#### BENGAL-No. 83.

China Sea, West—Cochin-China—Saigon River—Lights on Wharves now in course of construction at Saigon.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 164 of 1897) that two wharves are in course of construction—one northward, the other southward—of the Boulevard Charner, Saigon, from which the under-mentioned lights and flags are shown:—

The Southern Wharf-

At night three red lights, each on a mast at the extremity of each pile.

By day, three red flags in the same positions as the lights.

The Northern Wharf-

At night, two red lights, at the extremity of the scaffolding forming the front of the wharf.

By day, two red flags in the same positions as the lights.

Approximate position: Boulevard Charner on Chart No. 1,269: lat.  $10^\circ$  46' 20'' N., long.  $106^\circ$  42' 5'' E.

#### BENGAL-No. 84.

Australia, East Coast—Port Curtis entrance—Decreased depth in North Channel.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 166 of 1897) that the depth in North channel, entrance to Port Curtis, between Gatcombe head and Junction buoy, has decreased to about 8 ft. at low water springs.

Approximate position, Gatcombe head: lat. 23°.53′ S., long. 151° 23<sup>3</sup>″ E.

#### BENGAL,-No. 85.

China Seg-Singapore Strait-Shoal in North Channel.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 167 of 1897) that information has been received that, on February 2, 1897, the British steamvessel Cheang Chew grounded in a position with Horsburgh lighthouse bearing S. 41° E., distant 5½ miles; and Large island, Lima islands, S. 55° W.

Approximate position: lat. 1° 24′ 15″ N., long. 10′4° 21′ 0″ E.

A depth of 3 fathoms has been placed in the above position on the Admiralty Charts, and a note written

against the words North channel, "Should not be used for sea navigation."

Note.—Mariners are warned that the North channel should not be used for navigation, as no advantage is gained by passing through it, and it is possible that more shoals exist there than are shown on the Chart, as already stated in China Sea Directory, Vol. I., 1896, page 238.
