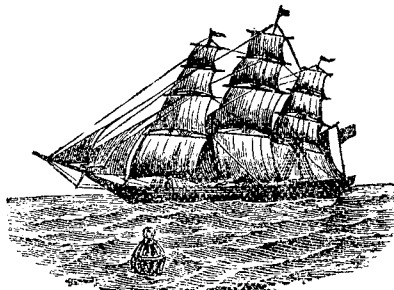

*New Light at Kovilam on the Island of Karativu, North Coast of Ceylon.*

NOTICE is hereby given that on and after May 15, 1899, a red light will be shown from sunset to sunrise from a steel mast painted white at Kovilam, on the island of Karativu, north coast of Ceylon, in latitude about  $9^{\circ} 46'$  north, and longitude about  $79^{\circ} 50' 20''$  east.

The light is a fifth order dioptric lantern, and will be hoisted to an elevation of 60 ft. above sea-level, and should be visible from all directions seaward at a distance of about 6 to 8 miles in clear weather.

*Eastern Archipelago—Sumatra West Coast—Batu  
Islands—Reefs discovered.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 121 of 1899) that the following reefs are reported to exist off the northern coast of the Batu Islands:—

(a) A reef with depths of 4 to 6 fathoms on it to the northward of Tanah Masa.

Approximate position: lat.  $0^{\circ} 4' 0''$  N., long.  $98^{\circ} 21' 50''$  E.

(b) A reef about 1,000 yards in extent, with a least depth over it of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms (23 to 27 fathoms around it), from which Batu Belobang, Pulo Pinie, bears S.  $3^{\circ}$  W., distant 7 miles, and north-east extreme of Pulo Pinie S.  $73^{\circ}$  E.

*Japan—Gulf of Tokyo—Sagami misaki—Decreased depth to the eastward.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 122 of 1899) that a depth of  $3\frac{3}{4}$  fathoms has recently been found on the patch of  $4\frac{3}{4}$  fathoms about 5 cables eastward of Sagami misaki (Matsuwaki).

Japan—Gulf of Tokyo—Uraga Channel—Rocky Patch discovered.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 146 of 1899) that a recent survey of Uraga channel, gulf of Tokyo, shows the existence of a sunken rock, named Iwato Dashi, with a depth, so far as ascertained, of 6½ fathoms, from which Tsurugi saki lighthouse bears W. ¼ S. distant 9¼ cables, and north-east point of Sagami misaki N. W. ¼ N.

Japan—Amakusa Islands—Shishi jima—Shoals discovered to the southward.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 147 of 1899) that a recent survey has resulted in the discovery of the two under-mentioned shoals, southward of Shishi jima, Yatsushiro sea, Kiusiu:—

a. A shoal, locally known as Okino me sone, with a depth on it of half a fathom at low water, from which Ao Sima centre bears N. 43° E., distant 2 cables, and the summit of Koikara jima S. 23° E.

Approximate position: lat. 32° 14' 20" N., long. 130° 12' 10" E.

b. At about one cable N. 65° E. from Okino me sone lies a shoal, locally known as Jino me sone, with a depth of 4 fathoms on it at low water.
