BENGAL.—No. 232.

Eastern Archipelago—Celebes, West Coast—Sunken Rocks north-eastward of Tanna Keke Island.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 651 of 1897) of the existence of the under-mentioned rocks north-eastward of Tanna Keke Island:—

1. A rocky patch, about 3 cables in diameter with a depth of 2 fathoms on it, in a position with Sandraboni southern house bearing E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., distance $2\frac{3}{10}$ miles, and Managandarie northern house N. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

Approximate position on Chart No. 1,293: lat. $5^{\circ} 26' 45''$ S., long. $119^{\circ} 20' 5''$ E.

2. A rocky patch, with a depth of 3 fathoms on it, in a position bearing W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., distant $3\frac{1}{10}$ cables from rock (1).

The white nun-buoy, previously moored about half a mile north-westward of rock (2), has been moved to the western side of that rock.

A danger line has been drawn on the Chart to include both the above rocks within it.

Eastern Archipelago—Java, North Coast—Particulars of Cheribon Lightvessel.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 205, dated October 28, issued by this Office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 652 of 1897) that on September 15, 1897, Cheribon lightvessel was moored eastward of Tanah reef, Cheribon bank.

Cheribon lightvessel shows an occulting light with a period of twenty-five seconds, thus: light fifteen seconds, eclipse ten seconds, elevated 33 ft. above the sea, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 9 miles.

The lightvessel is painted red, with the word "Cheribon" in white letters on each side; an iron framework support, 29 ft. high, carrying the light apparatus and a bell stands amid ships.

The lightvessel is moored in a depth of $5\frac{3}{4}$ fathoms at low water, in a position with Tanah point bearing W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., distant $10\frac{3}{4}$ miles: and Bangka point S. $\frac{3}{4}$ W.

Approximate position: lat. $6^{\circ} 29' 50''$ S., long. $108^{\circ} 42' 50''$ E.

Also, that the northern white nun buoy, previously moored at the north-east edge of Tanah reef, has been withdrawn.

China East—Yang Tse Kiang—Amended Position of Middle Island Beacon and certain Buoys.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 653 of 1897) that the positions of Middle Island surveying beacon and the under-mentioned buoys are as follows:—

1. Middle Island surveying beacon is situated S. 84° W., distant $6\frac{3}{10}$ cables, from the position in which it has hitherto been shown on the Chart.

Approximate position: lat. $31^{\circ} 25' 45''$ N., long. $121^{\circ} 36' 0''$ E.

2. Tsungming bank buoy is moored in a position with Middle Island surveying beacon bearing S. 5° E., distant 3 miles, and nest tree N. 71° E.

3. Middle Island buoy is moored in a position with Middle Island surveying beacon bearing S. 34° W., distant 4 miles, and high dark tree N. 46° W.

4. Blockhouse shoal buoy is moored in a position with Kiu Toan surveying beacon bearing S. 28° W., distant $2\frac{3}{10}$ miles, and high double tree N. 70° W.

Variation, 2° westerly in 1897.

Korea, East Coast—(1) Yokuchi Do—(2) Cape Boltin—(3) Tizenko Bay.

(1) *Sunken Rock northward of Yokuchi Do.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 691 of 1897) that information has been received, dated September 24, 1897, of the existence of a sunken rock, with a depth of 4 ft. on it, situated in a position with Tobi Do summit bearing N. 88° W., distant 6 miles, and Ord Island summit N. 4° W.

Approximate position: lat. $34^{\circ} 42' 15''$ N., long. $128^{\circ} 18' 45''$ E.

(2) *Rock westward of Cape Boltin.*

Also, of the existence of a white rock, situated in a position with Cape Boltin bearing E. $\frac{1}{8}$ N., distant $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and south-eastern extreme of the south-eastern Arefiev islands S.S.W.

Approximate position on Chart No. 1,316: lat. $40^{\circ} 48' 45''$ N., long. $129^{\circ} 35' 30''$ E.

(3) *Sunken Rock south-eastward of Tizenko Bay.*

Also, of the existence of a sunken rock, on which the sea breaks, situated eastward of the point separating Tizenko and Stepanof bays, in a position with east extreme of Ninue Island, bearing N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., distant nearly one mile, and south-east extreme of Mojaiska point N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{8}$ E.

Approximate position: lat. $41^{\circ} 55' 55''$ N., long. $129^{\circ} 59' 40''$ E.

Variation, (1) 4° , (2) 5° , (3) 6° westerly in 1897.
