

A VOWS TO 'FIGHT BACK' IF

Wednesday to "fight back" should Taiwan President Tsai Ingwen meet the US House Speaker during a trip to the United States.

Tsai left on Wednesday for the United States, from where she will head to Guatemala and Belize to shore up ties with diplomatic allies. On her way back to Taiwan she will stop in California, where US House Speaker Kevin McCarthy had said he would meet her.

China claims the democratic island as part of its territory to be retaken one day and, under its «One China» principle, no country may maintain official ties with both Beijing and Taipei.

Beijing warned Wednesday

that it was "resolutely opposed" to any meeting between Tsai take "resolute measures to

fight back" if it goes ahead. "If (Tsai) engages with US and McCarthy and vowed to House Speaker McCarthy, it principle, undermines China's sovereignty and territorial integrity, and undermines peace and stability across the Taiwan Strait," Taiwan Affairs Office spokesperson Zhu Fenglian said.

Tsai's trip follows Honduras's decision this month to open diplomatic relations with Beijing, leaving Belize and Guatemala among just 13 countries that have official ties with Taipei.

"External pressure will not hinder our determination to go global," Tsai told reporters at the airport before leaving. "We are calm and confident. We will not succumb and we will not provoke (others)."

French authorities raid banks in massive tax fraud case


PARIS (AFP), 28 MARCH, 2023 -

French authorities raided five banks on Tuesday as part of an investigation into suspected cases of massive tax fraud and money laundering, prosecutors said.

Some 150 investigators conducted searches in Paris and the financial district La Defense, the financial prosecutor's office (PNF) said in a

The raids follow five preliminary investigations that were opened in December 2021 in connection with suspected money laundering and aggravated suspected tax fraud related to dividend payments, the statement said. The operation "required several months of preparation", the statement said, and involved 16 investigating magistrates and more than 150 financial investigators.

Prosecutors from Germany, where similar tax frauds came to light in recent years, were also involved in the raids, the statement added.

Islamabad court issues non-bailable arrest warrants for Imran


DAWN.COM, 29 MARCH, 2023- An Islamabad court on Wednesday issued non-bailable arrest

warrants for PTI Cháirman Imran Khan in a case related to alleged threats made to a judge, and directed the authorities to present him before the court on April 18.

In the last hearing on March 24, the court converted the non-bailable arrest warrant issued for the PTI chief into a bailable warrant at the PTI's request while hearing a case registered against the ex-premier for allegedly using threatening language against Additional District and Sessions Judge Zeba Chaudhry and the Islamabad police officials.

Today, prosecutor Rizwan Abbasi appeared in Judicial Magistrate Malik Aman's court. Imran was represented by his counsel Faisal Chaudhry.

At the outset of the hearing, the prosecutor objected to Imran's absence, saying his warrants should be changed from bailable to non-bailable as he failed to appear before the court.


Once a self-sufficient and prosperous nation in terms of food, Sri Lanka's agriculture industry has now changed completely. The Green Revolution of the 1960s brought the widespread use of chemical inputs and fertilizers to the sector. Had chemical agriculture been sustainable, there would be no need to discuss food safety and food security as of now.

According to According to Marginalized Organic Producer Association (MOPA) Chairman Dr. Sarath Ranaweera attracted by the 'Green Revolution' to uplift agriculture, Sri Lankan farmers set their sights on increasing yields at all costs; forgetting one crucial element which is the soil. Prior to the use of chemical inputs the soil was rich and consisted of beneficial micro-organisms and nutrients necessary for plant growth. These microorganisms were especially crucial for the absorption of nitrogen, potassium and phosphorus components by plants. "However, the addition of synthetic chemical inputs to the soil to obtain higher yields turned the once-fertile soil into dead soil, which destroyed beneficial microbes. This left farmers dependent solely on chemical inputs to maintain their crops" explained Dr. Ranaweera

crops," explained Dr. Ranaweera.

Despite having a long history of farming, Sri Lanka lacks a deep understanding of the intricacies of agriculture. When farmers apply chemical inputs to their crops, they have little scientific knowledge of how the plants will absorb these chemicals; no matter how liberally they are applied. This emphasised the urgent need for a more understanding of the physical and chemical basis of plant growth.

"Inorganic nitrogen (N) that can be absorbed by plants is present in the soil in two forms: ammonium (NH4+) and nitrate (NO3-). Ammonium is held in soil particles and it can exchange with other cations. They can also be absorbed by plants. Ammonium does not degrade easily. But when we artificially add nitrogen to the soil, it does not remain in the soil and its efficiency dips. Different plants take up nitrogen at different rates and rates. Therefore, the frequency of applying nitrogen artificially to the soil has to be increased. It will also cost a lot of money. However, plants are not able to absorb all the chemical inputs added externally. Therefore, many external inputs, including urea, which we use in agriculture, will end up in reservoirs," said Dr. Ranaweera.



The Sustainable Nitrogen Management Status Report, published by the Mahaweli Development and Environment Ministry in 2019 has revealed some facts regarding this. About 64 percent of the imported urea in Sri Lanka is used for paddy cultivation, but only 20-40 percent of it is actually absorbed. In 2018, tea cultivation consumed 100.4 million kilograms of urea and 27.7 million kilograms of ammonium sulfate adding up to a staggering 51.88 million kilos of nitrogen. It is estimated that 40 percent of the total amount of nitrogen applied was wasted. Sri Lanka's agriculture sector ranks quite low on the EPI 2018 Sustainable Nitrogen Management Index, coming in at124th place out of 180 countries.

"Synthetic chemical fertilizers have been widely used in Sri Lanka's agriculture sector. Past governments increased the use of artificial fertilizers by offering subsidies. NPK fertilizers, which are highly soluble in water, have had devastating effects on the entire ecosystem, particularly on water sources. Excess fertilizer that is not absorbed by crops is washed into nearby waterways, leading to an increase in nitrogen content in water. Research reports on the water have revealed that Sri Lanka's river system now has one of the highest levels of nitrogen among

all river tributaries in Asia. In order to reduce the amount of nitrogen in river water, countries like Israel have reduced the mixing of nitrogen in river water. In those countries, arrangements have been made to supply the water required for cultivation through drip irrigation systems using advanced techniques. But there is no evidence of such techniques being practised in Sri Lanka. Sri Lanka lags behind in achieving its agricultural development goals. We boast about achieving sustainable development goals, but much needs to be done," he said.


"But instead, we have been squandering our country's economy. When nitrogen is produced naturally in the country, Sri Lanka relies heavily on imported urea to meet the nitrogen requirement of crops. Usually, plants absorb the required amount of nitrogen in a short period of time and release the rest to the environment. But

what Sri Lanka's farmers did was add imported urea excessively to plants, leading to wasted money and massive environmental damage.

Dr. Ranawera further said that part from the accumulation of water on the ground surface, chemical nitrogen combines with water and infiltrates the ground contaminating groundwater sources. Nitrogen evaporation also releases nitrous oxide (N2O) into the atmosphere, which is a highly dangerous gas. Nitrous oxide has the ability to increase the temperature 300 times as much as carbon dioxide over a 100-year period. In addition, nitrous oxide is the most destructive gas for the depletion of the ozone layer.

According to him a global summary analysis published by academics Yuri Sherbok, Neville Mirer, and Philip Robertson shows that, according to non-linear responses of nitrous oxides, the increased use of nitrogen inputs in modern agriculture leads to higher emissions of nitrous oxide. The application of varying amounts of nitrogen based on crop needs also exacerbates this issue. Therefore, the 2021 United Nations Conference on Climate Change, COP26 allocated US\$ 130 million to protect the environment by reducing greenhouses.

soil and strengthens the absorption process whereas the chemical method destroys beneficial microorganisms in the soil, leading to dead soil. Chemical inputs make the soil dead and organic inputs protect the life of the soil.

"Restoring dead soil can take 1-3 years. Depending on the impact of chemical inputs on the soil, the time can extend even more. Soil restoration involves reactivating natural processes in the soil and creating a suitable environment for the growth of nutrients and microorganisms.

"However the question arises as to whether it is possible to achieve higher yields and profitable cultivation by solely using organic fertilizers in a plantation. The key is to thoroughly study the farming method. When comparing the yield from crops using organic fertilizers to those using chemical fertilizers, the yield produced from by using the former is often lower. In the last Yala season, ordinary compost fertilizers were used for cultivation in many districts where paddy cultivation is widely practiced. The yield was 84 bushels per acre. In the last five years, the yield using chemical fertilizers was 88 bushels per acre," he explained.

However the question arises as to whether it is possible to achieve higher yields and profitable cultivation by solely using organic fertilizers in a plantation. The key is to thoroughly study the farming method. When comparing the yield from crops using organic fertilizers to those using chemical fertilizers, the yield produced from by using the former is often lower"

There are farmers who overcame the challenge posed by the chemical fertilizer ban brought about suddenly by the 2021 Government using environmentally friendly methods as seen in the Ampara district. Ampara farmers cultivated using eco-friendly methods for 3 main seasons and achieved a successful harvest. According to the Department of Agriculture, farmers were able to achieve a yield of 5800 kg per hectare from the 4660 hectares cultivated in Ampara district using biofertilizers. This is an increase of 27.6% compared to the average yield of 4,546 kg per hectare using chemical fertilizers in Ampara over the past five years. Some remain skeptical about the potential of organic farming to increase yields and it is unfortunate.

In addition, several agricultural lands have achieved remarkable outcomes from organic farming and are even exporting their products. For instance, the Dankotuwa Lunuwila Paraboa Farmers' Organization in the North-West Province is successfully managing over 110 acres of paddy fields with the cooperation of more than 100 farmers. They harvest the paddy from these fields, process it into rice, and export it. Each farmer in the project was able to achieve a yield of 110 bushels per acre from 8 acres of organic farming.

"In contrast to other countries, Sri Lanka shows limited interest in research related to organic farming. Therefore, the knowledge on that field is lacking. Research conducted by Wayamba University using different types of organic fertilizers was released on January 05, 2022. According to the report, the research was conducted using Bio Foods/Ecoplus bio fertilizers and regular organic fertilizers and two types of paddies in the Galewela area and its finding was that the yield of the cultivation using bio fertilizers was very high," he said.

Some farmers who do not believe in the old saying "if the soil is good, farming is good" are facing many challenges in cultivation. To overcome this, it is crucial to provide accurate scientific knowledge and new discoveries about farming to the people. This knowledge can be used to formulate national policies related to agriculture and new educational approaches. By doing so, the country and the world can be led towards a sustainable path.

Black leopard cub at Yala National Park :

CONSERVATIONISTS URGE PUBLIC TO ACT WITH CAUTION



photo and a video of a melanistic black leopard cub spotted at the Yala National Park is being shared widely on social media since last Friday(March 24). According to records, a black leopard has been spotted in Yala after about 50 years. "There have been records of a black leopard some 50 years ago, but the most recent sighting of a black leopard is the one that was recorded a few days ago," said Yala National Park Warden Manoj Widyaratne.

"The leopard that has been spotted is a 5-6 month old male cub and from a wildlife point of view it is a rare species. Once the photos went viral on social media there has been a 90% increase in the number of visitors who are arriving at the park since Monday to catch a glimpse of the leopard. The number of vehicles in the area that the leopard has been spotted has now increased causing a heavy traffic and this may put the leopard and its mother under stress. The vehicles are so much that the two animals are even finding it a challenge to cross the road. With such an unnecessary burden the mother might even have a tendency to change the territory and take the cub elsewhere. The next location might be closer to a bordering village and in that case they are at risk of falling prey to traps including snares. If this visitor behavior continues we may have to close down the area to ensure the safety of the animals," Widyaratne cautioned.

When asked what sort of awareness is being done to ensure that the leopard and its family is being protected, Widyaratne said that they have already informed wildlife guides, Jeep drivers and trackers to refrain from giving unnecessary attention to the black leopard cub. "Some have even gone to the extent of bypassing park rules and continuing their safari rides beyond 6.00pm just to ensure that the visitors catch a glimpse of the species. Such acts will not be entertained," Widyaratne underscored.

"Melanism occurs due to an animal having recessive or dominant alleles," explained Sethil Muhandiram, conservationist/carnivore researcher at Leopocon, an organization exclusively dedicated to conserve the Sri Lankan leopard and its ecosystems. "Alleles are essentially variations of normal genes. In leopards, the pigment is caused by a recessive allele. In jaguars, it is caused by a dominant allele. It is believed that only 10% of total population become panthe and over the past couple of decades around 3-4 panther deaths were reported within the island and the sighting of panthers date back to 1821. In many cases there were confirmed reports within the dry zone landscape of the country and panthers were no strangers to the Sri Lankan wilderness."

"But unfortunately with their color, society has given them a higher value which have made them vulnerable. The deaths that occurred in recent past indicate that some of the deaths were intentional and the snares which cause these deaths were intentionally targeted at the animal. We have reports of panthers and their presence throughout the country and local authorities and other environmental organizations are very discreet towards their presence," he added.

Speaking about the recent incident at Yala National Park, Muhandiram said that conservation disciplines have never been more challenged than today because of technology. "Conventionally, conservationists have argued that sharing the locations of vulnerable species gives poachers a leg up on the animals, making those on-the-brink species even more vulnerable. It is undeniable that in some cases, poachers have used published data to hunt down rare animals for the illegal wildlife trade. Yet sometimes the attention may help protect wildlife as well," he said while adding that it is our responsibility to protect, not pursue for fame.

Issuing a statement, the Wildlife and Nature Protection Society urged the public to act responsibly at this critical juncture. "The sighting of an incredibly rare melanistic leopard has once again created a lot of hype, especially among wildlife photographers in Sri Lanka.

The WNPS urges all photographers and the public to act responsibly at this critical juncture, without overrunning the park to get the perfect photograph. We also encourage those who have already witnessed this sighting to avoid publishing its whereabouts on social media to minimise its exposure. It's at times like this that we must protect, not pursue. All species possess the right to roam their territory undisturbed, and if we run this vulnerable species to the ground, we may never catch a glimpse of it again," the statement read.

It is no secret that the last few years have been interlaced with crisis after crisis on a local and an international scale. 2019 marked the start of some of the most turbulent years Sri Lankans have had to face since the end of the 30-year-long civil war in 2009. Bombings on Easter Sunday, 14/11/2019, COVID and, most recently, Sri Lanka's devastating economic crisis. Politics, the economy, health, human rights and the environment have all been "problem areas" globally, affected by both human and natural entities. Surviving crises is, in many ways, becoming a way of life. In an age of instant information, we have access to more data than ever before. Our devices create a sense of virtual proximity to events happening thousands of kilometres away. While this keeps us informed, the repeated consumption of negative data can be damaging; it is important that we care about world events, but it is equally important for us to care about our mental well-being. This begs the question: how is this recurrent exposure to negativity affecting us?

HEIGHTENED SENSITISATION

...... LEARNED HELPLESSNESS

When people are repeatedly faced with negative events, and when they believe that they have no control over these events, they gin to feel that these situations are inevitable and inescapable, even after a solution becomes

According to Dr. Pushpa Ranasinghe, Consultant Psychiatrist at the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) and Team Leader of the National Mental Health Helpline, "What is harmful is the belief that you cannot do anything to improve the situation and that nothing is within your control. This means the situation can worsen because you are not actively trying to improve it. However, this perceived lack of control is only a belief; it is not necessarily true. There are still things that remain within your control. In a stage of learned helplessness, people tend to give up".

CHRONIC STRESS

"When stress exceeds a healthy amount and becomes too much, a person can withdraw from situations and feel unable to handle it.



When stress becomes chronic, the amount of corticosteroid hormones present in the body can get affected. This hormone imbalance can also affect a person's physical health by worsening etes and high blood pressure conditions like dia Dr. Ranasinghe said.

...... ANXIETY AND DEPRESSION

There has definitely been an increase in anxiety and depression since the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic and the economic crisis», said Dr. Sajeewana Amarasinghe, NIMH Consultant Psychiatrist.

"Symptoms like feeling low throughout the day, especially if it is worse in the morning, losing interest in things that usually bring you joy, losing motivation, constant tiredness and feelings of hopelessness and helplessness are telltale signs of depression. Anxiety can present in different ways, for example, palpitations, difficulties in breathing, headaches, body aches and issues with concentration and memory", Dr. Amarasinghe said.

MALADAPTIVE COPING **MECHANISMS**

In stressful situations, people use different ways to deal with problen ome neonle use healthy coping strategies like problem-solving. Some people use maladaptive strategies to temporarily relieve themselves of the problem. This includes taking substances and deliberately harming oneself. This can also make people histrionic and irritable, especially towards people they are closest to", revealed Dr. Ranasinghe.

...... THE STATS: MORE SRI LANKANS SEEKING SUPPORT

The number of calls received by the 24/7 1926 helpline was at its maximum during the lockdown in 2020, with a total of 28,508 calls. According to Dr. Ranasinghe, the call tally reduced slightly after this period, but it is currently on the rise again. The total annual number of calls since 2020 has been significantly higher than in preceding

The NIMH also has a 24/7 WhatsApp helpline.

Dr. Ranasinghe stated that there has been a noticeable increase in the number of chats via WhatsApp. Most chats received are from the younger generation, particularly individuals etween 16 to 23 years of age

The doctors cited direct effects of crises such as unemployment, teens and young adults' inability to continue their education and having to financially support their family instead, family members moving abroad, increased rates of domestic violence and having to change lifestyles to adapt to the new economic situation as the most common factors causing people distress lately. "A lot of people are anxious about the future".

THE FLIP SIDE: **DESENSITISATION**

Is tragedy becoming so normalised that our empathy is getting adversely affected? How are we able to read about a catastrophic event and scroll past or turn the page so quickly?

"When there is a lot of violence and it becomes a day-to-day occurrence, it is possible for people to gradually become desensitised to it,





especially if they are not directly affected by the situation", said Dr. Amarasinghe.

Dr. Ranasinghe also attributed this reduced emotional reaction to the focus on statistics when interpreting news. "If there is an emergency situation, we want to know how many people were affected or how many deaths have taken place, for example. More attention is given to the number", she said.

DOOMSCROLLING

The recently-coined term "doomscrolling" has been used to describe the tendency to continuously scroll through negative news, especially on social media. Fuelled by uncertainty in times of crisis, we may be inclined to repeatedly refresh our news feeds for updates. This behaviour became prevalent in 2020, during the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic, and has since become a negative habit that many individuals continue to perform, despite its damaging consequences.

The overconsumption of media, in general, is not good, and this is especially the case if the information being consumed is negative. You need to find a healthy balance to stay informed without overdoing it", said Dr. Amarasinghe.

HOW CAN WE COPE?

According to the doctors, there are certain coping mechanisms and strategies that people can use to strengthen their overall mental wellbeing and minimise the negative impacts of crises and stressful situations on their mental

- Recognise the source of your stress and your body's reaction to stress.
- ■Recognise your personal contribution towards your stress, for example, overthinking, negative thinking patterns.
- ■Recognise your strengths, for example, supportive family and friends, intellectual capability, good personal qualities, and things to be grateful for.
- ■Set daily goals and be firm with reaching
- Avoid perfectionist expectations.
- ■Don't self-medicate. If you feel overwhelmed and/or are experiencing symptoms of anxiety and depression, reach out to a professional.
- Surround yourself with positive people.
- Meditation and positive affirmations.

The doctors emphasised the importance of continuing your daily tasks and leisure activities, spending time with friends and family plus focusing on things that are within your control.

National Transport Medical Institute

Brokers alleged to be conniving with doctors to issue fraudulent medical certificates

A pioneer in the medical field of Sri Lanka, the National Transport Medical Institute (NTMI) has become the only Government institute which certifies physical and mental fitness, conducting qualitative medical tests for all candidates who apply for driving licenses.

Their vision is a 'Healthy driver behind each steering wheel.

However, a Daily Mirror investigation has revealed that medical certificates have been issued to people whose vision was not suitable for

A Daily Mirror team visited the NTMI Head Office in Nugegoda to find out more about these

Several officials and several minor staffers who wished to remain anonymous provided details of

irregularities which they claim are currently going

According to them, there are brokers who roam inside the NTMI premises and take bribes up to Rs. 50,000 to issue fraudulent certificates. They provide the information that the examiners

ask at the examination, enabling applicants to cheat. These brokers charge a sum between Rs.15,

000 to Rs. 30,000 from applicants to provide examination details. Moreover, there were allegations that some of

the doctor assistants provide fraudulent results of the eyesight tests of the applicants to pass the test, compromising the procedure of conducting vision

These false medical reports will lead to the issuance of driving licenses to those who are not fit, putting other motorists and pedestrians at risk.

Meanwhile, an official at the NTMI claimed that a doctor who had recently taken measures to rectify the faults was removed from his post by the



According to the official, the said doctor used to conduct vision tests on his own, and that had antagonized brokers.

Several complaints were lodged with the Ministry by the brokers and the Ministry then decided to remove the doctor from the post. The same officials claimed that the doctor had



to make it convenient for people. The programmes speech and hearing difficulties in using public transport services.

He claimed that the doctor had proposed a lighting system to be installed in the bus as well as near the driver for deaf people to use, instead of a

The doctor had also requested to display the destination of trains prominently so that passengers with hearing impairment, and so that people who can't hear the announcements made at train stations can easily identify their intended trains.

Art as a witness of history
A retrospective of Kamala Vasuki's work

Kamala Vasuki (Born 1966) hails from Jaffna, Sri Lanka. Trained by A. Mark, a pioneering artist and art teacher who popularised modern art practices in northern Sri Lanka, she is among the few female visual artists from **Sri Lanka in general and** specifically from the north and east of Sri Lanka.

Having had her first solo exhibition in 1989 in Jaffna, she is the only female visual artist who has sustained an art practice while continuing to live through the war. She has lived through the trials and tribulations of war, shelling, the danger of sexual violence, displacement, loss of loved ones and all the other profound disruptions of ordinary life. She moved to Batticaloa in 1995 and has been an integral part of women's activist spaces for peace, non-violence and justice.

She experienced growing up as a young woman as a student at Vembadi Girls High School, the University of Jaffna and later as a youth volunteer in myriad progressive groups in Jaffna and Colombo.

Vasuki's artistic technique is vibrant

and has changed over time. When looked at together it is possible to trace journeys through technique, style and colour palette in her work. This can be artistically interpreted as reflexive of the context in which she was making art and there remains validity

and truth to that interpretation. When asked about these choices, Vasuki simply says

"I made art with whatever material I had access to".

In the context of war when art materials were close to impossible to obtain, Vasuki worked with any paper, colours or other material she could find. She made sculptures out of plastic pens and soap. The soap sculptures were eventually used by those in her household when soap was no longer available

in Jaffna due to the war-related embargo. She drew on any paper she could find and hungrily grabbed any material she found and learned to make art with it, with enormous encouragement of this mode of art-making from her teacher and mentor who she and others lovingly refer to as Mark Master.

Now, looked at together, Vasuki's art consists of landscape art, sketches, wash drawings, pastel paintings, cartoons and installations.

Her collective artwork, often with communities of women from different parts of the island often takes materials

from the everyday lives of women such as fabric, saris, objects, flowers, grains etc. to tell their own stories.

Vasuki has had individual and group exhibitions in different parts of Sri Lanka and abroad, including Nepal, Australia and

the Netherlands. In what is perhaps a fitting testament to her place in the world of visual art in Sri Lanka, her work was displayed and printed along with that of only nine other artists from the island in the book 'A to Z of Conflict', a trilingual collection of conflict-related words displayed around artistic works published by Raking Leaves in 2019.

As a collection of specially commissioned works, it is one of the largest artistic works on

conflict to emerge from the island. Vasuki's art practice is deeply grounded in her life experiences and her feminist perspective on the world. Now almost 35 years later since she began making art, her work bears witness to the histories she has lived through.

Some of her paintings such as the painting related to the rape and murder of Krishanthi Kumaraswamy in 1996 and the 'My child is not for war' painting have become iconic symbols of histories of the war, especially from a feminist and women's perspective.

More recently her paintings are being used as a pedagogic tool to teach the histories of the past 30 years, including that of the war in Sri Lanka. As much as Vasuki's work is an archive and a way to know, understand and feel the history of the north and east of Sri Lanka for the past four decades, she continues to be an artistic witness and commentator in contemporary Sri Lanka.

She has created work, that is a response to contemporary realities such as the pandemic, the economic crisis, and ongoing struggles for social change and justice.

One of the most important aspects of her continuing work is her collective art-making practice where she creates space for women, often from marginalized backgrounds who have been deeply impacted by war, poverty and other forms of injustice to create art together.


A retrospective of Vasuki's work goes beyond an individual history of a single artist. To the contrary, this retrospective, just as with her art, bears witness to four decades of history of this island, of the ordinary people of this land, the violent plight they continue to endure and the consistent histories of resistance and demands for justice.

Simultaneously the simple and sheer beauty of this land and its people peeps through in Vasuki's strokes and colours providing a holistic and nuanced history that is made possible through art.

HUMAN RIGHTS:


oday in Sri Lanka, President Ranil Wickremesinghe and the splintered Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) government are trying pull the country out of its worst ever socioeconomic crisis since independence in 1948. With the approval of the International Monetary Fund's (IMF) loan of US\$2.9B the situation has improved and President says he hopes to bring down the unprecedented cost of living within few months. But with the media and especially the social media saying different stories at different times and sometimes giving a twisted interpretation to fit into the agendas of some political parties, the truth is in a lying mess.


It is in this context that we need to contemplate on the United Nations International Day for the 'Right to the Truth Concerning Gross Human Rights Violations and for the Dignity of Victims'. In a statement to mark this international day, which was on March 24, the UN says the right to the truth is often invoked in the context of gross violations of human rights and grave breaches of humanitarian law. The relatives of victims of summary executions, enforced disappearance, missing persons, abducted children, torture, require to know what happened to them. The right to the truth implies knowing the full and complete truth as to the events that transpired, their specific circumstances, and who participated in them, including knowing the circumstances in which the violations took place, and the reasons for them.

This annual observance pays tribute to the memory of Monsignor Óscar Árnulfo Romero, who was murdered on March 24, 1980. Monsignor Romero was actively engaged in denouncing violations of the human rights of the most vulnerable individuals in El Salvador. The purpose of the day is to: Honour the memory of victims of gross and systematic human rights violations and promote the importance of the right to truth and justice; Pay tribute to those who have devoted their lives to, and lost their lives in, the struggle to promote and protect human rights for all; Recognize, in particular, the important work and values of Archbishop Oscar Arnulfo Romero of El Salvador, who was assassinated on March 24,1980, after denouncing violations of the human rights of the most vulnerable populations and defending the principles of protecting lives, promoting human dignity and opposition to all forms of violence.

On December 21, 2010, the United Nations General Assembly proclaimed March 24 as the International Day for the Right to the Truth concerning Gross Human Rights Violations and for the Dignity of Victims. The date was chosen because on March 24, 1980, Archbishop Oscar Romero was assassinated, after denouncing violations of human rights. In a study conducted in 2006 the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights concluded that the right to the truth about gross human rights violations and serious violations of human rights law is an inalienable and autonomous right, linked to the duty and obligation of the State to protect and guarantee human rights. In a 2009 report on the Right to the Truth, the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights identified best practices for the effective implementation of this right, in particular practices relating to archives and records concerning gross violations of human rights, and programmes on the protection of witnesses and other persons involved in trials connected with such violations. The Commission on the Truth for El Salvador was established in accordance with the Mexico Agreements of April 27, 1991 to investigate serious acts of violence that had occurred since 1980 and whose impact on society was deemed to require an urgent public knowledge of the truth. In its report of March 15, 1993, the Commission documented the facts of the assassination of Archbishop Romero by pro-government forces, the so-called "death squads". He was shot dead by an assassin as he celebrated mass on March 24, 1980.

In a message UN Secretary General António Guterres says The International Day for the Right to the Truth Concerning Gross Human Rights Violations and the Dignity of Victims reminds us that truth is a powerful light. A light that shines on violations that perpetrators would prefer to remain hidden. A light that reveals a path towards peace, justice and reparation for victims, and compels countries to meet their obligations under international law. And a light that illuminates the underlying causes of these violations, so that we can prevent them from taking root. When the light of truth is extinguished, societies are plunged into a dark world of threat, lies and mistrust.

Improving Lankan women's access to economic opportunities:



f 2023 is just like any other year, as women's history month wraps up this Friday, slowly but surely, women's faces slowly fall off the panels, roundtables, stages and meeting rooms, and everyone's favourite buzzword, "empowerment" is retired for another year.

It is easy to make light of this corporate spectacle of course, but the myriad of barriers and challenges that women uniquely experience is very real, and because of it we are all losers - you, me, women and the economy.

As we in Sri Lanka explore the pathways out of the current crisis, it is imperative that we acknowledge the mammoth contributions that women make to the economy, hidden and unpaid, and seriously consider how to improve their access to paid, formal economic opportunities. If lence is anything to countries (if any) have achieved successful economic development without creating and leveraging fair economic opportunities for women. In East and South-East Asia, women have powered their export-led manufacturing growth; over the past three decades, Vietnam's female labour force participation rate has consistently remained over 70%, Thailand's over 60%, and South Korea and Indonesia's over 50%. It isn't just a happy coincidence that across all of Asia's rapidly developing economies, women have access to and take up formal employment.

Sri Lanka's own female labour force rate has hovered in the low 30% for decades in 2021, just 31% of women were in the labour force compared to 71% of men. According to the 2022 Global Gender Gap Report, Sri Lanka has the 13th largest gender gap in labour force participation in the world, dropping four positions since 2021. This poor performance is particularly notable because Sri Lanka fares remarkably well in terms of women's access to and performance in education. Sri Lanka has achieved gender parity far ahead of others in the South Asian region in terms of literacy rates and enrolment in primary, secondary and university education. A recent study by the World Bank revealed that girls outperform boys in educational outcomes at every level of the education system and across all national examinations. Most notably, women have made up over 50% of state university enrolments since 2001, taking up a share of over 60% at present.

It is generally (and fairly) assumed that equitable access to education results in equitable economic participation as well. This has unfortunately and clearly not been the case for Sri Lanka; significant investments in women's education have not translated to economic benefits for women, nor the country.

as worth it. The long answer is that when employment is conceived as a rational choice, the "costs" Sri Lankan women have to incur to take up a job, outweigh the rupee remuneration they receive.

A study by Verité Research conducted in 2021 looked at exactly this, and the findings are startling. On average, every Rs.100 that employed (urban) women earn in Sri Lanka costs them Rs. 160; costs exceedearnings. This study is unique because it considers both rupee costs that women incur like transport and childcare, and implicit non-monetary costs like the physical and emotional cost of the double burden. In Sri Lanka, much like the rest of the world, family and society is disproportionately reliant on the unpaid labour of women for household and care work. Women are often the primary caregiver for children, and spend 2.5 times more time on household tasks than men, according to the most recent time-use survey. Because of the patriarchal nature of the society we live in, these expectations remain unchanged even when women take up full-time paid work outside the home. This comes at a 'cost" obviously, even if it is seemingly hidden. According to the previously quoted study, 57% of the total cost of doing a job for women is non-monetary.

The barriers that serve to restrict women's access to economic opportunities in Sri Lanka are multi-fold. This includes structural barriers like the lack of accessible, affordable, and quality

childcare options, attitudinal and cultural barriers like the patriarchal norms that expect women to prioritize and perform a lion's share of household and care labour, and discrimination in recruitment itself Tackling these barriers is long overdue, not just for women at the top of the corporate ladder, but grassroots up. Stakeholders including policymakers and employers have long made excuses to avoid reform saying that it wasn't the right time. But if the economic success of our Asian peers is any indication, it is not just the right thing to do to improve women's access to economic activities, but the smart thing to do business-wise.

PROGRESS IN SRI LANKA IS NOT NON-EXISTENT.

A few of the heartening examples of progress made in recent years include the drafting of guidelines for quality childcare service provision by the government along with the involvement of experts, and the inclusion of state-funded maternity leave benefits in the 2018 national budget, although it was not implemented. A growing trend from the private sector also signals a shift to more inclusive policies with policies such as parental leave and remote working becoming more mainstream.

However, this is just the beginning and both the state and the private sector are yet to adopt policies that truly facilitate equitable economic opportunities for

IMF: EUPHORIA OR MORE PITFALLS?

The long lines of costly fire crackers that were lit in certain towns to celebrate the approval of the IMF bail-out package was utterly moronic. Those celebrations only made Sri Lanka the laughing stock of Asia, if not of the world!

Worse seems to be the parliamentary debate that followed. Political rhetorics were galore - not unusual though - and certain ministers painted a rosy picture for the country's economic recovery and for most it seems that IMF has become the panacea for all our economic ills!

Also, one is at a loss to understand as to how president Wickremesinghe claimed that Śri Lanka is no more bankrupt, no sooner receiving the green light from Washington? One wonders whether, international rating agencies have upgraded Sri Lanka overnight! Even the IMF approved loan of US\$3 billion is spread over a period of four years. Let it be said that although the govt. has received the first tranche of US\$ 330 million, the receipt of the remaining payments will solely depend on the fulfilment of the government's pledges to IMF.

In this background, top priority for the president and governor CBSL would be the most decisive and difficult foreign and local debt restructuring so as to make our debts sustainable. Secondly, the bigges bugbear for the govt. it appears is the privatization/restructuring of state-owned enterprises, no doubt. Well, these are some of the pitfalls faced by the president and govt. to make sure that IMF obligations are met to pull SL gradually out of the present economic mess.

Amidst this background, it is quite obvious that the present economic struggle of the majority of citizens is a far cry from that of the politicians in power and rest of the elitist class, to say the least. However, a glimmer of hope is in the air for all patriotic citizens in general and for the lobbyists against bribery and corruption in particular as new anti-corruption laws, reducing corruption vulnerabilities, and governance reforms are included as major prerequisites in the IMF programme.

It is quite evident that even IMF has accepted that with rampant corruption in SL specially among most politicians and many state officials at all levels their funding without proper checks and balances could virtually be like water off a duck's back!!





Auto industry requests quota system from govt. to resume vehicle imports

people, who are directly or indirectly employed by it.

The ban on vehicle imports has been in place for three years now. As the country began encountering severe foreign exchange shortages in 2020, vehicle imports became the first casualty, as the then

government imposed a ban on vehicle imports, which has continued up to now.

"Lately, we have been requesting from the government to regulate the industry and then consider a quota system for vehicle imports," Ceylon Motor Traders Association Chairman Charaka Perera told a forum that was organised by the industry association in Colombo, yesterday.

He said as of now, over 50 percent of Sri Lanka's vehicle fleet is over 10 years old. Making a strong case for resuming vehicle imports, at least through a quota system, Perera pointed out that many non-essential products were imported into the country in 2020 and 2021, without any restrictions whatsoever.

Citing the Central Bank data, he said in the calendar years 2020 and 2021, over US \$ 1.5 billion was spent on non-essential imports.

Sri Lanka is negotiating with the International Finance Corporation (IFC), a member of the World Bank Group, to seek its service as transaction advisor for the sale of the government's stakes in several stateowned enterprises (SOEs).

The State-owned Enterprise Restructuring Unit (SRU) yesterday said the Finance Ministry is negotiating with the IFC to obtain its services to divest the state ownership in SriLankan Airlines, Sri Lanka Telecom PLC (SLT) and Lanka Hospitals Corporation PLC.

Crossing on HOPL drives turnover

Mixed interest was observed in Lanka IOC, Expolanka Holdings and Sri Lanka Telecom whilst retail interest was noted in SMB Leasing nonvoting, LOLC Finance and Browns Investments. Foreign participation in the market activity remained at subdued levels with foreigners closing as net buyers.

Food, Beverage & Tobacco sector was the top contributor to the market turnover (due to Horana Plantations) whilst the sector index edged down by 0.05%. The share price of Horana Plantations increased by Rs 3.00 (5.77%) to close at Rs 55.00

Auto industry...

"With all due respect to these industries, I wish to highlight the import expenditure for calendar years 2020 and 2021. Sri Lanka spent US \$ 421 million to import finished clothing and accessories, US \$ 739 million for home appliances and furniture, US \$ 310 million for seafood and US \$ 122 million for cosmetics and toiletries and the list goes on," Perera said.

"Therefore, we believe that there should have been a quota system for all these industries, which could have allowed all of them to survive, including our industry," he said.

"Considering the number I stated, the auto industry could have easily been allocated about US \$ 400 million, which would have been sufficient for the industry to manage businesses without bleeding, save over 15,000 jobs that were lost over the last few months and also provide the much-needed government revenue while making sure the prices of used vehicles do not sky rocket the way it did," he added.

Meanwhile, Perera said even with the pent-up demand, which has built up over the last three years, the resumption of vehicle imports wouldn't amount to what the country spent on vehicle imports in 2019.

"Based on the Central Bank figures, the whole industry consumed only US \$ 815 million in 2019, when imports were widely opened. Even if we consider the pent-up demand, which has built up over the last three years, considering that there is weak disposable income with our consumers, the requirement would be far lesser than what was there in 2019," he said.

Perera further pointed out that by properly regulating vehicle imports, forex outflows can be controlled, in order to not damage the country's foreign reserves, while providing the much-needed vehicles for the country.

Japanese envoy...

"No decision has yet been made. But it all depends on how the reforms of the Sri Lankan government go and whether Sri Lanka can regain the trust from the Japanese government and business community," Mizukoshi told a breakfast forum organised by the Ceylon Motor Traders Association in Colombo, yesterday. "I think all depends on that. When those conditions

are met, I think it will be considered,"
he added. Urban Development and Housing Minister Prasanna
Ranatunga recently said President Ranil Wickremesinghe's
government is ready to renew the LRT project contract with a
JICA loan facility, given its favourable conditions, including the
ow-interest rates and grace period of 12 years, which were
completely ignored by the previous regime.

Fourth round...

The National Trade Negotiating Committee, whose members primarily represent the Foreign Affairs, Trade, Commerce and Food Security Ministries, Trade and Investment Policy Department of the Treasury, Commerce Department, Central Bank and Board of Investment participated in the negotiations on behalf of Sri Lanka, under the leadership of Presidential Secretariat Chief Negotiator K.J. Weerasinghe. The third round of negotiations on the SLIFTA was held in January.

CB reiterates...

It is observed that crypto trading is widely promoted by certain entities as a profitable investment. However, recent complaints received by the CBSL have shown that the members of the public have incurred heavy losses on their crypto investments and in certain instances, have also been subject to financial scams conducted through crypto-related

schemes," the Central Bank said in a statement.

The Central Bank has already highlighted, through press releases issued in 2018, 2021, and 2022, the significant financial, operational, legal and security-related risks as well as customer protection concerns posed to users of cryptocurrency. It noted that these risks and concerns have already materialised with the recent failures of various global institutions engaged in cryptocurrency businesses and the collapse and loss of value of some cryptocurrencies.

"The public is reminded that cryptocurrencies are unregulated investment instruments, which are not recognised as an asset class in Sri Lanka. Further, cryptocurrencies are not considered as legal tender in Sri Lanka and have no regulatory safeguards relating to their usage in the country," the Central Bank statement said. Meanwhile, the Central Bank pointed out that as per Directions No. 03 of 2021, under the Foreign Exchange Act, No. 12 of 2017, electronic fund transfer cards such as debit cards and credit cards are not permitted to be used for payments related to cryptocurrency transactions.

It also highlighted that cryptocurrency operates through informal channels and therefore, it does not contribute to the national economy and can also cause a loss of valuable foreign currency to the country.

The Central Bank also warned of the growing number of financial scams operating with the promise of high returns based on crypto investments.

"These scams include deceiving individuals and obtaining money from them with the promise of providing a high return by investing money in cryptocurrency as well as deceiving individuals to invest in fraudulent cryptocurrency projects.

Such scams circumvent traditional regulatory and legal protection mechanisms, resulting in individuals losing their hard-earned money," the Central Bank said. In this backdrop, it advised the public to safeguard their hard-earned money and not to invest or engage in any cryptocurrency scheme offered through the internet, other forms of media or directly by any persons. The Central Bank also said it has not issued any licence or authorised any individual or business to operate schemes involving cryptocurrency and has not authorised any Initial Coin Offerings (ICOs) or any variant of it, cryptocurrency mining operations, cryptocurrency exchanges, deposittaking or custody services related to cryptocurrency or any cryptocurrency investment advisory service.

SLVA emphasises...

As previously reported, the SLVA expressed concerns over the recent importation of one million table eggs from India by the government. However, after close monitoring of the situation, the SLVA acknowledged the government's adherence to established procedures and guidelines before releasing any imported eggs to the market, safeguarding both the poultry

industry and public health of citizens.

"The SLVA appreciates the Director General and DAPH for ensuring the quality of the imported eggs and their adherence to the provisions given by Animals Disease Act 59 of 1992 and the protocols of the World Organisation for Animal Health and International Trade. It is crucial that all parties involved in the importation of eggs follow protocols and guidelines to avoid potential public health risks associated with the consumption of imported eggs," stated SLVA President Dr. Dilan Satharasinghe.

The SLVA stressed on the importance of sample testing to ensure that the imported eggs are free from Avian Influenza and Salmonellosis. Hence, the SLVA said the egg samples must be sent to the Veterinary Research Institute and Medical Research Institute for testing, before releasing them to the market. Since egg is an animal-origin product, it is crucial to prevent the spread of foodborne diseases to the public.

T-bill yields...

The Treasury bill yields gave up 24 basis points, 33 basis points and one basis point for three-month, six-month and 12-month bills, respectively, at the auction held yesterday, ahead of the third monetary policy meeting scheduled for next Tuesday. The yields settled at 25.99 percent, 25.79 percent and 24.31 percent, under the three tenures.

The three tenures have given up a cumulative 665 basis points, 641 basis points and 496 basis points, respectively, since the current stretch of declines started in mid-December.

Analysts are divided over what the rate setting committee at the Central Bank would do at their first policy meeting after the International Monetary Fund approved the US \$ 2.9 billion lifeline for Sri Lanka last week. The Monetary Board could change course and deliver a rate cut next week, as it is under pressure to support a rebound in the economy, which suffered enormous challenges in the last two years. The economy shrank by a record 7.8 percent in 2022. The phase I of the auction, which offered Rs.120 billion, didn't get fully subscribed, as the Central Bank sold only Rs.86.7 billion. Under the phase II of the auction, the Central Bank is issuing the difference of the accepted versus amount offered plus 25 percent of the aggregate amount offered at the auction.

The EU strongly encouraged Sri Lanka to continue cooperation and engagement with the Human Rights Council and its mechanisms.

Dilmah, which is sold in 104 countries across the world, has been a staple in Australian supermarkets since it did its first deal with Coles in 1988.

The company refuses to dilute its commitment to sustainability and ethical sourcing in order to provide a cheaper price to Australian supermarkets.

Fernando, whose father Merrill J. Fernando started the company, said consumers want quality, single origin (not blended) tea but this is ignored by the supermarkets just looking for higher profits. Another reason Dilmah is not willing to cut comers is it feels a responsibility to Sri Lankans to support the estates and workers that supply its products, 95 percent of which is exported. This has become even more important due to the tough economic times Sri Lanka has suffered in recent years, with inflation running at 50.6 percent in February. The tea industry employs around 10 percent of the Sri Lankan workforce, making it crucial to the country's economic recovery. Fernando said maintaining quality is critical, especially as Sri Lanka is also at the frontline of climate change. He believes Dilmah has a 'responsibility' to look after the soils and build sustainable farming methods, even if it means having to be removed from the Australian supermarket shelves. A Woolworths spokesperson told Daily Mail Australia that "The comments made do not reflect our engagement with Dilmah, however we are mindful that the business works with a number of retailers in Australia." "We are yet to receive a cost increase request from Dilmah and would review any future request on its merits. We are working closely with our suppliers to sensitively manage inflationary pressures, while continuing to support them to deliver quality products."

What is **Endometriosis?**

Endometriosis is a debilitating disease that affects millions of women worldwide. It can cause immense pain, infertility/sub-fertility, chronic fatigue, and other debilitating symptoms. Unfortunately, there is no known cure for endometriosis. However, if diagnosed early, it can

be successfully managed. This is why it is crucial to create awareness at every level of society, including the primary medical care levels of our country. This is where the Endometriosis Support & Awareness Foundation (ESAF) comes in, striving to increase disease recognition, advocate for early diagnosis, and educate the public on successful disease management options.

Endometriosis is often misunderstood in Sri Lanka due to several reasons. There is a lack of awareness and education about the condition among the general public, healthcare professionals, and even among women themselves. As a result, many women may not be able to recognise the symptoms of endometriosis and may dismiss them as normal menstrual pain. Another aspect of this is the stigma surrounding women's reproductive health in Sri Lanka contributes to the misconceptions surrounding endometriosis. 
