The Muslim Mosques and Charitable Trusts or Wakfs Regulations, 1958, published in *Gazette* No. 11,640 of January 16, 1959, are hereby amended as follows:—

(1) in regulation II—

(a) by the substitution, in the proviso to paragraph (2) thereof, for all the words from "he shall not" to "for the journey." of the following:—

"he shall be entitled only to—

(a) a first class railway warrant; or

(b) reimbursement in a sum equivalent to first class train fare, where such member performs such journey by car."; and

(b) by the insertion, immediately after paragraph (2) thereof of the following new paragraph:—

"(3) Every member of the Board, other than the Commissioner, shall be entitled to a first class railway warrant in respect of the traveling done by him on inspection duties as a member of a duly constituted meeting of the Board;

provided that where there is no train service or where inspection duties are such as to make it necessary to travel by road than by rail, then, any member who performs such journey by car shall be entitled, subject to regulation 1561 of the Government Financial Regulations, to a travelling allowance calculated at the rates set out in Schedule C hereto."

**Regulations**

1. These regulations may be cited as the Factories (Steam Boiler Attendants Certificates of Competency) Regulations, 1965.

2. It shall be the duty of the occupier of every factory to ensure that no person shall have control over—

- (a) any steam boiler not exceeding 2,000 lbs. per hour steaming capacity unless he holds a Class III Steam Boiler Attendant's Certificate of Competency;
- (b) any steam boiler not exceeding 6,000 lbs. per hour steaming capacity, unless he holds a Class II Boiler Attendant's Certificate of Competency;
- (c) any steam boiler exceeding 6,000 lbs. per hour steaming capacity unless he holds a Class I Boiler Attendant's Certificate of Competency,

issued to him by a person authorized under section 34 (6) of the Ordinance to examine and report on steam boilers.

3. No certificate of competency of any class shall be issued to a person unless such person is qualified in terms of the requirements for that class as set out in the Schedule I hereto:

Provided, however, that a person possessing such technical qualifications as may be approved for the purpose by the Chief Inspector of Factories or a person who has received such special training in the maintenance of steam boilers as may be approved for the purpose by the Chief Inspector of Factories, may be issued a certificate of competency in any class irrespective of the number of years of experience.

4. (1) Every certificate of competency—

- (a) shall be substantially in the form set out in the Schedule II hereto;
- (b) shall contain the particulars specified therein;
- and
- (c) shall be issued in triplicate.

(2) The original of the certificate of competency shall be issued to the applicant, the duplicate copy shall be sent to the Chief Inspector of Factories and the remaining copy shall be retained by the person issuing the certificate.

5. Every certificate of competency issued under section 4 of the Mines and Machinery Protection Ordinance 1896 shall continue in force for a period of six months from the date on which these regulations come into force and shall thereafter lapse.

6. Where a certificate of competency is refused by a person authorized to issue the same, he shall inform in writing the Chief Inspector of Factories within 14 days from the date of his refusal stating the grounds for such refusal.

7. Where a certificate of competency has been refused to any applicant by a person authorized to issue the same, no application for a fresh certificate shall be made by the applicant until six months have elapsed from the date of such refusal.

8. No application for a certificate of competency shall be entertained unless it is accompanied by a declaration to the effect that the applicant has not been refused a certificate of competency within the preceding six months.

**SCHEDULE I**

**CLASS III—BOILER ATTENDANT'S CERTIFICATE—QUALIFICATIONS**

1. He must have a general knowledge of boilers.
2. He must be competent to operate boilers with a steaming capacity up to 2,000 pounds per hour.
3. He must be able to raise steam efficiently and economically.
4. He must know names of boiler mountings and fittings, including safety devices and their functions and operations.
5. He must have at least one year's experience as a fireman or as an Assistant to a certified boiler attendant.
6. He must be conversant with boiler cleaning, wash outs and other maintenance work.

## CLASS II—BOILER ATTENDANT'S CERTIFICATE—QUALIFICATIONS

In addition to the qualifications stipulated for a Class III Boiler Attendant's Certificate, he shall possess the following qualifications:—

1. He must be competent to operate boilers with a steaming capacity up to 6,000 pounds per hour.
2. He must have had experience in attending to boilers for at least 3 years.
3. He must be able to effect routine repairs on injectors, etc.

## CLASS I—BOILER ATTENDANT'S CERTIFICATE—QUALIFICATIONS

In addition to the qualifications stipulated for Class II Boiler Attendant's Certificate, he shall possess the following qualifications:—

1. He must be competent to operate boilers with a steaming capacity of over 6,000 pounds per hour.
2. He must have had experience in attending to boilers for at least 6 years.

The Award

This is an award in an industrial dispute between the All Ceylon Commercial & Industrial Workers' Union (hereinafter referred to as the 'Union'), and Messrs. E. Coates & Co. Ltd.

(hereinafter referred to as the 'Company'). By his Order dated 26th February, 1965, this dispute was referred to me for settlement, by the Honourable Minister of Labour and Housing, under section 4 (1) of the Industrial Disputes Act, Chapter 131, of the Legislative Enactments of Ceylon (1956, Revised Edition), as amended by Acts Nos. 14 of 1957, 62 of 1957, and 4 of 1962.

2. According to the statement of the Commissioner of Labour dated 19th February, 1965, the dispute refers to the non-payment of bonus to the members of the Union for the year 1964.

At the inquiry before me Mr. J. Weerasekera, instructed by Mr. Kaleel, appeared for the Union, while the Company was represented by Mr. S. R. de Silva of the Employers' Federation.

4. The Company used to carry on business in petroleum, insurance, estate agency and shipping of rubber, coconut fibre, citronella oil, etc. It was an Agent of the Shell Company in the Galle District. The Company lost this business in 1962 as a result of the nationalization of petroleum. The insurance work also ceased in 1952 with the setting up of the Insurance Corporation of Ceylon. With regard to agency work, the Company attended to about 14 estates, but in 1964 only one estate had dealings with the Company. With regard to shipping, the Company lost its business with the nationalization of the Port of Galle.

5. The members of the Union are the workers in the Rubber Section. They ask for a bonus in respect of the year 1964 on the ground that the Rubber Section had made a profit in the year 1964. The accounts of the Company for 1963 and 1964 were produced by Mr. R. A. Weerasinghe, the Accountant, who is a member of the firm of Turquand & Young who have been the Auditors of the Company for a number of years. These accounts show that in the year 1964 the Rubber Section worked at a loss of Rs. 130,993.86. The business in rubber consisted of the purchase of and shipping of rubber on behalf of the Commissioner of Commodity Purchase. Prior to 1963, the Commissioner of Commodity Purchase paid the Company 6 3/4 cents for every pound which it handled on his behalf. About the middle of 1963, this commission was reduced to 5 1/2 cents. The reduction of one cent a pound greatly affected the profits of the Company which used to export about 5,000 tons of rubber a year. If the Company exported 5,000 tons in the year 1964, the decrease in the amount paid by the Commissioner of Commodity Purchase in 1964 would have been over one lakh of rupees.

6. The annual bonus was usually paid in December, before Christmas: it was based on the anticipated profits of the year. In December 1963, the Accountant of the Company submitted figures which showed an anticipated profit. On these figures the Company paid the usual bonus of 3 weeks gross wages. When the accounts for the year 1963 were later audited, it was found that the Company had actually worked at a loss. In December 1964 it was ascertained that the Company had been working at a loss during the period January to December 1964, and, therefore, the Company decided that no bonus could be paid.

7. The employees in the Rubber Section earned much more than the employees in the other sections. As the work was heavy the Rubber Section employees worked overtime practically every day of the week. In addition, they worked on Sundays too, when they received double overtime. In some of the other sections, for instance: citronella, coconut fibre, etc., the employees did not work every day but were given work only when work was available, that is, 3 or 4 times a week. This fact appears to have convinced the rubber workers that their section was working at a profit, whereas the other sections were worked at a loss. Their complaint against the non-payment of a bonus was made because they were under the impression that the Rubber Section had worked at a profit.

8. Mr. de Silva cited several authorities which indicate that, when the question of payment of bonus is concerned, the Company must take into consideration the working of all the sections of the Company, and not of a small section. I agree that it would be unfair to treat the different sections as separate units and decide in each case whether bonus should be paid or not.

9. The Company's reserve for bad debts in 1963 amounted to Rs. 339,070. Out of this figure only Rs. 21,462 was recovered in 1964. In 1964, other doubtful debts were added, and the total amount was Rs. 417,081.65. It would appear that the Company loses about 100,000 every year by the non-recovery of loans given to various persons.

10. The accounts of the Company had been very badly maintained, and the Auditors had to make a number of adjustments. In some cases, after adjustment, profits were shown as losses. In spite of these errors, the Company has continued to function without a qualified Accountant.

11. The accounts for the years 1963 and 1964 indicative very clearly that the Company had been running at a loss both in 1963 and in 1964. My Award is that the employees in the Rubber Section are not entitled to bonus in the year 1964 in view of the loss suffered by the Company in 1964.

Order

By his order dated 24th October, 1964, the Honourable Minister of Labour and Housing referred to this Tribunal for settlement by arbitration under section 4 (1) of the Industrial Disputes Act Chapter 131 of the Legislative Enactments of Ceylon (1956 Revised Edition), as amended by Acts Nos. 14 of 1957, 62 of 1957 and 4 of 1962 a dispute which had arisen between the Ceylon Plantation Workers' Union (hereinafter referred to as "the union") and S. Sithambaram, the proprietor, Lemas Estate, Koslanda (hereinafter referred to as "the Proprietor"). The dispute referred to was whether the termination of services of the twelve workers whose names are stated below was justified and to what relief they were entitled:—

1. Velamma, wife of Iyasamy.
2. Iyasamy, son of Nadarasa Kavunder.
3. Govindan, son of Iyasamy.
4. Perumal, son of Iyasamy.
5. Thailamma, wife of Nagamuthu.

8. Kathan, son of Nagamuthu.
9. Paraman, son of Nagamuthu.
10. Selambaie, wife of Palaniandy.
11. Palaniandy, son of Muthualagan.
12. Karuman, son of Nagamuthu.

On being directed to do so by this Tribunal the employer submitted on 12.11.64 the statement required by regulation 21 (1) of the Industrial Disputes Regulations. The proprietor submitted that the roof of the line in which these workers were stated to have lived had been badly damaged by a gale, that therefore he offered them in their own interest, as it was dangerous for them to continue to live in the said line, alternative accommodation in which all amenities, they had enjoyed in the damaged line would be provided and that he had also promised to pay them a reasonable sum as compensation but that the workers unreasonably rejected the proprietor's offer. The proprietor further submitted that in view of the unreasonable attitude of the workers he was reluctantly compelled to terminate their services. The union failed, though directed by this Tribunal, to submit their statement as required by regulation 21 (1) of the Industrial Disputes Regulations within the time allowed or at all.

The matter was set down for inquiry on 24th March, 1965. On that day the proprietor of the estate appeared but the union did not appear. This Tribunal noticed the union on 3rd April, 1965, that if it failed to show cause within 10 days of that date why the union did not appear on the date fixed for inquiry the claims of the workers whom it represented would be dismissed. The notice was sent to the union by registered post and it has not been returned undelivered. No communication has been received from the union up to now. It is therefore presumed that the union is not interested in this dispute. I make order dismissing the matter referred to this Tribunal for arbitration.

**CEYLON GOVERNMENT RAILWAY****Control of Vehicular Traffic at Cattle Mart Road (off Baseline Road, Dema'ajoddi)—Kelani-Valley Line**

WITH effect from Thursday, 30th September, 1965, the above unprotected Level Crossing will be equipped with two 3-aspect Colour Light signals and Warning Bells fitted on separate posts for the control of Vehicular Traffic at the spot. Drivers of all vehicles shall obey these signals which will operate in accordance with the following system:—

1. At a distance of 10 feet ahead of the Colour Light on either side of the Level Crossing a white line hereinafter called the "STOP LINE" drawn across the highway is provided in conjunction with such Road Light Signals.

2. At a distance of 30 feet away on either side from the Railway Line a Colour Light Signal consisting of 3 lamps, one Red, one Amber and one Green is erected on the left of the road facing the stream of traffic which the signal is intended to control.

3. The lamps showing the Colour Light are arranged vertically, the lamp showing the Red Light being the uppermost and that showing the Green, the lowermost.

4. The sequence of the signal lights for the purpose of controlling Vehicular Traffic will be as follows:—

- Red with the word "STOP" on the lens of the lamp.
- Amber and Red together.
- Green with the word "GO" on the lens of the lamp.
- Amber for 5 seconds and over to Red as at (a).

5. The significance of the Light signal aforesaid is as follows:—

- The Red signal indicates that a Train is approaching the Level Crossing and is within 100 yards—No Vehicular Traffic is to proceed beyond the Stop Line until the Green Light is shown.
- The Amber with the Red Signal indicates an impending change in the signal from Red to Green, but does not alter the prohibiting significance of the Red Signals.
- The Green signal indicates that traffic may pass the signal and proceed straight on with due regard to the safety of other users of the highway and subject to any direction which may be given by a Police Officer, or other duly authorised person engaged in the regulation of traffic.
- The Amber signal shown alone indicates that a train is at 350 yards away approaching the Level Crossing and an impending change in the signal to Red and shall be taken as prohibiting all traffic from proceeding beyond the Stop Line.

6. When the Signal is at Amber or Red, or Amber and Red, a Warning Bell ringing continuously will give an audible signal in addition to the visual one of the approach of a train.

7. If and when these light signals be defective, Drivers of all Vehicles will cross this Level Crossing carefully obeying hand signals at the Level Crossing if they be exhibited.

1. At a distance of 10 feet ahead of the Colour Light on either side of the Level Crossing a white line hereinafter called the "STOP LINE" drawn across the highway is provided in conjunction with such Road Light Signals.



2. At a distance of 30 feet away on either side from the Railway Line a Colour Light Signal consisting of 3 lamps, one Red, one Amber and one Green is erected on the left of the road facing the stream of traffic which the signal is intended to control.

3. The lamps showing the Colour Light are arranged vertically, the lamp showing the Red Light being the uppermost and that showing the Green the lowermost.

4. The sequence of the signal lights for the purpose of controlling Vehicular Traffic will be as follows:—

- (a) Red with the word "STOP" on the lens of the lamp.
- (b) Amber and Red together.
- (c) Green with the word "GO" on the lens of the lamp.
- (d) Amber for 5 seconds and over to Red as at (a).

5. The significance of the Light signal aforesaid is as follows:—

- (a) The Red signal indicates that a Train is approaching the Level Crossing and is within 300 yards—No Vehicular Traffic is to proceed beyond the Stop Line until the Green Light is shown.
- (b) The Amber with the Red Signal indicates an impending change in the signal from Red to Green, but does not alter the prohibiting significance of the Red Signal.
- (c) The Green signal indicates that traffic may pass the signal and proceed straight on with due regard to the safety of other users of the highway and subject to any direction which may be given by a Police Officer, or other duly authorised person engaged in the regulation of traffic.
- (d) The Amber signal shown alone indicates that a train is at 350 yards away approaching the Level Crossing and an impending change in the signal to Red and shall be taken as prohibiting all traffic from proceeding beyond the Stop Line.

6. When the Signal is at Amber or Red, or Amber and Red, a Warning Bell ringing continuously will give an audible signal in addition to the visual one of the approach of a train.

7. If and when these light signals be defective, Drivers of all Vehicles will cross this Level Crossing carefully obeying hand signals at the Level Crossing if they be exhibited.

Control of Vehicular Traffic at Mahawatta Road Level Crossing at Narahenpita—Kelani-Valley Line

WITH effect from Thursday, 30th September, 1965, the above unprotected Level Crossing will be equipped with two 3-lamp Colour Light Signals and Warning Bells fitted on separate posts for the control of Vehicular Traffic at the spot. Drivers

of all vehicles shall obey these light signals which will operate in accordance with the following system:—

1. At a distance of 10 feet ahead of the Colour Light on either side of the Level Crossing a white line hereinafter called the "STOP LINE" drawn across the highway is provided in conjunction with such Road Light Signals.

2. At a distance of 30 feet away on either side from the Railway Line a Colour Light Signal consisting of 3 lamps, one Red, one Amber and one Green is erected on the left of the road facing the stream of traffic which the signal is intended to control.

3. The lamps showing the Colour Light are arranged vertically, the lamp showing the Red Light being the uppermost and that showing the Green the lowermost.

4. The sequence of the signal lights for the purpose of controlling Vehicular Traffic will be as follows:—

- (a) Red with the word "STOP" on the lens of the lamp.
- (b) Amber and Red together.
- (c) Green with the word "GO" on the lens of the lamp.
- (d) Amber for 5 seconds and over to Red as at (a).

5. The significance of the Light signal aforesaid is as follows:—

- (a) The Red signal indicates that a Train is approaching the Level Crossing and is within 300 yards—No Vehicular Traffic is to proceed beyond the Stop Line until the Green Light is shown.
- (b) The Amber with the Red Signal indicates an impending change in the signal from Red to Green, but does not alter the prohibiting significance of the Red Signal.
- (c) The Green signal indicates that traffic may pass the signal and proceed straight on with due regard to the safety of other users of the highway and subject to any direction which may be given by a Police Officer, or other duly authorised person engaged in the regulation of traffic.
- (d) The Amber signal shown alone indicates that a train is at 350 yards away approaching the Level Crossing and an impending change in the signal to Red and shall be taken as prohibiting all traffic from proceeding beyond the Stop Line.

6. When the Signal is at Amber or Red, or Amber and Red, a Warning Bell ringing continuously will give an audible signal in addition to the visual one of the approach of a train.

7. If and when these light signals be defective, Drivers of all Vehicles will cross this Level Crossing carefully obeying hand signals at the Level Crossing if they be exhibited.

## CEYLON GOVERNMENT RAILWAY

Control of Vehicular Traffic at the Railway Level Crossing  
at Frazer Avenue Road and Uswatte Road at Moratuwa

WITH effect from 11th September, 1965, the existing wooden gates at the above level crossings will be removed and MOTOR WORKED BARRIERS (of the Toll-Bar Type) will be installed. The roadway over the level crossing would be divided into a dual carriage way with Colour Light road signals for the control of vehicular traffic. Drivers of all vehicles shall obey the light signals which will operate in accordance with the following system:—

1. At a distance of 6 feet ahead of each barrier, a white line hereinafter called the STOP LINE drawn across the highway is provided in conjunction with each road light signal.

2. At a distance of 42 feet to the rear of the stop line, a Colour Light signal consisting of three lamps, one Red, one Amber and one Green, facing the stream of traffic which the signal is intended to control is erected.

3. The lamps are arranged vertically, with the lamp showing the red light being the uppermost and that showing the green light the lowermost.

4. The sequence of the signal lights for the purpose of controlling vehicular traffic will be as follows:—

- (i) Red with the word " STOP " on the lenses of the lamp.
- (ii) Amber and Red together.

(iii) Green with the word " GO " on the lense of the lamp.

(iv) Amber.

5. The significance of the light signals aforesaid is as follows:—

(i) The Red signal indicates that no vehicular traffic is to proceed beyond the stop line until the Green signal is shown.

(ii) The Amber with Red signal indicates an impending change in the signal from Red to Green; but does not alter the prohibitory significance of the Red signal.

(iii) The Green signal indicates that traffic may pass the signal and proceed straight on with due regard to the safety of other users of the highway and subject to any directions which may be given by a Police Officer or other duly authorised person engaged in the regulation of traffic.

(v) The Amber signal shown alone indicates an impending change in the signal to Red and shall be taken as prohibiting all traffic from proceeding beyond the STOP LINE.

6. If and when these light signals be defective, drivers of all vehicles shall obey hand signals exhibited at the level crossing gate.
