**THE AWARD**

This is an award under section 24 of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950. It relates to an industrial dispute between the Eksath Engineeru Saha Samanya Kamkaru Samithiya of No. 267-1/1, Union Place, Colombo 2 (hereinafter referred to as "the Union") and Messrs. Hayleys Limited of 400, Deans Road, Colombo 10 (hereinafter referred to as "the Company").

2. The Honourable the Minister of Labour by his Order under section 4 (2) of the aforesaid Act referred to this Court on November 18, 1959, an industrial dispute between the aforesaid parties, for settlement. According to the statement of the Deputy Commissioner of Labour dated November 13, 1959, the matter in dispute between the parties is "whether the non-employment of the following 17 workers is justified and to what relief each of them is entitled:—

1. Nancy Nona
2. Asilin Nona
3. K. Romulus
4. J. A. Jayatilke
5. W. P. Odiris
6. H. W. Piyadasa
7. J. Amath
8. K. Sirisena

3. At the outset of the enquiry, counsel for the Company argued that this Court should confine itself to consideration of the domestic inquiry already held by Mr. N. W. G. Brown, a Director of Hayleys Limited, who had just returned to the Island, with Mr. D. S. Jayawickrema, Q.C., as *amicus curiae*.

We accept the principle that the findings of a domestic inquiry should not be disturbed unless (a) there has been want of *bona fides*, (b) it is a case of victimization or unfair labour practice, or violation of principles of natural justice, (c) there is a basic error on facts, or (d) there has been a perverse finding on the material. At the same time the power of the management to direct its own internal administration and discipline is not unlimited, and industrial tribunals can inquire into the justification or otherwise of a dismissal of a worker, vide *Indian Iron and Steel Company, Ltd. and another vs. its workmen* (1958 1 L. L. J. page 260, at page 269). It is for this reason that we desired to ascertain for ourselves if it was proper for the Company to have singled out the rubber factory committee members for suspension and serving of "show cause notices" on September 8, 1959, when all the workers had "stayed-in" from 3rd to 5th September, and we, therefore, decided to hear evidence ourselves. As for the domestic inquiry itself, we are satisfied that there has been no want of *bona fides*, no basic error on facts and no perverse finding on the material before it. It had, moreover, been conducted to the satisfaction of the Union. We appreciate the manner in which a disinterested *amicus curiae*, a Queen's counsel, had been selected to guide the Company on the procedural aspect of the inquiry and have no doubt whatever that his assistance had been of value. But, we cannot resist the observation that the Chairman does not appear to have realised the limited function of an *amicus curiae* and has gone to the extent of seeking his opinion on the facts of the case and, what is more, adopting his findings. We consider this a regrettable feature on which we feel that we should comment in the hope that this procedure will not be adopted at similar inquiries.

4. The facts of the case are as follows: Hayleys, Limited, is running a fibre business in Dean's Road, and during the relevant period they were having a rubber business as well in Darley Road. Each business is separate (needing separate skills to operate) and has its own separate factory committee under a parent trade union—the Eksath Engineeru Saha Samanya Kamkaru Samithiya. The two factory committees were independent of each other and the Union states that an earlier suggestion by it that they should be amalgamated was not approved by the Company.

5. The Company decided to retrench as from September 2, 1959, thirty-five labourers from the fibre stores, due to the introduction of machinery in the twisting section. This was objected to by the workers in the fibre stores who wished that those workers should be re-employed in the fibre stores. The Union referred this to the Department of Labour and after a joint conference between the Union and the Company, an agreement was signed on September 1, 1959, to employ 28 of them (the balance 7 did not seek re-employment) in the rubber section. At this conference held in the Labour Department, the Union was represented by Mr. T. S. Kulasekera, the President of the parent union, and seven workers, all from the fibre section. It is common ground that no member from the rubber factory committee was present at this conference, nor was any invited to attend.

6. We recognize the right of the management to deploy its staff in any manner it likes in the interests of its production, provided such arrangement does not affect the workers adversely. But, in the present situation, the history of the relations between the rubber and fibre sections of the Company ought to have been given due consideration. It is a fact which the management itself admits that on earlier occasions, even as late as 1958, when the transfer of workers from one section to the other was considered as a feasible solution for avoiding the trouble of retrenchment, one or other of the same department had objected to this procedure because of the fear of the financial loss such arrangement would entail. Further, we would like to know how it came about that alternate employment was offered the retrenched fibre workers in the rubber stores when apparently the question of the closure of these rubber stores would have been under consideration.

7. When the rubber factory committee came to know on September 1, 1959, of the decision to send to their stores twenty-eight workers from the fibre stores, they met and decided to protest. On September 2 the Secretary of the rubber factory committee informed Mr. B. Weerasinghe, the Labour Relations Officer of the Company, that they were not a party to any agreement and that they objected to the twenty-eight workers coming and that they would strike if they were brought in. Even at this

stage the Company did not care to parley with the representatives of the factory committee, but referred them to the agreement with the parent union.

8. The Company had also on September 1, discontinued some casual labourers engaged in the rubber stores to make way for the labour proposed to be brought from the fibre stores. These labourers also resented this and were demonstrating in front of the rubber stores and had to be cleared by the Police called in by the Company.

9. The Company went ahead with its plans to bring in the twenty-eight workers from the fibre stores on September 3, 1959. To prevent this, all the labourers in the rubber stores numbering 198 staged a "stay-in-strike" in the rubber stores from September 3, 1959. The labourers in the fibre stores also struck work from September 2 to September 5. In the meantime, Mr. Kulasekera, the President of the parent union, who had been out of Colombo, returned to the scene and persuaded the labourers in both sections to call off the strike giving them the assurance that the object of the strike had been achieved. Resumption of work was decided on by the workers in both sections on September 5 (Saturday) and the Company duly informed of this decision. Accordingly, the workers discontinued the "stay-in-strike" on September 5, went home and came back to work on Monday, September 7. On Tuesday, September 8, the Company picked out the seventeen members of the rubber factory committee and served "show cause notices" on them and suspended them. This appears to have provoked the committee members (15 out of 17—No. 1 and No. 14 in the list of workers appearing in para. 2 of this award—Nancy Nona and A. Wilson—did not in fact participate in the "stay-in-strike") to stage another "stay-in-strike". The provocation was caused by the fact that though all 198 workers had struck work, these seventeen were sought out because they were committee members, and served with "show cause notices" and suspended from work; and this, in spite of the fact that, after notifying the Company, they had stopped their strike and resumed work. It may be noted that they were no more guilty than the rest of the "stay-in-strikers". The Company appears to have condoned the action taken by the rest.

10. The main question for determination is whether or not a "stay-in-strike" is legal in this country. Two pieces of legislation have dealt with this question and we must confine ourselves within those bounds. The first is the Stay-in-Strikes Act, No. 12 of 1955, which came into operation on April 12, 1955. Section 2 thereof reads thus—"Where any person taking part in a strike in any industry remains in furtherance of that strike in the premises in which that industry is carried on, he (a) shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction after summary trial before a Magistrate, be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding three months, or to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees or to both such imprisonment and such fine, and (b) may be arrested without warrant, and be ejected from those premises by any police officer not below the rank of Inspector of Police." In promulgating this piece of labour legislation the "objects and reasons" set out are "to prohibit stay-in-strikes. Recently there have been a number of stay-in-strikes and it is therefore necessary to prohibit such strikes." Side by side with this should be read section 427 of the Penal Code which defines criminal trespass as follows:—"Whoever enters into or upon property in the occupation of another with intent to commit an offence, or to intimidate, insult or annoy any person in occupation of such property, or having lawfully entered into or upon such property unlawfully remains there with intent to commit an offence is said to commit 'criminal trespass'". The penal section is section 433 of the Penal Code where the punishment specified is identically the same as that stated by section 2 of Act No. 12 of 1955.

11. We are unable to subscribe to the view that the Penal Code and this Act conferred concurrent jurisdiction on our Courts. It is clear that the element of *mens rea* is a necessary ingredient of an offence under section 427 of the Penal Code whereas under section 2 of the Act it is not so. When charged with the offence of criminal trespass the burden of proving intent to insult, intimidate or annoy or to commit an offence always rests on the prosecution, but in a charge under section 2 of the Act this burden shifts inasmuch as it is for the accused to show that he remained on the premises for a lawful purpose. If a "stay-in-strike" was intended to be synonymous with criminal trespass, it is difficult to understand the necessity to have introduced new legislation. Had this Act remained on the Statute Book in September, 1959, the Police could have arrested the offenders without a warrant and ejected them from the premises. But, on May 9, 1958, came into force the Stay-in-Strikes (Repeal) Act, No. 23 of 1958, whereby the earlier Act was repealed in its entirety, and the only manner in which "stay-in-strikers" could be dealt with thereafter is by charging them for criminal trespass under the Penal Code; and this was the action taken by the Company. We are not impressed with the argument that all that the Act No. 2 of 1955 did was to give the Police the power to eject "stay-in-strikers" and the repeal in effect was in that regard alone. Those committee members of the rubber factory committee who had been convicted and fined Rs. 25 each in M. C. Colombo No. 23183/A (production marked D. 3) were rightly charged under the Penal Code and convicted. There has been no appeal on the law against it nor have papers in revision been filed in the Supreme Court and the Union cannot be heard to complain about it at this stage. But, this conviction cannot,

by itself, affect the legality or otherwise of a "stay-in-strike". Whatever may be this Court's personal view on the desirability or otherwise of "stay-in-strikes", it is of the opinion that the law of the land as it now stands has declared that a "stay-in-strike" is not illegal. Mr. Kadirgamar has cited certain authorities to support his contention that a "sit-down-strike" or a "stay-in-strike" is illegal. There has not been an award of the Industrial Court in Ceylon on this point as yet. We should like to deal with some of the cases cited by him although it may not be strictly necessary for us to do so in the light of what we have stated earlier. The case of Bally Municipality and S. M. M. Bannerjee (1954) 2 L. L. J. page 500 did not directly deal with the question whether or not a "sit-down-strike" is legal. There was no issue on this point although in considering if that particular dispute was an industrial dispute or an individual dispute, at page 505 there appears the statement that the Appellate Tribunals in India have held that a "sit-down-strike" is illegal. In (1955) 2 L. L. J. at page 97 appears the case of Howrah Foundry Works Ltd. and their workmen. One of the four issues was if the workmen were entitled to wages for the lock-out period from the date of the "stay-in-strike" which was called off on September 29, 1953; if their dismissal was justified, and to what relief they were entitled. In this case the strike was held to have been justified, but it was also held that the manner in which it was continued was highly illegal because the workmen caused damage to the property of the company and burnt its coal to prepare their meals. In addition, they prevented the manager from entering the premises and turned him out. In regard to the circumstances of that case the strike was held to have been illegal. In the case which we are considering none of these factors is present. According to Ludwig Teller, "sit-down-strikes" occur whenever "a group of employees or others interested in obtaining a certain objective in a particular business forcibly take over possession of the property of such business, establish themselves within the plant, stop its production and refuses access to the owners or to the others desiring to work." Teller continues "Sit-down-strikes should more accurately be defined as a strike in the traditional sense to which is added the element of trespass by the strikers upon the property of the employer." The fact that the committee members in this case have been convicted of criminal trespass does not make their "stay-in-strike" illegal in the absence of other concomitant elements. The Fansteel case reported in U. S. A. Supreme Court in 1939 pp. 305-307 contains the following passages:—

"The employees had the right to strike, but they had no licence to commit acts of violence or to seize the building employer's plant. The seizure and holding of the building was itself wrong, apart from any act of sabotage. But in the legal aspect the ousting of the owner from lawful possession is not essentially different from an assault upon the offices of an employing company or the seizure and conversion of its goods, or the despoiling of its property or other unlawful acts in order to force compliance with demands. To justify such conduct because of the existence of a labour dispute or of an unfair labour practice would be to put a premium on resort to force instead of legal remedies and to subvert the principles of law and order which lie on the foundations of society."

In Teller's "Labour Disputes and Collective Bargaining" Vol. 1 at page 313 it is stated thus:

"It is to be hoped that the Fansteel decision has placed a quietus upon further indulgence by labour in the sit-down-strike. The case marks what is hoped to be the end of an unfortunate chapter in the history of American labour activity."

This quotation seems to indicate that that country had for a considerable time been afflicted with "stay-in-strikes" of a violent type. And the hope expressed by Teller is in that context. It does not seem to apply to this country which as we have stated before has by statute declared "stay-in-strikes" no longer illegal. The reference to page 379 of Prem's "Law of Labour Disputes and Constitutional Remedies" does not appear to take the question of illegality of "stay-in-strikes" any further.

12. The Court would be failing in its duty if it did not express its disapproval of the way in which Mr. Kulasekera, the President of the parent union, conducted himself in this matter. While we hold that the Company should have, particularly in view of past experience, been cautious enough to take into account the possible reaction of the rubber section workers before deciding to import twenty-eight workers in one lot from the fibre stores, we are strongly of the opinion that Mr. Kulasekera was guilty of irresponsible conduct when he signed an agreement with the management agreeing to the movement of twenty-eight labourers from the fibre section to the rubber section, without consulting the rubber section factory committee and including them in the negotiations preceding the agreement. This is particularly reprehensible in view of the fact that Mr. Kulasekera would have been aware of previous resentment on the part of workers when they were moved in numbers from one store to another.

13. In spite of the dereliction of duty on the part of Mr. Kulasekera, President of the parent union, we are satisfied that the rubber factory committee was not included in the negotiations

which led to the agreement signed on September 1, 1959, and particularly in view of the fact that they were not a party to this agreement, there seems to be no valid reason for taking disciplinary action against this committee for not implementing the agreement.

14. In view of the circumstances of this case, this Court holds that the non-employment of the 17 listed workers was not justified. Had the rubber stores not been closed, we would have ordered re-instatement with back pay. In view of the fact that the rubber stores were closed down on December 19, 1959, we order that these 17 workers be paid their basic salary and any other allowances to which they normally would have been entitled, from such date as they ceased to be paid to December 18, 1959, and to retrenchment relief as in the case of the other workers who were discontinued when the rubber stores closed down.

We order that the full payment to the workers be made within one month of the publication of this Award in the *Government Gazette* through the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Colombo Industrial Relations, 21, Vauxhall Street, Colombo 2.

Should any dispute arise with regard to the correctness of the amounts deposited, the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Colombo Industrial Relations is authorized, after verification of the books, and, if necessary, hearing the parties, to make his decision with regard to the correctness of or otherwise of the amounts deposited. His decision on this matter shall be final.

We make our award as set out above.

**THE AWARD**

This is an Award in an industrial dispute between the Tea, Rubber, Coconut and General Produce Workers' Union, 123, Union Place, Colombo 2 (hereinafter referred to as the "Union") and Messrs. K. N. M. Mohamed & Company, P. O. Box 1413, Colombo (hereinafter referred to as the "Company").

2. The Honourable Minister of Labour by his Order dated 24th February, 1960, referred this dispute to this Court for settlement. According to the statement of the Deputy Commissioner of Labour, the matter in dispute between the Union and the Company was the non-employment on a permanent basis of the following workers:—

- (1) H. B. Gnanawathie
- (2) W. A. P. Somawathie
- (3) M. Mary Wijesinghe
- (4) A. Hemawathie
- (5) H. Sumanawathie
- (6) H. D. Dayawathie
- (7) R. Somalal

- (11) M. K. Mary Nona
- (12) A. Cecilia Nona
- (13) S. Siriawathie
- (14) M. B. Magilin Nona.

3. At the inquiry the Union was represented by Mr. K. Kulavirasingham while Mr. Advocate M. Somasunderam instructed by Mr. C. M. Chinnaiya appeared for the Company.

4. The Company is engaged in the export of tea, pepper, cardamoms and cocoa. The principal business of the Company was the export of cocoa. The majority of the women workers employed by the Company were occupied in cleaning and sorting cocoa. Cocoa is a seasonal crop and ordinarily cocoa will not be available for purchase during the months July to October.

5. The chief export market for cocoa was the Manila market. The total quantities of cocoa exported by the Company to Manila from 1953 to 1959 are as follows:—

During the year 1960—up to the end of May—the total quantity exported was 2,395 cwt.

6. In August 1959, the Company decided, owing to the fact that there was a reduction in the exports of cocoa, that it would be necessary to retrench some of its workers. Accordingly 18 female workers were retrenched. Notices were served on them in August, 1959, that their services would be discontinued on or before 30th September, 1959; the workers in question were discontinued on 19th September, 1959.

7. In November, 1959, the Company received an order for cocoa from New York and additional labour was required to fulfil that order. The Company sent letters to the 18 discontinued persons requesting them to report for duty by 10 a.m. on 5th November. In response to that notice seven of the retrenched persons offered themselves for work and were re-employed. One letter was returned undelivered by the post office. At the inquiry held before this Court some of those who did not return to work stated in evidence that they did not receive the letters in question.

8. In February, 1960, the Company re-started the purchase of cardamoms and more labour was required. Letters were sent to the 7 persons who had not reported for duty in November. Three letters were returned undelivered but none of the persons turned up for duty. One of those who failed to do so was W. A. P. Somawathie. She stated in evidence that she was not prepared to work under the Company if she was paid only Rs. 2 per day, which was the rate paid to her at the time of her discontinuance.

9. On 11th August, 1959, the Union had made representations to the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Industrial Relations, contending that the women workers who attended to the packing of tea in addition to the other work should be paid wages on the basis of the minimum wage that was payable in respect of the tea export trade. The workers evidently decided that they would not return to work unless they were paid the higher salaries to which they were entitled according to the Union.

10. On 11th November, 1959, an inquiry was held by the Assistant Commissioner of Labour with regard to the retrenchment effected by the Company. The Company's position at that inquiry was that the retrenchment was necessary but some of the retrenched employees had already been re-employed and that it was prepared to consider the re-employment of the balance workers if there was a change in their export business. The retrenched persons who had not returned to work were therefore aware that some of the retrenched employees had already been re-employed. If they themselves desired to be re-employed they could have reported at the office and asked for re-employment. They stated in evidence that they tried to do so but were prevented by the watcher. I do not accept this explanation. The watcher knew that retrenched employees were being re-employed and would have allowed these persons to attend the office. I consider that they did not wish to return to the service of the Company unless the Company was prepared to pay the enhanced salaries to which they thought they were entitled to.

11. The Company produced evidence from the books showing the actual exports of cocoa during 1959. The evidence was supported by Customs documents and I have no doubt that the

figures given are correct. Their business had gone down in 1958 and in 1959 they were justified in reducing the number of workers. Their *bona fide* is shown by the fact that—

- (1) in November, 1959, letters were sent to all the retrenched workers offering re-employment as soon as they received fresh orders;
- (2) in February, 1960, when an order for cardamoms was received they offered re-employment to those persons who had not turned up for work in November, 1959.

12. It was only when the retrenched employees failed to turn up for work that they engaged fresh employees. My award is that the Company was entitled to carry out the retrenchment which was effected.

13. There are, however, several points which require attention—

- (i) the letters of discontinuance were to the effect that the services of the workers would not be necessary on or before 30th September. Ordinarily a person is informed that his services would not be required after a definite date and not before an indefinite date. A calendar month's notice should have been given that their services were not required after 30th September, 1959;
- (ii) the re-employment of the retrenched persons in November, 1959, was on terms different to those on which they were employed at the time of discontinuance; they were permanent workers prior to August, 1959, while their re-employment was on a temporary basis subject to

termination without notice. Their names, however, have now been entered in the permanent register from 5th May, 1960, i.e., after completion of six months' service. They should be re-employed on the same terms as before discontinuance and therefore they should be regarded as permanent from the date of re-employment in November, 1959. They will therefore be eligible for holiday pay and maternity benefits as if they had been re-employed on a permanent basis from November, 1959;

- (iii) it is not possible to ascertain the actual date on which these persons had been first employed as the Company did not maintain proper checkrolls till 1957; even at present proper checkrolls are not maintained in respect of temporary workers. In future proper checkrolls should be maintained not only with regard to permanent workers but also with regard to temporary workers as otherwise it would be extremely difficult to ascertain their seniority if it becomes necessary at any time to retrench a section of the workers.

14. No compensation has been paid to these persons whose services were retrenched in September, 1959. I consider that they are entitled to compensation in respect of their past services. It is not possible to ascertain in each case the exact period of employment; my award is that each of them should be paid one month's wages as compensation. These payments should be made through the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Industrial Relations, Colombo 2, within three weeks of the publication of this award.

3. For the purposes of this determination—

- A Supervisor or a Head Waiter is an employee who is wholly or mainly employed in supervising the work of waiters, ice cream servers, pantry boys, plate washers, room boys and page boys.
- A Waiter is an employee who is employed to serve food and drinks and to perform other duties ancillary thereto.
- A Packing Counter Boy is an employee who is wholly or mainly employed to pack and deliver articles of food in or about the hotel.
- A Packing Counter Assistant is an employee who is wholly or mainly employed to pack articles of food not consumed within the premises.
- A Bar Keeper is an employee employed to manage the liquor bar and to maintain the necessary records.

- A Cook is an employee who is wholly or mainly employed for the preparation of meals and supervision of the kitchen staff.
- An Assistant Cook is an employee who is employed to assist the cook in the preparation of meals.
- A Cook Mate is a labourer wholly or mainly employed in or about the kitchen of a hotel to perform unskilled work.
- A Pantry Boy is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to deliver food, drinks, crockery, cutlery and linen to waiters for the purpose of serving customers and to maintain the pantry.
- A Plate Washer is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to wash and clean crockery, cutlery and utensils.
- A Tea Brewer is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to brew tea and prepare other similar beverages, operate and maintain any apparatus used for such purposes and perform duties ancillary thereto.
- A Rotti Maker is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to make rotti and pastries.
- A Sweet Maker is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to make sweet-meats commonly known as Indian Sweets.
- A Labourer is a person who, not being a cookmate, is employed to perform any unskilled work.
- An Ice Cream Server is an employee who is wholly or mainly employed to attend to the ice cream machine and to serve icecream to customers either directly or through waiters.
- A Clerk is an employee (not being a bill clerk, a book-keeper or a receptionist) who is wholly or mainly employed on clerical work including typewriting and accounts.
- A Bill Clerk is an employee who is wholly or mainly employed in the task of writing out bills issued to customers.
- A Cashier is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to receive or pay money, have the custody of money, maintain the cash book and other necessary records and attend to the banking of money.
- An Assistant Cashier is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to receive money and to maintain records of the moneys received.
- A Telephone Operator is a person who is wholly or mainly employed to operate the telephone switch board and to make and answer telephone calls.
- A Book-keeper is an employee whose duties consist wholly or mainly of maintaining the books of accounts of a hotel including the drawing up of the balance sheet.
- A Receptionist is a clerical employee whose duties consist wholly or mainly in doing reception work in residential hotels.
- A Billiard Maker is an employee employed by residential hotels to maintain the billiard room and the equipment and mark the scores and to perform other ancillary duties.

- Notify for general information that the Perahera Festival will commence on 26.8.60 and close on 6.9.60.
- Prohibit entry to Dunwattetota from where water will be pumped to be used for drinking purposes for pilgrims.
- Appoint the special camping ground opposite Willowewa tank on Alutnuwara-Bibile P. W. D. road otherwise known as Badulla Veediya to be a place for occupation by pilgrims.
- Appoint an additional camping ground on the land called Kurumburepitiya opposite the V. C. Office on Alutnuwara-Soraborawewa P. W. D. road.
- Prohibit cooking within the Devale premises and Vihare Maluwa and Devale road or Palle Veediya, Meda Veediya and Bomalu Veediya.
- Appoint the following places for the sale of only flowers, joss sticks, candles, incense, camphor and images as offerings at the Devale, viz.:—

Temporary buildings erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer in front of the Sanga Awasa and on the Meda Veediya.

- Appoint the following places in which any commodity except an article of food and drink may be sold subject to the provisions of the Regulations:—

- Temporary buildings erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer along the Main road;
- Permanent and temporary buildings erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer along and facing the Bibile-Alutnuwara-Soraborawewa P. W. D. road, north of the Resthouse, Alutnuwara and south of the Willowewa Tank;

- Permanent and temporary buildings erected on permits issued by me or by an Authorised Officer facing and along Alutnuwara-Karametiya-Meegahakiula, P. W. D. road, south of the Willowewa Tank;

- Licensed permanent buildings facing and along Bibile-Alutnuwara-Soraborawewa P. W. D. road between Willowewa Tank and the Resthouse, Alutnuwara, and facing and along Alutnuwara-Meegahakiula-Karametiya P. W. D. road between Willowewa Tank and the Resthouse, Alutnuwara.

- Except in regard to the sale of articles described in para (f) at the appointed places above, prohibit, subject to the provisions of the Regulations, the sale of any commodity of any description in the Sacred Area at Mahiyangana comprising the following:—

- Devale road or Palle Veediya;
- Meda Veediya;

- Devale premises;
- Vihare Maluwa.

2. No vehicles including bicycles and carts will be allowed within the Camp Area without a permit from me or an Authorised Officer.

4. Available Crown sites will be released by the D. R. O., Bintenue, at his discretion for the purpose of boutiques on payment of rent as usual. No trade will be allowed on such premises unless the building conforms to the requirements of the Sanitary Authorities. 4. A notice of assessment under section 31 of the Act in respect of a charitable institution in a case where an assessment has been agreed upon or determined on an appeal shall be substantially in the Form set out in the Fourth Schedule hereto.
5. A notice of additional assessment under section 31 of the Act in respect of a charitable institution shall be substantially in the Form set out in the Fifth Schedule hereto.
