THE AWARD

This is an Award under section 24 of The Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950, as amended by the Industrial Disputes (Amendment) Acts, No. 25 of 1956, No. 14 of 1957, and No. 62 of 1957. It relates to an industrial dispute between The Ceylon Mercantile Union of No. 22-1/1, Upper Chatham Street, Colombo 1 (hereinafter referred to as "The Union"), and Messrs. Hoares (Ceylon) Limited, of No. 55, Dias Place, Colombo 12 (hereinafter referred to as "the Company").

2. The Honourable the Minister of Labour, by his Order dated 9th September, 1959, made by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 4 (2) of the aforesaid Act, referred the dispute to this Court for settlement.

According to the statement dated 9th September, 1959, furnished by the Deputy Commissioner of Labour and appended to the Order of the Minister, the matter in dispute between the Union and the Company is "whether the retrenchment of the following nineteen employees is justified and to what relief they are entitled:—

3. Both the Union and the Company duly filed with the Registrar of this Court their respective statements and answers, relating to the matter in dispute. The gist of the Company's statement is that, owing to the considerable diminution in the volume of its business in recent times and the consequent average monthly loss of Rs. 21,547 sustained during the period 1st October, 1958 to 31st March, 1959, it decided, entirely *bona fide* and in its own best interest, to carry out a scheme of retrenchment affecting two European executives, one Engineering Assistant, one Ceylonese executive, one workshop foreman, twenty-two clerical and minor staff, eleven others including drivers and labourers, and six launchmen and porters, thus saving a total sum of Rs. 20,909.13 per month. Of the twenty-two clerical and minor staff, three accepted the retrenchment and left the services of the Company, so that it was only the remaining nineteen that were concerned in the present dispute. The Company stressed its *bona fides* in the action it had taken.

The Union in its statement referred to an earlier attempt made by the Company (in January, 1957) to retrench twenty-three employees, all of whom were members of the Union. The resultant dispute between the Union and the Company had been referred to an Industrial Court. The Court, having in the course of its inquiry, examined the Company's duly audited Balance Sheets and Profit and Loss Accounts for the years ending September, 1953, September, 1954, and September, 1955, and the unaudited accounts for the six months ending 31st March, 1956, and for the twelve months ending 30th September, 1956, had made award (in I. D. 18) finding the proposed retrenchment unjustified and ordering that all the persons mentioned in the reference be retained in employment.

The Union stated that the Company, acting on unaudited figures prepared by the Management in respect of the six months commencing 1st October, 1958, was once more seeking to retrench twenty-three employees, nineteen of whom were mentioned in the present reference. The Union added that the Managing Director of the Company conceded that the years ending September, 1956, and September, 1957, had been years of profit and that the accounts for the year ending September, 1958, had not yet been audited. In these circumstances the Union maintained that the Company had not established the necessity for the retrenchment of the persons concerned in the present dispute.

4. My inquiry began on 9th February, 1960. Mr. P. B. Tampoe, General Secretary of the Ceylon Mercantile Union, appeared for the Union. Mr. Advocate S. J. Kadrigamar, instructed by Messrs. Julius & Creasy, appeared for the Company. After Mr. Tampoe had briefly outlined the Union's case Mr. Kadrigamar set out the Company's case, explaining patiently and in minute detail the financial strains and stresses that

the Company had begun to experience in recent years and the varied efforts made by the Board of Directors to ease them. To mention just one such effort, Mr. J. H. Hoare, Chairman of the Board of Directors, had begun to forgo his salary.

Since Mr. Tampoe was not at this stage inclined to give any quarter where the unaudited accounts were concerned, Mr. Kadrigamar promised that the Company would try to produce by the next date of hearing the audited accounts for the year ending 30th September, 1958.

5. When the inquiry was resumed on 25th April, 1960, Mr. Tampoe brought to the notice of the Court that the Company had on 29th January, 1960, given notice of discontinuance to another member of the Union named I. B. T. Fernando and had actually followed it up by informing him on 25th March, 1960, of the termination of his services. Mr. Tampoe asked that I. B. T. Fernando's name be included along with the nineteen listed by the Deputy Commissioner of Labour in his statement of the matter in dispute. As Mr. Kadrigamar intimated to the Court that the Company had no objection to such inclusion, I. B. T. Fernando's name was duly added to the original list of retrenchees.

6. Since at the very outset of the inquiry both Mr. Tampoe and Mr. Kadrigamar had—although for different reasons—mentioned the Award in I. D. 18 as having a close relevance to the present dispute, Mr. Kadrigamar now proceeded to make a minute analysis and exposition of that Award, pointing out the various considerations that had prompted the Court to make the decisions recorded therein. This he did with the object of clarifying the present dispute in all its aspects and ramifications and of justifying the retrenchment measure which forms its subject.

On this day Mr. Kadrigamar marked and commented on sixteen documents (H. 1-16) which he was producing.

7. On 25th April, 1960, the third day of hearing, he marked and commented on more documents (H. 17-50) and (H. 51A-0).

8. At the next sitting, on 12th May, 1960, he marked and commented on still more documents (H. 52-59). Thereafter he called his first witness Mr. A. J. F. Rogers, who had joined the Company as an Assistant Engineer in March, 1953, and had since 1st December, 1957, functioned as its Managing Director until on 29th February, 1960, he terminated his services with the Company for no other reason than that the Company was no longer able to extend to him some of those amenities which the European executives had earlier been accustomed to enjoy.

9. On the next date of hearing, viz., 19th May, 1960, Mr. Rogers' evidence-in-chief ended and his cross-examination by Mr. Tampoe began. On this day Mr. Rogers produced, for the purpose of illustrating and amplifying some of the points made by him, documents marked H. 60-64. His cross-examination had not yet ended when the Court rose at 5.15 p.m.

10. When the inquiry was resumed on 20th May, 1960, Mr. Tampoe continued his cross-examination of Mr. Rogers which occupied all that day, all the next day, viz., 21st May, 1960, and a goodly portion of 25th May, 1960, which was the next date of hearing.

11. Mr. Kadrigamar began his re-examination of Mr. Rogers on 25th May, 1960, and completed it the same day. On that day he marked documents H. 65-67.

12. Mr. Rogers' testimony, both in his evidence-in-chief and under cross-examination by the lynx-eyed Mr. Tampoe, was on the whole dispassionate and objective and helped not only the Court but—so I believe—Mr. Tampoe and his fellow representatives of the Union to get an inside view of the vicissitudes which the Company had been passing through in recent years and appraise its problems more understandingly and therefore more sympathetically.

13. When, therefore, on 26th May, 1960, immediately on resumption of the hearing Mr. Kadrigamar apprised the Court that he and Mr. Tampoe had had a preliminary discussion with a view, if possible, to effecting a settlement, and when both Counsel jointly desired a short adjournment during which an effort to secure a settlement would be made, I was not altogether surprised. The adjournment was gladly granted.

After two hours of mutual discussion both counsel intimated to me that they required more time to pursue their deliberations.

14. When the Court was about to resume its sitting the next day (27th May, 1960), Mr. Tampoe informed me in Chambers that he and Mr. Kadrigamar were proceeding with their discussion and asked me for a further adjournment. This was granted.

At 5.10 p.m. both Mr. Kadrigamar and Mr. Tampoe saw me in Chambers and informed me that a settlement had been found possible and that after finalisation of the terms they would submit a memorandum of settlement to me on Monday, 31st May, 1960, at 3 p.m.

15. On 31st May, 1960, Mr. J. C. Byrnell appeared for the Company in the absence of Mr. Kadrigamar, who was detained elsewhere. Mr. Tampoe, who appeared for the Union, left the Court with my permission leaving Mr. J. C. Hatch to represent the Union in his place.

Mr. Byrnell advised the Court that the Company and the Union had reached the following settlement:—

"The Union accepts retrenchment of the following persons as effected by the Company on the basis of 'last in, first out':—

The Company, having considered the special circumstances in regard to the following four persons, is willing to continue them in employment as from the 1st of June, 1960, without a break in their service or change in the terms of their employment:—

Mrs. L. G. Peiris  
Miss G. Hingert  
Mr. W. J. G. Perera.

It is agreed that these four persons have no claim to salary in respect of the period that they were out of employment.

The Company agrees that in the event of recruitment of employees of the category of those now retrenched, it will offer employment through the Union to those of the retrenched employees who are at the present moment out of employment, a list of whose names has been agreed between the Union and the Company.

It is agreed that the Company will pay retrenchment compensation in a total sum of Rs. 16,000, which will be paid to the Union as follows:—

- (a) Rs. 5,000 on or before the 15th of June, 1960;
- (b) Rs. 5,000 on or before the 15th of December, 1960; and
- (c) Rs. 6,000 on or before the 31st of December, 1961.

But Major Hoare will endeavour to have this last instalment settled earlier, if possible.

It is agreed that the Union will allocate and divide this sum among the retrenched employees in such manner as the Union thinks fit, and it is agreed that no individual will be entitled to prefer any claim or raise any dispute with the Company in regard to the quantum of compensation or the allocation of the same.

The Union agrees that this settlement is binding upon it and all the members of the Branch Union at the Company."

15. I should here mention that the Company and the Union, in the course of the discussion which led to the settlement, agreed to bring within the purview of the settlement the two employees, viz., P. Gunewardane and T. M. Sukumaran, whose names occur as the last two in the list embodied in the memorandum of settlement.

16. Mr. Hatch on behalf of the Union confirmed approval of the terms of the settlement.

17. I consider the above-mentioned settlement just and equitable and in the best interest both of the Union and of the Company, and I make my Award accordingly.

In doing so I would place on record my keen appreciation of the enlightened and conciliatory manner in which the Company, as represented by its Chairman Major J. H. Hoare and his Counsel Mr. Kadirgamar, and the Union, as represented by Mr. Tampoe, addressed themselves to the matter in dispute and, instead of allowing what might have become a prolonged and acrimonious debate to continue, brought about the happy settlement referred to above.

It may be that many captains of industry are as soulless and impersonal as the machines they manufacture or market and that many union leaders out-Shylock Shylock himself in obduracy, but the humane spirit in which Mr. Hoare and the imaginatively realistic spirit in which Mr. Tampoe approached the problem of resolving the present dispute restore one's faith in the essential goodness of human nature.

#### THE AWARD

This is an award under section 24 of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950 (as amended by the Industrial Disputes (Amendment) Acts, No. 25 of 1956, 14 of 1957 and 62 of 1957). It relates to an industrial dispute between the Sri Lanka Labour Union, No. 99, Gintupitiya Street (Colombo 13) (hereinafter referred to as "the Labour Union") and the Colombo Co-operative Stores Societies Union, Limited, No. 11, Saunders Place, (Colombo 12) (hereinafter referred to as "the Co-operative Stores Union").

2. By his Order under section 4 (2) of the aforesaid Act dated February 1, 1960, the Honourable the Minister of Labour referred to this Court for settlement an industrial dispute between the above named parties. The matter in dispute between the parties, as set out by the Deputy Commissioner of Labour in his statement dated January 16, 1960, is the demand made by the Labour Union for the payment of a special living allowance of Rs. 17.50.

3. The Co-operative Stores Union has filed its statement under Regulation 20 of the Industrial Disputes Regulations, 1958. It states that the Labour Union has no status to enter into any dispute with the Co-operative Stores Union in that the Labour Union has only a membership of 7 in its staff of 193 workers of different grades. It also states that the Co-operative Stores Union had been in communication with the Department of Labour and had learnt that the special living allowance is payable only if the salaries and allowances paid are on the same basis as government employees; that the salaries and allowances paid by the Co-operative Stores Union have no such basis. It is also pleaded that the Co-operative Stores Union took over from the liquidators on December 30, 1959, and that the working of the business shows a loss of nearly Rs. 4,000 per month during the first few months; that there was a recurrent loss even during the time the liquidators ran the business.

The statement filed by the Labour Union merely sets out that a demand is being made for the payment of a special living allowance of Rs. 17.50. It does not state as to why this demand is being made and what reasons justify the demand.

4. At my inquiry Mr. A. G. Piyasinghe, Secretary of the Labour Union, appeared for the Union while Mr. A. F. de Saa Bandaranaike, Administrative Secretary of the Co-operative Stores Union, appeared for that Union.

5. With regard to the question of membership of the Labour Union among the workers of the Co-operative Stores Union, Mr. Bandaranaike stated that he sent out a questionnaire to all the 193 workers in the Co-operative Stores Union and that he received 176 replies and only 7 replies indicated that they were from members of the Labour Union. Mr. Piyasinghe stated that there were 125 members of the Labour Union in the Co-operative Stores Union at the time the demand for a special living allowance of Rs. 17.50 was originally made; that now, as a long period had elapsed, some of the members had left the Labour Union as the Labour Union was not able to do anything for them. He stated that now there are about 90 members among the workers of the Co-operative Stores Union.

6. It is unnecessary for me to investigate the question as to whether Mr. Bandaranaike's or Mr. Piyasinghe's statement is correct because my attention has not been invited to any law which requires that there should be a particular percentage of membership of a trade union before that trade union can take up an industrial dispute with the employer on behalf of the workers. So long as there is an industrial dispute between the workers and the employer, and the Minister has thought it fit to refer that industrial dispute to an Industrial Court, it is the duty of that Industrial Court, as laid down in the provisions of the Act, to make the necessary investigations and to make an award that is just and equitable.

7. With regard to the averment made in the statement filed by the Co-operative Stores Union that the Commissioner of Labour had stated that the special living allowance is payable only if the salaries and allowances paid to workers are on the

same basis as those paid to government employees, I think that this is due to a misunderstanding of the letter of the Commissioner of Labour. The letter dated February 26, 1960 (marked R. 2) has been produced. That letter reads as follows:—

"I have the honour to inform you that the special living allowance payable to government employees and to other employees who are paid on the same basis as government employees depends on the salary which is Rs. 17.50 for married persons drawing salaries from Rs. 20 to Rs. 100 and unmarried persons drawing salaries from Rs. 20 to Rs. 175."

This letter does not mean that only workers who are in receipt of salaries on the same basis as government employees are entitled to the payment of Rs. 17.50 as special living allowance. The letter only means that the employees in government services and in some other services are paid a special living allowance of Rs. 17.50 if their salaries range from Rs. 20 to Rs. 100 in the case of married persons, and Rs. 20 to Rs. 175 in the case of unmarried persons. I do not think that the fact that the workers in the Co-operative Stores Union are now in receipt of salaries and allowances which are not on the same basis as salaries and allowances received by government employees is a bar to their claiming the special living allowance of Rs. 17.50.

8. It would appear that this claim for a special living allowance of Rs. 17.50 was first made on March 6, 1958, and the demand has been subsequently pursued from time to time. On March 6, 1958, the present Colombo Co-operative Stores Societies Union, Limited, was not in existence. The Co-operative Stores Societies Union, Ltd. which was then in existence was a Society registered by the Commissioner of Co-operative Development, and the Registrar of Co-operative Societies, and bore the registration No. C. 1411. The registration of that Society was cancelled on November 24, 1958, and it went into liquidation. The liquidators have been carrying on the business previously carried on, no doubt with the object of winding up. The present Co-operative Stores Union was registered under No. 2224 in September, 1959, and started to function on December 31, 1959. It took over from the liquidators some of the assets of the previous Society including stock in trade as on December 31, 1959, furniture and fittings, etc. Thus, at the time the Minister referred this dispute to this Court on February 1, 1960, it is the present Co-operative Stores Union which was in existence and the dispute must be regarded as a dispute between the Labour Union and the present Co-operative Stores Union. It is, therefore, necessary to consider the capacity or incapacity of the present Co-operative Stores Union to pay the demanded special living allowance.

9. I stated earlier that the statement filed by the Labour Union under the Regulations framed under the Act does not set out any reasons as to why this demand was being made. Mr. Piyasinghe, however, in the course of his address, stated that the reasons for making the demand are the prevailing high cost of living and the fact that other workers in comparable employments are in receipt of this special living allowance. I think these reasons are sound. If other workers in comparable employment get this special living allowance it is only just and reasonable that workers in this Co-operative Stores Union should also receive similar allowances. But, as to whether the Co-operative Stores Union can be ordered to pay must necessarily depend on its capacity or otherwise to pay. Mr. Bandaranaike has produced the trading account and the profit and loss account of the Co-operative Stores Society for the period January, February and March, 1960 (marked R. 3). R. 3 shows a net loss of Rs. 9,115.90. Mr. Piyasinghe at one time stated that he could not accept these accounts without scrutiny of the account books themselves, but later agreed to accept the trading account and the profit and loss account, but contended that the loss sustained by the Co-operative Stores Union was due to the inefficiency of the Committee of Management. He gave as an instance in support of his contention that the loss sustained was due to the inefficiency of the management, that a co-operative stores at Grandpass which is not a member of this Co-operative Stores Union was selling empty gunny bags at 82 cents and 65 cents whereas this Co-operative Stores Union was selling the same quality of bags at 65 cents and 45 cents respectively. Mr. Bandaranaike's explanation for this was that while co-operative depots which are not members of the Co-operative Stores Union are at liberty to sell empty gunny bags at any price they liked, the Co-operative Stores Union is bound by its rules. They have to advertise calling for sealed tenders; that the sealed tenders are kept in a sealed box and are opened in the presence of the entire Committee of Management and that the highest tenderer is given the gunny bags.

10. It is not within the scope of my functions to investigate as to whether the Committee of Management is inefficient. But, it is my duty to investigate the capacity of the Co-operative Stores Union to meet the demand.

11. In order to see whether the previous Society had made good profits during the period of its existence and whether the present Society may be able to make good profits in the near future; so that, if there was sufficient reason for thinking that the present loss is only a passing phase because it is just starting business and that very soon it would make reasonably large profits, I investigated the profits made by the previous Society. Mr. F. Samarasinghe, Headquarters Inspector of Co-operative

Societies, produced books of accounts and balance sheets and profit and loss accounts, and gave evidence. According to his evidence, the previous Society was registered on March 15, 1944, and carried on business till the registration was cancelled on November 24, 1958, and it went into liquidation. Figures given by him show that during the first three years of its existence its margin of profits was very small ranging between Rs. 300 and Rs. 700 a year. But, since April 1, 1951, it had been making considerably large profits. In the year 1.4.51 to 31.3.52 the profits amounted to Rs. 89,843; Rs. 211,912 for the year 1.4.52 to 31.3.53; Rs. 23,963 for the year 1.4.53 to 31.3.54; Rs. 35,916 for the year 1.4.54 to 31.3.55; Rs. 91,898 for the year 1.4.55 to 31.3.56; Rs. 14,311 for the year 1.4.56 to 31.3.57 and Rs. 92,116 for the year 1.4.57 to 31.3.58. In the circumstances he was unable to explain as to why it became necessary to have the registration cancelled and for it to go into liquidation. The accounts for the subsequent period are being audited and the profit or loss for that period has not yet been ascertained. But, Mr. Samarasinghe stated that he learnt from the liquidators that during the time the business was being run by them a loss of over Rs. 50,000 had been estimated. He explained the reason for the large profits during some of these years as being due to the fact that the previous Society had a monopoly as wholesale dealers in regard to supply of flour and sugar throughout Colombo during this period and also with regard to the sale of firewood. The present Society does not enjoy that monopoly. Its present business is mainly the distribution of rice through its 24 depots on which it makes a profit of about  $\frac{1}{2}$  cent on a pound. It also makes a profit by the sale of empty gunnies. So that, according to Mr. Samarasinghe's evidence, the prospects of the present Society making any large profits are remote.

12. R. 5 is a copy of letter dated November 16, 1959, written by the Joint-Liquidators to the Commissioner of Labour. In that letter they state that the payment of Rs. 17.50 would be far too great a strain on the finances of the Society as 80 per cent of the turnover is on rice sales on which the marginal profit is only  $\frac{1}{2}$  cent per lb; that the Colombo Societies make a profit of only about Rs. 2,000 or less per annum.

13. The workers are now being paid a monthly basic wage of Rs. 120 Rs. to 160 for managers; Rs. 85 for cashiers; Rs. 70 for bill clerks; Rs. 60 for salesmen; Rs. 45 for watchmen; Rs. 70 for cycle orderlies; and Rs. 60 for peons. I have not set out the salaries which are paid to the Administrative Secretary and clerical assistants. The allowances paid are 10 per cent of the basic salary as dearness allowance plus Rs. 5 as a special living allowance with the exception of salesmen whose extra allowance is Rs. 10. Mr. Bandaranaike has submitted a statement (R. 4) which shows that the basic salary in respect of the entire staff for January, 1960 was Rs. 15,704, the dearness allowance Rs. 1,527 and the special living allowance Rs. 1,317. This means that the total paid by way of allowances for January was Rs. 2,844. For February, 1960, the total salary bill was Rs. 15,455 dearness allowance Rs. 1,506 and the special living allowance Rs. 1,296. This means that the total allowances paid during February was Rs. 2,802. In respect of March, 1960, the total salary bill was Rs. 15,082, dearness allowance Rs. 1,464 and special living allowance Rs. 1,249. This means that the total allowances for March was Rs. 2,173. For April, 1960, the total salary bill amounted to Rs. 15,041, the dearness allowance Rs. 1,462 and the special living allowance Rs. 1,217. This means that the total allowances paid in April came to Rs. 2,679. The drop in the salary bill and allowances was due to retrenchment of two or three workers. Mr. Bandaranaike has calculated the amount that would be payable as special living allowance if the Labour Union's demand is conceded at Rs. 3,114 per month. If the difference between the allowances which are now being paid and the Rs. 17.50 alone be paid, so as to make the total allowance Rs. 17.50 per month, then the extra amount involved would be Rs. 400 per month. Mr. Piyasinghe stated that what he was asking for was not the difference, but that an additional Rs. 17.50 be paid. This, as I stated earlier, would mean an additional commitment of Rs. 3,114 every month. In view of the fact that during the first three months of its existence the Co-operative Stores Union has sustained a loss of over Rs. 9,000 it is utterly impossible to meet this extra commitment. The demand is, therefore, rejected. This should not be taken to mean that the demand is rejected for all times. If and when the Co-operative Stores Union makes profits from which this sum may reasonably be met, it will then be time for the Labour Union to re-agitate this matter.

I make my award accordingly.

THE CONTROL OF PRICES ACT, No. 29 OF 1950

Order

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 4 read with section 3 (2) of the Control of Prices Act, No. 29 of 1950, I Thambiah Sivagnanam, Deputy Controller of Prices (Food), Hambantota District, do by this order—

- (i) revoke with immediate effect my Food Price Order No. H 26 dated January 23, 1959, published in *Ceylon Government Gazette Extraordinary* No. 11,653 of January 27, 1959;
- (ii) fix with immediate effect the prices specified in column 2 of the First Schedule hereto to be the maximum wholesale price for one hundredweight (cwt.) nett above which paddy shall not be sold within the respective areas mentioned in the corresponding entries in column 1 of the First Schedule hereto;
- (iii) fix with immediate effect the prices specified in column 2 of the Second Schedule hereto to be the maximum retail price per pound (lb.) nett above which paddy shall not be sold within the respective areas mentioned in the corresponding entries in column 1 of the Second Schedule hereto;
- (iv) direct that for the purpose of this Order—
  - (a) any sale of any quantity of paddy for the purpose of re-sale or any sale of paddy in a quantity of one hundredweight or more at a time shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
  - (b) any sale of any quantity of paddy less than one hundredweight for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;
  - (c) "pound" or "lb." shall be deemed to be the standard pound avoirdupois weight; and
  - (d) the maximum amount that is payable for any quantity of paddy which is less than or more than one cwt. nett sold by the wholesale should, as usual, be calculated proportionately from the maximum wholesale price per cwt. nett specified hereto;
- (v) direct that no person shall sell paddy which is adulterated with any other article;
- (vi) direct that when any paddy is sold the maximum prices fixed by this Order shall include the price of the wrapper or container, if any, in which such paddy is sold;
- (vii) direct that in every area where maximum prices are fixed by this Order, every trader who has any paddy in his possession or under his control at any place or any vehicle shall exhibit conspicuously at that place or in that vehicle a notice in which there shall be set out the maximum prices fixed by this Order in that area; and
- (viii) direct that every person who sells paddy by wholesale shall, and every person who sells any paddy by retail shall, on demand, give the purchaser thereof a receipt in which shall be set out—
  - (a) the date of sale;
  - (b) the quantity of paddy sold (by weight);
  - (c) the price paid for the quantity sold; and
  - (d) the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or by retail.
