Eastern Archipelago—Celebes, South Coast—Sunken Rock south-westward of Cape Bulu Bulu.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 22 of 1893) that the Master of the Netherlands Indies steam-vessel Japara reports the existence of an isolated rock, with a depth of 16 ft. on it, situated about one mile off shore in a position with Malasoro point in line with Jeneponto head, bearing about W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.; and point Petaing about N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

Approximate position: lat. $5^{\circ} 42' 50''$ S., long. $119^{\circ} 44' 25''$ E.

Eastern Archipelago—Lombok—Light at Ampepan.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 23 of 1898) that on January 5, 1898, a sixth order fixed white light, elevated 41 ft. above the sea, and visible 11 miles in clear weather, was shown from a white framework, iron support, 42 ft. in height, with the keeper's dwelling (white, red roof) adjoining, situated in a position bearing N.E. by N, distant 68 yards from Ampepan flagstaff, west coast of Lombok.

Approximate position: lat. $8^{\circ} 34' 15''$ S., long. $116^{\circ} 3' 55''$ E.

Pacific Ocean—Philippine Islands—Mindanao—Iligan Bay—Amended particulars of Coral Patch eastward of point Bombon.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 25 of 1898) that an examination has recently been made of the

danger marked "Rocky bank," &c., about 12 miles eastward of point Bombon, west side of Iligan bay, with the under-mentioned result :—

This patch, consisting of coral and white sand, is about 3 cables in length north-west and south-east within the 5-fathom line and 2 cables broad, with a least depth of 16 ft. on it, and soundings of upwards of 50 fathoms about a mile off around.

It is situated about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.E. by N. from the position in which it has hitherto been shown on the charts, or approximately in lat. $8^{\circ} 40'$ N., long. $123^{\circ} 51'$ E.

Bay of Bengal—Burma Coast—Caution—Position of Wreck of Steamer Medusa.

A telegraphic communication has been received from the Port Officer, Rangoon, stating that the Commander of the Royal Indian Marine steamer Minto reports that the wreck of the steamer Medusa lies sunk from 6 to 8 fathoms water bearing south 27° east, true, from Table island lighthouse, distance 9 cables approximate and 5 cables approximate from the shore; fore and after ends submerged; bridge above water; foremast standing. Mariners are warned accordingly.
