Hongkong-Amendment to Chart No. 1,466.

Notice to Mariners No. 567 of 1897, issued by the British Admiralty, is republished for general information:—

On certain copies of Chart No. 1,466 a rock of 3 fathoms, situated 3 cables N. by E. (N. 11° E.) from the eastern extreme of Stonecutters' island, Hongkong harbour, has been omitted.

The existence of this rock was made known by Notice to Mariners No. 530 of 1894, and it is also mentioned in

Hydrographic Notice No. 1 of 1897, relating to China Sea Directory, Vol. III., 1894.

China Sea—Singapore—An Earthquake at Kudat, and a new Island thrown up from the Sea opposite Labuan.

The following Notice to Mariners (No. 699 of 1897), issued by the Government of the Straits Settlements, is republished for general information:—

Advices from British North Borneo state that an earthquake was felt at Kudat on September 21.

About the same time a new island was thrown up from the sea between Mempakul and Lambeidan, fifty yards from the mainland, opposite Labuan. The island is of

clay and rocks, and measures 200 yards long by 150 yards broad, and 60 ft. high. The island appears to be increasing in size.

#### Bengal.-No. 205.

Eastern Archipelago—Java, North Coast—Light-vessel established Eastward of Tanah Reef, Cheribon Bank.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 575 of 1897) that in September, 1897, a light-vessel was moored eastward of Tanah reef, Cheribon bank.

Cheribon light-vessel shows a revolving light, visible in clear weather from a distance of 10 miles.
