World Bank allocates US\$ 110 mn for purchases

A senior official of the Agriculture Ministry said that international competitive bidding for the import of fertilizers to Sri Lanka has been initiated under strict regulations imposed by the World Bank to ensure a fraud and corruption-free bidding process.

According to those terms, contractors and subcontractors must allow World Bank representatives and audit teams to inspect and audit records, accounts and other documents related to the procurement process.

Sri Lanka has now invited tenders for the import of 150,000 metric tonnes of urea for the upcoming Maha Season. This will be done utilising US\$ 110 million provided by the World Bank under the emergency financial relief program. Accordingly, under

The CAA said legal action will be initiated against those who sell eggs

exceeding the MRP.
The All Ceylon Egg Manufacturers Association (ACEMA) yesterday said considering the current high prices of main poultry foods including maize and soya, both egg varieties cannot be sold at the gazetted prices.

The Association lamented the sudden decision taken by the Consumer Affairs Authority (CAA) that countrywide poultry farmers should sell white eggs at Rs. 43 and brown eggs at Rs.45 from August 22 (today). ACEMA Chairman Sarath Ratnayaka told the Daily News that in addition to maize and soya which are the major poultry foods, vitamins and other related medicines, used by poultry farmers had also been increased in the open market.

He said under a such situation it is not ethical for CAA officials to demand that poultry farmers should reduce egg prices to bring relief to consumers.

He said although Agriculture Minister Mahinda Amaraweera also recognized the problems faced by poultry farmers due to the massive shortage of poultry foods such as maize and sova as well as vitamins, it is not ethical the Government to take a such decision at this juncture without considering the plight of poultry farmers.

"It takes at least five months to breed



a hen to lay eggs and farmers will have to spend a massive cost to maintain a poultry farm and other labour charges including the transport of birds from one place to another.

According to reports there are over 5,000 large scale poultry farms in the country owned by companies and also individuals. Not only eggs, but chicken meat cannot be sold at the Government stipulated price of Rs.1,300 per kilo when the production cost of chicken has increased to over Rs.900 a kilo due to the unbearable prices of poultry feeds and labour charges.

Ratnayaka therefore made a fervent appeal from the Consumer Affairs Authority (CAA) to re consider the grievances of poultry farmers and make a considerable price increase of eggs and also the price of chicken meat.

People's representatives of the respective districts have expressed their appreciation to Prime Minister Dinesh Gunawardena for getting Cabinet approval for upgrading seven



Urban Councils to Municipal Councils recently. The Cabinet Paper presented by Prime Minister Dinesh Gunawardena to convert seven Urban Councils into Municipal Councils and three Local Councils into Municipal Councils was approved by the Cabinet recently.

The Cabinet decided to convert the Urban Councils of Kalutara, Vavuniya, Puttalam, Trincomalee, Mannar, Ampara, Kegalle into Municipalities and Kilinochchi, Mullaitivu and Moneragala as Local Councils.

There are currently 24 Municipalities, 41 Municipal Councils and 276 Local Councils in Sri Lanka and the total number of Local Government institutions is 341.

A ranking of 10 major cities in 25 administrative districts of Sri Lanka will be done this year and this will be relevant to the development of those provinces as well as to raise the standard of living of the people.

Under the more powerful Municipal Council Ordinance, the Local Government naturally possesses many unique legal legacies. Among them are the laws and regulations for the administration of many areas such as health, education, transport, social welfare, etc., as well as receiving special tax revenues.

Parliamentarian Wimalaweera Dissanayake said that the Prime Minister deserves commendation for upgrading Ampara Urban Council into Municipal Council status. He said that it was not possible to turn Ampara, which was the centre of the historic Galoya Development Scheme, into a Municipal Council for decades.

"Prime Minister Gunawardena should be appreciated for his mission as the minister in charge of the Public Administration Ministry for accomplishing this historic task", Parliamentarian Dissanayake said.

Ampara District Parliamentarian D. Weerasinghe also hailed the Prime Minister's move to turn the Ampara UC into Municipal Council status.

"Ampara was the main city since the Gal Oya Development Project was launched by the country's first Minister of Agriculture and Lands D. S. Senanayake," Weerasinghe said.

Wanni Parliamentarian Selvam Adaikalanathan, Vavuniya District Coordinating Committee Chairman and Wanni District Parliamentarian Kulasingham Dileepan also expressed their appreciation on behalf of the people in the Vavuniya District for upgrading the Vavunia UC to Municipal Council status.

Soft liquor licenses for 2,500 registered tourist establishments

Soft liquor licenses are to be provided to 2,500 tourist establishments registered with the Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority (SLTDA).

Excise Commissioner General M.G. Gunasiri said the annual license fee is Rs.25,000 and tourist hotels and restaurants with this license will be permitted to sell soft liquor (beer and wine).

The Commissioner General said soft liquor licenses would be provided to tourist hotels and restaurants in Tourist Zones such as Arugambay, Nilaveli, Hikkaduwa. Ella, Kalpitiya, Nuwara Eliya and the Southern Coastal Belt, based on a policy decision of the Government.

However, there are reports that some are attempting to obtain the license with forged documents misusing the Government policy. Those involved in the tourism sector request the Government to streamline the process of issuing soft liquor licenses.

"We can reduce the import of animal feed by promoting the maize industry. There is a need for seeds as well as pesticides for maize cultivation. All those aspects are completed through the programme we are currently implementing.

A large number of people are waiting to plant maize in the coming season. We are allocating Rs. 400 million from the

seeds through government agencies. In addition, it is planned to increase the amount allocated to import maize seeds from the private sector.'

Currently, the price of one kilogram of paddy in the market has come down to Rs. 80 to Rs.

Therefore, steps were taken to buy rice from the farmers at a minimum price and accordingly, the PMB arranged to buy Nadu at Rs. 120, Samba at Rs. 125 and Keeri Samba at Rs. 130 per

This was approved by the Cabinet and according to a request made by Agriculture Minister Mahinda Amaraweera, the government agreed to provide Rs. 2 billion for the first phase of paddy purchase.

Accordingly, in the last three days, the PMB bought 844,960 kilograms of paddy or 844 metric tons of paddy, said PMB Chairman Neil Alwis said.

The amount of paddy purchased on Saturday (20) is 303 metric tons.

Agriculture Amaraweera instructed the Paddy Marketing Board to continue purchasing paddy at the government's minimum price.

Accordingly, last week, a review meeting was held in the Department of Agrarian Development regarding the progress made last month, where the Department of Agricultural Development mentioned that the uncultivated paddy lands in eight districts of the island have now been reduced to zero level.

Thus the uncultivated paddy lands have been reduced to zero level in the districts of Anuradhapura, Polonnaruwa, Monaragala, Ampara, Hambantota, Batticaloa, Kilinochchi and Trincomalee.

There were 21, 200 acres of uncultivated paddy lands in these eight districts and necessary steps have been taken to cultivate them in the next Maha Season

also advised the department officials to look into the possibility of cultivating uncultivated paddy lands that cannot be cultivated in the Western Province using the Indonesian Sorjan cultivation method. The Minister pointed out that under the Sojan system, vegetable and fruit cultivation can be done in swampy lands and freshwater fish cultivation in deep canals around the beds.

The Minister instructed to strengthen the programme initiated by President Ranil Wickremesinghe for guarantee food security in the country and to take steps to replant all uncultivated paddy lands and take steps to eliminate all fallow fields in Sri Lanka by the end of next year.

Her husband died two years ago. It was a difficult time for her, who is used to living in a family setting. She is in regular contact with her siblings in Sri Lanka. And if a bouquet of flowers is handed over again today, then you can be sure that this sentence will be spoken "She really doesn't look 85".

We are not hitchhikers

ast week the All-Island Three-Wheeler Drivers' Association announced that they have decided to charge Rs.120 for the first kilometre and Rs. ■100 for each kilometre thereafter.

Today we are talking about this issue because no matter whether you are a BMW owner or the less fortunate, we all travel by three-wheelers often at least once or twice a week. Some travel in three-wheelers on a daily basis. Therefore, we all face the same problem but the poor ordinary people who do not have their own vehicles and use public transport face the most difficult times in their life now due to the skyrocketing three-wheeler fares.

It is all right to pay Rs. 120 for the first kilometre and Rs. 100 for every kilometre thereafter. But the problem is, it is not happening in reality and only a handful of three-wheeler drivers stick to these charges. All the other three- wheeler drivers all over the country charge as they wish and it depends on the appearance of the passenger which gives them all background details of him/her. Only a question or two gives them a very clear picture about the passenger. They charge a reasonable amount only from their regular and familiar customers and all the other passengers who travel with them have to pay sky high prices just to travel a few kilometres. They charge extremely high prices from women because most of the female passengers do not have any idea about current charges for various distances. The other group who become the victims of three-wheeler drivers are old and infirm. The three-wheeler drivers know very clearly that they cannot use public transport due to their old age and sicknesses and because of that they charge sky high prices from them to take them for two or three kilometres. If the passenger looks rich, then the three-wheeler driver tells him/her double or triple of the price they usually charge to transport a passenger to that specific location.

At least it is tolerable if all three wheeler drivers or at least the majority of three-wheeler drivers provide a good service for the sky high prices they charge. They never do it. Sometimes, they just drop aged and sick passengers before the exact location they want to travel telling that the fuel tank is empty and sometimes they rob such feeble passengers or women by taking the three-wheeler to a lonely road. There are hundreds of such incidents reported from all over the country during the past one or two months. There are three-wheeler drivers in the Western Province who charge Rs. 1,000 to transport a passenger to a place located four kilometres away from his/her house.

The other burning issue is their careless behaviour during pandemics. The entire country experienced it during last year and the previous year when COVID-19 hit the country. The health authorities made appeal after appeal from them to place a piece of polythene to prevent the possible transmission of the COVID-19 virus between the driver and the passenger. But only a handful of three-wheeler drivers did it sincerely. Others did it just to avoid trouble from law enforcement officers and health authorities and some did not care at all.

The piece of polythene they placed separating the driver and the passenger told the whole story. A handful of three-wheeler drivers placed a big, high quality, long lasting, washable and removable polythene making it fully separating the two sides of the three-wheeler. Maybe less than ten three-wheeler drivers in the Western Province still use it. All the others just hung a small thin piece of polythene which vanished within a week or two.

The only way out for the poor three-wheeler passengers is introducing a new law, rules and regulations making it compulsory to issue a ticket for the ride. All the details of the three-wheeler, the driver and the ride should be included in it. That can be done very easily without a big extra cost by fixing such a system to the already installed taxi metres. If any three-wheeler does not issue a ticket, the passenger should be able to inform it to a hotline which immediately trace the specific three-wheeler and warn for the first and the second time. The third time, the registration of the three-wheeler should be cancelled forever.

There are issues and there are solutions. The relevant authorities and the three-wheeler drivers should accept one solution from many. Fortunately, the very first step has been taken by the Government. The Transport Ministry will bring the management and monitoring of three-wheelers under the National Transport Commission (NTC) and the preliminary work in this regard will be finalized before the end of this month (August).

Nothing can be done here in Sri Lanka without toughest laws and toughest punishments. No one follows rules and regulations without the toughest punishments. Therefore, all relevant authorities need to look into this issue with this in their mind. Otherwise threewheel drivers will start to charge Rs. 1,000 for the first kilometre soon.



They demand it to sell in the black market and stay at home comfortably. By now all main media and social media platforms showed how they do it



all main media and social media platforms showed how they do it through videos and I am sure of this because of my own experiences and not because of various stories told by others.

When travelling by threewheeler recently, the driver told me that selling fuel in the black market is much more profitable than transporting passengers because there is no wastage, no risk of accidents, hijacking etc, not time consuming, no limitation in prices, no tiredness, or no cost at all. I can just buy fuel for my quota and sell one litre of petrol for Rs. 2,500 or more. The only thing I need to do is wait in the queue, obtain fuel, empty my fuel tank, go and wait in the same queue again and again. Waiting in the queue is fun because there are gangs and we have food and beverages. We play games while waiting in the queue. There are ladies who come and chat with us. It is more fun than transporting passengers or staying at home, he said. The Government should strictly stick to the current QR system to protect the ordinary

The only way forward

Last week, the President had stated that loss making institutions need to be restructured. In addition to the politicians, it is the trade unions that have dragged Sri Lanka to the current pathetic situation. Singapore, Malaysia, Korea etc. became developed nations a long time ago because they do not have trade unions similar to the trade unions here in Sri Lanka. If there are any, the respective Governments and leaders in those countries do not dance according to the tune of those trade unions.

The only way forward is totally ignoring the so-called local trade unions and trade



SAITM BAD: FOREIGN UNIVERSITIES IN SL GOOD

The recent comments by Cabinet Spokesman Mass Media Minister Dr. Bandula Gunawardena on allowing internationally recognised foreign universities in Sri Lanka is a case in point. According to the minister's statistics, every year around 30,000 students in Sri Lanka leave the island for higher education in overseas universities. Some of these universities are in developing countries such as Nepal and Pakistan, observed the Minister.

To pay for their tuition, more than USD two million leaves the country, noted Minister Gunawardena. Thus, by allowing internationally recognized private universities to be established in Sri Lanka we would be saving forex at this critical junction where the US Dollar shortage has culminated to an economic and political crisis. Besides the savings, this would also give us an opportunity to earn much needed foreign currency as well, stated the Minister.

Yet, Dr. Neville Fernando's valiant efforts to establish an internationally recognized private university for medicine was shot down by Sri Lankan politicians, Government Medical Officers' Association and various student bodies in State universities. This stance was supported by a large section of the media. Collectively, they all opposed the South Asian Institute of Technology and Medicine (SAITM) not because there was something specifically or significantly amiss at this particular institution. It was simply based on the absurd notion that private medical colleges cannot be allowed. It was not allowed in the past and so it will not be

allowed now or in the future, was the slogan. While a variety of excuses were forwarded to justify the opposition to this college, the basic gist was that the education of a noble profession as medicine cannot be trusted in the hands of entrepreneurs - even one who hailed from a medical background. The opposers were of the view that entrepreneurs are those who would do anything for profit. As such, they would engage in practices that would allow those without proper qualifications to enter the medical stream to follow a substandard curriculum. It was charged that degrees would be metered out for a few. Another argument was that private medical colleges would poach the best lecturers in the field.

It is truly tragic that due attention was not given to the exact quality of this college. As such, the merits of the college itself or the advantages of such an entity were completely ignored. A genuine attempt to identify its demerits and help to mitigate it was absent. The whole opposition was thus based on mere speculation and the wholehearted effort was somehow or other to have it shut down.

None of the detractors cared that this college invested in facilities as the state of the art mortuary that preserved bodies to retain its flexibility and suppleness in limb and tissue. At the time, this was the only facility of such sophistication for the entire South Asian region. To observe the natural movement of a human body that is not set rigid with rigor mortis is a valuable experience for the medical student. For this technology alone, Sri Lanka would have attracted medical students from all over the world.

Every effort by Dr. Fernando to overcome the criticism, including the offer to upgrade a Government hospital to the standard needed for medical students to gain experience, as dictated by their curriculum, was crushed by fellow doctors. The GMOA threatened trade union action if any Government facility was allowed for these students to engage in their studies.

Had SAITM was allowed to upgrade this hospital, its patients would have greatly appreciated it. These patients are primarily from economically challenged backgrounds. Yet, none of these points mattered to those who opposed the private medical school.

One's most idealistic stage of life is in their student days. Still to be embittered by life's disappointments, a student ideally fights for other's rights than one's own. The prevailing system that unfairly penalizes many of those who are qualified to enter the tertiary education stream simply for want of resources should bother the conscience of these State university undergrads. Instead, in an act of gluttony to be the only graduates of a Sri Lankan university, they refused to consider alternative paths that those who were denied the opportunity to pursue a degree course. Instead, calling themselves as the "cream of the crop", they disagreed that their peers should somehow be given the same opportunities.

Today, sharing the contents of the Cabinet thinking at the Cabinet press conference held at the Government Information Department, Minister Gunawardena observed the "urgent" need to allow foreign universities in Sri Lanka. The effort is to reduce the flow of the much needed forex out of the country as well as earn some at the same time.

However, foreign universities mean that the course and related exam fees would still have to be made in either a foreign currency or the equivalent of that to an entity outside Sri Lanka. The curriculum itself would not take local factors into consideration. Thus we would be paying to study a course influenced by the concerns that need not reflect our own ground

The fact that we are seriously considering foreign entities to establish what we mistrust our own to do properly is a matter that ought to concern us greatly. None of these foreign universities would consider a branch in Sri Lanka unless it is a profit venture. They will not invest in Sri Lanka for any other reason.

Therefore, the same arguments that stood against SAITM ought to apply in this instance as well. If an entity would do anything for profit as it is a profit-oriented enterprise, then there cannot be any distinction whether this entity is owned by a local or foreign party.

Most unfortunately, SAITM was not an isolated case. Over the decades, we have lost many such opportunities that would have created new industries that can propel our economy forward by saving foreign currency whilst bringing in the much needed

Collectively, we have two issues before us. 1.) We treat our local entrepreneurs as scoundrels. Conversely, we have an inherent trust in anything that is foreign or imported. Even a mere opinion from a "foreign" expert carries more weight than from a Sri Lankan

2.) As we lack trust in our own integrity, we are slavishly dependent on imports

WHERE HAVE ALL OUR

Undergraduates from State universities took to the streets on a daily basis to voice their opposition. Since 1948, Sri Lankan governance has been shifting between the capitalists and socialists. The Sirimavo Bandaranaike's Government, which was an alliance of leftists, was more focused in its anti-elite, anti-west agenda and much less so on national security. The 1971 JVP insurrection itself would not have taken place had her Government taken due note on the intelligence reports of a brewing movement

against the State. Socialism and nationalism are two very different principles. Yet, we often confuse the definition of these two terms and interpret socialism as nationalism. The Sirimavo's Government, composed of leftist allies, in the name of nationalism took socialism to the extreme.

Successive Governments have not taken socialism to such drastic levels that almost

starved the country. At the same time, neither had any Government redressed the damage caused by Sirimavo's half witted policies. Consequently, our economy continues to disintegrate.

Sirimavo's failure to assure the proprietors of a safe environment after the 1971 JVP insurrection resulted in the educated and those with means to migrate. Her specific actions as taking over private enterprises into State ownership severely undermined the economy, disabled entrepreneurship and undermined worker ethics and discipline. Businessman was equated to a profiteer who exploits workers and a racketeer without ethics.

> Trade unions have thus adapted a hero complex as saviours of workers' rights. In reality, the industry itself is of little interest to trade unions.

Highly politicized, trade unions are mostly engaged in agitating for worker rights and privileges with the underlying intention of discrediting the government in power.

Consequently, youth are uninterested in entrepreneurship and are singularly focused in seeking employment, preferably as a public servant. More than the open economy, it is this reluctance to invest in the economy that would create economic growth and new job opportunities that adversely affects our domestic production. As employees, the focal point is on pay and perks

and not efficiency or productivity. We are thus becoming increasingly dependent on consuming imports. As a nation, we work for money instead of investing so that money works for us. Our main revenue fields are the apparel sector, expatriate remittances from blue collar jobs and low budget tourism targeting mostly surfers, backpackers and package tours.

LESSONS TO LEARN

Our failure to brand our teas in innovative ways as pairing with food, highlighting the diversity based on region or cooking with tea but allowing it to be mixed with low quality import varieties have dented its market potential.

In this regard, we show a remarkable lack of creativity. It is our ignorance of brand value that has allowed the good name of "Ceylon Tea" to be sullied by the mixing of lesser imported varieties. Instead of building a solid product, we are more interested in earning a quick profit and

short term gains. The calibre of entrepre-



founder of Dilmah tea brand is in serious short supply in Sri Lanka. His qualities such as consistency, persistence and firm belief in his product are not inculcated in many of us.

It is most unfortunate that we do not celebrate personalities as Fernando. In effect, they are our modern heroes. They have changed the system and broadened the perspective. Instead of emulating these personalities, by and large we rather follow the systems and markets created by the British.

Our apparel sector was introduced as an industry by President Ranasinghe Premadasa in the '80s. Yet, to date it remains stagnant without branching horizontally or vertically. As such, half the revenue earned is spent on importing accessories and we continue to stitch for the lower or middle income earners as we did when this industry was initiated.

We still need support from the Governments of our markets, which are mostly in the West. Without facilities such as the GSP, we cannot compete effectively in those markets - especially as our labour costs are high. This has made us very vulnerable. The GSP hangs over us like the Sword of Damocles.

Every time the European Union feels displeased with us, or the need to compel us to take an unpopular decision, we are threatened with the GSP. Most of the demands made with the GSP dangled before us have nothing to do with the apparel sector. It does not reinforce quality of product so that their taxpayers' benefits or worker rights and thereby ensure an ethically produced product. Instead, the demands are mostly that affect our own national security or other internal interests.

Whilst our garment sector thus languishes, our neighbouring countries such as India, Bangladesh and Pakistan continue to nurture their cottage industries as designing Sari. These countries have their own signature embroidery stitches and styles. Countries such as Philippines uses traditional methods to weave soft cloth out of fibre from pineapple leaves. These are now the top designers' popular choice over synthetic or animal furs. Most of our neighbours too enjoy the benefits of the GSP, but are not as dependent on this industrialized garment sector for its contribution to the GDP as we

TRAPPED INSIDE THE BOX

The most important factor for any country is its economy. A strong economy overrides all other challenges. Countries such as Singapore are a fraction of Sri Lanka's territory. Yet, because of its strong economy, it is a much more formidable country than Sri

It is not a country without attempts of foreign interference. It is a country not without criticism. Singapore's autocratic democracy and tightly controlled press are favourite topics of her critics. Yet, Singapore has never allowed herself to be distracted by such criticism. Instead, the focus has always been on strengthening her economy.

Though Lee Kuan Yew is rightly credited for leading Singapore from slums to the world class economy she enjoys today, it was not a singular effort. If we do not understand this basic principle and nurture leadership amongst us, we will not be getting out of our current rut.

Today, looking at the present political mess before us, we are wondering who could be our next leader. We are worried as we cannot see such a person. We hope in time such a person will emerge - hopefully in time for next Presidential Elections.

Instead, our focus should be to nurture the leader in ourselves. We must adapt the qualities we would like to see in our future leader in ourselves.

Hence, before a system change, what we really need is an attitude change. We need to change the notion we currently nurse over entrepreneurs and our own integrity. We need to nurture local entrepreneurship and fully support it. To do so, we must believe in ourselves and not in others.

Study shows Monkeypox virus can stay on common household items

Monkeypox by the US disease control body Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) suggests that the virus can linger on many common household objects for several days despite regular disinfecting. However, it's not yet clear if that can spread the infection.

For this study, a home shared by two Monkeypox patients was taken up as sample. They said that they disinfected surfaces, washed their hands several times a day and showered regularly.

According to the CDC, researchers found the virus on 70 per cent of high-contact areas 20 days after their symptoms began. The virus was found on couches, blankets, a coffee machine, computer mouse and light switch.

However, no live virus was detected on any of the items or surfaces, suggesting the risk infections could spread are low. The CDC said that cleaning and disinfection practices may have limited the amount of contamination in the home.

The CDC suggested that

people visiting the home of someone with Monkeypox should protect themselves by wearing a well-fitting mask, avoiding touching possibly contaminated surfaces, maintaining appropriate hand hygiene, avoiding sharing eating utensils, clothing, bedding, or towels and following home disinfection recommendations.

The virus transmits when a person comes in contact with the virus from an animal, human, or materials contaminated with the virus.

Al-Shabab gunmen storm Somali hotel, leave 20 dead

SOMALIA: Islamic militants have stormed a hotel in Somalia's capital, engaging in an hours-long exchange of fire with the security forces that left at least 20 people dead, according to Police and witnesses.

In addition, at least 40 people were wounded in the late Friday night attack and security forces rescued many others, including children, from the scene at Mogadishu's pop-

ular Hayat Hotel, they said Saturday. The attack started with explosions outside the hotel before the gunmen entered the building.

Somali forces were still trying to end the siege of the hotel almost 24 hours after the attack started. Gunfire could still be heard Saturday evening as security forces tried to contain the last gunmen thought to be holed up on the hotel's top floor.

The Islamic extremist

group al-Shabab, which has ties with al-Qaida, claimed responsibility for the attack, the latest of its frequent attempts to strike places visited by government officials. The attack on the hotel is the first major terror incident in Mogadishu since Somalia's new leader, Hassan Sheikh Mohamud, took over in May. Al-Shabab remains the most lethal Islamic extremist group in

Africa. - YAHOO NEWS

Daughter of Ukraine war mastermind dies in Moscow car explosion

RUSSIA: Darya Dugin, the daughter of Ukraine war mastermind Alexander Dugin, was killed in a car bombing on the outskirts of Russia's capital Moscow on Saturday night in an alleged assassination plot meant for

her father. Darya, a sanctioned Russian nationalist whose 60-year-old father, Alexander Dugin, is dubbed 'Putin's brain', was killed in an explosion on a highway near the village of Bolshiye Vyazyomy just outside the capital.

CCTV footage from the bombing scene shows Darya's Land Cruiser Prado engulfed in flames with at least one fire truck in attendance.

Amid claims of a plot gone wrong, Putin stooge Denis Pushilin, head of the pro-Kremlin breakaway Donetsk People's Republic in eastern Ukraine, accused Ukrainian 'terrorists' of killing Alexander's daughter.

He wrote on Telegram: 'The terrorists of the Ukrainian regime, trying to eliminate Alexander Dugin, blew up his daughter... In a car. Blessed memory of Daria, she is a real Russian girl!'

Darya Dugin was driving back from a festival when her car suddenly exploded.

According to sources, her father, Alexander, was meant to be travelling with her but he took a separate car. Alexander is the former chief editor of the staunchly pro-Putin Tsargrad TV network. - INDIA TODAY

NASA selects potential Moon landing sites

<u>US:</u> NASA has identified 13 possible landing sites on the Moon as the space agency gears up for its Artemis mission, which aims to put US astronauts back on the Earth's satellite by 2025.

The zones are located near the lunar South Pole, according to the agency's statement released on Friday. "Selecting these regions means we are one giant leap closer to returning humans to the Moon for the first time since Apollo," said Mark Kirasich, Deputy Associate Administrator for the Artemis Campaign Development Division, referring to

the agency's 1972 mission, which marked the last time humans set foot on the Moon. The potential landing locations, each approximately 15 by 15 kilometres, are situated within six degrees of latitude of the lunar South Pole and contain diverse geologic features. According to NASA,

when selecting these zones, scientists and engineers relied on troves of data collected by the Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter, the agency's unmanned spacecraft that is now circling the Moon, as well as decades of other lunar science findings. - RUSSIA TODAY



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

IMF team to visit Colombo from August 24 to 31

For discussions on economic, financial reforms and policies

IMF staff plans to visit Colombo from Thursday (August 24) till 31 to continue discussions with the Sri Lankan authorities on economic and financial reforms and policies.

The objective is to make progress toward reaching a stafflevel agreement on a prospective IMF Extended Fund Facility (EFF) arrangement in the near term.

"Because Sri Lanka's public debt is assessed as unsustainable, approval by the IMF Executive Board of the EFF program would require adequate assurances by Sri Lanka's creditors that debt sustainability will be restored," IMF said.

IMF staff would also continue the engagement with other stakeholders during the visit. The team will be led by Peter Breuer and Masahiro Nozaki. The World Bank also called for "deep structural reforms that focus on economic stabilization, and also on addressing the root structural causes that created this crisis."

An International Monetary Fund (IMF) mission team led by Peter Breuer and Masahiro Nozaki visited Colombo from June 20 to 30, 2022 to discuss IMF support for Sri Lanka and the authorities' comprehensive economic reform program. Stating at the end of the in-person visit, Breuer and Nozaki said that they witnessed some of the hardships currently faced by the Sri Lankan people, especially the poor and vulnerable who are affected disproportionately by the crisis said: "We reaffirm our commitment to support Sri Lanka at this difficult time in line with the IMF's policies.'

"The authorities have made considerable progress in formulating their economic reform program and we are looking forward to continuing the dialogue with them."

Earlier the World Bank said it was concerned for the fate of the people of Sri Lanka, but added in a statement that it was not able to give funds "until an adequate macroeconomic policy framework is in place." The World Bank said it had already diverted \$160 million from existing loans to provide urgently needed medicines, gas for cooking, and school meals.

There is a considerable untapped export potential for Sri Lankan products mainly in the apparel, fishery, tea, spices and processed food sectors in the Israeli market and there is a USD 105 million remaining total untapped potentials in individual products, said Sri Lanka Export Development Board Chairman Suresh de Mel-Chairman.

Speaking further, De Mel said Sri Lanka considers Israel as a very important economic partner and there is a vast untapped potential in trade for both countries to explore for mutual benefit. Israel was the 20th largest trading partner to Sri Lanka in

2021. "Therefore we will be able to open up new avenues of trade between two countries in various sectors. since not every function of the market could be carried out without a physical presence. The need to digitize end-to-end operations of the market was badly felt and as a result, a joint committee of the SEC and CSE was appointed to carry out the digitization initiative."

He further elaborated that "It was important for the SEC to support the CSE in this exercise since the SEC also had a duty towards the development of the market and that with the ultimate achievement it proved that difficult and complex tasks could be achieved if parties worked collective-

"The digitalization of the Sri Lan-

kan Stock Market brings the future to Sri Lanka positioning it to become a global financial hub, which will redefine the stock market landscape, taking a hyper-leap into the future."

"Mentioning the developments of a Central CounterParty System (CCP), CSE, CEO, Rajeeva Bandaranaike, said that to continue to broad base the capital market, it is needed to ensure that the overall systematic risk in the market is managed, and to do that, we need to manage and minimise the risk of default by buyers and sellers, and a CCP is a mechanism to do this effec-

tively.

EXPLANATORY NOTES Statement of Compliance

The consolidated financial statements of the Group and the separate financial statements of the Bank have been presented in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards 34 (LKAS 34) "Interim Financial Statements" issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka (CA Sri Lanka) and in compliance with the requirements of the Companies Act, No. 07 of 2007 and the Banking Act No. 30 of 1988 and amendments thereto.

There were no changes to the accounting policies and method of computation since the publication of the last annual financial statements are considered as the publication of the last annual financial statements.

Note 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The tax liability arising from the Surcharge Tax Act No: 14 of 2022 has been accounted as recommended by the Statement of Alternative Treatment (SoAT) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka as disclosed under the note 3 on imposition of surcharge tax.

As per the Surcharge Tax Act No. 14 of 2022 which was certified on 8 th April 2022, the Bank and Group are liable for the surcharge tax of LKR. 1,232 and LKR 1,309 million respectively pertaining to the year of assessment 2020/21. According to the said Act, the surcharge tax shall be deemed to be an expenditure in the financial statements relating to the year of assessment which commenced on 1 April 2020. Since the Act supersedes the requirements of the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards, the surcharge tax expense is accounted as recommended by the SoAT on Accounting for Surcharge Tax issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka, in April 2022.
