



SC GRANTS LEAVE TO PROCEED WITH PETITION

The petitioners maintained that these actions are prejudicial to the fundamental rights of the petitioners and the citizens of Sri Lanka

The Supreme Court three-judgebench comprising Justices Preethi Padman Surasena, Gamini Amerasekera and Janak De Silva granted leave to proceed with the petition under Articles 10, 12(1) and 14(1)(a) of the constitution.

The Centre for Policy Alternatives CPA) and its Executive Director Dr. Paikiasothy Saravanamuttu filed this petition naming the Treasury Secretary, Government Printer and Inspector General of Police and several others as respondents.

The petitioners stated that the elections to elect persons as members of local authorities are required to be held every 04 years in terms of the relevant statutes. Elections were previously held in 2018, and the term of the Local Authorities that were due to expire in 2022 were ended for a year thereafter.

The petitioners stated that the conduct of the Government Printer and the Inspector General of Police are indicative of a coordinated campaign to procrastinate the holding of local Authority elections. The petitioners

also stated that the President in the capacity as the Minister of Finance and the Secretary to the Treasury have not until the very last minute on the 23rd of February 2023 indicated that there is a challenge in the allocation of funds to conduct the elections.

The petitioners maintained that these actions are prejudicial to the fundamental rights of the petitioners and the citizens of Sri Lanka.

The petitioners are highlighting that the failure of the Government Printer. IGP, President Ranil Wickremesinghe (as Finance Minister) and the Election Commission failed to protect the fundamental rights of citizens, by failing to take proper steps as required by law to hold elections by 19th March as made compulsory in terms of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, Urban Councils Ordinance and Pradeshiya Sabhas Act.

Senior Counsel Viran Corea with Luwie Ganeshathasan and Khyati Wikramanayake appeared for the petitioners. Senior Additional Solicitor General Priyantha Nawana appeared for the respondents.

Minister of Ports, Shipping and Aviation Nimal Siripala de Silva has appointed a team to investigate air accidents in the Sri Lanka airspace for the first time.

Accordingly, letters of appointments were awarded yesterday to the first batch of Air Accidents Investigators. Accordingly, 07 Air Accident

nvestigators received letters of appointment from the Minister. This is the first time in the history of

Sri Lankan aviation services sector, Air Accident Investigators were appointed to identify accurate information, investigate to the true cause of air accidents and take necessary action to prevent any future disasters in the Sri Lankan airspace.

The Minister said that the regulatory role of the global aviation sector is performed by the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) and the regulatory activities of the Sri Lankan aviation sector should follow the ICAO

"For so long, there was no institution or proper programme to accurately conduct

investigations of aircraft accidents occurred in Sri Lankan airspace," the Minister said. He said that after deep study into the matter, the steps taken by the Civil Aviation Authority of Sri Lanka to establish an independent pool of Air Accident Investigators is a great leap forward for the elevation of the Sri Lankan aviation sector.

"Therefore, immediate steps will be taken to amend the Aviation Act to establish the Aviation Accident Investigation Bureau for these activities without delay," the Minister

Training for Air Accident Investigators conducted by the Civil Aviation Authority of Sri Lanka, adhered to the standards stipulated by the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO). The team will be operated as an independent body under the purview of the Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Aviation.

A spokesman for Ratnapura General Hospital said the woman concerned who developed vomitting, high fever, and headache had been admitted to hospital in a semi-conscious state and that she died while under treatment. A senior official of Kuruvita MOH office said, judging from the symptoms she is suspected to have died of complications caused by Listeria Monocytogenes bacteria. She was a resident of Kospelawinna in Ratnapura.

He said her blood samples and spine marrow would be subject to biological tests to confirm the cause of death. A microbiologist said the Listeria bacteria is found in soil and

refuse and that it would be contracted through frozen food including milk, sausages and cheese.

A doctor said elderly persons, infant children, expectant women and diabetics and cancer patients are more susceptible to this disease.

A spokesman for Kuruvita MOH office said the cause of death of the woman could be confirmed on medical test reports and that the pilgrims need not be perturbed by any possible danger to their health, but they should refrain from partaking in frozen food and take only hot food. The doctors advised them to take immediate treatment if they developed fever, vomitting and headache.



O NEW SPECIES OF

"Sri Lanka is a hotspot for Cnemaspis Day Geckos, with 40 currently known species with 100% endemism," one researcher said.

These gecko species are reported from Galgiriya Mountain, in the Kurunegala District, Ampara District, and Ethagala Mountain, in the Ampara District.

"These new species were recorded from granite caves within forested areas in isolated mountains in the dry bio-climatic zone (Point-endemics). Both new species are micro-habitat specialists with narrow niches limited to humid, cool, canopy-shaded granite caves and old buildings associated with granite caves, where they are camouflaged

by their cryptic morphology and body colouration," a report by the researchers

Both species are classified as "critically endangered" (CR) under the IUCN Red List criteria.

The Jayaweera's day gecko has been identified by researchers in the vicinity of the Ethagala Kanda forest reserve in the Ampara District by a senior member and former president of the Young Zoologists' Association (YZA) of Sri Lanka, Shanthasiri Jayaweera.

The species named Nanayakkara's day gecko was identified from the Galgiriya Forest Reserve in the intermediate climate zone of Kurunegala District by a senior instructor of the reptile study

group, the Young Zoologists' Association (YZA) Ananda Lal Nanayakkara.

A group of local and foreign reptile experts, including Suranjan Karunaratne, Kanishka Ukuwela, Anslem de Silva, Majintha Madawala, Madhava Botheju, Dinesh Mahagage, Eran Bauer and Nicolo Poirkov, participated in this research.

The major threats for these new species are habitat loss due to the expansion of commercial-scale agriculture, illicit forest encroachments. and forest fires.

"We recommend that authorities take immediate conservation action to ensure the protection of these forest areas and their buffer zones soon," the researchers







OUR THOUGHT

DO YOU SEE THE 'MIDDLEMEN' IN THIS HAZE?

hese are days where Sri Lankans are sinking into the possibility that LG Polls would not be held after all. This government- unelected by the citizens of the country—doesn't have to please the people. But if you analyse who comprises the government some shocks could be revealed.

According to Ajith Perakum Jayasinghe who writes for the Sinhala weekend newspaper 'Anidda' the three categories of people 'forming' the true government are the politicians, government servants and individuals who undertake contract work for the regime via the businesses they run. These are the people who earn massive incomes and poor tax payers have to maintain them and their questionable earning methods. They also can be labeled as the 'middlemen'. This middleman or privileged class is represented by both the elite and some sections of the worker classes like worker unions. This concept is not difficult to understand when one observes the politicians who run their very own hotels, busses and wine and spirits stores and even some of the grocery stores which have earned the preferred name food city. When the government jacks up the prices of goods businessmen operating the above mentioned enterprises see a rise in income.

The worst hit are the entrepreneurs and the majority of the members of the worker class. So technically the JVP and its politicians in parliament cannot say that they don't make some representation in this 'middleman class'. They enjoy parliamentary privileges. We must observe this privileged class in this society. Most worker unions that are very active have a system that fattens their coffers and sees to the welfare of its elected members.

It's hard for anyone not in this privileged class to break into the political scene and get closer to the 'throne' or the hot seat of being a minister or Member of Parliament (MP). The Aragalaya that faded away is a good example. So the painful truth is that the next leader of the country or president will have to come from this privileged class or the group that represents the 'middleman'. May be that a new leader emerging from this old set-up can change the system and instill some discipline into how this privileged class will spend state funds; also not forgetting the fact that earnings of governments workers must be monitored with strict vigil. There is still no system in place to check the total income generated by a Sri Lankan politician who does so by serving in the cabinet or attending parliament and the wealth and assets he amasses by putting in several years as a lawmaker.



Ajith Perakum Jayasinghe writes in his column that till the system is changed and there are proper checks and balances regarding state expenses-or for that matter the country begins to mould lawmakers who are ruthless when it comes to being responsible citizens of this country-it could be wise to allow a veteran lawmaker like Ranil Wickremesinghe to continue to be the first citizen of the country. Critics might not agree with what's suggested above, but the majority of citizens with voting rights might agree to the fact that Wickremesinghe is a safer bet than the unknown prince 'deyasen' who a good number of people in this country still pray and hope will arrive and save everyone!

We all love democracy, freedom of speech and freedom of expression; all of which the government elected without the franchise of the voting public dread at the moment. The present government is also worried that a sinking economy can go down crashing if these neverending strikes and protests are not stopped and the recovery process is not given chance to run its course.


There are some signs of the government taking this economy at least somewhere close to stability, but then this regime must be given a

ISLAMOPHOBIA: THE INHUMAN POLITICS BEHIND THE SCOURGE



arch 15 came and went. None celebrated the Ides of March. Also on March 15, the first-ever United Nations Day to combat Islamophobia, too, came and went. There was very little awareness campaign apart from perfunctory United Nations statements which received little media attention, though Islamophobia is one of the pressing global issues.

On March 15, last year, the UN General

On March 15, last year, the UN General Assembly adopted Resolution 76/254, designating the date as the International Day to Combat Islamophobia. The resolution introduced by Pakistan on behalf of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), was unanimously adopted but not before India, France, and the European Union made some observations.

To mark the day, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres affirmed that the International Day to Combat Islamophobia, observed for the first time this year, was "a call for action to stamp out anti-Muslim hatred".

"Discrimination diminishes us all. We must stand up against it," he said in a Twitter post. "Today & every day, we must counter the forces of division by reaffirming our common humanity."

The UN Chief said anti-Muslim bigotry is part of a larger trend of a resurgence in ethnonationalism, neo-Nazism, stigma, and hate speech targeting vulnerable populations.

In Sri Lanka, where Islamophobia was part of politics, the UN day was a nonday, whereas the Government should have made use of it to stress the principles the UN stands for. In the preamble to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), it is affirmed that recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world.

The UDHR, regarded as the human rights holy scripture, has been embraced by every UN member. It stands as a reminder that never again shall the world see atrocities similar to the Holocaust during which millions of Jews were exterminated by Germany's Adolf Hitler and his Nazi butchers who believed in a pseudoscientific Master Race ideology.

Race ideology.

Despite the horrors of the Holocaust, racism, anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, and apartheid do exist to demonize and divide people who are part of the human family. UN treaties, and supporting domestic legislation do exist to combat the evil that discriminates against people, but only to be observed in the breach in most counties or to be selectively applied.

The irony is that the very laws that are

adopted to end discriminatory practices are implemented discriminately.

In Sri Lanka, it is alleged that the International Convention of Civil and Political Rights Act which was supposed to end racial discrimination and hate speech was selectively misused to harass Muslims, political opponents, and even artistes. While the ill-informed police charge the suspects under the ICCPR Act, the Prevention of Terrorism Act, and other draconian laws, the Attorney General's Department did precious little to stop the misapplication of the law. The AG's role is not to be an accomplice in the government's wilful buse of the law, but, like a caregiver to advise -- and if necessary warn -- the government not to play politics with the law.

Take the case of an impoverished Muslim woman from Mahiyangana. She was arrested for wearing a kaftan that depicted the picture of the ship's helm. The police deliberately interpreted the picture as the Dharma Chakra and booked her under the ICCPR Act. That this was Islamophobia and abuse of law was lost on the state's legal officers.

Islamophobia came to the mainstream in Sri Lanka after the end of the separatist war in 2009. The separatist war itself was given a racial twist and called an ethnic war for political reasons rather than being dealt with as a civil war. Instead of building a Sri Lankan nationalism that recognises unity in diversity, respects democracy, and adopts meritocracy, Sri Lankan politicians, in the promotion of ethnonationalism, saw an easy way to capture power.

After Tamil ethnonationalism was tamed by sheer military force, the ultranationalists' turned their weapons on the Muslims, who stood for Sri Lanka's unity. Such self-centered political opportunism, while kindling anti-Muslim riots in Aluthgama, Digana, Minuwangoda, and other places, only led to the Easter Sunday terrorist attacks, the ascension of an incompetent candidate to the presidency and brought about the economic crisis.

As Islamophobia was aroused by Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna elements to win the 2019 presidential election, some sections of the mainstream media willingly joined the ultranationalist bandwagon and falsely accused a Muslim doctor of making thousands of Sinhala women infertile. Also accused of making Sinhala women infertile were Muslim traders selling women's undergarments and Muslim eateries selling 'wanda' or pregnancy-preventing

kottu. Although these allegations were proved wrong, it is unfortunate that the country lacks a media culture to name and shame the fake news messengers posing as journalists and peddling Islamophobia.

Islamophobia was also evident during the Covid pandemic, with the then government, egged on by its anti-Muslim advisors, denying the Muslims the right to bury their kith and kin dying of Covid, although the World Health Organisation, fair-minded Sri Lankan scientists, Islamic countries, and international human rights organisations pointed out that it was safe to bury those who died of Covid.

On a positive note, the Aragalaya protests that overthrew the Islamophobic President have brought about a general realisation across the country that all this anti-Muslim hype had an ulterior motive - capturing power.

In neighbouring India, too, Islamophobia is almost the state policy. The Bharatiya Janata Party seized on the sheer devastation the 2019 Easter Sunday bombing caused in Sri Lanka and won the elections that year by projecting itself as the only party that had the willpower to end the so-called Islamic terrorism. Since the ultranationalist BJP assumed power in India in 2014, its members have been given the carte blanche to demonise India's 200 million Muslims – the world's third-largest Muslim population after Indonesia and Pakistan.

BJP leaders have publicly claimed that India's Muslims do not deserve the same rights as everyone else living in the country. Some have even called for the mass killings of Muslims. The lynching of Muslims for eating, selling, or possessing beef continues with impunity. The rich Muslim segment of India's history is obliterated, while mosques and Muslim houses are bulldozed for road projects. Mercifully, the Dravidian south is not infected by the BJP's Hindutva and Islamophobic ideology.

Islamophobia is a multibillion-dollar industry in the West. In a 2021 report, the United States-based Muslim rights group, Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), revealed that a staggering \$105,865,763 was poured into 26 Islamophobia Network groups between 2017 and 2019, within the US alone. These groups spread misinformation and conspiracy theories about Muslims and Islam, the report titled Islamophobia in the Mainstream said.

In Europe, several reports point to a rise in Islamophobia. In the Netherlands, France, the United Kingdom, and other European countries, Islamophobia is "becoming increasingly normalized".

Declarations of a UN day to combat Islamophobia alone will not end the inhuman practice of dividing humanity. Much needs to be done to establish equality and fraternity in human society before another holocaust tarnishes human history.



Message from the Irish President

President marks St. Patrick's Day 2023

ar Uachtarán na hÉireann, may I send my warmest greetings and good wishes to our Irish family, and friends of Ireland, across the world, on this day of celebration of our national patron, Saint Patrick.

Whether we are Irish by birth or Irish by choice, we are all part of a rich and vibrant global community that is bound together by a shared love of life, a shared love of our national heritage, language and culture.

Today, as we gather to celebrate that spiritual culture and legacy that speaks so deeply to us of a common but complex past, we can draw a shared strength from recalling the inspirational teachings from the life of Saint Patrick, our national Patron Saint.

In these times of multiple interacting crises, human and natural, it is vital that we recognise the need for a solidarity that binds us together as humans, and acknowledge the responsibility we share for our vulnerable planet and for all those who dwell on it.

For example, the plight of the people in Türkiye and Syria will be in our thoughts as they work to rebuild in the wake of last month's devastating earthquakes. Such horrific events remind us all of our utter vulnerability, and of the shared humanitarian response required.

We live in a time of increasing conflicts, and a departure from the principles of international and humanitarian law so carefully crafted over decades, as alternatives to war.

Over a year on from the invasion, the people of Ukraine, and all those ensnared in the more than 20 armed conflicts around the world, must remain foremost in our minds.

It is heartening to see the welcome that so many households and schools have extended here in Ireland and elsewhere, heartening to hear of all those who continue to provide sanctuary to the tens of thousands of displaced Ukrainian citizens who have fled conflict in their homeland. Schools in every part of the country have opened their arms to new pupils and shown a deep commitment of respect and solidarity. Thank you.

As we honour our patron saint, Naomh Pádraig, how appropriate it is that we recall the foundational story upon which our

National Day, is based, that story of the slavery of his time as a young man.

Saint Patrick emerged from slavery, having been trafficked across the Irish Sea as a young man. After six years he escaped, returning to his family and his studies in Britain. Yet, in a remarkable display of resilience and generosity, he would later return to Ireland as a missionary.

There are many powerful echoes from Patrick's life that resonate with our contemporary circumstances, ones that have brought new forms of slavery into being, where racism is increasing rather than decreasing, in so many parts of a world, where a poisonous xenophobia, new and recalled, has taken hold in so many places. It is in these spaces where fear is being sowed.

The story of Patrick's transformation that would lead to his becoming an emblem of the country he adopted as his own, stands in counterpoint and is so important.

In his protest against the war crimes of King Coroticus and his men, Patrick, the former slave, gave both voice and his life, to spearheading an awareness of the consequences of slavery.

The story of his life as a migrant, we must never forget, is a reminder of the resilience and necessary courage of migrants, a reminder too of the contributions that they have made, and continue to make, to the countries they call home.

The act of migration constitutes a story defined by an extraordinary will and an unyielding human desire to envision and create a better world, even in the face of sometimes considerable adversity

Today, as we recall the life of our patron saint, we can invoke his spirit in acknowledging our role as global citizens, opening our minds and hearts to our universal human family in all its complexity, circumstances and vulnerability.

It is by showing empathy, compassion and solidarity, such as by helping those fleeing distress, by offering our hearts and doors to those in need, and giving people an opportunity to build a better life for themselves and their families, that we demonstrate our commitment to bringing into being values which have the power to



Basic human morality suggests that we must think in terms of the common good if we are to invoke or follow the path of Saint Patrick, recognizing that we bear a duty to stand in solidarity with all those across the globe who are vulnerable and in need, and do everything in our power to create an inclusive, just world where all humans, in all their diversity and circumstances, are treated with dignity, respect and justice.

While Saint Patrick's story encourages us to reflect on the significance of migration running through our history as a constant feature of the Irish experience, we are required to respond to the ongoing, brutal reality of human trafficking and forced migration as a constant feature of human experience. It is by doing that we can most fully embrace Patrick's legacy and our own place and exercise our responsibilities in today's world.

There are so many areas where we cannot continue to fail on such basic issues as global hunger and poverty. For example, in the Horn of Africa, the harsh reality of hunger steals the future, the potential, the dignity, of millions of our brothers and sisters threatened

How shameful it is too that 64 countries in the developing world were forced, while struggling with the Covid pandemic, to spend more on debt repayments than on funding public health.

During my recent visit to Senegal at which I addressed the Africa Food Summit, I emphasised that there is an urgent need to tackle not only poverty and hunger in Africa but to offer proper security on the basic necessities of life, delivering universal basic services such as education and healthcare, thus helping to create a lasting, sustainable future built on security in its most inclusive sense.

We have a moral and ethical responsibility to support our global family in dire need, to help with sustainable solutions to ending all famines, to provide a decisive response to climate change,

Saint Patrick's message was at its core one of respect for nature, for its spirituality reflected in its seasonal renewal. Our planet is scarred by the consequences of human actions, actions often sourced in greed, actions that have had a direct bearing on our changing climate, constituting, as it does now, one of the greatest challenges of our time, reflected in extreme weather

events, widespread displacement and forced migration across our world, and the loss of fertile land.

It is such a tragic injustice that those nations suffering the greatest human and economic impact of climate change are those who were least responsible for the emissions that threaten their very existence.

The demand for collective action addressing our shared Earth's climate emergency has never been greater. We all must now take responsibility for our role in the climate crisis and play our part in decarbonising our economy and society so that we may inhabit a sustainable world, one that preserves the planet for future generations and all those who inhabit it.

On this day, let us pledge to work together, cooperating, so that we may confront the contemporary challenges facing our world, espousing some of the most essential values, such as kindness and compassion, embodied as they are in the story of Saint Patrick.

Rather than list the points of darkness that challenge us in our contemporary circumstances, let us instead be guided by the points of light. Let us envision how our lives could be without war, famine, hunger and greed, in a world that eschews the poisonous ideals of imperialism and embraces the decent instincts of humanity that such as Saint Patrick embodied.

As we commemorate Saint Patrick's legacy, guide and patron, whose life embodied the values of a shared, generous sense of humanity, let us do so by mustering the courage to recover the best instincts of our humanity, have the mettle to face those who resist such instincts, reaffirm and strengthen our commitment to advocating the principles that informed Patrick's life, calling us as they do to embrace our role as global citizens, extending a hand of support to all those in need with whom we share this planet, respond with hospitality and kindness to those fleeing the ravages of hunger, conflict and climate change, thus bringing into reality our taking responsibility to work with fellow citizens for a more just and inclusive world.



SEVERAL DECADES AFTER LEAVING S. THOMAS' I FEEL THAT IT IS NOT A DISEASE; THE BIG MATCH, THE BATTLE OF THE BLUES THAT IS, IS A HEALER. THERE'S NOTHING MAD ABOUT MARCH; THE BIG MATCH PROVIDES SANITY IN A WORLD OF ROUTINE AND GRINDS MARKED BY CHAOS, UNCERTAINTY AND DRUDGERY







he season of big matches is upon us. These cricket encounters are big for the respective schools, not for others. In fact, as far as the particular schools are concerned they are huge. It is THE event of the year.

Today there are big matches in all parts of Sri Lanka, so many that only a few can escape them for the spectacle is not contained by the walls of the schools. It not only spills over to the streets but climbs over the walls of other schools as well. Well, the girls' schools at least.

For history and spectacle, however, it can be argued that no match comes even close to the Royal-Thomian encounter. Royal College and S. Thomas' College, Mount Lavinia have played this annual encounter for over 140 consecutive years. That's including the war years and the period of Covid-19-related lockdowns.

All good fun for the most part. And so, over the years we have come to expect phrases such as **Big Match Fever**, and **Mad March Days**.

Today, several decades after leaving S. Thomas' I feel that it is not a disease; the Big Match, the Battle of the Blues that is, is a healer. There's nothing mad about March; the Big Match provides sanity in a world of routine and grinds marked by chaos, uncertainty and drudgery.

For me, like for countless Royalists and Thomians, the Roy-Tho is not only the oldest continuously played cricket series in the world but an extraordinary carnival that adds value to comradeship and friendship.

It is all about memories, traditions, sportsmanship and life in general. It is a holiday unlike any other. We walk into the SSC, where the big match has been played for decades except for the last two years when the venue was shifted to Suriyawewa due to containment protocols related to Covid-19, and we are suddenly in this incredible space where we just don't have to guard our tongues or worry about perceptions being wrecked.

We can be frank, open and basically ourselves

without having to think twice before saying or doing anything. It's not a shut up and sit down event but a getup and speak up one where everyone is equal.

We all have school memories. Among them, those associated with the Royal-Thomian are the most precious. The truth is, as schoolboys we never thought about memories. We just had fun. Incredible fun. Little did we know that we were in fact creating memories that would stay with us and keep us warm when we are battered by the harsh and freezing winds of life.

It is not just students and old boys. It is everyone associated with the two schools including teachers, non-teaching staff, parents, friends, girlfriends and others who identify with each School for as simple a reason as living close by!

I still vividly remember the 1990 Big Match. Naresh Adikaram, the Thomian Captain, lost his father a few days before the Roy-Tho. He attended the funeral, and a few hours later, was at the SSC, leading his boys. He scored over 70 runs in that match. Such courage, such composure! I am sure it was appreciated and applauded by both Thomians and Royalists.

Of course, what happens in the middle of the ground is hardly what makes the Royal-Thomian so special. The carnival, so to speak, unfolds outside, in the stands, among friends, in the back-and-forth of reminiscences by old men whose firm belief they've not aged is a product of the amount of alcohol consumed, the papare bands, dancing in the tents, the supporters affirming yet once again that the only tune they can hold is that of the school song, and the occasions pitch-invasion.

It was not uncommon even back then for some of the most colourful personalities of our generation, from Varuna Botejue, Charya De Saram or Prasad Wimalasekara, to spend weeks before the Royal Thomian planning for the event.

I remember being aghast, as a senior student, seeing my younger brother Nishantha running into the field, the college flag in hand. He was just about eight years old then. Such interruptions are expected, cheered or jeered, and looked back upon with a smile that says, "We were so much younger then, and we can only be as young again on the three days in March when we attend the Royal Thomian."

And we graduated from the boys' tent to the Stallions, the Colts, the Mustangs and other horse-enclosures that don't have anything to do with age but celebrate merry-making to the maximum, such as the Stables, set up by Krishan Perera and his team 19 years ago.

On the Thomian side, I still remember how seriously cricket legends like Michael Tissera and Anura Tennakoon would come and invest so much of their time and energy in helping to advise, support and mentor our team. All this while the late Warden Neville De Alwis and Sub Warden former Bishop Duleep De Chickera would be warning the 'Yakos' such as myself to kindly refrain from assaulting Prefects during the match.

It is a pilgrimage as holy as any other. This is why Royalists and Thomians time their visit to the 'mother country' so that they can go to the Big Match. It is a temple where there's community worship of things that matter: friendship, camaraderie and memories that just don't age.

The Sane March Days are here again. Let the Big Match healing begin!

MACRON FORCES THROUGH CONTROVERSIAI PENSION REFORM WITHOUT PARI IAMENTARY VOTE

AFP.COM, 16 MARCH, 2023- French
President Emmanuel Macron on
Thursday decided to trigger Article 49.3
of the French constitution, which granted
the government executive privilege
to push through controversial pension
reforms without a parliamentary vote.
The move gives the opposition the

right to immediately call a confidence

vote and risks further inflaming the protest movement after months of demonstrations. The decision was made just a few minutes before the vote was scheduled at the National Assembly, France's lower house of parliament.

The retirement age has now been raised by two years to 64 in a pension

reform that is the flagship legislation of Macron's second term. The unpopular plan has prompted major strikes and protests across the country since January.


The move is expected to trigger a quick no-confidence motion in Macron's government.

The announcement came hours after the Senate, France's upper house, adopted

the bill Thursday morning in a 193-114 vote, a tally that was largely expected since the conservative majority of the upper house of parliament favours a

higher retirement age.
But the government was unsure of the vote numbers in the National Assembly, forcing French Prime Minister Élisabeth Borne to announce the triggering of Article

49.3. Resorting to the measure is likely to further enrage unions, protesters and left-wing opposition parties that say the pension overhaul is unfair and unnecessary. "This government is not worthy of our Fifth Republic, of French democracy. Until the very end, parliament has been ridiculed, humiliated," Fabien Roussel, head of the French Communist Party said.





Royal did not have it easy when they were nvited to take first lease of the wicket as they lost three quick wickets in just under





Last-gasp defeat motivates Sri Lanka for second New Zealand Test



Captain Dimuth Karunaratne says Sri Lanka will use their agonising last-gasp defeat to New Zealand as motivation when the second Test starts today in Wellington.

Kane Williamson sealed a thrilling New Zealand win by running a bye as the first Test went to the final ball in Christchurch.

The hosts' two-wicket triumph scuppered Sri Lanka's chances of making the World Test Championship final, handing the spot to India, who will face Australia.

"Unfortunately we aren't in a position to progress (to the final), but it's a two-Test series and we have to play for our pride," Karunaratne told reporters yesterday.

"I can see the boys in the dressing room still want to win this match and draw the series." Karunaratne knows his team paid a heavy price for fielding errors in Christchurch, particularly when danger man Williamson was dropped on 33. He went on to make a match-winning century. "There were small things we couldn't do well,

that is the only concern, but we're trying to correct the mistakes," said

The Sri Lankan skipper says his seam bowlers can cause problems for Williamson and New Zealand's

Asitha Fernando took seven wickets in the first Test.

'We can challenge the Kiwi top batters every time, even some of their players said to me that they didn't expect that kind of bowling pressure from the Sri Lankans," said Karunaratne.

"That's a plus point." The second Test is at Wellington's Basin Reserve, scene of the hosts' memorable one-run win over England last month which squared that two-Test series.

"We had great crowds last time we were here and got people talking about Test cricket," said captain Tim Southee, whose Black Caps are chasing a third straight Test win. Showers and high winds are forecast today and Southee will decide his team after inspecting the green wicket. "We'll have a final look in the morning as there is a bit of weather around," he added.

All-rounder Doug Bracewell has been added to the New Zealand squad as cover for Neil Wagner, who is sidelined after finishing the first Test with a back and hamstring injury.

Southee expects Sri Lanka to put up another stern test. "They are a quality side, as we saw in Christchurch," he

Gianni Infantino re-elected FIFA president until 2027

Gianni Infantino has been re-elected s President of FIFA until 2027 after standing unopposed at the congress of world football's governing body yesterday.

The 52-year-old Swiss lawyer, who succeeded the disgraced Sepp Blatter in 2016, was waved in for a third term by acclamation, just as he was four years ago, by delegates from the 211 member federations.

"I love you all," Infantino told delegates in the Rwandan capital, where the voting system did not register the number of dissident voices.

While FIFA statutes currently limit a President to a maximum of three fouryear terms, Infantino has already prepared



as President of football's ruling body FIFA on a four-year term until 2027

the ground to stay until 2031, declaring in December that his first three years at the helm did not count as a full term. Infantino, who staunchly defended

Qatar's hosting of last year's World Cup as the Gulf state's treatment of migrant workers, women and the LGBTQ community came under the spotlight, has overseen the expansion of the men's and women's World Cup and huge increases in FIFA revenues.

The men's World Cup will increase from 32 teams to 48 for the next edition in North America in 2026, while the women's World Cup will feature 32 teams for the first time in Australia and

New Zealand later this year. Infantino has also announced projected income of \$11 billion in the four years up to 2026, compared to \$7.5 billion in the last four-year cycle ending in 2022. (AFP)

G-Sec yields continue descent as economic recovery hopes grow ahead of IMF approval

The yields of government securities continued to ease this week as the Central Bank succeeded in selling Rs.120 billion at the Treasury bill auction held on Wednesday, two days after it offered a mammoth Rs.180 billion in the country's biggest bond auction in its history.

The bill auction saw the yields falling across the board extending the months-long streak of declines in yields on the hopes of finalising a deal with the International Monetary Fund

This week's primary bill auction saw the 3-month bill yields falling by 81 basis points to 27.94 percent, 6-month bill yields falling 43 basis points to 27.34 percent and 12-month bill yields falling 51 basis points to 25.92 percent.

With this week's declines, the

tenors had cumulatively given up 4.70 percent, 4.86 percent and 3.35 percent respectively, since the current streak of declines in bill yields began in the middle of December last year.

The current descent in yields also reflects that the 100 basis points hike in key rates by the Central Bank a fortnight ago had no impact.

Despite the full subscription of the bill auction, the Central Bank

kept open the second phase of the subscription for a further day to accept up to 25 percent of the aggregate amount offered at the

Meanwhile, the Central Bank on Monday offered Rs.180 billion in two bonds maturing on November 15, 2024 and May 01, 2027 at 22.00 percent and 18.00 percent

Although Rs.70.0 billion was offered under the 2024 bond, the Central Bank accepted only a fraction or Rs.441 million at a weighted average yield of 29.99 percent reflecting that a majority of bids have landed well above the

However, the Central Bank accepted the total Rs.110 billion it offered under the 2027 bonds at an

average yield of 28.11 percent. The Central Bank managed to raise a further Rs.8.95 billion at an issuance window which kept open till the following day at the same average yield.

The Central Bank raised further Rs.121.8 billion on Wednesday via a special issuance of Treasury bills as per the request of the Treasury to finance debt servicing payments.

Proposed CB law will pave way for unpopular but essential decisions

- Under the draft law, the main priority of the Central Bank will be to maintain price stability

The new Monetary Law Act, which aims to grant independence to the Central Bank with enhanced accountability, will empower the monetary authority to make unpopular but essential decisions in prioritising price stability in the country under a flexible inflation target framework, a

top official said.
"The key objective of this legislation will be to empower the Central Bank to make the right decisions, not popular decisions. With this new law, a Central Bank Governor has the ability to work independently and make decisions without any undue influence from the fiscal authorities, and such decisions cannot be changed according to the whims of the government in power,' Central Bank Governor Dr. Nandalal Weerasinghe said delivering a public lecture on the Central Bank of Sri Lanka Bill, in Colombo yesterday.

Under the draft law, he highlighted that the main priority of the Central Bank will be to maintain price stability by officially adopting a flexible inflation targeting framework. The

Minister of Finance and the Central Bank are required to sign a monetary policy framework agreement settingout the inflation target to be achieved by the Central Bank.

In failing to meet the inflation target

11-member Monetary Policy Board Chaired by the CB Governor will be required to submit a report to the parliament through the Minister of

Further, the Central Bank is also required to publish a report every six months detailing recent movements in inflation, sources of inflation and medium-term projections for inflation and key risks to such projections.

Although, the Central Bank had achieved some success in maintaining inflation at manageable levels with gradual adoption of a flexible inflation targeting framework in 2009-2020 period, Dr. Weerasinghe pointed out that inflation spiraled out of control after 2020 due to excessive interference of fiscal authorities who sit in the Monetary Board.

Accordingly, he noted that Secretary to the Treasury is excluded from both 11-member Monetary Policy Board and the 7-member Governing Board in order to deter any influence from the fiscal authorities.

Central Bank disputes Fitch Solutions' forecast on rupee

Disputing the grim forecast a high figure of foreign debt f Sri Lanka's exchange rate servicing is unlikely given that of Sri Lanka's exchange rate by Fitch Solutions by the yearend, Central Bank Governor Dr. Nandalal Weerasinghe raised concerns on the basis of the forecast while stressing that such long-term predictions on exchange rate are not prudent.

Fitch Solution recently maintained its forecast for the rupee to weaken to a record low of 390 per dollar by the year-end despite the positive prospects of the country securing the US\$ 2.9 billion International Monetary Fund (IMF) bailout package.

Dr. Weerasinghe noted that annual debt service obligation to the tune of US\$ 6 billion until 2029 has been one of the assumptions of this forecast. However, he stressed that such

the country is engaged in debt restructuring negotiations.

Further, he opined that such a long-term prediction on an exchange rate of a currency is not practical.

Referring to the recent appreciation of the rupee, he remarked that the market will adjust to a new rate and if the need arises, the CB stands ready to intervene in the forex market in a limited capacity.

'We have a small market, that's why the exchange rate fluctuates a lot. That's why the CB is required to intervene in the market to a certain extent. However, the CB would not act against the direction of market forces," he stressed.

JAAF welcomes progress made towards securing IMF bailout

of Intent submitted by President Ranil Wickremesinghe and Central Bank Governor Nandalal Weerasinghe will be received positively by the IMF Executive Board," the association said in a brief statement.

"As the country's largest foreign exchange earner, JAAF sees these important steps in the recovery process for the Sri Lankan economy. Good governance and recognition of the democratic process is key. It is also imperative that the country makes progress on other reforms required to get the country back on a growth agenda. These include reforms of the state-owned enterprises, labour law reform and pursuing free trade agreements with countries like Australia, Japan, Korea and Canada which have too will follow suit to expedite enormous potential," it added.

Economy shrinks 12.4% in 4Q22 as crisis bites

- Full year contraction at 7.8%, worst in postindependence history
- Agriculture bottoms out as sector returned to 0.7% growth in 4Q
- Fx shortages, inflation, higher rates, power cuts and social unrest cited as reasons for sharp GDP decline
- Sri Lankan economy turning a corner as IMF will unfreeze relief package next week

The Sri Lankan economy declined the most in the fourth quarter of last year since the beginning of the pandemic as the economy recorded its worst contraction in 2022 during its post-independence history.

The economy shrank 12.4 percent in the final three months of 2022, deepening the decline from the revised 11.5 percent decline in the third quarter.

The Department of Census and

Statistics (DCS) revised up the third

quarter Gross Domestic Product

(GDP) contraction from an earlier estimate of 11.8 percent to 11.5 percent when it released the fourth quarter GDP estimates this week.

The sector-wise performance showed that the agriculture sector had turned around with 0.7 percent expansion in activity, but the industrial and services sectors had continued to shrink by 30.1 percent and 3.9 percent respectively.

For some, the December quarter GDP estimates came in as a bit of a surprise as they thought the economy might have bottomed in the third quarter.

Before that Sri Lanka had recorded its worst decline in terms of quarterly GDP estimates in the second quarter of 2020 when nearly the entire quarter had to be shut down because of the pandemic. The Sri Lankan economy gave

up 17. 1 percent of its output from April through June 2020 when the pandemic forced the economy to go into hibernation. Along with the pandemic, sweeping tax cuts, excessive Central Bank liquidity and economic mismanagement contributed to Sri Lanka's economy's undoing.

DCS cited the economy running out of steam in the early part of last year caused by the shortage of foreign currency, sending inflation and interest rates through the roof



It also noted that social unrest took a massive toll on almost all sectors of the economy as it had never been.

'In addition, frequent power disruptions, shortages in fuel, raw materials, foreign currency which affected in making supply chain disruptions, amidst price escalations in both domestic and global markets, affected adversely to the whole production process of agriculture, industry and services." DCS said

This caused the economy to give up record 7.8 percent in 2022. For the full year, the agricultural sector declined by 4.6 percent, while the industry and services sectors contracted by 16.0 percent and 2.0 percent, respectively.

Sri Lanka's economy is expected to turn a corner next week with the expected approval of US\$ 2.9 billion bailout package by the Executive Board of the International Monetary Fund (IMF)

The bank's shares closed 24 percent lower on Wednesday after its main shareholder, Saudi National Bank, said it would not raise its stake in the group due to regulatory

The bank had already taken a hit earlier in the week when its annual report acknowledged "material weaknesses" in internal controls.

The Swiss National Bank said late Wednesday that capital and liquidity levels at the lender were adequate for a "systemically important bank", even as it pledged to make liquidity available if needed.

Credit Suisse is one of 30 banks globally deemed too big to fail, forcing it to set aside more cash to weather a crisis.

It said in yesterday's statement that the central bank loan would "support... core businesses and clients".

Analysts have warned of mounting concerns over the bank's viability and the impact on the wider sector, as shares of other lenders sank on Wednesday after a rebound the day before.

"The usage of the liquidity facility sends a mixed signal," said ING senior sector strategist Suvi Platerink Kosonen.

"While it is comforting that the bank has access to liquidity it may need, it is also rather disturbing that it needs it," she said.

Markets have been rocked this week following the implosions of tech industry lenders Silicon Valley Bank and Signature

SVB's demise was precipitated by the US Federal Reserve's interest rate-hike campaign,

which brought down the value of bonds with lower returns that the California bank held, causing it to lose US\$ 1.8 billion.

Credit Suisse said Thursday that its bond portfolio was "fully hedged for moves in interest rates".

The European Central Bank will be in focus later yesterday as it is expected to raise rates again by a hefty half a percentage point to battle inflation. The Fed will hold its own rate policy meeting next week.

In February 2021, Credit Suisse shares were worth 12.78 Swiss francs, but since then, the bank has endured a barrage of problems that

have eaten away at its market value. In early 2021, its asset management branch was rocked by the bankruptcy of British financial firm Greensill, in which some US\$ 10 billion had been committed through four funds. And just a few weeks later, it was hit by the implosion of US fund Archegos, which cost it more than US\$ 5 billion.

The bank last month booked a net loss of 7.3 billion Swiss francs for the 2022 financial year. That came against a backdrop of massive withdrawals of funds by its clients, including in the wealth management sector one of the activities on which the bank intends to refocus as part of a major restructuring plan.

'What happened was the Treasury unduly influenced the monetary policy in favour of fiscal policy, that's why our KPI dipped by 50 percent," he added.

In order to maintain coordination of fiscal, monetary and financial stability policies, it is proposed to setup a Coordination Council under the draft law. However, Dr. Weerasinghe noted that the Coordination Council would not be vested with any decision making powers. When it comes to the appointment of the Central Bank Governor,

he stressed that an open and transparent mechanism will be provided under the draft CB Act, which includes a strenuous screening process to determine fitness and propriety of recommendations made by the Minister of Finance. The approval of the Constitutional Council is required for the appointment of the Central Bank Governor.

However, Dr. Weerasinghe acknowledged that there are certain flaws in the draft legislation with regard to powers granted to the Minister of Finance to appoint a Deputy Governor, who is not a Central Bank employee, which may allow the Finance Ministry to exert some influence on the monetary policy decision making process.

Dr. Weerasinghe expressed confidence that such flaws would be corrected by the Supreme Court or when the Bill is taken up for approval in parliament.

Meanwhile, the draft law exempts the Central Bank from the requirement of purchasing unsold Treasury bills, which is expected to discourage money printing, which has been a main driver of high inflation.

Dr. Weerasinghe noted that the Treasury bill stock currently held by the Central Bank has risen to Rs.2.75 trillion, and a large part of it was accumulated over past 2-3 years.

The Central Bank would also be relieved from the agency function of raising funds to settle the country's debt eventually. A new entity is to be established under the Finance

Ministry for this task. Further, Dr. Weerasinghe noted that the

draft law also closes loopholes in terms of making new direct provisional advances to the government to finance expenditures. Accordingly, the government is required to make such requests for provisional advances within the first month of the new year, and is required to settle such provisional advances within a period of six months.



But his work is also steeped in mid-century influences including jazz and popular American standards. Williams holds he's not as Wagnerian as his music might indicate, but admits the 19th century German giant's influence on Hollywood's early composers, and therefore his own, is palpable."Wagner lives with us here, you can't escape it," he told The New Yorker in 2020. "I have been in the big river swimming with all of them."

Afterwards, he moved to New York, where he enrolled at the prestigious Juilliard school to study piano



Spielberg also introduced



the most recognisable film score ever. Several of Williams' "Star Wars" compositions are prime examples of leitmotif, with musical cues tying together the vast, character-rich story. "He has written the soundtrack of our lives," conductor Gustavo Dudamel told The New York Times last year. "When we listen to a melody of John's, we go back to a time, to a taste, to a smell. All our senses go back to a moment." Other credits from Williams' more than 100 film scores include the music for 1978's "Superman," the first three "Harry Potter" films and a number of "Indiana Jones" films.

"Harrison Ford made Indiana Jones into an iconic action hero, but John made us believe in adventure again, through that pulse-pounding march," said Spielberg. Off-screen, he is responsible for the "Olympic Fanfare and Theme" first composed for the 1984 Summer Games in Los Angeles and used ever since on US broadcasts. Williams has recently

indicated he might take a step back from film scoring, giving more energy to conducting and composing concert music; he was a longtime leader of the Boston Pops orchestra. But speaking at a panel with Spielberg earlier this year, Williams seemed to walk back the notion of slowing down, vowing to work until he's 100 or so. "So I've got 10 more years to go. I'll stick around for a while!" he told the crowd. "You can't 'retire'


