow best in warm and humid conditions. The ideal temperature for growing green chilly is somewhere between 22-25°C.

Sunlight:

Grow your chillies is the area that receives 5-6 hours of sunlight every day. Your pants or pots should be placed in the area that receives partial shade.

Nourish your seeds with the right kind of soil. You can get organic potting soil that is enriched with beneficial microbes and fosters the growth of the plant. It will stimulate the process by providing essential nutrients, protecting the seeds and healthily retaining moisture. Mix some vermicompost in the soil for even better

Irrigation:

Chillies do not require as much water as other plants, therefore, water only when the top layer of the soil looks dry. These plants may rot as they cannot withstand water for a very long time, so ensure that you main-

> tain porous soil. **Fertilizers:**

Feed your plants with organic fertilizers at regular intervals. You can use cow dung, tea compost, fruit peelings, etc to fertilize your soil. If the soil is rich in minerals, your plants will grow well. Read more to learn how to prepare Organic Fertilizer at home.

Step 2 - Start With A Seed Tray

For the seeds to germinate well, a seed tray (up to 3 inches deep) provides the most conducive environment. Fill the seed tray with soil and spread the chilli seeds on it. Add only a thin layer of soil above the seeds and then sprinkle some water. Keep the seeds warm and moist and they will start germinating in a week or two.

Step 3 - Move Germinated Seeds To A Pot

Choosing the right pot is an important element of growing a plant to its full capacity. A pot that is about 12" deep with proper drainage holes would be ideal for growing chillies. So, once the seeds have germinated in the seed tray, pick out the saplings and plant them separately the pots or containers you have picked. Place the pot in a sunny location and water it whenever you feel that the top layer of the soil is dry.

That's it, you're done! In around two months (60-70 days) your chillies should be ready to be picked. Since you're likely to have more than you'll need, you can even dry some chillies and store for use throughout the year.

Growing chillies at home

Growing green chillies at home is pretty simple. In fact, India is one of the largest producers of chillies across the world. Whether you are a novice gardener or a gardening expert - either way growing chilly is perfect for every gardener. Although green chillies are easy to grow, make sure that you are providing an adequate amount of water, as both overwatering and underwatering can hamper the growth of

To ensure the purity of harvest, it is advisable to sow seeds that are not genetically modified. Furthermore, heritage also has a role to play in the quality and quantity of the produce. So, it's best to go for open-pollinated heirloom seeds.

They neither feel workplace fatigue nor do they have an urge to secretly encroach into a neighbor's land to enhance periphery of their own land. They do not bother to maintain social status. They perceive the whole world as theirs and in a way they are like

socialists. Yet, each and every one of them have their own story to convey to others in this clan of likeminded people.

Award winning American actress Frances McDormand plays the main role as Fern who takes on a journey as a nomad on her husband's demise and losing her job at a US Gypsum plant. In the

movie we see nomads' world through Fern's eyes. A support system community for fellow nomads organized in Arizona as a desert gathering by a real-life nomad, Bob Wells is attended by Fern on one of her friend's request. On meeting with fellow nomads, Fern learns basic survival and self-sufficiency skills for the road dwellers.

Director Chloe Zhao has cast non-actors to portray characters as nomads. A number of real-life nomads appear as dramatized versions of themselves, including Linda May, Swankie, and Bob Wells. Bob Wells's character is of a facilitator of the broader nomad community who after surviving divorce and the death of his son, found solace in a life on the road. His philosophy in life and beyond touches upon Buddhist philosophy. The old man when Swankie dies of cancer says, "I will see you down the road". He never says 'goodbye' to a demised colleague. "I do not ever say goodbye. I believe we all meet again someday, down the road", he

Fern's acquaintance with the middle aged Dave and eventually ignoring his sentiments towards her is agreed with, as we understand Fern's temperament as a lone traveler.

The movie depicts emotions at its best. Fern's brief encounter with a teenage boy on the roads is touching. Her meeting with this random teenage boy in a Neverland is depicted to arouse emotion of the viewer. Fern recites a poem to the boy as he offers a beer to her. As she sings to the boy, "Sometimes too hot...the eye of heaven shines...", the frame changes to the boy walking with his rucksack and we see him from afar.

One could perceive 'Nomadland' as the female version of the movie 'Forrest Gump' in which Tom Hanks keeps running on foot to places throughout the better half of his life. In Nomadland Fern (Frances McDormand) travels with fellow nomads to places in her

Once Fern tells a man outside the nomad clan, "I do have a home though I don't have a house. My home is my van". The movie stirs emotion with Fern's performance and dialogues. A soothing music though with a touch of repent perfectly blends with the tempo of the movie.

Nomadland is truly Oscar worthy. As Fern drives her van and fades away to the horizon, we hear the song, "Drifting away I go".
