

Examination paper evaluation payment increased

He said the decision was taken after Cabinet approval. Accordingly, allowances are given to university lecturers and lecturers who participate in the evaluation of the answer scripts.

"The evaluation of the answer scripts should be completed immediately, as the Examinations Department is lagging to hold two Ordinary Level (O/L) examinations and one A/L examination," he said. Meanwhile, Examinations Commissioner-

General H.J.M.C.Amith Jayasundara told the media that the payment made for examiners to evaluate answer scripts was Rs. 500 in 2019.

"Later, the payment was increased during the COVID period, and now it is increased to Rs. 2,000 as daily payment," he said.

"In 2020, a Chief Examiner, who was not in a science subject was paid Rs. 62,050 for the whole evaluation process (for 12 days), but that has been increased to Rs. 101.600. Additional Chief Examiners (Senior Teachers) were paid Rs. 52,250, but it was increased to Rs. 90,270. Assistant Examiners were paid Rs. 36,725 and it is now increased to Rs. 60,475.

"Chief Examiners for science subjects were paid Rs. 64,550 in 2020, and it is increased to Rs. 106,506. The charges for the Additional Chief Examiners have been increased to Rs. 95,946 from Rs. 59,900.

"The allowance of an assistant examiner was Rs. 44,199, and was increased to Rs. 64,460. "There are 1,200 University academics who engage in the answer script evaluation, and their allowances have been increased by 100%," he said.

The 2022 GCE A/L examinations ended on February 17.

"The evaluation process of the answer scripts should be completed within six weeks. But the process got delayed as teachers and lecturers raised the payment issue," he said.

Envoy asserts zero chance of illegal entry

Australia's High Commissioner to Sri Lanka, Paul Stephens, told Daily Mirror that both Sri Lanka and Australia continue to work together to curb people smuggling.

A number of failed attempts were reported during the economic crisis with the Sri Lanka Navy managing to nab most of them.

The Ambassador also noted that a strong campaign is being carried out in Sri Lanka where anyone attempting to migrate illegally to Australia are informed that they have "zero chance" of reaching Australia. "No boats from Sri Lanka have made it to Australia. No illegal entrants from Sri Lanka have made it to Australia," he said.

Stephens also said that there is a system in place for anyone seeking refugee status in Australia through its humanitarian settlement programme and such applications will be assessed by the UN refugee agency.

So they need to follow the decision faithfully. Else they would be belittling the authority of the Supreme Court and undermine the basis of democracy," the Cardinal said.

"It was reported that two Members of Parliament have spoken concerning the judgement given by the Supreme Court enforcing on the secretary, Ministry of Finance and Attorney General the allocation of funds that has been approved by Parliament for conducting local elections. The MPs have called this decision, a violation of their parliamentary privileges by Courts. This matter is to be viewed with great concern.



ajor trade unions, student unions and a number of political parties are up in arms over the recently revised income tax structure of the country. Under the proposed tax revision, persons drawing up to Rs.100,000 do not pay taxes. Those receiving up to Rs. 141,667 pay approximately Rs. 2,500 (6%) per month. Persons receiving an income up to 266,667 are subject to a 24% tax amounting to Rs. 25,000/- per month and only those receiving over Rs. 750,000/- per month are subject to a 36% or Rs. 196,500/- monthly income tax.

Government receives revenue for its expenditure, via income tax, which forms the backbone of government income, which keep the wheels of the economy turning over smoothly.

Subsidies which the people of our country have enjoyed since independence such as 'free education', 'free medication' via state hospitals, clinics etc, subsidies on fertilizer etc will no longer be possible if revenue drops. In the aftermath of the collapse of our economy and default on international debt repayment, increased taxes are inevitable via IMF demands. The alternative will be to raise taxes via indirect taxation, which will mean the ordinary man and women in the country will have to bear this burden.

A long time ago there lived in Germany a man named Karl Marx who wrote a book titled 'Das Kapital' - a critique of the political economy. Marx believed that strikes unified the working class, that they were a manifestation of class struggle and directly undermined elite members of society.

By a strange quirk of fate, in this country we are now seeing a twist in working class struggles. Today, the average income earner in a family of four (which comprises over 50% of the population) does not exceed Rs. 70,000/- per month. This bracket therefore is untouched by the revised income tax policy.

The groups leading the struggle against the tax revision are the university students, professional groups such as doctors, engineers plus port workers, electricity board workers and school teachers.

Other than professional groups such as doctors who are holding helpless patients to ransom, and engineers, the other groups who are demanding a lowering of the new income tax regime are not touched by the revised tax plan.

The most vociferous group demand an income tax revision however, are students of the state universities, who reap the benefits of our 'free education'. Yet this 'free education' is paid for by the state via taxes paid by ordinary citizens of this country.

Figures published by the University Grants Commission, show, government expenditure on University Education in 2021 stood at a whopping Rs. 25,000,000,000 or Rs. 25 billion! Government expenditure on education as a whole stands at Rs.154.9 billion plus (University Grants Commission

Our 'free health service' too comes at a cost. According to the World Health Organization's Global Health Expenditure database 4.8% of our GDP was spent on our health sector. These services which we take as 'free' are in fact paid by the state mainly from revenues gained from taxes both direct and indirect.

The question which arises is why university students who are direct beneficiaries of 'free education' demand taxes be lowered? Are they in fact demanding government cut back in services to higher education? Are they calling for a scrapping of state-funded university education system? Would the now prominent university student leader be able to continue his seemingly endless period of higher education had he or his family had to pay for it?

At college level, if a student fails his 'A' level exam thrice, he has to leave school. Yet a present university student leader - now nearing his forties, and who probably has more cases pending than many a briefless lawyer - is still milking the system which continues to provide him a 'free education'. He too is demanding a lowering of taxes for the super-rich of this country, whose taxes play a role in his continued 'free education'.

Lanka has many firsts worldwide. We elected the world's first prime minister and now we have another first. Our trade unions are calling for a strike on March 15 to protect the rights of the capitalist class.

In the UK and in the US, the Labour Party and the Democratic Party campaign to raise taxes. It is the Conservatives and Republicans who call for a reduction in taxes.

Its time our trade unions recognise with whom their loyalties lie - with workers or capitalists?

WHEN STRIKERS TAKE GOVT. HOSTAGE, THE STATE UNRAVELS

The President should not let that happen

ri Lankans often draw the comparison to Singapore or South Korea and lament why their country could not replicate the economic success of the other. That is a misplaced comparison, for they generally pick and choose a few Asian Tiger economies, which were rather an exception, not the norm in the recent history of international political economy.

However, there is no argument that independent Sri Lanka has seen needless chaos and bloodshed. That is not to say other states did not; Chiang Kai-shek's white terror to subdue communism killed easily half a million. Suharto turned Bali into a prison camp and was responsible for two million deaths. But in retrospect, considering the long period of political no matter how monstrous, could even be termed utilitarian.

Whereas Sri Lanka has seen repeated outbursts of insurgency and terrorism, which were then pacified, often too late, at a tremendous cost of lives. Why was that? What were those particular grievances that the Southern youth had to wage an abortive leftist revolution to oust the most socialist government of the country in 1971?

Why so strong a sense of despondency in a country that has provided universal health care, free education and, until 1977, a ration of subsidized rice? The lack of land ownership was identified in the postmortem of **1971** as a main grievance. That led the government at the time to one of the most far-reaching land reforms in the world, under a prime minister from one of the largest land-owning families in the country, who lost most due to the reforms. Such selfless dedication is also a rarity in politics. Feudalism in Pakistani politics and entrenched inequality in society, and, in part, the state's inability to reform is largely routed in its land-owning families.

However, land reforms did not prevent another nihilistic uprising in the South a decade or so later.

Also, what were those specific grievances that the Sri Lankan Tamils had, that their Malaysian counterpart did not? That was despite the fact that the first commander of the Navy was a Tamil, and in 1983, when the Tamil political leadership was backing a nascent separatist insurgency, the Attorney General, IGP and one-third of the bureaucracy were Tamil. Neither Malaysia nor Singapore ever had a non-**Malay or non-Chinese** service chief and are unlikely to have one, given how ethnic roles are defined.

It was not about grievances per see. Sri Lankan plunged into repeated chaos, not because it wronged any community. It was because, from the very outset of independence, it has always been a weak state.

From **Dudley Senanayake**, who resigned

heartbroken when a handful of rioters were killed in a police shooting during the 1953 Hartal, and SWRD Bandaranaike who tore a modest resolution to the ethnic demands, under threat of marauding Buddhist monks, **Sri Lanka** had been governed by a set of politicians who were manifestly lacking political will. They might have been incorruptible gentlemen, but they lacked that 'iron' in them to rule a new state. They were mere passengers who rode in the gravy chain, not the statesmen Sri Lanka deserved at the time. Again, the idea of a statesman is country and time specific. Probably, Augusto Pinochet is a greater statesman

than his benign but incompetent peers. Weak and indecisive political leaders at the helm worsened another particular ailment that was not unique to Sri Lanka. As Samuel Huntington aptly observed then, the extent of political and social empowerment of these new states overwhelmed their stillborn institutions because institutional empowerment was lagging behind mass empowerment. This, in effect, created a vacuum filled by charlatans who promised the sun and the moon and demagogues who harped on inflated and concocted grievances.

A strong political leadership should have provided a stabilizing effect by using the institutions to navigate these contradictions. That did not happen in Sri Lanka until it was too late. Both northern Tamil political elites and Southern Marxists of the JVP exploited this vacuum. The rest is history.

Today, **Sri Lanka** is facing a no less nihilistic attack at its weakest moment. A host of government trade unions have threatened an indefinite strike from **March 15** unless the government revokes the income tax reforms. This is a catch-22 situation. Should it walk back on the tax reforms, it would seriously undermine the confidence of the creditors, and the IMF, which earlier demanded that the tax threshold be lowered to **Rs.45,000 a month**.

The Rupee has soared against the US Dollar in the hope of an impending IMF extended funding facility, which will be presented for board approval on March **20**. An abrupt change to the tax policy by the government would not only negatively reflect its commitment to stick to the agreed reform agenda but also lead to further delay on a financial lifeline.

Should that happen, the country's economic freefall, stabilized during the last few months, would resume again.

On the other hand, the government's refusal to cave into the trade union demands would plunge the country into a full-blown strike in the coming weeks, if not days. That would bring the government hospitals, ports, electricity and water supply, transport, postal, and schools, among others, to a grinding halt. The public would be greatly inconvenienced, and hospital services would be crippled, threatening many lives. The entire country would come to a standstill, delivering a fatal blow to the economy in a life-support system.

This still would not be the end, but the beginning of an end. The collapse of the public service would be the prelude to the return of anarchy.

A government devoid of decisive action would condemn the nation to a period of heightened uncertainty, instability and an economic free fall. Public discontent and a vacuum of decisive political leadership would be exploited by the fringe groups, including some of the fellow travellers of Aragalaya, Peratugamis, and everyday charlatans. At worst, this could lead to state capture. Though that is a long shot, and Sri Lanka's coercive organs are effective enough to spoil any such attempt, the disruption and chaos this bout of anarchy would unleash would damage **Sri Lanka** beyond repair.

President Ranil Wickremesinghe should not let that happen. He should use powers in his office and all available measures of state power to nip the nihilistic and selfseeking strike in its bud.

In the first place, an industrious government should be able to divert the public anger of the mass inconvenience to the perpetrators themselves. That should be the prelude to other measures that should follow. However, this government has proved incompetent in messaging the public; its opponents have also exploited the failure. Any disruption of essential services, which have already been gazetted, should be dealt with under the law, including asset seizures and prison sentences. The military should be mobilized to run the operations at the ports and other essential services and, where needed to maintain public order.

If it comes to the crunch, and the government's deficit of political legitimacy is holding it back, appoint the chief of defence staff as the competent authority to run the essential services. Sri Lanka does not have a history of military takeovers. Instead, it has been ravaged by terrorists and extremists in the North and South three times. This should not be opening for another such eventuality.

Sri Lanka needs a political leadership that can act decisively. If the President fails, he does not deserve to be in office.



n the Book of Psalms, lines 107:14 says, "He brought them out of darkness and gloom, and broke their bonds asunder," which reminds this writer of Dr. Gamini Goonetilleke. The Daily Mirror met this person- a surgeon- and there was much he had to say during his interview with us. Dr. Goonetilleke is a person who values his patients more than anything else. He sat with us during one evening and he walked us through one of his thoughtprovoking and nerve-racking experiences as a surgeon. Lalitha, his patient, was in a desperate situation where she had swallowed food with difficulty for eight years. If not for this doctor she might have suffered her entire life.

Lalitha is a 29-year-old spinster, the only child in the family living with her mother Somawathie, who is a rubber tapper earning a daily wage. Following an argument, Lalitha attempted suicide by swallowing Acetic acid (referred to as rubber acid by those in that occupation and usually kept in their homes. It is used to coagulate latex). This life-threatening incident took place in May 1990 at their home in Ingiriya. She collapsed with acute chest pains and was rushed to the nearby District Hospital.

Following initial treatment she was sent to a hospital with better facilities; located farther away. There she spent the next two months with her mother by her side. She couldn't swallow at that point, therefore, a general hospital's thoracic

unit was recommended to her. Her gullet had narrowed and strictured, according to the diagnosis. Lalitha said that efforts had been made on 48 occasions to widen the constricted gullet, so that she could swallow during meals. Talking about surgery, this operation is known as oesophagoscopy and oesophageal dilatation (gullet), according to Dr Gamini. "I remember that she had to endure general anesthesia each time, and the treatment took place over the course of eight years. Every time she had some symptom alleviation it never amounted to a full resolution of her issue. When she was sent to my Unit

at the Sri Jayewardenapura General Hospital (SJGH) from that hospital and I first saw her it was October 1998. The patent was 37 years old then. When she was admitted to the ward her physique was withering and she appeared sick. The biggest issue Lalitha faced was that she had trouble in swallowing and could only consume liquids, and even then, just a trickle at a time. She was slowly, but steadily losing body mass, which was a very pitiful scenario," he recalled.

This writer questioned Dr.

Goonetilleke in order to get him to explore and explain the scenario in much simpler terms. Acetic acid burns the gullet when it is swallowed (the passage that takes food from the throat to the stomach). The immediate aftermath includes shock and severe chest discomfort. The gullet eventually narrows after the initial burn lesion heals as a result of the scar tissue contracting. It becomes challenging to swallow food and liquids due to the constriction of the gullet. If extensive reconstructive surgery is not performed to remove the burned gullet and replace it with another section of the gullet that wouldn't allow her to take food in a satisfying manner. This condition may eventually bring death to the patient due to dehydration, anemia, and starvation," he explained.

"The typical path was entirely obstructed, making it unthinkable to control Lalitha by feeding her with healthy food. Even when attempting to insert a tube (a nasogastric tube) through her nose and into her stomach the procedure proved to be too much of a challenge. As a result, we needed to find another solution. A short surgical operation was performed on her, during which a tube was placed into a small intestinal loop. It's known as a Jejunostomy.

This made it possible for us to give her liquids strong in protein and energy to make up for her dietary inadequacies. She went through this process for three months before being ready, both physically and mentally,

to have major surgery," he said. According to Dr. Goonetilleke, Lalitha underwent a major surgical procedure that lasted 8 hours. The gullet that was burnt and scarred was completely removed following an approach using the neck and the

Narrowing of the 'gullet' after acid ingestion abdomen- where the gullet is situated -without opening up the chest. This procedure is referred to as "Transhiatal Blunt Oesophagectomy" (TBO). Next, a segment of the large bowel with its blood supply was prepared. This segment was taken through the chest and placed in the normal site of the gullet and was used to bridge the gap. This was connected at the top end to the Pharynx (throat) and at the bottom end to the stomach. This will now act as the conduit to convey food from the pharynx to the stomach. Lalitha survived and returned home happy and was able to swallow food and drink once again. She was advised to attend the clinic on a regular basis, but she defaulted on many occasions for

Lalitha, speaking to Daily Mirror, said that if not for Dr. Goonetilleke, she would not have been able to see the light of day. "Eight years after the operation I met Chathupala, a 61-yearold rubber tapper. One year later I gave birth to Kumuditha, my only son. I was functioning normally after the surgery performed with the 'Godly hands' of Dr. Goonetilleke. I had no intention of living further when I could not eat, I lost all hope and my only hope was death. It is only due to Dr. Goonetilleke that I saw a ray of hope and regained my appetite for living," Lalitha said.

various socio-economic reasons.

It was following that episode that Dr. Goonetilleke reappears in her life. Dr. Goonetilleke with a radiant smile said, "To my surprise she appeared at the clinic one-day carrying baby Kumuditha. "She was well, but the reason for her visiting the clinic was to obtain some financial assistance from me to buy milk for her baby boy and some vitamins for her. Lalitha used to visit my clinic whenever she was in a desperate financial need. Chatupala had no permanent job and used to earn Rs 300 a day on and off. That was barely sufficient for their sustenance; especially with the couple having to nurture a small child," he said.

Dr. Goonetilleke retired from service in October 2014 and afterwards she couldn't find him at the clinic anymore. Lalitha had lost all hopes in life although she managed to survive in order to bring up her son.

'Three years later Lalitha returned to the SJGH ward where she had received treatment in a desperate attempt to seek help. The workers knew Lalitha well, and she got my phone number from one of them. Lalitha was able to get in touch with me once again as a result. I realised that those calls were coming to me from the Almighty up there and could not be ignored," the doctor said humbly.

Dr. Goonetilleke said that he had visited her residence in Handapangoda on the Meepe- Ingiriya road; which is about 40 km from the heart of Colombo. "It was a sad plight at first sight. In fact, the construction of the house was incomplete, and the inside was so dark resembling a dungeon. They were certainly living in darkness. I spoke with them regarding their problems. They were faced with plenty of problems and all of them were connected to poverty and the lack of a regular income," the doctor said.

Dr. Goonetilleke with the help of his friends and other donors has done a tremendous meritorious job to improve the lives of Lalitha's family.

Lalitha, with tears in her eyes, said that all the requirements for her son are fulfilled by Dr. Goonetilleke. She said that the doctor had bought all the equipment that was needed by Kumuditha to pursue online education during the COVID pandemic.

Lalitha and her son used to walk two Km daily to reach the main road to get a bus to school. A school van was arranged to take the boy to school. Additional classes in English, Mathematics and Information Technology were also arranged so that Kumuditha would receive a sound education. Every month Lalitha receives Rs 15,000 and on some months sometimes more to cover their daily expenses, including the purchasing of medicines.

Dr. Goonetilleke, being pensive for a moment, said "After each telephone conversation the parting words are "Sir we are happy now, May God Bless you and your family. When are you coming to see us again".

Having waited two weeks for anyone to give life to Ehelepola Kumarihamy, the Menike of Ehelepola Maha Adikaram who sacrificed her life, her children and above all the Chanter of womanhood, for the sake of her husband and the country, has been forgotten by our women's organizations and also by the political authorities.

Ehelepola Kumarihamy is a Martyr and undoubtedly the icon of Sri Lankan womanhood.

Is it because, she knew no English nor hobnobbed with people with foreign influence and that's why our women's organizations have forgotten Ehelepola Kumarihamy. She was the wife of Ehelepola, the First Adigar of the 6th Century Kandyana Kingdom.

Ehelepola Kumarihamy was considered the most beautiful woman in the Court of Kandy, surpassing Subamma, the mother of Sri Wickrama Rajasinghe. She was the sister of Maha Adikaram Keppetipola and wife of Disava Ehelepola. Subamma arrived in the Kandyan Kingdom with the nine-year-old Kannaswamy, the usurper to the Kandyan Throne, who became Sri Wickrama Rajasinghe. She was considered as the most beautiful woman in the Kandyan territory. This would have been the reason for Pilimatalawa fostering her and bringing up Kannaswamy, later to be elevated to the throne against the wishes of the Court.

Ehelepola Kumarihamy, rejected the advances of King Sri Wickrama Rajasinghe and in fact 'slapped' the King for entering her residence one night, after the King sent Maha Adikaram as the Dissava of Sabaragamuwa out on an official assignment. This was done by purpose so that he could visit the Kumarihamy. It so happens that the front door of

the Palace offers a view to the house of Ehelepola; down Raja Veediya (even presently). It is said that in the mornings Ehelepola Kumarihamyafter a bath wearing Jasmine flowers around her neck- used to sit on the upstairs of the house. The King could see her from his palace doorway. This is how the King desired for here and got slapped when she visited the home of Ehelepola Kumarihamy in the night.

One could opine that King Sri Wickrama Rajasinghe 'bent the law (bending the law has its disastrous consequences) for his own ends against the advice of one of his confidantes in Court; Tennakoon Rajapakse Mudiyanselage Punchi Banda. He said that the law didn't permit children to be pounded. But Molligoda, who had an axe to grind with Ehelepola, read out the order of the King. It is a known fact that the King by this time was a drunkard and whether he really understood Molligoda is questionable.

It was said by British observers at the time that Ehelepola Kumarihamy only took the pounder in her hand and laid it on the mortar. She did this in order to avoid the shame that she

would be handed over to a 'Gahalava'

(a low-caste person). Charles Pridham in his book 'A historical, political and statistical account of Ceylon and its dependencies (Volumes London 1849, pp. 185 - 186) states "Palipane Disawa witnessing the drowning of Ehelepola Kumarihamy and her female relative in the Bogambara Tank was so affected that he fainted and was deprived of his office for showing such tender sensibility". He further records, during the two

days, the whole of Kandy, with the exception of the court of Sri Wickrama Rajasinghe, was one of mourning. So deep was his grief that not a fire was kindled, nor food dressed and a general fast was held. "This is a clear manifestation to the popularity of Ehelepola Maha Adikaram and Kandyans never reckoned Ehelepola as a traitor. By placing Kannaswamy on the throne, he had other motives and thought young Kannaswamy, who was 18-years-old, could be used as a pawn in his hands. However he was beheaded due to a flimsy suspicion. It is in this background that events took a turn in the Kandyan Court.

Punchi Banda the man who advised the King as his confidante was banished from the inner city. He lived outside in the outer city. The correct place where Ehelepola's children were beheaded and where the severed heads of her children were to be pounded were in the centre of the area between the Maha Vahalkada of Natha Devale and the flight of steps leading to the Maha Devala or popularly known as Vishnu Devale. This is known as "Deva Sanhinda". The King sat at the doorway of the Palace and witnessed the barbaric massacre of innocent women and children. The incident did not take place at the Maha Maluwa as many writers portray.

NILLIAMSON LEADS NEW ZEALAND

ane Williamson was hailed as "world class" after New Zealand's record Test run-scorer orchestrated a dramatic last-ball win over Sri Lanka on a rain-disrupted final day in Christchurch on Monday.

The thrilling triumph at the Hagley Oval scuppered Sri Lanka's chances of making the World Test Championship inal, handing the spot to India.

In a helter-skelter finish, the only Sri Lankans not guarding the boundary for most of the closing 10 overs were the bowler and wicketkeeper as New Zealand chased down their target of 285.

Having lost eight wickets and on a day limited to 53 overs, skipper Tim Southee paid tribute to his star batsman Williamson.

The former captain finished 121 not out and ran a bye off the final delivery of the match in a remarkable conclusion, to go with New Zealand's one-run victory over England a fortnight ago.

"Seeing how calm he is out in the middle keeps us calm as well," Southee said as New Zealand celebrated another famous, nail-biting win.

"The guys were very trusting in what he was going to do and alongside Daryl Mitchell) for most of the day it was a great partnership that got us in that great position.

"He's a world-class player and worldclass players are able to perform in different conditions." Visiting captain Dimuth Karunaratne said that fielding errors let his side down, particularly dropping the talisman Williamson on 33.

"We had a good chance to win, unfortunately we are the losing side,"

"We had misfields a few times that cost us the game. We have to minimise those mistakes.



Banks lift overseas spending limits imposed on credit cards as dollar liquidity improves

presidential intervention, the Sri Lanka Shippers' Council (SLSC) warned that the recent decision by Ports, Shipping and Aviation Minister Nimal Siripala De Silva to remove the regulations on freight charges is likely to hurt the competitiveness of Sri Lanka's exports and result in higher import costs, fuelling inflation.

In a gazette notification issued on March 3, 2023, De Silva rescinded the regulations issued under Section 10 of the Licensing of Shipping Agents, Freight Forwarders, Non-Vessel Operating Common Carriers and Container Operators Act, No. 10 of 1972, which made the service providers to subject to all applicable charges such as terminal handling charges, full container load and less than container load charges, to be included in all-inclusive freight.

"The rescinding of the gazette has created a ripple effect, which will lead to Sri Lanka's imports and exports becoming more expensive, due to unethical surcharging, thereby becoming uncompetitive and in turn leading to the loss of its market share in the global market," the SLSC said in a statement yesterday.

"Imports to Sri Lanka will become more expensive after the removal of the legislation, due to the addition of unethical surcharges as in the past (44line items were charged) and the breaking of freight cost into

many parts, which ultimately ends up being charged from noncontracting parties. The result is the rise in inflation and cost of living in the country," the SLSC cautioned.

With the removal of the "promarket" regulations, the SLSC also cautioned on possible illegal foreign exchange outflows from the country.

"With the rescinding of Gazette No. 2041/10, therein lies the question of whether foreign exchange will flow out of the country illegally, due to the possible introduction of zero freight again and surcharges levied on non-contractual parties, simply because there is no coverage of same, through the law of the land," it said.

By removing these regulations, the SLSC lamented that the government has endorsed anti-competitive market practices while sending mixed signals to foreign trading partners, who are sensitive to policy inconsistencies.

"The recent frequent changes made to shipping regulations in Sri Lanka through a few gazettes have also raised ambiguity and concern among foreign trading partners, who are sensitive to policy inconsistencies.

Prime lending rate falls sharply

The prime rate fell sharply, despite the Central Bank half-heartedly raising the key policy rates by 100 basis points, reflecting that the most recent policy move is entirely symbolic and has no real impact on the markets.

The prime lending rate, the benchmark rate used to price loans to top-tier borrowers and also provides direction for the rest of the markets from home mortgages, small business loans to consumer loans, fell by 71 basis points to 22.74 percent last week, adding to the 76-basis-point decline in the week before.

The behaviour in the weekly prime rate reflects the sentiments in the financial markets and provides for the future trajectory in rates. With last week's sharp decline, the prime rate has given up 450 basis points since the end of last year, when the rate was at 27.24 percent. **MOREON P10**

HSBC swoops in to rescue UK arm of Silicon Valley Bank

HSBC has swooped in to buy the UK arm of collapsed US Silicon Valley Bank (SVB), bringing relief to the UK tech firms, who warned they could go bust without help.

Customers and businesses, who had been unable to withdraw their money, will now be able to access it as normal.

The Treasury said the deal, which was thrashed out with HSBC through the night to be done before trading resumed yesterday, involved no taxpayer money.

HSBC said it paid just £1 for the SVB's UK arm after it failed on Friday. Silicon Valley Bank - which specialised in lending to technology

companies - was shut down by the US regulators on Friday in what was the largest failure of a US bank since 2008. Its collapse sent shockwaves across the tech industry over the possible impact it could have on businesses, with some firms telling the BBC they could go bust if deposits were not secured. Signature Bank becomes next casualty of banking turmoil after SVB

REUTERS: State regulators closed New York-based Signature Bank on Sunday, the third largest failure in the U.S. banking history, two days after authorities shuttered Silicon Valley Bank in a collapse that stranded billions in deposits.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) took control of Signature, which had US \$ 110.36 billion in assets and US \$ 88.59 billion in deposits at the end of last year, according to the New York state's Department of Financial Services.

The deal came after all night talks involving Chancellor Jeremy Hunt, the prime minister, Bank of England governor, HSBC bosses and civil servants to try to find a solution before

firms began trading again yesterday morning. The Bank of England said no other UK banks had been 'materially affected" by SVB's collapse and said the wider banking system remained "safe, sound and well capitalised".

Although the UK arm of SVB was small with just over 3,000 business customers, its collapse would have presented a risk for a sector, which the government views as pivotal to the UK's future economic success. Hunt said such firms were often "fragile". "Some of them only had bank accounts with SVB UK and so for that reason we were faced with a situation where could have seen some of our most important companies, our most strategic companies, wiped out and that would have been extremely dangerous," he added. But Hunt insisted there was "never a systemic risk to our financial stability in the UK". Sebastian Weidt, Chief Executive of Universal Quantum, a tech company, which employs about 40 people and held all its funds with SVB, said the deal was a "huge relief". He told the BBC the ast 48 to 72 hours had been "unbelievably stressful" and said while his company had been trying to make plans to mitigate the potential impact, had a deal not been made it would have been "pretty detrimental to the whole sector".

"We value the visionary pioneers and the hard work of the people in the industry for staging #Maldives as the number one tourist destination. #Dive deep to appreciate the diversity and wonders of our nature," said Ahmed Nashid, a prominent Maldivian businessman, who is also Morocco's first Honorary Consul in the Maldives. "The tourists who come to Maldives come for peace, luxury, privacy and hospitality. If they wanted to climb a mountain, I'm sure they can do it at home. This is a tourism minister who doesn't understand the tourists," tweeted a Maldivian travel blogger. Expressing displeasure on Fernando's comments was also another Maldivian citizen who said, "Instead of focusing on why tourists shouldn't go to Maldives, focus more on why tourists should visit Sri Lanka. Apart from the white sandy beaches, crystal clear water & breathtaking underwater beauty, we also provide jobs for Sri Lankans, which you forgot to mention? Muhammadh Musthafaa, another Maldivian, pointed out in his comments that the Maldives brand is a benchmark and a global product in global tourism.

"The only country that ran tourism during the pandemic, that boosted & increased investor confidence. Sri Lanka may be more diversified but still doesn't have professionals & experts like Maldives do. Good luck Sri Lanka," he tweeted. "Instead of building synergy between the two markets and strengthening market share through connectivity and investments, this sort of short-sighted backyard viewpoint hinders the development of South Asia," commented a Twitter user. Social media users also called out to Fernando to first address the shortcomings in Sri Lanka tourism, before glorifying what it has to offer. "For starters, fix proper bathrooms at tourist sites, get rid of the Trishaw mafia, have honest tourist cops who speak English and compassion, and learn to advertise our country more effectively. Then we can start 'boasting'," said a user under the handle @AmirtaHapu. Despite being a small island nation, the Maldives has been highly successful in its tourism industry. The tourism sector in the Maldives began in the 1970s and has since become the country's major contributor to its economy

The tourism authorities of the Maldives have also won many accolades for successfully promoting the destination to international travellers and staying true to its brand promise. In 2022, the Maldives Marketing and Public Relations Corporation fetched for the island nation the World's Leading Destination at the World Travel Awards, a title it has won for three consecutive years. The Maldives was also named as the biggest tourism success story in 2020 by CNN, as it welcomed 32 percent of its regular tourist arrivals as the world grappled with the worst pandemic witnessed in a century. In November 2020, the Maldives Tourist Board launched a fresh campaign with the tagline 'Isolation Never Looked This Good'.

Signature's failure followed Silicon Valley Bank's Friday shutdown, the second largest in the U.S. history behind Washington Mutual, which collapsed during the 2008 financial crisis. Investors were unnerved by the speed at which start-up-focused SVB, the 16th largest lender in the U.S., was toppled by customer withdrawals. The episode last week erased more than US \$ 100 billion in market value from the U.S. banks, prompting swift action from government officials over the weekend to try and restore confidence in the financial system. The FDIC established a "bridge" successor bank on Sunday, which enabled customers to access their funds yesterday. Signature Bank's depositors and borrowers will automatically become customers of the bridge bank, the FDIC said. The regulator named former Fifth Third Bancorp

Chief Executive Greg Carmichael as CEO of the bridge bank. Silicon Valley Bank customers would have access to their deposits starting yesterday, the U.S. officials said on Sunday. The federal government also announced actions to shore up

deposits and try and stem any broader fallout. Signature was a commercial bank with private client

offices in New York, Connecticut, California, Nevada and North Carolina and had nine national business lines, including commercial real estate and digital asset banking. As of September, almost a quarter of its deposits came from the cryptocurrency sector but the bank announced in December that it would shrink its crypto-related deposits by US \$ 8 billion. Signature Bank announced in February that its Chief Executive Officer Joseph DePaolo would transition into a senior adviser role in 2023 and would be succeeded by the bank's Chief Operating Officer Eric Howell. DePaolo has served as President and CEO since Signature's inception in 2001. The bank had a longstanding relationship with former President Donald Trump and his family, providing Trump and his business with checking accounts and financing several of the family's ventures. Signature Bank cut ties with Trump in 2021 following the deadly January 6 riots on Capitol Hill and urged Trump to resign. In a statement, New York Governor Kathy Hochul said she hoped the U.S. government's actions on Sunday would provide "increased confidence in the stability of our banking system." "Many depositors at these banks are small businesses, including those driving the innovation economy and their success is key to New York's robust economy," she said. Officials said on Sunday shareholders and certain unsecured debtholders of Signature Bank, as well as those of Silicon Valley Bank, would not be protected and that the senior management of both banks has been removed. Any losses to the FDIC's Deposit Insurance Fund used to support uninsured depositors will be recovered by a special assessment on banks, as required by law, officials said.

Pan Asia Bank posts compelling performance in FY22

The bank increased the impairment provision buffers on its investments in Sri Lanka International Sovereign Bonds (SLISBs) up to 35 percent, due to the increased level of credit risk as a result of prevailing external public debt service standstill of the Government of Sri Lanka, and the possible adverse outcomes of the ongoing comprehensive debt restructuring programme. The amounts charged to the income statement during the year 2022 include provisions made on foreign currency exposures to the Government of Sri Lanka amounting to Rs. 3.80 billion. However, when presenting the figures, the management has presented the impact of the currency depreciation on the impairment charges of loans and advances and investments under Other Operating Income/ Losses, where the exchange gains from the corresponding assets have been recognized.

Pan Asia Bank strived for earnings maximization through portfolio re-alignment and cost management despite sector vulnerabilities that



Borrowing its title from the 1997 work by Agnes Martin, With My Back to the World asks the viewer to observe, feel and respond to the subtleties in art-making without seeking a cause or reason. It is an attempt to grasp what remains in the liminal spaces where materials are moulded, arranged, reshaped, and deconstructed. This is an invitation to actively engage with process and the tactile conversations that emerge across different disciplines. Whether it be embroidery, beadwork, woodblock printing, painting, sculpture, assemblage, or photography, there is much that transpires within the silent interstices of subtle gestures.
Inspired by the geometric elements


and grids of Islamic architecture, Sabeen Omar uses embroidery and beading to transform objects from her childhood such as handkerchiefs and cardboard boxes, exploring the ephemerality of memories and the places we inhabit. **Hema Shironi** manipulates the mutable qualities of textiles in her work by allowing them to be folded, hung, stored away and then reassembled to contemplate the impermanence of home. She experiments with paper and stitchingreworking her materials to the point of disintegration to meditate on concepts of migration, displacement, and instability.


Fabienne Francotte's hand is evident in her clay sculptures, drawings, and paintings of lips, which she impetuously stitches and reworks to reflect on sisterhood, loss, and trauma. **Anomaa Rajakaruna** approaches documentary photography with an acute sensitivity that leaves us deeply aware of the issues of conflict, displacement, and sexual harassment. the female form with nature to Sumi Perera uses hybrid printmaking techniques to explore the interplay of geometric forms, shapes, and lines. Ashini Nanayakkara uses a combination of analog and digital photographic techniques to construct geometric compositions of urban architecture that disorient traditional perceptions of space, place, and scale. The original process of painting is lost as Anoli Perera digitally superimposes centuryold cosmological maps with present-day watercolours as she reflects on ideas of 'pilgrimage', and the sacred routes and landscapes people construct.

With My Back to the World foregrounds the myriad ways in which these artists actively engage with material and process to communicate the ideas they are concerned with. Here the act of making takes precedence over the finished product-every action or gesture is oriented towards a purpose and

serves towards creating the overall meaning of the work. As opposed to decoding the meaning of a work, the exhibition is an invitation to slow down and enagage with the process of art making, even when it isn't discernible in the final work.

With My Back to the World will run until Sunday 02.04.23.

The exhibition programme will include a series of online talks, workshops, and curated walk-throughs spread throughout the month.




