





There are more than 1 million three-wheelers in Sri Lanka and converting them to running on electricity will decrease the fuel bill and passengers can travel at an affordable price.

It has been planned to convert 300 three-wheelers to electric power within this year under the E-Mobility programme implemented as a pilot project of the UNDP and prepare a proper methodology for that.

The UNDP has allocated US\$ three million for this project. Meanwhile, attention was also paid to starting an electric bus service in Colombo city.

The Minister told the gathering that the Cabinet Paper has already been submitted vesting the power to the NTC to handle all the institutions related to passenger transport. Accordingly, the NTC will be vested with powers to amend the Act, determine the fees and impose fines. In future, the activities related to the registration of three-wheelers that will be converted to electric power will also be started.

The universities that were completely closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic have not yet fully reopened. In some universities, academic activities are conducted through the online system. Thus, after more than two years, the university system will be fully operative from September and physical lectures in universities will be conducted. Meanwhile, studies in some universities are conducted without the full student capacity as per the COVID-19 regulations issued by the Health Ministry. Accordingly, students are summoned in groups to universities to study.

One of the main demands of the recent protest held by the Inter-University Student Union was to reopen the universities as soon as possible.

a new virus known as tomato flu, or tomato fever, has emerged India in children younger than 5 years, reports the Lancet journal. Tomato Fever is also known as Hand Foot Mouth Disease (HFMD).

The medical practitioners have sounded an alarm over the spread of 'tomato flu' across the country. While the virus was first reported in Kerala on May 6, India has recorded over 80 cases till now.

"Just as we are dealing with the probable emergence of the fourth wave of COVID-19, a new virus known as tomato flu, or tomato fever, has emerged in India in the state of Kerala in children younger than 5 years," Lancet said in its report.

According to the Lancet study, tomato fever flared in India after children, aged below 5 years, got infected upon contact with the virus. The tomato fever is rarely diagnosed in adults because their immune system is generally stronger than that of a child's.

It may be noted that the rare viral infection is in an endemic state and is considered non-life-threatening; however, because of the dreadful experience of the COVID-19 pandemic, vigilant management is desirable to prevent further outbreaks.

In Tomato flu, children are showing rashes, skin irritation, dehydration and red blisters which is probably how it got its name of tomato flu. - ZEE NEWS

A graduate and an assistant instructor at the Post Graduate Study unit of the Agriculture Department, Virasmi Weerakkody, 27, had been a senior member of the UOP Explorers' Club.

Virasmi and 59 club members had gone to Saradiel Gala for mountaineering. Virasmi had stayed back as she was suffering from an injury in hand.

"She could not climb because she could not have a proper grip on the rope. So we went ahead while Virasmi and a fellow club member stayed back. Later, the two of them attempted to climb the rock using a different path. They had almost succeeded. The student who stayed with Virasma had told her 'it looked like we passed the difficult part of the journey' to which Virasma had replied yes. At that moment, she had stepped on some dried leaves, slipped and fell." a club member explained.

Virasma was severely injured in the 250 feet fall and succumbed to her death on location due to internal bleeding.

Vice Chancellor of the Peradeniya University Professor Terrance Madhujith said certain protocols have been violated. "When a decision is made by a team, everyone should stick to it. Nobody should use alternate roots when a root is decided on. It seem that protocol has been violated." he pointed out

The case against Khan was filed hours after Interior Minister Rana Sanaullah said that the Government was mulling filing a case against the 69-year-old PTI chief over his provocative speech delivered on Saturday night in the F-9 Park of the national capital.

According to the copy of the first information report, the case was registered at the Margalla Police Station of Islamabad at 10 pm on Saturday under Section 7 of the Anti-Terrorism Act (punishment for acts of terrorism)

The FIR reads that Khan in his speech had "terrorised and threatened top police officials and a respected female additional sessions judge" with the aim to stop them from performing their functions and abstain from pursuing any action against any individual related to his Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaaf party (PTI). It says that Khan's speech had spread fear and uncertainty among the police, judges and the nation. - ZEE NEWS

When a Head of the Department (HOD) of a Faculty in the University had applied for sabbatical leave, Jaffna University Vice Chancellor Professor S.Srisatkunarajah was appointed Acting Head of the Department after informing the Senate.

However, the Head of the Department who applied for the Sabbatical leave had later informed the VC that his foreign trip will be delayed and he wants to postpone taking sabbatical leave and requested to come back and function in his Department. Then VC had approved his request.

"After hearing about this, the Professor who was appointed as Acting HOD has come to the VC's office while a meeting was going on and poured kerosene on his head and attempted to suicide as he lost the opportunity to function as the Acting HOD. However, the VC had talked to him more than one and half hours and pacified the Professor and sent him home," sources said.

Some of the SLPP supporters were pushed into the Beira Lake and attacked and protesters had set fire to the buses they came from.

Two persons have been arrested by the Colombo Crime Division on suspicion. There is a woman among them. On May 09, more than 10 buses were set on fire and some of them were pushed into Beira Lake.The police say

an organized group led the attack.

They were attacked and pushed into the Beira lake while the buses that had arrived transported them to the meeting held at Temple Trees were set on fire and destroyed.

Police say that about 30 people were thrown into the Beira lake and were kept in the water for more than an hour. A large number of people who were attacked and unable to go to their villages had stayed at Temple Trees premises overnight and the Police say that doctors came and treated the injured.

Police say that although the bus owners complained about the damage to the buses, most of the people who were assaulted did not complain about it.

But according to the complaints received, the Police say that they are currently engaged in identifying the suspects from the videos and photos and video data shared on social media.

According to the Police, the suspect had committed the crime using a T56 weapon during the power cut experienced in the area. The attack is suspected to have been carried out in return to the

The attack is suspected to have been carried out in return to the murder of Wasantha Soyza, who was shot dead by two unidentified gunmen at Urawatta, Ambalangoda on July 26, 2022.

Wasantha was killed on the way back home after appearing in the Balapitiya Court for a hearing. He was accused of over the murder of Ajith Soyza alias 'Buru Ajith' at Parrot Junction in Ambalangoda on August 22, 2020. Wasantha Soyza was arrested by the Police Special Task Force (STF) in connection with this murder.

Following the murder of Wasantha Soyza, his gang carried out a shooting targeting the main suspect of the Wasantha's murder Sujith Soyza while he was participating in a funeral on July 27. However, Sujith Soyza managed to escape in the shooting while

two others including Sujith's Brother Vijith Soyza died on the spot.

Later, on August 19 Police arrested Sujith Soyza and another suspect while they were hiding in a house in Homagama along with the motorbike and the weapon used to kill Wasantha Soyza. A 64-year-old woman who provided shelter to these suspects was also arrested by the Police. "The shooting carried out at the restaurant in Ambalangoda on Sunday was aimed at Dhanushka Soyza, the son of Sujith Soyza's brother, Police said. The shooters were able to kill Dhanushka on this occasion while the other person had died after he

jumped in to the swimming pool on the ground floor to rescue

Dhanushka Soyza when the shooting took place.

The deceased Dhanushka Soyza and Sandun Madhusanka were residents of Wenamulla, Ambalangoda. Although the Police had advised Danushka Soyza not to go out due to the death threats he had been receiving, he had ignored them," Police said. "A dispute between two families is the reason behind this series of murders," Police said.

"Wasantha's faction is receiving the support from underworld kingpin Karandeniye Sudda and Podi Lasi to commit these murders, police said. A group of armed persons killing the husband, wife and their four-year-old child at Idanthota in Ambalangoda in 2016 also has a connection to this family dispute, police sources said. Karandeniye Sudda and Podi Lasi had killed this family over a contract given by Wasantha Soyza.

He said that although the number of COV-ID-infected people reported in the second week of this month had exceeded 200, about 150 infected people were reported again and eventhough the number is less than that, it cannot be said that the number of COVID-infected people is low.

He also said that when the number of patients decrease, the number of deaths will decrease.

He stated that although there is a decrease in the number of COVID-19 patients, there may not be a decrease in the number of people actually infected with COVID-19 and the real number of patients are not reported because they are not directed to carry out tests to identify COVID-19 except in essential cases.

Dr. Hamdani also said that because there is the prevalence of fever, cough, cold and the dengue disease these days, people are less likely to get tested for COVID-19.

Director General of Health Services Dr. Asela Gunawardena, has confirmed that 95 COVID-19 related deaths have been reported in the 20 days. He has also confirmed that 75 of the deaths reported were people above the age of 60. The Department of Epidemiology informs that 3228 people infected with COVID-19 have been reported only in the first 20 days of this month.

"More than 100 COVID-19 infected patients are being reported from Sri Lanka every day and therefore everyone should be very careful about this disease," said Dr.Samitha Ginige, the head specialist of the department. He also said that people with chronic diseases, including the elderly, should take precautions by getting the COVID-19 booster doses. He stated that as a result of anti-COV-ID-19 vaccines, the number of infected people have decreased in the past and the immunity rate of the first and second doses of the COVID-19 vaccines have decreased.

He also said that the attention of the people should be focused on getting the anti-COVID booster vaccine doses to build immunity against the virus.

Second batch of urea from India reaches Sri Lanka

The second batch of 65,000 metric tonnes of urea fertilizer to be given to Sri Lanka under the Government of India's loan scheme was officially handed over to Agriculture Minister Mahinda Amaraweera on August 22 morning by Indian High Commissioner to Sri Lanka Gopal Bhagle.

Sending the fertilizer stock of 21,000 metric tonnes to the Lanka Fertilizer Company and Commercial Fertilizer Company were also commenced.

The urea fertilizer was handed over at the Port of Colombo on August 22 in the presence of Ports, Shipping and Aviation Services Minister Nimal Siripala de

The Government of India has taken measures to provide 65,000 metric tonnes of urea fertilizer for paddy cultivation in the spring season. The first batch of 44,000 metric tonnes was received last month and the second batch has been provided now. 98 per cent of the

urea fertilizer required for rice cultivation in the dry season has been distributed to the farmers. The remaining two per cent has been arranged to be distributed in the coming period, and it is estimated that the total amount of urea fertilizer required for the root season will be around 31,000 metric tonnes. Another 35,000 metric tonnes of urea will

be left and it is planned to be distributed to the farmers at the beginning of the next season.

The Minister mentioned that although there was some delay in providing urea fertilizer to the farmers who cultivated paddy in the yala season, the required amount has been distributed so far. Some parties made various allegations regarding the ferti-

lizers provided by the Indian government. Some had claimed that the urea was inferior to fertilizer and toxic. But the farmers are now saying that the quality of this urea fertilizer is very high. Minister Amaraweera said that the World Bank has supported the purchase of urea fertilizer for the upcoming season. While inviting tenders to buy urea fertilizers, it receives recommendations

Therefore, there will be no room to cheat even a rupee from the fertilizers provided next month. All purchases are made transparently. And a good audit is done. "Therefore, there will be no room for fraud in fertilizer transactions in the future," he said.

Pakistan records highest-ever weekly inflation

Before this, the highest ever year-on-year increase in the SPI was 38.63 per cent, recorded for the week ending on August 5, the Dawn reported.

The latest data shows that the SPI rose by 3.35 per cent over last week, mainly because of higher food prices. The highest week-on-week increase in inflation was recorded at 3.68 per cent for the week that ended on

The report said that the increase was mainly observed in the prices of food items, including tomatoes (20.28 per cent), chicken (7.57 per cent), onions (2.30 per cent) and eggs (1.63 per cent). The non-food items that witnessed an increase in prices included electricity (6.83 per cent) and petrol (2.96 per cent). - ANI

Eight more Sri Lankans rescued in Arichalmunai

Eight more refugees from Sri Lanka, including four children, were rescued in Arichalmunai on Sunday. However, their statement that they had been stranded in Indian waters in Arichalmunai for the past three days raised eyebrows regarding the surveillance activities of the Central and State agencies.

When personnel from the Indian Coast Guard spotted the refugees stranded in Arichalmunai, they intershores in a hovercraft on Sunday.

According to Chandrakumar, 36, and his wife Delsi, 35, of the Killinochi District, Sri Lanka, they reached Arichalmunai on an illegal vessel late on Thursday. "The boatmen returned in a hurry after dropping us off. Under the cover of darkness, we did not know where exactly we were. With just five litres of potable water and a few packets of biscuits, we managed

cepted and brought them to the to survive till the ICG personnel res-

cued us," Delsi said. The situation in Sri Lanka, according to the refugees, was very bad. "We have lost everything. There are no savings. After selling whatever goods we could, we managed to raise about 1 lakh Sri Lankan rupees with which we paid the boatmen. We were so thirsty, that we used up what little water we had in less than an hour. For almost two days, we drank salt water,

and there was no one to come to our aid in Arichalmunai," she said.

"Early morning on Sunday, the hovercraft rescued us. We thank the Indian Coast Guard and the Marine Police," Delsi added.

Along with Chandrakumar and Delsi, their seven-year-old son Venuson and two-month-old daughter Praveenason were taken to the Marine Police station. Kirubakaran, 30, his wife Nishanthi, 28, and their children

Deepika, nine, and Rakshika, four, from Jaffna were also rescued. A Marine Police officer said they would be handed over to the officials at the Mandapam Rehabilitation Centre.

With the arrival of eight persons on Sunday, the number of refugees has increased to 134, officials said, and added that one aged woman had died after an illness at the Government Rajaji Hospital in Madurai.

A fishermen leader in Rameswaram

said that for the last eight days, there was no fishing activity due to the rough weather. "At least, when the fishermen ventured into the Palk Strait, they would notice stranded refugees and inform authorities," he added. Only on Saturday night, about 700 fishermen set sail into the sea from Rameswaram, and it was baffling that they did not notice the Sri Lankan refugees at Arichalmunai, he said. - The Hindu

Accordingly, Wasantha Mudalige, Ven. Galwewa Siridhamma Thera and Hashantha Jeewantha will be detained and questioned by the CID/TID for 90 days with effect from yesterday.

The Divisional Crimes Investigation Unit of Kelaniya arrested these three individuals during a protest march organised by the IUSF in Colombo on August 18. By the time of the arrest, the Colombo Fort Magistrate had issued arrest warrants on Mudalige for failing to appear before courts over a case against a protest held in 2021.

After being arrested, the three suspects were initially detained for 72 hours by the Peliyagoda

According to the STF, they have been identified as the suspects who provided information about the targeted person to the shooters through WhatsApp from inside the courtroom.

The targeted person is said to be an informant who had provided information about the drug network of underworld Kingpin 'Harak Kata' to the STF. STF officers arrested the duo at Kanduboda, Delgoda in the Biyagama police area. During the interrogation, the suspects had revealed that the information about the targeted person was provided to carry out this shooting based on a request made by Harak Kata who is currently in Dubai and the shooting was carried out by another person on the instructions of Ruwan Jayasena, an accomplice of Karak Kata who is also in Dubai. The targeted person had appeared in the court on that day to participate in the hearing of a financial fraud case against him. He had been accompanied by this 27-year-old suspect, who is also an accused of that case.

The information about the dress and the seat number the targeted person was sitting had been sent by the male suspect from inside the courtroom to the female suspect who was outside the court premises and she had forwarded them to Ruwna Jayasena through WhatsApp. STF investigations were also able to recover four grams and 520

milligrams of heroin in the possession of the suspects.

The STF is conducting further investigations.

According to the National Dengue Control Unit, more than 50,000 dengue cases have been reported from all regions of the country so far this year with 50.8 percent of them being reported from the Western Province.

"Due to the scaling down of fumigation activities, the staff who carry out these activities have to face a number of difficulties in carrying out their duties. The fact that house inspections are not carried out properly, prosecutions against people who have mosquito breeding places in their home gardens are hampered resulting in an increase in the number of dengue infected people," Dr. Vijayamuni said.

He stated that the population density of Colombo Municipal Council is 20,000 per square kilometer and when an infectious disease like dengue is caught, it spreads very quickly in the

He said that since the beginning of this year, 1938 infected people have been reported from the Colombo Municipal Council area alone and about 4 to 5 dengue infected people are

He said that the number of infected people usually increases in May, June and July and decreases in August and increases again in December, January and February and the reason for this is the monsoon rains.

According to the report, Rs. 150,000 has to be spent to restore the said area and Rs.4.7 Million to place the natural grass turf.

UDA sources observed that subject minister Prasanna Ranatunga has given instructions to charge the above mentioned amount from the protestors.

The UDA release further states, "For about 3 months, the group of protesters occupied the area around Galle Face without permission, demanding former President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to resign. After Gotabaya Rajapaksa stepped down, the Court informed the activists to leave the place to which they had to consent."

"The Galle Face area where the protesters were occupying is public property. The area where illegal constructions were set up, in terms of Section 3(1) of the Urban Development Authority Act No. 41 of 1971, belongs to the Colombo Municipal Council Jurisdiction area. The Special Gazette of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka No.4/1 dated 30/09/1978 has declared the area as an urban development area."

"If any development activity or temporary construction is carried out in an urban development area, a permit must be obtained in terms of Section 8(A)1 of the Urban Development Authority (Amendment) Act No. 04 of 1982. But the protestors have trespassed into the area and committed many atrocities.

The right of the public to freely use the area has also been hindered due to the fact that many unauthorised structures have been built in the same area. All these actions are in violation of the Urban Development Act. Accordingly, the Urban Development Authority has been empowered to take action against such action," the statement further said.

Gammanpila also requested to appoint another Presidential Commission of Inquiry to investigate the current economic crisis and those who are responsible for it.

MP Gammanpila said that the Presidential Commission should investigate incidents that inflicted violence against the protestors as well as politicians.

The Parliamentarian made these observations at a press brief held at the Pivithuru Hela Urumaya head office. "The violent incidents that took place on May 9 are

scarier than the ones that happened in the 1987-89 era. Those days when someone is killed, an announcement is kept near the body that explains the reasons for the killing. However, can someone give an explanation as to why Amarakirthi Athukorala was killed? Or explain why Dr. Gunapala Rathnasekara's house was burnt down? Even though the public participated in the protests genuinely, we have got to know that Tamil separatists and NGOs backed by the American government have funded the protests. Considering these facts, our motherland is in great danger," Gammanpila said.

Thus, we request the President to appoint a Commission of Inquiry to investigate these incidents and backgrounds." Gammanpila noted.

MP Gammanpila also alleged that some Ministers who were in Gotabaya Rajapaksa's government are behind the conspiracy to destabilize the country.

"We announced the plight of the country in October 2020. However, some Ministers turned a blind eye to the matters we raised. Some arrogant Ministers said that Gammanpila is just making up boogeymen. So it is obvious that some Ministers in the Government contributed to the destabilization. People are suffering because of corruption and wrong decision making. We cannot move ahead without finding out who was behind this economic crisis. I am ready to come before such a Commission to give evidence as to who took wrong decisions and mismanaged the country's economy." MP Gammanpila also said.

clauses of it are unconstitutional. The petitions were taken up before a Supreme Court Bench comprising Chief Justice Jayantha Jayasuriya and Justices Buwaneka Aluwihare, Arjuna Obeysekara.

When the petitions were taken up before the Supreme Court yesterday, President's Counsel Manohara de Silva. Attorneys V.K Choksey, Peiris and Nagananda Kodithuwakku appearing for the petitioners made lengthy submissions.

Petitioner Attorney-at-Law Nagananda Kodithuwakku appearing for the petition which was filed by him made submissions and said that the composition of the proposed legislative assembly is problematic and it has been proposed to appoint seven members from within the parliament and three from outside and it will have a harmful effect on the independence of the judiciary and it will directly violate the constitution. All the ten members to be appointed for that should be appointed from outside the parliament and thus the independence of the judiciary is 100 percent protected and the appointments, promotions, transfers, etc. of judges should be done by independent persons. He pointed out that the appointment of judges by the executive violates the independence of the judiciary and is a complete violation of the

He also pointed out that Article 28 of the proposed 22nd Constitutional Amendment is against the Constitution and pointed out that the ability of politicians to return to the position after committing any offense while in office should be removed.

When President's Counsel Manohara de Silva appeared for Lieutenant Kernel A.S. Amarasekara making submission over the petition Chief Justice Jayantha Jayasuriya raised a question that how the President's executive power is being deprived by stating that the appointment of the cabinet should be done according to the instructions of the Prime Minister according to the proposed 22nd constitutional amendment?

The Chief Justice also stated that most of the clauses included in this bill have been brought to the attention of the court in the 17th and 19th constitutional amend-

President's Counsel Manohara de Silva said that the 19th constitutional amendment has confirmed that the executive power of the people of this country belongs to the President and that power cannot be curtailed. He emphasized that although certain restrictions can be placed on that power, it cannot affect his final decisions.

The President's counsel pointed out that the powers of the President have been reduced by the article 44 of the bill and it is against the constitution, he pointed out that according to that constitution the president has been made to act according to the instructions of the Prime Minister.

Also, the provision that the appointment of ministers as well as the appointment of Deputy Ministers should be made on the advice of the Prime Minister, the President's counsel stated that the President has been deprived of acting according to his independent discre-

Accordingly, he pointed out that the relevant appointments must be made on the advice of the Prime Minister and the advice of the Prime Minister must be taken. However, according to the existing Constitution, the

President has the ability to decide whether or not to take the Prime Minister's advice, but he pointed out that this is not the case here. The President's counsel stated that it is a violation of the power of the President.

He said that the court has the responsibility to examine whether the constitution is against the constitution and the court has the ability to propose alternative amendments when such a constitution is unconstitutional but it is not a mandatory matter. According to the 4th provision of the Constitution,

the executive power of the people is vested in the President. In the exercise of that executive power, there is a need to act on someone else's wishes and this is questionable, he added.

The petitions Will be taken up again today for further consideration.





Reading the riot act

resident Ranil Wickremesinghe minced no words in Anuradhapura over the weekend when he told Public Servants to pull up their socks or leave their jobs. He told a District Secretaries' meeting that he cannot afford to feed any Public Servant for free any longer and everyone needs to contribute towards the development of the country.

"If they cannot do that they should go home," he said. There is a large contingent of State officials at ground level and the President has been told that there were nine public officials for each Grama Sevaka division.

"I urge them to divide their sections so that each one is assigned to a specific task. If you want to work then work, if not go home," the President told the public officials.

Of course, the President took the risk of being unpopular with Public Servants by being rather blunt. It has been the practice of all past leaders to woo the Public Servants (including Armed Forces and Police) that number over 1.4 million, which is a healthy vote bank.

How important Public Servants become at elections is seen by salary increments and other benefits showered on them during election campaigns by all leaders. However, the time has come to remove all blinkers and see things as they really are.

Our Public Servants have taken too much for granted and developed a sense of invincibility. They think they are untouchable and beyond the reach of any authority. Hence, it is about time someone in authority read the riot act. It is all too well known that the Public Service is notorious for indifference, lethargy, corruption and hardly justifies its keep.

Today the Public Service has largely become irrelevant and imposed a huge burden on the public who fund it but receive little or nothing in return. On the contrary, it is bleeding the economy white as a result of the colossal amount of funds spent on its behalf. Presently, 80 percent of the national income is spent on salaries and pensions of the Public Servants but what has the country and its people gained?

The economy remains stagnant and the progress retarded while the Government keeps on maintaining 1.4 million Public Servants out of public funds that are fast depleting as a result of the economic downturn.

President Wickremesinghe knows this reality and wants value for money. The country and the economy could no longer afford the luxury of mollycoddling unproductive Public Servants. Like the President observed, all Public Servants should give a periodic account of their work and be judged by their performance.

If not, they should be shown the door. The country cannot continue to pay Public Servants for nothing in return. One has only to walk in to any Government Department to observe this reality. Employees are often idling or engaged in gossip or meaningless chatter

No one in authority dares to take action against these shirkers and seat warmers since most of them are political appointees. The spring cleaning of the Public Service should start from these segments who mirror what ails our public service. Many Public Servants come to work only to engage in trade union work on behalf of their political masters. Hardly any work is done at all, though they unfailingly collect their pay packets at month's end.

There is also duplication of work. According to a recent report, the Sri Lanka Transport Board (SLTB) has 12 workers for a single bus which is an indication of the extent to which State institutions had been packed with political appointees. It was the signal boast of a former leader that he was the only leader who found employment on an unprecedented scale in the Public Sector to jobless youth and was solely responsible for raising the minimum salary of State Sector employees by more than 100 per cent.

ees by more than 100 per cent. Is it any wonder that the econon

Is it any wonder that the economy has gone bankrupt and most State Sector bodies are finding it difficult to pay the salaries of employees and are borrowing from the Treasury to meet their salary bills? It is perhaps this realization that prompted former Finance Minister Basil Rajapaksa to order a freeze on recruitment to the public sector and for all State bodies to drastically slash down on expenditure.

But this alone will not suffice to reform the State Sector. As the President noted, performance is the key and the payment of salaries should be made based on performance and output as done in developed countries. In fact, a similar scheme prevails in our private sector, which, no doubt, has made the difference between our State bodies and the private sector in terms of advancement, modernisation and profits.

Inefficiency is not tolerated in private sector organisations and there are no seat warmers either. President Wickremesinghe, no doubt, wants standards that exist in the private sector to be emulated by our State bodies and it was in that context that he has enjoined those who do not work to go home. Hopefully, the cue would be taken by our Public Sector officials to start delivering the goods from now onwards.

What went wrong?

Flawed 19A and effort to improve it

have over the last few weeks been concentrating on the current mess in the country, but the rot has been going on for a very long time. This was brought home to me vividly when I had home for dinner an African friend who had served in Geneva in 2009 and been a solid supporter when we were under attack by several Western countries. He said that that had seemed the highest point of Sri Lankan diplomacy whereas now he saw us lower than we had ever been.

It took me some time to realize that course correction would not happen, so at the end of 2014, having informed Mahinda Rajapaksa well in advance that I could not support him if changed were not made, I decided to support Maithripala Sirisena to implement a reform agenda. That that all went disastrously wrong is now part of history.

But at that same dinner, I was reminded by Dayan Jayatilleka of the amendments I had proposed way back in 2015 to the confused and confusing 19th Amendment, which did very little to fulfil the pledges in Maithripala Sirisena's manifesto about cutting down on executive

I did my best to correct things, but no one was interested except for the Speaker and also Dinesh Gunawardena who as I think Chief Government Whip at the time had the grace to ask me what I felt when particular clauses were taken up. That is one reason I still have a soft spot for him, despite his regrettable commitment now to Ranil Wickremesinghe. For others, and in particular those who kept shouting, were simply anxious to get the whole business over and done with, regardless of the confusion it engendered and the failure to strengthen Parliament as had been pledged. Little use in this I suppose, given the general quality of Parliamentarians, for despite lip service no one else bothered at this stage about electoral reform.

Dayan urged that I revive my amendments since it is clear that the proposed 22nd Amendment does little to overcome the problems raised by the 20th. And this finally pushed me to seek for the complete text, which I had not stored systematically so I could not find it after the computer I used then collapsed.

But I finally traced it in an email, and sent it to him, in case he is in touch with political leaders who might want to propose changes to the current amendment. I have no intention now of going to see anyone, but I do respond to queries for assistance and I am surprised that no one in Opposition has bothered to consult someone they know was more knowledgeable about constitutional principles than anyone else in Parliament. Recent complaints from the Opposition about what Government is doing are ironic given that these come from people who cared not a whit about corrective measures I had suggested seven years ago. As we have seen repeatedly since then, successive Presidents, confident of their own popularity but not the popularity of their Governments,

have used such early elections as a substitute for productive action.

My next proposal was to stop premature dissolution, which should not be at the whim of the President. We had agreed on fixed terms, and such dissolution should only be permitted if it is clear to Parliament – a sensible Parliament elected on the new system – that it has outlived its usefulness.

I also tried to and to stop arbitrary pardons, something that has been much abused over the years by successive Presidents.

Fundamental principles

I would like to propose the following amendments to the clauses as numbered below of the proposed Bill to amend the Constitution, in the latest version issued in Parliament on April 21st 2015, but dated March 16th 2015.

1(2) Instead of current text, replace with 'This Act shall come into force following the amendment of Sections 95 to 99 of the Constitution, save that Sections 11, 17, 19, 24 shall come into force on the date

of first meeting of Parliament after the General Election held under the new system introduced by the above amendment'.

This is to ensure that electoral reform occurs simultaneously with the introduction of these new elements into the Constitution

2. Amend the first sentence of 14 A (1) (d) to read 'being information that is required for the exercise or protection of the rights of any citizen or the public good

Amend Section (a) to read 'established or created or recognized by or under any law'

To extend the right to information to cover the public good and to ensure that Non-Governmental organisations functioning officially are subject to this Right

4. (2) Instead of amending 31 (3A) Delete the whole of 31 (3A)

The President should not be allowed to bring forward his election. This is not a privilege enjoyed by other elected Presidents, and leads to confusion as with the winner of such election taking office at different times depending on who wins

5. Replace 33 3 © with To summon and prorogue Parliament

The President should not be able to dissolve Parliament, nor should we allow Parliament to be dissolved before the end of its five year terms. I think we agreed on fixed terms all round

Insert a new 5A – Delete the words 'where any offender shall have been condemned to suffer death by the sentence of any court'

It was decided at the meeting of party leaders in March that there should be controls on the President's power to pardon, and that this should be on the basis of consultation.



SL is not an MOPEN ECONOMICE Country - Prof. Abeyratne

Sri Lanka is not an open economic country. True, we opened it in 1977 but we did not address the **fundamental** requirements for the open economy like the public sector reforms or reform the public enterprises. The Daily News spoke to Protessor Sirimal Abeyratne of the **Department of Economics at** Colombo **University about** his views on the present economic crisis in Sri Lanka.

JAYANTHA SRI NISSANKA and RUWINI JAYAWARDANA

EXCERPTS:

As an economist, what is your opinion about the • present situation of the **Sri Lankan economy?**

A: Sri Lankan economy is in an unprecedented crisis. This situation did not happen overnight. We knew that the country was going in that direction. Crises build up slowly but the collapse is instant. It is different from the crises that developed countries face because they make adjustments from time to

This is also a man-made crisis. So our policy errors in the past have brought us to this situation. There were some triggering factors in 2019 and 2020 and the collapse started with those factors.

The Government is introducing many • reforms. How long do you think it will take for the country recover from the present to situation?

A: It is questionable whether the reforms are comprehensive enough. The way that I see it the reforms are basically not enough aiming at macroeconomic stability. This is only one side of the crisis. It has to do with raising Government revenue, cutting down the expenditure, reforming the State-owned enterprises as well as targeting the welfare programmes and reducing corruption vulnerability. Those are the major elements of the recovery process. However, when we look at the other end of the crisis, the dollar crisis is what stands out for me. Until we have a longterm programme to generate foreign exchange, earnings through export growth require foreign investment because domestic investors alone cannot cope with the situa-

Therefore, we need not worry about investment funds today. We cannot save more as a developing country today because there is no shortage in the global savings which should be available as foreign investment. As long as we do not address this fundamental issue we will not enter the sustainable growth part.

Why isn't Sri Lanka attracting foreign

A: Before the end of terrorism, everybody thought that it was terrorism which prevented foreign investors from coming to Sri Lanka. However, even after terrorism we do not possess a good record of foreign investments. In the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic India received 64 billion dollars of foreign investment. Singapore received 92 billion. Sri Lanka received only less than half a billion. Therefore, we can see how poor we are in terms of receiving foreign investors. Even Vietnam and Thailand received around 10 or 15 billion dollars per year.

Throughout our 40-year period, our accu-

mulated foreign investment stock is not more than 13 billion.

There are three reasons why foreign investors do not come here even after the terrorist era. Our policies are not geared towards export growth. We actually have a policy which is biased towards export promotion. One element of that is that Sri Lanka is not an open economy as suggested. We have very lengthy bureaucratic procedures and complicated regulator systems that have not been reformed for many years. This is very cumbersome for investors. Our policy and political environment is not predictable. We need to show a consistent policy direction for the country. The corruption in the country affects genuine foreign investors too as they look at the corruption records through international records. Therefore, they know Sri Lanka is not a good place to invest in. Unless we resolve these problems, it is difficult for us to expect substantial increase in foreign invest-

What are the macroeconomic fundamentals we need to correct to attract investment?

A: Investors look at macroeconomic fundamentals which are related to our monetary policy and fiscal policy. So the Government's budgetary management has to be manageable with sound revenue acts and produc-

tive expenditure patterns so that our debt levels can be manageable. The monein Washington, D.C. tary policy had to be towards geared achieving the Central Bank objectives like price stability and the financial sector stability. During the last two and half years Central Bank has to support the Treasury by providing the funds necessary because it lost physical budgetary management. This is not a wise way of using the Central Bank instruments to sustain Government

 $\boldsymbol{A:}$ If savers with draw deposits due to the high inflation, the banking system will collapse. The road to that kind of calamity is actually having due to high inflation. Sri Lanka has the highest inflation among the Asian countries. Inflation is good for borrowings but bad for savings. So depositors are naturally encouraged not to save in this situation. Therefore they exchange their deposits to some other asserts.

If this continues to the future, obliviously we will face challenges in banking and finance sectors. We need to manage it and reduce the pressure on inflation with the use of monetary policy.

Some economists say that • the current predicament • is due to the negative balance of trade which occurred after introducing the open economic system in 1977.

A: If that is so, it should be applied not only to Sri Lanka but all the other countries in the world like Singapore, Hong Kong, South Korea, Malaysia, Vietnam, Thailand and China. However we have not seen them take on similar routes.

Sri Lanka is not an open economic country. True, we opened it in 1977 but we did not address the fundamental requirements for the open economy like the public sector reforms or reform the public enterprises. We adopted liberalisation programmes and reversed it. We did not address corruption and rule of

One of the most important aspects of having an open economy is having a liberal international trade. Sri Lanka's total tax revenue from the taxes on international trade has a percentage of the Government's total tax revenue which expands to around 18 percent. This was in 2019 before the Coronavirus pandemic. In India it is four and half percent while in Singapore it is almost zero percent. In most of the developing countries in Asia it is three to four percent. This means Sri Lanka is far behind all these countries in having an

Although we tried our best to increase export • revenue since 1977, we could not make a sound export-oriented economy due to high cost of production and administrative red tapes. Do you think we can promote Sri Lanka as an export-oriented country?

A: I do think Sri Lanka can be a successful export-oriented economy. For that we need to adopt a comprehensive reform programme. We need to reform our trade policies which are not in favour of exports, our regulator mechanisms which are not in favour of export and investment and other elements.

over the last 25 years. Sri Lanka needs to go back to the reform process. We need to convince the international investors those reforms. Hence, there will be more investment in this country as well as exports generated within the country. One of the major low hanging fruits is the Port City project. It is free from all these anti-export policies

We have given up our reforms

and regulatory mechanisms. It is a good opportunity to generate foreign investment and export revenue for the country if we adopt the investment promotion schemes now. Even the country can have a good export promotion record because Sri Lanka has all the necessary fundamental conditions to do so.

Some say that we should have approached the IMF • two years ago. What is vour view?

A: I too believe that we should have done that because we could have avoided a lot of downfalls we have experienced so far.

Even if we go to the IMF, it will not provide a comprehensive 100 percent answer to our problem. We have a big part to play at home which will not come out of the IMF. This is especially regarding export promotion and investment promotion. It is our duty to focus on these two areas. The IMF will basically bring about fundamental problems with our physical management.

Some say that even if we approach the IMF, we will not be able to attract international investors for our international sovereign bonds as we have been declared as an international bankrupt country.

A: When you declare bankruptcy and the default ratings by the credit rating agencies, there are a lot of bitter consequences that we need to expect. The international community investors have negative trust on our ability to honour borrowings as well as about our businesses. They mistrust the situation of the country and the banking system here. That is why we are facing problems like them not wanting to trade with Sri Lanka.

A: IMF is not the only option but it will carry some positive results because it comes with around three or four billion dollars of financial assistance with a programme so that we have a commitment to follow it although we have a history of honouring those IMF programmes. There is an improvement in international perception about the Sri Lankan economy and its future. Positive things are coming with the IMF programme.

However the major part of the work that we need to do is to come out of the economic crisis and to move beyond and above the crisis. Otherwise we will head back to the 2019 situation which is not a good position to be in. All these things are in our hands, not in the hands of the IMF. Our Government and people need to do a lot of cleaning work at home. The IMF will only serve as a support

Due to the tax cut done by the former President Gotabaya Rajapaksa's Government, the **Government lost around Rs. 600** billion annually. How can the **Government increase its revenue** without it affecting the people who are already suffering from high inflation?

A: You need higher income to reach Government revenue and you need higher Government revenue to reach income. When we look at our tax revenue as a percentage of GDP, it has been declining over the years. It has been declining because we haven't been focusing on our tradable production growth. It was basically about Government spending on our infrastructure and providing Government jobs with small salaries to all the unemployed people. It looked like our economy was moving with all these projects. We improved our per capita income but in reality our tax revenue was declining even before 2019. We would have recognised this problem and made the corrections then and there long

The second part of the issue is that within the tax system there is a major part of the problem because a small share of direct taxes is as a percentage of total tax revenue and is about 20 to 25 percent. The balance 70 to 80 percent comes from the complicated commodity taxes. This is not the correct method of direct and indirect taxes. According to Sri Lankan standards income taxes should be around 50 percent. Therefore around half of our taxes should come directly. Direct taxes are low because many people are not paying taxes. The Government or the tax authorities do not know people's income levels. We haven't established a proper system to get information about people's income and wealth. In such a system many would find it difficult to explain their income and wealth and that might be the reason why there is no such system. Due to this the Government cannot raise direct access and as a result of this the Government resorted more and more to indirect taxes.



Russian missiles rain on Ukraine

as war nears half-year mark

RUSSIA, UKRAINE: Artillery shells rained down on a city close to Europe's biggest nuclear plant overnight and Russian missiles hit targets near Odesa, a Ukrainian Black Sea port and a grain export hub, as the war headed for its sixmonth milestone on Wednesday.

August 24 will also mark 31 years of Ukraine's independence from Soviet rule and President Volodymyr Zelenskiy in a nightly video address called for vigilance, saying Moscow could try "something particularly ugly".

Russian authorities said on Sunday they were investigating a suspected car bomb attack outside Moscow which killed the daughter of Alexander Dugin, an ultranationalist Russian ideologue who advocates Russia absorbing Ukraine.

While the investigators said they were considering "all versions" when it came to working out who was responsible, the Russian Foreign Ministry speculated there

could be a link to Ukraine, something Zelenskiy's adviser quickly dismissed.

As Ukraine prepared to mark its Independence Day embroiled in a war that has flattened towns and cities, killed thousands and forced millions to flee, military and regional officials reported more Russian strikes on targets in the east and south of the country.

The fighting in the proximity of Zaporizhzia and Saturday's missile strike on the southern Ukrainian town of Voznesensk, which is not far from Ukraine's secondlargest atomic plant, has spurred fears of a nuclear accident.

In the latest incident, a drone attack on the headquarters of Russia's Black Sea fleet was thwarted on Saturday morning, according to a Telegram Post by Mikhail Razvozhayev, Crimea's Russian-appointed governor, who is not recognised by the West.

PAKISTAN: Pakistan's media watchdog has banned broadcasting live speeches of former Prime Minister Imran Khan on all satellite television channels with immediate effect, hours after he threatened state institutions and government officials while addressing a rally in Islamabad.

Khan, while addressing a public gathering here on Saturday, threatened to file cases against top police officials, a woman magistrate, the Election Commission of Pakistan and political opponents over the treatment meted out to his aide Shahbaz Gill, who was arrested last week on charges of sedi-

The Pakistan Electronic Media Regulatory Authority (PEMRA) in a communique issued on Saturday said that television channels despite repeated warnings had failed to implement a time-delay mechanism to stop the broadcast of material against state institutions.

"It has been observed that Mr Imran Khan, Chairman Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf, in his speeches/statements is continuously alleging state institutions by levelling baseless allegations and spreading hate speech through his pro-

vocative statements against state institutions and officers which is prejudicial to the maintenance of law and order and is likely to disturb public peace and tranquility," it said.

The regulator said Khan's speeches were in violation of Article 19 of the Constitution and against the code of conduct for media.

SOMALIA: Somali authorities on Sunday ended a deadly attack, in which 21 people were killed and 117 people were wounded, when gunmen stormed a hotel in the capital. Over 62% of Germans dissatisfied with **Chancellor Scholz's Govt.**

GERMANY: A survey conducted by the INSA polling institute for the German Bild am Sonntag newspaper, published on Sunday, found that 62% of Germans had an unfavourable view of Scholz. It is a major dip in support, compared to some 39% who said the same in March. Only 25% of Germans believe that Scholz, who was Deputy Chancellor under Angela Merkel in the previous ruling coalition, is doing his job well, down from 46% in March. - DEUTSCHEWELLE

Japanese PM Kishida **COVID** positive

JAPAN: Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida has tested positive for COVID-19, the Government said. Kishida, 65, developed a cough and slight fever on Saturday night and came up positive in a PCR test, according to a statement by the Cabinet Office. He's currently resting at the Prime Minister's official residence.

With respect to July 2021, the reported inflation for the month of July 2022 was mainly due to the higher price levels prevailing in both food and non-food groups. Accordingly, the Year-on-Year inflation of the food group increased to 82.53 % in July 2022 from 75.8% in June 2022 and the Year-on-Year inflation of the non-food group Increased to 52.4% in July 2022 from 43.6% in

On a Year-on-Year basis the contribution of food commodities to infla-

Industrial production down by 3.4% in 2Q

The volume of industrial production for the second quarter of 2022 has decreased by 3.4 % compared to the same quarter in 2021 according to the Department of Census and

Statistics. The volume of industrial production has decreased by 0.8 % in the month of June, 2022 compared to the same month in 2021. The production in the month of June 2022 has decreased by 0.1 % when compared to the production in the month of May 2022.

Over \$18 Tn wiped off global markets in 1H 2022 - $WFE\ data$

New data published by the World off global markets in the first six Federation of Exchanges (WFE), the global industry group for exchanges and central clearing counterparties, lays bare the full economic impact of the Ukraine war upon a global economy still trying to recover from the Covid-19

The WFE's Market Highlights report for the First Half of 2022 reveals a sharp retraction in market capitalization of around 15% when compared with the previous sixmonth period, with all global regions experiencing decreases of similar proportions. A total of more than \$18 trillion was wiped months of 2022.

The number of IPOs plunged 52% over the same time period and the capital raised through IPOs fell

There are some glimmers of hope, however. Trading activity in cash equities increased in the Americas and in the EMEA region, which groups Europe, the Middle East and Africa, during that time, by 26% (the Americas) and 16% (EMEA). The value traded increased by 17% and 13% respectively compared with the last six months of 2021. In the Asia Pacific region (APAC) the number of

trades decreased marginally by 2.98% but the value traded decreased by around 23%.

The WFE report also reveals that the number of exchange-traded derivatives contracts reached its highest level in the last five years. totaling \$39.37 billion, an increase of 17.2% on figures from the sec-

ond half of 2021. Chief Executive Officer at the WFE, Nandini Sukumar, said: "Growth prospects were already subdued as the tragic Ukraine conflict caused major disruption in the energy and commodity markets. This combined with global economies already struggling to recover from the pandemic has led to a perfect storm that has hit growth prospects hard." TO PAGE 12



One progress report released last month by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) Secretariat, the G24 members said: "We should be conscious that any commitment beyond a political commitment will effectively constrain," according to a report in Business Standard, "future law-making powers of sovereign jurisdictions. Setting such a high legal bar runs the risk of undermining the consensus solution that the current work aims to achieve and will raise constitutional concerns in various jurisdictions." The business daily cited Akhilesh Ranjan, advisor (tax policy) at PwC, as saying that there is a slim chance the deal would be implemented within the timeline, and it is likely to be postponed by one year. Some highlights from the report: Cash Equity

• Domestic market capitalization decreased about 15% when compared to the previous sixmonth period, with all regions experiencing decreases of similar proportions. Overall, more than USD 18 trillion has been wiped off from

the markets in the first six months of 2022.

- Trading activity increased significantly in the Americas and EMEA. In these regions' volumes increased by 26% and 16%, while value traded increased by 17% and 13%, respectively (compared with H2 2021). In APAC the number of trades decreased marginally but the value traded decreased by about 23%.
- The average trade size was at its lowest level compared with the previous period (at USD 3,259.41 /trade).
- The number of IPOs and the capital raised through IPOs2 saw a massive decrease relative to H2 2021 (-53% and -62%, respectively), and to H1 2021 (-48% and -65%, respectively).
- Exchange-traded derivatives • The number of exchange-traded derivatives contracts reached its highest level in the last five years, amounting to 39.37 billion (24.74 billion options contracts and 14.63 billion futures contracts traded in H1 2022). This represents a 17.2% increase compared to H2 2021, and a 34.8% increase year-on-year.
- While commodity options volumes increased by about 24% (relative to the previous six-month period), commodity futures decreased by about 22%.
- Equity, currency, and ETF derivatives witnessed double digit increases when compared to H2 2021 (24%, 27.9% and 32%, respectively), and year-on-year (53.8%, 35.4% and 36.5%, respectively).
- Interest rate derivatives increased 13.6% compared to H2 2021 and 9.3% year-on-year.



Chandimal the wicket keeper batter of Army SC who is in good form reached the 10,000 run mark at the last three day game against Bloomfield while Police SC experienced batter Chamara Silva reached 15, 000 first class runs in their game against BRC.

He was the T-20 Captain when Sri Lanka won the world cup in Bangladesh in 2014. Actually he did not play last two games and Lasith Malinga was the acting skipper in

the last two games including the T 20 world cup final at Minpur. I like to play for my team and as well as my country and my dedication is very high. My first coach at Dharmasoka College Ambalangoda Asoka Kumara Gange always gave his blessings while my wife, parents and brothers always encouraged me to go forward. I always prefer to play Test cricket but never wanted to be labelled as a red ball player and I enjoyed all three formats, said Chandimal.He has been included for the Asia Cup 20 member squad and named as the third wicket keeper of the side. I was a National wicket keeper but now most of the time I am very keen to play as a batter. However for the team I always like to give my service. If I will keep the wickets I will find it difficult to bat in the top order. But it's depend on the match situation and my first priority is for the team's success, said Chandimal.

Meanwhile 42 year right hander Chamara Silva who has completed his milestone of 15, 000 first class runs said he had a target to reach this mark. I maintained fitness and worked hard to achieve this. Actually I completed 15, 000 runs with a century against BRC. Playing first class cricket I really enjoyed. I have completed level three coaching qualification and think about a role of coaching in future. Actually in my 233 first class match I was able to reach my target of 15, 000 runs with a fighting century (111)_which was my
