WHEREAS by the 21st section of "The Cemeteries Ordinance, 1862," it is enacted that the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, shall make regulations as to the fees to be paid for the performance of burial services, for digging graves, and such other services:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the 6th August, 1885, a general cemetery has been established at Anuradhapura, in the North-Central Province:

And whereas it appears expedient for the purposes of the said Ordinance to make the following regulations:

It is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make and notify for general information the regulations undermentioned, to be observed by all whom it may concern, in regard to the fees to be paid for the performance of burial services, for digging graves, and such other services within the said cemetery.

# Regulations above referred to.

1. The keeper of the cemetery shall keep order within the cemetery, and his orders shall be obeyed.

2. To prevent one funeral party being disturbed by another the cemetery-keeper

may require one funeral service to be concluded before another is commenced.

3. No grave shall be less than 4 ft. in depth or at a distance less than 4 ft. from any

4. No grave shall be opened within a year, nor vault within six months, from the last interment therein.

5. The following fees shall be paid in advance under the 21st, 22nd, and 24th clauses of "The Cemeteries Ordinance, 1862":—

Provided that paupers dying in the Government Civil Hospital shall be buried free of charge by the hospital contractor or servants under the direction of the cemetery-keeper.

Provided also that on the production of a certificate signed by a minister of the Christian religion, the senior officer of police, or any headman not lower in rank than a korala, that the friends and relatives of any deceased person are not able to pay the fees herein authorized for the digging of a grave, the keeper of the cemetery shall cause a grave to be dug and the corpse to be buried therein free of charge.

### MATRICULATION EXAMINATION OF THE UNIVERSITY LONDON.

- `HE Matriculation Examination of the University of London will be held at the Office of the Director of Public Instruction on the under-mentioned dates, commencing at 11 o'clock A.M. :-
  - (a) Monday, January 9, 1899.(b) Monday, June 12, 1899.
- 2. Candidates should notify to the Director their intention to present themselves at the examination six clear months prior to the date of such examination, in order that application may be made in time for the examination
- 3. Each candidate is required to forward to the Director, one month prior to the examination, an admission fee of £2 sterling by Bank draft or Post Office order on England payable to the Registrar of the University of London, and also a certificate of birth showing that he has completed his sixteenth year.
- 4. If a candidate withdraws his name, or fails to present himself at the examination, or fails to pass it, the fee shall not be returned to him, but he shall be allowed to enter for any subsequent *Matriculation Examination* upon payment, at every such entry, of an additional fee of £1 sterling. The certificate of age need not again be produced.
  - 5. The following regulations from the "University Calendar" are published for general information:—

Candidates will not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the following subjects, according to the details specified under the several heads:—

(1) Latin (two papers); (2) English (two papers); (3) Mathematics (two papers); (4) General Elementary Science (two papers); (5) any one of the following languages or Sciences:—Greek, French, German, Sanskrit,† Arabic,† Elementary Mechanics, Elementary Chemistry, Elementary Sound, Heat and Light, Elementary Magnetism and Electricity, Elementary Botany (one paper).

The following are the particulars of the foregoing subjects of examination:—

### I.—LATIN.

A portion to be selected by the Senate one year and a half previously from the under-mentioned works.

Virgil.—The Æneid. Horace.—The Odes.

Sallust.—The Conspiracy of Catiline, or the War with Jugurtha.

Cæsar.—The Gallic War.

Livy.

-De Senectute or De Amicitia Orationes in Catilinam; Pro Lege Manilia, Pro Archia, Pro Balbo, Pro M. Marcello. Cicero.-

-Metamorphoses, Epistles, Tristia, Heroides.

One paper shall be set containing passages from the prescribed books to be translated into English with ques-

tions on Grammar, History and Geography arising out of them.

A second paper shall be set containing easy passages to be translated into English from Latin books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin.§

## II.- ENGLISH.

English Grammar and Composition, with elementary questions on the history of the language and literature (one paper)

History of England to the end of the Seventeenth Century, with the Geography relating thereto (one paper).

### III.—MATHEMATICS.

- 1. Arithmetic.—The ordinary rules and processes of arithmetic, including proportion, vulgar and decimal fractions, extraction of the square root.
- -Addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of algebraical quantities; reduction and Algebra.manipulation of algebraical fractions; arithmetical and geometrical progression; simple equations and easy quadratic equations, with questions involving their use.
  - Geometry.

The subjects of the first four books of Euclid and simple deductions.

### IV .- GENERAL ELEMENTARY SCIENCE.

Note.—The examination in the subjects referred to in the following Syllabus will be more elementary than that in the corresponding subjects included at Matriculation in optional Mechanies, Chemistry, Heat and Light or Electricity and Magnetism.

In particular the subjects of the present Syllabus will be treated wherever possible from an experimental poin

of view, and numerical examples or problems will be restricted to very simple calculations.

Candidates will be expected to have performed or witnessed simple experiments in illustration of the subjects mentioned in this Syllabus.

No credit will be given for more than one of these subjects.

<sup>†</sup> Candidates desiring to be examined in Sanskrit or Arabic must give at least four calendar months' notice to the Director of Public Instruction.

Special stress is laid on accuracy in the answers to the grammar questions and on the correct rendering of English into Latin.

### 5.—Arabic.

V.—Section 2. Optional Sciences.;

The following Syllabuses are intended to indicate the general scope and character of the examination (which will be of an elementary character), without being exhaustive of all parts of the respective subjects thereof. Candidates will be expected to show a general acquaintance with the apparatus by which the elementary principles of the subjects comprised in the Syllabuses are illustrated and applied.

The general characteristics of metals as a class. The chief sources and properties of silver, copper, mercury. lead, aluminium, iron, zinc, calcium, and sodium, and of their principal oxides, carbonates, sulphates, chlorides. and nitrates.

Resolution and composition of velocities, accelerations, &c.

Elementary notions of mass and momentum.

Elementary notions of force as measured by rate of change of momentum.

Ramurculaceze, Papaneraceze, Cruciferze, Violaceze, Caryophyllacze, Leguminosze, Rosacze, Umbelliferze. Compositæ, Scrophulariceæ, Labiateæ, Primulaceæ, Cupuliferæ, Liliaceæ, Gramineæ.

The functions of the parts of the flower, and adaptations for cross- and self-pollination; fruits and seeds, their relation to the parts of the flower, and the provision for the dispersal of seeds.

The elementary facts in the nutrition and respiration of a green flowering plant, and the structure of its parts,

in so far as is necessary to explain these facts.

The description of a flowering plant (whether in whole or in part) in technical language. The plant need not belong to any of the above-mentioned orders.

N.B.—Candidates are warned that Botany being partly practical, cannot be held in Ceylon.

In each of the subjects Latin (1), English (2), Mathematics (3), and General Elementary Science (4), two papers shall be given, each of three hours' duration. In the fifth subject (optional languages and sciences) one paper shall be given, of three hours' duration.

A certificate of good conduct need not again be produced.

The following extracts from the University Calendar are published for general information:

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidates to pass, viva voce questions to any candidate in the subjects in which they are appointed to examine.

Candidates shall be examined in the following subjects: -(1) Latin; (2) either the French or the German

Language : (3) English Language, Literature, and History; (4) Mathematics and Greek.

CLASSICS.

The Latin Language. - Two Latin subjects, one in prose the other in verse; to be selected two years previously by the Senate from the works of the under-mentioned authorso:

History.—History of Rome to the death of Augustus.

The papers in Latin and Roman History shall contain passages of the specified authors, with simple passages of Latin from books not previously named, to be translated into English; short passages of English to be translated into Latin;† and questions in Grammar, History, and Geography.

Greek +-One Greek subject to be selected two years previously by the Senate from the works of the undermentioned authors, together with easy questions in Grammar :-

The English Language, Literature, and History.—The grammatical structure of the language: composition. Other special subjects to be defined two years previously.

A general knowledge of English History, with a special study of a limited period to be prescribed in each year as one of the special subjects; such period, as a rule, coinciding with the defined period of English literature.

The French or the German Language.—Translation into English, with questions in Grammar.

### MATHEMATICS

Arithmetic.—The ordinary rules of Arithmetic; vulgar and decimal fractions; the rule of three and its applications; simple and compound interest; present value, discount, and annuities; extraction of the square root.

Algebra.—The ordinary rules of Algebra; reduction and manipulation of algebraical fractions; ratio, proportion, and variation; permutations and combinations; arithmetical and geometrical progressions; simple and quadratic equations; determination of common factors; the theory of indices; the nature and use of logarithms.

The relations and properties of similar rectilinear figures; the elementary properties of the plane including those of the angles made by planes with right lines and with each other; the elementary properties of the sphere, including those of the great and small circles on the surfaces of spheres; the mensuration of the simpler plane and solid figures, including that of the circle, the sphere, the cylinder, and the cone; elements of co-ordinate Geometry, in rectangular and polar co-ordinates, as far as the equations and properties of the right line and circle.

Trigonometry.—The different measurements of angles, and the ordinary relations of their trigonometrical, ratios; the elementary formulæ connecting the trigonometrical ratios of two or more angles; the solution of the several cases of plane triangles, including the determination of their areas; the determination of the heights and distances of inaccessible objects.
