21A.—Whenever an officer entitled to a pension under this Minute is also entitled to a pension from Imperial funds or from the funds of some other Government, the maximum pension, which may be granted under this Minute, shall in ordinary circumstances be such as when added to such other pension does not exceed two-thirds of the highest salary drawn by such officer at any time in the course of his service.

### The Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration Warrant.

#### VICTORIA R.I.

WHEREAS it is Our desire to recognize the long and meritorious services of Commissioned Officers of Our Colonial Auxiliary Forces, and of others who shall be eligible under the conditions herein laid down. We do hereby constitute and create, as a reward for these services, a new Decoration, which shall be designated "The Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration."

It is Our Will and Pleasure that this Decoration shall be conferred on the Commissioned Officers of all organized Military Forces, except the Permanent Forces, serving in Our Colonies and Dependencies, or raised for Our Service in countries under Our protection, whether designated as Militia or Volunteers, or otherwise, subject to the following rules:—

The period of service requisite to qualify for this Decoration shall be 20 years' commissioned service. Half the time served in the ranks of any such forces shall be reckoned as qualifying service.

Service on the West Coast of Africa shall reckon double as qualifying service.

Service rendered partly in the Local Forces of one Colony or Protectorate, and partly in the Local Forces of another Colony or Protectorate, or partly in the Local Forces of one or more Colonies or Protectorates, and partly in the Volunteer Force of Great Britain, shall be reckoned as qualifying service for the Decoration, provided that no Officer shall be eligible unless at least half of his qualifying service has been rendered in the Militia or Volunteer Forces of one or more Colonies or Rrotectorates; service on the West Coast of Africa counting double.

Service on the Permanent Staff shall not reckon as qualifying service for this Decoration.

Service qualifying for this Decoration shall also count towards the qualifying service necessary for "The Volunteer Officers' Decoration," provided that no Officer shall be eligible for such Decoration, unless 10 years' commissioned service, or the equivalent thereof, has been spent in the Volunteer Force of Great Britain.

It is Our further Will and Pleasure that this Decoration shall be conferred under such regulations as to grant, forfeiture, and restoration, as may from time to time be submitted by the Governor-General of Our Dominion of Canada, or by the Governors of Our Colonies and Dependencies, or by Our representatives in countries under Our protection, and as may be approved by Our Principal Secretary of State for War upon the recommendation of Our Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies. The regulations aforesaid shall, as far as possible, correspond with those laid down for "The Volunteer Officers' Decoration."

Our Warrant of the 24th May, 1894, save and except so much of it as relates to Our Indian Empire, is hereby cancelled.

### The Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal Warrant.

#### VICTORIA, R.I.

WHEREAS it is Our desire to recognize the long and meritorious services of members of Our Colonial Auxiliary Forces, and of others who shall be eligible under the conditions herein laid down, We do hereby constitute and create, as a reward for these services, a new Medal, which shall be designated "The Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal."

It is Our Will and Pleasure that this Medal shall be awarded to the Members of all organized Military Forces, except the Permanent Forces, serving in Our Colonies and Dependencies, or raised for Our Service in countries under Our protection, whether designated as Militia or Volunteers, or otherwise, subject to the following rules:—

The period of service requisite to qualify for this Medal shall be 20 years. Service on the West Coast of Africa shall reckon double as qualifying service.

Service rendered partly in the Local Forces of one Colony or Protectorate and partly in the Local Forces of another Colony or Protectorate, or partly in the Local Forces of one or more Colonies or Protectorates, and partly in the Volunteer Force of Great Britain, shall be reckoned as qualifying service for the Medal, provided that no Officer or man shall be eligible unless at least half his sevice has been rendered in the Militia or Volunteer Forces of one or more Colonies or Protectorates; service on the West Coast of Africa counting double.

Service on the Permanent Staff shall not reckon qualifying service for this Medal.

Service qualifying for this Medal shall also count towards the necessary qualifying service for "The Volunteer Long Service Medal," provided that no Officer or man shall be eligible for such Medal unless 10 years' service has been spent in the Volunteer Force of Great Britain.

An Officer who has served in the ranks of a Volunteer Corps in Great Britain, or of the Militia or Volunteers of a Colony or Protectorate, but who is not qualified for the Colonial Auxiliary Forces

Officers' Decoration, shall, on completing 20 years' service in all, be eligible to receive the Long Service Medal, but shall surrender it if subsequently the aforesaid Decoration shall be conferred upon him.

It is Our further Will and Pleasure that this Medal shall be awarded under such regulations as to issue, surrender, forfeiture, and restoration, as may from time to time be submitted by the Governor-General of Our Dominion of Canada, or by the Governors of our Colonies and Dependencies, or by Our representatives in countries under Our protection, and as may be approved by Our Principal Secretary of State for War upon the recommendation of Our Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies. The regulations aforesaid shall, as far as possible, correspond with those laid down for "The Volunteer Long Service Medal."

Volunteer Long Service Medals already issued to Colonial Forces under the authority of Our Warrant of the 13th June, 1896, shall be considered equivalent to "The Colonial Auxiliary Forces

Long Service Medal."

Our Warrant of the 13th June, 1896, save and except so much of it as relates to Our Indian Empire, is hereby cancelled.

THE following copy of a letter received from Her Britannic Majesty's Acting Agent and Consul-General at Zanzibar, transmitting a copy of a Notification issued by the Government of His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar, re-imposing on and after 15th September, 1899, a duty of 5 per cent. ad valorem on all merchandize, with the exception of a few commodities particularly specified, imported into the Islands of Zanzibar and Pemba, is published for general information.

Notification referred to.

On and after 15th September a 5 per cent. ad valorem duty will be levied on all Imports from Foreign Countries.

Coins, Coals, Hippopotamus-teeth, Ivory, Rhinoceros horns and hide, Rubber, and Tortoise-

shell will alone be exempted from this duty.

Goods (on which duty is not at present charged) bond fide at sea on or before the 14th September will be exempted from duty.

THE following additional regulations have been framed in order to facilitate the work in the Customs House in connection with the abolition of the Free Port :-

Goods will be taken charge of by the Customs Authorities on due application being made on a proper printed form supplied for the purpose, and stored in warehouses set apart for such goods. These warehouses will not necessarily form part of the Custom premises, and the Collector of Customs. shall have full power to alter their site, from time to time, as necessity may arise.

The importer of goods intended for transhipment, or his agent, shall declare them as such within 48 hours after arrival of the vessel, in the same manner and form and containing the same particulars, as are required for the entry of goods to be delivered for local consumption. Such goods

shall be liable to a warehouse rent, as per tariff, during all the time they are thus kept in warehouse.

All reasonable facilities will be given merchants for handling or shipping goods lying in the warehouse, rent to accrue thereon according to the balance of goods left in hand after each fractional delivery. Goods thus declared for transhipment can be removed into town for local consumption on

payment of the full warehouse rent due, plus five per cent. duty.

Goods in warehouses shall be under the absolute control of the Customs Authorities, and the Collector of Customs shall have the right to detain the goods of any person or firm who shall omit or refuse to pay any money due for rent or any other charges due on goods stored in any of the said warehouses.

Rent for all goods placed in a warehouse will be charged per week, and part of a week will be

charged as a whole week; the rent will commence from the date of warehousing.

The Customs Authorities will not hold themselves responsible for any loss or damage suffered by goods while in warehouse, except in case of culpable negligence on the part of their employes, nor will they be held responsible for the contents of packages when the outward condition on delivery is the same as when the packages were first received in warehouse.

Permission will be given for the opening of packages for appraisement, extracting of samples, &c., but all packages so opened, without their condition having been questioned, will be considered as taken delivery of, and no claim for damages subsequently discovered will be allowed. Packages that have once been opened will be in the warehouse at the risk of the owner.

### Rules of the District Committee of the Buddhist Temporalities.

RULES of the District Committee Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance, Colombo, made under section 13 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1889, sanctioned by the Provincial Committee under section 5 of Ordinance No. 17 of 1895:—

1. Three members of the District Committee shall form a quorum.

- 2. In the absence of the President one of the members present shall be selected to preside, who shall have for the time being all the rights and privileges vested in the President.
  - A member absenting himself from three consecutive general meetings ipso facto cease to be a member.
- 4. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the Committee a meeting of the remaining members held after giving public notice in a Sinhalese newspaper shall elect a duly qualified person to fill the vacancy.
- 5. The meetings shall be held at the office of the Committee or at any other place after due notice of time and place being given to members.
- 6. The Committee shall appoint one of their members as Secretary, and shall employ as many clerks and messengers as may be found necessary.
- 7. The Secretary shall enter in a book the business to be placed before each meeting, and shall record in another book the minutes of the proceedings of each meeting, and the minutes shall be confirmed from time to time, the President signing the confirmation.
