

"This respiratory tract viral infection will infect children from the age of seven or eight months up to seven or eight years," he said.

There is no need to admit patients with mild symptoms to hospitals. With the mild symptoms, those infected children can manage at home, Dr. Perera added.

"It is better to use masks if there are symptoms, and it is better not to send those children to school or daycare centres. If the infected children are having difficulty in breathing, vomiting, or are dehydrated, it is better to go to a hospital," he said.

If we checked those infected children, they might test positive for influenza and other viral infections like para-influenza and adenoviruses. Even after the infection, the children might get a post-viral cough for a longer period, which can spread



WHY IS PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION DRAGGING ITS FEET ON SERVING JUSTICE TO

SHANI AND RA

The Public Service Commission (PSC) reportedly has blocked two retired senior public officers, their due salaries/ pensions allegedly on personal grudges despite their eligibility to draw their dues.

The Public Service Commission (PSC), the apex authority handling appointments, transfers, promotions and disciplinary conduct of all public officers in the country is accused of taking revenge against those whom they believe are a threat to politicians and their stooges when requests were made seeking approval to obtain stalled salaries/ pensions.

Former Director CID, SSP Shani Abeysekera and former Director Preventive Customs Ranjan Kanagasabai have come under severe harassment at the hands of the PSC over the past two years; depriving their salaries/pensions although legally they are entitled to draw their respective dues.

"What is the reason for the PSC to hold back our dues once our names have been cleared from courts? It is clear that they are pursuing personal grudges against us, as

we have taken action against politicians and their stooges who were engaged in corrupt or criminal activities," both SSP Abeysekera and Ranjan Kanagasabai told the Daily Mirror.

SSP Abeysekera was interdicted from the police service on January 7, 2020, on an alleged accusation of bringing disrepute to Sri Lanka Police. But, the Police neither held a preliminary inquiry regarding the matter nor has it issued a charge sheet against this individual to date.


On February 24, 2020, Abeysekera had requested the Police Commission and the IGP to reinstate him or pay half his salary which was his entitlement, as there was no way for him to maintain his family without the income.


According to the Establishment Code, if a person is involved in terrorist activities, drugrelated crimes, mischief of public property or charged in a court of law for a criminal offense and if an indictment has been served by the High Court, half the person's salary can be withheld until his name is cleared.

As SSP Abeysekera had no such allegations levelled against him, the Police Commission, by letter dated May 5, 2020, had recommended paying Abeysekera half his salary. However, till February 2021, he was not paid that amount, but later a combined half salary had been paid until he went on retirement on June 30, 2021.

"On June 29, 2021, I submitted my intended pension papers to the IGP, and in response I was requested to submit a certified copy of my birth certificate. Although I submitted the necessary documents, on July 7, 2022, I was informed

two months and within six months the report should be submitted.

With regard to the case associated with SSP Abeysekera the authorised officer has not held a preliminary inquiry even to date; and that period is over 35 months since his arrest.

Although the Senior Assistant Secretary first informed the Tribunal that there is a charge sheet against the complainant, the former when further questioned informed the Appeal Tribunal

that the Law and Order Ministry has sent a report on the complainant to which the Hon. Judge has said that a report cannot be considered as charge sheet.

A similar harassment has been meted out against the former Director Preventive, Sri Lanka Customs Ranjan Kanagasabai by the PSC.

Kanagasabai was arrested (Case No: HCB/1967/2013) on January 3, 2013, on purported bribery charges for soliciting and accepting a bribe from a businessman to release a container he had detained. This businessman is alleged to be a friend of Justice (Rtd) Balapatabendi,

the then Chairman Bribery Commission. According to the court documents this businessman admitted during the cross examination of the said bribery case, that he telephoned **Bribery Commission Chairman Balapatabendi** on his personal mobile number and his residence landline number before Kanagasabai was fixed regarding the

The learned Judge in his order has stated, "When all of this evidence is taken together into consideration, I have come to the conclusion that the accused accepted a bribe from the virtual complainant is not evidence that could be accepted in any manner. And according to all these facts, I have decided the accusation that the accused has

On January 22, 2021, Kanagasabai was acquitted of all charges. It is alleged that the PSC on personal vendetta has blocked Kanagasabai from receiving his salary and pension arrears as the latter's counsel has proved in court that Balapatabendi had a hand in his purported arrest on bribery charges during his tenure as the head of the Bribery Commission.

"In order to implicate me in bribery charges, the then Bribery Commission under Balapatabendi produced documents of questionable authenticity of the investigation and served indictment without adhering to proper procedure.


All attempts to contact PSC Secretary Daya Senerath to find out why the Commission has failed to approve Kanagasabai's request, were futile, as he did not want to talk to the media.

When an application was sent under the Right to Information Act on March 28th to find out why the PSC is delaying granting approvals to pay Kanagasabai, his entitlement, the Information Officer, Senior Additional Secretary R.K.R.R. Ranaveera by letter dated June 6, refused to provide the information. An appeal was then made to the Designated Officer, Additional Secretary (Operations) H.A.D.D. Jayasekera. By letter dated August 9, 2022, the Designated Officer too refused to release the information that was sought by this newspaper.





FIFA WORLD CUP AND HYPOCRISY IN QATAR

he world's biggest extravaganza, the quadrennial (four-yearly) FIFA World Cup, has begun in Qatar. It's been 12 years since it was announced that this year's World Cup (2022) would be held in Qatar - a country with a population of a little below three million people which follows tough Islamic law.

This particular World Cup, has unfortunately been dogged by controversy. Rather unfortunately in the West, more particularly in Europe, many have tried to bury the event under a storm of controversy accusing the host nation of disgraceful working conditions inflicted on migrant workers, its human rights record, deprivation of women's rights and mistreatment of people in gay relationships. Some even question FIFA for permitting Iran to compete at the tournament.

O tempora, O mores, what hypocrisy! Haven't other event-hosting nations had even worse human rights records?

In 1934, Benito Mussolini's fascist regime in Italy and in 1978, the brutal Argentine dictatorship hosted the event with the blessings of FIFA. In 1950 Switzerland, a small nation and the mother nation of 'money laundering' so-to-say, hosted the World Cup. Even worse in 1994, the World Cup was hosted by the

Yet, just two decades earlier, the US used chemical weapons in its war against the Vietnamese people. Vietnam estimated as many as 2,000,000 civillians and some 1,100,000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong fighters were killed.

Even worse, the US remains the only country in the world to have used atomic weapons on purely civillian targets - the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki during World War II. The explosions immediately killed an estimated 80,000 people in Hiroshima. Tens of thousands more would later die of radiation exposure. Three days later, a second B-29 dropped another A-bomb on Nagasaki, killing an estimated 40,000 people, according to history.com.

Western nations accuse Qatar of disgraceful working conditions inflicted on workers who built the tournament's infrastructure. Unfortunately, these nations which present themselves as 'citadels of democracy, human rights and workers rights' tend to overlook their own role regarding workers' rights. They easily overlook the slave trade - where hundreds of thousands of African men, women and children were encircled and forcibly transported to the US to work as slaves on plantations in the US and the Caribbean. They choose to forget Britain shipped thousands of desperately poor Tamils from South India to create tea plantations in Lanka's hill country. The workers had no quarters when they reached the cold hill country.

Thousands of these 'migrant workers' died of cold and malaria. They were also paid slave wages. When 'housing' was ultimately provided, two to three families shared a 12 x 2 ft room, and worse with no running water or toilet facilities.

Despite their own culpability, high flyers and cheap political leaders of these nations continue to point the finger at other countries, not acknowledging past crimes and refusing to recompense countries and people who continue to suffer their rapacious deeds.


We do not condone exploitation of labour, infringement of women's rights or suppression of LGBT groups. But cannot feel, based on facts, the strident condemnation of Qatar stems from jealousy at that small nation's riches.

For instance, Qatar had a GDP per capita of \$124,100 as of 2017, while in United Kingdom, the GDP per capita is \$44,300 as of 2017.

The economy of Qatar is one of the richest in the world based on GDP per capita, ranking generally among the top ten richest countries on world rankings for 2015 and 2016 as per data compiled by the World Bank, the United Nations, and the International Monetary Fund (IMF). We do not deny that housing conditions provided to migrant workers in Qatar are not of the highest quality. They definitely leave much

Sadly, the world economic system forces the poorer classes to accept these conditions. What is sad is that the US and the West while blaming Qatar, do not offer hope to the suffering masses in Africa and Asia which forces them to seek greener pastures in lands, believed to 'flow with milk and honey'. The present migrants' drownings off the coast of Britain and Europe, and the incarcerating of Latin American migrants desperately seeking employment in these US smacks of the pot calling the kettle names.

Let's cut the crap. It cannot be right for World's Richest 1% to own twice as much as the bottom 90% as Oxfam International reports. Instead of blaming one nation or the other, let's try to spread Earth's resources more equitably.

THAT TWITTER OURNALISM



It was in 2009 that I first started using Twitter. It had been around for a while by then. During those days, the main network for instant news updates was SMS. I was linked to a group of journalists who reported on the conflict via one such group. I was also helping out in a volunteer capacity with a business venture that was based on SMS news updates. The latter crashed; the former did so too but with far more dangerous consequences.

> We all were aware that the SMS group had potential informants. What we did not know was the length they would go to. A message that was circulated through the group was instantly shared with military intelligence who were able to easily figure out the original details had come from a small military detachment in the Northwest which had come under attack in the middle of the night. With the help of the informant within the group not only was the source compromised but all of us stopped posting on to the SMS group. Thus went a valuable information source.

Twitter quickly became my-goto-platform for breaking news and information. Using applications like Tweetdeck, I could easily curate it to groups, hashtags and feeds that were like a tailormade news ticker for me. For the last five years or more I have had Tweetdeck running, mostly in the background when I work.

I have had very little issues with disinformation and misinformation and also online threats. I credit years of reporting the conflict for this; like my experience with that SMS group. Disinformation, misinformation were part and parcel of the game as was bold print of the same.

Threats, physical and otherwise were common. The epithet 'traitor' was more common than my own surname linked to me. So, by the time I transitioned, I was used to all this.

But the vectors of online threats and dangers are really high on Twitter as with other social media platforms. My research work in fact centres around this - how do journalists navigate these dangers and keep working.

Now that Twitter, my personal, free, news ticker is in chaos, I have been left with looking for alternatives. The Elon Musk takeover of Twitter has been followed by mass disruptions with staff leaving and all kinds of changes being announced. There were a few that came through as I was writing this.

Last week there was fear that the platform could be gone within days. I was one of those who downloaded my Twitter archive and also joined an alternative platform. But I have not left Twitter yet and am unlikely to do so, at least any time soon.

It is still my go to platform for info, in the real time from the world cup to the minor hailstorms that have taken liking to my current neighbourhood. I am still searching for that alternative that can fill the Twitter journalism groove. Again, as I was typing this, Twitter was first notification of an earthquake near Solomon Islands

I lived in this very universe before Twitter. Back then it was slower and by extension a bit more controllable.

The digital replication has been like been in a digital storm of locust 24/7. My job right now is to train media professionals to safely deal with this storm.

To cut to the chase, despite the mass migration out of Twitter, it remains the go to pint for me. I could join the desertions, but for now, I am one of those who is hoping the platform survives this chaos.



AS RESCUERS COMB RUBBLE FOR SURVIVORS

he death toll from the earthquake that shook the Indonesian island of Java leapt to at least 268 on Tuesday as more bodies were found beneath collapsed buildings.

Cianjur regional disaster mitigation agency said on its Instagram site that the number of dead increased from 162 reported the night before. Another 151 people remain missing and more than 1,000 have been injured.

The city of Cianjur, south of Jakarta, was near the epicenter of the 5.6 magnitude earthquake that hit Monday afternoon. The temblor sent terrified residents fleeing into the streets, some covered in blood and debris, and caused buildings around the rural area to collapse.

With hospitals already overwhelmed, patients lay on stretchers and cots in tents set up outside, with intravenous drips in their arms as they awaited urther treatment.

Many of the dead were public school students who had finished their classes for the day and were taking extra lessons at Islamic schools when the buildings collapsed, West Java Gov. Ridwan Kamil said.

Five dead, 40 injured in Iraq gas tank explosion

Five people died and 40 were injured when a gas tank exploded and sparked a fire in a student dormitory in northern Iraq,

The explosion in Dohuk is the second LPG tank explosion to occur in Iraqi Kurdistan in less than a week(AFP)

authorities said Tuesday. The blast hit Monday night when a rooftop gas tank leaked at a building housing the student accommodation and a bakery in the Kurdish city of Dohuk. "The gas leaked, reaching the students' rooms, and police arrived to evacuate them," Dohuk's governor, Ali Tatar, told AFP. "Unfortunately at that moment, the explosion occurred."

A student, a bakery worker and three policemen who arrived as part of the emergency response were killed, including the unit's deputy director, Tatar said.

It was the second explosion of a liquefied petroleum gas tank in Iraqi Kurdistan in less than a week. Last Thursday, 15 people died in Sulaimaniyah when an LPG tank exploded and caused the collapse of a building.



Iran retaliates against UN nuclear resolution: Media

Tehran has for the first time started enriching uranium to 60% fissile purity at the Fordow facility, Iranian media reported on Tuesday. Such a move would be seen as a response to a critical resolution adopted by the UN's nuclear watchdog last

Iran is already enriching uranium at Natanz, its other major production site, to below weapons-grade 90% enrichment, but well above the 3.67% limit specified in the 2015 Iran Nuclear

Deal, or JCPOA. The US abandoned the deal with Tehran during the administration of Donald Trump, leading to its erosion and effective collapse. Other reported moves by Iran include upgrading cascade lines with more advanced gas centrifuges to boost production capacity at Fordow, as well as firing up additional chains at Natanz.

Tehran's action was described as retaliation in a resolution passed last Thursday by the Board of Directors of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA).

Russia threatens to cut gas exports due to Ukraine's theft

RT.COM, 22 NOV, 2022-Russia's energy giant Gazprom said on Tuesday that Ukraine was diverting natural gas supplies transiting to Moldova, and the company has threatened to curtail deliveries through a key pipeline in response.

"The volume of gas supplied by Gazprom to the 'Sudzha' gas measuring station (GMS) for transit to Moldova via Ukraine exceeds the physical volume transmitted at the border of Ukraine with Moldova," Gazprom's statement read.

Moldova paid for some November gas supplies on Monday, according to Gazprom, which said that Kiev had kept 52.52 million cubic metres of gas meant for Moldova on its territory.

The Russian energy company further warned that if the transit imbalance persists then it would begin slashing gas supply to the Sudzha GMS for transit via Ukraine from 10 am (7am GMT) on November 28, "in the amount of the daily underderlivery."

The Sudzha transit line through Ukraine remains the only route to supply Russian gas to western and central European countries after the Nord Stream network was damaged by a



suspicious explosion in September.

Meanwhile, land-locked Moldova, which has been suffering massive blackouts lately, has called for international assistance as soaring energy costs and skyrocketing inflation are set to put a huge strain on consumers in one of Europe's poorest countries.

in their World Cup opener yesterday, kicking off their Group D campaign with a strong performance against one of the pre-tournament

Tunisia have never reached the World Cup knockouts in five previous attempts but Jalel Kadri's side will be encouraged both with a point at Education City Stadium and with how they performed against the fancied Danes.

Since Kadri took charge of the team in January Tunisia have only lost to Brazil and they frustrated Denmark in front of thousands of noisy North Africans.

Christian Eriksen was largely anonymous on his return to major tournament football after nearly dying on the pitch at the European Championship last year, wilting in the face of ferocious defending. Denmark had come into the match as favourites but Tunisia tore into

their more illustrious opponents from kick-off, flying into tackles.

The massed ranks of Tunisians in the stands created a crackling atmosphere and they cheered every tackle and clearance.

The Danes began to get a foothold in the game but talisman Eriksen struggled to shake off the attentions of Tunisia's well-organised backline, and although they got into dangerous positions any attacks were comfortably snuffed out. The Tunisians came closest to taking the lead in the opening period, Copenhagen-born Anis Ben Slimane straying offside before slotting past Kasper Schmeichel, who then made sure the scores were level at the break with a wonderful stop. CB chief says no going back to old ways; urges politicians to walk the talk

- Calls for consistent policies; says can't go back to old ways once IMF deal clinched
- Stresses need to end repeating cycles of balance of payment deficits once and for all
- Urges need for Cabinet and Parliament to work towards one direction to resurrect economy

Central Bank Governor Dr. Nandalal Weerasinghe yesterday stressed the need for the country's political authorities to be consistent with their plans to pull the island nation out of the ongoing economic crisis, so that the cycle of economic mismanagement can be broken once and for all.

Dr. Weerasinghe asserted the need for the higher-ups to be consistent with the policy decisions already taken and ensure they do not go back to old ways and practices once the International Monetary Fund (IMF) deal is clinched.

"What happens all the time is that they (politicians) are not consistent in their activities, specially with the macro-fiscal framework. We need to maintain consistency over a period of time," said Dr. Weerasinghe during a forum that was organised to celebrate Sri Lanka Internet Day 2022, yesterday in Colombo.

"Whenever we go to the IMF, we agree to go towards a certain path and once the programme is over, we go back to old ways and end up in repeating cycles of balance of payment deficits," he added.

Dr. Weerasinghe stressed on the importance to understand who has fiscal authority and the roles of the Cabinet and Parliament, so that all sections are working in one direction towards achieving a single goal.

According to him, this time around,

the majority of the political parties appear to have identified the need for fiscal consolidation and the ongoing debates in Parliament show that all sides are determined to increase government revenue and reduce the deficit, so that the ongoing economic crisis can be tackled at the earliest.

"This is a positive that I see. Going forward, if this continues, I think we can see a positive outcome," he said.

Sri Lanka is facing its worst economic crisis at the moment, as a result of decades-long mishandling of the economy. The latest of such blunders include the 2019 tax cuts, excessive money printing through the pandemic, ban on chemical fertilisers and botched rupee devaluation in March this year.

Sri Lanka has already gone to the IMF 16 times, after printing money to boost domestic demand and losing foreign reserves.

The initial Cabinet nod has been granted for the proposed new Anti-Corruption Act, which includes provisions to protect whistleblowers along with provisions to carry out investigations



independently. "I presented an anti-corruption bill to the Cabinet of Ministers and the Cabinet endorsed it as a policy decision," Justice, Prisons Affairs and Constitutional Reforms Minister Wijeyadasa Rajapakshe told the weekly post-Cabinet media briefing held in Colombo yesterday.

The minister pointed out that the current Commission to Investigate Allegations of

Bribery or Corruption (CIABOC) has lost public confidence, as many of the complaints go unaddressed, with no accountability.

Therefore, he noted that the new draft legislation would address all shortcomings in the current commission by

CB widely expected to maintain policy rates tomorrow

Pressure is gradually building on CB to support faster recovery and reboot growth

The Central Bank is widely expected to keep the policy interest rates at the current levels while skewing a bit more towards a dovish stance at the monetary policy meeting scheduled for today, after the softer than expected inflation prints, which came during the last three weeks.

This year's eighth and final monetary policy announcement is expected on Thursday (24) morning.

In a precursor to what could be expected at the upcoming policy meeting, Central Bank Governor Dr. Nandalal Weerasinghe last week said interest rates might have peaked and the Central Bank may intervene to ease the liquidity conditions in the interbank money market, which could

put downward pressure on short-term

"The recent rise in interest rates should turn around because the inflation has turned around," Weerasinghe told a post-budget forum, filled with bankers and financial sector executives, last week.

The short-term government securities yields promptly responded to the governor's remarks, as some were looking for a pivot in the interest rates policy amid easing inflation. As of late, calls have been growing louder to support economic recovery and growth before the downturn becomes entrenched, causing irreparable damage to the economy.

After aggressively raising the key policy rates, taking the cumulative hike in rates to 950 basis points this year through July, the Central Bank paused to see if its actions were sufficient to break the relentless cycle of runaway

As the International Monetary Fund and World Bank have highlighted the importance of strengthening the resolution framework to strengthen the financial sector safety nets, the proposed Banking (Special Provisions) Act is to be drawn up as a supplement to Banking Act No. 30 of 1988, introducing provisions for resolution of licensed banks, deposit insurance and winding up/liquidation of licensed banks.

Indices recover after six sessions

The ASPI closed in green as a result of price gains in counters such as Expolanka Holdings, Lanka IOC and Ceylinco Insurance with the turnover crossing Rs 1.5 Bn. A similar behaviour was witnessed in the S&P SL20. High net worth and institutional investor participation was noted in Sunshine Holdings, Commercial Bank and John Keells Holdings. Mixed interest was observed in Lanka IOC, Expolanka Holdings and Dialog Axiata whilst retail interest was noted in Sri Lanka



Telecom, First Capital Treasuries and The Colombo Fort Land & Building. Foreign participation in the market activity remained at subdued levels

with foreigners closing as net buyers. Food, Beverage & Tobacco sector was the top contributor to the market turnover (due to Sunshine Holdings and Lankem Developments) whilst the sector index gained 3.50%. The share price of Sunshine Holdings gained Rs 1.10 (3.44%) to close at Rs 33.10. The share price of Lankem Developments recorded a gain of Rs 5.20 (21.31%) to close at Rs 29.60.

Energy sector was the second highest contributor to the market turnover (due to Lanka IOC) whilst the sector index increased by 11.89%. The share price of Lanka IOC increased by Rs 20.50 (13.02%) to

close at Rs 178.00.

Expolanka Holdings and Ceylinco Insurance were also included amongst the top turnover contributors. The share price of Expolanka Holdings moved up by Rs 14.25 (11.45%) to close at Rs 138.75. The share price of Ceylinco Insurance appreciated by Rs 146.00 (7.47%) to close at Rs 2,100.00.

Furthermore, Office Equipment announced a first interim cash dividend of Rs. 10 per share.

Initial Cabinet...

Therefore, a specialist team led by President's Counsel Srarath Jayamanna and former director of the CIABOC have already drafted this new anticorruption bill, in accordance with the concepts of 2003 United Nations Convention against Corruption. Moving forward, the CIABOC will be accountable to the general public and the public," he elaborated.

Highlighting some of the new features of the proposed legislation, Rajapakshe said it contains provisions to protect whistleblowers while allowing the commission to carry out investigations without any interference with the full financial independence. Further, he revealed that Declaration of Assets and Liabilities Law, No. 1 of 1975 would also be amended to make it mandatory for the president, Provincial Council members, members of independent commissions as well as officials in Sri Lankan diplomatic staff to declare their assets. Further, he noted that a mechanism would be established to check the validity of these asset declarations.

CB widely...

The official headline inflation, which peaked at just shy of 70 percent in September, decelerated to 66 percent in October, potentially setting off a disinflationary path ahead. While the job of combating inflation is nowhere near its completion, the slight ease seen provides the Monetary Board some wiggle room to consider policies to support growth. Meanwhile, the external sector is showing some stability, with the authorities managing the

outflows reasonably well, with what the country receives from exports and remittances.

Hence, this relative calm in the domestic foreign exchange market would provide the Central Bank the space to refrain from being hawkish and consider cutting rates towards early next year. The activation of the deal with the International Monetary Fund for a US \$ 2.9 billion, four-year economic stabilisation package would really bolster the case for the Central Bank to cut rates, as a potential deal would unlock foreign inflows from other multilateral and bilateral sources. The likely debt deferment for at least a couple of years as part of a potential deal with the country's creditors would also not put pressure on foreign exchange sector liquidity until the debt servicing kicks in. Sri Lanka expects to raise about US \$ 2.8 billion in 2023 from foreign currency to bridge its budget gap.

New German...

In the context of worldwide diversification of supply chains, the current effort by Sri Lankan exporters would strengthen the national economy through higher exports to Germany, Europe and beyond," Friedrich Naumann Foundation Sri Lanka and Bangladesh Head Wolfgang Heinz remarked.

He made these remarks in taking part in a press conference yesterday in Colombo, which was organised to award certifications to 26 Export Development Board (EDB) officials, who completed a capacity building programme in preparation for the forthcoming German Act on Corporate Due Diligence in Supply Chains. The capacity building programme was jointly organised by the Delegation of German Industry and Commerce (AHK) in Sri Lanka and Friedrich Naumann Foundation for Freedom (FNF).

The German Act on Corporate Due Diligence Obligations in Supply Chains is an effort on the part of the German Federal Government to protect human rights and manage material environmental risks through supply chains of companies operating in Germany. The act in 2023 requires all companies operating in Germany, with 3,000 or more employees, to implement a supplier risk management system and in 2024, the act will apply to companies operating with 1,000 or more employees. The risk management system would support efforts to assess, mitigate and monitor human rights and environmental risks in the company's supply chain. "The implications of the German Supply Chain Due Diligence Act are to ensure free and fair trade.

This includes transparent value chains, sensible trade agreements that enable lasting good economic relations, the observance of fundamental human rights and international conventions in commerce and the guarantee of economic standards across value chains when doing business with Germany, AHK Sri Lanka Chief Delegate Marie Antonia von Schönburg said. She noted that the European Union (EU) has a similar or much more sophisticated legislation in the making that may come to fruition in 2024. Therefore, she said that compliance with the German Supply Chain Due Diligence Act would prepare Sri Lankan exporters to comply with the upcoming EU legislation. Currently, the majority of the large-scale exporters have already taken measures to comply with the German Supply Chain Due Diligence Act. Commenting on preparing and getting the SME exporters to comply with the law. EDB Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Suresh de Mel noted that the EDB has planned a series of awareness sessions targeting SME exporters to provide the necessary guidance on compliance

requirements with the new act Further, de Mel also viewed this legislation as an opportunity for Sri Lankan exporters to increase exports, in particular value-added food exports, to Germany and other premier markets. The German enterprises failing to comply with legal obligations with regard to supply chains are set to face administrative fines up to eight million euros or up to 2 percent of annual global turnover. This is also the first time the responsibility of German enterprises to respect human rights in global supply chains has been put on a legal footing.

Currently, the EU is Sri Lanka's second largest export region, with Germany remaining as the fourth largest export destination for the country's exports.

Cabinet greenlights... Justice, Prisons Affairs and Constitutional

Reforms Minister Wijeyadasa Rajapakshe noted that the proposed act would be followed by a comprehensive new Banking Act, replacing Banking Act No. 30 of 1988 at a later stage, as it is difficult to enact a new complete banking law in a short period.

Private sector...

I think one thing we have forgotten is that we are an island nation and it has been 13 years since the end of the conflict. I think a review is required on this," he remarked.

Pointing out to the Easter Sunday attacks the country experienced in 2019, despite the everincreasing allocation, he said, "the quantum of defence spending doesn't mean that you are more secure". He also asked those who were present at the forum to imagine the level of transformation

that could be made in the areas of social security, health, education and skill development with only a 10 percent of the defence budget reallocated into each of these areas. While acknowledging the need to revisit the defence spending, Treasury Secretary Mahinda Siriwardana said such expenditure remains extremely rigid but the budget lays the ground to rationalise expenditure over the medium term, as complete reset is impossible and impractical in a year beset by the worst economic crisis.

"It is very rigid the defence expenditure and it is very little that you can do in the short term. You at least need three to four years to put in place reforms," Siriwardana said.

Meanwhile, echoing similar sentiments, Institute of Policy Studies Executive Director Dr. Dushni Weerakoon emphasised the importance of reallocating resources to provide social security to the poor and vulnerable, who became disproportionately affected by the ongoing crisis.

"We have to release resources from unproductive areas where public sector is number one, whether it is the armed forces or a public service and reallocate those resources to support economic activities that drive growth as well as the poorer segments of the population," Dr. Weerakoon said.

She also said she would have liked to see more proposals and reforms from the budget to support recovery and reboot growth, which puts the lowincome seament at its front and centre.


"Because the kind of the crisis we are in is not something we will overcome in a year or two. Even if you return to a positive growth in 18 months or so, there is a long way for us to go to catch up the output that we have lost. And we may never actually fully recover the output lost in these two to three years," Dr. Weerakoon added.

Thailand helps SL to procure portion of country's maize seed requirement for Maha season

shortage of grains for the animal feed industry and maize-based food items, due to the ongoing socio-economic crisis in Sri Lanka, as part of the response efforts through the United Nations (UN) joint Humanitarian Needs and Priorities (HNP) Plan, the Royal Thai Embassy in Colombo has supported the procurement of a portion of the country's maize seed requirements, working together with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).

In addition to the livestock feed industry, maize is a staple input for food items such as Thriposha and Samaposha, for which the demand for seeds has swelled over the recent years.

The UN has since June been responding to the crisis through its joint HNP, which was recently revised to target the provision of life-saving assistance for 3.4 million Šri Lankans and extended through the end of December. Foreign exchange shortages and reduced household purchasing power, exacerbated by two consecutive seasons of poor harvests, have triggered dramatic increase in food insecurity. Twenty-eight percent of the population or 6.3 million people, face moderate-to-severe acute food insecurity. The Royal Thai Embassy recognised the immediate need to import

Emirates to operate double daily direct flights to Colombo from December 1

Emirates yesterday announced plans to add one more daily direct flight between Dubai and Colombo from December 1, 2022 to cater to the seasonal increase in the demand for travel.

The additional service, EK648/EK649 will increase the number of daily flights between the two cities to three, including two direct flights and one operating via the Maldivian capital Male.

Emirates' additional daily service will operate direct between Dubai and



Colombo will stop over in Male.

From December 1 to 15 and from December 31 to March 26, EK648 will Colombo, except during December 16 depart Dubai at 16:10hrs daily and arrive to 30, when the service from Dubai to in Colombo at 21:55hrs, all times local.

Flight EK648 will be routed via Male from December 16 to 30 and will during that period, depart Dubai at 10.30hrs, arrive in Male at 14.45hrs, depart for Colombo at 17.15hrs and arrive in Colombo at 19.15hrs.

From December 1 to March 26, flight EK649 is scheduled to depart Colombo at 02:55hrs and arrive in Dubai at 05:55hrs.

Could privatising profitable businesses to foreign investors deteriorate BOP?



The official data shows that deterioration f Sri Lanka's external balance is partly due to the increase profit repartitions by foreign direct investment (FDI)-backed businesses. The low level of new FDIs coupled with the existing FDI stock already reaching the profit repatriation phase has exacerbated Sri Lanka's balance of payment (BOP) woes.

The government appears to be looking at privatising state-owned businesses to foreign investors as a remedy to the current economic crisis. However, such privatisations could lead to further weakening of BOP in the medium term, especially if the privatised business is not going to generate significant foreign

Arowing gap between (new) FDI and FDI renture profit repatriation

As shown in the table, the gap between profit repatriations by FDI ventures and net cash FDI inflow has been negative since 2015, suggesting the majority of Sri Lanka's existing FDI ventures have reached the profit repatriation phase. The FDI cash inflows exceeded profit repatriations in 2018 and 2019, due to the proceeds from the sale of the Hambantota Port.

It is likely that a high level of profit repatriations seen during last few years is from FDI ventures in non-tradable sector investments like property development, thus causing an unusual imbalance in the external account.

Also, the gradual deterioration of the overall economic and political stability appeared to have encouraged investors to take profits out rather than to reinvest. For example, for the first half of 2022, the FDI ventures have repatriated 97 percent of profits made, despite a 74 percent surge in profits compared to the first half of 2021.

This is an unfortunate situation, despite that FDI ventures in Sri Lanka have earned an average of 9.8 percent during the 10-year period between 2011 to 2020 compared to the global average of 6.9 percent. Again, this is a reflection of the true nature of FDI their short-term focus and preference to take out earnings from Sri Lanka quickly. As Sri Lanka descended into a deep economic crisis in early 2022, FDI ventures have taken out almost half a billion dollar in profits during the first six months of 2022 alone.

Rising foreign private debt stock and equity stock without inflows

Another way FDI ventures exert pressure on the country's BOP is through loading the company with private (intercompany) debt and raising equity value through revaluations. During the ten-year period between 2012 to 2021 FDI debt stocks have surged by over 200 percent when the growth in FDI equity stock has been almost flat. However, in 2021, there has been an extremely unusual increase in (net) FDI equity value by almost US \$ 4 billion (a 46 percent increase YoY). Such surge in equity FDI stock without corresponding (actual) foreign inflows, is possible through massive revaluation of assets (in large FDI venture like the Port City project). However, such high revaluations suggest possible hefty foreign exchange outflows in the future.

sold to a foreign investor, Sri Lanka could benefit from the inflow of the sales proceeds, which could help remedy shortterm BOP constraints as well as fiscal constraints. It is expected that any strategic or financial investor, investing in small emerging markets like Sri Lanka typically targets a very short investment payback period (around five to seven years). Hence, after this short payback period is over, Sri Lanka will start experiencing negative foreign outflows from the investment unless such business generates large foreign income after privatisation.

Usually, FDI ventures also repatriate money through many other channels other than profits - these channels include management fees, royalty and licence fees, etc., which thus exacerbating negative pressure on the country's external balance.

Privatisations do have many benefits like improving financial and operational performance as well as technological advancement. However, Sri Lanka's core economic problem centres on its inability to generate sufficient foreign income to sustain itself. In such scenario, selling profitable state assets to remedy shortterm liquidity issues may lead to large BOP deficits in the future unless major interventions are done to remedy the core foreign exchange problem.

Palm oil: A diamond purposely kept in the rough!



Sri Lanka is purposely ignoring the economic opportunities of oil palm cultivation, at a time when the rest of the world is strengthening economies through the cultivation of productive and economically important crops, such as oil

The use of palm oil extends beyond cooking to the production of margarine, biscuits, sweets, bakery products and even other nonfood products. However, while the annual consumption of vegetable oil in Sri Lanka is estimated to be around 250,000 tonnes, domestic production is only about 50,000 tonnes. As a result, Sri Lanka spends a huge amount of foreign currency on vegetable oil imports. Thus, if our annual vegetable oil requirement can be met through domestically produced palm oil, it is estimated that Sri Lanka can reduce its external spending by 27 to 44 million US dollars, each year.

However, unfortunately, the public does not have a clear understanding of oil palm cultivation, which has the highest yields among crops grown for vegetable oil. This is a result of the many myths and misconceptions about palm oil, which people sadly believe without bothering to do any research.

These unfounded and unscientific misconceptions have even led to a government ban on further oil palm cultivation, even though the global body of scientific research concerning it has empirically demonstrated that cultivation and consumption of palm oil poses no significant threat to the environment or public health.

In fact, driven by scientific research, India, Malaysia, Indonesia and others have successfully and sustainably, expanded their palm oil production, with huge positive impacts accruing to their economies, particularly in rural areas. Additionally, in Sri Lanka at least, oil palm cultivation, by law, does not take place on virgin land and must occur on previously cultivated land. In fact, oil palms are a most suitable alternative to fields of rubber, tea and other crops that have begun to see yields dropping after decades.

Thus, by increasing the production of palm oil, Sri Lanka can meet its vegetable oil needs at a lower cost. Furthermore, palm oil is required for a large number of manufacturing and industrial processes, often operated by SMEs. These businesses have epeatedly reiterated that substitutes to palm



oil are economically unviable and result in decreased product quality and higher prices.

Considering the evidence supporting oil palm cultivation, it is indeed a pity that the government, not just refuses to support the industry but actively inhibits its growth and operation; without proper study, research or any heed to the growing, globally concurrent body of scientific and empirical evidence supporting the cultivation of oil palms, merely to appease certain groups of activists, driven no doubt by those with vested

Any decision taken with regard to palm oil must, therefore, be backed by scientific evidence, logic and foresight. Particularly amidst the present economic difficulties, government policy should be supportive of oil palm cultivation.

Many pleas to reconsider the ban have been made to authorities, through various bodies, including the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce and the Palm Oil Industry Association of Sri Lanka, highlighting the high yields obtainable, as well as the potential for economic emancipation in rural areas, particularly through the diversification of cultivation away from solely large regional plantation companies and towards smallholders, which can truly strengthen rural communities and the national economy.

However, still, at present, the government stubbornly sticks to its ban on the expansion of cultivation, much to the detriment of Sri Lanka's foreign exchange position, rural communities, SMEs, which make up the backbone of commerce and economic activity in Sri Lanka, and the national economy as a

Today, every Sri Lankan is losing out as a result of this and many other, myopic, selfserving and grandstanding policy decisions taken to grow voter bases, rather than the economy. This must stop. It is now up to every Sri Lankan to call upon their leaders to pay heed to reason, empirical data, scientific evidence and expert advice, and repeal the ban on oil palm cultivation, while empowering the industry, so it can benefit all Sri Lankans!







CRITICAL ZON

Science Meets Art at This International Exhibit as it Explores Mankind's Search for a Common Ground





International travelling exhibition project 'Critical Zones' invites visitors to engage with the critical situation of the Earth's critical zone in an interactive and stimulating curation of art works, installations and experiences. Critical Zones is open to the public at the J.D.A Perera Gallery, Colombo till 27th November 2022.

Critical Zones is based on a concept by Bruno Latour and Peter Weibel and was first exhibited in Germany. In collaboration with the Goethe-Institute in South Asia, the exhibit is set to travel through India and Sri Lanka in 2022 and 2023, complemented by further works from local artists.

The Critical Zone is Earth's land surface where most terrestrial life – including humanity and all that they need to survive such as water, soil, plants, rocks and animal life – resides. It's the zone where rock meets life; the very bare bones of all existence. Yet human behaviour has disrupted this thin and





fragile zone and scientists are calling this domain 'critical' as this tiny part of the Earth on which humankind is totally dependent upon

has entered into a sort of intensive care. The Critical Zones exhibit is where critical zone science meets art; exhibiting a series of projects, installations, art works and research that sheds light into the topic. Curator of the exhibit, Mira Hirtz explaining the concept shared, "[the exhibit] is to make people rethink our relationship with Earth. We place ourselves as all important on this Earth, happy to use the resources it provides as and when we need it and now we've exhausted it and the consequences are coming back to us. What happens if we

damage this zone upon beyond repair?" The exhibit occupies all three floors of the JDA Gallery with installations ranging from documentaries and research experiments to artwork and multimedia setups. A particular favourite from the exhibit was 'Atmospheric Forest' - a virtual reality installation that provided visitors with an immersive visualisation on the complex relationship between a forest, climate change and the atmosphere. "Critical Zones is a thought experiment that is based on the notion that we don't live from the land we live on. It's a response to the ecological crisis."
