GENERAL CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO APPOINTMENTS TO POSTS IN THE PUBLIC SERVICE ADVERTISED IN THE "CEYLON GOVERNMENT GAZETTE"

1. *Allowances.*—Unless otherwise stated, Rent Allowance, temporary Cost of Living Allowance and temporary Special Living Allowance are payable according to Government Regulations.

2. *Conditions of Service.*—Appointments will be subject to the Public Service Commission Rules, the Financial Regulations, the Regulations of the Manual of Procedure, Departmental Orders or Regulations, and any other orders or regulations issued from time to time by the Government.

3. *Terms of Engagement.*—(i) In the case of appointments to the non-pensionable establishment (excluding those on daily rates of pay) appointees will be required to contribute 5 per cent. of their salary to the Public Service Provident Fund, and they will be allowed to contribute at their option a further 5 per cent. The Government contribution in either case will be equal to 7 1/2 per cent. of the salary paid in at the close of each financial year.

(ii) Appointees may be required to furnish security in terms of the Public Officers (Security) Ordinance, if so required by the Head of their Department.

(iii) Appointees other than those already in the Public Service will be required to pass a medical examination by a Government Medical Officer as to their physical fitness to serve in any part of the island.

4. *New Entrants to the Public Service.*—(i) The period of probation/trial of New-Entrant Officers appointed to pensionable posts/non-pensionable posts, as the case may be, shall be three years, unless a longer period is prescribed in respect of any posts.

(ii) All New-Entrant Officers must subscribe to the condition that they will conform to the provision of the Official Language Act, No. 33 of 1958, and any laws and rules that now exist or may be introduced in the future for giving effect to the language policy of the Government.

(iii) (a) They should acquire a working knowledge of the Official Language (Sinhala) during their period of probation/trial, except in exceptional cases where it is not essential for the efficient discharge of their duties.

(b) Their confirmation, at the expiry of the period of probation/trial will depend, *INTER ALIA*, on their passing within specified periods of time prescribed proficiency tests in Sinhala, leading up to a level not higher than the J. S. C. Standard. Failure to pass these proficiency tests within the prescribed periods will result in the non-payment of the increments falling due, until the tests are passed. The services of those officers who do not reach the requisite standard of proficiency in Sinhala by the end of their period of probation/trial will be liable to be terminated.

Note.—Those who qualify for entry into the Public Service through the Sinhala medium will be exempted from passing these proficiency tests in Sinhala as a pre-requisite for confirmation.

5. *Qualifications Required.*—(i) Every applicant must furnish satisfactory proof that he is a Ceylonese. A "Ceylonese" is a citizen of Ceylon by descent or by registration.

(ii) A candidate for any post for which the minimum educational qualification prescribed is a pass in the Senior School Certificate examination or equivalent or higher examination shall have a pass in the Sinhala Language or its equivalent obtained at the Senior School Certificate examination or its equivalent if he is a Sinhalese, educated in the Sinhala medium. (This requirement will not apply to those officers who are in the Public Service from a date prior to January 1, 1961, and who seek appointment to other posts in the Public Service).

6. **War Service Concession.**—Provided they are qualified in all other respects, ex-Servicemen of Her Majesty's Fighting Forces and full-time members of the Auxiliary Fire, Air Raid Precautions and Civil Defence Services (excluding those who had left these services of their own accord) will be allowed to deduct periods of such service commencing from September 3, 1939, at the earliest and up to December 31, 1949, at the latest from their ages for purposes of eligibility alone provided that they joined the Forces before August 15, 1945, and that such service was satisfactory and continuous.

7. **Other Requirements.**—(i) Applications from officers of the Public Service who are qualified must be forwarded through the Heads of their respective Departments. Every such officer applying for a post advertised by the Secretary, Public Service Commission, must however, notify the date of despatch by him of his application, direct to the Secretary, Public

2. **Salary.**—The salary scale attached to the post is Rs. 6,600—180 and 240—Rs. 9,240 per annum, with efficiency Bar before Rs. 8,280 per annum.

3. **Terms of Engagement.**—

(a) **Permanent Post :**

(i) The post is permanent and pensionable. The selected candidate will be required to contribute to the W. & O. P. Fund.

(ii) The selected candidate will be required to take up appointment at short notice.

(iii) The duties will be to make original translations into Sinhala from English or vice versa; to revise translations in Sinhala sent by other Departments and to assist the Department in other ways as well. A high literary standard will be expected.

(b) **Temporary post :**

(i) The post is temporary and non-pensionable. The selected candidate will be required to contribute to the Provident Fund. He is liable to be discontinued at any time with one month's notice.

(ii) The selected candidate will be required to take up appointment at short notice.

(iii) The duties will be to make original translations into Sinhala from English or vice versa; to revise translations in Sinhala sent by other Departments and to assist the Department in other ways as well. A high literary standard will be expected.

4. **Qualifications required.**—Every applicant must furnish satisfactory proof that he—

(a) (i) is either a graduate of a recognized University with Sinhala as a subject; or

(ii) possesses 10 years experience as a Translator in Sinhala or is a Writer or Author in Sinhala who can establish to the satisfaction of the Selection Board that he is a scholar of at least equal competence with graduates and possesses a sound knowledge of English;

- (b) is not less than 25 years and not more than 50 years of age on 29.5.70. (These age limits will not apply to those already in Government Service);
- (c) is of excellent moral character and physically sound.
5. Applicants must attach to their applications COPIES (NOT ORIGINALS) of—
- a certificate of registration of birth or special certificate of age issued by the Registrar-General (in case of applicants whose births have not been registered). *N. B.*—Baptismal certificate or a certificate issued for the purpose of the Code of Regulations for Assisted Schools will not be accepted;

**COMPETITIVE EXAMINATION FOR ADMISSION TO CLASS V OF THE CEYLON ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICE
AND THE CEYLON OVERSEAS SERVICE—1970**

THE following regulations for the competitive examination for admission to Class V of the Ceylon Administrative Service and the Ceylon Overseas Service to be held in Colombo in 1970 are published for general information.

Regulations

1. An open competitive examination for admission to Class V of the Ceylon Administrative Service and the Ceylon Overseas Service will be held in Colombo, by the Public Service Commission. The examination will be held in two parts. Section A of the examination consisting of the compulsory subjects will be held first in or about August, 1970. The actual dates will be notified later. Sections B and C of the examination will be held after the results of section A are available. The dates for sections B and C will be notified later. The Public Service Commission reserves the right to cancel this examination if it considers it expedient in the public interest to do so. It is open to the Public Service Commission to postpone the examination should it consider it necessary.
2. The number of vacancies in the Ceylon Administrative Service and the Ceylon Overseas Service to be filled on the results of this examination and the date of filling of such vacancies will be determined by the Public Service Commission in due course. The Public Service Commission reserves to itself the right to omit to fill any or all the vacancies if it considers this necessary in the Public interest.
3. Candidates for this examination must be Ceylonese. For the purpose of this examination a Ceylonese is—a citizen of Ceylon by descent or by registration.
4. Candidates for this examination must have attained the age of 22 and must not have attained the age of 27 on 1st August, 1970. The upper age limit has been advanced to 27 years for this examination only as no examination was held in 1969. The above age limits will not apply to officers holding permanent appointments in the Public Service.
5. Female candidates who possess the prescribed qualifications will be eligible to compete at this examination subject to the proviso that not more than 20 per cent of the vacancies to be filled may be filled by them.
6. Candidates are required to obtain a written nomination from the Public Service Commission to sit for the examination.
7. Candidates must satisfy the Public Service Commission that they are duly qualified in respect of health and character. They must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight and physically qualified for service in any part of the Island. Successful candidates will be called upon to undergo a strict medical examination to test these points.
8. A married candidate will not be eligible for appointment without the special consent of the Public Service Commission.
9. The fees for the examination will be as follows :—
 - (a) Section A—Rs. 100.00. This fee should be paid before the closing date for applications at the nearest Kachcheri or at the General Treasury, Colombo, and credited to Revenue Head VI, Sub-head 3, Item (4). The Kachcheri or the Treasury receipt should be pasted on the last page of the application form.
 - (b) Sections B and C—Rs. 100.00. Candidates who qualify to appear for Sections B and C of the examination will be informed later the manner in which the fees should be paid.

Note.—The fee will be returned to candidates who are not granted nomination to sit for the examination. A candidate who withdraws or absents himself/herself from the examination for any reason whatsoever at any time after he/she has been granted nomination shall not be entitled to a refund of the whole or a portion of the fee.

 - (c) Rs. 10.50 for the medical examination. Successful candidates will be notified later the manner in which this fee should be paid.
10. (a) Nomination to sit for the competitive examination will be limited to candidates who have passed an Honours or Pass Degree Examination of a Recognised University or any other examination which may be deemed to be of at least equal standard.
 - (b) Candidates will be required to produce their Degree Certificates before the Viva Voce Test.
 - (c) Only candidates who are qualified may enter for competition for admission to Class V of the Ceylon Administrative Service and the Ceylon Overseas Service. They should indicate in cage 18 of the application form their preference as between the Ceylon Administrative Service and the Ceylon Overseas Service. No alteration in the preference indicated will be allowed after the closing date of applications.
11. *Method of application.*—(a) Forms of application should be obtained from the Secretary, Public Service Commission from 1st June to 25th June, 1970. Requests for printed forms of application should accompany a self-addressed, UN-STAMPED envelope, not smaller than 9" x 4" in size. Forms of application will not be issued to personal callers.
 - (b) Applications for admission to the examination must be addressed to the Secretary, Public Service Commission, P. O. Box No. 500, Colombo 1, and must be sent by registered post so as to reach him on or before 29th June, 1970. Any application received after that date will be rejected. Applications from those in the Public Service should be sent through the Heads of their Departments, in terms of A.R. 109.
 - (c) Applications must be complete in all respects. Any application which does not contain all the information asked for will be judged on its own merits and is liable to be rejected.
 - (d) No allegation that an application or a letter respecting such application has been lost or delayed in the post can be considered. Candidates who delay their applications until the last few days will do so at their own risk.
 - (e) Candidates are required to fill in and return as instructed therein the printed post card (marked A) issued to them with the form of application, when the receipt of their application form in this office will be acknowledged. Applications of candidates who do not comply with this requirement will not be acknowledged. Those who comply with this requirement but do not receive an acknowledgment within three weeks of the closing date should at once notify the Secretary, Public Service Commission. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the applicant of any claim to consideration.
12. Nominations for the examination will be considered on receipt of the form of application.
13. NO CANDIDATE will be entitled to sit for the competitive examination on more than two occasions.

14. The Secretary, Public Service Commission, will issue admission cards to all candidates who have been granted nominations to sit the examination.

15. *Identity Cards.*—Candidates will be required to prove their identity in the examination hall to the satisfaction of the Supervisor for each subject they offer. For this purpose any of the following documents will be accepted :—

- (a) Identity Card issued by the Postmaster-General.
- (b) A valid passport issued not more than three years before the date of the examination.
- (c) Any certificate, licence or other document embodying the photograph of the holder and issued not more than three years before the date of this examination on the authority of a Government Department, Public Corporation or other Statutory Organisation.

16. *Penalty for furnishing false information.*—If a candidate is found to be ineligible according to the regulations for this examination, his candidature is liable to be cancelled, at any stage prior to, during or after the examination.

If any of the particulars furnished by a candidate are found to be false within his knowledge, or if he has wilfully suppressed any material fact, he will be liable to dismissal from the Public Service.

SCHEME OF EXAMINATION

MEDIUM.—The Competitive Examination will be held in Sinhala, Tamil and English media.

- (a) *Compulsory Subjects.*—Essay, Precis and General Knowledge. Candidates should indicate the language medium in which they will take these subjects. Candidates must take up the compulsory subjects in one language medium only. The medium in which the candidates take up the compulsory subjects will be considered as the language medium in which the candidates enter Public Service.
- (b) *Optional Subjects.*—(i) If the subject chosen by a candidate is one which he/she had offered for the Degree, he/she should take it in the linguistic medium in which he/she passed it at the Degree examination.
- (ii) In all other cases, the candidate should indicate in order of preference the medium in which he/she wishes to take such subjects. The Commission will in its discretion decide the medium in which the candidate will be permitted to take these subjects.

The examination will include the following subjects. Each subject will carry the number of marks shown against it.

SECTION A—COMPULSORY FOR ALL CANDIDATES

Note.—(i) Candidates who offer a natural science subject (subjects 40 to 47 inclusive) must produce a certificate of laboratory training in an Institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the Head of the Institution.

Note.—(ii) External and Private candidates who offer Geography must produce a certificate of practical training in that subject in an Institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the Head of the Institution.

Note.—(iii) From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the examiners may consider necessary in order to secure that no credit is allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

Note.—(iv) If a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a deduction, which may be of considerable amount will be made on this account from the total marks otherwise accruing to him/her.

Note.—(v) Credit will be given for orderly, effective and exact expression combined with due economy of words, in all subjects of the examination and not only in subject which is specially devoted to language.

Note.—(vi) The marks scored by candidates in the written examination will not be available to the Boards conducting the Viva Voce tests.

The examination will be held in two parts. Section A of the examination consisting of the compulsory subjects, Essay, Precis and General Knowledge will be held first. The number of candidates who will be permitted to sit for Section B of the examination, on the results of Section A of the examination, will be three times the number of existing vacancies in the Ceylon Administrative Service. Such candidates will be selected in order of merit according to the results of Section A.

Section B of the examination consists of the optional subjects carrying 600 marks and the Viva Voce (General) carrying 200 marks. Candidates who enter for the Ceylon Overseas Service will be required to sit for the paper on World Affairs carrying 100 marks in addition to the optional subjects and the Viva Voce (General). Candidates who attain a sufficiently high standard in the World Affairs paper, to be determined by the Public Service Commission, will be summoned for the Viva Voce (Special).

The final order of merit of candidates to be selected for appointment to the Ceylon Administrative Service will be determined after taking into consideration the marks scored by the candidates for both sections A and B, and the Ceylon Overseas Service, after taking into consideration the marks scored for sections A, B and C.

SYLLABUS

All papers will be of three hours duration except where specified

SECTION A—COMPULSORY FOR ALL CANDIDATES

ESSAY.—An essay to be written on one of four or five specified subjects. These subjects will not be related to any special field of study but will be designed to test the candidate's general knowledge and intelligence, his general ability both in powers of thinking and expression. The essay will be judged by the degree of thoughtfulness and originality in its treatment of the subject as well as by its language, style and arrangement. It must be clearly and legibly written.

Note.—The attention of candidates is drawn to the importance of (a) relevance, and (b) legibility. Candidates are advised to reflect on the subject and its demands before beginning to write. Credit will be given to careful examination of the subject, to the degree of thoughtfulness and to the quality of the writing.

2. **Precis.**—A paper of one hour's duration requiring the candidate to express more succinctly the substance of one or more passages of prose.

3. **General Knowledge.**—A paper on matters of general interest and importance at the present day—cultural, social, economic, political and scientific. A liberal choice of questions will be given.

SECTION B—OPTIONAL SUBJECTS AND VIVA VOCE (GENERAL)

4. *Sinhalese (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Sinhalese texts from the beginning of the Polonnaruwa Period to the present day, excluding exegetical and glossarial works in prose and early G1 poetry. Candidates will be expected to paraphrase or to translate into English, passages from the above texts, and questions will be set on language and subject matter.

Outlines of the History of Sinhalese literature from the beginning of the Polonnaruwa Period to the present day ; prose composition.

5. *Sinhalese (Higher Division) Four Papers.*—Sinhalese inscriptions Sigiri Graffiti and classical texts, prose and verse. Candidates will be expected to paraphrase or to translate into English, passages from the above texts, and questions will be set on language and subject matter.

An essay, translation from English into Sinhalese, and from Sinhalese into English ; literary criticism.

History of Sinhalese literature from the earliest times to the present day ; the history of the Sinhalese language.

The culture and civilization of the Sinhalese with special reference to the development of religion and art (painting, sculpture and architecture).

6. *Tamil (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Translations from Mediaeval and modern texts with questions on their language and subject matter.

The history of Tamil literature from the earliest times. Prose composition.

7. *Tamil (Higher Division) Four Papers.*—Translations from Tamil inscriptions and the older Tamil texts. Literary criticism, the history of the Tamil language, prosody and poetics.

The history of Dravidian civilization from the earliest times to the end of the 19th century, with special reference to the Tamils.

Credit will be given for knowledge of original authorities.

8. *Arabic (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Translation from post-Islamic and modern Arabic texts into English including questions on subject matter and grammar.

Prose composition in Arabic. The history of Arabic literature.

9. *Arabic (Higher Division) Four Papers.*—Translation from pre-Islamic, post-Islamic and mediaeval texts, including the seven Muallaquat, and questions on grammatical forms.

The history of Arabic literature and an essay in Arabic on one of several specified subjects. Questions on poetics and scanning, Islamic civilization.

The history of Semetic religions, with special reference to mythology and thought of pre-Islamic Arabia.

Credit will be given for knowledge of original authorities.

10. *Sanskrit (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Translations from easy Vedic and Classical Sanskrit texts including the epics with questions on their language and subject matter.

The history of Sanskrit literature, prosody and poetics, and prose composition in the Devanagari script.

11. *Sanskrit (Higher Division) Four Papers.*—Translation from Vedic and Classical texts at an advanced level, including the philosophical and technical literature, with questions on their language and subject matter.

An essay on one of several specified subjects ; translation into Sanskrit of a passage of greater difficulty, or alternatively, verse composition ; the Devanagari script being required.

The history of Vedic, philosophical and technical literature, and the antiquities of the Vedic period, an acquaintance with the relevant archaeological discoveries being required.

The history of Indian religion, mythology, philosophy and the thought of India from their beginnings to circa 1200 A.D.

Credit will be given for knowledge of original sources.

12. *Pali (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Translations from easy canonical texts and post-canonical literature excluding the *pakarana*-literature, with questions on their language and subject matter.

Prose composition, the history of Pali literature in Ceylon and the history of Buddhism in Ceylon.

13. *Pali (Higher Division) Four Papers.*—Translations from more difficult canonical texts, including the *Abidhamma* and *Pakarana*-literature, with questions on their language, subject matter, grammar and philology. Candidates are expected to have a knowledge of Buddhist doctrine in relation to contemporary Indian Philosophy.

An essay on one of several specified subjects, or alternatively, translation into Pali verse or prose of a suitable text.

The history of Pali literature and antiquities.

The history of Buddhist thought, a knowledge of the outlines of Mahayana being required.

Credit will be given for knowledge of original authorities.

14. *English (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—English Literature 1600–1832, with special reference to any four of the following :—
Shakespeare, Dryden, Pope, Dr. Johnson, Blake, Wordsworth, Jane Austen, Keats.

English Literature from 1832 to the present day, with special reference to any four of the following :—

Tennyson, Arnold, Thomas Hardy, Shaw, Conrad, T. S. Eliot, D. H. Lawrence.

Candidates will not be expected to have a detailed knowledge of all the work of the writers selected for special study nor to identify extracts taken from their work. "Shakespeare" for instance, would mean such representative phases of his work as the candidate is familiar with through his study of typical plays, e.g., As you like it for comedy, King Lear for tragedy, The Tempest for a later play, and so on. Candidates will be expected to illustrate their answers on the work of any of the writers set for special study from their reading of a selection of the major works of these authors. A knowledge of literary developments in the two broad general periods, comprised by the Lower Division will not be required of candidates. They will, however, be expected in their answer to show that they have a good grasp of the language.

15. *English (Higher Division) Four papers.*—English Literature from 1550–1660, with special study of the following : Chaucer, Spencer, Shakespeare, Ben Johnson, Donne, Milton, Webster.

English Literature from 1660–1798, with special study of the following : Dryden, Pope, Swift, Addison, Dr. Johnson, Fielding, Burke.

English Literature from 1798–1880, with special study of the following : Wordsworth, Keats, Shelley, Jane Austen, Tennyson, Arnold, Dickens.

English Literature from 1880 to the present day, with special study of the following : Hopkins, Shaw, Conrad, Joyce, D. H. Lawrence, E. M. Forster, T. S. Eliot.

Candidates will be expected to have a good knowledge of at least four of the writers selected for special study in each of the above groups, and to take a compulsory question (for which greater credit will be given than for the other questions testing their ability to recognize and criticise extracts from the work of each of such writers. There will be a question on the practical, criticism of a passage representative of one of the main literary trends in each period to be studied. A knowledge of the social and literary background of such period will also be considered necessary. Candidates offering this subject will be expected to provide evidence of their command of the English Language and a careful reading of its major Literature.

16. *Latin (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Unprepared translation from Latin texts, with questions on their language and subject matter.

Prose composition and the history of Latin Literature.

17. *Greek (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Unprepared translation from Greek texts, with questions on their language and subject matter.

Prose composition and the history of Greek Literature.

18. *Classics (Higher Division) Four Papers.*—Unprepared translation from Greek texts at an advanced level and prose and or verse composition in Greek (1 paper).

Unprepared translations from Latin texts at an advanced level and prose and or verse composition in Latin (1 paper).

The history, literature, geography, social, political, religious and philosophical developments of Greek and Roman Civilisation (2 Papers).

In Roman history, the main stress will be on the period 133 B.C. to 43 B.C. and in Latin literature on the Ciceronian and Augustan age. In Greek history, the main stress will be on the period 510 B.C. to 430 B.C. and in Greek Literature on the Attic dramatists and writers.

Credit will be given for knowledge of original authorities.

19. *French (Lower Division) Two Papers—Paper I.*—Unprepared translation of passages chosen from French literature of the 17th to the 20th centuries, with questions on their style and subject matter. Prose composition.

Paper II—French literature, from the 17th to the 20th century, with special reference to any four of the following writers, Moliere, Racine, Rousseau, Hugo, Flaubert, Baudelaire, Gide, Giraudoux:-

Answer to questions on authors set for special study must show detailed knowledge of one or more of their representative works. Candidates will also have the opportunity of choosing questions of a more general kind on other major writers. One question should be answered in French.

20. *History (Lower Division) Two papers.*—Four papers of which candidates may offer two and not less nor more than two.

22. *Economics (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—The principles of economics, including definition, scope and method, economic systems, the theory of production, forms of productive enterprises, the market system, determination of price, implications of monopoly and competition, national income forces which determine its size, the role of savings and investment, the distribution of national income, the role of the state in economic life, public finance.

Banking and currency, including the nature and definition of money, the theory of price changes, monetary systems, the function of banks, central banking, problems of monetary organisation and policy, international economic transactions, balance of payments, exchange rates.

Modern economic history, including the economic history of England, France, Germany, Russia and the U. S. A. during the 19th and 20th centuries.

23. *Economics (Higher Division) Four Papers.*—Ten papers of which candidates will have to offer the first two papers and any two bracketed papers of the other eight papers.

Paper 1—The principles of economics, carried to a more advanced stage than in the lower division.

Paper 2—A paper on current economic problems designed to test the candidate's knowledge and understanding of current economic problems in Ceylon and the World. A reading of current economic journals and documents will be expected.

Papers 3 & 4—Advanced monetary and banking theory, monetary history and organisation. Finance of international trades.

Papers 5 & 6—The economic history of Europe, U. S. A., India and Ceylon with special reference to the 19th and 20th centuries.

Papers 7 & 8—Mathematical statistics and its application in the field of economics and commerce.

Papers 9 & 10—The constitution and administration of the leading states of the world, political and social theory. History of political ideas.

24. *Politics (Lower Division) two papers*

Paper 1—*Social and Political Theories.*—Theories of National State; Machiavelli, Bodin, Hobbs, Locke, Rousseau, Liberalism, Socialism (including marxism) and similar theories, Fascism. Theories of modern state Freedom, Rights, Equality, Property, Nationalism.

Paper 2—*Political System of Ceylon (since 1833)*—Development of Political consciousness among the Ceylonese. Rise of Nationalism, Movement to National Independence.

Political Institutions and their evolution. Peoples' participation in politics.

Political Organizations and pressure groups, Government functionalism since 1931.

25. *Politics (Higher Division) Four papers.*

Paper I—*Comparative Government and Principles of Government.*—U. K., U. S. A., U. S. S. R., France, Switzerland, Australia, Canada, Scandinavia, Japan, China, India.

Executive, Legislative and Judicial systems of modern governments, Administrative systems, Representative methods.

Paper 2—*International Relations*—International relations between main countries since 1914.

League of Nations, U. N. O. and other organizations affiliated to it.

Main determining factors of International Politics since 1945.

Paper 3—*Advanced Political Thought*—I.—Ancient Indian Political thought (Hindu and Buddhist) Greek; Plato, Aristotle and Ideas of City State Ancient Roman Political thinkers and Lawyers Augustine, Thomas Aquinas, Dante, Marsilio, Reformation; Luther; Calvin, Knox.

Paper 4—*Advanced Political Thought*—II

Machiavelli, Bodin.

Political thinkers of the English Revolution.

Political thinkers of the French Enlightenment.

Founding fathers of the American Constitution.

Political thinkers of the October Revolution.

Political thinkers of the Chinese Revolution.

26. *Sociology (Lower Division) Two Papers.*

Paper I—*Principles of Sociology.*—Delimitation of the field of sociological inquiry; critical evaluation of biological, racial and geographical explanations of social behaviour; relationship between sociology and other humanistic studies and social sciences. Analytical distinctions between Society, Culture, Personality, Basic sociological concepts; basic theoretical formulations of social structure, institutions, stratification, social control, group structure, social, integration and social change.

Paper II—*Social Problems and Social Administration.*—Concept of crime; approaches and methods of criminology; problems of crime prevention.

Concept of race; sociology of race tensions.

Demography; population growth and problems with special emphasis on Asian countries.

Development and content of social services; administration of social services.

The meaning of the concepts "social services", "welfare society", an examination of social needs and provision with particular reference to employment, old age, education, delinquency, health and disease, economic problems of the peasantry, &c. (special emphasis will be placed on Ceylon).

27. *Sociology (Higher Division) Four Papers*—Five papers of which candidates may offer any four papers.

Paper I—*Comparative Social Institutions.*—A comparative study of kinship and family, social stratification (caste, class) religion, economic structure, political structure. Theory of bureaucracy and formal organisations. The aims and methods of comparative study.

Paper II—*South Asia with special reference to Ceylon.*—Definition of peasant society, community. Review of community studies. Theoretical frameworks for studying peasant society. Kinship and stratification in India, Ceylon and other selected countries.

Economic features, value systems and other institutional features of peasant society.

Sociology of Hinduism and Buddhism, both synchronic and diachronic.

Historical analysis of Ceylonese traditional society, the feudal systems and social change in the 19th century.

Problems of economic development of under-developed countries.

Paper III—*Theories and Methods of Sociology.*—The development of sociology since Comte, Theories of evolution, diffusion functionalism, neo-evolution.

The theoretical contributions of Durkheim, Weber, Simmel, Pereto, and twentieth century anthropologists and sociologists, e.g., Malinowski, Radcliffe-Brown, Boas, Hobhouse, Parsons.

Scientific Method: The logic of scientific inquiry and inference, nature of induction, experimental methods; application of scientific method to sociological investigations.

Field techniques and empirical methods in Sociology and Anthropology (The candidate may be required to formulate a research design on a specified problem).

Paper IV—*Social Psychology*—Social factors, in the formation of personality, socialization, culture and personality, national character. Theories of personality development, learning, perception, motivation. Psychological analysis of group structure and dynamics, including the field of small group research. Factors affecting formation of public opinion. Group and individual differences in intelligence. Methods and techniques employed in psychological investigations.

Paper V—*Social Anthropology.*—(a) The scope and methods of social anthropology. Basic concepts, e.g., society, social structure, social organization, function and culture. Cultural growth; distributional studies; acculturation and culture change.

(b) History of social anthropology, with special reference to the work of Morgan, Frazer, Tylor, Rivers and Elliot Smith.

(c) Recent trends in anthropology: the functional approach, with particular reference to the works of Malinowski Radcliffe-Brown, and Evans-Pritchard, the cultural approach.

(d) Social anthropology of South East Asia.

28. *Geography (Lower Division) Two Papers.*

Paper I—(a) The principles of both physical geography (land forms, drainage, Natural vegetation, soils, climate, weather) and human geography (man's distributions, migrations, societies, economies);

(b) Either the regional geography of the Indian Area (India, Pakistan, Burma, Ceylon) or Europe; physical, human, economic; or

The regional geography of Anglo-America: physical, human, Economic.

Paper II—General map work; topographical maps (Ceylon, United Kingdom, United States); elementary surveying (chain, plane table, prismatic compass) projections (properties, simple construction); and graphics (presentation of elementary statistical data).

29. *Geography (Higher Division)—Four papers.*

Paper I (a) Advanced Geomorphology (with basic physical geology) ; evolution of landforms and the development of hydrographic patterns.

(b) Advanced Climatology (with basic meteorology) ; climatic region concepts, world climatic classification and patterns, and climatic changes.

or (c) Advanced Biogeography or (d) Advanced Agricultural Geography.

Paper II (a) Economic geography ; primary productions, power resources, and industry trade centres, and domestic and international trade.

(b) Either the regional geography of Asia or U.S.S.R. or Latin America : physical, human, economic, historical and political or the development of Geographical discovery, Exploration and thought.

Paper I—Prehistory, Basic principles of Archaeological excavation, history of Architecture in Ceylon.

Paper II—History of Sculpture and painting in Ceylon.

Paper III—Brahmi Inscriptions in Ceylon.

Paper IV—Inscriptions and ancient records from 8th Century A.D. to 1505 A.D. Numismatics of Ceylon.

32. *Anthropology—(Lower Division)—Two papers.*

Paper I—*General and Physical Anthropology.*

(A) *General Anthropology.*—Scope and basic methods of study in Physical Anthropology, Prehistoric Archaeology and Social Anthropology. Basic concepts of Anthropology.

(B) *Physical Anthropology.*—The more important human fossils ; Human evolution ; General evolutionary Theory Criteria of race ; Classification and distribution of human racial types ; Elementary genetics.

Paper II—*Prehistoric Archaeology and Social Anthropology.*

(A) *Prehistoric Archaeology.*—Archaeology of Palaeolithic, mesolithic and neolithic ages. The origins of civilization.

(B) *Social Anthropology.*—Nature of culture and society ; Principles of Social Organisation in Simple Societies ; Religion, Kinship and political institutions of simpler societies.

33. *Buddhist Civilization (Lower Division) Two papers.*

Paper I—Religion and Society in Ancient India at the dawn of Buddhism; the history and Impact of Buddhism in India, including modern development.

Paper II—The Early Buddhist schools and the spread of Buddhism outside India ; Buddhism in the History of Ceylon up to and including the modern period.

34. *Buddhist Civilization (Higher Division) —Four papers.*

Paper I—The Institutions of Early Buddhism the Sangha and the monastic organization ; the Vinaya and ecclesiastical procedure ; lay society and its social organization ; Buddhist Worship and Ritual ; the sociology of Buddhism.

Paper II—Buddhist art and architecture of any two of the following regions :

(a) India, Pakistan and Ceylon

(b) South-East Asia

(c) Tibet and Central Asia

(d) China and Japan.

Paper III—The expansion of Buddhism or the impact of Buddhist ideas in India, Pakistan, Ceylon, the ancient Middle East and South East Asia with special reference to Buddhist influence on Social institutions, culture Law and Politics.

Paper IV—The expansion of Buddhism in Tibet, Central Asia, China, Korea, Japan and the modern world.

35. *Philosophy (Lower Division) —Two papers.—The history of Western philosophy.*

(a) Greek philosophy, with special emphasis on the Scientific period, the Sophists, Socrates, Plato, Aristotle, the later ethical period, Neo-Platonism.

(b) The middle ages, with special emphasis on St. Augustine, Scotus Eugeue, Anselm, Thomas Aquinas, St. Bonaventure, Duns Scotus, the revival of Aristotlism, the Problems of Universals.

(c) Modern Philosophy, with special emphasis on the Renaissance (Bruno, Bacon, Hobbes), systems of Rationalism (Descartes, Spinoza, Leibnitz) Empiricism and the Enlightenment (Lock, Berkeley, Hume), German Idealism (Kant, Fischer, Schelling, Hegal).

Ethics.—The nature and scope of ethics, morality and religion, the Problem of moral knowledge, moral progress and a belief and a fact, customary morality, general principles of moral theory, Rationalism, Hedonism, Eudæmonism, moral practice, the system of human values, the nature of human rights, duties, virtues and their place in ethics, justice, ethical and legal economic life and morals, the sex life, the family, the state and other social institutions.

36. *Philosophy (Higher Division) Four Papers.*

Papers 1 and 2, Logic and Epistemology.—Problem of Logic and Epistemology Theoris of the origin of knowledge ; Empirical, Rational, Critical, Development of the knowledge of problem, doctrines of ideas, judgment inference, formal logic, metaphysical logic, mathematical logic, logical positivism, the nature of truth, different theories of knowledge and truth, tests of truths.

Metaphysics.—Relation between Epistemology and Metaphysics, general problem of Metaphysics with special reference to contemporary Philosophy, realism, neo-realism, critical realism, idealism, platonic idealism, idealism of Berkeley, Kant, Hegel, Neo-idealism, Neo-Hegelianism, Pragmatism, problem of Reality and Appearance, Substance and attributes, causality, matter and motion, space and time, value, immortality, God and Creation, Philosophy of Language, Philosophy of Science.

Eiüher Psychology or Indian Philosophy.—Candidates will have to offer one or the other of these two sections.

Papers III & IV Psychology.—The nature and scope of psychology, methods of psychology, theories of mind-body relationship, sensation, perception, memory, imagination, conceptual thinking, reflex action, instincts, intelligence, feelings, emotions, sentiments, will, personality.

The scope and nature of Animal Psychology and Human Psychology, individual and social Psychology, Applied Psychology, Contemporary Schools in Psychology, ; Behaviourism, Hormic Psychology, Gestalt Psychology, Spearman's Psychology, Psycho-Analytic Schools ; Freud, Adler, Jung.

Alternative Papers III & IV. Indian Philosophy.—The religion and philosophy of the Vedic Hymns, the Upanishads, the teaching of the Bhagavadgita and the Epics, the rise and development of Buddhism and Jainism, Indian materialism (Carvaker), the age of the Darsanas, the Realism, and Atomism of the Nyaya and Vaisestha, the School of Mimama, the Anekantavade, (Sydovada) of the Jainas, the earlier Himayana Schools of Buddhism, the origin and the evolution of the Sankhya and the Yoga, the Mahayana and the Vedanta Schools.

A detailed study of either the Advaita Vedanta system of Sankara or the Mahayana School of Buddhism or Early Buddhism.

37. *Pure Mathematics (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Algebra (including complex number), Trigonometry, Geometry (including Analytical Geometry of two and three dimensions), Differential and Integral Calculus and Differential Equations in one independent variable. Each of the two papers will be based on the entire syllabus.

38. *Applied Mathematics (Lower Division) Two Papers.*—Statistics and Dynamics of a particle and of a rigid body. Hydrostatics and Gravitation. Each of the two papers will be based on the entire syllabus.

62. *Criminal Law.*—English Criminal Law and the Criminal Law of Ceylon not including criminal procedure.

63. *Viva Voce (General).*—The candidate will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his career. He will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to assess his suitability for the service for which he is entered, and in framing their assessment the Board will attach particular importance to his intelligence and mental alertness, his vigour and strength of character and his potential qualities of leadership.

SECTION C

64. *World Affairs.*—This will be a written paper of two hours duration and will be designed to test the candidate's knowledge of world affairs with special reference to Modern World. Candidates should indicate the language medium in which they will take this subject.

65. *Viva voce (Special).*—This is in addition to the *viva voce* (general) and is designed to ascertain the suitability of the candidate for the Overseas Service, taking into account such consideration as their personal qualities and other factors such as special knowledge of Foreign Countries, international affairs, international Law and Foreign Languages.

THE Public Service Commission has ordered the publication of the following Scheme of examination of the Open Competitive Examination for admission to Class V of the Ceylon Administrative Service and the Ceylon Overseas Service.

The Scheme of examination dated 31.1.70 published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* No. 14,893 of 13.2.70 is hereby cancelled.

Note (i).—Candidates who offer a natural science subject (subjects 40 to 47 inclusive) must produce a certificate of laboratory training in an institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the Head of the Institution.

Note (ii).—External and Private candidates who offer Geography must produce a certificate of practical training in that subject in an institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the Head of the Institution.

Note (iii).—From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Examiners may consider necessary in order to secure that no credit is allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

Note (iv).—If a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a deduction, which may be of considerable amount will be made on this account from the total marks otherwise accruing to him/her.

Note (v).—Credit will be given for orderly, effective and exact expression, combined with due economy of words, in all the subjects of the examination and not only in subject which is specially devoted to language.

Note (vi).—The marks scored by candidates in the written examination will not be available to the boards conducting the *Viva Voce* tests.

The examination will be held in two parts, Section A of the examination consisting of the Compulsory subjects, Essay, Precis and General Knowledge will be held first. The number of candidates who will be permitted to sit for Section B of the Examination, on the results of Section A of the Examination, will be three times the number of existing vacancies in the Ceylon Administrative Service. Such candidates will be selected in order of merit according to the results of Section A.

Section B of the examination consists of the optional subjects carrying 600 marks and the *Viva Voce (General)* carrying 200 marks. Candidates who enter for the Ceylon Overseas Service will be required to sit for the paper in World Affairs carrying 100 marks in addition to the optional subjects and the *Viva Voce (General)*. Candidates who attain a sufficiently high standard in the World Affairs paper, to be determined by the Public Service Commission, will be summoned for the *Viva Voce (Special)*.

The final order of merit of candidates to be selected for appointment to the Ceylon Administrative Service will be determined after taking into consideration the marks scored by the candidates for both Sections A and B, and the Ceylon Overseas Service, after taking into consideration the marks scored for Sections A, B and C.

**EXAMINATION FOR RECRUITMENT TO GRADE III
OF THE SHROFFS' SERVICE—AUGUST, 1970**

Date of Examination—August 30, 1970

A competitive examination for male and female candidates wishing to enter Grade III of the Shroffs' Service will be held at the following centres on August 30, 1970—Colombo, Gampaha, Negombo, Moratuwa, Kalutara, Kandy, Matale, Nuwara Eliya, Galle, Matara, Hambantota, Jaffna, Point Pedro, Vaddukoddai, Mannar, Vavuniya, Batticaloa, Amparai, Trincomalee, Kurunegala, Puttalam, Chilaw, Anuradhapura, Badulla, Moneragala, Ratnapura and Kegalle.

Any centre for which a sufficient number of candidates does not enter may be cancelled.

Note.—The percentage of females to be recruited would be as decided by the Government.

2. Medium in which Candidates should take the Examination.—Candidates should take this examination in the linguistic medium in which they passed the examination which qualifies them for admission to the examination (i.e., in Sinhala or Tamil or English) provided that—

- (a) a candidate who has passed in the various subjects at the qualifying examination in different media should take the corresponding subjects at this examination in those respective media and the other subjects in the medium in which subject (1) in paragraph 14 (i.e., Language and Composition) is taken;
- (b) temporary Assistant Shroffs referred to in paragraph 6 (i) who do not possess the educational qualifications prescribed in paragraph 5 (iii) may take the examination as a whole in the medium in which they have been taught. Those who had been taught in Tamil or English may opt to take the examination in Sinhala;
- (c) a candidate who has passed the qualifying examination in the Tamil or the English medium, or a candidate who had been taught in the Tamil or the English medium may opt to take this examination in the Sinhala medium.

3. Conditions of Service.—(i) Reference is invited to the General Conditions applicable to appointments to posts in the Public Service, published at the beginning of Part I: Section (II) of this *Gazette*.

(ii) Male candidates who are successful in the examination will be appointed on three years' probation with effect from the date of appointment. Their posts are pensionable.

(iii) Female candidates who are successful in the examination will be appointed on a Provident Fund basis, in the first instance, and will be on trial for a period of three years, with effect from the date of appointment. They are entitled to opt to come into the pensionable establishment at any time before completing 10 years' service. The option once exercised will be irrevocable. Those female candidates who exercise this option during the period of trial will be placed on probation thereafter, the period of probation being equivalent to that part of the three-year trial period which they have not served.

(iv) They will be liable to transfer and may be posted to any station in Ceylon.

(v) Successful candidates, who are deemed to be "New-Entrants" for the purpose of the Official Language Policy, must subscribe to the condition that they will conform to the provisions of the Official Language Act, No. 33 of 1956, and any laws and rules that now exist or may be introduced in the future for giving effect to the language policy of the Government.

Candidates selected for appointment as Shroffs, if "New-Entrants" for the purpose of the Official Language Policy, should acquire proficiency in the Official Language—Sinhala—during their probationary/trial period. Confirmation of these candidates at the expiry of the probationary/trial period will depend on satisfactory work and conduct and on the passing of a prescribed proficiency test in Sinhala.

(vi) Selected candidates will be required to furnish security as follows:—

- (a) Guarantee Bond in Rs. 2,000.
- (b) Cash Rs. 2,500.

The cash security referred to in (b) above may be built up by an initial deposit of Rs. 1,250 and monthly instalments of Rs. 20 and a final instalment of Rs. 10

until the deposit of Rs. 2,500 is reached. Thereafter at the option of the officer further monthly contributions of Rs. 10 may be continued till the cash deposit accumulates to Rs. 4,000 when security through the Guarantee Association will cease.

4. *Salary.*—Successful candidates will be appointed to Grade III of the Shroffs' Service on the consolidated salary scale of Rs. 3,000 per annum rising by 24 annual increments of Rs. 90 to Rs. 5,160 per annum. In this scale an Efficiency Bar operates before Rs. 3,900 per annum.

5. *Eligibility.*—General Conditions :—

- (i) Candidates must be of good character.
- (ii) Candidates must be Ceylonese*.

* For all purposes of recruitment to the Public Service the term "Ceylonese" is defined as a Citizen of Ceylon by descent or by registration.

(iii) Candidates should possess at least one of the following :—

- (a) The Ceylon Senior School Certificate with credit passes in at least four subjects including Language and Arithmetic or Pure Mathematics or Elementary Mathematics or Commercial Arithmetic.
- (b) The London Matriculation Certificate or the Cambridge Senior Certificate.
- (c) The General Certificate of Education (Ordinary Level) in :—
 - (1) Sinhala/Tamil Language,
 - (2) Arithmetic or Pure Mathematics or Elementary Mathematics or Commercial Arithmetic, and
 - (3) four other subjects, provided passes in five of these subjects have been secured on one and the same occasion, and credit passes have been obtained in at least four subjects including Language and Arithmetic or Pure Mathematics or Elementary Mathematics or Commercial Arithmetic.
- (d) The Senior Domestic Science Certificate.
- (e) The Sinhala Tamil Commercial Certificate of the Department of Examinations, Ceylon.

Note.—Applications will not be entertained from candidates who have sat any of the examinations mentioned above, the results of which have not been released before the closing date of applications for this examination.

(iv) Candidates must not be less than 17 years, nor more than 22 years of age on August 1, 1970.

5A. *Eligibility, Special Concessions to Retrenched Civilian Employees of the United Kingdom Services in Ceylon.*—Provided they are qualified in all other respects, Ceylonese Civilian Employees of the U. K. Services in Ceylon, who have been discharged on or after July 6, 1956, or who are due to be discharged consequent on the Government's decision to take over the Bases, and the employees of the Royal Naval Wireless Station at Narahenpita (Anderson Station) who were discharged after September 27, 1954, as a result of the Government's decision to shift this station to Periyarakachchi in the Trincomalee District, will be eligible for the following concessions :—

- (i) In computing age for the purpose of the age limit prescribed in paragraph 5 (iv), they will be allowed to deduct their periods of service under the U. K. Services from their ages, provided such service was continuous and satisfactory.
- (ii) Those who have completed at least 4 years' continuous satisfactory service under the U. K. Services on or before June 29, 1970, and who do not possess the educational qualifications specified in paragraph 5 (iii) will be permitted to sit this examination, provided they have passed at least one of the examinations mentioned in paragraph 6 (iii) A (a).

5B. *Eligibility, Special Concessions to ex-Servicemen of the Armed Forces.*—(i) In computing age for the purpose of the age limit prescribed in paragraph 5 (iv) ex-servicemen of the Armed Forces, i.e., members of the Armed Forces transferred to the Reserve after service in the Regular Force, or officers and servicemen who have left the Armed Forces except those who have

been cashiered, dismissed, discharged with ignominy, or had to leave the service for any sort of misconduct, will be allowed to deduct their periods of service in the Regular Force from their ages.

(ii) Those who count not less than four years service in the Regular Force and who do not possess the educational qualifications specified in paragraph 5 (ii) will be permitted to sit this examination, provided, they have passed at least one of the examinations mentioned in paragraph 6 (iii) A (a).

5C. *Eligibility, Special Concessions to Retrenched Government Employees.*—Persons who have served Government in a permanent or temporary capacity and whose services have been discontinued for reasons other than that their work or conduct, was unsatisfactory will be eligible for the following concessions :—

In computing age for the purpose of the age limit, prescribed in paragraph 5 (v) they will be allowed to deduct from their ages, their periods of service under Government other than those terminated by dismissal or owing to unsatisfactory work or by resignation.

6. *Eligibility, Special Concessions to Government Employees.*—(1) Temporary Assistant Shroffs who have completed 2 years' continuous satisfactory service on June 29, 1970, will be permitted to sit the examination, irrespective of educational qualifications, provided they are under 45 years of age on August 1, 1970.

(i) Persons holding temporary posts in Government employ who are not eligible for the concession set out in paragraph 6 (i) will be permitted to sit the examination, provided they—

- (a) possess the educational qualifications specified in paragraph 5 (iii) ;
- (b) are under 45 years of age on August 1, 1970, and
- (c) have completed at least 1 year's continuous satisfactory service under Government immediately prior to June 30, 1970.

(ii) A. Persons holding temporary posts in Government employ who are not eligible for the concessions set out in paragraph 6 (i) and 6 (i), but who have completed at least 4 years' continuous service under Government immediately prior to June 30, 1970, will be permitted to sit the examination, provided—

- (a) they possess the educational qualifications stipulated in paragraph 6 (iii) A (a) ;
- (b) they are under 45 years of age on August 1, 1970.
- (iii) Persons holding permanent posts in Government employ on May 19, 1970, will be permitted to sit the examination subject to the exceptions in Note (iii) below, provided they—

- (a) possess the educational qualifications specified in paragraph 5 (iii) ;
- (b) are under 45 years of age on August 1, 1970 ; and
- (c) their services are certified as satisfactory by the Heads of their Departments and the Heads of their Departments are prepared to release them if selected for appointment to the Shroffs' Service.

(iii) A. Persons holding permanent posts in Government employ who have completed at least 4 years' continuous service under Government immediately prior to June 30, 1970, will be permitted to sit the examination subject to the exception in Note (iii) below provided—

- (a) they possess one of the following :—
 - (i) Cambridge Junior Certificate ;
 - (ii) J. S. C. of the Education Department ;
 - (iii) J. S. C. of a school approved by the Education Department ;
 - (iv) Either the Commercial Education Certificate (General Commercial or Shorthand Typists' Section) (Overseas) or the Higher Commercial Education Certificate (General Commercial or Shorthand Typists' Section) (Overseas) under the Ceylon Scheme of the London Chamber of Commerce ;
 - (v) Either the Commercial Education Certificate (General Commercial or Shorthand Typists' Section) or the Higher Commercial Education Certificate (General Commercial or Shorthand Typists' Section)

Section) awarded by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce and the Ceylon Education Department;

- (vi) The Commercial Certificate or the Higher Commercial Certificate (for Book-Keepers' or for Shorthand Typists) awarded by Technical Colleges under the Ministry of Education and Cultural Affairs;

- (b) they are under 45 years of age on August 1, 1970; and
 (c) their services are certified as satisfactory by the Heads of their Departments and the Heads of their Departments are prepared to release them if selected for appointment to the Shroffs' Service.

Note.—(i) Officers in categories 6 (iii) and 6 (iii) A above, appointed prior to September 24, 1956, who are successful in this examination will be regarded as old-entrants for the purpose of the Official Language Policy.

Note.—(ii) Candidates seeking admission to the examination under the provisions of paragraph 6 of the notification will not be eligible for War Service concessions appearing among the General Conditions published at the beginning of Part I: Section (II) of this Gazette.

Clerical Service; and Pupil Teachers; Local Government Service Commission employees; employees of Boards, Corporations and similar autonomous bodies and permanent, temporary and casual employees falling within the categories referred to in paragraph 3 of Treasury Circular No. 629 of 4.12.63 and members of the Armed Forces and the Ceylon Police will not be eligible to sit this examination under paragraphs 6 (iii) and 6 (iii) A. Officers in Departmental Clerical Services, recruitment to which has now ceased, will however, be eligible.

7. Applications.—(i) A specimen form of application is published at the end of this notification. The candidature of a candidate who fails to produce one of the documents referred to above will be treated as provisional. Such candidature may be cancelled at the discretion of the Commissioner of Examinations.

10. Documents of Eligibility.—(i) No documents whatsoever should be forwarded with the application but the necessary particulars should all be provided in the form as required. An application which is not complete in all these respects will be judged on its own merits and may be rejected.

(ii) Documentary evidence in proof of eligibility will be required from candidates who have qualified. Such candidates should produce these documents at the *Viva Voce* test, if held, or forward them promptly under registered cover when called for by the Commissioner of Examinations.

- (iii) The following documents will be necessary:—
 (a) A certificate of good character signed by a responsible person.

Note.—If a candidate is in attendance at or has recently left a Government or Assisted School, the certificate of character must be

- (e) Original certificate of service as a civilian employee of the United Kingdom Services in Ceylon, or certificate of Service in the Armed Forces (in respect of candidates referred to in paragraph 5A and 5B).
- (f) Original certificate of service under Government (in respect of candidates referred to in paragraph 5c).
- (g) Identity Card (at the viva voce test, if held).

(iv) Candidates are warned to have all the necessary documents in readiness at the time of application. Any candidate who is unable to produce the necessary documents at the viva voce test, if held, or who delays in producing them when called for by the Commissioner of Examinations will have his/her entry rejected.

11. *Penalty for furnishing false particulars.*—If a candidate is found to be ineligible according to the Regulations for this Examination his/her candidature is liable to be cancelled at any stage prior to, during or after the examination.

If any of the particulars furnished by a candidate are found to be false within his/her knowledge, or if he/she has wilfully suppressed any material fact, or if it is proved, at any time during the period of his/her service that he/she was ineligible to sit this examination, he/she will be liable to immediate dismissal from the service. The number to be called for the *Viva Voce* test will be fixed by the Additional Deputy Secretary to the Treasury, in consultation with the Commissioner of Examinations. The *Viva Voce* test may, however, be dispensed with if the number of candidates qualifying for it falls short of the number of vacancies.

15. *Publication of Results and Offer of Appointments.*—The names of successful candidates will be published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* and they will be given appointments as suitable vacancies occur.

16. *Vacancies.*—The number of vacancies to be filled on the results of this examination will be determined by the Additional Deputy Secretary to the Treasury having regard to the actual requirements of the service.

17. *Medical Examination.*—The selected candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of Ceylon.
