It is moored on the contour 20-fathom line, magnetic, south of the rock.

### BENGAL.-No. 120.

Africa, North-East-Red Sea, Western Shore-North Massawa Channel Approach—Search for certain dangers.

The following Notice to Mariners (No. 274 of 1897) issued by the British Admiralty is re-published :-

The under-mentioned information relating to a recent search for King Arthur shoal and Akbar rock, and an examination of Gannet bank, has been received from Lieutenant and Commander H. J. Gedge, H.M. surveying vessel Stork :-

1. King Arthur Shoal.—With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 205 of 1889, on the steam-vessel King Arthur striking on a shoal with a depth of about 24

fathoms on it, reported to be situated in approximately lat. 17° 10′ N., long. 39° 10′ E.:

In the search by the Stork for this danger the least water obtained was ten fathoims, in approximately lat. 17° 8′ N., long. 39° 8′ E.; t is, however, considered probable that the rock exists and is small. Consequently the words "Bock reported hereabout" have been retained on Admiralty Chart against the above position of the on Admiralty Chart against the above position of the ten fathoms.

2. Akbar Rock.—With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 448 of 1892, on the steam-vessel Akbar (draught 20 ft.) touching on a shoal in a position (considered very doubtful) in lat. 16° 47′ N., long. 39° 12′ E.:

This rock was not found by the Stork, the least depth obtained being ten fethems in convergental lat. 16°

obtained being ten fathoms, in approximately lat. 16° 44′ 30′ N., long, 39° 12′ 45″ E. In this case also it is considered ropbable that the rock exists and is small. Consequently the words "Rock reported hereabout" have been written on the Admiralty Chart against the above position of the ten fathoms. position of the ten fathoms.

3. Gannet Bank.—A coral head with a least depth of 33 fathoms over it, was found on Gannet bank; and the position of this head was determined to be about 13 mile, N.W., from its previously charted position, or approximately in lat. 16° 59′ 55′ N., long. 39° 12′ 25″ E.

This bank is about 6 cables in length north and south,

and 3 cables in breadth, within the 5-fathom line, deepening quickly to the westward and southward, and having soundings less than ten fathoms for some distance from it in other directions.

Class No. 25.—Linen and nemp, yarn and thread.

Class No. 32.—Linen and hemp goods not included in classes 26, 27, and 50.


