Eastern Archipelago-Celebes, West Coast-Sunken Rocks north-eastward of Tanna Keke Island.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 651 of 1897) of the existence of the under-mentioned rocks north-eastward of Tanna Keke Island:—

1. A rocky patch, about 3 cables in diameter with a 1. A rocky patch, about 3 cables in diameter with a depth of 2 fathoms on it, in a position with Sandraboni southern house bearing E.  $\frac{7}{8}$  N., distance  $2\frac{7}{10}$  miles, and Managandarie northern house N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E.

Eastern Archipelago - Java, North Coast-Particulars of Cheribon Lightvessel.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 205, dated With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 202, dated October 28, issued by this Office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 652 of 1897) that on September 15, 1897, Cheribon lightvessel was moored eastward of Tanah reef, Cheribon bank.

Cheribon lightvessel shows an occulting light with a period of twenty-five seconds, thus: light lifteen seconds, eclipse ten seconds, elevated 33 ft. above the sea, and with the period of the sea, we then from a distance of 9 miles.

The lightvessel is painted red, with the word "Cheribon" in white letters on each side; an iron framework support, 29 ft. high, carrying the light apparatus and a bell stands amid ships.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 653 of 1897) that the positions of Middle Island surveying beacon and the under-mentioned buoys are as follows :-
