

Considering that fact, the Paddy Marketing Board intervened to provide the maximum price to the farmers' paddy products, and under the first phase, Rs. 2,000 has been spent and 30,000 metric tonnes is expected to be purchased, and the minister said that this step was taken to prevent rice producers from buying paddy from farmers.

The minister said that the government is ready to intervene and buy more if necessary, and the minister said that between January and July of 2022, the Government imported more than 500,000 metric tonnes of rice.

Currently there is no shortage of rice in the country. The minister also said that since there is a stock of imported rice as well as paddy harvest in the spring season, a shortage of rice is likely to occur at the end of this December, and therefore the government has decided to maintain a rice reserve.

Also, arrangements have been made to prepare the rice purchased by the Paddy Marketing Board and sell it at a minimum price. Every kilo of rice sold by the Paddy Marketing Board will be reduced by Rs.5 and if it is necessary to further reduce the price of rice considering the market situation, the minister said that steps will be taken to do so.

During this period alone, more than six tonnes of cannabis have been seized by the Police and the Navy from raids across the country.

According to Police Narcotics Bureau data, the amount of heroin seized during this period is 1,007 kg and 207 grams. In 17,650 raids, 17,597 people were found with heroin.

During this period, the largest amount of heroin was seized in operations carried out by the

Police Narcotics Bureau and the Navy in the high seas.

The amount of heroin seized along with 29 people in three raids in the high seas is 917 kg and 40 grams.In addition to that 16,820 people have been arrested in 17,914 raids for having heroin amounting to 68 kg and 685 grams.

The amount of six tonnes of cannabis has been seized in 14,101 raids where 13,946 people have been arrested.

Cabinet Spokesman Mass Media Minister Dr. Bandula Gunawardena yesterday stated that there is an urgent need to allow internationally recognised foreign universities in Sri Lanka as a means of earning foreign exchange.

Discussion on measures to stabilise situation in aviation services

If the Ceylon Petroleum Corporation (CPC) cannot provide aviation fuel to meet the requirement, the private sector will be facilitated to import and for distribution purposes. It was revealed recently that the number of aircraft arriving and departing from Sri Lanka has decreased significantly due to difficulty in obtaining aviation fuel.

Local representatives of airlines, aviation services institutions and Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) and Ceylon Petroleum

The Minister at the discussion pointed out the importance of the supply of aviation fuel without any hindrance to all aircraft arriving and departing Sri Lanka. He emphasized that

Private Sector parties could be facilitated to import aviation fuel if the

CPC faced difficulties in prioritising to meet the requirements.

Several Private Sector institutions representing the aviation services sector here, stated that importation and distribution of aviation fuel could be made possible on their own on the concurrence and facilitation from the Ministry of Power and Energy and the CPC.

Officials of the CPC stated that two crude oil vessels were expected in Colombo soon and accordingly, about 600 metric tons of aviation fuel on a daily basis could be provided through the Sapugaskanda Refinery to continue supply from August 20. The Minister instructed CPC officials to pre-

pare a systematic process on the airlines' daily requirement for aviation fuel and the steps to be taken to supply the requirement based on a proper study on to the matter.

Airline representatives at the meeting, pointed out that the continued supply of aviation fuel was crucial for the sustainability of the industry also considering the increased number of flights which are scheduled to arrive at the BIA in the coming months with the arrival of tourist season in Sri Lanka.

Minister de Silva instructed CPC officials to promptly carry out the necessary measures taking into consideration the future requirements to facilitate and expand storage capacities in and outside the airport for aviation fuel

Protective helmets for rider, pillion rider made compulsory

The Transport and Highway Ministry has issued a Gazette Notification (2287/28) removing the full-face helmet law, while making it compulsory to wear protective helmets for both the rider and the pillion.

As per the notification, every person who rides a motorcycle and the pillion rider on any road should wear a protective helmet with or without a visor.

The gazette notification was issued by the Transport and Highways Minister on July 7, 2022, under Section 237 read with subsections 2 and 3 of Section 158 of the Motor Traffic Act.

The helmets should be classified as Type B of the Sri Lanka Standard specification as protective helmets or any other standard that may be applicable for protective helmets from time to time.

"Such a protective helmet should bear the SLS product certification mark issued by the Sri Lanka Standards Institution (SLSI). Those helmets should not reflect light from their outer surface." the notification stated.

It furthered, "The protective helmets should comprise a shell, a shock-absorbing liner, a chin

strap, buffer padding and a headband. The chin strap of the helmet should be firmly fitted to the helmet, and it should have a mechanism that enables the wearer of the helmet to adjust the length of the chin strap and to fasten and unfasten the chin strap securely and conveniently."

"The visor of the helmet should be fitted to the protective helmet and should not be worn if it is made of a tinted, coloured material or if it obscures the peripheral vision of the wearer of the helmet. The chin guard should not obstruct the peripheral vision of the wearer of the helmet."

As per the gazette notification, a person should not use, sell, or offer for sale any helmet for the purpose of riding a motorcycle that does not conform to the provisions of these regulations. It is also recommended to wear a protective helmet as provided in these regulations in any public place or at any public gathering.

The above regulations, however, should not apply to a police officer engaged in crime prevention or a member of the Sri Lanka Army, Navy, or Air Force tasked with national security protection.



ACCEND introduces enhanced nutrition care package to tackle undernutrition

ADRA Sri Lanka and Oxfam Sri Lanka through their jointly implemented Assisting Communities in Creating Environmental and Nutritional Development (ACCEND) project held a research symposium on August 12 to launch and discuss its research report on undernutrition among children below the age of five in estate and rural communities of the Nuwara Eliya District.

ACCEND project which is funded by the European Union, carried out the study in the Ambagamuwa Divisional Secretariat with the involvement of Dr. Renuka Jayatissa, the Head of the Department of Nutrition at the Medical Research Institute, and Dr. Upul Senarath, Chair Professor and Specialist in Community Medicine at the University of Colombo.

Undernutrition in children under five years is a major public health problem in Sri Lanka with the Nuwara Eliya district reporting the highest rate of undernutrition, indicated by very severe levels of stunting and underweight in children less than five years of age.

This study aims to investigate nutrition outcomes following an enhanced nutrition care package developed by the Medical Research Institute. This package optimizes the existing public health services implemented through the Medical Officers of Health, integrates the care with the clinical nutrition services, and is expected to strengthen the existing health system.

Various stakeholders of the ACCEND project were present at the event including the Programme Manager of the EU Delegation, Chandana Hewawasam who highlighted the importance of taking necessary action towards securing food and nutrition, especially targeting the most vulnerable income groups under the current context in the country.

He further stated that "the European Commission has set itself some extremely ambitious but achievable targets to support countries in reducing the number of stunted children under the age of five at least by seven million (globally) by 2025."

Rohitha Wickramarathna, Additional Director General of the Department of National Planning (DNP) who was present at the event expressed his appreciation towards the ACCEND project for conducting such a study. He further emphasized the government's efforts to alleviate food insecurity and mentioned that all sectors must work in unison to address this issue.

The ACCEND Project was a five-year commitment of EU's rural development scheme to improve water, sanitation, hygiene, health, and nutrition in the most vulnerable communities of the Matale, Monaragala and Nuwara Eliya districts.

Low-floor A\C buses to encourage people to use public transport

Lanka Private Bus Owners' Association (LPBOA) Chairman Gemunu Wijeratne said yesterday that plans are afoot to commence low-floor air-conditioned bus services in Colombo and suburban areas.

The overall objective is to encourage more

people who are at present using individual vehicles to opt for public transportation. This would also help reduce traffic and economize fuel cost." he added.

As an initial step, at least 100 low-floor buses will be deployed to Colombo and the suburbs. He also said that buses for this ser-

vice will be procured from China on a loan basis. There is a need to purchase 100 lowfloor buses which can carry a high proportion of standing passengers in greater comfort than small buses which are more comfortable and suitable for short-distance running than the existing buses.

Ensuring adequate fuel for harvesting Yala paddy

Agriculture Ministry appoints officer to coordinate with **Ceylon Petroleum Corporation**

Representatives of farmers' organizations have requested the Agriculture Ministry to continue providing the necessary fuel for harvesting paddy in this year's Yala season and for cultivation activities in the upcoming season.

Farmers complain that they are not getting adequate and regular fuel for paddy harvesting this year.

Taking these facts into account, Agriculture Minister Mahinda Amaraweera instructed the Secretary of the Ministry, Rohana Pushpakumara to immediately appoint a responsible officer in the Ministry for the purpose of coordinating between the Agriculture Ministry and the Ceylon Petroleum Corporation. Accordingly, arrangements have been made to refer the officer to Ceylon Petroleum Corporation from today in order to ensure continuous and regular supply of fuel to the farmers.

It is currently estimated that at least 3,020 bowsers of fuel will be required for paddy harvesting this season. The required fuel is 20.285 million litres.

This amount of fuel should be provided by September 30.

The reason is that the 512,000 hectares of paddy that have been planted this year will be harvested by September 30.

Minister cracks whip on people smugglers

Labour and Foreign Employment Minister Manusha Nanayakkara has decided to encourage investigations against human trafficking and to offer cash rewards to officials who arrest people involved in human trafficking and take legal action.

People who get a tourist visa and go abroad and then get a work visa there are subjected to various persecutions and this step has been taken to prevent it.

Accordingly, the Minister instructed the officials of the Foreign Ministry to speed up investigations to nab smugglers who take people abroad on tourist visas for employment.

YUAN WANG 5 berths at Hambantota Port



Scientific research ship 'Yuan Wang 5' of the People's Republic of China, docked at the Hambantota International Port (HIP) yesterday. It will remain at HIP for 7 days for replenishments and ship chandelling.

China's Ambassador to Sri Lanka, Qi Zhenhong, who attended a ceremony held at the Hambantota International Port to mark the Yuan Wang 5's arrival said, "Hambantota International Port as a key cooperation project of Belt and Road Initiative, has become an important engine to help Sri Lanka's economic recovery and enhance its independent development capability."

He added that the visit of Yuan Wang-5 left its own marks for the celebration of the 65th anniversary of diplomatic relations between China and Sri Lanka and the 70th anniversary of the signing of the Rubber-Rice Pact, highlighting the deeprooted traditional friendship between China and Sri Lanka.

Johnson Liu, CEO of Hambantota International Port Group (HIPG) and representative of global partner CMPort, welcoming Captain Zhang Hongwang of the Yuan Wang 5 and his crew said, "HIP has always extended a warm welcome to foreign vessels approved by the Government of Sri Lanka and the SLPA. We have had vessels calling from various countries, from time to time. Up to July, we catered hundreds of vessels, including RoRo, gas and oil vessels, bulk carriers, layups, cruises, yachts etc. The arrival of the Yuan Wang 5 is a significant occasion and marks an important milestone in strength-

ening the friendship between Sri Lanka and China."

Captain Zhang Hongwang of Yuan Wang 5 said, "Yuan Wang 5 is a ship on a mission of peace and friendship. As an international port that accommodates multinational ships, Hambantota Interna-tional Port will provide us with necessary ship supplies in accordance with international practice. We believe the ship's call at Hambantota International Port will deepen the exchange between China and Sri Lanka in the field of space science and technology and promote the common progress of the space industry of the two countries. It will also deepen the connection between China and Sri Lanka and further grow the friendship between people of both countries."

Amongst the distinguished guests attending the welcome ceremony were several members of the Sri Lankan Parliament and representatives from the Chinese Embassy, and other port officials.

HIP, a multipurpose commercial port operating under the sovereign authority of the Sri Lanka Government, is a publicprivate partnership between the Sri Lanka Ports Authority and international port operator CMPort.





Elvis Presley's 45th death anniversary



When Elvis returned home, he gradually pursued a more mellow pop-influenced style of music and adopted a conventional look. Elvis returned to musical comedies with Blue Hawaii, which was his second most financially successful movie. The movie directed by Norman Taurog, featured a huge cast of colourful characters who could handle comedy. In response to his fans' demand for more songs. Blue Hawaii also contains 14 musical numbers. including the title song and one of Elvis's biggest hits "Can't Help Falling in Love." Elvis opened at the International Hotel on July 31, 1969, and the engagement was so successful that the Colonel inked a deal for Elvis to perform there twice a year for a month each time. The extravagant costumes and complex rituals of Elvis's period in Vegas fit the scale of the 1970s Presley concert. In Vegas and on the road, Elvis was joined onstage by a gospel quartet, a female backup trio called the Sweet Inspirations, a rock band, and a 35-piece orchestra. After his burst of creativity in the early 1970s, a demanding schedule and an unhealthy lifestyle took its toll on Elvis. Isolated from the real world and secluded at Graceland when not on tour, Elvis lived a strange life sleeping all day and staying up all night. Inclined toward excess including overeating, overspending, and prescription drug abuse On June 26, 1977, Elvis Presley gave his final performance at Market Square Arena in Indianapolis. Less than two months later, he was dead at age 42. His girlfriend, Ginger Alden, found his body slumped over in the bathroom at Graceland on August 16, 1977. After paramedics failed to revive him, he was taken to Baptist Memorial Hospital where further attempts to revive him failed. Within an hour of Elvis's death, fans began to gather in front of Graceland. Elvis's 23 years in show business constituted an extraordinary music career. I conclude with his most famous quote "Never criticize what you can't understand. You haven't walked in that man's shoes". The music of the "king" will live forever.

Remembering the King of Rock 'N' Roll

ohn Lennon once said: "Before Elvis there was nothing, after Elvis nothing was the same." As a young adult in the 1940s, Sam Phillips became acutely aware that no genre of music existed primarily for teenagers in America. Eventually, Phillips saw potential in a cross-pollination of blues and country music, a new sound that America's booming postwar teenage population would connect with. Ultimately, Phillips would use Elvis Presley to create a style of music so innovative and alive that it would become a revolutionary force. Not only was Phillips one of the major creators of Rock N' Roll, but his success in tapping the new teenage consumer would contribute to jump-starting a cultural revolution, one that would change the face of American life forever.

By the 1940s, Beale Street in Memphis had become a centre for African American culture and urban life as black Americans travelled from the Delta to find work, and play the blues. Beale Street became the black musical equivalent of the Grand Ole Opry. The jug band music, jazz, and blues played in juke-joints, saloons, and clubs brought Beale Street to life. In February 1952, Phillips created Sun Records. White retailers told Phillips that black music was ruining their children. Phillips therefore contemplated on how he could take the element of "feeling" from blues music and make it appeal to teens. According to Phillips, his philosophy at the time was, "If I can find a white person who can give the feel and the true essence of the black blues-type song."

Entered a newcomer, an eighteen year old named Elvis Presley. Presley walked into Sun Studio wanting to record a song for his mother's birthday. Phillips' secretary, Marion, asked Presley, "Who do you sound like?" Elvis replied, "I don't sound like nobody." Phillips proceeded to record Presley singing two popular ballads: "My Happiness," and "That's When Your Heartache Begins." Young Elvis bought his clothes from Beale Street and greased his hair into a pompadour style that sported long sideburns, which would be copied by other young men.

Presley grew up listening to the radio and was heavily influenced by the gospel music that he heard at his church. At school, Elvis was bullied and had few friends. When not working at the Precision Tool Company in Memphis or driving a truck for Crown Electric, he visited Beale Street to listen to the blues singers. He frequently attended gospel programmes. As someone said he (Elvis) was the "white boy with black hips". Elvis would live up to this name giving stunning performances on stage, moving his hips and doing many dance acts.

On July 5, 1954, Phillips paired Presley with guitarist Scotty Moore and bassist Bill Black. The song was Arthur Crudup's 1946 release, "That's All Right Mama." In 1948, the Memphis radio station WHBQ debuted a show hosted by Dewey Phillips called "Red Hot and Blue." Excited over Presley's unique sound, Dewey agreed to play "That's All Right Mama" on his programme. As soon as the song hit the airwave, Dewey was bombarded with nonstop telephone calls from his listeners. After Sun Records released Elvis' first record in July 1954, Presley and his band mates embarked on a journey of scheduled appearances. Sam Phillips saw it as a cultural revolution—one that could be used by generations to express deeply felt aspirations.

By tapping into the musical atmosphere of Memphis Tennessee, Sam Phillips created a new form of entertainment for teens, Rock N' Roll music. The new medium of television also helped promote Rock N' Roll. Significantly, teens were spending US\$ 1.5 billion a year on music, record sales tripled, and by the end of the decade the teenage market had amounted to US\$ 10 billion. Rock N' Roll not only changed the way teens spent money, but it changed the way they walked, talked, dressed, and wore their hair. Rock N' Roll encouraged teens to resist their parents' authority, be more sexually adventurous and learn from their peers.

Presley changed his musical style and his personal





look to keep up with the times and gain popularity among older audiences. He became a movie star during the 1960s and then returned to live musical performances during the 1970s. Because his career went through so many changes, he was popular with different types of fans for different reasons. This wide popularity, as well as his important role in American musical history, made him a cultural icon.

On January 8, 1935, in Tupelo, Mississippi, Elvis Aron Presley was born a half hour after his stillborn twin brother, Jesse Garon. The occasion was a mixed blessing to parents Vernon and Gladys Presley, who lived in a two room shack in Tupelo. A true son of the South, Elvis never ventured far from his roots, physically or musically. While a young boy, Elvis learned to play the guitar from relatives, and then he fell under the influence of countrywestern singer Mississippi Slim. Elvis became familiar with the music of the well-known local R&B artists, including B.B. King, Rufus Thomas, and Big Memphis Ma Rainey. All these Southern-based musical genres inspired Elvis's early singing style, which turned out to be a true fusion of sounds. Their weekly appearances on the Louisiana Hayride radio programme brought them wide exposure.

His performing style evolved to become a unique, highly energetic part of an Elvis Presley performance. Dressed in outrageously colorful clothes — such as those worn by R&B artists down on Beale Street — Elvis moved throughout his entire act, bouncing on his feet, shaking his legs, and swiveling his hips. The antics of the fans, especially the girls, drew the attention of country promoter Colonel Tom Parker, who believed the young man with the big moves could be a national success. By the end of 1955, Parker had succeeded in becoming Elvis's manager. Negotiating a movie contract for Elvis served Parker's long-term goal of reaching as broad an audience as possible. As a movie star, Elvis could attract regular moviegoers. Elvis made four movies between 1956 and 1958: Love Me Tender, Loving You, Jailhouse Rock, and King Creole. Elvis was drafted to the US Army in late 1957 at the age of 22. Elvis opted to join the regular army and do his duty to serve his country. Elvis spent two years serving in a tank division in Germany, and became a sergeant.

While Elvis was in the army, two events in his personal life occurred that made a permanent impact on his life. In August 1958, near the beginning of his tour of duty, Elvis's mother, Gladys, died unexpectedly. With her death, he lost his biggest supporter. Then in early 1960, near the end of his tour of duty, Elvis met 14-year-old Priscilla Beaulieu, whose stepfather was also in military service. The two began a relationship that would continue in the 1960s when Priscilla moved to Memphis at Elvis's suggestion, eventually leading to marriage in 1967.

National Dengue Control Programme from September 1 to 3

Dr. Sudath Samaraweera, Director of the National Dengue Mosquito Control Programme announced yesterday (August 16) that the National Dengue Control Programme will be implemented from September 1 to 3.

He also said that this national programme will be implemented in 60 MOH divisions in seven districts namely Colombo, Gampaha, Kalutara, Kandy, Kegalle, Ratnapura and Galle. He stated that since the beginning of this year, 50,730 dengue infected people have been report-

ed and on average, about 1,500 dengue infected people are reported per week.

He said that several mosquito control days were announced in May and that the number of infected people can be reduced by carrying out mosquito control activities.

He said that more than 51 percent of the reported dengue infected people are from the Western Province.

He also stated that the public should take steps to maintain the environment properly where they live so that mosquitoes cannot breed.

Sri Lankan Embassy in Jordan conducts awareness session on remittances for migrant workers

In order to increase remittance inflows to Sri Lanka, the Sri Lankan Embassy in Jordan organized an Interactive Session with the People's Bank of Sri Lanka through Zoom technology on August 12, 2022 for the Sri Lankan migrant workers in Jordan.

The Assistant General Manager of the People's Bank Aruni Liyanagunawardena reached out to the audience to explain the procedure of opening a Non Residential Foreign Currency

(NRFC) account and explained how to remit the funds to Sri Lanka through the People's Bank. The migrant workers, who attended the programme were advised on the importance of opening NRFC accounts. Ambassador Shanika Dissanayake emphasized the importance of strengthening

channels. remittance inflows to Sri Lanka in order to support the economic growth of the country and encouraged migrant

to open accounts were distributed among all attendees. The Embassy is also reaching out to Apparel factories, where many Sri Lankan

migrant workers are employed, in order to encourage them to open NRFC accounts and remit their funds through legal

A dire situation

hile Health authorities are focused on the rapid spread of COVID-19 and dengue, it appears that little attention is being paid to the chronic shortage of medicines and essential drugs in rural hospitals which has now assumed crisis proportions. It seems only the Government Medical Officers' Association (GMOA) that keeps continuing to highlight the drug shortage and the plight of the patients, particularly in hospitals in the outstations and is holding regular news conferences to nudge the authorities on the need for finding remedies to overcome the crisis. As the GMOA doctors keep saying food can always be shared between the haves and the have nots and people will not always go hungry. As GMOA Secretary Dr. Haritha Aluthge says if one could not afford to buy dhal one can easily switch to a cheaper food item. But this is not the case with drugs and medicines. One has even the choice to skip one meal for the day, but drugs and medicines cannot be reduced in intake and the full dosage prescribed by the doctors has to be taken if one were to stay intact.

The other day television showed the plight of a Government hospital in Anuradhapura where patients were asked to buy their drug requirements from outside due to their unavailability in the hospital including life saving drugs. In a pathetic sight a poor distraught father was shown sobbing inconsolably as the drug prescribed by the hospital for his ailing daughter was to cost Rs. 95,000 which he could not even dream of raising. How the daughter is going to survive no one can tell. The hospital had run out of stocks and pleas for replenishment had been to no avail. Meanwhile, doctors at the Lady Ridgeway Hospital have appealed to the public to meet the medicinal requirements of children with long standing ailments adding that any break in the treatment cycle could prove fatal. This sums up the situation. Health Minister Keheliya Rambukwella had apparently grasped the gravity of the position and said the drugs and medicinal requirements of all Government Hospitals will be met shortly.

The problem is, it is not just the Government hospitals, even most of the private hospitals are running short of drugs and medicines, and, what is more, test kits and other vital medical equipment. No Rapid Antigent Tests too are being carried out any longer and there could be carriers of the COVID-19 among the public several fold than what is officially reported. All Government Hospitals meanwhile have suspended non-urgent surgeries and are performing operations only on life threatening cases.

The prices of drugs and medicines are another cause for concern. Almost all drugs are beyond the reach of not only the poor but also the average income earners, the prices shooting up more than fivefold with most drugs unavailable in the pharmacies even at a price. The plight of the aged, the Senior Citizens, retirees who have no one to depend on could only be imagined. These souls need their regular intake of drugs and medicines to keep them alive and if the shortage in hospitals coupled with the high prices continue indefinitely we will soon see a situation where people start dying without medicines. As such the authorities need to act fast. As already mentioned, one can ration or even go without food for a day or so and still survive but it is a different kettle of fish where medicine is concerned, especially in the case of the aged and those afflicted with non communicable diseases such as diabetes and high blood pressure and respiratory problems. With COVID-19 and dengue back with a vengeance, the situation could only be dire. It's time the health authorities went into emergency mode and devise measures to deal with the multiple health threats that threaten to plunge the country into a serious crisis. The health precautions that were evident during the initial outbreak of the pandemic are no longer evident. Public transport continues to ply in their own merry way with overcrowding the order of the day. We are also not in short supply of protests, agitations and other mass gatherings. Restrictions that were placed on weddings, funerals etc. have simply vanished and there were few face mask wearers at the recently held religious festivals. Now that there is an acute shortage of drugs and medicines in the hospitals what the authorities should be doing is taking steps to prevent or minimize the spread of diseases as far as possible, so that this may at least ease the strain on the doctors and medical staff. True, this is not the long term answer for the current drug shortage in hospitals that has hampered the treatment of serious illnesses. This requires elaborate planning and foreign assistance in which the country has now almost reached the point of exhaustion. The Government should now pay equal attention that is directed towards the import of fuel and gas, to essential drugs and medicines too. We are certain that bodies such as the WHO and International Red Cross would more than chip in to address this grave humanitarian crisis. All Government hospitals should be adequately stocked, so that the medicines last for longer durations not leaving the public in want.

uing for libel was never fun for the plaintiffs and if there was a defendant that was accused unfairly that was far from fun for the latter either. But there was a way in which newspapers were kept in check.

From time immemorial of course people could be slandered in the public space without it having to be through the newspapers. People could be slandered by letters being written to various folk who are important, or connected to the person being maligned.

It was called the poison-pen. But poison-pen wielders were not generally the purveyors of libelous material. The newspapers usually did that job.

So there was a fairly circumscribed space in which libel originated, and it was easy to keep track of libelous content and easy for victims to be identified and for perpetrators to be brought to justice.

Not that dealing with newspaper libel has been satisfactory in any way at all. Courts have to consider several angles before reaching a conclusion, and these include issues such as public interest so called.

Of course there is something called public interest but then there are those who also take cover behind public interest defences. But newspapers are fairly 'out there' and newspaper libel is not a non-navigable morass in the main.

Case by case, things could be looked at clinically with newspaper defamation. But then came social media and now the issue of libel is bewildering and to call it a minefield would be understatement.

What are the laws that deal with social media libel in this country? It's the same laws that deal with libel — or defamation — in general.

That's the way it is in most countries including in the so called advanced liberal democracies. At least with the press there is something called self-regulation — by name at the very least - even though that's mostly a farce in a lot of cases, in many countries, but that's a different story.





case involving the wives of top football stars in the UK. In the second suit the libel itself took place on social media, when one wife of a football star Ms. Coleen Rooney made an allegation that her private Instagram posts were leaked to a tabloid newspaper by a wife of another soccer star, Rebecca Vardy.

In the first suit, Amber Herd was accused of libeling her ex-husband in newspaper articles and it was in that sense a classic case of newspaper libel, but what was different was the social media hype surrounding the

This is deplorable under any circumstances, and it is a positive sign that politicians have been forced to think twice these days before placing restrictions on social media, particularly when they are trying to combat perceived attacks against them.

COMPLEXITIES

But ordinary people in any case do not have the ability to ban social media or to restrict access of persons maligning them falsely on social media platforms. Of course they can report the perpetrators and try to have their accounts banned, but this is a long process and schoolgirls who commit suicide due to negative social media exposure for instance, did not have a chance to deal with any of these issues by lodging complaints.

Reporting is a complicated process — it takes time — and very often does not vield results. It is sad therefore that the abuse of persons on social media is mostly as a result of the fact that the law hasn't caught up with the problem, and there is very little recourse to people who feel genuinely maligned or threatened by behaviors of fellow users of the various different platforms. Granted of course that it is very difficult to regulate social media and by extension that much more difficult to control social media libel and defamation. But there has to be a start, and despite the fact that there were sensational cases internationally such as the mentioned Depp-Herd trial and the Wagatha Christie lawsuit, there isn't much at all that's happening to ensure that something is done to deal with these new complexities. The old systems, the old libel laws etc. aren't adequate and that's obvious, but there seems to be an insistence that new modes of libel should be dealt with, with the same old archaic laws and in the same old archaic approach. If internationally they are not interested at least in this country there has to be some move towards addressing these issues not least because there are schoolchildren that are committing suicide, even though of course in very small numbers, due to abuse on social media platforms.

Though a platform such as say Instagram may state that it's practicing self-regulation, that's not organised and cannot be organised in the face of the fact that the individual accounts are massive in number. In other words individuals are on their own, and they can libel or defame others with a few strokes on the keyboard.

CHRISTENED

There were the recent cases of libel which grabbed international attention which had much to do with social media one way or another. The first of this was the case between Johnny Depp the actor, and his exwife Amber Herd.

A less publicized but not any less talked about case was christened Wagatha Christie, and was a libel case.

Many commentators were of the view that social media played a disproportionate role in determining the outcome of the case, even though Jury members were forbidden from accessing their social media accounts for a certain crucial duration of the trial. The very fact that this kind of stricture had to be placed on Jury members is a sign that social media plays a huge role sometimes, even though the original libel was in the print media. The libel associated with the case in social media may be worse for the parties concerned than the libel in the print media that caused offence in the first place.

In the so-called Wagatha Christie trial the victim did her own detective work and discovered that it was Rebecca Vardy, her husband's team mate's wife that was leaking stories about her private life from her Instagram account to the Sun newspaper. That led to the play on words that caused the trial to be christened the 'Wagatha Christie', with Wag being the term for wives and girlfriends of football stars.

lain who caused the stories to be leaked and then wanted to 'clear her name' by basically calling the victim a liar. Be that as it may, the social media implications of libel are hardly ever taken into account these days despite all these sensational cases and the outcomes or the intervening circumstances that have so much to do with social media.

In this country we have had the situation — repeated several times over — of schoolchildren, particularly schoolgirls committing suicide due to what appeared on social media about them. The tragedy is that there has been very little coverage of these stories and hardly any analysis leave alone concern about why the phenomenon of social media character assassination is not a topic of any significance in the national discourse.

What can be done about social media libel and defamation in general? Awkwardly, and one might add flagrantly, politicians have sometimes dealt with this issue when they are the targets by banning social media or restricting access.

PREMAKEERTHI DE ALWIS' 33RD DEATH ANNIVERSARY

UNTIMELY END OF PROLIFIC LYRICIST AND BROADCASTER

amaraweera Mudalige Don Premakeerthi de Alwis (June 3, 1947 – July 31, 1989), commonly known as Premakeerthi de Alwis, was a highly popular and prominent Sri Lankan radio and television broadcaster and lyricist. He was assassinated during the 1987–1989 terror period which destroyed many such innocent valuable lives and billions worth National assets.

During the 1987–1989 terror period de Alwis received death threats allegedly from young Sinhala undergraduates who called themselves rebels. But as a socialist, he did not take them seriously. At around 8.30pm on July 31, 1989, armed men stormed into de Alwis' home in Homagama. De Alwis tried to escape through the back door but more armed men were waiting in his back garden. His wife pleaded with the armed men and they assured her that they only wanted to question de Alwis. They dragged him outside and shot him dead. His bullet Premakeerthi De Alwis was a prolific lyricist, writing hundreds of songs. He wrote his first song, Hada Puda Asune Senehasa Bendune, in 1969 for Rupa Indumathi and Malkanthi Nandasiri. In the same year he wrote his first film song, for Lokuma Hinawa directed by K. A. W. Perera. He wrote songs for more than 150 films. He wrote songs for numerous singers including Mohideen Baig, Malini Bulathsinhala, Milton Mallawarachchi, J. A. Milton Perera, Mervyn Perera, Victor Ratnayake, Freddie Silva and Priya Suriyasena etc.

ridden body was later found 200 yards from his home. His remains were cremated at the Borella General Cemetery on August 7, 1989. De Alwis had two children, a daughter and a son.

His killers did not stop there. They killed 30 politicians, 23 academics, 1 member of


the clergy, 2 Government officials, 89 civilians and 61 service personnel, from July 1987 to January 1990. They began preparing to topple the Government. They began targeting opponents, carried out robberies to collect funds and began acquiring weapons. Usually collecting pistols and shotguns from owners who had gained gun licences from the Government. Thereafter, they planned to raid armouries of the Government, who had deployed its forces to the North and East of the country to counter the LTTE.

They carried out a large number of murders. They killed more than 70 Members of Parliament between July and November 1989.

They murdered probably thousands of people and crippled the country with violence and by forced enforced general strikes for two years. Individuals or organisations were warned or intimidated with messages dropped in the night to homes or posters or graffiti that appeared overnight. Those that did not cooperate were brutally killed, with the repercussions extended to their family members. Executions were mostly carried out at night with armed groups coming to the homes of the victims and carrying

them away to be tortured, executed and left as an example, while occasional bombings took place. In most cases the funerals of these victims were not allowed by them, traditional final rights were not allowed and the caskets were to be carried below knee level as a mark of disrespect.

With these techniques of fear and intimidation, they were able to bring the country to stand still. Acts of sabotage were common, with destruction of Government property, electric transformers were a common



target. In addition they destroyed a large number of State properties including buses, trains, state buildings etc. Killings took place in both urban and rural areas and the Government seemed powerless in the face of it.

A member of them was found guilty of the murder on December 17, 1992 by the High Court of Colombo. In July 2014 a part of Independence Square Mawatha, the road leading to the SLBC Headquarters in Colombo, was renamed Premakeerthi de Alwis Mawatha.

De Alwis was born on June 3, 1947 in Colombo, Ceylon. He was educated at Maradana Maligakande Maha Vidyalaya and Ananda College where he co-edited the school newspaper *Dhamma Jayanthi* and compiled the *Anandaya* magazine in 1965. In 1961 he unsuccessfully auditioned to be a singer on Radio Ceylon. However, his speaking skills enabled him to take part in several children's radio programmes, including Lama Pitiya and Lama Mandapaya, presented by Karunaratne Abeysekera.

De Alwis' father wanted him to join the Railway Department but he was attracted to radio broadcasting. De Alwis joined the *Visithura* magazine, part of the Davasa group, in 1966 as a feature writer. He started working for Radio Ceylon as a freelance announcer on December 17, 1967. He became a permanent announcer in June 1971 and was promoted to programme producer. He became a Grade Two announcer in 1974 and afterwards presented programmes such as Sonduru Sevana, Serisara Puvath Sangarawa and Shanida Sadaya on Radio Ceylon's successor Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation (SLBC). He later joined the Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation, presenting programmes such as Anduna, Shanida Ayubowan and Sampath Rekha (National Lotteries Board).

fter seventy-four years of democratic Governments, within the framework of democracy, Sri Lanka has today declared bankruptcy, or on the verge of it, due to the lack of much-needed dollars to pay back debts to international organisations up to US 55 billion dollars. Global Organisations investigations reveal that out of the US\$ 55 billion loans, Sri Lanka heads the list by fleecing 30 billion out of Sri Lanka.

"We are not concerned about any person or Governments which are responsible for such deeds," says Chanaka Senanayake (One Country Law Organisation) in a YouTube video, which is going viral internationally. Unfortunately, this video is not available anymore!

In his opinion, 'there is a mechanism to get those dollars back to the country.' The process is twofold. The United Nations and World Bank established an Institution in 2004 and named it 'STAR' (State Stolen Assets Recovery) in 2007. It was established under a special 'Geneva Convention against Corruption.' Since the establishment of this convention, 'STAR' has recovered illegal monies lying in foreign bank accounts in up to 259 countries so far.

Chanaka Senanayake requests the public and the Sri Lankan media (to question all 225 Parliamentarians -including the Opposition) what they have done so far about it? Instead of making groans about it whether they had even heard the name 'STAR' so far? It all came out because of Chanaka Senanayake after speaking to STAR officials.

Chanaka Senanayake relates an interesting story about the President of Guatemala (a military General) who received 67% of the vote base in the General Election. He plundered wealth up to the tune of billions of dollars using his brother's and his friend's names (from the time of Marcos in power in Phililliphines). According to his story, the President of Guatemala

made use of imports of food items *(especially sugar)* and while the stocks were in the Guatemala Harbour, he reduced taxes so that his brothers, relations' and importers benefitted.

The Opposition made a hue and cry constantly about the President's corruption techniques but he simply brushed them under the carpet calling such accusations complete fabrications. Every time accusations erupted the President blamed his relations and importers rather than accepting himself. In the end, one young female suggested that they hold a calm protest surrounding his official residence. She requested one hundred people who sympathised with her to attend the protest, but to her amazement eleven thousand people gathered. The protesters were yelling that he was a fraud. Furthermore he fired the Deputy President and various ministers in his Cabinet. Meanwhile, the United Nations intervened and proved that he was guilty of transferring a huge sum of foreign currency to other safe havens. This was when the President of Guatemala had to resign.

The present 'Aragalaya' in Sri Lanka was akin to the non-partisan development in Guatemala, However criminals managed to intermingle with the protesters, entered the Presidential House, Presidential Secretariat and the Prime Minister's (Residence - Temple Trees) and started looting and caused millions worth of damages to the properties. On May 9 Sri Lankan hooligans threw petrol bombs at many Government Ministers' houses, including Ranil Wickremesinghe's house and caused incendiarism. Lots of other buildings and vehicles were torched; some were seen carrying TV sets from the Presidential House.

Concerning the Sri Lankan struggle, unlike in Guatemala, the missing link was the absence of the United Nations appearance on the scene. To fill such a vacuum 'saviour' Chanaka Senanayake appeared on the scene to reveal what action could be taken by STAR.

He had done adequate groundwork to prepare for the looted money back to Sri Lanka. Sri Lanka does not have to pay a single dollar or cent to get back swindled money. Today, it is very sad to see people suffering to the hilt with soaring

food prices and the hospitals do not have adequate drugs to treat patients.

Chanaka Senanayake says there are two procedures to follow to invite *STAR* to intervene and help to get plundered sums back to the Treasury. The first step is by a new Government *(All Party Government making a request)*, and secondly through the Civil Organisations or the Media appealing to *STAR* to make an early start.

Chanaka Senanayake says he has already written to the United Nations, the World Bank and the UN Dock on the premise that he would get one million signatures for the petition to recover the cheated money. He started collecting signatures from the Viharmahadevi Park at the beginning. What he says is sooner he gets one million signatures to be sent to STAR the process could enter the fast track and Sri Lanka could get US30 million dollars to Government coffers step by step as STAR finished its investigations.

He states that anyone may escape from Sri Lanka, but *STAR* will be able to find him wherever they are, and refund the 'plundered' money to the benefit of the Sri Lankans. He warns that it might not be a quick action as *STAR* needs to find where the hoarded monies lie, and therefore, it might take months until all the probes are completed but the main consolation is that Chanaka Senanayake has laid the foundation to recover the plundered money! It would be interesting to note whose names are there on *STAR*'s list of swindlers.

STAR's fundamental policy is to get the robbed money by rulers or officials in any Government. Therefore, Chanaka opines: 'Why should we maintain noiseless about it any further? Many associations work on such deceitful draining of money that belongs to people in many nations. At this very moment, he says we need dollars as our children are starving without any milk powder and the entire society is suffering immensely without petrol, and soaring consumer prices. He adds that 'if we can get back at least fifteen billion out of the thirty billion defrauded from Sri Lanka, then we would be in an advanced position to arrange Sri Lankan affairs systematically.

Out of the Asian countries that have sought the assistance of *STAR* were Malaysia and Pakistan. According to world statistics, the highest number of dollars that were swindled was 1.2 million thus Sri Lanka comes up on top of the list of swindled money totalling 30 billion. Senanayake says it is a national crime when people are starving and suffering incalculably. Therefore, Senanayake says to come forward and sign the petition as quickly as possible to get the money back to the Sri Lankan treasury.

One million signatures

Chanaka Senanayake says Sri Lanka has intentions to get further loans from the IMF and the World Bank, but he has not asked them not to grant loans because it might be a wicked inhumane crime. But before granting any loans to Sri Lanka he has requested the IMF and World Bank to include conditions so that no one will be able to swindle loaned monies. The UN has its inbuilt frame of such legalities.

Further, Senanayake says he has already invited the Law Society in Sri Lanka to arrange the legal framework and the Law Society has agreed to his request. He states that protests alone are not adequate, but there should be some effective means so that the swindlers will get worried when they realise that they are going to lose their billions. Therefore, Senanayke urges the public to help him to get one million signatures. One missing link in his appeal was that he did not make the petition online or give an email address or a telephone number to contact his association. It would have helped to fill well over a million signatures as the general public with their suffering is fed up with their teeth!

Chanaka Senanayake further states legal monies could be deposited in banks in the British Virgin Islands, Panama Papers or any other off-shore bank account as far as they are legally earned money according to each country's existing regulations but certainly not theblack or stolen money.

FULL-SCALE US-RUSSIA NUCLEAR WAR COULD KILL 5 BN PEOPL REPORT

US: Five billion people would die in a modern nuclear war with the impact of a global famine -- trig-gered by sunlight-blocking soot in the atmosphere -- likely to far exceed the casualties caused by lethal blasts.

Scientists at Rutgers University mapped out the effects of six pos-sible nuclear conflict scenarios. A full-scale war between the US and Russia, the worst possible case, would wipe out more than half of humanity, they said in the study published in the journal Nature Food.

The estimates were based on calculations of how much soot would enter the atmosphere from firestorms ignited by the detonation of nuclear weapons. Researchers used a climate forecasting

tool supported by the National Center for Atmospheric Research, which allowed them to estimate productivity of major crops on a country-by-country basis.

Researchers also considered whether utilizing crops currently used as animal feed or reducing food waste could offset losses in the immediate aftermath of the conflict, but concluded that savings would be minimal in largerscale battles.

The study comes

after the specter of conflict

between the US and Russia was raised following Vladimir Putin's invasion of Ukraine. Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov warned in April that there was a "serious" risk of nuclear war breaking out.

"The data tell us one thing," said Alan Robock, the study's co-auther and a professor of climate science in the Department of Environmental Sciences at Rutgers University. "We must prevent a nuclear war from ever happening." - NDTV

20 DEAD IN BUS-OIL TANKER COLLISION IN PAKISTAN'S PUNJAB

PAKISTAN: At least 20 people were burnt to death and six others injured after a passenger bus collided with an oil tanker near the Jalalpur Pirwala district of Pakistan's eastern Punjab province, local media reported.

According to the reports, the accident took place at the motorway in the wee hours of

Tuesday when both vehicles caught fire following a collision, resulting in the killing of 18 passengers on the spot.

Afterward, motorway police and rescue teams reached the site and started the rescue operation, local media said.

During the operation, eight people who had been rescued in injured condition were traveling on the bus while it

shifted to a hospital where two succumbed to their wounds during treatment, local media said, adding that 18 dead bodies have been recovered from the wreckage of the bus.

Rescue workers told media that 26 people, including a driver and a conductor, were

UK becomes first nation to approve **Omicron** vaccine

UK: The United Kingdom has become the first country to approve a socalled 'bivalent' COVID vaccine that targets both the original strain of COVID-19 and the newer Omicron variant, British health authorities announced on Monday. The Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) said it had given the green light to the Moderna vaccine as a 'sharpened tool' against the novel coronavirus after it was found to meet its standards of safety, quality and effectiveness. The MHRA said its decision to

grant approval for this booster vaccine in the UK was endorsed by the government's independent expert scientific advisory body, the Commission on Human Medicines, after carefully reviewing the evidence. The regulator said its decision is based on data from a clinical trial, which showed that a booster with the bivalent Moderna vaccine triggers a strong immune response against both Omicron (BA.1) and the original 2020 strain. In an exploratory analysis, the bivalent vaccine was also found to generate a good immune response against the Omicron subvariants BA.4 and BA.5. The authorities said that safety

monitoring showed that the side effects observed were the same as those seen for the original Moderna booster dose and were typically mild and self-resolving, and no serious safety concerns were identified. - NEW INDIAN EXPRESS

Trump claims FBI seized three passports during raid

US: Former US President Donald Trump has accused the FBI of seizing his passports during a search of his Mar-a-Lago estate.

Describing it as an "assault on a political opponent", the former US president claimed agents "stole" three of his passports.

The FBI searched his home last week after officials discovered boxes containing classified information were taken to his estate after his presidency came to an end.

They were retrieved in January by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), which then asked the Justice Department to investigate whether Trump's handling of White House records violated federal law.

In a post on Truth Social - his own social media platform - Trump told his followers: "Wow. In the raid by the FBI of Mar-a-Lago, they stole my three Passports (one expired), along with every-

Construction Industry reeling with nonpayment of Rs. 200 bn

Construction Industry, which employs over 1.5 million people both directly and indirectly, has come under severe stress due to nonpayment of dues amounting to over Rs. 200 billion by the Government to contractors for State projects.

Accordingly, the Government has to

pay dues amounting to Rs. 60 billion to contractors for road construction projects while about another Rs. 150 billion has to be paid for building construction work, Ruwan Edirisinghe, Past President of the Ceylon National Chamber of Industries told Daily News Business.

Majority of contactors are running at huge losses

due to nonpayment to contractors, shortage of fuel and non availability of essential construction material including blasting explosives, with industry players hhaving to face numerous challenges due to the inability in paying debt and leasing installments.

"Construction sector comprises mainly small and medium scale players with less financial capabilities.

If current issues are not meted out immediately, SME players would be the hardest hit segment of the construction sector. If there is no sign of industry recovery, highly educated segments of

the industry including engineers, quantity surveyors, architects and many others would migrate, looking for better career prospects. Subsequently the cost of maintenance of existing projects would be costly. This would pave the way for foreign contractors to grab opportunities and increase their footprint in this sphere in a big way."

> To sustain the industry without a total collapse, Edirisinghe highlighted the need for both the Government and top hierarchy of the relevant State institutions to act fast when it comes to the decision making process.

'We request the relevant authorities to give us a fair hearing rather than penalizing contractors."

In addition, construction material is not on the list of essential items and it is impossible to import raw material due to the dollar crisis along with soaring prices of certain materials in the world market. According to Edirisinghe, the cost of sand, granite, and cement have increased three fold in recent months. He requests the Government to take these matters into consideration without imposing a complete ban on imports whilst allowing contractors to import certain construction items without any hindrance.

This is given that, foreigners are insisted to to pay in dollars, according to a forex system. Industry needs around one shipment per month which is less than US\$40 m, and the ministry can make good money by selling this to the industry.

Regardless of tourists, Sri Lankans themselves are requested not to travel into Sri Lanka due to the dollar- and consequent Fuel- shortage. Though, we provide preferential treatment to fuel for tourists this is not possible in the case of extremely lengthy queues, thus travel to Sri Lanka is impractical and discouraged.

A country cannot move out of a crisis only by saving and borrowing usd as their only 2 strategies. Earning USD is essential and this proposal recommends exactly that.

THE PROPOSAL - Allocate few Petrol Sheds in the Country (Geographically and strategically selected to serve Tourist Routes) exclusively for the sale of Fuel to Tourist vehicles. For individual tourists payment can made via dollar accounts and for groups separate means must be adopted. All purchases made should make in foreign currency and processed as a forex payment. Key aspects -

- Fuel is provided only for CARDS of Foreign currency accounts
- These sales are higly profitable to Sri 2. Lanka if one were to calculate the differ-

ence between CIF Cost of Fuel against Ultimate Retail Price of Fuel in USD. The difference is local value addition -

Taxes, Costs incurred all in Sri Lankan Rupees. All these are now paid in us dollars.

3. Surplus sales bringing in USD and therefore, even if a Tourist buy a ship load of fuel, we have earned millions of dollars. There is no loss of foreign exchange but gain of foreign exchange.

4. If CPC is unable to conduct this program, it can be

handed over to a Private Party as it is self-sustaining model working entirely in USD. The Private Party importing in USD, will have to finance in USD on its own and EARN USD through Sale to Foreigners to Continue business. So there is no way USD can be siphoned off. The entire program must come under the supervision of the central bank of sri lanka and it should only allow import in USD and the surplus could be utilized by the Central Bank for other imports. So the entire forex earning should be in the hands of Sri Lankan Government.

THE SITUATION - IF NOT IMPLEMENTED

The main objective of the Exercise is to kick start tourism which is almost zero due to shortage of Fuel. If it is kick starts it will lead to the additional dollars and the economic activity across the Country and uplift the living standards all connected to Tourism industry. The USD earned will help us to import additional Fuel for the people of Sri Lanka.

The ultimate aim of the exercise is to earn foreign exchange while creating Economic Activity.







In economic sector, Indonesia and Sri Lanka are entering a new stage to discuss the start negotiation on Preferential Trade Agreement which is important as there are ample rooms for both countries to

uplift economic and trade volume. Through the Agreement, Sri Lanka will be more competitive in supplying Indonesian market while the semi-finished products as materials from Indonesia to Sri Lanka will strengthen the industry of Sri Lanka. Milestones of the 70 Years of Diplomatic Relations between Indonesia and Sri Lanka

This year is an important year for Indonesia and Sri Lanka as it signifies the commemoration of 70th Anniversary of diplomatic Relations between the two countries that was established on the 6th of August 1952.

Relations between Indonesia and Sri Lanka have historically been established since the 8th century. The Abhayagiri Vehara inscription mentions that Rakai Panangkaran brought teachers from India or Sri Lanka when he converted to Buddhism. The construction of the Borobudur Temple in Central Java, Indonesia, is also inseparable from the approval of Rakai Panangkaran to the Buddhists. Rakai Panangkaran was the Second King of the Medang Kingdom, who lived in the Central Java period or the so-called Ancient Mataram Kingdom, which ruled around the 770s.

Kings from Sulawesi, Ternate, Tidore, to Kupang, including Bugis, Sundanese, Madurese, Minangkabau, Ambonese, Balinese were exiled to Sri Lanka. Many of these communities reside in Colombo, Galle, Trincomalee, and Jaffna. Some places in Sri Lanka also refer to identical Indonesian names such as Jawatte, and Ja-Ela, to street names such as Melayu Street, Jawa Lane, and Jalan Padang. Many of them known as Malay Society which most were descended from Indonesia.

Relations between the two friendly countries, which had long historical and cultural ties, getting stronger by formally establishing the Diplomatic Relations between the two countries on the 6th of August 1952.

Since then, Indonesia and Sri Lanka have strengthened bilateral ties in various fields of mutual interests. The two countries also became the pioneers of the Asia-Africa Conference, which took place on 18-24 April 1955 in Bandung. The said conference continued the Colombo Conference held in Sri Lanka from April 28 to May 2, 1954. The



Asia-Africa Conference, which was an outcome of the "Bandung Principles," then gave birth to the Non-Aligned Movement on September 1, 1961, through the First Summit in Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

Indonesia and Sri Lanka support each other in various regional and international fora, including sharing knowledge and experiences through various activities, such as the Colombo Plan, Bali Democracy Forum, Bali Process, Indian Ocean Rim Association (IORA), ASEAN Regional Forum, Archipelagic, and Island States (AIS) Forum. This collaboration continuously nurtures in strengthening bilateral relations through multilateral fora.

Moreover, the two countries also establish Parliamentary Friendship Group that become one of the important pillars in bilateral relations. "Sri Lanka – Indonesia Parliamentary Friendship Association (SIPFA)" was established in Sri Lanka on March 24, 2021, while in Indonesia, "The Indonesia – Sri Lanka Parliamentary Friendship Group," was established in February 2020. The participation of Speaker of Sri Lanka and the delegation to the 144th Inter Parliamentary Union (IPU) Assembly in Bali in March 2022 and the one-on-one meeting between the Speaker of Sri Lanka and the Speaker of Indonesia on the side lines of the meeting has strengthened the relations.

Since the opening of diplomatic relations, more than 11 MOUs on bilateral Cooperation that has been signed, among others are MOU on Combating International Terrorism, MOU on Diplomatic Education and Training, and MOU on Cooperation Against Illicit Trafficking in Narcotic Drugs, Psychotropic Substances and Their Chemical Precursors. The two countries also continue to broader cooperation including in economic, trade, investment as well as the people-to people relations.

The two countries are currently preparing for the establishment of the Joint Working Group on Trade and Investment (WGTI) and in the preparation of commencing the negotiation of Preferential Tariff Agreement (PTA) between Indonesia and Sri Lanka. The future implementation of the two mechanisms will further boost of the economic relations between the two nations. Indonesia attaches great importance to the development of Indonesia – Sri Lanka relations, and Indonesia stand ready to support Sri Lanka during the challenging time of economic crisis. Considering of the urgency of the essential needs in Sri Lanka due to the economic crisis, on 28 April and 8 May 2022, the Government of the Republic of Indonesia, supported by the pharmaceutical companies in Indonesia, had provided humanitarian aid to Sri Lanka on essential medicines and medical equipment with the value of LKR 517.5 million (around the US \$1.6 million) in a total volume of the aid is 3.1 tons.

As the first country to give the humanitarian assistance to Sri Lanka, the quick responses from stakeholders in Indonesia show the thoughtfulness of Indonesia towards Sri Lanka and in understanding of the urgency of the said essential medicines and medical equipment for the people of Sri Lanka.

People-to-people is another important aspect to strengthen especially youth. Indonesia offers Dharmasiswa Scholarship annually to all international students to study Indonesian language (Bahasa Indonesia), art, and culture for one year program. More than 185 countries have participated in the program, organized by the Ministry of Education and Culture. There were 8 Sri Lankans graduated from the program.More youth of Sri Lanka are encouraged to participate in the program. The relations between people-to-people stronger from time to time. Through the Establishment of Sri Lanka Indonesia Friendship Association (SLIFA) that was inaugurated in June 1992, to its 30th anniversary this year, SLIFA has played a big role in bridging and promoting closer cultural, social and trade relations between Indonesia and Sri Lanka.

The Malay community in Sri Lanka of more than 44.000 population with the majority are Indonesian descended, through the Sri Lanka Malay Association (SLMA) they also play role on the community by supporting the preservation of cultural values, assist the less privileged of society in their welfare and education, preserve the Sri Lankan Malay heritage, and foster religious values.

In the hybrid Webinar on 10 August 2022 organized by the Embassy of the Republic of Indonesiain collaboration with the Foreign Ministry of Sri Lanka and the Lakshman Kadirgamar Institute of International Relations and Strategic Studies (LKI), during delivering their messages, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia and the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Sri Lanka emphasized the importance of promoting cooperation in various fields for the interests of the two countries and other developing countries, including agriculture, maritime affairs, defence and intelligence, narcotic eradication and others. Both countries would continue to forge closer bonds of friendship in good times and difficult times. Indonesia reaffirms its commitment to being a reliable friend of Sri Lanka during this challenging time.

History proven, Indonesia and Sri Lanka stood side-by-side championing the voice of developing countries. Therefore, Indonesia and Sri Lanka will continuously emulate this spirit in addressing the various crisis we face today.

Indonesian Economy: Current and Outlook

In the effort to boost Indonesia's economic growth, the Government sets three economic strategies: the green economy, the digitalization of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), and the development of downstream industries. It is also stated that 2022 will be the year of downstream industries in Indonesia by focusing on processing commodities into ready-to-use products, starting from nickel.

Indonesia possesses 21 million tons of nickel, the largest reserve in the world. Downstream raw nickel into products such as electric car batteries will add value to the commodity and stimulate economic growth. Indeed, partnerships within the industry have already commenced— for example, the partnership between Indonesia's State-Owned Enterprise and LG with the value of USD9.8 billion.

The progress of mining and mineral-based downstream industries can be seen through the development programs of the smelter industry. Currently, the annual capacities of the smelters that are already in operation reach 12.3 million tons for nickel, 6 million tons for aluminum, 3.2 million tons for copper, and 19 million tons for steel. From 2015 to the third quarter of 2021, there were 69 companies in the metal smelter industry, with a total investment value of USD51.43 billion. Of all the downstream industries' potential, The Ministry of Investment/BKPM is also committed to facilitate investors to get into the industries.

Fitch Ratings (Fitch) has affirmed Indonesia's Sovereign Credit Rating at BBB (investment grade) with a stable outlook, as announced on June 28, 2022. Key factors that support the affirmation are a favorable medium-term growth outlook and a low government debt/GDP ratio. The Fitch's affirmation shows strong confidence from international stakeholders on the Indonesia's maintained macroeconomic stability and medium-term economic prospects, amidst elevated global economic uncertainty. It is supported by the credibility of the policies and the effective policy mix orchestrated by the Government and the Bank Central of Indonesia.

In their reports, Fitch expects that Indonesia's economy continued to recover smoothly. GDP growth will gradually recover to 5.6% in 2022 and 5.8% in 2023. The recovery is supported by a pick-up in service sector and the strong exports supported by elevated commodity prices. Fitch projects that current account balance will record a small deficit of 0.4% of GDP in 2022 and 1.0% of GDP in 2023. With regards to inflation, Fitch views that the pressure on domestic inflation has been increasing, and yet inflation is still projected within target of 3+1%.

Strive and Rise: Economy

Over medium-term, the domestic economy will grow by 5.8% in 2024, boosted by the implementation of the Omnibus Law on Job Creation. The Law that was enacted in November 2020 aims to alleviate long-standing barriers to business and investment. The Law is considered a breakthrough in the country's legal system as it revised 76 current laws simultaneously. By simplifying regulations and improving the investment climate, the law is expected to encourage more incoming investment, especially in labour intensive industries, and eventually create more jobs.

According to the government's Strategic Investment 2020 – 2024, Indonesia has placed several business sectors as its focus:

Even though Covid-19 pandemic led to the global economic slowdown, Indonesia has attracted seven foreign companies to relocate their investment in 2020. As one of the top 5 host economies for the FDI Inflows, Indonesia's wave of structural reforms shown a subsequent strong performance in terms of stable growth, enhanced investor confidence and increased FDI inflows.

As a member of the G-20 major economies, Indonesia is now the 15th largest economy in the world and by 2030 is predicted to become the 5th largest economy. In 2020, Indonesia is the 2nd most prospective investment destination. Not only inflow FDI, the Domestic Direct Investment of Indonesia continue to grow and proved to be resilient.

The government of Indonesia plans to improve conectivity across the archipelago and promote balanced growth between the western and eastern parts of Indonesia. The government has introduced a "sea toll road" concept to connect Indonesia's archipelago through seaports in the main corridor between western and eastern islands to reduce high logistics costs.

Clean and Green

Indonesia throws support behind crude palm oil role in biofuel energy. Providing sustainable clean and renewable energy is critical for Indonesia because of declining fossilbased fuel stocks. It also contributes to protecting the environment, which is essential for the health of its population.

Indonesia is the home of palm oil, and its waste is great for bioenergy. Kalimantan and Sumatera islands are the centres of the palm oil industry, with around 90% of the country's palm oil plantations. The industry is growing rapidly, as seen by the increasing pace of public plantations at 24% per year from 1990 to 2015. The positive industry profile can also be seen through the contribution of CPO - in 2016, Indonesia provided 53.4% of total global CPO.

The investment prospects of the biofuel industry in Indonesia are extensive. The government has issued pro-investment regulations for the biofuel industry.

Through Presidential Decree No. 44 Year 2016, investment in biofuel production can have 100% foreign ownership. Mandatory B30 policy, requiring a 30% mixture of palm oil-based biofuel in diesel fuel, has also been introduced.


The Ministry of Finance also gives special tax facilities and customs for investors in the renewable energy sector. It launched Ministry of Finance Regulation No. 21/ PMK.011/2010 on Taxation Facility Allotment and Customs for renewable energy activities in 2010. The regulation contains an income tax payment (PPh) facility that will reduce net income of 30% from the capital investment amount. The ministry will only charge 5% per year for the investors for six years.







Getting to know more about 5 super-priority destinations in Indonesia



Lake Toba is located in the mountains of Bukit Barisan, North Sumatra. The area is 1,145 square kilometers, which makes it the largest lake in Southeast Asia. Lake Toba is also the largest lake in the world formed by volcanic eruptions and is included in the Guinness World Records list.

Lake Toba was formed due to volcanic eruptions that spewed 2,800 km cubic of eruption material, thus making the crater that gradually filled with water into a lake and the middle of Lake Toba there is an island called Samosir. This island has several villages with extraordinary natural attractions, such as mountains and waterfalls. Samosir Island and Lake Toba are the heart and home of the Batak Tribe. Other tourist activities on Lake Toba that you can do include going around the village of Tuktuk Siadong-Adong, visiting historical sites (Tomb of Raja Sidabutar), seeing local people planting rice, and seeing people's homes with Batak Gorga.

2. Borobudur Temple and Prambanan Temple



Borobudur is the largest Buddhist temple in the world, located in the area of Magelang, Central Java. This temple is located at the height of Menoreh Hill and is surrounded by Mount Merapi, Mount Merbabu, Mount Sindoro, and Mount Sumbing.

Boro means "the monastery complex" and Budur means "above". Sir Thomas Raffles was the first person to "introduce" Borobudur to the world, in 1814. Because of its grandeur, the temple which was built in the 8th century has been designated by UNESCO as one of the world's cultural heritages.


Borobudur Temple was built during the reign of the Syailendra Dynasty. The stupa-shaped temple was founded by Mahayana Buddhists. It is estimated that the Borobudur temple was built between 760 and 830 AD. The building process is estimated to have taken between 75 to 100 years. The new Borobudur Temple was 100% completed during the reign of King Samaratungga in 825 AD. Borobudur Temple restoration efforts were carried out twice. The first restoration was by the Dutch East Indies

government, under the leadership of Th. van Erp between 1907-1911. The target of restoration at that time was the Arupadhatu, which is the top of the temple consisting of three round terraces and the central stupa. The second restoration was carried out in 1975-1983 by the Indonesian government in collaboration with the United Nations organization for education, science, and culture, UNESCO.

Prambanan is the Most Beautiful and Graceful Hindu Temple in Indonesia Located not far from the Buddhist Borobudur temple, the proximity of the two temples tells us that on Java, Buddhism and Hinduism lived peacefully next to one another. Prambanan is a magnificent spectacle and an icon of Indonesia's cultural heritage. The temples at Prambanan were built in the 9th century and is known locally as Roro Jonggrang, coming from the legend of the 'slender virgin'.

The biggest temple is dedicated to Shiva the destroyer, and the two smaller ones which sit on its right and left are dedicated to Brahma, the creator, and Wisnhu, the sustainer. The tallest temple of Prambanan is a staggering 47 meters high. Its peak visible from far away and rises high above the ruins of the other temples. After hundreds of years of neglect, the Prambanan temple was rediscovered by CA Lons, a Dutchman, in 1733. Since then, this temple has been revitalized and today is widely regarded as the most beautiful and graceful Hindu temple in Indonesia. The grandeur, complexity, and integrated architectural concept of Prambanan makes this a truly amazing structure. As a unique cultural and architectural marvel, Prambanan was declared a World Heritage site in 1991 by UNESCO.

As Bali is located 8 degrees south of the equator, you will find the climate to be the typical tropical, warm and humid all year round with two main distinctive seasons: Dry Season and Rainy Season. Some of the areas around Bali's central mountains (volcanoes) have several peaks over 3,000 meters above sea levels. Up here the temperatures are considerably cooler, and there is much more rainfall than in the coastal areas. Indonesia is also rich of traditional musical instruments, with its diverse coming in hundreds of different forms and styles, uniquely differs from one region to another, that has been heritage for centuries. Below are some of those instruments.

Sasando



Sasando is a typical musical instrument from Rote Island which at first glance looks like a guitar. This musical instrument is said to have been used by the people in Rote, East Nusa Tenggara Indonesia since the 7th century. Sasando has a main part in the form of a long tube made of bamboo. In the middle of this stringed instrument, it is circular from top to bottom. The strings on Sasando are stretched in the tube from top to bottom which has been given wedges.

Based on the tone structure, Sasando can be divided into two types. First, the Sasando gong with a pentatonic tone system has twelve strings. This type of sasando can usually only be used to play traditional songs of the people on Rote Island Indonesia.



ART AND CULTURE

Gamelan



The indigenous orchestra type of the islands of Java and Bali, in Indonesia, consisting largely of several varieties of gongs and a traditional percussion orchestra with xylophones, gongs, gong-chimes, drums, cymbals, string instruments and bamboo flutes. As integral part of Indonesian identity dating back centuries, gamelan has been passed down many generations through informal and formal education, including in school and after-school activities.

On December 15, 2021 UNESCO recognized gamelan as the intangible cultural heritage from Indonesia.

Angklung

Angklung is a musical instrument from West Java in Indonesia made of a varying number of bamboo tubes attached to a bamboo frame. The tubes are carefully whittled and cut by a master craftsperson to have a resonant pitch when the bamboo frame is shaken or tapped and are tuned to octaves, similar to Western handbells.

On November 18, 2010, UNESCO officially recognized the Indonesian angklung as a Masterpiece of the Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity.






