SLMA Vice President Consultant Endocrinologist Dr. Manilka Sumanatilleke, said that Sri Lanka was almost in the fourth wave and added the country would plunge into a catastrophic situation if strict measures were not taken at correct time.

"It should be noted that the virus spreads faster than our vaccination drive. Hence, we need to subtract this gap. As such, the only option is to impose travel restrictions in short term," he stressed.

"The authorities must pay special attention to the current situation and take immediate steps to address he crisis," Dr. Sumanatilleke added.

Meanwhile, commenting on the increase in COVID deaths, he said that three people were dying from the virus every one hour, with regard to the 82 deaths that was reported on Wednesday (4).

"This is an alarming situation and it's nothing, but the truth that the contribution of the contagious Delta variant has also led to the sharp rise in deaths and infections," he added.



Responding to protests the government promised to give a solution at a cabinet meeting held earlier this week but to the dismay of the teachers and principals the government announced that it doesn't have the money to resolve the issue. A teacher is often acknowledged as a 'second mother' and one may question the pathetic plight of a teacher in Sri Lanka who had to finally take to the streets to demand the government to increase their salaries even after completing all higher educational qualifications and dedicating a greater part of their life to a much revered profession.

44 individuals representing various teacher and principal unions were arrested following a protest that took place in front of the Presidential Secretariat on August 4. The teachers and principals were later produced at the Colombo Magistrate's Court yesterday (August 5) and were released on bail. "These are unlawful arrests because these people were arrested once the protest was over," opined Ceylon Teachers Union (CTU) President Joseph Stalin. 'They were being detained by the Harbour Police. Police personnel from Maligawatta, Dematagoda and various other police stations were deployed to disperse the crowd. These incidents clearly show the undemocratic nature of governance implemented by the present regime. We will take every possible trade union action against these unlawful moves.'

When asked how the salary anomaly issue first came into being, Stalin said that teaching was established as a service in 1994 and as a result teachers and principals received pay hikes. "But in 1997 the B. C. Perera Salary Commission arrived at a notion that the formula to increase salaries for teachers and principals was errant. However, those engaged in other services got a 60% pay hike. According to Circular No. 297(3) the matter was held for later consideration but that consideration didn't happen for 24 years. Thereafter we took various trade union actions. Then again in 2006 the Lionel Fernando and Saliya Mathew Commission arrived at the same conclusion made by the B.C. Perera Commission."

"As a result we decided to boycott A/L paper marking and a case was filed by a student at the Supreme Court. In the final verdict, the Supreme Court rules (SC/FR287/2008) that teachers and principals be taken out of the General services category. But to date, that too hasn't been done. In 2008 we met with the then Education Minister Susil Premajayantha and



6.7 billion was required to fix salary anomalies of teachers and principals. Subsequently the amount was brought down to Rs. 3 billion to increase the salaries by 45%. But no budgetary allocations were made with regard to this matter," he added.

Stalin further said that in 2019 there were several cabinet papers addressing this matter and President's manifesto itself mentioned that teaching would be made a 'closed service'."To date, none of these decisions or promises has been fulfilled. We staged our protests on par with the protests being held requesting the government to withdraw the Kotelawala National Defence University Bill. Since July 12 we have stopped conducting online classes for students. The only component that was done from distance learning was online education but that too wasn't done properly. The government didn't allocate a cent for it and everything was done by the teachers. It is only after one year and four months that they are talking about starting educational channels. We then met with Education Minister Prof. G. L. Pieris and Salary Commission was appointed where submitted our salary proposals and requested to make it a closed service.'

GRAVE INJUSTICE EXPERIENCED BY PRINCIPALS

"To become a principal as per the Sri Lankan education system, one has to gather a lot of experience," opined Professional Principals Association President, Sugeeshwara Wimalaratne. "In order to become a principal an individual has to serve for five years as a teacher and obtain a Degree in Education or serve five years as a teacher and have a basic degree and apart from that they should complete a Postgraduate Diploma in Education or complete a Diploma and serve seven years as a teacher. So far the total cadre of school principals island-wide is 16,512 but only around 11,000 of them are active at the moment.

The teacher-principal service has been under the same salary code in the administrative service until 1997 when the B.C. Perera Salary Commission raised questions about errant calculations. What we now request is to add these anomalies to our salaries. When the Subodhini Salary Commission was appointed with five executive members representing the Education Ministry we submitted a proposal

with our requests. As such a principal in the Grade 1 category should receive Rs. 76,175. The salary for a Grade II principal was calculated at Rs. 62,595 but the actual amount is Rs. 64,890 and the salary calculation for a Grade III principal is Rs. 47,615 but the actual amount should be Rs. 57,798.

Wimalaratne expressed concerns over categorizing principals in the same salary code that includes field officers, clerks and management assistants at government offices, those involved in paramedical services etc. "This is a grave injustice that we have faced. As such a principal is entitled to a salary of only Rs. 35,280 with all the educational qualifications we have to fulfill. It costs around Rs. 10,000 to stitch the white outfit that we have to wear; we need a good pair of shoes etc. When we talk about teachers they look after students with their own expenses. Some children come to school without breakfast, some children don't bring books to school because they cannot afford. All these are covered by teachers but these factors haven't been counted when calculating salaries of teachers or even principals for that matter."

What we have seen since the pandemic is making proclamations about school openings and closing and holding exams and not holding exams, without addressing important policy issues such as introducing a curriculum for emergency situations - Dr. Sujata Gamage

WE ARE WITNESSING A **DETERIORATION OF SCHOOL EDUCATION:**

DR. SUJATA GAMAGE

Continuing a struggle to bring about reforms in the education sector, Dr. Sujata Gamage, Senior Research Fellow at LIRNEasia and Co-Coordinator of Education Forum Sri Lanka says that one of the main reasons for teachers to receive step-motherly treatments by successive governments is due to deeply ingrained socio-

One of the main arguments for the ongoing struggle is that teachers have been underpaid for the longest time. Why do you think teachers (and their well-being) were neglected by governments? Is it a political motive? How could this issue have been resolved by successive governments? (In terms of special allowances, salary hikes etc.)

I am not conversant with the salary issues, but the reason that teachers have been underpaid, unrecognized and disrespected is due to deeply ingrained socio-political issues.

Teaching has gradually become a profession which is the last resort for the educated while administrative posts in government or positions of political power are hugely more lucrative and status boosting. In a climate where private interests override public interest, it is not surprising that the decision makers are interested in serving the interest of their professional class and their kith and kin.

A glaring example is the struggle by FUTA to increase spending for education to 6% of GDP, an unrealistic demand considering our total budget is less than 20% of the GDP. Anyway, the struggle was supported by a broad base of workers including teachers" unions, but the end result was a substantial increase in salaries for university staff and nothing for teachers.

How do you resolve the salary issue for teachers? Shut down state enterprises such as Sri Lankan which are causing billions of rupees losses per day (Rs.40 billion in 2019) bleeding the treasury and fund school education adequately and pay teachers and principals better salaries

Have you observed a reduction in budgetary allocations for education over the past few years?

The budget for education has been steady at around 2% of the GDP over the last decade. As I noted later, this spending is skewed towards higher education and promises by the government to open more and more free-of-charge degree awarding opportunities is squeezing resources for school education. Another issue is that of the money allocated to primary or secondary education more than 95% is taken up by salaries and other personnel expenses. As the education sector is viewed by each succeeding government as places for employment of party supporters there is less and less money for anything other than buildings and bodies

Schools were closed for more than a year in Sri Lanka and teachers claim that it was them who spent their own data charges and conducted online classes. The government didn't implement any programme to provide e-learning opportunities for children. How do you see this?

What we have seen since the pandemic is the government was making proclamations about school openings and closing and holding exams holding exams without ad important policy issues such as introducing a curriculum for emergency situations, giving power to schools use a diversity of methods to reach out to each child without dictating terms from the center and reallocating funds to meet unforeseen costs and more importantly recognizing teachers for efforts they were making to reach out to the children and making some payment to show the appreciation. Instead teachers were sent one-size fit all circulars dictating how and when they should be teaching.

Since teachers have boycotted online classes, children are once again at the receiving end. What are the greater disadvantages children due to ongoing protests?

50% of children who were left out of online education are unaffected. Of those who were online many of them may have already turned off from zoom fatigue. I don't see a big problem for children. Bigger problem is having frustrated teachers.

Why is Sri Lanka not keen to bring about reforms in the education sector and why is it necessary in this day and

If you go by stated intentions, the present government is keen to bring about reforms proposed in Saubhagya Dakma manifesto of President GR. The state Ministry of Education Reforms is promising to launch a pilot in 2023 with reduced examinations and reduced content in the curriculum. Unfortunately, I see very little chance of their efforts succeeding.

First, the attitude of the central government is all wrong. They cannot manage the present number of 300+ national schools but they want to take over more schools to increase the number to 1000 national schools. Essentially controlling about two thirds of the total enrollment in schools. This effort not only violates the intentions of the 13th Amendment which has devolved the subject of education to the provinces but also further centralization will worsen the present problems which are due to a ministry which should be doing policy and monitoring of policy implementation trying run 10,000+ schools from the centrally controlled school.

Secondly, our priorities are all wrong. Over the years we have diverted funds from school education to tertiary education. In 2004, the World Bank reported that "By international standards the average recurrent expenditure per student in Sri Lanka is modest at primary and secondary education levels but high at the tertiary education level. Further analysis is needed but over the years the funding for schooling has become more modest in comparison to higher

education. To make matters worse, this government has promised to open city universities in each district when much needs to be done to improve our school education. The priority of the government should be to ensure every child gets an opportunity to complete 13 years of education with readiness to face the world. It is well established in economics that school education gives more public benefits than private benefits while the opposite is true for higher education. Once well prepared in quality school education, all that youth would need is a loan from the government to pursue whatever they want to pursue for a fee. It is said the Dr. Kannangara inserted including higher education to the "Education shall be free up to ..." at the last without weighing on the consequences. What we are witnessing today is deterioration of school education due to this haste in assuring free of charge higher education to all.

COVID-19 CASES SURGE, BUT GOVT. NOT IN A POSITION TO LOCKDOWN

OVID-19 cases are rising again, triggering fears over the capacity of the health sector to cope with the daily challenges. After the latest relaxation of restriction of public movements, intermixing took place, leading to a spike in cases in the aftermath of the outbreak of Delta variant of SARS-CoV-2 that is more transmissible. The newest surge is not a phenomenon in Sri Lanka alone. It is the same story with the entire globe.

The World Health Organisation WHO) said four million new cases were reported last week along with 64,000 deaths all over the world. But, the countries in the world, particularly, the low, middle-income economies, are no longer in a position to enforce stricter lockdowns this time despite high transmissibility of the current dominant variant. The pandemic induced curtailments of economic activities have crippled the world's economies to such an extent that the respective countries have now decided to remain open regardless of COVID-19 and proceed with routine activities.

The present predicament, caused and exacerbated by the pandemic, prompted the world bodies such as the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to evolve fresh approaches to address liquidity issues of the member states battered by limited economic activities.

The IMF Board of Governors approved a general allocation of Special Drawing Rights (SDRs) equivalent to US\$650 billion on August 2, 2021, to boost global liquidity.

"This is a historic decision – the largest SDR allocation in the history of the IMF and a shot in the arm for the global economy at a time of unprecedented crisis. The SDR allocation will benefit all members, address the long-term global need for reserves, build confidence and foster the resilience and stability of the global economy. It will particularly help our most vulnerable countries struggling to cope with the impact of the COVID-19 crisis," IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva said, according to a press release uploaded on its Twitter account.

The statement said the general allocation of SDRs will become effective on August 23, 2021. The newly created SDRs will be credited to IMF member countries in proportion to their existing quotas in the Fund.

About US\$275 billion (about SDR 193 billion) of the new allocation will go to emerging markets and developing countries, including low-income countries. According to the IMF current account balances of the countries were widened by the factors such as major shifts in travel, trades and consumption.

Sri Lanka is no exception to this crisis at all. It has already begun to feel the pinch of reduced economic activities during previous lockdowns. Income from tourism, an industry that generates US \$ 4.5 billion foreign exchange, had dropped to a mere US \$ 19 million during the first quarter of this year. The remittances of expat workers have come down.

Like elsewhere in the world, the informal sector of economy has been hard-hit by the pandemic in Sri Lanka. The informal economy involves people as diverse as tax drivers, pavement hawkers, vegetable, fish/meat sellers, construction workers etc.

The International Labour Organisation (ILO) estimates that about 2 billion workers, or over 60 per cent of the world's adult labour force, operate in the informal sector--at least part time.

After the relaxation of restrictions in recent times, it is found some of these people in informal economy struggle hard to resume their businesses due to lack of working capital. The pandemic has raised its ugly head at such a time, but further curbs public movements appears to the last option for the government grappling with a slew of economic challenges including foreign currency liquidity issues to lack of money for daily operation. In fact, the government has reached the saturation point in the enforcement of COVID-19 related curbs. Any further lockdown, either national or localised will have a huge bearing on the economy with marginalised people being driven to poverty.

Likewise, COVID-19 curve should also be flattened without allowing the number of patients to rise beyond a point as otherwise the health sector will be exhausted. Then, it is a challenging situation with limited options. The health experts have warned of a serious outbreak in the months to come. But, the government does not mull any closure of economic activities to control the trend because it is aware of economic challenges lying ahead. Actually, the government is eager to open the country for international tourism as early as possible as otherwise, it cannot replenish its depleting foreign reserves.

Sri Lanka paid a \$1 billion bond last week. It gave some confidence in overcoming the crisis. But, there is no payment until next January. The government is expected to settle US\$ 500 million next January, and another US \$ 1 billion in July, next year, and another US \$ 1 billion before the end of 2023. As such, it is impossible for the government to resort to any step that will result in the slowdown of the

economy any further. OUR THOUGHT

ARE OUR TEACHERS SHORTSIGHTED?

ri Lanka is a nation which has seen many rebellions staged against the state or the government. These rebellions suggest that past governments have hardly been people friendly regimes.

There is a section of the society which still maintains the idea that Sri Lanka would have been better off under British rule. But history shows us that the Ceylonese were brutally repressed during colonial times and their incomes were taxed with the introduction of taxes. Apart from paying taxes for uncultivated lands there was a tax that had to paid if you rared a dog (these are two among several other reasons that fueled the 2nd battle for independence).

People rebel against the regime when lawmakers make merry at the expense of tax paying citizens. This tendency to rebel against the state has continued over the years since the time of the British.

These days we see the teachers rebelling against the regime. Strangely the Government of Sri Lanka (GoSL) is not using strong arm tactics to squash these rebellions by teachers.

Past records on rebellions against the government show that the main cause for them being unsuccessful was due to the lack of cooperation.

These agitating teachers are having the government by the scuff of its neck. Covid or no Covid these teachers have crippled school education because they have pulled out of online education; and worse threatened to stay away from upcoming exam duties and paper marking.

Now in this environment we see private tuition masters minting money by conducted online classes. Some parents have said that if their sons and daughters don't log in to the class at least 10-15 minutes before the class commences such students have logging in problems and miss the class. In the absence of school activities these tuition masters have virtually taken over education in the country and have found loyal students and supportive parents, who'd keep their bank accounts supplied with a steady remittence.

The GoSL probably loves what it sees. These private tuition masters are fighting the regime's battle. The government has specifically stated that salary anomalies of teachers would only be solved after the presenting of the next budged.


Parents and observers of this standoff between the regime and teacher unions must understand that there is a political line to this battle fought by the teachers. If one observes the proceeding up to now one can see that two of the top most individuals marshaling these teachers are almost in retirement and would be desperate about what the future holds for them; hence their aggressiveness and efforts to add fuel to agitation activities.

There was a time in the past when school teachers were looked upon as demi gods. But over the years private tutors have taken that place and cemented their futures in education by producing students with island rankings at Education Ministry conducted school examinations.

This is a 'me' era and any ambitious student would ask the question 'what's in it for me' before making a commitment to sign up for a course or even participate in a social responsibility project like a 'shramadhana'. The same thinking is adopted by the private tuition masters; hence that is why they prefer to do their own businesses rather than teach in schools for paltry salaries.

There are those who bat for these school teachers and support their demands. But a good majority of parents are frowning at them for neglecting their duties and the children who came under their tutelage. A recent facebook post on the teachers perhaps sums up the general thought outsiders have of these teachers. It reads, "If the teachers can only think of staging a strike to win their demands during the present pandemic and suggest that they are so shortsighted then these teachers deserve the present salaries they are drawing'.

FROM SRI LANKA TO TUNISIA: DEMOCRACY UNDER THREAT


scorpion wants to cross the stream and asks a frog to carry it across. The frog hesitates because it is afraid the scorpion will sting it. The scorpion argues that if it does so both would drown. The frog then agrees and starts swimming while carrying the scorpion on its back. Mid-stream, the scorpion stings the frog. The dying frog asks the ungrateful stranger why he did so knowing well both would die. The scorpion replies: "I couldn't help it. It's in my nature."

This Russian or Persian fable well describes the unpleasant nature of the power-packed executive presidency, with democracy being depicted by the ill-fated frog. If the frog had worn protective armour, it could have saved itself. Similarly, for a democracy to survive, it needs to protect itself from excessive powers of the executive branch the government. Theoretically speaking, not only the executive presidency, but also the other two government arms – the legislature and the judiciary – can be antidemocratic if proper checks and balances are not in place.

Just as the scorpion, executive presidents are also unable to resist the temptation to undermine democracy. This happened in Sri Lanka in October 2018 and in Tunisia only last week. In between, to varying degrees, executive presidents and prime ministers have acted like scorpions and killed or undermined democracy. Of course, among the culprits was Donald Trump who cared no two hoots about democratic values which form the very fabric of the US constitution. He even refused to accept the people's verdict at the November 2020 presidential election and enticed his hardline followers to launch an insurrection and storm the US Congress when it was about to confirm the election

While Trump was destroying democracy, it was no surprise that in many nations, populist leaders had no qualms over misusing the executive powers, with some demagogues saying they were doing so to combat the COVID-19 pandemic. In Hungary at the outset of the pandemic, the rightwing populist Prime Minister Viktor Orban removed the constitutional checks and passed legislation to rule by decree for an indefinite period, while silencing the media to boot.

When Sri Lanka was plunged into a constitutional crisis after the then President Maithripala Sirisena removed Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe, appointed opposition Parliamentarian Mahinda Rajapaksa as Prime Minister and then went on to dissolve Parliament, democracy's defenders had pinned their hopes, rightly so, on the judiciary. The Supreme Court had the courage to cut the then President down to size and tell him tersely that he had violated the Constitution. The court

ruled that in terms of the 19th Amendment, he lacked the power to dissolve Parliament at will before parliament completed the mandatory four-and-a-half year period from the day of its first sitting.

But alas, the hard-won victory for democracy was short lived, when the new Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna government revoked the 19th Amendment which, despite its many shortcomings, stood as the new powerhouse of Lanka's democracy, and replaced it with the 20th Amendment which removed key constitutional checks and made the office of the executive president all powerful

president all powerful.

Apart from a murmur of protests from opposition parties and intellectual circles, the people at large, dreaming of Utopia under the new government and the new leadership, refused to see the danger of vesting too much power in the executive branch

Constitutional changes democracies worth their salt enact should come with necessary reins to restrain those who hold office when they try to abuse the power the people have vested in them in the belief that they will exercise it with responsibly.

Tunisia's political hodgepodge was in many ways similar to the 2015-2019 Sirisena-Wickremesinghe government during which governance was held hostage to the political game of back-stabbing while the leaders paid little attention to national security, national economy and national harmony in what could be described as a criminal desertion of responsibility.

responsibility.

But the little luck Sri Lankan democracy lovers had in 2018, thanks to the uprightness of the judiciary, is not to be found in Tunisia where there is no constitutional mechanism or a court to challenge the President. Last week, the all-powerful executive president removed the Prime Minister and dissolved parliament in a move condemned by democracy promoters as a constitutional coup or the

militarization of the government.

It was also seen as the last nail on the coffin of the Arab Spring, which began in Tunisia. The democracy wind blew across the Arab world in 2011, giving people hopes that soon they would be freed from the clutches of autocratic rulers, military dictators and monarchs. Alas! The Arab Spring has been turned into a long and dark winter.

Tunisia stood out as the only success story of the Arab Spring. But its success was its apparent undoing. Many external forces do not want democracy to take root in the Arab world. The United States which claims that part of its foreign policy is democracy promotion around the world is a silent observer or in some cases an unseen accomplice when democracy is destroyed by the military or militarybacked strongmen. It is alleged that the US played a behind-the-scenes role in the 2013 Egyptian coup when the democratically elected Brotherhood government after the Arab Spring was overthrown in a bloody counter-revolution financed and supported by some Gulf Arab countries ch saw democracy as a curse. In last week's Tunisian constitutional coup, too, it is alleged that some Gulf leaders had a hand in it, as they see Islam's blend with democracy as a dangerous mix that could destabilize the region and pose a threat to their hold on power.

Yet, democracy survived for ten years in Tunisia until last week President Kais Saied invoked emergency powers, fired the prime minister, and suspended parliament. The president said he acted in terms of the Constitution's Article 80 which granted him the authority to take "any measures necessitated by the exceptional circumstances" if the country is in a "state of imminent danger."

The exceptional circumstances were the protests in the capital against the technocrat government of Prime Minister Hichem Mechichi. But the protesters were targeting largely, the Islamic party Ennahda, the largest party in parliament and whose leader was speaker under a power-sharing arrangement.

Although, the Tunisian government had several ministers from the President's party, the protesters directed their anger at the Islamist Ennahda for the government's failure to prop up the economy which was crumbling in the face of the Covid-19 pandemic. With Tunisia recording the highest per capita death rate from Covid-19 in Africa, income flow from tourism, one of its biggest foreign exchange earners, has come to a standstill.

Sri Lanka in 2018 and Tunisia last week point to a disturbing trend where those who destroy democracy are allowed to go unpunished and tolerated in politics. The then United Nations Secretary General Kofi Annan once famously remarked that countries where governments are toppled in coups should be suspended from UN membership. It appears that in the absence of a global mechanism to punish or shame coup leaders and democracy killers, democracy's full bloom will only be an idealist's drapm

Long-lasting Covid-19 symptoms rare in

Many who are infected do not develop symptoms and those that do, tend to have a mild illness. This peer-reviewed study, published in the Lancet Child and Adolescent Health journal, wanted to understand how Covid affected children and how it compared to other respiratory diseases.

World Lung Cancer Day

Early stage detection can be a challenge





he World Lung Cancer Day was observed on August 1. Lung cancer, as the name suggests is a type of cancer that originates in the lungs. Lung cancer has opped the charts as the leading cause of cancer deaths worldwide.

Lungs are the organs that participate in gas transfer. They aid oxygen molecules enter and reach the red blood cells, which then carry it via the medium blood, to all the organs and tissues of the body, up to every last living cell. The lungs also expel carbon dioxide from the body when we oreathe out.

The ongoing COVID -19 pandemic has caused respiratory health to take the center stage, and the plight of patients who struggle due to a lack of oxygen is certainly an eye opener to be more vigilant about one's lung health. If smokers are looking for a sign to quit smoking, now is the time.

Although people who have never smoked can develop lung cancer, smoking is the most common cause. Passive smoking or any other exposure to cigarette smoke increases the risk of lung cancer among many other ailments. Smoking can cause damages to the fragile lining of the lungs, which is designed for air exchange, and when they are exposed to inhaled smoke and other carcinogens, the cells tend to change their nature in order to withstand these new stressors. As chronic exposure occurs, the cells mutate into cancerous cells. Inhaling carcinogenic substances such as asbestos, some types of coal dust and other chemicals too can increase the risk of getting lung cancer. The challenge is recognizing the initial



stages of lung cancer is that it does not show definitive, specific symptoms. A common symptom of lung cancer is prolonged cough. Other symptoms such as coughing up blood, Chest pain, Shortness of breath, and weight loss. It is important to diagnose Lung cancer at its early stages, as lung cancer can spread to other organs. This process is called metastasizing.

The two major types of lung cancers are

■Small Cell Lung Cancer – This caused almost exclusively by extensive

smoking ■Non- small Cell Lung Cancer – This is a common term given for several cancer types including squamous cell carcinoma, adenocarcinoma etc.

Regular check-ups and being aware of the changes in one's body may provide early diagnosis. Smoking or passive smoking are known risk factors and quitting can reduce the risk of lung cancer. If it is difficult to abstain from smoking, you should actively seek different aids to help you quit.

Those who are working in factories where chemicals are involved, you may be constantly exposed to carcinogens, hence, it is important to adhere to proper safety and health guidelines to avoid direct contact with these substances. Moreover, maintaining a healthy diet with regular exercises too will greatly aid in reducing the risk of lung cancer and even improve your general health.



MUQADDASA

Recently a news article created a stir regarding Ringworm Disease also known as Tinea. Speaking to Daily Mirror, Dr Nayani Madarasingha, Consultant Dermatologist at National Institute of Infectious Diseases, stated that there was no need to be alarmed about the disease. "This disease is not something that just appeared, it has been here for a long time. Ringworm disease is caused by a type of fungus known as a dermatophyte," said Dr Madarasingha.

She noted that this was a common skin disease where the fungus affects the keratin containing cells (skin, hair and nails). "The fungus affects the superficial skin layer thus the disease is not fatal," stated Dr Madarasingha.

The symptoms of the disease can differ according to the site of infection. A red round patch with a usually clear center, margin with red bumps and extensive scaling can be seen when the infection occurs on the skin. This is mostly seen on flexures but can be widespread too. When scalp is infected, red scaly patches and areas of hair loss are seen. When toe webs are infected, a whitish thick plaque like material is visible between the toes and blisters too could develop after some time. Redness and scaling may also be present in the palms or

Hot and humid weather

Commenting on the rise of the disease which happened over the last few years, Dr Madarasingha opined that a possible reason could be the

current hot and humid weather in the South Asian region. "But there are other causative factors for this disease," she said, adding that the factors were poor personal hygiene. wearing tight fitting clothes and wearing closed toe shoes for a long period of time. She also revealed that immunocompromised people such as those with diabetes, cancer and those who've recently had an organ transplant have a higher risk of contracting the disease. "This is mostly transmitted via person to person contact. The disease can be transmitted through sharing of clothes, towels and beddings with an infected person. Even coming in contact with the surfaces touched by the infected person can cause the transmission of the disease," she explained.

Why has it become harder to treat?

Due to the itchy nature of the disease, people may

seek quick relief from it using certain combination medications that contain steroids and antifungal drugs, this had resulted in the increasing extensiveness of the disease. These

> drugs provide quick relief but causes the disease to become extensive which would result in longer treatment duration and can also be difficult to treat," cautioned Dr Madarasingha. She also pointed out that another reason for this could be antifungal resistance which is a result of patients not following the treatment properly. "When symptoms disappear a few days

into the treatment, patients discontinue the treatment. This should not be done, because even though the symptoms disappear, it does not mean the patient is fully cured. Therefore, a re-emergence of the disease could occur and it could be more extensive," she warned. A more extensive form of the disease would require a longer treatment period and stronger drugs to be used.

What should I do if I get infected?

"At the earliest sign of the disease, seek medical care. It is easier to cure the disease in the early stages," she stated adding that for mild cases of the disease, topical creams are prescribed while in severe cases, oral antifungal drugs are prescribed for a specified period."The treatment must be followed for the specified period and if the condition persists, please visit the dermatologist again. Please don't attempt to change the treatment duration without the advice of the dermatologist or self-medicate as it can cause more harm than relief," warned Dr Madarasingha.

How to prevent from it?

Following proper personal hygiene and avoiding sharing of clothes, towels and combs, not wearing tight clothes and closed toe shoes for long time are the preventive measures one can take to prevent getting infected, according to Dr Madarasingha.

Do you know that human urine can form stones and it's one of the commonest conditions affecting both males and females in Sri Lanka?

Our urinary system consists of kidneys, ureters, urinary bladder and urethra. The kidneys form urine which is carried to the urinary bladder through narrow tubes called ureters. The urinary bladder temporarily stores the urine and carries it outside through a tubular structure called Urethra.

Disease conditions can occur in any part of urinary system and in today's Health Capsule we are going to shed light on urinary stone disease, a common yet an important entity which could lead to permanent kidney damage if ignored or improperly treated.

"USD (Urinary Stone Disease) is a condition which ndicates the presence of stones made up from the minerals of urine within the urinary tract," explains Dr Nishantha Liyanapathirana, Consultant Urological Surgeon. Most of these stones are made of minerals of calcium (Eg, Calcium oxalate and calcium phosphate), but in a smaller percentage they could consist of constituents such as uric acid and cysteine. Urinary stones are generally formed in the kidneys, but can be found anywhere in urinary tract.

Prevalence and risk factors

"The prevalence of USD is similar to diabetes, affecting 1 in 11 people in their lifetime. As a temperate country with a tropical weather Sr

Lankans are inherently more prone for USD, since the major risk factor for stone formation is chronic dehydration" underscores Dr Liyanapathirana.

This is mainly due to evaporation of fluid from the body making our urine concentrated to a point where minerals of urine become tiny crystals and stick together to form a stone. Recurrent episodes of urine infections and various causes of obstruction of the urinary tract could accelerate the stone formation. Additionally, the number of patients with stones has nearly doubled over the past 15 years owing to the increasing incidence of other risk factors including high blood cholesterol, obesity and diabetes

Presentation

"Urinary stones are well-known to cause severe pain. However a stone forming inside the kidney may be completely asymptomatic until the latter stage which can manifest as a pain in the loin area. Nevertheless, this can silently cause significant damage to the kidney during that period. In contrast an excruciating pain in the loin region which runs down to the lower abdomen is typically experienced when a stone drops down and obstructs the ureter tube. It's more often associated with bouts of vomiting and may be accompanied with passing red colour urine due to bleeding in to the urinary tract caused by the stone obstructed' says Dr Liýanapathirana.

This is referred as ureteric colic and often requires hospital admission for pain relief. Occasionally stones develop inside the bladder which manifest as symptoms of difficulty and pain while passing urine due to the obstruction of the urine outflow

Diagnosis

According to Dr Liyanapathirana, the widespread availability of many modalities of investigations, diagnosis of USD is quick and accurate in the modern day. Urological surgeons could request basic tests like urine analysis and X-rays of GU tract as well as more advanced, imaging tests such as CT scans for accurately assess and locate the stones.

Interventions

Treatment of urinary stones depends on location and size of the stones and their complication. Most of the larger stones formed inside kidneys need interventions. On the other hand stones causing obstruction to ureters or kidneys need a careful evaluation before





proceeding with treatment. They could sometimes be treated with oral medication to expel with urine, but this needs careful follow-up to reassess the situation. If the stones are too large or unlikely to pass with the medications or complicated with infections or kidney impairment an urgent surgical intervention is always recommended.

In this modern era stones developed at any part of the urinary tract are managed with endoscopic or telescopic surgeries by the urological surgeons. Kidney stones are now effectively treated

"Apart from the crippling pain urinary stones could cause serious complications if not assessed and treated properly. This includes infections of urinary tract which may at times lead to serious life threatening condition" says the doctor.

Stones obstructing kidneys and ureters could cause significant damage to the kidneys if not attended on time. In a worst case scenario this may be permanent, needing advanced therapies liké dialysis and even renal transplantation.

The Sri Lanka Volleyball Federation (SLVB) has decided not to field a team for the 21st Asian Women's Volleyball Championships, which will be held from August 29 to September 5 in the Philippines.

Sri Lanka has been participating n this event regularly from 1991 to 2019 with the exception of five occasions.

This year's event will be an Asian Qualification Tournament

for the 2022 FIVB Volleyball Championship.

The tournament, which has been conducted by the Asian Volleyball Confederation since 1975, has attracted only eight countries due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

SLVB has decided to skip this year's tournament as the Sri Lanka Women's Volleyball Team has not performed upto expectations in the recent past and also given the estimated cost for this event being over Rs. 10 million.

India 'dances' with joy after hockey team end four-decade medal drought

India celebrated yesterday over a bronze medal, after the most successful nation in men's Olympic hockey claimed their first podium finish in 41 years.

A comeback 5-4 win over Germany in Tokyo snared third place in the tournament and ended decades of agonising over repeat failures since they won the last of their eight Olympic titles in Moscow in 1980.

Families of the Indian team danced in the streets in Punjab state, waving hockey sticks in the air after the win. Other fans waved the Indian flag as they rushed out of their houses.

Ten of the 18-man squad -cluding double goalscorer Simranjeet Singh -- come from Punjab, where the state government said each would get a \$135,000 bonus.

"The whole nation is dancing," Prime Minister Narendra Modi told captain Manpreet Singh and coach Graham Reid in a celebratory call to the team. He

hailed the win as "historic". Hockey has fallen behind cricket in the popularity and glamour stakes in India. Despite the country's pedigree in the sport,

none of the team were born the last time India won a medal.

Even cricket legends such as Gautam Gambhir were quick to praise the team. And goalkeeper Parattu Raveendran Sreejesh echoed Modi's hopes that the result would inspire a new generation to take up hockey. "It's a rebirth. That's it. It's been 41 years," he said.

"In 1980 we won the last medal and after that, nothing. This gives a boost and gives energy to the youngsters to pick up hockey and play this game. This is a beautiful game." India came back from 3-1 down and went into the final quarter leading 5-3, before a German goal set up a tense finale.

Sreejesh pulled off a crucial save in the dying seconds as Germany threw everything at India, sinking to his knees when the match finished.

India's women's team has enjoyed their best ever Olympics and will play Britain for bronze today after eliminating title favourites Australia in the quarter-finals.



I can go higher, says pole vault champ Duplantis after record near-miss

Olympic pole vault champion Armand Duplantis said he was confident of raising his world record still further after he came close to setting a new best in the Tokyo final.

Duplantis secured gold with 6.02 metres and then came agonisingly close on his record attempt of 6.19m. But the 21-year-old Swede said he had plenty more to come.

"I definitely think I can jump higher than I've jumped so far,' he said at an event organised by official timekeeper Omega.

"Into the 6.20s, this is very possible for me, especially considering the way I felt over over 6.19 a couple of nights ago." After Sergey Bubka's world record of 6.14m stood for 20 years, France's Renaud Lavillenie jumped 6.16m in 2014, but Duplantis has taken the event to new heights, raising the record to 6.18m.

He said it was a "bit of a

bummer" that his good friend, American Sam Kendricks, missed Tuesday's final after being ruled out by coronavirus and he believes he could have jumped higher with the reigning world champion present.

"He's somebody that very well could have pushed me to some higher heights," Duplantis said.

"And I think we could have definitely done something even more special than what happened." Duplantis narrowly missed a potentially ruinous coffee appointment with Kendricks in Tokyo's Athletes' Village when a phone conversation with his girlfriend overran.

He said he was in regular touch with Kendricks during his isolation in Tokyo."It's a shame. It's a crazy situation, something that you never would predict to happen," Duplantis said.

WORLD CHAMPION GARDINER

teven Gardiner added Olympic gold to his 400m World Championship title with a steaming run down the home stretch that gave Bahamas their first medal at Tokyo 2020 yesterday.

Gardiner overcame a poor start but still found himself behind in the last 100m, before he powered his way through and crossed the line first with a season's best time of 43.85 secs, ahead of Anthony Jose Zambrano of Colombia who took silver.

"It feels amazing. My first Olympic Games didn't go well for me (missing the final at Rio 2016) but this one here, I'm cherishing this moment. Olympic champion," Gardiner, who won gold at the 2019 World Athletics Championships said after the race.

Grenada also bagged its first medal of Tokyo 2020, when Kirani James crossed the line for bronze, claiming his third Olympic medal in the Men's 400m, having taken gold in 2012 and silver in 2016.

Americans Michael Cherry and Michael Normal finished just outside the medals, a tenth of a second apart, as the USA's

woeful track returns continued. In the Men's 110m hurdles final, Jamaica's Hansle Parchment improved on his bronze medal from London 2012 to win gold with a season's best time of 13.04 secs, five-hundredths of a second ahead of Grant Holloway from the United States.

Ronald Levy of Jamaica finished third with a time of 13.10 secs.

"There was no intimidation. He is a great competitor. I knew that he would have taken the lead, he always takes the lead. I don't know how he gets to the first hurdle so fast. I know

that once I am close to the first three hurdles, I would be able to catch him close to the line and I did just that," Parchment said of beating favourite Holloway, who set the second fastest time in the event's history earlier this year.

The United States did however have success in field events yesterday, with Pole Vaulter Katie Nageotte winning gold, even though she was on the cusp of elimination after failing her first two jumps at the opening height of 4.50 metres.

After making the height on her third attempt, she later went on to make the winning jump

at 4.90 metres on her second attempt, beating the number one ranked athlete Anzhelika Sidorova of the Russian Olympic Committee.

In contrast, Sidorova had clean jumps until she botched two attempts at 4.90 metres and, choosing to go one level higher, couldn't make her only attempt at 4.95 metres.

Speaking on how she handled the competition, Nageotte said: "It was the worst warm-up I have had in a long time and I did an ugly first few jumps. It took me a few heights to get in to it, but I was just fighting and I finally found a smooth jump. It came together."

Holly Bradshaw of Great Britain whose last successful clearance, like Sidorova, was at 4. 85m, won bronze medal on countback, having registered more failures.

The United States also took gold and silver in the Men's Shot Put event, with Ryan Crouser setting a new Olympic record with a throw of 23.30 metres, ahead of compatriot Joe Kovacs whose best effort was for a distance of 22.65 metres.

Tomas Walsh of New Zealand won bronze with a season's best 22.47 metres.

Portugal's Pedro Picahardo won gold in the Men's Triple Jump with a new National Record of 17.98 metres on his third jump, with Yaming Zhu of China a distance second with a leap of 17.57 metres.

Hugues Fabrice Zango created history by winning Burkina Faso's first ever Olympic medal, with a bronze medal winning jump of 17.47 metres.

A fifth-place finish in the Men's Decathlon 1500m was enough for Canada's Damian Warner to take gold with a new Olympic Record and take gold in the ten-discipline event, 292 points ahead of World Record nolder Kevin Mayer.

Ashley Moloney broke the Oceania Record with his total



All Blacks primed to defend historic run at Eden Park fortress

The All Blacks will not only be defending the Bledisloe Cup when they face the Wallabies on Saturday, but looking to preserve an unbeaten run at Auckland's Eden Park.

Their unbroken run of 19 years with the Cup and 27 years without a loss at the grounds known as "the fortress" are achievements that rile Australia.

To prepare for the Bledisloe, the Wallabies won a tense 2-1 series against Six Nations runners-up France and the All Blacks easily won Tests against Tonga and Fiji last month.

New Zealand's performance had Wallabies coach Dave Rennie planning to dominate up front and play a fast, physical and aerial game in the hope of claiming the three-Test series and ending the All

Blacks' dominance. The All Blacks have not been beaten at Eden Park, their spiritual home, in 44 Tests dating back to 1994. Australia have not won at the ground since 1986, nor held the Bledisloe Cup, which is contested

annually by the two countries, since 2002. While the All Blacks say they are focused on the game rather than extending records, the Wallabies

see an opportunity to claim a slice of history. None of the Wallabies were born when the team last won at Eden Park in 1986. Captain Michael Hooper said that, though he has not enjoyed

repeatedly losing at Eden Park, younger members of the squad have been spared the pressure that comes with playing there. "It wouldn't be good to put what everyone else says

about Eden Park on to them," Hooper said. -AFP

Spain's Sanchez Jaime lands karate's historic first Olympic gold

Spain's Sandra Sanchez aime won the first ever Olympic Games karate gold medal in Tokyo yesterday.

She ensured her name would be in the sport's history books by beating Japan's Kiyou Shimizu in the women's kata Karate was included for

the first time on the Olympic programme for the pandemicdelayed 2020 Games, but was not included on the menu for Paris 2024. Sanchez Jaime, 39, took

the historic title with a higher athletic score than the home favourite Shimizu after the two karatekas were all square on 19.60 on the technical score. The 2018 world champion

beamed and raised her arms skywards after the chief judge had walked out to stand between the two finalists, then raising the right arm to signify victory for Sanchez Jaime.

Karate is split into two disciplines: kata, where athletes perform choreographed moves for the judges to score, and kumite, which involves two fighters trying to land blows on each other in bouts of up to three minutes. Yesterday France's Steven da Costa will

face Turkey's Eray Samdan in the men's -67kg kumite final followed by the women's -55kg kumite final.

The karate competition is being held at the Nippon Budokan, the venue with the roof fashioned to resemble Mount Fuji. It staged judo at the 1964 Tokyo Olympics.

New Zealand cricket team to tour Pakistan after 18 years

New Zealand will tour Pakistan for the first time in 18 years to play three one-day internationals and five Twenty20s, both countries said yesterday.

Pakistan has made steady strides in restoring its image as a safe venue for international matches, after successfully hosting Zimbabwe, Sri Lanka, the West Indies, and South Africa in recent years. The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB)

said New Zealand will tour "Pakistan

for the first time since 2003" starting

September 17, with all matches split between the central cities of Lahore and Rawalpindi. "The 2019 World Cup finalists, who are also the World Test

champions and ranked third in T20Is, will draw tremendous attraction and interest from the local fans, and will reinforce Pakistan's status as a safe and secure country," PCB Chief Executive Wasim Khan said in a statement.

A bomb blast outside the New Zealand team's hotel in Karachi in 2002 cut short the Black Caps' last Test tour of Pakistan, but they visited again for an ODI series the following year.

After a deadly 2009 attack on the Sri Lanka team bus in Lahore, most of Pakistan's international matches have been hosted outside the country over security fears. However, the rapid improvement

in security in recent years has gradually seen the return of international cricket to Pakistan.

Rawalpindi's Pindi cricket stadium will host the ODIs

between September 17 and 21, while Lahore's Gaddafi Stadium will stage all five T20s, starting on September 25 the PCB said. Kane Williamson's side is currently ranked number one in


Tests and ODIs. New Zealand Cricket's chief executive David White said the country was looking forward to the upcoming tour.

"New Zealand was the first country outside India to (ever) tour Pakistan and we share a close relationship with the PCB,' White added. "It's great that, after such

a difficult time for Pakistan, international cricket is again being played in the country." The three one-day internationals are part of the ODI League, a qualification process for the men's Cricket World Cup in 2023 to be held in India.

New Zealand will be the first side to visit Pakistan in what the PCB has called a "bumper 2021-22 season."

Following New Zealand's tour, England's men's and women's sides are set to play white-ball matches in Pakistan in October. - AFP

Sri Lanka has been ranked the fifth poorest country in the world in terms of food affordability, according to a latest report by United Kingdom (UK)-based think tank, Institute of Development Studies.

The country rankings were based on the 'Cost of Food Basics' analysis that compares the monthly minimum recommended spend on food per adult and monthly average wage in 107 countries globally.

For the analysis, the research team has utilised the data published on publicly available global cost-of-living database, Numbeo, in June this year.

The minimum recommended amount of food is based on 12-14 basic items that together would account for 2,100 calories per adult per day which is the level recommended by the World Health Organization (WHO) and the US

Committee on International Nutrition.

The 'Cost of Food Basics' found that, more than one year since the outbreak of COVID-19, there was a vast disparity between countries in terms of the proportion of average wages needed to afford enough food.

affordable nation for basic food, according to the analysis.

The monthly minimum recommended expenditure for food per person in Sri Lanka was US\$ 161.23, while the average monthly wage per adult in the

country stood at US\$ 245.81.

"This means that 66 percent of average wages per person would need to be spent to afford the minimum recommended amount of food for an adult. This is before considering other costs such as feeding their family or Sri Lanka was the fifth least expenses including rent, transport, utilities and other non-food purchases,' the researchers pointed out.

In contrast, in neighbouring India, the recommended minimum monthly expenditure on basic foods accounted for only 27 percent of monthly wages.

Teejay Lanka records improved 1Q performance

Teejay Lanka PLC has made an encouraging start to FY 2021-22 with solid top and bottom line growth in the three months ending 30th June 2021, shrugging off the pandemic-imposed shackles that retarded 1Q growth last year and overcoming the impact of the third wave of COVID-19 on the industry.

Sri Lanka's largest textile manufacturer more than doubled revenue to Rs. 10.4 billion at group level for the three months posting growth of 119 percent, achieved 27-fold improvement in its profit before tax of Rs. 385 million, and converted last year's 1Q net loss of Rs. 31.5 million into a posttax profit of Rs. 310.5 million in 1Q, 2021the Group's third consecutive quarter of profit growth.

Teejay Lanka Chairman Bill Lam welcomed the positive start to the new financial year, but cautioned that raw material prices and the new dynamics brought about by the global pandemic would continue to pose challenges to the business.

He attributed the growth in turnover to the Group's success in maintaining uninterrupted operations at all three manufacturing plants despite the third wave of COVID-19, additional revenue from outsourced operations in Sri Lanka and the depreciation of the Rupee in the review period.

The turnaround in 1Q profits was achieved through increased volumes, a strong order book, strategic management of yarn price increases and stringent control of osts, he said.

At company level, Teejay Lanka reported profit before tax of Rs. 347 million for the three months, reflecting growth of 40 percent, while net profit improved by 50 percent to Rs. 315 million on revenue of Rs. 6.2 billion, up 65 percent over the corresponding quarter of the previous year.

Pandemic fuels SL's digital literacy; computer literacy lags

- COVID-19 has pushed more people to pick up digital devices for work, study etc.
- Digital literacy rate rose to 50.1% in 2020 from 46% in 2019
- ■But computer literacy rate only edged up by 1.5% to 32.3%

hile computer literacy hasn't reached a third of the population in Sri Lanka, the COVID-19 pandemic has given the country's digital literacy a push with people picking up digital devices to connect with each other, work, study and entertain themselves while staying at home.

The ability of a person between the ages of 5 and 69 to use a computer, laptop, tablet or a smartphone on their own without outside support is defined as digital literacy and it is measured as a percentage of the population in the same age bracket.

In Sri Lanka, this rate reached 50.1 percent by the end of 2020 compared to 32.3 percent computer literacy rate, according to the latest

survey on computer literacy by the were seen increasingly investing Department of Census and Statistic. This is also a jump from 46

percent digital literacy rate in 2019. In comparison, the computer literacy, which requires a bit more sophistication and perhaps a little training, rose only by 1.5 percentage points from 2019.

Some low-income households could only afford a smartphone to ensure that their children receive their daily dose of online schooling when the pandemic deprived them of classroom learning for

With the so-called new normal brought in by the pandemic, people

in computers, laptops, tabs and smartphones to work-from-home.

Even after the end of the pandemic, it is now being predicted that the world work would largely remain a hybrid one, as employers have also realised the operational savings such an arrangement could bring in.

According to the bi-annual survey, every one in five households in Sri Lanka has either a desktop or a laptop computer and this hasn't changed much during the last four years from a range of 22 percent to 23 percent.

Chevron Lubricants loses momentum in 2Q as virus-related restrictions return

After a solid start for the year, Chevron Lubricants Lanka PLC appears to have lost momentum in the June quarter (2Q21), largely due to pandemic-related restrictions.

The market leader in lubricant blending and sales reported revenues of Rs.2.8 billion for the three months to June 2021 compared to Rs.2.5 billion in the year earlier period, logging 9.0 percent growth.

However, June quarter revenues marked a sharp drop from the Rs.4.4 billion in revenues registered in the first quarter that ended in March, which surged by 53 percent from the same period in 2020.

The initial demand for company's namesake lubricants and others under Caltex and Texaco brands was fuelled by

the restoration of economic normalcy after months long pandemic-induced restrictions.

However, this euphoria faded from around mid-April with fresh restrictions on travel and other economic activities being imposed, which led sales and profits to languish.

For instance the company's operating profit of Rs.578.8 million for the quarter under review was identical to that of the same period last year, which was characterised by even harsher virus-related restrictions.

The company reported earnings of Rs.1.92 a share or Rs.461.2 million for the quarter under review compared to earnings of Rs.1.78 a share or Rs.427.0 million in the corresponding period last year.

President's office stresses no change to fertilizer policy; says only organic fertilizer allowed for local agriculture

Only specialised fertilizers allowed to be imported through Agriculture Department and other relevant institutions under special licensing system

According to census conducted by relevant govt. institutions, licenses have been issued for a six month period



The government on Wednesday stressed that it has not granted permission to import chemical fertilizers for local agricultural purposes, and has not made any changes to the decision taken by the President to use only organic fertilizers for local agriculture and will not make any changes to this decision in the future as well.

A media statement by the President's Media Division said the Cabinet had granted approval to the proposal made by the Minister of Agriculture on 31st of May 2021, to import plant nutrients, which include natural chelated minerals and micro matter.

"As the above natural chelated minerals and micro matter were already being imported under the HS Code, but currently prohibited by the Gazette Notification No. 2226/48, and in order to grant Cabinet approval to the aforesaid Cabinet paper submitted by the Minister of Agriculture, the Gazette Notification No. 2226/48 was amended.

Tourist arrivals to the country up for third consecutive month in July

19,337 visitors arrive during first seven months

Kazakhstan, Ukraine, Germany, China and the United Kingdom were top five int'l tourist generating markets for SL for the January to July period this year

Sri Lanka saw a pickup in the number of tourist arrivals for the month of July with 2,429 visitors coming in.

The total number of visitors to the country for the first seven months Following the steep decline witnessed in April, the number of tourist arrivals is now on an upward trajectory. The numbers have increased, marginally, for the third consecutive month.

According to the Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority (SLTDA), the improvement in international arrivals is largely due to factors such as vaccination programmes around the world, softer restrictions for vaccinated travellers and growing consumer confidence.

The United Kingdom, Maldives, and United States emerged as the largest source markets for the month of July.

The United Kingdom accounted for 14.1 percent of the total traffic, while Maldives accounted for 10.3

percent, and the United States 10 percent.

Region wise, Europe became the largest source of tourist traffic to Sri Lanka with 53.4 percent of the total traffic for the month. Asia and Pacific accounted for 26.8 percent of the total traffic while Americas accounted for 17.4 percent.

"The presence of countries from the Americas, Western, Central & Eastern Europe and Asia Pacific regions among the top source markets reflects the gradual revitalisation of tourism industry fuelled by factors such as gradual improvement of traveller confidence, lifting of travel restrictions and roll out of the COVID 19 vaccine,' SLTDA said.

Sri Lanka's food inflation has been growing by double digits during the last few months, while the real wages of private sector and informal sector workers have recorded a contraction due to the pandemic.

According to 2020 Global Food Security Index (GFSI), high agricultural import tariffs (above global average), food inflation and absence of comprehensive food safety-net programmes with a national coverage remain key weak indicators in food affordability.

The top 10 countries where basic food was least affordable were Syria, Nigeria, Ethiopia, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Ghana, Indonesia, Algeria, Iran and Uzbekistan.

Based on these results, Teejay Lanka PLC has proposed an interim dividend of Rs. 1.15 per share in respect of the quarter reviewed. The Group has continued its strong debt-free balance sheet from the previous year with a net cash balance of Rs. 4.8 billion.

Therefore, in accordance with the Imports and Exports (Control) Regulations No. 11 of 2021 issued by the Minister of Finance on 30th July 2021, only the following types of specialised fertilizers are allowed to be imported through the Department of Agriculture and other relevant institutions under a special licensing system. Only the organic fertilizers, which are up to the international organic fertilizer standards, will be allowed to be used for local agricultural

"According to the census conducted by the Department of Agriculture, Department of National Botanic Gardens and other relevant government institutions, licenses have been issued for a period of six months under the direct supervision of institutions registered for protect agriculture in greenhouses and for hydroponics, aeroponics and floriculture to import nitrogen minerals or chemical fertilizers and chelated minerals and nutrients.

The above licenses also permit packets of compound fertilizers containing the three plant nutrients, namely mineral or chemical nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, or capsules containing a mixture of two of them or packets weighing 10kg or less containing such products.

All these fertilizers are allowed to be imported only by the relevant agencies as per the requirements or under special licenses issued only for limited quantities to suit those requirements," it added.

In addition, nitrogen extracts (organic) and mineral potassium can be imported, which are not classified as chemical fertilizers, the statement said.





Disney sails into new LGBT waters with 'Jungle Cruise' film

"Jungle Cruise," Disney's new nostalgia-soaked adventure film based on a 1950s theme park ride, has an unexpectedly modern twist, one of its

main characters comes out as gay. A scene in which Jack Whitehall's character discusses his sexuality with Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson's Ámazon boat captain, though far from ground-breaking by modern cinema terms, is a departure

for the traditionally conservative studio. Young British fop MacGregor does not use the specific word "gay," but explains how he broke off three engagements with women because his "interests happily lay elsewhere," prompting skipper Frank to raise a toast to "elsewhere." "I felt



And a fleeting lesbian kiss in "Star Wars: The Rise of Skywalker" was cut from versions of the film playing in Singapore and Dubai, where same-sex marriage is illegal.

But the historic "Star Wars" lip-lock was also condemned by LGBT rights advocates as tokenistic as was a brief scene in Marvel's record-grossing "Avengers: Endgame" in which an openly gay man participates in a support group.

The "Jungle Cruise" representation goes further - MacGregor explains he joined his scientist sister (Emily Blunt) on her expedition to Brazil because she "stood by" him while others in World War I-era London spurned him because of who he "loved." "It was a scene that we really wanted to get right," said Whitehall, a British

comedian-turned-actor, who is straight. Expanding on the theme at Sunday's world premiere in California, Whitehall told Variety he thought the scene was 'significant" and "one that we certainly thought about and talked about a lot." "I hope that it's a scene that audiences enjoy and I certainly felt at the time that I was proud of the work that we'd done, he said, adding that he hoped it would be a positive for LGBT children watching.

But the film's failure to use the word "gay" has already stoked criticism on social media. "Disney will really do anything to avoid using



the word 'gay' in its mainstream content won't it," wrote Declan Cashin, a curator for Twitter. GLAAD's "Studio Responsibility Index" counted only 20 LGBTQ characters in films released by major studios last year, and 30 percent of those were only on screen for under one minute.

Blacklow said GLAAD was looking forward to more LGBTQ storylines in upcoming Disney films, and especially in the Marvel superhero movies "Eternals," "Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness" and "Thor: Love and Thunder" - all due for release in the next 10 months. AFP

nere's something to be said about exploring the waterbodies of Sri Lanka. You could see tens and hundreds of them and each of them will offer something new and unexpected; something so exciting and surprising about each one that you are willing to explore the rest. The Koggala Lake is already famous. It's home to the island of Madol Doova which inspired Martin Wickramasinghe's eponymous book that has bought many curious locals and tourists to the lake and then to the island to recount the adventures of one Upali and Jinna. Over the years, a whole ecosystem has been built around the lake and today, it's a must-stop destination and experience on any southern coastal trip.

We were having lunch at the South Lake Resort at its waterfront restaurant gazing longingly at the still waters of the Koggala lake when we were told that the resort has its own boat and guide and frequently arranges lake safaris for guests and whether we'd like to go on one? The answer was yes; we are excited at the prospect of glimpsing Madol Doova and our curiosity had peaked over the tourism the local community has managed to built for itself over the years.


A short 30-minute drive from Galle, the Koggala Lake is a little oasis embellished with ten small islands; some inhibited but most not. The 30km lake takes almost 2 hours to explore with all its pit stops but it's 2 hours well spent.

The depth of the ake varies from as low as 3 feet to a maximum of 12 feet at the very middle of the lake. Our guide told us that the tsunami in 2004 had affected the depth of the water making some areas shallow and in those areas you will see fisherman standing knee deep in the water casting their nets – and some areas are very deep. It's important to have a boatman who knows the water well to avoid the frequently scattered rocks that may potentially scrape the barrel of the boat.

The lake has a very rich biodiversity and eco system with verdant mangrove swamps of kadol rees dotted occasionally with small flowers. t's also alive in birdlife; cormorants and herons perched on a rock or a lone Bonelli's eagle flying overhead as you cruise down the waters. The lake s rumoured to be home to a few crocodiles, but our guide told us they haven't seen them in years as the busy activities on the lake has made them wary of visiting populated areas.

One of the main functions of the Koggala Lake s its role in the fishing community, as the lake is abundant with seafood. Being a traditional fishing ground for centuries, the lake has many popular varieties of fish like barramundi, bull-eyed mackerel and barracuda. Perhaps one of the most unique experiences you can witness on the Koggala ake is prawn fishing that happens at night – a sight that can be witnessed from the South Lake Resort whose waterfront is at the epicentre of all this action. Fishermen come in the night and stay perched on little elevated seats on the water made from sticks with torches and lights cast into the water waiting to cast their nets at the right time

THE ISLANDS WITHIN AN ISLAND

The Koggala Lake has ten islands; some are inhibited and some aren't. Hath Doova, an uninhibited island is used for cinnamon plantation. When the crops are ready, people would come to the island and carry crops off. Observed from afar, Thambika Doova appears to be a few trees floating on water. What was once an island has eroded over time and all that remains are a few trees and a weathering rock.


