Australia—Investigator Strait—Kangaroo Island—Nepane Bay—Buoys placed to indicate Line of Telegraph Cable.

The President, Marine Board, Port Adelaide, has given notice (No. 4 of 1897) that, for the purpose of indicating the line of telegraph cable between Yankalilla and Kingscote, a bell buoy, painted green, has been placed in latitude 35° 41½ south, longitude 137° 42½ east, in $3\frac{3}{4}$ fathoms of water L.W.S.; and a green perch buoy off Bear Point in latitude 35° 40' south, longitude 37° 39' 50' east, in $3\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms L.W.S. These two buoys in line and the two beacons on shore at Kingscote bear north 72° west and south 72° east cor. mag.; and masters of vessels are hereby cautioned that when anchoring they must keep well north or south of that line to avoid the telegraph cable.

This notice, which affects Chart No. 2,389A, cancels notices Nos. 4 and 5 of 1884.

Australia-Wide Bay Bar-Hook Point-Minimum Depth. The Portmaster, Brisbane, has given notice (No. 10 of 1897) that the square white beacons on Hook Point bear when in line N. 87° W., and lead across the bar with a minimum depth of 19 ft. at L.W.S.

New Zealand—North Island—Manukan Harbour—Decreased Depth in South Channel.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 352 of 1897) that Heron spit has extended to the south-eastward, and the depth in its vicinity, with the leading beacons for south channel in line, is not more than two fathoms at low water springs.

Vessels of 12 ft. draught and upwards should therefore not attempt to enter the south channel until threequarters flood.

Approximate position, Heron spit : lat. 37° 6' S., long. 174° 32_4^{\prime} E.

China Sea-Gaspar Strait-Cheruchup Bay Westward of Jumangin Shoal. -Sunken Rock

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 355 of 1897) of the existence of a rock, with a depth of 34 fathoms on it, and 8 fathoms simmediately around, situated in Cheruchup bay, west coast of Billiton island, in a position with the summit of Kelmanbang bearing N. 72° E., distant 84 cables, and Tikus island S. 10° E.

Approximate position on Chart No. 2,137: lat. 2° 47' 0" S., long. 107° 31' 30" E.

The white buoy, surmounted by staff and ball, pre-viously marking Jumangin shoal, has been moved to the westward of the above rock, and is moored in a depth of 6 fathoms.

Japan-(1) Kiusiu, (2) Seto Uchi, (3) Yezo.

(1) Kiusiu-Rocks Southward of Misumi Harbour. The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 369 of 1897) of the existence of the under-mentioned rocks between Misumi no seto and Zozo no seto, west coast of Kiusiu :-

- (a) A rock, named Giha so, with a depth of $1\frac{3}{2}$ fathom on it, in a position with the northern summit ($427 \ \Delta$ of Sinzoku jima, bearing S. 19° E., distant one mile; and summit of island (Tera shima) a quarter of a mile northward of Senzoku jima north point N. 72° E.
- Arock, also named Giha se, with a depth of 2 fathoms on it, lies E.S.E., distant one cable from rock (a).

Approximate position (a) rock lat. 32°35' 25" N., long. 130° 27′ 40″ E.

(b) A rock, with a depth of $2\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms on it, lies with the northern summit of Senzoku jima bearing south, distant 81 cables, and centre of Ogata village S. 73° W. (c) A rock, with a depth of 5 fathoms on it, lies with northern summit of Senzoku jima bearing S. 6° W., distant 8 cables, and centre of Ogata village S. 78° W.

The mooring buoys in Misumi harbour have been withdrawn.

(2) Seto Uchi-Mekari Seto-Sunken Rock Northward of Chodaiu.

Also, of the existence of a rock, with a depth of $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on it and 5 to 18 fathoms around, in a position with Chodaiu lighthouse bearing S. 1° E., distant 14 cable, and Sukune sima summit S. 66° W.

Approximate position: lat. 34° 22' 30" N., long. 133° 8' 10" Ê.

(3) Yezo-Rock off Tokachi kawa.

Also, that the Master of the steam-vessel Koyeki Maru reports that he observed a rock, which dries about 2 ft. at low water, with shoal water between it and the coast, situated about 14 mile off the mouth of the Tokachi kawa, south-east coast of Yezo.

Approximate position: lat. 42° 49' 0" N., long. 143° 55' 20" E.


