

He was arrested by the Kuliyapitiya Police on Sunday and was produced in Courts yesterday.

Police reported to the Court that the child is currently residing with his grandmother. The Police were ordered to submit a full probation report on August 22.

Earlier, the suspect had sent the video he made to his wife and the employment agency who sent her abroad through WhatsApp.

Subsequently, the Kuliyapitiya Police Children and Women's Bureau had taken the child into their custody and arrested the man after the matter was brought to the notice of the Police.

The knife that was used to make the threatening video was also found by the Police Children and Women's Bureau. Police officers had taken action to immediately admit the child to the Kuliyapitiya Teaching Hospital due to the signs of injury marks found on the child's neck area. Police say the man has resorted to similar acts in the past as well.

The Health Promotion Bureau of the Ministry of Health said that the relevant institutions running under the Ministry of Health, which are preparing to face the 'Monkeypox' epidemic which is spreading rapidly around the world, have issued the necessary guidelines to identify suspected patients at the same time as starting tests to determine the disease.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), Monkeypox can cause a range of signs and symptoms. While some people have mild symptoms, others may develop more serious symptoms and need care in a health facility. Those at higher risk for severe disease or complications include people who are pregnant, children and persons that are immunocompromised.

warrants against them in connection with various crimes were arrested, police said. Among them there are 10 persons with open warrants.

Information from the Criminal Investigation Department stated that among the arrested warranties, there are also six suspects who fled the country when the investigations began.

A senior officer of the Criminal Investigation Department said that a travel ban had been imposed against all the six suspects and that they had fled the country before the ban was imposed and it was questionable how they entered the country without being caught by the Immigration Department.

He said that a special investigation has been started in this regard.

The officer further mentioned that about 150 suspects required by the Criminal Investigation Department have obtained warrants related to various frauds and criminal investigations and most of them have fled the country.

levels to deal directly with Supreme Court judges including the Chief Justice, the Judicial Service Commission or Judicial Officers (High Court judges, District Judges and Magistrates) in relation to judicial proceedings or matters incidental thereto in which the government or government officials are parties to.

This notification was made by the President's Secretary through a letter yesterday (15) to all Ministry Secretaries, Provincial Chief Secretaries, Heads of Departments, District Secretaries, Heads of State Corporations and Statutory Boards.

In relation to those matters, care should be taken to transact letters only with the Attorney General's Department as per the provisions of Chapter XXVII of the Institutions Code and the related public administration circular instructions.

However, the letter has further informed that provisions of this circular is not applicable in relation to correspondence between the Ministry of Justice or other Government agencies with the Judicial Service Commission, the Attorney General's Department and judicial officers in relation to day-to-day general administrative activities related to their scope and complaints submitted by judicial officers to the Judicial Service Commission.

The registered postage fee will be increased from Rs.30 to Rs.60. Under the facility to mail letters at subsidized rates for charities and voluntary organisations, the postage fee for a letter weighing up to 20 grams has been revised from Rs. 12 rupees to Rs.30.

Steps have also been taken to increase the postal fee for letter delivery within the Colombo Metropolitan Area from Rs.12 to Rs.30. The fee for open printed matter packet letter service has also been increased from Rs.12 to Rs.30. The initial fee for newspapers and magazines registered with the Department of Posts has been increased from Rs.10 to Rs.20. The maximum weight of a parcel that can be forwarded by this service is one kilogramme and it costs 110 rupees to send such a parcel by post. The price of Rs. 90 has been increased to Rs. 150 postal items weighing 250 grams sent under general mail. Meanwhile, the price of a postcard has been increased from Rs.10 to Rs. 20.A stamp cover which cost Rs. 18 has been revised to Rs.60 and a large stamp cover of Rs.20 has been revised to Rs. 70. Along with the revision of postal charges, the maximum money limit of Rs. 50,000 which could be remitted through the Money Order Service has been increased to Rs.100,000.





The deceased has been identified as Kamani Ranasinghe (64), a mother of two. She was a retired Staff Grade Officer at the Department of Labour and had been living alone in her residence. The Police say blood trails can be seen in the house which suggest that the woman in question had moved to a store room near the kitchen after the attack.

The woman's children are residing in Australia and the husband had passed away sometime back. The murdered woman is the owner

of several buildings at Ampitiya Junction which were given on rent for

businesses. A neighbour said that when he went to the woman's house at around 2.00 pm, he saw some blood stains and while following the trail of the blood stains, he saw a dark skinned person about five feet in height coming out of the woman's house with a blood staned knife in his hand.

"The person who was holding the knife was also bleeding with wounds to his hand," he added

The neighbour said the man who had pointed the knife towards him in a threatening manner had said it was a family issue.

The neighbour said when he went inside the house, the woman was moaning and after a few moments, she had died, so he did not try to take her to the hospital and informed the Police. The Police are investigat-

# **Police uncover bowser-lorry nexus**

Police arrested six suspects in connection with the illegal sale of fuel from a bowser to two refrigerated lorries in the Puttalam area vesterday.

The bowser which had 13,200 litres of petrol and the two lorries connected to the incident too had been taken into custody in a joint operation carried out by the Anamaduwa and Puttalam Police.

The Anamaduwa Police had raided a house in Anamaduwa Thonigala area on information that some people were secretly supplying fuel to lorries from a fuel bowser.

Police also received information that a refrigerated lorry, which had already received petrol from the fuel bowser, was heading towards Puttalam. The Anamaduwa Police had promptly informed the Traffic Division of the Puttalam Headquarters Police about the matter.

The lorry had been stopped at the Fourth Mile Post on the Puttalam-Kurunegala Road and officers of the Puttalam Headquarters Police had found 4,000 litres of petrol stored in 20 barrels. They had arrested two suspects.

Police investigations that have been carried out so far have revealed that a bowser which was transporting fuel from Colombo met with an accident and the stock of fuel had been transferred to another bowser in the Madampe area

It is said that those in the sec-

ond bowser which had received the fuel had engaged in illegal selling.

# **Agitation against BoC Chairman Rival trade union accuses Ceylon Bank Employees' Union of foul play**

The picket and poster campaigns conducted by the Ceylon Bank Employees' Union (CBEU) against the incumbent Bank of Ceylon (BoC) Chairman Kanchana Ratwatte is completely based on false allegations, said the Pragathi Bank Employees' Union (PBEU).

Speaking to the media in Colombo, PBEU President Nishantha Samarasinghe yesterday said that particular trade union is operating on a political agenda to achieve the narrow intentions of its leaders, rather than representing the bank employees.

The PBEU accused the CBEU of creating a trade union mafia operating in the banking sector.

"The conduct of this trade union has caused damage to the BoC's image among the public," he said.

According to him, once the best trade union in the banking sector, the CBEU has become corrupt after it was taken over by the present leadership.

"There are allegations against the leaders of this union for accepting sexual bribes from their union members in order to interfere into those employees' promotions and disciplinary action processes against them. We have evidence to prove these allegations," Samarasinghe said.

He said those with such accusations against them are the ones who point their fingers at the BoC Chairman seeking his removal from the position in order to achieve their agendas inside the bank.

"As a trade union which represents bank employees, we request the relevant authorities to conduct an impartial and independent investigation against the BoC Chairman and prove his guilt or innocence," the PBEU President said.

All the state banks in the country are currently operating under the purview of President Ranil Wickremesinghe as the Finance Minister.

Dr. Ananda Wijewickrama of the National Institute of Infectious Diseases, yesterday said that the spread of the Covid-19 virus again may be due to the fact that the immunity of the people who have received the earlier doses of the vaccine has decreased.

He said it is important for people to get vaccinated to get the anti-Covid immunity again. He also said that a person can be infected with the virus even after receiving the first and second booster doses.

However, Dr. Ananda Wijewickrama said that by taking the anti-Covid vaccine, the complications will be reduced and there will be no increase in the complications and

this will prevent the loss of life. He also stated that there should be no fear of getting infected with the virus if they have been vaccinated.

Dr. Ananda Wijewickrama said that people who have received the first and second doses of the anti-Covid but did not receive booster doses may experience complications if they are infected with the virus.

He also said that it has been about a year since the first and second anti-Covid vaccines were given and the immunity of those vaccines would have decreased by now.The Epidemiology Department states that 8,064,094 of the population of Sri Lanka have taken the first booster dose against Covid and 99,392 have taken the second booster dose against Covid.

# Private bus services now fully operational LPBOA asks for increased fuel quota in rural areas

Lanka Private Bus Owners' Association (LPBOA) Chairman Gemunu Wijeratne said yesterday that the private bus fleet has been normalized from yesterday following the resumption of fuel delivery as well as the reopening of schools on all five days of the week.

Accordingly, 90 percent of the private bus fleet was operational yesterday," he said.

However, Wijeratne said there

should be a proper mechanism to supply fuel for private buses at **CEYPETCO** filling stations in rural areas. Otherwise, schoolchildren will be inconvenienced by the limited number of private buses operating in rural areas.

"We requested the authorities to increase the fuel quota under the QR system provided for private buses as there are no SLTB bus depots in many rural areas. Especially, there are no SLTB depots in Hakmana, Deniyaya,

Dikwella, Middeniya, Beliatta, Hambantota, Suriyawewa, and Tissamaharama in the Southern Province and the authorities should take measures to supply adequate fuel for private buses to transport passengers," Wijeratne said.

He also said the Bus Priority Lane (BPL) rule will come into effect shortly for the convenience of public transport users. These lanes would be kept for buses from 6.30 am to 9 am and

again from 3.30 pm to 6.00 pm. Wijeratne said the BPLs would be implemented in selected areas in Colombo and the suburbs

Initially, it will commence from Moratuwa to Colombo on the Galle Road. This will result in a reduction of congestion and minimizing of accidents on major roads in the Colombo suburbs. It has been reported that the implementation of priority bus lanes will cut congestion by 35 percent in Colombo city.





# A welcome proposal

Government MP from the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP) Dilan Perera has called for the appointment of a Tamil national as the country's Prime Minister under an All Party Government and for the Cabinet to be decided on an ethnic ratio. He said this would enhance Sri Lanka's image internationally and bring the country many advantages. Speaking in Parliament on Friday the MP said: "What is wrong in appointing a Tamil as the Prime Minister, a Muslim as the Leader of the House. We can have a Sinhala Buddhist President. We can give a positive signal to the world if we make these appointments. Extremism has been clearly shattered by the Aragalaya".

Coming from a member of a political party that was based on nationalism and which was purely formed on a Sinhala Buddhist ethos, this is indeed a welcome transformation and augurs well for national unity, not to mention the easing of racist tensions which was always simmering on the surface. In fact had we had a Tamil Prime Minister prior to this, perhaps, there would not have been a separatist war that raged for 30 years and the unfortunate events of July '83. There had been many countries in the world that had leaders that were not from the majority community. They were gladly accepted by the people. India had at its one time President a Muslim -Abdul Kalam. The people in fiercely Hindu nationalist India had no objections.

In fact, before MP Dilan Perera it was former President Chandrika Bandarnaike Kumaratunga who strove to remove all vestiges of racism from the SLFP and make that party a truly multiracial party. She even went further and wanted to appoint Lakshman Kadirgamar as the Prime Minister when the People's Alliance (PA) won the General Election in 2004. In fact it was the JVP, which too was strongly tilted towards Sinhala nationalism, and jointly contested with the PA to defeat the UNP, at that election, that proposed Kadirgamar for the Premiership which also is an indication to what extent one time fiercely nationalist parties have changed with the times. However, a group within the new Government that strongly supported the candidature of Mahinda Rajapaksa for the Prime Minister's post threw a damper on the proposal (Mahinda himself threatened to leave the Government and join the Opposition if he was denied the post). Had the JVP's word prevailed Kadirgamar would have been the first Tamil Prime Minister of Sri Lanka, and, perhaps, changed the fortunes of this country by gaining for it the admiration and recognition internationally, the very thought which Dilan Perera is now harbouring.

In fact there certainly wouldn't be objections from the majority community if a Tamil became the Prime Minister of this country. The Sinhala voters have time and time again returned minority candidates to Parliament from electorates predominated by the majority community. The best examples are A.C.S Hameed (Harispattuwa), M.H. Mohamed (Borella), M.A. Bakeer Markar (Beruwala), A.H.M Fowzie and Haleem Ishaak (Colombo Central). Not only did they win, but they defeated their Sinhala Buddhist rivals by huge majorities. Who can forget how all Sri Lankans rejoiced to a man when Muttiah Muralitharan broke the world record by reaching the 800 wicket milestone in Test Cricket at the Galle International Stadium and how the firecrackers rang throughout the country. Like MP Dilan Perera observed, the Aragalaya provided ample proof that racism was a thing of the past and no Sri Lankan would want to revisit that ugly past. Not just racism, but even differences based on religion too have undergone a sea change. It was the Buddhist clergy more than any other group who rallied around His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith in the aftermath of the Easter Sunday carnage and were actively involved in rebuilding the damaged churches. The Aragalaya site in Galle Face too saw clergy from all faiths joining together to make common cause with the agitators with a prominent Catholic priest taking centre stage. That racism and religious bigotry is on the way out in this country is also proven by the increasing instances of corporatism and conviviality displayed by people of different faiths and nationalities in each other's religious festivals and cultural events. Certainly, the proposal by MP Dilan Perera is worth giving a try. There is no better time than this to experiment. We are certain that Prime Minister Dinesh Gunawardena too would endorse such a proposal. Of course, a Tamil Prime Minister should always keep in mind to treat all communities equally and not represent the interests of only one community. As it is we see parties such as the TNA solely speaking only about the grievances of the Tamils in the North. It is such an attitude that has made the majority community harbour suspicions. However, the appointment of a Tamil as the Prime Minister would make the demand for a separate state no longer tenable. Such a demand would also certainly not receive international support and will have the wind taken off the sails of lobby groups such as the Global Tamil Forum. Needless to say, it would also deal a mortal blow on the international fund collection to advance separatism in this country. There certainly will be a lot of advantages that would accrue to Sri Lanka if the proposal of MP Dilan Perera is taken to its logical conclusion.

# What went wrong? TIME TO CURB WASTAGE

ver three months have passed since the departure of the Rajapaksa Squared regime, or rather of its obvious manifestation when two brothers were President and Prime Minister. When that happened one expected some reforms, but with the determination that the status quo remains, nothing has really changed. And as I noted a few weeks after what was meant to herald change, there was no sign of any new ideas.

Reports this week suggest that nothing will change. One reason for this is that there is absolutely no analytical capacity amongst our decision makers. On the one hand we are told that electricity charges are to shoot up, on the other the Minister in charge complains of the excessive overtime payments in the Petroleum Corporation. It does not take rocket science to deduce that what is needed in such institutions - and they are all very similar – is not making the public pay through the nose for extravagance, but rather a ruthless cutting of costs

The country is bankrupt, and has been bankrupt now for months, and all decision makers have been thinking about is how to borrow more money, with no thought of how it will be paid back. At present the pie in the sky is support from the IMF, which will take ages, and will only lead to another crisis thereafter when the money has to be paid back to them, along with everything else that has to be paid back that is pending. And yet during all this time there has been nothing done to cut costs, and to raise revenue.

Indeed, we even had a remarkably absurd pronouncement in a world of absurdities, to the effect that properties damaged during the agitation that led to the departure of the Prime Minister Rajapaksa and then his return to influence along with a new President will be rebuilt at even grander levels. I cannot believe this is true, but then most things that have happened in recent days beggar belief.

There has been no word of going into the provenance of what was destroyed, checking on the declarations of assets of those who suffered such losses. While the violence that occurred was deplorable, the initial violence unleashed by some of those who suffered and the reciprocal vio-

lence that went on for too long after self-defence ceased to be relevant, it makes no sense to reward those who not only plundered the state but placed the final nail on the Rajapaksa Squared regime.

So instead of cutting costs, we have the mixture as before finding new ways of spending money, in addition to continuing with the excesses of earlier days such as unproductive advisers and senior advisers. We also have continuing incoherence, as when the recommendation to compound with existing creditors is sidetracked by our wayward foreign policy, obsequiousness combined with pompous defiance.

Meanwhile, the bleating of the National Movement for Social Justice, rendered ridiculous after the death of the charismatic Ven. Sobitha Thera, who felt bitter about the betrayal that took place in 2015, continues, the latest bleat being with regard to the 22nd Amendment. There is no understanding that this does not tackle the main issues, the need to strengthen financial oversight through compulsion rather than recommendation, a change in the electoral system that stops the financial vice including rescuing the chief accounting officers of ministries, the secretaries, from the bullying of the political leadership.

And there has been absolutely nothing about increasing revenue. Privatizing institutions in g o v e r n m e n t hands will not help much, for unless its original owners are willing to pocket out a massive amount –

to be given on lease one trusts, not sold outright no one will be keen to contribute to Government coffers as is needed. Rather we should develop a more productive tax regime, reintroducing PAYE and Withholding Tax and licensing activities that generate much revenue, beginning with private educational institutions and also tuto-There should be a moratorium on new buildings until existing Government properties that are neglected have been recommissioned. Many years back the indefatigable Mrs. Charles, after her very sudden transfer to Batticaloa to make way for an obsequious District Secretary in Vavuniya, made good use of her time there to prepare a schedule of unused Government buildings. I recommended that this be done nationwide and good use made of what was available, but that was ignored by a regime that valued the application of cement and the money that could be made from that. Hence, new white elephants in those areas, without proper study of how existing buildings could be used.

With no signs of any thinking outside the box, no signs of getting advice from the productive, as opposed to the same old dinosaurs that messed things up previously, I see no hope of us getting out of this mess for a very long time.



# **Collapse of the Aragalaya**

# Lack of understanding of Sri Lankan masses - root cause for movement's failure

n July 9, it looked as if Sri Lanka was undergoing a "revolution" spearheaded by "peoples' power" in the raw. Massive crowds had converged on Colombo to force President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to quit. The Presidential Palace, the Presidential Secretariat and the Prime Minister's office were stormed, vandalized, and occupied. But the most striking act was the burning of Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe's personal residence, a repository of thousands of books and rare *objet d'art*.

Sections of the political class, savouring the anti-Government moves with delight, hailed the events as a triumph of the "popular will" over the "corrupt" Establishment. Constitutionalism was devalued. More shockingly, a former Commander of the Sri Lankan Army, a war hero and the country's only Field Marshal, urged the Security Forces not to obey "illegal" orders.

Under the cover of supporting popular movements as part of their "concern for human rights", Western envoys kept urging the Government not to use force even to stop vandalism and arson. The fact that scores of houses of ruling party leaders and public transport buses were set aflame, and a Member of Parliament was lynched, was conveniently brushed under the carpet. The Sri Lankan and international media toed a similar line. Even in the face of violence, not seen since the anti-Tamil riots in 1983, Western envoys, the international and local media, kept up the chant that the movement was "peaceful" and that all actions by the law and order machinery were "brutal" and "repressive".

A fact that both the participants in the Aragalaya and its supporters in the gallery hid from the public view was that a peaceful movement by the educated middle class, that was appalled by the corruption and mismanagement of the Rajapaksa

regime, was hijacked by unruly elements led by parties that had no faith in constitutionalism and had had a violent past. Few thought of the consequences of legitimizing violence and unconstitutional actions. It did not dawn on them that once sanctioned, this method of changing Governments would become the norm and that they might themselves become victims of that one day.

The violence of the Aragalaya and the support it seemed to be getting at home and abroad, unnerved President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to such an extent that he abdicated his responsibility to restore law and order and safeguard State institutions. He took the unprecedented step of fleeing the country and resigning from afar. The Aragalaya then turned to his

successor, Ranil Wickremesinghe,

who had been duly appointed as per the constitution. The agitators adopted the same kind of tactics to unseat him. An attempt was made to storm and capture Parliament and force the 225 MPs to resign and make way for fresh elections. But the mobs did not realize that the man now in charge was one of grit and determination. He was undaunted by the fact that his residence had been burnt to ashes by the rioters. Unlike his predecessor, he ordered the Security Forces to quell the rioters, without firing a shot, though. Once the chief ordered them officially, the Security Forces did their duty. As the President told them, they saved Parliament and thereby the constitution just as they saved the country from terrorism not so long ago. Thereafter, the ring leaders of violence and those who damaged or stolen Government property were picked up and brought before the courts. This was a clear signal to violence-prone elements in society who thrive during periods of political tension. They went into hiding. Crowds at the protest sites melted, bringing the curtains down on the "revolution."

The Aragalaya succeeded to the extent that it drove President Gotabaya Rajapaksa out and made the Rajapaksa clan quit the Government wholesale. But it failed to bring Sri Lanka's political or constitutional system down. It tried to overthrow Gotabaya's successor, but failed.

The critical factor behind the initial success and the subsequent failure of the Aragalaya was the leadership of the State. President Gotabaya Rajapaksa was overthrown not because of the violence, but because

the State law and order machinery had been disabled by a lack of leadership on the President's part. The top man had lost the will to fight. He failed to give appropriate orders to his Security Forces.

But violence was quelled and the movement collapsed as soon as the leader who succeeded Gotabaya Rajapaksa showed the will to protect law and order and the sanctity of constitutional institutions.

In spite of hostility in Parliament, where the Opposition kept raucously chanting that he had no legitimacy, President Wickremesinghe attended to his executive duties diligently and brought about improvements in the situation regarding essential supplies such as food, fuel and cooking gas.

There were two other reasons why the Aragalaya failed. Firstly, it had no single alternative plan for governance as commentator Victor Ivan put it. All it wanted was the resignation of particular individuals. Secondly, it was disorganised, with no single leader or a single set of leaders.

Thirdly, it lacked knowledge of the historical realities. The participants and the leaders did not realize that in Sri Lanka, people have never approved of violence as a means of changing Governments. Every time such an attempt was made, it had been rejected and defeated.

hange is the only constant the in world. Organic development, as opposed to abrupt development, occurs gradually and naturally.

Leaders must understand organic change, but they must lead deliberate change efforts to address today's challenges. The ability of a leader to implement change is becoming increasingly important for the survival of the organisation in the face of economic volatility, technological advancement, and globalization. Organisational leaders will place a premium on those who have the ability to lead and implement change in their organisations as the pace and magnitude of global, national, and organisational change continues to accelerate. Change management is no longer a desirable skill, but rather a necessity.

#### Design and plan the System Change

You can lead a country, a ministry, an organisation, or a function within an organisation. System changes are required at all the levels. You have to first ask what exactly the required change is and why you want it. To answer this question, you have to have a stakeholder dialog and expert brainstorming, which will help you finalize smart goals and the real reasons for change.

As the change champion, you have to be enthusiastic about new or different ways of doing things and be determined to see them implemented. In doing this, you have to explore the field outside your organisation or even country for examples of successful change. Choose what aspects of those stories you can apply to organisational change. Finally, you must ensure that the expectations of your customers and other beneficiaries are in line with your design specifications when making the change. It is important to decide how you will measure the success of the change and how you will measure the outcomes.

#### **Inspire the System's Change**

An essential part of your role as a change champion is helping your teams overcome their resistance to change by bringing new perspectives to national or organisational issues. Leaders of change are proactive in preparing their organisation for the challenges ahead, both immediate and long-term. They have achieved great success by successfully

future-proofing their company and themselves. A leader's role is to draw attention to a threat that needs to be addressed immediately, to position change as a long-term undertaking that requires perseverance, to explain how change benefits the organisation and its people, to effectively promote an idea or vision, and to inspire action and commitments toward it. Engage others, especially those who are resistant to change, by being open and honest in addressing their fears about change. You'll be viewed as a role model for your co-workers if you successfully implement the suggested organisational changes. You should be able to motivate your superiors and persuade others in the company to adopt your ideas. You need to be able to listen well in order to gain a better understanding of the viewpoints of others. Help people see how they can contribute to the transformation of the organisation. You should go to areas where there is a high level of enthusiasm for change and take advantage of the people and resources that are already working

in your favour. You should be able to rejoice in small victories as you work toward a greater goal. You're prepared to expel those who stand

in the way of progress. Good ideas and an enticing manner of communication are essential if you want to motivate others to action. To further complicate matters, making a change calls for both calm persistence and unwavering emotional fortitude. In addition, you should have a way to incorporate other people's ideas into the process of making a change. For the best outcome, you must overcome the resistance to the change. You should not spend too much time convincing others of the merits of your ideas. Get a sense of the forces that are in favour of and against making changes. People and groups affected by the change should be identified. You need to understand the motivations of the stakeholders involved in the decision-making process.

There are times when it is preferable to focus on tested concepts rather than wasting time on untested ones. Furthermore, it is critical to avoid being perceived by those around you as a threat to the current power structure, both informal and formal. If your company has grown accustomed to its own complacency and smugness, or if your organisation's change initiatives have a history of backfiring, you must be extremely strategic and skilled in your communication. Furthermore, you can train employees who are adaptable.

It is imperative that you establish urgency. You must do four things at once in order to create urgency. To begin with, you must invigorate and motivate people to make a shift in their behaviour. As a second step, try to alleviate any feelings of fear, anger, or complacency. Three, you must provide a step-by-step plan of action. Fourth, you must facilitate the removal of all obstacles and bottlenecks.

#### Implement the **System Change**

Leaders who are adept at implementing change should make an honest effort to understand the impact of change on others. Employees should be kept informed of any future changes that may affect them. You should modify and refine the implementation plans based on feedback from others during the change, and make adjustments along the way.





The ability of a leader to implement change is becoming increasingly important for the survival of the organisation in the face of economic volatility, technological advancement, and globalization. **Organisational leaders** will place a premium on those who have the ability to lead and implement change in their organisations as the pace and magnitude of global, national, and organisational change continues to accelerate. Change management is no longer a desirable skill, but rather a necessity.

You must ensure that the internal sponsors of the change remain aligned and committed to it. You must manage the opposition and be perceived as adaptable.

You must be a good listener who is sensitive to the concerns and ideas of others about the change. You are also perceived as direct and proactive. You should acknowledge and thank people for their contributions to change. Seek advice from people who are not directly involved in the situation, and set a good example. You must be able to communicate the big picture to your employees in order for them to understand why key decisions are made. To do so, you must fully understand the change rationale communicated from higher levels of management. You must engage others rather than control them. You must have excellent interpersonal and collaborative skills. You should be able to persuade others. You should avoid rushing to implement the change because it will confuse and overwhelm others.

Consensus should not be prioritized over quality and excellence. Make an effort to meet with people on a regular basis and spend time talking about the change, its impact, and their reactions to it. People want a sense of control, so give them viable options within the confines of the change initiative. You should create a simple and user-friendly mechanism for people to learn about the changes and get answers to their questions. You must provide clear and compelling evidence for the need for the change. Furthermore, effective communication with your stakeholders is critical for discussing progress, making changes, and retaining their support.

AFGHANISTAN: Almost 60 percent of Afghanistan's journalists have lost their jobs or fled the country since the Taliban takeover a year ago, according to a survey published Friday by Reporters Without Borders.

The France-based NGO said 219 of the country's 547 media organisations had ceased operations since the Taliban took power on August 15, 2021. Women journalists have been most impacted, with 76 percent losing their jobs.

The survey found that only 656 women journalists were still working, the vast majority in Kabul, down from 2,756 a year ago. Some media outlets have been forced to shut by rules against broadcasting music and other content, while others have been unable to continue without international funding.

In a letter to Kim for Korea's Liberation Day, Putin said closer ties would be in both countries' interests, and would help strengthen the security and stability of the Korean peninsula and the Northeastern Asian region, North Korea's KCNA news agency said. Kim also sent a let-

ter to Putin saying Russian-North Korean friendship had been forged in World War II with victory over Japan, which had occupied the

Korean peninsula. The "strategic and tactical cooperation, support and solidarity" between the two countries has since

# "Lankan cities need to be evolved to unlock true potential"

"The current trajectory of Sri Lanka's cities is not sustainable and our cities need to be evolved to be more efficient if we are to unlock their true potential, " says Nayana Mawilmada, President, Property Group- John Keells Holdings. (PICTURED) To this end, Mawilmada stated both land use and transportation must be addressed in tandem.

"Most social and economic infrastructure is still focused in the higher density city core. As per data, over 2 million passengers travel across Colombo every day and around 600,000 vehicles enter/exit daily,

Mawilmada told the 'ReformNow' Conference, held in Colombo.

Noting that unlocking the potential of Lankan urban areas will require a reset in thinking, Mawilmada stated that the country's cities have been crippled through decades of shortsighted policy, suboptimal decisions, and poor coordination. Mawilmada said the introduction of mass transit is a critical step and game changer for urban development in Sri Lanka.

He also spoke on key interventions in this regard, which include modernizing existing rail, introduction of new railway into fast growing corridors, optimizing bus routing to feed into private vehicle ownership by charging private vehicles entering the city.

Stressing the need to stimulate transport oriented development ,he stated that zoning changes need to be made to enable higher density development close to transit stations whilst granting permission for high density development, eliminating mandatory parking for new constructions, preventing fragmentation, stimulating consolidation and mandating high minimum plot sizes.

'Moreover, we need to systematically release state land adjacent to rail stations for development whilst taking

the rail network and decentivizing measures to release air rights above stations for development.'

In addition, he stressed the need for the Government to establish a single window for the Government land release transactions and consolidate data on land availability and make it easily accessible to the market through a centralized window. "Sri Lanka must also establish a clear transparent process, purpose driven and systematic land release based on broader urban strategy thereby considering alternatives to one time upfront payments.

It is also required to consider structured transactions to enhance the via-

bility of developments and consider PPP wherever possible to capture high value and long term revenue streams."

Speaking Further, Mawilmada stated it is also important to reduce cost of multi family housing construction, reduce mandatory 1:1 parking, eliminate protectionism in construction and materials, remove para tariff on building materials, streamline approval process, enhance access to housing finance for first time buyers, release state lands on concessional basis for private sector driven middle income housing development.

#### Softlogic Group holds consolidated revenue at Rs. 24.5 bn in Q1

Despite the adverse effects of the economy, Softlogic Group consolidated revenue held strong at Rs. 24.5 billion during the quarter consequent to the Group's mixed portfolios re balancing top-line performance.

Group EBITDA recorded a strong rise of 45% to Rs. 4.7 billion during 1QFY23 primarily owing to better cost and inventory management. The Retail Sector was most impacted.

Top contributors to Group's revenue for 1QFY23 were the Retail sector (40% contribution), Healthcare Services (22%), Financial Services (24%) and IT (7%). Leisure and Automobile together contributed 7% to Group's top line for the quarter.

"Finance income, which predominantly comprises the investment gains at Softlogic Life Insurance, saw an increase of 317% to Rs. 3.9 Bn during the quarter primarily resulting from increased interest rates. AWPLR has increased from 9.85% to 22.27% for the period under review, said Chairman Ashok Pathirage.

This led to a 120% increase in net finance costs to Rs. 2.48 Bn which also includes substantial exchange losses during the quarter.

Retail sector, which recorded a formidable growth during the pandemic, is now facing one of the most challenging times in history.

Retail sector revenue was Rs. 9.7 Bn during the quarter, down from Rs. 13.5 Bn, due to the standstill on imports of mobile phones. Primary con-

tributors to the sector topline emerged to be Consumer Electronics followed by Fashion, Restaurants and Supermarkets. Healthcare sector continued its robust performance amidst the socio-economic shocks. Sector revenue increased 14% to Rs. 5.4 Bn during the quarter. Contribution from Asiri Hospital Holdings for the quarter was 40% of the hospital group's revenue. Central Hospital made up 27% while Asiri Surgical Hospital contributed 20%

Quarterly sector revenue grew 40% to Rs. 1.8 Bn as B2B hardware and software solutions segment continued its pivotal contribution in delivering financial results primarily led by IT infrastructure projects. Operating profit recorded an increase of 84% to Rs. 244 Mn for the quarter.

Sector EBITDA for the quarter reached Rs. 272 Mn (up 69%). Sector PBT rose 3% to Rs. 126 million for the quarter while quarterly PAT was Rs. 99 million.

Financial Services recorded a topline growth of 27% to Rs. 5.9 billion during the quarter. This growth was primarily led by Softlogic Life Insurance and Softlogic Finance.



In an Open Cover, the difference is each and every consignment is declared and a certificate which is needed for customers etc. is issued.

Sri Lanka insurance offers marine cargo policies, subject to institute time clauses, applicable and accepted worldwide, providing protection for various types of cargo in transit/at destination ports/warehouses, exposed to risks against loss or damage from associated perils. The coverages are meeting with regulatory requirements of exporters and importers. The associated terms of the cover will depend on the type of commodity, nature of packaging, details of carrying vessel and their susceptibility to damage and voyage. # Celebrating the National Logistics Day in Sri Lanka

The government of Sri Lanka declared August 16 as the National Logistics Day in Sri Lanka, CINEC Campus has been instrumental in proposing this idea to the Ministry of Transport and the first Sinhala text book authored by **Professor Lalith** Edirisinghe and published by **CINEC** Campus was launched on this historic day.

Logistics and Transport are two sides of the same coin, better transport services cannot be expected without improving Logistics competence of a county and vice versa. Since logistics

plays an indispensable role in customer's needs. The critical transportation planning, operation and management smart transport network should be founded on a strong logistics platform.

The term logistics was borrowed from the military as a proven discipline of planning and carrying out the movement, supply, and maintenance of military forces. In its most comprehensive sense, transport sector needs to seek the strategic input of logistics concepts and theories for sustainability and continuous improvements in the transport operations. Logistics is the design, operation and control of efficient transport and storage of goods, services, and between the starting point and the consuming location to meet the

importance of an efficient logistics and the supply chain network came into prominence during the global covid pandemic as well as Sri Lankas economic and energy crisis.

Logistics now accounts for about 11% of GDP in the Sri Lankan economy and 20% of the total service sector. Therefore, the sector of logistics has become increasingly important in the country's economy. However, it is observed that Logistics performance in Sr Lanka is not in good shape as per the Logistics Performance Indicator (LPI) published by the World Bank (the only indicator to measure logistics performance of a country). CINEC Campus is the first non-

government university to conduct

Logistics and Transport degree in Sri Lanka that later introduced the Bachelor of Management degree in supply chain management approved the Ministry of Higher Education for the first time in Sri Lanka. It is the only institute that offers a PhD in Transportation Planning and Logistics Management in Sri Lanka. CINEC Campus is instrumental in establishing Logistics as an academic subject in school curriculum.

The launch of the first Logistics Sinhala textbook titled 'Logistics Sinhalen' was the key activity in the National Logistics Day 2021. The most effective knowledge dissemination among many people in the society can be done through the national language, Sinhala.

The book has been awarded the



formal license by the Ministry of Education to be used as a library book in schools.

CINEC Campus together with many well-wishers distributed Logistics Sinhalen book to schools' libraries in Sri Lanka free of charge during the past year. Initially 500 school libraries have been selected and will extend to more schools in the coming year as a CSR project.

The key objective of the investment is to support the logistics and transport education in Sri Lanka and invite you to join hands to distribute more books to Libraries in Sri Lanka.

The book will cater to a wide spectrum of audience covering school children, University graduates and industry professionals.

The book consists of 434 pages and introduces most suitable Sinhala term for Logistics as approved by the Department of Official Languages. It is categorized as a science book because it reveals two new transport theories. The book has been endorsed by many academia, professionals, and organizations in Sri Lanka and overseas, including Ministry of Education and National Library of Sri Lanka.

It is imperative that a social awareness about Logistics is required by the entire cross section of the society to derive the maximum benefit from the transport sector.

The Ministry of Transport has selected this book as the key feature of the National Logistics Day 2021 celebration considering these factors that has a huge national value. The institute of chartered Shipbrokers Sri Lanka unveiled the first ever song dedicated on Logisticians on the maiden National Logistics Day in Sri Lanka. A commemorative stamp has been issued by the Philatelic bureau of Department of Post Sri Lanka.

# Indian logistics sector is expected to reach \$380 Billion mark by 2025

The Indian logistics industry is growing, especially after facing a slowdown in the last two years. Adding to the growth are the new policies that are set to give the industry a much-needed push. Better connectivity, dedicated freight corridors, tech-driven warehousing are some key highlights as part of the 'PM Gati Shakti' plan announced during the Union Budget 2022 earlier this year.

To better understand how the policies will help the logistics sector grow and to understand the key factors that will help boost this industry, Express Mobility spoke to Nilesh Ghule, the CEO and Co-Founder of TruckBhejo.

#### What is the logistics industry outlook for 2022? How different do you expect it to be compared to 2021?

The Indian Logistics Sector has been growing at a rapid pace and is expected to reach USD 380 Bn mark by 2025. Constant growth in online buying and thus e-commerce business, the government's focus on localised manufacturing through "Make in India" drive, and the onset of many D2C businesses – all these augurs well for the Indian Logistics Industry in 2022 and beyond.

I think the adoption of technology by the smaller fleet owners, who own 1-5 vehicles and form the majority of the logistics industry, will go up substantially. It also seems evident, that due to D2C business models expected to rise, the industry will move towards smaller-sized shipments and faster deliveries.

#### How will the recent budget announcement help the logistics sector?

The impetus given by the government



to build the infrastructure in the recent budget is the biggest positive for the logistics sector. The keen focus on building connectivity through a better road network, dedicated freight corridors, tech-driven warehousing along with Multimodal logistics parks, all these efforts indicate that the age-old perception of "logistics is just about transportation" is changing.

It is more widely believed that logistics is a specialised function, critical to economic growth and that is probably one of the reasons why a 7 Engine Plan called "PM Gati shakti" has been put in action. All these efforts will help the sector immensely in reducing logistics costs. And this will open up different opportunities for the new age techbased start-ups like TruckBhejo to take a rightful place in the scheme of things.

#### What are your views on the National Logistics Policy and what according to you is the key factor that will help the industry grow?

Over the last many years, the Indian logistics industry has been marred by its inefficiencies, and that shows in the higher logistics cost which is ~14% of GDP, much higher than most of the other comparable economies where the average logistics costs are 8%-10% of

GDP. The National Logistics Policy (NLP) is the right step in the direction of removing those inefficiencies. The introduction of GST has already brought some efficiency to the system, which can be seen in the reduced turnaround time for trucks by 18-20%. Geotagging of warehouses and encouragement of "IoT" in warehousing will be another factor that will remove inefficiencies further.

Industrial inspection of warehouses by drones is likely to be one more thing that will make processes faster. For all these reasons and many more, it's imperative that NLP is put into action to spur the growth of the logistics sector.

# What are your views on the Gati Shakti scheme and how will this benefit the sector?

Better Infrastructure, improved logistics, and higher economic growth are directly correlated. Gati Shakti scheme is what our current state of logistics Sector warranted for. Both the sector and economy needed a transformative approach, which Gati Shakti Scheme endeavours to provide by having 7 distinctly identified and defined engines namely roads, railways, airports, ports, public transportation, waterways, and logistics infrastructure.

# Poised to "leapfrog to the forefront" **Staying Hot: Logistics Market in Southeast Asia**

#### Southeast Asian logistics market: \$55 billion by 2025

In 2018, Internet penetration in Southeast Asia reached 58 percent. And with 3.5 million Internet users coming online each month, consumer behavior in Southeast Asia is changing fast

Given this flood of new online buyers, what's the outlook for logistics in getting goods to the doorsteps of these millions of new and relatively new online buyers? Logistics in Southeast Asia is a work in progress, but oh, the opportunity is there for success, and quick success at that.

According to Insight Partners, Southeast Asia's logistics market "accounted for \$36.4 billion in 2017 and is expected to grow at a CAGR of 5.5 percent over the forecast period through 2025, to account for \$ 55.7 billion in 2025.

That's a \$19 billion upgrade, which is over \$2 billion per year over the eight-year span.

AT Kearney reports that Southeast Asia, especially the 10-nation ASEAN, is poised to "leapfrog to the forefront of the fast-moving global digital economy." Why the confidence? Probably because the fundamentals are already in place:

Robust economy generating GDP of \$2.5-plus

trillion and growing at 6 percent per year Literate population of more than 600 million people, with 40 percent under 30 years of age Smartphone penetration of around 35 percent, and growing rapidly Well-developed information and communications technology (ICT) cluster with a track record of innovation and investment in new technology Nielsen has predicted that the region's "middle-class population will reach 400 million by 2020, over twice the size it was in 2012. According to data from the International Monetary Fund, the combined GDP of all ASEAN countries (10 member states) in 2017 amounted to around \$2.8 trillion. By the end of 2019, that number is projected to rise to \$3.1 trillion.'

"Southeast Asian youths are sophisticated, tapped into social media and are using technology to leapfrog barriers," says Regina Lim, JLL's Head of Capital Markets Research, Southeast Asia

"Consumers have bypassed computers and are using their mobile phones to shop. About 20 to 30 percent of those online in Southeast Asia have bought something via the internet in the last 30 days, a similar rate to the United States or the UK.

"Lim believes that the appetite for ecommerce coupled with a lower cost of production could lead to more manufacturers relocating from China to Southeast Asia."China wages are now three to four times higher (than before) while minimum local content laws in some Southeast Asia countries are further driving manufacturers to relocate to these countries to serve the growing consumer populations," she says.

And just to round out the economic outlook headed toward Southeast Asia, a study by Google and Temasek, reports that "the region's retail sales are forecast to almost double to \$1.38 trillion in 2025 from the \$720 billion it recorded last year...and the Internet economy is "expected to exceed \$240 billion by 2025."

#### Logistics today primed for disruption

The region's logistics sector is still currently dominated by third-party logistics service providers, "better known as 3PLs, which have traditionally been characterized as asset heavy and labor intensive."

Some of the top players: Deutsche Post AG, Nippon Express Co., Ltd., C.H. Robinson Worldwide, Inc., Kuehne + Nagel International AG, XPO Logistics, Inc., DB Schenker, DSV A/S, Geodis, Sinotrans Co., Ltd., and UPS Supply Chain Solutions.

The logistics sector is ripe for innovation. "While Singapore is ranked seventh globally in the World Bank's Logistics Performance Index, the rest of the region trails behind. Thailand places next at 32nd, followed by Vietnam (39th), Malaysia (41st), Indonesia (46th) and the Philippines (60)."

Poor logistics performance is expensive: Typically, in Southeast Asia costs range from 15-20 percent of GDP...21 percent for Vietnam.

#### The "Lazada Way" as a model?

Southeast Asia is one of the last major unclaimed e-commerce markets in the world, with no dominant player. So, what kind of form factor is needed in Southeast Asia to succeed in addressing the logistics needs of its 600 million consumers, multiple countries, languages and cultures spread out over four time zones?

Alibaba is betting on Lazada to build out an Amazon-type presence in Southeast Asia. Scooped up for \$2 billion by Alibaba between 2016 and 2018, Lazada has been helmed since December by Lazada veteran and MIT-trained engineer Pierre Poignant. According to Bloomberg, Lazada's logistics footprint is larger and headed towards the gargantuan: Lazada has "31 fulfillment warehouses scattered around

Southeast Asia and an outsourced fleet of planes, trucks, motorbikes and bicycles that can get packages to customers in as little as 24 hours in big cities." Of course, it's all far from automated, but it's in place, and with the help of Alibaba's logistics arm, Cainiao, Lazada has a huge leg up on the competition. Lazada has also staked a claim to groceries, "in 2016 acquiring RedMart, a startup that's become a leading e-grocer in Singapore. It intends to take that business to at least one more country this year," Poignant said.

These assets have helped turn Lazada into the region's largest e-commerce company as measured by traffic. In the last quarter of 2018, it attracted 183.4 million monthly web visits in six countries, according to the research consultant iPrice. Although the Lazada Way looks primed for success, things can happen quickly to adversely affect its upward trajectory. With 20 to 30 percent of those online in Southeast Asia having bought something via the internet in the last 30 days, and with e-commerce ready to skyrocket across the region (\$240 billion by 2025), Lazada will need much more firepower to dominate for very long.

And Alibaba's presence in Southeast Asia goes beyond backing Lazada. The firm also invested \$1.1 billion in Tokopedia which competes with Lazada in Indonesia, Southeast Asia's largest economy and the world's fourth most populous country. One thing's for sure with any of the logistics challengers, Southeast Asia will need to do much better in the World Bank's Logistics Performance Index than it has in the past. Languishing in 32nd place or 39th place simply won't cut it.






