Denial of registered addresses for estate community: Estate worker seeks Supreme Court intervention

Sureshkumar a resident of Muwankanda Waththa in Mawathagama filed this petition concerning the Estate Workers and their families living in Sri Lanka who are considered as citizens of this country but are equally aggrieved as the Petitioner himself due to the lack of registered residential addresses allocated to their residences.

The petitioner had named the

Home Affairs Dinesh Gunawardena, Minister of Plantation Industries Ramesh Pathirana, Minister of Water Supply and Estate Infrastructure Development Jeevan Thondaman and several others as respondents.

According to the petition, registered permanent residential addresses for estate workers play an essential role in ensuring that these individuals have access to government services and can participate in the democratic process of the country.

This petition had been filed for the purpose of addressing the denial of a registered address for the estate community of Sri Lanka including the Petitioner himself who are a significant part of the country's labour force employed in the tea, rubber, and coconut plantations, which are the country's primary economic sources.

The Petitioner states that, there are

approximately 300 families residing in the said Muwankanda Estate and that none of these households have a permanent postal address, hence, the citizens residing in the said estate do not receive letters and postal items personally to their houses or their name, and all mail is collectively received by the public address; "Muwankanda Waththa, Mawathagama"

which is common to all the families residing in the estate.

Muthuvel Karunanidhi Stalin (MK Stalin) the Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu State in India, unveiled the name board of a road with a new name on March 24 2023. The Municipal **Administration of Tamil** Nadu's capital city, Chennai had officially changed the name of the West Circular Road in Mandavelipakkam, ward number 126, Zone 9 as the T.M. Soundararajan Road (Saalai). T.M. Soundararajan known popularly as TMS, was a renowned playback singer in Tamil films for many decades

The date March 24 was picked for the official name change as it was the birth centenary of TM Soundararajan, born in 1923. The singer who passed away in 2013 had

been residing on this road at Mandaiveli since 1962. Hence the West Circular Road was changed to TM Soundararajan Road in his honour.

Chief Minister Stalin personally unveiled the new name board in a symbolic gesture. TMS family members were present. Devoting the first article in each month to a film, film personality or film-related topic was a practice followed by this column

in the past. The articles were well received and widely appreciated by readers in general and film fans in particular. However, there was a break in this routine for some months now and several readers have written saying they missed the first week film article.

It is my intention therefore to resume this practice of publishing a 'Filmy Article' on the first Saturday of each month. As such this column focuses this time on my favourite Tamil playback singer T.M. Soundararajan or TMS.

PLAYBACK SINGERS

As is well-known, an indispensable feature of Indian language films for long has been the song sequences. These songs are usually picturised on actors or actresses, who lipsynch them on screen. Sometimes, they are merely montage scenes with songs audible in the background.

It is common knowledge that the singing nices we hear belong to off-screen sing known generally as playback singers. The songs sung by these playback singers are usually pre-recorded for movies.

Fortunately for these playback singers, they are given credit in the film titles as well as the soundtrack albums. Film songs, therefore, are identified by the singer, who actually sings them and not the actor, who lip-synchs on screen. Tamil movie playback singers in India have gained much popularity and many, many fans over the years by their singing.

Thuguluva Meenatchi Iyengar

Soundararajan known as TM Soundarajan and TMS was one such playback singer who dominated the Tamil film scene for several decades. In a singing career spanning more than six decades, TMS has sung more than ten thousand songs in over a thousand films.

Most of these songs were in the Tamil language. B. Kolappan writing an obituary for TMS in The Hindu stated as follows-

"Whether it was romantic melodies, lyrics loaded with political statements or philosophy, a simple folk tune or a classical raga-based song, TMS was unparalleled in rendering them. His high-pitched voice captured the majesty of the Tamil language, but TMS could also render duets that evoked an intensity of emotion beyond imagination.

THREE SALIENT ASPECTS

T.M. Soundararajan's forte was his fullthroated, high-octave singing. There are three salient aspects of his singing that I want to highlight in this article.

The first is his unique singing style of voice modulation and variation that blended well with the voices and expressions of the actors he was singing for.

The second was the manner in which he could emote meaningfully with the song in accordance with the film sequence and the mood of the character on screen. Whatever the type of song, TMS would 'act' it out through his voice.

The third was the impressive way in which

he pronounced Tamil.

The film songs in those days were an integral part of the film and were often used by directors to narrate the story effectively. Unlike the present, songs were picturised fully in the films then. Except for rare instances, the songs were recorded before the scenes on which they are picturised were shot. The song sequences were part and parcel of the film. There were songs to denote all aspects

or phases of life like birth, death, romance, marriage, heartbreak, separation, reunion, friendship, sorrow, joy, celebration, sibling affection, brother-sister bonds, motherly love, husband-wife relationship; there was a Tamil film song for every occasion and every mood in life.

TMS RULED THE ROOST

Ordinary filmgoers began singing those numbers themselves and applying them in their lives. These songs became a part of everyday life itself. In an era where electronics had not invaded every facet of life, there were singsongs galore in many gatherings and Tamil film songs rendered by TMS ruled the roost on such occasions.

The making of a film song was a team effort. The director, lyricist and music composer would discuss among themselves the film sequence for which a song was required. Then appropriate playback sin were chosen. After particular songs were assigned for singing by TMS, the versatile singer would obtain details of the story, the sequence of the song in the film and the particular actor it would be picturized on.

Thereafter he would prepare himself to sing off-screen for the on-screen actors.

Through his unique style of voice modulation, the singing mode of TMS would perfectly suit the actors he lip-synched for likes of Sivaji Ganesan, M.G. Ramachandran, Ranjan, Udayakumar, S.S. Rajendran, Jaishankar, Ravichandran, Asokan, Gemini Ganesan, Muthuraman and Sivakumar.

His voice in the songs would sound just like those of the actors when you saw and heard the songs on screen. Thus most male actors wanted TMS to sing for them.

The feelings and emotions portrayed by the roles being acted in would be expressed soulfully by TMS through his singing. He would modulate his voice in accordance with those of the actors and emote passionately with the roles they played on screen.

The singing would harmonise with the personality of the actors and the particular roles portrayed by them on screen.

This was especially so in the case of leading yesteryear heroes M.G. Ramachandran, and Sivaji Ganesan.

REVELATORY INTERVIEW

TM Soundararajan was frequently asked by interviewers and fans about how he managed to accomplish this feat. TMS himself has supplied the answer very often. Among the answers given by TMS, the response he provided just a month before his demise was the most revelatory. Here is the relevant excerpt from an interview conducted by C. S. Venkiteswaran appearing in **The Hindu** in April 2013.

You are one of those rare singers who has sung for almost all the major stars in South Indian filmdom. But when you sang for each one of these actors, you adopted a different style and tone that suited the actor's voice and character.

TMS Answer: Yes, I closely follow the voice of the actors and their tonal modulations when I sing for them. For each actor, I sang in a voice that matched his voice, his persona and the character he played in that particular film. On some occasions I had to bring in a melancholic mood, in others, romantic, situations, tragedy, and comedy..... Sometimes I had to make my voice sound masculine, sometimes very youthful or aged. I have done it all according to the situation and the actor. A film singer has to be sensitive to all these things; it's not just a matter of singing in front of a mic. In many instances, I literally used to 'act' while I sang many songs; many of the actors used to come and watch me sing to get a feel of my acting so that they could use it in front of the camera! I think playback singing involves the element of acting too. Most importantly, the actors admired my songs and had great faith in me. My songs helped to lend character to their roles, adding to their charm and intensity, the reason why great actors such as Sivaji and MGR insisted on my singing for them. Jayalalitha once said that it was my songs that brought her close to MGR.'

ISAITHAMIZH (MUSICAL TAMIL)

In addition to the voice modulation and emoting, the third distinguishing feature of Soundararajan's singing was the way in which he pronounced Tamil.

He had a distinctive style, diction, tone and tenor. He sang in Tamil on screen the way songs in the mellifluous, vibrant language should be sung. Generations of Tamils learnt to appreciate the beauty, sweetness and power of the Tamil language because of the manner in which TMS made Isaithamizh (Musical Tamil) a reality. Many Tamils loved their language more due to TMS.

SAURASHTRIAN BRAHMIN

The pleasant irony in this was that the Madurai-born TM Soundararajan was ethnically not a Tamil. He was of Saurashtrian Brahmin stock. Historically Saurashtra was a region in present-day Gujerat State.

Soundrararajan's ancestors were among the Saurashtrians, who had relocated to Tamil-speaking regions in the south due to continuous Mogul invasions.

A substantial number of Saurashtrians settled down in Madurai. They became very fluent in Tamil and engaged in agriculture, weaving and commerce.

Soundararajan's father was a Saurashtra Brahmin priest in a small Madurai Vaishnavaite temple. He named his second son Soundararajan after the deity Soundararajap Perumaal at the famous Kallalaghar Temple in Alaghar Kovil, Madurai.

However, despite his Vaishnavaite roots, Soundararajan became an ardent devotee of Lord Murugan in later life.

After schooling for some years at the Sourashtra High School in Madurai, TMS dropped out and learnt Carnatic music from Ariyakkudi Rajamani Aiyer. He began performing at classical music concerts in 1945. In 1946, he got his first break in playback singing from the music composer SM Subbiah Naidu.

TMS sang four songs in the film Krishna Vijayam. The film however was released only in 1950.

MGR AND SIVAJI

The turning point in Soundararajan's life was when he began singing for lead actors MG Ramachandran and Sivaji

Ganesan in the mid-fifties of the last century. Thereafter he became the singing voice of MGR and Sivaji for decades. The songs

he rendered for them became very popular. However, TMS sang for many other actors too from the swashbuckling Ranjan to ace comedian Nagesh. TM Soundararajan has worked with many music composers over the years.

Among these were Subbiah Naidu, G. Ramanathan, TG Lingappah, T.R. Pappa, K.V. Mahadevan, M.S. Visvanathan, T.K. Ramamoorthy and Veda.

TMS has gone on record expressing gratitude to Ramanathan for teaching him the nuances of playback singing. However, the greatest number of songs v

TMS for Mahadevan and the Visvanathan-Ramamoorthy duo. TMS has sung many duets with male and female singers. The duets he sang with

Seergali Govindarajan and P.B. Sreenivas

were all chartbusters. He was associated in duets with songstresses like Bhanumathy, Leela, Jikki, Jamuna Rani, Susheela, Janaki and L.R. Easwary.

P. SUSHEELA

It is widely accepted that his best vocal partner was P. Susheela. The TMS-Susheela duo dominated the Tamil film song realm in the sixties and seventies. They were the uncrowned king and queen of Tamil playback singers in terms of popularity.

TMS and Susheela have sung 732 songs together. The last duet they sang was in 2010 for Vaalibam Suttrum Ulagham. He was 87 and she was 75 at that time.

TM Soundararajan has also acted in four films in lead roles. They were Pattinathaar, Arunagirinathar, Kaviraja Kaalamegam and Kallum Kaniyaagum, which he co-produced with fellow Saurashtrian playback singer A.L. Raghavan.

TMS has made several cameo appearances in several films. The most notable was in Theivam where he along with Seergali Govindararajan appeared on screen as themselves and sang Thiruchendhoorin Kadaloarathil together. TMS also composed music for the film Palappareetchai.

DEVOTIONAL SONGS

Soundararajan has also sung hundreds of devotional songs over radio and as records and albums. Most of these were in praise of Lord Murugan but there were others too.

TMS has also toured the world singing to audiences in Eastern and Western countries. He has won numerous awards and accolades.


Soundararajan married Sumithra in 1946. hey had three daughters and three sons, on of whom died at a young age. The other two sons are good singers too with voices similar to their father's.

OUR THOUGHT

BRINKMANSHIP AND DANGERS OF AN UNINTENTIONAL **NUCLEAR WAR**

ar mongering and brinkmanship are escalating in the European theatre, where the US and NATO are fighting a proxy war with Russia in Ukraine. On March 14, a US MQ-9 Reaper drone was brought down over the Black Sea by Russian fighter jets, after the drone allegedly violated Russian airspace and carried out its flight with transponders turned off.

The US and sections of the Western media made a huge hue and cry claiming the Russian fighters engaged in reckless maneuvers which brought down

Subsequently, on March 20, as if to test the resolve of Russia, the Independent, a British national newspaper, reported that on March 21 a Russian jet intercepted two US nuclear bombers over the Baltic Sea as they were approaching Russia's borders. The Russian Defence Ministry the Independent said, released footage on Tuesday, which it claimed was captured from a Russian Su-35 on Monday.

It said its fighter jet met B-52 strategic bombers flying towards the Russian border on Monday, but that it returned to base after they moved away.

On March 26 Russian President Putin announced he would be stationing tactical nuclear weapons in Belarus –a staunch supporter of Russia- sending a warning to the US and its NATO allies that Russia would not stomach continuing provocations unanswered. Putin said his stationing of nuclear weapons was similar to that of the US, which has stationed its nuclear weapons in Europe.

Reuters quoted Putin as saying "there is nothing unusual here; the US has been doing this for decades. They have long deployed their tactical weapons on the territories of their allied countries...

What is worrying however is that this is the first time since the mid-1990s, Russia will base such destructive weapons outside the country.

The US reacted cautiously, saying there were no signs Russia intended to use its nuclear weapons. NATO countries however reacted differently, castigating President Putin over the threat to station nuclear weapons in Belarus.

NATO Spokesperson Oano Longescu declared, "Russia's nuclear rhetoric is dangerous and irresponsible. "NATO is vigilant and closely monitoring the situation. We have not seen any changes in Russia's posture that would lead us to change our own...'

What folly? The only person who has the power to unleash NATO's firepower is the American President. Member states do not even have the power to leave the organisation (NATO) until a year after they formally indicate they intend to leave the grouping.

NATO member-states do not even have the power to extradite persons living in the US, who may have attempted to overthrow the said member States Government, NATO member Turkey learned this in the aftermath of an attempted coup to overthrow President Erdogan in 2016.

The alleged coup leader continues to live in the US with no restrictions on his movements. While Turkey has repeatedly called for the extradition of the alleged coup leader, the US has blocked his extradition.

Similarly, when a US embassy employee's wife, who did not enjoy diplomatic immunity in Britain, killed a British youngster in a road accident in the UK and fled to the US, the UK Government was unable to bring her back to face trial. Meanwhile, Russian Nobel Peace Prize laureate Muratov has referred to Russian TV channels propagating a view that nuclear war is not a bad thing.

Senior Russian officials are warning NATO should not push Russia too far. On Thursday, the BBC announced -Nikolai Patrushev- a close aide of the Russian President warned, that Russia had a "modern unique weapon capable of destroying any enemy, including the United States.

These gung-ho attitudes and threats from both sides are not only normalising war but appear to be preparing the people of Europe for a nuclear war -making it seem inevitable.

It is time the two principal antagonists –the US/ NATO combine and Russia- take a step back. It is time to rethink. Invasions and wars are wrong. Threats to a nation's security often lead to war or warlike situations, as was the case with the aforementioned Cuban Missile Crisis. Fortunately, cooler heads prevailed at that time.

Today, if Mexico, the immediate neighbour of the US, were to invite Russia to bring in its missiles and troops to be based in that country for fear of US interference, what would the US reaction be?

This is a hypothetical question, but a valid one. What Ukraine is to Russia, is what Mexico is to the

already postponed indefinitely in view of the Government press having declined to release ballot papers on the grounds that payments have not been made for them.

Hence, the election has already

been deferred in the practical sense and the Elections Commission has only to announce a fresh date. The Commission has to do it without knowing when the Treasury will release funds for the election or more precisely whether funds will be released at all.

An Interim Order had been issued on May 3 by the Supreme Court on the Treasury Secretary Mahinda Siriwardena preventing him from withholding funds allocated for the Local Government Elections by the budget.

On the grounds that he has not complied with the order, the Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) and the Jathika Jana Balawegaya (JJB) or the National People's Power (NPP) had on March 21 two Contempt of Court cases agains the Treasury Secretary. Both cases were postponed on Thursday for May 22.

The Treasury Secretary after this court order forwarded all appeals for funding by the Elections Commission for the conduct of the elections and the Government Printer for printing ballot papers to the Finance Minister, who is also the President.

The President already has expressed his views against holding elections now or in the near future.

The Treasury Secretary seems to tell the court that he had sought approval from his Minister to release funds for the election, according to the Court Order. If that is the case, and if the court accepts it, then the problem would sometimes become one between the Judiciary and the Executive.

Earlier, on February 23, the Supreme Court ordered that a Writ **Petition filed by an Army Colonel** seeking an order delaying the same elections be taken up again on May

Therefore, now it is clear all debates about the Local Government elections have become futile till mid-May.

Yet, people and the media are not left without topics. They have this Extended Fund Facility (EFF) offered by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the issue of whether Sara Jasmin alias Pulasthini Rajendran, one of the suspects of the Easter Sunday terrorist attacks in 2019 is alivé or dead. And these issues might further help the two ruling parties, the United National Party (UNP) and the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) to freeze electionrelated matters.

Meanwhile, former President and the Leader of the SLPP, Mahinda Rajapaksa told media at the Abhayaramaya in Narahenpita on March 27 that he opined that an election would be held before

December this year. Whether he told this based on his understanding with the President on the matter or just to tease the Opposition parties that are pushing for an immediate election is not clear.

Despite various arguments raised against the holding of an election at this moment, it is a well-known fact that **the** real reason behind the opposition to the election on the part of the two ruling parties is nothing but the drastic erosion of their popularity among the people, especially due to the horrific effects of the economic crisis on the masses.

The latest opinion poll, the Sri Lanka Opinion Tracker Survey (SLOTS) conducted in February by the Institute of Health Policy (IHP), an inresearch institution shows that support for the JVP/NPP has surged up to 43 percent and the SJB's support base has shrunk to 30 percent. The popularity of the two ruling parties has plummeted to a dismal 4 percent.

Hence, the Government might do its utmost not to hold any election until the time turns in its favour. Despite it being against democracy, the possibility of that being the reality is very high.

It was the economic downturn that created a situation where the ruling parties cannot face the public. However, with Sri Lanka having received the first disbursement of the Extended Fund Facility (EFF) of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and more foreign funds being expected very soon, the burden on the people has begun to ease.

Fuel prices came down considerably resulting in the transport cost and prices of some essential items plunging. It is said that the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank (ADB) are to offer loans worth US\$ 3.8 billion. The International Finance Corporation (IFC), the investment arm of the World Bank has offered US\$ 400 million for three commercial banks in the country to facilitate imports of essential items.

Even though all these will add to the existing debt burden of the country, the immense hope built in the masses on the IMF loan by the Government has boded well for the two ruling parties, with the first tranche of the IMF loan received.

A feeling has been built up that the crisis is gone. Against this backdrop, rumours have it that the President might go for a Presidential Election soon.

However, there is no Constitutional room for him to hold a mid-term election as he is a succeeding President. The Constitution after empowering the President to seek another mandate after his first term says 'A person succeeding to the office of President under the provisions of Article 40 shall not be entitled to exercise the right"

Also, he would not be able to dissolve the Parliament and hold the Parliamentary Elections either to take advantage of the slowly recovering economy, as his term will terminate at the end of next year before he is empowered to dissolve it.

However, the SLPP would not allow

the UNP to exploit the situation, if it turns favourable to the ruling parties. They have already come out of the cocoons they have been hiding so far since the Aragalaya broke out and trying to lay claim to the next Government. Their strategy seems to be dumping all

sins of the economic crisis into former President Gotabaya Rajapaksa's account, while blaming the hundreds of thousands of people who rose against the Government last year citing the crimes committed by a few people in the name of the Aragalaya.

Despite it is not clear how successful their efforts would be, there is a possibility of rising rivalry between the UNP and the SLPP over regaining power.

In fact, the SLPP also can lay claim to the IMF-related funds since the programme with the international lender was started by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa in March last year. Even the Government's fiscal reforms had been cited in the country report of the IMF that was released in March last year. Yet, the member parties of the SLPP would never be able to absolve themselves from the massive crime of destroying the country's economy.

However, two major issues seem to be standing in the two ruling parties' way.

Although Sri Lanka has received the first tranche of the IMF funds, there is a danger of facing problems in debt restructuring which is a must before the second tranche. Professor Premachandra Atukorala of Australian National University pointed out during the Pethikada Programme of Sirasa TV that Zambia is facing such a situation after the first disbursement where China has put forward new conditions to restructure its debts.

He also warns that some creditors might push for restructuring local debts as well, which would seriously affect the local banks. And the next instalments depend on the successful debt structuring process and implementation of reforms in the agreement with the IMF which includes a strict anti-corruption mechanism.

Secondly, how permanent the current massive breakaway of people from the two ruling parties is not clear. Will they return to the fold of the two parties, especially the SLPP, the party that has eroded the most?

Many people have their emotional dreams of a house, a vehicle, higher education, foreign education and marriage of their children, all shattered due to the economic crisis. Only time will tell how people will react to an election.

He was also critical of the Government's handling of the conflict and its failure to bring about peaceful resolution.



English flourishing in Jaffna

Jaffna was once at the pinnacle of education in Sri Lanka. However, at an Akaram Foundation Workshop in Jaffna on 15.10.2016, Prof. Roshan Ragel produced statistics to show that Jaffna District had slipped from first place in 1980 to ninth (last).

In the same period, the Western Province held on to its second place while the Southern Province moved up from third to first.

In engineering and Medicine alone, the Northern province did not see the same loss, from first to third, and from first to fifth, respectively.


Mazher Fazleali





Young hits 86 as New Zealand beat Sri Lanka 2-0 in ODI series

Will Young hit 86 not out as hosts New Zealand beat Sri Lanka by six wickets in yesterday's third one-day international, ending the visitors' hopes of qualifying directly for the World Cup this year.

New Zealand replied with 159 for four after bowling Sri Lanka out for 157 in Hamilton. The Black Caps won the ODI series 2-0, having also won both of the two Test matches. A three-match Twenty20 series between the teams starts tomorrow (2).

The home win saw New Zealand top the Super League table in qualifying for the ODI World Cup in India this year.

Sri Lanka are ninth, outside the top eight who automatically go to the World Cup, and now face a qualifying tournament in Zimbabwe starting in Ĵune.

Young's 86 runs off 113 balls dug New Zealand out of trouble, Sri Lanka's seamers naving made life hard for the hosts early on. His fifth-wicket partnership of 100 runs with Henry Nicholls sealed the result for New Zealand.

"We were one down when I came in. It was a bit more nerve-racking later on when we were three or four down," said man-ofthe-match Young.

"One of the good things about this team is

that we can bat a long way down, so I had full confidence that we would get the job done. "It was nice to be out there at the end and

knock off the runs," he said. New Zealand made a terrible start after they were set a target of 158. Openers Chad

Mumbai Indians, armed with big-money signing Cameron Green, will bid for a recordextending sixth title when the Indian Premier League started yesterday, in what could be Chennai veteran MS Dhoni's swansong.

The 16th edition also returns to its pre-Covid glory days, with 74 matches scheduled at 12 venues over eight weeks.

In the opener at the world's biggest cricket stadium in Ahmedabad, defending champions Gujarat Titans will play Dhoni's Chennai Super

England all-rounder Sam Curran returns to Punjab Kings after being bought for \$2.23 million, making him the most expensive IPL player ever. Green, 1.98 metres (6 feet

and 6 inches) tall, joined IPL's most successful outfit Mumbai after he became the second-most expensive buy at \$2.11 million in the December auction.

India spinner Ravichandran Ashwin called Green a "once-ina-generation" cricketer after the batting all-rounder hit his maiden Test hundred in India earlier this month.

"I think he's a fantastic player. Just the raw materials for a person as tall as him, lovely levers, good batting sense, can bowl and really hit the deck well, moves pretty well on the field," Ashwin said.

Mumbai, led by India captain Rohit Sharma, will be without injured pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah but have been boosted by the return of England fast bowler Jofra Archer, who missed last season due to injury.

Chennai are not far behind Mumbai with four titles -- and are five-time runners-up -- and Dhoni's towering presence as wicketkeeper-batsman and captain has been key. Dhoni, 41, remains a huge

Trade deficit narrows significantly in February amid slowing imports

- Feb. 2023 deficit dips to US \$ 39mn, from US \$ 780mn in Feb. 2022
- Steep contraction due to significant moderation of import expenditure, owing to subdued aggregate demand conditions
- Decline in earnings on merchandise exports observed in all main categories
- Import expenditure almost halved in Feb. 2023, driven by lower expenditure on food and non-food consumer goods
- Import expenditure on investment too dips significantly in Feb.

ri Lanka's deficit in the merchandise trade account witnessed a significant contraction in February, due to a significant moderation in the import expenditure, arising out of the aggregate demand conditions.

The trade deficit narrowed significantly to US \$ 39 million in February 2023, from US \$ 780 million recorded in the corresponding period of the previous year, the data from the Economics Research Department of the Central Bank showed.

Accordingly, the cumulative deficit in the trade account during the January-February 2023 period was US \$ 449 million, a sizeable decline from US \$ 1,636 million recorded over the same period in 2022.

Despite recording a marginal growth compared to January 2023, the earnings from the merchandise exports declined by 10.2 percent in February 2023 ear-on-year to US \$ 982 million. The export earnings were recorded below the US \$ 1 billion

level for the second consecutive month. Although a decline in the earnings was observed across all main categories, the industrial exports mainly contributed to the overall contraction. The cumulative export earnings during January-February 2023 declined by 10.7 percent over the same period,




On the merchandise imports, the expenditure almost halved in February 2023, at US \$ 1,021 million, compared to February 2022. This is the lowest recorded imports since May 2020. All major import sectors declined while the decline in expenditure on intermediate goods was significant.


Meanwhile, the cumulative import expenditure during January-February 2023 also contracted by 37.1 percent over the corresponding period in 2022.

Driven by the lower expenditure on both food and non-food consumer goods, the expenditure on the importation of consumer goods in February 2023 dipped when compared with that of recorded in February 2022. The contraction in expenditure on non-food consumer goods was broad-based but the drop in imports of home appliances, household and furniture items and clothing and accessories was notable, the Central Bank said.

Further, the expenditure on food and beverages also declined, due to the lower imports of cereals and milling industry products (mainly, rice), compared to

The expenditure on intermediate goods also witnessed a decline in February 2023 when compared with the corresponding month of the previous year. This was driven by the lower imports of fuel, textiles and textile articles (primarily,





fabrics). The importation of refined petroleum was significantly low, due to the build-up of inventories, while crude oil imports were not recorded in February 2023. The decline in textiles and textile articles was significant, implying a possible slowdown in garment exports in the period ahead, the Central Bank said.

nflation eases to 50.3% in March

Headline inflation, as measured by the year-on-year (YoY) change in the Colombo Consumer Price Index (CCPI, 2021=100), decreased to 50.3 percent in March 2023, from 50.6 percent in February 2023

The decline in headline inflation is broadly in line with the disinflation path

envisaged by the Central Bank in 2023. Food inflation (YoY) decreased to 47.6 percent in March 2023, from 54.4 percent in February 2023, whereas non-food inflation (YoY) increased to 51.7 percent in March 2023, from 48.8

percent in February 2023. The monthly change of the CCPI recorded at 2.92 percent in March 2023, due to the price increases observed in items of the nonfood category, which was 3.71 percent.

However, the food category recorded a monthly decline of 0.79 percent. Core inflation (YoY), which reflects the underlying inflation in the economy, decreased to 39.1 percent in March 2023, from 43.6 percent in February 2023. Looking ahead, based on the available information, the anticipated declining trend of inflation is expected to continue through 2023 The Central Bank said the disinflation process would be supported by subdued demand conditions, owing to tight monetary and fiscal policy measures, softening of food and energy prices amidst the recent exchange rate appreciation and greater passthrough of lower global commodity prices, second round impacts of recent fuel price revisions and anticipated improvements in domestic supply conditions, along with the favourable statistical base effect.

Colombo Tea Auction ends final sale for 1Q23 with good general demand

The final sale for 1Q23 at the Colombo Tea Auction this week saw 5.1 MnKgs come under the hammer, which was met with good general demand.

"The firm to easier trend in prices would emanate, due to qualitative factors combined with less activity, due to the commencement of the Ramadan

period and restricted purchases on account of stock taking factors, due to the end of the financial year," said Forbes and Walker Tea Brokers in its latest tea report.

Trade deficit...

While a sizable decline was recorded in the importation of base metals, chemical products, plastics and articles, rubber and articles and vehicle and machinery parts, an increase was noted in the expenditure on wheat, diamonds, precious stones and metals.

Similarly, the import expenditure on investment goods declined significantly in February 2023, compared to the same month in 2022, resulting from a decline in all three investment goods subcategories: machinery and equipment, building material and transport equipment.

Colombo Tea...

The overall quality in regard to the teas in the Western and Nuwara Eliya planting districts were barely maintained, whilst the others were fairly similar to last. The Best Western BOP/BOPFs had a few select invoices, which appreciated on account of special inquiry, whilst the others were often firm and easier following quality. In the Below Best category, the brighter BOPs were firm and marginally easier, whilst the others declined up to Rs.100 per kilogram. The plainer sorts declined further. The corresponding BOPFs – whilst

the brighter sorts declined up to Rs.50 per kg, the others together with the teas at the lower end of the market often sold around last week's levels although towards the close, the prices tend to weaken marginally. The Nuwara Eliyas were irregular, following quality. The Uda Pussellawas were generally maintained. The Uva BOPs were maintained, whilst the corresponding BOPFs - majority of the teas on offer declined Rs.50-100 per kilogram.

The CTC teas were generally firm and the price declines were reflective of quality.

The Low Growns comprised 2.2 MnKgs. The market met with fair demand at lower levels, particularly for the well-made teas. However, the teas at the bottom continued to sell well. In the Leafy and Semi Leafy catalogues, the OP1s in general were firm. The well-made BOP1s remained firm, whilst the teas at the bottom declined. The well-made OP/OPAs in general eased, whilst the teas at the bottom were firm. However, the smaller OP varieties declined substantially. The PEK/PEK1s, in general, declined

In the Tippy catalogues, the well-made FBOP/FF1s together with the Below Best were easier, whilst the teas at the bottom sold around last levels. In the Premium catalogues, the high-priced Tippy teas were firm on special inquiry, whilst the others in general were lower. However, the leafier varieties were firm to dearer.

"The feature of the sale would be the widespread demand for the teas at the lower end and the firm to dearer trend in prices," Forbes and Walker Tea Brokers
