

Brother of two Brits killed wants answers

Speaking on the programme 'On Fire with Easwaran Rutnam' on Daily Mirror, David Linsey said that the 2019 attacks must be investigated to the fullest extent. Linsey was in Sri Lanka this week to support cleft lip and palate surgery training through the Amelie and Daniel Linsey Foundation.

"I just want to know the truth. I am not a politician or a judge. But it (Easter attacks) needs to be

investigated to the fullest extent. Until that, it is really difficult for me to make assumptions," Linsey said when asked about concerns raised over ongoing investigations into the attacks. Asked if he feels that he and his family will get closure following the loss of his brother and sister, David Linsey said that it will be difficult to ever get closure. He said that helping Sri Lanka through the Amelie and Daniel Linsey

Foundation is one way to move on while the process of justice takes its course.

David also said that the terrorists must not be allowed to win and he also encouraged more people to visit Sri Lanka. Daniel, 19, and Amelie, 15, had been eating breakfast with their father in the Shangri-La Hotel in Colombo when a suicide bomber detonated his explosive device in the restaurant.

Daniel and Amelie were killed in the attack, while their father survived. David was back in the UK with his mother and youngest brother, studying for his Oxford University exams. Following the incident David Linsey launched the Amelie and Daniel Linsey Foundation and brought a team of cleft lip and palate experts to Sri Lanka this week to support cleft lip and palate surgery training in Sri Lanka. The team attended a cleft surgery conference in Galle, and assisted with training surgeons at the new cleft lip facility in Nuwara Eliya.

Wickremesinghe also informed the opposition parliamentarians that the economy was on an upward trend and would improve in the coming months. The President said the country was in a better position when compared to a few months ago and once the economy stabilizes, he would consult all political parties and other parties concerned and call for a presidential poll.

The President further said that he would call on all political parties in parliament to work as one to implement the IMF reforms in order to strengthen the economic revival after he presents the IMF agreement before Parliament in April or May.

To those opposition parliamentarians who want to join the government, Wickremesinghe encouraged these MPs to come with their respective groups or political parties and if the party leadership is not willing to join the government, then the MPs can crossover on their

Sources who attended the meeting told Daily Mirror that Wickremesinghe had however informed the parliamentarians that he presently had a comfortable majority in Parliament, and hence he was not in any rush to take MPs from the opposition. He said if these MPs want to crossover

they should do so voluntarily and not under political pressure or expecting portfolios in return and those who do not want to crossover, but yet want to support him can do so.

He said such MPs would be allocated tasks and designations to support the government while being in the opposition so that all parties could be united in taking the economy further.

Several opposition parliamentarians including from the Samagi Jana Balawegaya are in discussions with the President and have informed him that they are ready to support him in taking the country forward.

Prez, ambassadors to declare assets under new Anti-Corruption Bill

They are not covered under current law for asset declaration.

Justice Minister Wijeyadasa Rajapakshe told Daily Mirror the bill, already announced in the gazette notification, would be presented to Parliament during the next parliamentary week. The bill, if enacted by Parliament, will provide for the establishment of a new commission to investigate bribery and corruption in place of the present commission. The Minister said the proposed three member commission would be all powerful to prosecute anyone accused of bribery and corruption. "The current asset declaration law provides for the MPs to declare their assets to the Speaker, the Cabinet Ministers to the president and the government officials to their heads of departments.

The new law will provide for them to declare assets to the proposed bribery commission," he

said. Besides, the Minister said there are special provisions in the bill to protect whistleblowers.

Today, government officials are reluctant to report about the misconduct of their superiors fearing reprisals. The new law will have special safeguards for them," he said.



SC grants leave to proceed with FR petition

The names of the said Private **Entities have** been proposed to the Cabinet of Ministers by the Minister of Health for the relevant procurements

The petitioner had challenged the moves by the Ministry of Health to procure medical supplies from unregistered private suppliers through direct contracting and unsolicited bids.

While noting that serious doubts have arisen regarding the lawfulness of the impugned procurement transaction, Supreme Court granted following two interim reliefs; Suspension of further importation of pharmaceuticals pertaining to the decision without obtaining a further order from the Court after proving that the quality and safety requirements are satisfied, and the procurement is lawful. Release for use the two consignments that have already reached Sri Lanka only after conducting necessary tests, and the National Medicines Regulatory Authority (NMRA) expressing its independent decision assuring the safety, quality, and efficacy of the already imported pharmaceuticals.

The TISL and its Executive Director Ashala Nadishani Perera filed this petition seeking an order preventing the Cabinet of Ministers and other officials from making any payments to Savorite Pharmaceuticals (Pvt) Limited and Kausikh Therapeutics Limited in respect of the purported procurement of any medicinal

supplies. The petitioners stated that the Minister of Health Keheliya Rambukwella has sought the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers to utilize the Indian Credit Line and other unspecified means of funding to maintain an uninterrupted supply of medicine, with the purported view to prevent acute shortages in medical supplies in government health institutions in Sri Lanka.

The petitioners further said that the Minister of Health has on two occasions proposed the names of Savorite Pharmaceuticals (Pvt) Limited and Kausikh Therapeutics Limited as identified suppliers from whom the procurement and importation of medical supplies would be made to Sri Lanka, in respect of certain medicines. The names of the said Private Entities have been proposed to the Cabinet of Ministers by the Minister of Health for the relevant procurements, despite the said Private Entities not having the requisite registrations by the NMRA, and in the complete absence of a competitive procurement process

The Supreme Court three-judgebench comprised Justices Murdu Fernando, Yasantha Kodagoda and Achala Wengappuli. Counsel Senany Dayaratne with Nishadi Wickramasinghe, Sankhitha Gunaratne and Lasanthika Hettiarachchi instructed by Attorney-at-law Thushari Jayawardena appeared for the petitioners. Deputy Solicitor General Nirmalan Wigneswaran appeared for the Attorney General.

Sri Lanka ratified the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) in 1981 and remains fully committed to adopting consistent and sustainable pro-equality and pro-empowerment policies towards women, including parity of status in decision making processes.

By being elected to the CSW, Sri Lanka continues its international engagement in the area of women's empowerment. It is recalled that in June 2022, Professor Rangita De Silva De Alwis of Sri Lanka was elected to the United Nations Committee on the Elimination of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW Committee) for the term 2023-2026 - a body of 23 independent experts on women's rights from around the world that monitors the implementation of the CEDAW. The Government of Sri

Lanka continues to make progress in achieving gender equality and women's empowerment and advancement in social, economic, and political settings through law reforms, formulating gender responsive policies and action plans.

The other countries elected include Bangladesh, Belgium, Bolivia, Colombia, Romania, and the Netherlands.

The CSW established in 1946 and comprising 45 member states, is the principal UN intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women. The CSW has contributed to drafting of the CEDAW and its Optional Protocol, and other global policy frameworks such as the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. The CSW works to put key gender equality issues on the global agenda and encourages action and implementation at the national level. The Commission also contributes to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.



The leader of the Opposition Sajith Premadasa and his party, the Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) are very much in the news lately. There have been many reports in the mainstream as well as social media that a large number of MPs from the SJB are planning to join the ranks of the Ranil Wickremesinghe Govt soon. Some reports speculate that the number of SJB Parliamentarians contemplating a crossover is between 20 to 40.

D.B.S. Jeyaraj

Predictably Sajith Premadasa has denied that his party MPs are going to defect. He has lashed out at the Govt and said such misleading reports are being planted in the media by the Govt.

He has also accused the Govt of conspiring to entice MPs from his party by offering Rs 200 Million to each MP. Premadasa has asserted that none of his party MPs will be tempted by such offers. He also claims that some Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) MPs have joined the SJB. A news report in a morning newspaper stated as follows -.

"Members of the current Government create various news media and plant them in social media in an attempt to mislead the public," said the Leader of the Opposition of Sri Lanka, Sajith Premadasa.

He noted that a new political conspiracy was currently taking place in which the Government lies that a large number of MPs of the Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB)

But Chandima Weerakody and Jayarathne Herath and a large number of MPs in the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna

(SLPP) have joined our party and there are many more in line waiting to come," he said. The Government, however, has weaved this lie against

the country's only solution, the country's only answer, which is the SJB, he noted. 'We have gotten to know that the Government's estimate

for an MP is Rs.200 million, the Government thinks that when they show Rs.200 million to our MPs they will beg to join the Government," said Mr Premadasa.
"I would like to say that the MPs of the SJB are not

ready to take part in the Government's auction of Mps,'

Sajith Premadasa taking umbrage over the alleged attempt by the Wickremesinghe Govt to take away his MPs is quite understandable. After all, no party leader would like his MPs to split and join another party or form a new one.

The irony in this is that Premadasa himself took away the majority of MPs from the United National Party (UNP) of which he was a member and formed the SJB anew. When that happened the UNP or its leader Wickremesinghe

did not accuse him of offering financial "incentives" to woo the green elephants.

Pre-emptive measures

Notwithstanding Sajith's denial and assertion that his MPs would not split, it does appear that the SJB Leader is aware of a potential mass defection and is engaging in pre-emptive measures to prevent it.

Premadasa's allegation that MPs are being offered Rs 200 million can be seen as an attempt to deter potential

He is indirectly warning his party MPs that if the MPs break away, it would be insinuated that they did so for cash and that each MP's reputation would be tarnished. Moreover, Sajith organized a dinner for his party MPs at

the Monarch Imperial Hotel in Battaramulla on April 3rd. Earlier it had been fixed for April 5 but was suddenly advanced by two days. One of the reasons attributed for this change was the "rumour" that a number of MPs from SJB were going to shift to the Govt when Parliament met on April 4. Sajith wanted to prevent this from happening by appealing to the MPs collectively and individually. Hence the dinner was held on the 3rd. 23 MPs including the host Sajith were at the dinner.

Mistrust of SJB MPs

Premadasa's anxiety and insecurity over the possibility of his MPs joining the Govt of President Ranil Wickremesinghe stem from his mistrust of his fellow SJB MPs.

It may be recalled that almost all the SJB Parliamentarians were UNP members in the past.

Most of them had no problems with Ranil Wickremesinghe's leadership and were not favourably

disposed towards Sajith Premadasa's leadership ambition. Yet, they deserted Wickremesinghe and the UNP en masse and together with Premadasa formed the SJB. This was not due to any ill will towards Ranil or any goodwill

towards Sajith. They had gauged the mood of the electorate through various means including opinion polls and had assessed that Ranil's stock was low while Sajith's was high.

They realised their electoral prospects were dismal if they remained with Ranil and the UNP.

So, they hitched their wagon to the Sajith star and turned to SJB. Politically what they did then seemed correct when the UNP was wiped out at the 2020 Parliamentary poll. The UNP hit an all-time low by not having a single elected MP. The party got only one MP on the National List.

Now the wheel seems to have turned full cycle. Ranil's stock seems to be rising. It appears that Ranil Wickremesinghe has the best chance of winning in the next Presidential Election.

His party the UNP or his tactical ally the SLPP doing well in Local authority, Provincial Council or Parliament elections are very, very slim.

However, this scenario is not prevalent in the Presidential hustings

Gulliver among Lilliputians

It is Ranil who stands out among potential contenders in a future Presidential poll. He is like Gulliver among Lilliputians there.
Ranil knows it and therefore is firmly opposed to any

other poll being conducted before Presidential Election. What Ranil is aiming to do is to forge a broad alliance presumably named the United National Front (UNF) with the Elephant symbol and be its Presidential candidate.

This new pro-Ranil alliance will consist of the UNP, elements of the SJB and SLPP and parties representing the ethnic minority communities in Sri Lanka.

Since Sajith knows fully well that most of his fellow MPs lay down with him on the SJB bed only because of the desire to be in Parliament and not because of any love or admiration for him, the party leader is suspicious to the point of paranoia that they could desert him and return to heir first love the UNP.

UNP-SJB rapprochement

Sajith Premadasa, therefore, is ultra-sensitive about any move to bring about UNP-SJB rapprochement or promote unity between both. Some months ago two former UNP stalwarts, one an Ex-Cabinet Minister and the other an ex-Corporation head, held an informal discussion with some SJB personalities about a tie-up between the UNP and SJB.

When Premadasa heard about this, he lost his cool and issued a harsh statement. In that, he mentioned the two ex-UNPers by the first letters of their names and accused them of a 'Kumanthranaya' (Conspiracy) to break up his

More recently TPA leader Mano Ganesan and SLMC leader Rauff Hakeem engaged in an 'Amity Mission' to bring about unity between Ranil Wickremesinghe and Sajith Premadasa with the Presidential Election in mind.

Ranil was amenable, subject to some conditions. He would be the Presidential candidate in 2024 backed by an alliance comprising the UNP, SJB and minority community parties. Sajith would be Prime Minister. Ranil will retire in 2029 clearing the field for Sajith to become the leader.

Apparently, this proposal was welcomed by SJB stalwarts like Thalatha Atukorale, Kabir Hashim, Eran Wickramaratne, Harsha de Silva, Rajitha Senaratne and Rohini Kaviratne. But others like Ranjith Madduma Bandara, Tissa

Attanayake, Imtiaz Bakeer Markar, Lakshman Kiriella, Sujeewa Senasinghe and Hirunika Premachandra opposed it.

Members of the Premadasa family too did not like the idea. Finally, Sajith Premadasa rejected the unity proposal.

Upon hearing this Ranil Wickremesinghe too hardened his stance. So, Hakeem and Ganesan abandoned their unity moves (I have referred to this in these columns on 25 March 2023).

It is clear therefore that despite his statements to the contrary Sajith Premadasa is acutely aware that a defection from opposition/SJB ranks to the Govt/ UNP ranks is very much on the cards. He is trying hard to prevent this from happening but events seem to be overtaking his efforts. Sajith and the SJB are certainly facing a political storm.

Dr Rajitha Senaratne

It is learnt that efforts are underway within the SJB to convince the hierarchy that the party should throw in its lot with President Wickremesinghe for the betterment of the country. If the leadership remains unwilling, a group of

MPs are likely to declare themselves independent and go over to the Govt. A news report in the Daily Mirror of 6 April 2023

quoting Dr Rajitha Senaratne indicates this. Here is an excerpt -"Several Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) MPs are willing to support President Ranil Wickremesinghe

and will do so as a group if the party fails to take a decision, SJB MP Rajitha Senaratne said today. "MPs like Harsha de Silva are willing to support President Wickremesinghe no matter what anyone says. We will support the President as a group if the party fails to make a decision," the MP said responding to a question raised by journalists at a

"Also, he said the notion that the President has put the country to a better position is a reality"

media briefing.

What then has caused this change of mind among the UNP-turned-SJB Parliamentarians? Why are those who abandoned Ranil and accepted Sajith's leadership in 2020

now prepared to do the opposite? There are three probable reasons.

Ranil: From loser to winner

The first reason is the fundamental change of perception towards Ranil. His image has changed from a loser into that of an achiever and winner.

Though attacked viciously as an unelected President lacking legitimacy and a Rajapaksa stooge, Ranil

Wickremesinghe has done well. Ranil has entrenched himself as President despite having only a solitary MP in Parliament. He has progressed considerably towards the goal he set himself namely the

repairing of the economy.

Despite all the negativity of his critics and detractors, Ranil has been able to - with the collaboration of the Central Bank and Treasury-secure the much-awaited Extended Facility Fund (EFF) finances from the International Monetary Fund (IMF). This has been a political game-

Whether Wickremesinghe's critics acknowledge it or not, the reality is that his efforts in pulling Sri Lanka out of the dire economic straits it was in, are resonating with the 'ordinary' people who comprise what is termed as the silent majority.

Despite his faults and lapses, posterity will judge Wickremesinghe on what he did for the economy. Likewise, all MPs in the present Parliament will also be judged on those lines. Therefore these SJB Parliamentarians would

Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna

The second reason is the perceived increase in popular support for the Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP) and the corresponding decrease in support for the SJB.

An important pointer in this regard is the Sri Lanka Opinion Tracker Survey (SLOTS) undertaken by the Institute for Health Policy (IHP). The survey gauges the level of support for political parties if Parliamentary elections are held currently.

According to the SLOTS, the JVPled NPP and the SJB are the leading contenders. Both the SJB and NPP were running neck to neck for the months of November and December 2022 and January 2023. There was a marked change in February 2023. Support for the JVP-led NPP surged in February, giving it a clear lead with 43% of likely General Election voters, compared to 30% for the SJB.

The analysis also disclosed that in the

12 months from February 2022, the JVP-led NPP gained 30 points while the SJB gained 11 points. So the SJB politicos are getting jittery about the

rising popularity of the JVP and want to close ranks with Wickremesinghe, who they feel is the best option to counter the JVP.

Sajith's leadership style

The third reason is growing intra-party resentment and dissatisfaction towards Sajith Premadasa and his leadership style.

It is said that Sajith ignores senior partymen and runs things autocratically relying on a clique. This Cabal consists of Premadsa family members, a handful of MPs and an 'adviser'. This adviser, a businessman whose surname begins with a 'F' is supposedly influencing Sajith in many ways and has incurred the wrath of several MPs.

The disenchantment with Sajith Premadasa's leadership is a key reason for many MPs toying with the idea of exiting the SJB. Even minority party allies are disillusioned with this state of affairs.

The Samagi Jana Balawegaya party and its leader Sajith Premadsa are facing a gathering political storm. This storm is likely to erupt anytime after the April

New Year festivity.

OUR THOUGHT

RESURRECTION AND TRUE SOCIAL PROGRESS

hat is the deeper meaning of Jesus's death and resurrection? How does it serve his message? What is the importance of his Gospel message for our contemporary world? Is it still relevant?

The Gospel never invites us to pity. We read, rather "Feed the hungry, quench the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, visit the sick and the prisoner". We are invited to active involvement. The Gospel is in sharp contrast with our present-day culture which encourages people to "have a good cry", for easy emotional indulgence without costly involvement on behalf of others. This culture manipulates our emotions without challenging us to change things. Our involvement in the suffering of others is what leads us to change things.

If an event is simply past it is not possible for us to be involved in it. The same is true of the passion of Jesus. This is not an event isolated from the rest of human history.

It will never be understood unless placed within our ongoing reality. It is only if we understand it in continuity with all the suffering of the world that we can be properly involved in the passion of Jesus. It follows that the path to proper involvement in the passion of Jesus is openness to deeper involvement in the suffering of our world now.

It is not over yet. How, then, thus the passion of Jesus related to the ongoing story of human and subhuman suffering? The proclamation and praxis of the Kingdom were experienced as destructive and even blasphemous by others. It led to his death. But Jesus died as he had lived. He did not change. He refused to return evil for evil. He persisted in doing good and opposing evil and suffering to the end.

His death is what clinches the unconditional character of his proclamation and lifestyle: the Kingdom of God is at hand and there is only one way to live now. He did not swerve from living out the truth of God for us in the face of hatred and violence: his death suffered through and for others, asserts the unconditional validity of loving as God loves, the God whose sun shines on all alike, whose care for people cannot be affected by their response.

Because of this consistency, the death of Jesus is the climax of his witness to the God of the coming Kingdom. All his living had been a claim to be acting as God acts; it was through the creative "Finger of God" that he did what he did for suffering people. Fidelity to the Kingdom of God had brought him unavoidably to this place.

Therefore, in his dying we have the fullest historical expression of who God is, It is, of course, we who brought Jesus to the cross but nothing we did could make him betray the truth of the Father for us. He died loving, not hating. He experienced, as his deepest suffering, the eclipse of God, Godforsakenness, and accepted that too, for us and our well-being

The 'Kingdom of God' is the metaphor of definitive salvation seen as a society of brothers and sisters, freed from all oppression and exploitation, where every tear is wiped away.

Resurrection faith is not a matter of dreaming. It is waking from our dream of reality to the reality in the dream. It is a way of living which proclaims the truth of the Risen One to the world. And the shape of this way of living is simply a continuation of the way Jesus responded to ordinary people in this sense of the God of the Kingdom. Resurrection faith is shown in our engagement with the people God loves wherever their dignity and life are being threatened. The resurrection of Jesus cannot be separated from his career and death. In the New Testament, the new thing that God the Father does for Jesus is understood, first and foremost, as recognition of the intrinsic and irrevocable significance of his lived proclamation of the Kingdom. He was right about God. It follows that the primary witness today to the truth of his resurrection lies in the quality of commitment and hope displayed in the lives of Christians for the sake of everybody. Jesus lived and died for the well-being of the whole of humanity.

To let God Easter in us involves a break with our fixed roots in the socially-induced unquestioning sense of 'the way things are'. We need to go beyond ourselves in a way that is not flight or evasion but rather a discovery of the possibilities of transformation of the everyday world.

The resurrection of Christ is also the restoration of the values he stood for. With the resurrection of Christ, what he stood for was also resurrected; peace, mercy, wisdom, clemency, humility, honesty, sensitivity, faith, hope, compassion, endurance, flexibility, harmony, justice, truth, empathy, healing, forgiveness, wholeness, etc.

To build a better world, we need people like Jesus. The more 'Jesuses' there are, the better for the true progress of a society. What Jesus stood for until his death is what humanity needs most. Nothing could defeat what he stood for. Resurrection is the sure guarantee that in the end good will triumph over evil.

TERRORISM BILL: A MARCH FORWARD OR BACKWARD?

The Bill, if enacted in the current form might become counterproductive to those who vote for it as well.

he Government has decided to postpone the presentation of the Anti-Terrorism Bill that seeks to replace the draconian Prevention of Terrorism (Temporary Provisions) Act of 1979 after wide criticism against it by local and international human rights organizations and civil society organizations.

Justice Minister Wijeyadasa Rajapakshe told the media on Thursday that the Bill would be presented in Parliament in late April or early May after giving opportunity for the lawyers and the Opposition to express their views on the Bill. However, he denied the allegation that the Bill is aimed at suppression of protests and discepts

Locally, the Human Rights Commission of Sri Lanka (HRCSL), Bar Association of Sri Lanka (BASL), Centre for Policy Alternatives (CPA) and several individuals concerned with human rights have expressed serious concern over the possibility of the bill, if enacted infringing human rights of the people.

Internationally, the European Union, Amnesty International, Human Rights Watch (HRW) and the International Commission of Jurists (ICJ), among others have expressed critical views on the Bill.

Many opine that the new Bill, though expected to replace the PTA and purports to do away with the provisions of the PTA that were considered to violate international human rights law, is worse than the latter.

Almost all agree with the view that the interpretation of the term "Terrorism" in the new Bill is vague and overbroad and paves the way for a crackdown on dissent and infringement of fundamental rights.

The Bill cites certain intentions and acts separately, which in combination, make up the offences of terrorism.

For instance, if a person or a group "causes serious obstruction or damage to or interference with Essential Services or supplies or with any critical infrastructure or logistic facility associated with any essential service or supply" with the intention of "wrongfully or unlawfully compelling the Government of Sri Lanka, or any other

Government, or an international organization, to do or to abstain from doing any act" commits an offence of terrorism.

When simplified, if a Trade Union strikes work or launches a street protest, "causing serious obstruction to essential services or supplies," "with the intention of compelling the government" to increase the salary of its members, it will amount to an act of terrorism under the Bill.

The HRCSL says "As prescribed in section 3(2) (f) anyone who interferes with essential services or supplies is considered to be an act of terrorism. This would mean that anyone who takes part in a protest or rally, even if it is peaceful, can be deemed to be committing an act of terrorism."

It further says "The definition of terrorism contemplated in the Bill shall make it difficult to distinguish between legitimate acts of dissent and actual acts of terrorism."

The term 'Terrorist Act' has been described in such wide terms so as to bring in all legitimate, democratic, mass political and protest campaigns against government policies within the definition of a terrorist act, senior Attorney-at-Law KalyanandaTiranagama has stated in a newspaper article.

Subscribing to the view, the CPA also notes that the definition of the 'offence of terrorism' in the Bill is overly-broad and some of the offences in it raise serious concerns for the freedom of expression, potentially giving the State an additional tool to crack down on dissent and criticism.

The ICJ also says that the overbroad and vague definition in clause 3 of "acts of terrorism" in the Bill can be interpreted in a manner that stifles dissent and can be used to crush peaceful protests.

Vague laws undermine the rule of law because they leave the door open to selective and arbitrary interpretation, law enforcement and prosecution, it has added. HRW is of the view that the "proposed counterterrorism law would permit the government to continue to use draconian measures to silence peaceful critics and target minorities.

The Sri Lankan Government has been under pressure from international human rights organisations, especially the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) for about a decade to repeal the PTA or to replace it with a new anti-terrorist law in

accordance with the international human rights laws and international standards.

Based on the 2021 UNHRC resolution on Sri Lanka, the European Parliament passed a resolution in June 2021, which called on the European Commission to consider the possibility of annulling the GSP+ facilities awarded to Sri Lanka, if Sri Lanka did not improve its human rights situation including the repealing of the PTA.

The Yahapalana Government which took an approach different from the one taken by the Rajapaksas towards the UNHRC drafted a Counter Terrorism Bill in 2018 and presented it in Parliament.

However, Gotabaya Rajapaksa Government rejected it claiming that it was forced on the country by foreign forces. Now, they are turning a blind eye to the new ATB, which contains almost the same provisions. The irony is that the Government has published a new Bill claiming to meet international standards and to replace the PTA, but the international forces that pressed for it have turned against it claiming that the new Bill is worse than the PTA.

In fact, the new Bill has rectified some of the flaws in the PTA that were pointed out by the international players.

It has removed the provision in the PTA for a detainee's confession to be admissible as evidence against him. It has also provided for the arresting officer to issue a document notifying the arrest to the next of kin of the accused and the Human Rights Commission, within 24 hours.

The obligation to bring the detainee before a magistrate every 14 days when the person is detained without a Detention Order is also an improvement in the new piece of legislation.

However, despite the new Bill having somewhat improved the situation of the persons who could be arrested under it, it has defined the term terrorism so that anybody who criticizes a Government might be arrested as a terrorist.

Had this Bill been in force last year, even President Ranil Wickremesinghe might have been arrested, as he publicly supported the GotaGoGama!

The Aragalaya and the GotaGoGama had fulfilled the two criteria needed to be a terrorist act under the new Bill – having an intention of compelling the government to do something and obstructing essential services (vehicular transport and the functions of the President's office).

However, the allegation that the Government has drafted this Bill to implement the IMF conditions is unfounded as the offences of terrorism under the Counter Terrorism Bill of 2018 and those of the new Bill is the same, as Mr Tiranagama points out.

However the timing of its presentation this time is questionable.

The game Bill has some additional

The new Bill has some additional offences that affect the media as well. It also empowers the President to proscribe organizations based on its definition of terrorism.

The Bill, if enacted in the current form might become counterproductive to those who vote for it as well. Apart from the danger of losing an annual GSP concession of about US\$ 500 and a stronger resolution being adopted at the next UNHRC session, the Bill might turn against them also, in case of a regime change.

Besides, if a member of the current Government is disgruntled over a change of Ministry or not being offered a portfolio, he would not be able to express his views. Yet, all signs are that the Bill is going to be amended before it is enacted.

PTA to ATA: Delay is not the end of the story

The proposed Anti-Terrorism Bill which was Gazetted on March 22, 2023 came under much scrutiny as many factions condemned that its contents are far worse than those included in the Prevention to Terrorism Act.

Government's response to the Aragalaya, others claim that this Bill would give more powers to the Executive and the Armed forces.

Even though the State will be introducing it in place of the PTA. concerns have been raised

While some call it the incumbent

in place of the PTA, concerns have been raised on its definition of terrorism, clauses on the proscription of organisations, imposition of the death penalty and other areas.

Several international organisations including the International Commission of Jurists (ICI) issued statements highlighting the grey areas of the Bill.

For example, Clause 4(1)(a) of the Bill, which, if adopted in its current formulation, would introduce the death penalty for "the terrorism offence of murder".

In its statement, ICI states that Sri Lanka has

been a de facto abolitionist country for decades, given that a moratorium on executions has been in place in Sri Lanka since 1976.

"The ICI is opposed to the death penalty in

"The İCJ is opposed to the death penalty in all circumstances, as a violation of the right to life, and as the ultimate cruel, inhuman and degrading punishment."

The Bill was introduced in the wake of several trade unions launching strike action against various policy decisions taken by the government, one being the tax policy. Stating on Wednesday, the Bar Association of Sri Lanka (BASL) said it would not hesitate to challenge any bill that would deem to undermine the rule of law and liberty of the citizens of this country.

However, as a response to widespread concerns and criticisms, Justice Minister Dr. Wijeyadasa Rajapakshe said that the Government had decided to delay the tabling of the Bill towards the end of April or the first week of May.

But the Government has not been clear on addressing the grey areas of the Bill before tabling it in Parliament.

In the event the Bill receives a two-thirds majority and is passed in Parliament, the media too will be at the receiving end of State suppression.

aster, the greatest Christian religious festival is about the good news that Jesus of Nazareth, the guru and the prophet who through an unjust trial was condemned to death, crucified and buried, yet rising again to life after three days of lying in the tomb.

Often it was an appearance with the greeting: "It is I, do not be afraid, Peace be with you".


The Resurrection of Jesus validated all that was seen and heard of him during three years of public ministry and travels covering the city of Jerusalem, other cities and villages along beaches and on land.

We are told that many crowds used to gather in the hills, beaches and in the privacy of homes and synagogues to hear him and many sick were brought to him for healing and the possessed freed for demonic power.

To make the situation more incredible he used miracles to prove that he had the power to forgive sins and that wherever faith in him was present, even among gentile pagans, miracles were possible as in the case of the servant of the Roman centurion and the Canaanite woman who had an issue of blood from which she was cleansed through the sheer touching of his garment.

He welcomed children making them symbols and signs of his kingdom thus challenging the adult world to child-like attitudes. Many women followed him in his company with his disciples who assisted him with his material needs.

He touched lepers in healing and exorcised the dumb, the blind and the deaf and made the lame walk again. He claimed to exercise and fulfil the task of a messiah of a kind other than a merely political one that many religious leaders and popular national belief expected would free the land from the colonial yoke of Roman rule. Jesus taught us a new way of universal love



that demands us to love even our enemies and do good to those who hate us. That teaching on neighbourly love was revolutionary. He manifest a new way of exercising authority as a humble service by washing the feet of his disciples, which usually was a task allotted to the slaves when the master of the house would host any guests.

Many great Pharaohs and Caesars have come and gone in the history of ancient kingdoms and epochs, but only the story of the humble son of a Galilean carpenter, Jesus of the village of Nazareth has stood the test of centuries.

Those who believe him to be the saviour of mankind and the Son of God are more than a third of the world's nearly seven billion of humanity. The itinerant preacher of Palestine has touched to this day millions of believers worldwide and his Sermon on the Mount about beatitudes has become in the literature of religions, a spiritual classic that has touched many a spiritually minded person and mystics including the great Mahatma Gandhi, the founding father of modern India.

Jesus Christ, his life, death and Resurrection are at the heart of the message of all Christian churches as they strive to make him known and loved by the modern world.

His teachings have even inspired further applications in the area of socio-political and international issues that deeply touch

the hum-drum life of modern man, wherever they live. Being prophetical teaching, at times the Christian value system comes into stark conflict with what the technocratic and secular world believes and acts upon.

This struggle is seen in the field of scientific research, ethical and moral issues and those pertaining to life and health. The authentic view of the Christian churches on issues such as abortion, assisted suicide called euthanasia, artificial birth control, same-sex marriage and other issues bordering on sexual morality including homosexuality and gender change are well known for their stubborn defence and at times aggressive criticism.

The standard of Christianity is always rooted in the nobility and inviolability of life and the dignity of love inspired by the vision of the God of life and love. Hence, the work of the Churches is to establish a culture of life against all lethal forms of death and assist in building a modern civilization of love, mutual respect and dialogue among the people. In a poly-centric world with cultural, religious and political diversity, the only possible path to peace and collaboration is that of dialogue which helps in accepting differences realistically and pursuing areas of convergence and communion.

The religion instituted by Jesus of Nazareth is one of universal brotherhood. Even in his day, he treated the people of his race, which was Jewish and those non-Jews like those of Samaria and the Pagans of the Roman Empire equally. He

was open to all including women and children who were marginalized in his own society. The plague that was nailed to the top of the cross where he was crucified read: Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews.

Pilate the Roman Governor of his region had it written in Greek, Latin and Hebrew which incidentally was a literal combination of Greek culture known for the earliest philosophies coming from Athens in Greece, the cultural center of that time; Latin, the official language of the Roman Empire and Hebrew: the language of the Sacred Jewish Scriptures.

What a significant and imposing one indeed at that! Thus the cross of Christ is not only a sign of contradiction but also, by contrast, a symbol of incredible reconciliation, harmony and unity.

Jesus of Nazareth who appeared in the occupied land of Palestine, was no mere historical individual. He has universal significance. Indeed all religious founders belong to the entire humanity. The dignity of man, the solidarity of peoples, the nobility of human work, the care for the earth, the mending of differences among peoples and nations, peace among nations and the building up of goodwill are some of the corollaries that seep down from the Christian teaching about the love of God and love of neighbour.

Jesus marvelled at the mysteries of nature as he contemplated the lilies of the fields and the birds. He loved the hills, the mountain ranges and the beaches from where he taught large crowds and even fed them. Yet, he taught that we humans are more worth than any of these about which God cares, feeding the birds who do not spin and gather into barns and the lilies who are so elegantly beautiful. It was a virtue to break even the law of the Sabbath to go out in succour to someone in need. Religion is interior and that of the heart and not mere observance of external laws and prescriptions which at times may be needed.

But one should not be a whitened sepulchre: elegant from the outside and all rotten inside. Hence we are invited to judge the power of religions more from the inner spiritual experience that cleans the mind and disciplines the heart than merely by external rituals, rites and celebrations however exotic and popular they may be. The power of religions lies in their liberating potential to change and transform the adepts in their lives. Very often this inner reality does not happen though religious doctrines and codes of ethics are acclaimed from the roof-tops of temples, churches and shrines in question.

churches and shrines in question.

Given the rather distressful state of the world, a rebirth of humanity across religions, cultures and civilizations appears to be a dire need of the hour. The moment being decisive, projects for renewal and reform have to be initiated effectively.

The content of the Easter message is a halt to the sense of fear and insecurity to be accompanied by peace within and without. It is also the Risen Lord Jesus who commissions his chosen disciples to venture into the whole world and proclaim the good news about the Kingdom of God which is nothing by a world society animated, inspired, motivated and filled with the love of neighbour. It must help emerge a humanity which will make this earthly home a habitable one where all resources are shared equally without any country usurping what others have a right to have.

It has to be a world order where cultures, economies and political systems contribute towards achieving the common good. In light of the above considerations, Sri Lanka needs to achieve freedom from the oppressive cycles of karma that have precipitated us into the depths of tragedy and catastrophe. The country urgently needs to undertake the imminent task of a rebirth: one that rediscovers the spiritual core of her religions in the kind of multi-religious society we have, coupled with the preservation of the perennial cultural values we have long held as noble and reconciliation in the field of politics that has caused many a disaster in the country for the last seven decades.

We need people to elect wisely only future leaders who are truly patriotic and Statesmen of the calibre of our founding fathers. We need a citizenry which is truly introspective, exercising its franchise and democratic rights intelligently, entrusting to the seats of governance only those who would be true leaders spearheading a re-born Sri Lanka, harbingers of a new nation.

Resurrection - Capstone of Christian faith



Jesus, Christ rose from the dead and He appeared to His disciples who had abandoned Him at the time of His arrest. He, the risen Lord, ate with them, He walked with them, and He appeared to them, while they all were locked down in a room.

Finally, He taught them the doctrine, He preached before His death and most of them had not understood the deeper meaning of what He had taught them. He now made them understand the doctrine he had preached. Especially taking from the Old Testament the passages which were spoken about him. He made them realize that He was the Messiah that the Jews were expecting for ages - the fulfilment of the Old Testament.

What is Resurrection?

Resurrection is not a resuscitation of a corpse, which means that a dead body comes to life with the same corruptible body, which will face material death in the future one day. During

the mission of Jesus Christ on earth, he raised Lazarus from death, but Lazarus died afterwards.

Resurrection is a metaphysical reality. It is a resurrected body. The body is different from the material body that Jesus had when He lived his physical life on Earth.

Yet, He is the same Jesus Christ, who lived physically on earth. If Jesus Christ, after resurrection had the same material body, which he had on earth, how can Jesus Christ enter into a closed room? We find in the gospel that Thomas, who was a disciple, doubted that He had risen, and when Jesus appeared, and showed His wounded hands, He asked him to testify to it.

Since He had a resurrected body that transcends space and time in the material realm, He could enter through closed doors and appear and disappear suddenly to His disciples. According to the early fathers of the church, the soul is imprisoned in a material body at birth, which escapes from this material body at our physical death. Our "being" acquires material existence at birth, and departs from our material body at our physical death. The Empty Tomb is not conclusive proof of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. One could argue that disciples stole His body and set the word around that



He is risen. Even the appearances of the Risen Lord could not give any conclusive proof for the fact that the Lord has risen from the dead. One could argue that delusion may have occurred in their minds due to various factors that they encountered. What cannot be disproved is the fact that all the disciples who fled away, when Jesus was captured by the Jews, bore witness to the fact that Jesus Christ is risen. On the day of the Pentecost they received a Divine power from the Risen Lord as he promised to send to them, and they, as brave men, went out. Out to people to bear witness to the fact that the Lord had risen from the dead, and people who heard Peter. On that day, according to the Act

of the Apostles, the 3,000 men were converted to Jesus Christ. On the first day of his sermon the immense power and strength they received was enough for them to understand the teachings of Jesus Christ to make them fully converted to believing in the person of Jesus.

To this conviction, they all gave their lives to Him and became martyrs except Saint John, who was the youngest among the disciples, who died in his old age and wrote the most profound gospel in the Bible. Those who embraced the teaching of Jesus Christ lived a life of grace and testimony, and as a result, many were converted by them and they experienced the power of the risen Lord and performed miracles. They were

able to convert many people to the Lord because of the Divine power they experienced and by adhering to the teachings of the Lord.

Science cannot disprove the resurrection, as it is no longer in the empirical sphere. Resurrection goes behind the realm of the subject matter of science. A resurrection is a unique event. One-time phenomenon. It cannot be repeated as in empirical sciences. Scientific propositions: To be called a scientific proposition it needs to have certain criteria, which have to be fulfilled. Regularity and repeatability are considered as the sine qua non for scientific data. Therefore, resurrection falls outside of scientific data.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is a fact. This fact was well documented. That Jesus died on the cross, that He was crucified by the Romans under Pontius Pilate, and that He was placed in the tomb and on the third-day tomb was empty. He had risen. Risen Lord appeared to many and changed their lives forever.

The fact is that the power of the Risen Lord transformed the lives of billions of people throughout the centuries and continues to be so is an undeniable fact and it goes to prove that Jesus lives and that the mystical Union with the Risen Lord empowers the lives of those who believe in Him.

PROF MOHAN MUNASINGHE NAMED GLOBAL ENVIRONMENTAL LEADER SAVING THE PLANET

Professor Mohan Munasinghe, 2021 Blue Planet Prize Laureate and co-winner of the 2007 Nobel Prize for Peace, was featured on the front cover of the recently published book: Saving the Planet: The leading environmentalists. He is identified among 28 top global environmentalists who are saving the planet, including fellow Nobel Prize winners Wangari Maathai and Al Gore, the legendary Rachel Carson, Jacques Cousteau, and UK King Charles.


Featured in this magnificently illustrated book are captivating biographies of the men and women from around the world who have raised awareness about air, soil and water pollution, habitat destruction, biodiversity loss, and climate change. These scientists, economists, activists, princes, and Indigenous people have dedicated their lives to help solve the complex human-caused problems facing Earth today. To protect their territory and ultimately save the planet, some of these

environmentalists have written learned reports, others produced riveting documentaries about nature, and many have founded environmental organizations.

Prof. Munasinghe received the 2021 Blue Planet Prize (also called the 'Environmental Nobel Prize') and shared the 2007 Nobel Prize for Peace (as Vice Chair of the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change). A globally recognized expert, his work has contributed to key international agreements like the 1992 Agenda 21 & UNFCCC, 1997 Kyoto Protocol, the 2015 Paris Climate Agreement and the UN 2030 Agenda & Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). He first proposed the Sustainomics transdisciplinary framework at the 1992 UN Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, emphasizing the importance of integrating and balancing the sustainable development triangle, including economic, social and environmental dimensions. At the Rio+20

Earth Summit in 2012, he introduced the Balanced Inclusive Green Growth (BIGG) path for both developed and developing nations, as well as the innovative Millennium Consumption Goals (MCG) concept that was included as SDG No.12.

Professor Munasinghe is Chairman of the MIND Group in Colombo, which includes the non-profit Munasinghe Institute for Development (MIND), a UN-recognized centre of excellence working globally on all aspects of sustainable development, and MIND AM focusing on data analytics and management. He is Chairman of the Board of the Climate & Conservation Consortium (CCC), and his visit to UAE coincided with the soft launch of the Dubai office of the CCC. He is also the Board Director of the Eureka Group and a Distinguished Guest Professor at Peking University, China. He was Chairman of the President's Expert Committee on Sustainable Sri Lanka 2030 Vision



Former football presidents, ExCo members accused of financial fraud and misdeeds

The football investigation report commissioned by Sports Minister Roshan Ranasinghe has revealed that there has been largescale financial fraud and various misdeeds in the past because former presidents and certain executive committee members of the football governing body took turns in the administration of football in the country.

It is against this backdrop that Sri Lanka suffered a drastic decline in the football world ranking, from 122 in 1998 to 207 out of 211 countries in the world by 2022. according to the report of the fivemember football investigation committee headed by retired High Court judge Kusala Sarojini Weerawardena.

It has been revealed in the report that out of the 64 football leagues that have been registered under the Sri Lanka Football Administration, 20% of them are fake football leagues established with the aim of increasing the votes of the former presidents of the football administration. It is reported that many of these bogus football leagues have not

prepared annual accounts and have not held annual general meetings.

Meanwhile, the Sri Lankan football authorities should take responsibility for not working to amend their constitution in accordance with the FIFA constitution, and that responsibility should not be transferred to a third party, the Kusala Sarojini five-

person report has indicated. The report pointed out further that everyone who held positions in the past should take full responsibility for bringing football to a lower level in this country.

of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) has said. Kristalina Georgieva said the path ahead was "rough and foggy" - and warned that cooperation to address the problems was becoming more difficult.

She spoke in Washington ahead of the IMF's annual meeting. In her remarks, she called for more help for low-income

"For the weakest members of our global family, additional support from wealthier countries is essential," she said, calling for countries to boost funds for the IMF, which makes low-cost loans to countries in need.

The organisation is bracing for a wave of requests for help or debt restructuring, as the shocks from Covid-19 crisis, the war in Ukraine and soaring cost of living continue to reverberate.

Last year, global growth dropped almost in half to 3.4 percent, following a post-pandemic surge in 2021.

That was below the 3.8 percent average growth of the last two decades. The slowdown has continued this year, despite strong job markets in countries such as the US.

The IMF said it expected growth to dip below 3 percent in 2023, with India and China accounting for more than half of the

Roughly 90 percent of advanced economies are expected to see growth decline, reflecting the weight of higher borrowing costs, after central banks raised interest rates sharply to stabilise soaring prices.

For low-income countries, higher borrowing costs come at a time of weakening demand for their exports.

Tourism earnings in first quarter top US \$ 500mn

- March revenue up 22% YoY to US \$ 198mn
- Tourist arrival target for this year revised to 2mn
- Improved tourism activity expected going forward as economic crisis eases

Earnings from tourism almost ouched the US \$ 200 million mark in the month of March, while such earnings for the first quarter topped US \$ 500 million.

According to the provisional data released by the Central Bank, the local tourism sector generated revenue of US \$ 198.1 million in the month of March. In rupee



terms, the earnings amounted to Rs.65.3 billion. Compared to the corresponding period of the previous year, March revenue expanded by 22 percent. In March 2022, the tourism sector fetched earnings of US \$ 161.2 million.

During the first three months of the year, the tourism sector's contribution to the national economy crossed the US \$ 500 million mark. For the January 01 to March 31, 2023, the total earnings amounted to US \$ 529.8 million.

Compared with the corresponding period in 2022, the earnings expanded by 9.8 percent. For January 01 to March 31, the cumulative earnings amounted to US \$482.4 million.

Despite grappling with the challenges prevailing in the economy, Sri Lanka's tourism sector is witnessing a steady improvement in tourist arrivals.

For three months straight, the island nation has been successful in luring over 100,000 international travellers, which in turn has helped in fetching higher earnings.

Given that the sector is performing at levels better

Tesla cuts US prices for fifth time since January

CNN: Tesla cut prices in the United States between 2 percent and nearly 6 percent, its website showed on Thursday, as the company extends a discount drive on its electric vehicles that analysts caution could hurt profitability.

The fifth such cut in Tesla's largest market since the start of the year comes as the United States prepares to adopt tougher standards this month that are expected to limit EV

Tesla (TSLA) cut prices on both versions of its Model 3 sedan by US \$ 1,000 and on its Model Y crossover by US \$ 2,000, the website showed. It also cut prices on both versions of its more expensive Model S and Model X by US \$5,000.

The company has said the tougher U.S. standards would reduce the US \$ 7,500 tax credit available for its base, rear-wheel drive Model 3 since January.

Sri Lanka airline boss says 'don't be a CEO during Covid'

BBC: Sri Lanka's national carrier has been struggling against even more headwinds than many of its rivals.

Airlines around the world have been buffeted by the impact of countries closing their borders during the pandemic and soaring fuel prices due to the Ukraine

State-owned SriLankan Airlines is also facing the worst economic crisis for decades in its home country.

Its British-born boss told the BBC how he plans to turn the firm around.

"I think the first lesson for me is don't ever go and be a CEO during Covid," Richard Nuttall, Chief Executive of SriLankan Airlines, jokes when asked what his biggest takeaway is from the



He became Chief Executive of SriLankan Airlines in April last year, after joining the company in November 2021 as its Chief Commercial Officer.



APOA stakeholders' meeting in Malaysia sets course for sustainable development and cooperation



The Asian Palm Oil Alliance APOA) held a stakeholders' meeting in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia recently. The meeting was attended by representatives from the global sustainable agriculture specialist organization Solidaridad Network, apex edible oil industry associations from five major palm oil importing countries in Asia, and major stakeholders, including Godrej nternational.

The APOA was initiated by the Solvent Extractors Association of India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, and Nepal, together with Solidaridad with the aim of working across the world to promote sustainable palm oil and to ensure that palm oil is recognized as a high-quality, economical, and healthy regetable oil.

Atul Chaturvedi, President of APOA, began the meeting by introducing the Asian Palm Oil Association and shared that the APOA is formed to empower several Asian countries for whom palm oil is a source of affordable food and nutrition.

The APOA is expected to safeguard the economic and business interests of the palmoil-consuming countries and create a level playing field for all oils and fats used in food, feed, and oleo chemicals in Asia. He also mentioned that in the coming year, the membership would be further expanded to include other select companies or industry organizations operating in the production and/or refining of palm oil in Asia.

Dorabh Mistry, Director of Indian consumer goods company Godrei International suggested that Malaysian and Indonesian Palm oil growers and producers be invited as they are an important part of the system. He expressed his nappiness that this alliance is being formed between India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka, as these are the countries that not only consume 40 percent of palm oil but also don't create



hurdles for palm oil producer

countries. Ajay Jhunjhunwala, President of the Solvent Extractors' Association of India, stated that all major producers tend to respond more to demands from buyers in Europe rather than pay attention to the needs of Asian purchasers. The European Union accounts for less than 9 percent of the global palm oil imports. Asian buyers share for around 40%, but producers try to comply with EU's demands and ignore Asian buyers.

Dr. Suresh Motwnai, Secretary General of APOA, stated that APOA is a coordinated platform of the palm oil consuming countries to unitedly address common problems, interests, and aspirations of the Asian palm oil sector stakeholders. This will help Asian countries to play a decisive role in defining and implementing sustainable development of the palm oil sector.

He also shared that the aim of APOA is to facilitate cooperation amongst its members to secure an efficient, economical, and regular supply of sustainable palm oil adhering to national sustainability standards, national laws, and UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The organization's primary goal is to increase the consumption of sustainable palm oil in Asia while challenging negative

Dr. Rohan Fernando, President of the Palm Oil Industry Association of Sri Lanka (POIA), expressed gratitude towards the Solvent Association of India and Solidaridad for forming the APOA and welcomed the opportunity to work together towards policy recommendations that safeguard the economic and business interests of palm oil consuming countries.

He also thanked APOA for inviting POIA to join hands with them, as this has strengthened the industry's position in Sri Lanka, which had banned palm oil cultivation overnight, making it the only country in the world to do so. On an international level, although Sri Lanka is equipped with the Generalised Scheme of Preferences Plus (GSP+) in the UK and European Union (EU), the GSP to the UK will be replaced with the Developing Country Tariff Scheme (DCTS) in December of 2023.

As part of the plan to rebuild its shattered economy, the government aims to raise funds by privatising SriLankan Airlines. In February this year, unable to meet interest payments due end of the year, the company defaulted on a US \$ 175 million (£140 million) bond.

Nuttall highlighted that, while he was not against selling off the business, there was still a lot of work to be done to restructure its debt before that can happen.

"If we can structure that debt, then a large part of what we're paying as interest comes back and can be used to run the airline," he said. "And it means that an outside investor can come in and not pay for the sins of the past."

"Poverty and hunger could further increase, a dangerous trend that was started by the Covid crisis," she added. While calling for support for vulnerable nations, Georgieva said authorities should continue to raise interest rates to fight

inflation - "so long as financial pressures remain limited". "If that were to change, policymakers would face an even more complicated task, with difficult trade-offs between their inflation and financial stability objectives and the use of their respective tools," she said.
