

TID summons former AG Dappula de Livera

Meanwhile, Justice Minister Dr. Wijeyadasa Rajapakshe also said at a Cabinet briefing that he has informed the Attorney General to record a statement from Dappula de Livera over his statement on the Easter Sunday

In May 2021, a few days before the

end of his tenure as the AG, Dappula de Livera said that he is unable to present indictments against the conspirators and abettors of the 2019 Easter Sunday terror attacks within his tenure, as the Criminal Investigation Department's probes are incomplete.

Speaking to the media, the Justice Minister said that Dappula de Livera as the Attorney General at the time should have summoned the Police and ordered them to conduct further investigations if the level of inquiry had been insufficient.

Petition to be heard on Thursday (20)

This petition has been listed to be taken up for determination before Supreme Court three-judge-bench comprising Chief Justice Jayantha Jayasuriya, Justice Vijith Malalgoda and Justice Arjuna Obeysekera.

A Retired Brigadier of the Sri Lanka Army Athula De Silva, Political analyst Shenali Waduge and prominent businesswoman Jehan Hameed filed this Special Determination petition naming the Attorney General and Parliamentarian Premnath C. Dolawatte as respondents. This petition was filed through Attorney-at-Law Dharshana Weraduwage.

Through this petition, the petitioners are seeking a declaration that the bill requires the approval by the people at a Referendum in addition to the 2/3 approval of the Parliament.

The Petitioners state that the proposed amendment has failed to look into and preserve the best interest of the children. The petitioners feared that the LGBTOI movements may promote their programmes in schools and impact the free decision making of the school children and may also give rise to Transgender Children.

PENAL CODE AMENDMENT CHILD ABUSE- CIVIL

Urban Citizens Organisation in a letter addressed to President Ranil Wickremesinghe said crime abuse will be decriminalized under the new amendment proposed in the new private members Bill presented by MP Premnath Dolawatta.

"Section 365 in the principle enactment which states - "whoever voluntarily has Carnal intercourse against order of nature with any man, woman, animal "is proposed to be repealed and be substituted with - "whoever voluntarily has Carnal intercourse against the order of nature with an animal shall be punished with imprisonment of either description of a term which

may be extended to 10 years and shall also be liable to a fine". Omitting the words "any man, woman" in the proposed bill will automatically abolish the entire amendment brought under act number 22 of 1995. In our view it automatically decriminalizes child abuse under section 365 and 365 (a)," the letter signed by Urban Citizens Chairperson Shermila Gonawala said.

According to existing laws, in the event that any person above the age of 18 years commits the said "unnatural acts" against a child less than 16 years of age, it is a serious crime and is punishable.

Cabinet decision to allocate Galle Face only to spend leisure time

Cabinet spokesman, Mass Media, Transport and Highways Minister Dr. Bandula Gunawardana told the weekly post cabinet news briefing that Sri Lanka Ports Authority (SLPA) has undertaken to develop the Galle Face area as a Corporate Social Responsibility project.

So far, the SLPA has spent about 220 million rupees on development work and only 6.6 million rupees have been spent on repairing the property damages that occurred during the last Aragalaya period.

The land in Galle Face should be maintained as an area for the

people to spend their leisure time. However, due to musical shows and other events that gather people in large numbers, the area is being damaged and it has become difficult to maintain the beauty and scenic nature of the area.

Therefore, the Cabinet has decided not to allow the use of the Galle Face ground for musical performances, meetings or other activities that may damage the beauty of the Galle Face ground except for religious activities with effect from 2023.04.20, Minister Dr. Gunawardana said.

RAILWAY DEPT. TO BE MADE A CORPORATION - MINISTER

 Rails of the coastal line have to be replaced every five years, but it has not been done for the last ten or more years

A public corporation or a statutory corporation is operated on a commercial basis and governed by a Chairman and Director Board. A department does not possess commercial qualities as such and is directly controlled by the government.

Reforming the SOEs has been prescribed by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to qualify for financial assistance to tide over the current economic crisis.

Transport and Highways Minister Bandula Gunawardane told Daily Mirror that the Department of Railways had been run at an annual loss of Rs.10 billion during the recent past years, and its commercial viability should be improved to make it more passenger friendly.

"In 2021, the Department generated revenue of Rs.2.6 billion. However, Rs.2.3 billion had been

spent for the payment of overtime work by the employees, and Rs. 2.7 billion for salaries," the Minister said. The Minister said he held

talks with the rail trade unions representing engine drivers, station masters and guards, and got their positive responses to the proposed restructuring plan. Sri Lanka has a rail network of

around 1,500 kilometres. However, the Minister said some rails were as old as 50 years, and they should be replaced immediately.

"We have placed orders for the import of 10,000 rails. The rails of the coastal line have to be replaced every five years. But it has not been done for the last ten or more years. Therefore, trains cannot speed up to Panadura on the southern coastal line. The speed limit has been restricted to 20 kilometres per hour," he said.

Certain political elements behind delaying A/L answer script correction: Minister

After signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the Vocational Training Authority (VTA) and the Sri Lanka Bureau of Foreign Employment (SLBFE) at the Bureau office in Battaramulía, he told the media that the intelligence report was released last week and that the report said that extremist political groups are trying to inconvenience youth in the 18,19 and 20 age group by delaying the scrutinizing of answer scripts.

The minister said that the teachers' unions had agreed to the government's programme of scrutinizing answer scripts.

'We need 19,000 teachers to complete the task." A/L practical tests have already begun, and teachers are already engaged in their duties. The Ministry had taken measures to

minimise the delay in scrutinizing the answer scripts to some extent. We hope that the Federation of University Teachers' Association (FUTA) will engage with the programme soon,"

"Political groups and unions must consider this a national constraint without considering their personal benefits. 350,000 students had faced the A/L examination, and 600,000 students were to face the Ordinary Level (O/L) exam. The O/L exam was postponed by the examination department by two weeks to create a gap between the two main examinations," Minister Premajayantha said.

Therefore, the minister requested that the unions commence scrutinizing answer scripts in the name of their children.

SLPI expresses concern

The Sri Lanka Press Institute (SLPI), its constituents and affiliated organisations are deeply concerned over the proposed 'Anti-Terrorism Act' (ATA) published on 22 March 2023 (Gazette notification dated 17 March 2023), drafted to replace the Prevention of Terrorism Act (Temporary Provisions) Act No. 48 of 1979 (PTA),

the SLPI said in a statement.. The SLPI is of the opinion that the presented bill has several controversial elements that are not conducive for the media community. The proposed bill consists of an overbroad and vague definition of "acts of terrorism" that can be interpreted in a manner which curtails the freedom of expression. The broad powers vested within the proposed bill enables the criminalisation of speech that is likely to be understood as an encouragement or inducement to commit or prepare for terrorism, with the burden of proof on the defendant to show, that was not their intention. These offences also apply to those who publish, distribute, sell,

or transmit publications that could be interpreted as materials supporting acts of terrorism.

According to the Bill, confidential information could be any information having an 'adverse impact' on 'national security/defence' which includes 'any information not in the public domain. Therefore, the broad and vague classification of 'confidential information' could place media personnel in a precarious position in the due course of executing their duties, as many offences which fall under the criminal law could now be reframed as 'terrorist offences'.

It is evident that the constitutionally guaranteed fundamental rights of citizens, in terms of freedom of speech and expression, freedom of assembly and association, and freedom to dissent are threatened through the proposed ATA. While the SLPI understands the need to amend the PTA, it also endorses caution in making amendments that could undermine democracy and good governance.

forming a link between its membership and the University.



The Association has several key objectives including Student Welfare, Engagement and Fellowship. The members of the association, as thought leaders of the country, have played many roles at strategic and policy levels.





PTA, ATA, ICCPR AND WE, THE CITIZENS

or the past 73 years, we Lankans have at different times permitted different governments to take away our freedom for one reason or the other. We permitted without too much ado, the right of the government to impose emergency regulations in an effort to prevent workers demanding a living wage.

One of the best examples was when late president JR Jayewardene dismissed over 40,000 public sector workers for demanding a monthly increase of Rs. 300/in July 1980 using emergency regulations. Neither the public nor mercantile sector trade unions took up the cause of the dismissed strikers. Many a striker committed suicide, but the caravan moved on.

We next accepted a further reduction of rights in 1979, when the Prevention of Terrorism Act (PTA) was first introduced as a temporary law and later made permanent in 1982. The PTA; infringes constitutionally vested rights, including freedom from right to be free from torture, arbitrary arrest, detention and punishment, and the right to a fair trial.

At that time, large sections of the majority community - sans a few individuals like MP Vasudeva Nanayakkara - supported the PTA, seeing it as being directed against the Tamils who were calling for a separate state.

Despite numerous warnings from the minorities, that the draconian piece of legislation would come back to haunt them, large sections of the Lankan community continued supporting the legislation.

It was only during the past year, once the PTA began to be used to crush the 'Aragalaya' group, did a majority of citizens become aware of the deadly powers they had conferred to their rulers. In the aftermath of the crackdown on the 'Aragalaya,' ordinary citizens, politicians and political parties soon began demanding the abolition of the PTA.

The Ministry of Defence at an International Research Conference in 2023 admitted there were flaws in PTA; which infringed constitutionally vested rights and the Act had discriminatory provisions which need revisiting.

To 'assuage' the people's feelings, government has presented a new piece of anti-terrorism legislation - the Anti-Terrorism Act (ATA). However, the bill in its present form seems to increase the powers of the president to proscribe organizations issue curfew orders, and restrict areas of access.

Human rights organizations, trade unions and even religious groups have joined the political parties in describing the ATA as being worse than its predecessor, the PTA. Political Scientist, Prof. Jayadeva Uyangoda speaking to the Daily Mirror columnist Kamanthi Wickremasinghe said the proposed new law would turn the country into a police state, posing a threat to the rule of law, democracy and human rights in the country.

Sunday Times' columnist Kishali Pinto-Jayawardene points out that the ATA has features worse than its predecessor, the PTA, bringing in Section 3 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR) Act as a component of the 'offence of terrorism and concentrates even more power in the office of the presidency.

While speaking of terrorism, the ATA is imprecise in its description of what constitutes a terrorist offence and could include perfectly legitimate actions in given circumstances.

The bill also appears to be a direct attack on the freedom of the media, describing any person who publishes or causes to be published a statement which could be understood by some or all members of the public as 'instigating' an act of terrorism. The punishments for violation of the bill are - the death penalty or 20 years rigorous imprisonment and a fine up to Rs. One million upon conviction by the High Court and forfeiture of property.


The bill also empowers the president with powers of proscription if he has 'reasonable grounds to believe an organization is engaged in an act amounting to an offence'. What these reasonable grounds are 'God only knows'!

Will we, the sons and daughters of Lanka, once more meekly bow our heads as our rights are being effectively stripped of us?

In Germany, before the World War II, people surrendered their rights and a Hitler emerged. The ATA looks more and more like a 'Frankenstein monster' in the waiting. Will we acquiesce to this?

The Bar Association of Sri Lanka has announced it would not hesitate to challenge any bill it would deem undermines the rule of law and liberty of citizens in the country. In response to mounting criticism, the government has announced that it would delay tabling the bill.

We, the citizens, need be alert to prevent an erosion of our rights whether by our elected representatives or those elected by our elected representatives.

OUR TAX: WHERE DOES IT GO?



ne of my younger colleagues at the University of Peradeniya, recently wrote on his Facebook something a female student had told him: "Sir, we only eat one meal a day."

This is not news to us at universities, especially to those of us whose students are mostly from rural Sri Lanka. Peradeniya itself is rather rural, and the students coming from even its vicinity belong to the rural poor. One of the students told me that her daily bus fare is unbearable for her family. Students are not given hostel facilities unless their homes are 50km away. If one must commute some 40km twice a day, the traveling cost is indeed unbearable.

Once at a committee meeting, I had the opportunity of listening to how one of the university cafeteria managers described the meal purchasing of students during the on-going financial crisis: "Those children come to the canteen at about 10.00 am and buy one meal for both breakfast and lunch. We feel so sad, but we are helpless?" he said

According to what I have gathered on this matter over these months, many students do not add a piece of chicken or fish to the meal just buy a 'plate of vegetable rice.' A small cooked portion of chicken is sold at least Rs. 150 and a portion of fish is around Rs. 100.

At the faculty where I teach, about 90% of the students are females; on average, they are between 22 and 24 years old. At this age or any age for that matter, these young girls regularly need nutritious meal. These are the brightest citizens of their age group, and they have entered university after performing well at the most competitive national exam in the country. Yet, the above examples show how they are being treated for about two

The way a country treats its women indicates its quality level and priorities of development. I just cannot imagine what kind of health issues these under-fed young women would have to face in future. Those health issues take years to show their consequences. When it happens, we, the teachers or the University administration will not be among them to help them. While the university community has tried out numerous ways to help the students, and unless a "Needy Students' Fund" has been established, the problem would be too heavy for us to handle.

In the meantime, the government has increased our taxes in addition to VAT even those starving students have to pay when they buy those poor meals. On average, a professor pays about Rs.100,000 as monthly tax, and the most senior professor at the University told me that his monthly tax cut was about Rs.150,000.

We, being a community of professionals, and I, as an individual, are not against taxation. In fact, a vigorous programme of redistribution is needed even without a financial crisis such as the current one. But the key word is 'redistribution.' As the above examples from my own life show, if there was a principled programme of



As the economic crisis looms, poor and needy people turn to community kitchens and other donors to

'redistribution,' our students would not be as deprived. What we get to hear instead is that many students have not received their Mahapola stipend for months. Since it is the key financial aid programme within the national university system, its monthly stipend has not increased for years and remains around Rs. 5,000! It as not been adjusted at least fractionally to cope with the current inflation. That was why students keep avoiding meals. What is heartbreaking here is the fact that a professor's monthly tax is enough to pay 20 Mahapola stipends at the present rate. Therein lies one of the issues about the increased tax on the professionals.

Professionals believe in redistribution that reach masses in forms of education, healthcare, and improved employment. And there is a segment of population that needs subsidies in nearly everything while they wait to find employment and other sources of income

The on-going professionals' trade union action against increased tax has several pertinent arguments. Many of us do not know what really happens to our tax money. We are indeed worried about corruption on the part of politicians. All major political parties have produced politicians whose narratives of corruptions are almost mythological. They are not just mythic stories that exist only in imagination. They are real: we have seen politicians with humble beginnings becoming insanely wealthy just about a decade into their political careers. And these political 'new rich' is not ashamed of showing off their newly-acquired wealth and the power of quick-money. Anyone who has observed the lifestyles of many politicians from all major parties knows that without some unknown flow of money towards them, those politicians cannot live the kind of life they did. That is on top of all the perks legally belong to them.

It is true that the legality of the

material benefits the politicians enjoy cannot be challenged legally. The discourse on the corruption in the country is so rich that nearly all major politicians have been challenged ethically. On their part, however, there is very little remorse or a sense of guilt. Now, no major politician can visit his/ her voters without the entourage of security personnel. This resentment of politicians is shared by professionals like me. We do not want to pay higher tax if it is wasted on politicians.

Professionals believe in redistribution that reach masses in forms of education, healthcare, and improved employment. And there is a segment of population that needs subsidies in nearly everything while they wait to find employment and other sources of income. Thus, tax money should be redistributed on the principle of equity and justice. If redistribution is guided by such principles, it is a pleasure and an honour to pay tax. Any citizen with a sense of dignity will be happy that his/ her tax is enhancing the quality of life of needy citizens. Such transparency is rarely found in corrupt states.

In addition, taxpayers have other personal worries. No matter how much tax they pay they still have to spend from their own pockets for healthcare, transportation, and the education of their children. For example, public healthcare system has weakened so much that it is rarely a middle class person makes use of government hospitals because they know that so many poor people are waiting in line for the similar kind of services. When a middle-class man chooses a private healthcare facility over a government hospital, he/she is in fact paying a 'tax' that is not accounted for, and the person is indirectly participating in a programme of redistribution. When the same person must pay an increased tax, he/she is double taxed.

Higher earners must pay tax, and it is an honour to pay it. But they are prevented from the pleasure of seeing, their tax helping some other fellow citizens taking a shot at a better life. What they see instead is major politicians becoming big shots with insanely luxurious lifestyles. That must not be tolerated.

It appears that we are going back to 1960s as far as the eggs are concerned. In the 60s we imported eggs from India and were sold at prices varying from 6 to 8 cents. Breakage was heavy due to transport by country craft and broken eggs were sold at a discount.

Later we became self sufficient in eggs and People's Bank played a major role in financing the poultry industry. The only problem the poultry farmers and consumers experienced was the seasonal price fluctuations due to farmers entering the industry when the prices are high and leaving when prices are low.A perfect example of price mechanism prevailed, as enunciated by the 18th century economist Adam Smith said to be the father of economics. The industry managed itself subject to market forces.

Presently there is a shortage of eggs brought about by the price control introduced by the authorities. A farcical situation existed wherein we have banned import of Turmeric to save foreign exchange and support the local farmer but permitted importing of eggs without studying the repercussions. Very soon self sufficiency in eggs will become a thing of the past and a lot of people will lose their jobs. It's advisable to do some re-thinking of the price controls and allow the market forces to direct the industry.

The labour that should not be lost

Looking into why women's role in rebuilding the economy needs more policy reforms

Inspiring and bringing confidence to working women as a nation would inspire more women to join the workforce



"Women empowerment isn't about making women stronger as they are already strong. It is about changing the way the world perceives that strength," Managing Director of Jetwing Travels Shiromal Cooray said speaking at the launch of WPAN (Women's Policy Action Network) organised by the Advocata Institute recently. WPAN is an independent network of individuals committed to bringing about policy reform through advocacy for the economic empowerment of women.

WPAN comes in the light of the disproportionate impact of both the pandemic and the economic crisis on women, enhancing women's participation n the workforce is even more critical

The launch was followed by a panel discussion on the "**Reforms to Empower Women During** an Economic Crisis.'

"At the moment, we do have the political will to make changes by 2024," said Shan Yahampath, the Adviser to the Ministry of Labour and Foreign Employment. According to International Labour Organization estimates, he female labour force in 2021 was at 34.47%.

However, a report said that despite the increase in the percentage compared to the previous years, the number had dropped again in 2022 due to the economic crisis in Sri Lanka.

The report also said that women had left their obs during this time mainly because of the financial difficulties and clashes in the work routine due to the country's economic crisis, which followed the pandemic. However, to fix the system and create more level playing field and work options for women, the WPAN has already started working on making new policies.

...... THE ATTITUDE TOWARDS EMPLOYED WOMEN

"It is about changing the way the world perceives that strength," keynote speaker Managing Director of Jetwing Travels Shiromal Cooray said at the event.

She **highlighted** the importance of the equal requirement of both social and economic policies to support the dual roles played by orking women, who are also held for nurturing and taking care of children.

"An archaic system which expects girls to give up on their dreams and manage household chores and take care of them is a major cause for only 30 - 35 per cent of the girls becoming part of the labour force among the 52% of women population," Ms Cooray said.

"As a result, only 25% of women are in the senior and middle management level of the labour force.

"Unfortunately, women who work as teapluckers, seamstresses and migrant housemaids are at the lower end of the pyramid with no opportunity to grow, even though they are the ones who earn us the most amount of foreign exchange," she said.

She stressed factors such as implementing appropriate or flexible working hours, assurance and availability of jobs after maternity leave and the availability of opportunities to learn subjects like technology and engineering.

The percentage of women working in the tourism sector is dropping due to social stigmas associated with employment opportunities in the tourism sector," she said.

"No amount of economic reforms will solve this until the attitude of the society and cultural biases and gender stereotyping are changed," concluded Cooray.

WHY IS MATERNITY LEAVE CONSIDERED A COST?

"Companies should look at maternity leave as an investment and take the biological angle into account to level the playing field," said Anarkali Moonesinghe, former CEO of CIMB Sri Lanka.

CIMB Group Holdings Berhad is a Malaysian universal bank headquartered in Kuala Lumpur and operates in high-growth economies in ASEAN. CIMB Group is an indigenous ASEAN investment bank. She said that creating flexible work arrangements such as working from home during maternity leave was a healthy way to encourage female participation in the labour

Bringing the stakeholders together and converting the formulated policies into collective action is expected to be seen, Anarkali said.

...... AFFORDABILITY OF CHILDCARE SERVICES IN SRI LANKA

In Sri Lanka, relying on the unpaid labour of women-especially the unpaid labour of



grandmothers- to support childcare has been in existence for so long.

However, the lack of childcare services and the issue of its affordability have been the main concerns affecting the female workforce, Senior Research Analyst Sumini Siyambalapitiya said speaking at the panel. "The cost exceeds the earnings women

receive," she said. This leaves women to make a rational

choice between looking after the children or joining the workforce,

"They have to decide to either stay at home and take care of the child or to bear the cost which is both an economic and emotional strain," she said.

Regulating the childcare industry is one of the easiest moves which will positively impact these concerns, Sumini said.

She said how the Government had drafted a national guideline for **childcare** services in 2019 which considered all factors like affordability and quality of the services in both the city and rural areas. However, these guidelines were never implemented due to political and other factors.

...... **PARTICIPATION OF** WOMEN IN THE HIGHER **EDUCATION SECTOR**

In comparison to the past few decades, there is marked progress in women's participation in degree programs of different subjects like tech and hospitality and other sectors, the Director at Virtusa, Sampath Thrimawithana said.

"Yet, in rural areas which lack less vareness, mentoring and training, **huge** struggle is observed in finding opportunities," Thrimawithana said.

Introducing role models and conducting workshops and campaigns and discussing challenges and solutions would encourage more women's participation in the workforce, Thrimawithana suggested.

HOW TO GET MEN INVOLVED IN UNPAID DOMESTIC WORK?

Acknowledging care work and household work as work with economic value will be an initial step to making a shift in the thought process of society, said Sumini.

Acknowledging the fact that women's contribution to household work also contributes to an economy's function is essential, she said.

Giving more dignity for the role played by women," she added. Men should start considering taking up more and more household chores, she said.

She said that even though the cultural norms cannot be changed overnight, creating flexible work options like remote work and making changes in the way employment is generally defined, would encourage women.

...... LAWS AND REFORMS

A draft policy framework has been made on the unified labour code and is expected to be presented to the Cabinet by the end of May 2023.

"Our labour laws fail to focus on competitiveness and productivity, while efficiency is not taken into consideration, especially in terms of night time work restrictions, overtime restrictions, part-time work, occupational safety, sexual harassment and termination of employment," stated Shan Yahampath, Advisor to the Minister of Labour and Foreign Employment.

Expanding and reforming certain existing definitions by giving a futuristic outlook, abolishing certain legislations, creating more job opportunities and understanding how the local industries can compete globally without undermining foreign investments are measures taken into consideration, he said.

"Most importantly, the issues faced by pregnant women are looked into in the policy draft and the Government is looking into whether it could implement a paid maternity leave and other financial compensations," he

Sri Lanka - Ireland 1st Test Match

ri Lanka demolished the visiting Ireland side by a massive innings and 280 runs with over two days to spare in the first Test match concluded at the Galle International Cricket Stadium

The writing on the wall was there when play ended on day two with Ireland in reply to Sri Lanka's massive score of 591 for 6 ending the day on 117 for 7 and needing a further 474 runs to erase to avoid the follow on.

It was the day one wrecker left arm spinner Prabath Jayasuriya who finished off the tail as Ireland resuming their innings yesterday lasted ust under eight overs only 45 balls to be exact.


Jayasuriya who ended with a five wicket haul on day two added two more wickets to his collection to end with figure 7 for 52 while Ramesh Mendis bagged the other wicket to bowl out the visitors for a paltry 143 runs.

Ireland made to follow on and left with the daunting task of erasing a massive deficit of 448 runs fared no better.

It was a repeat of their first innings batting as the left arm pace and spin combination of Vishwa Fernando and Prabath Jayasuriya combined again to have them in tatters.

The pair shared four wickets between them and with Ramesh Mendis accounting for the fifth wicket had Ireland batting in shambles as they went into the lunch break in a bad position of 41 for 5.

The post lunch session saw Harry Tector and Curtis Campher putting in some resistance as they succeeded to post the 50 runs stand for the sixth wicket and then put Ireland's 100 runs on the board before Mendis separated them with the wicket of



Campher who made 30 and sharing a sixth wicket stand of 60 runs with Tector and

Ireland on 100 for 6. Tector followed eight runs later becoming the second victim of Mendis having made 42. George Dockrell and Andy McBrine featured in a brief stand of 23 before Mendis struck again with the wicket of McBrine to have Ireland struggling on 131 for 8.

Later with Ireland on the brink of defeat Dockrell shared another brief stand of 36 runs for the ninth wicket with Mark Adair which ended with Dockrell becoming Mendis' fourth wicket before Jayasuriya bagged the last Ireland wicket to bundle them out for 168 runs for Sri Lanka to take a 1-0 lead in 1ST INNINGS 591/6 declared (D. Karunaratne

the two match series.

In the process Ireland in just over two sessions of play lost 13 wickets for 194 runs. Mendis who ended with four wickets was the pick of the Sri Lanka bowlers in Ireland's second innings while Jayasuriya who bagged three along with his seven in the first innings ended with a match bag of 10 for 108 runs and fittingly was adjudged the player of the match.

The two teams will play their second Test match from April 24 at the same venue.

AFP-Asian markets mostly fell yesterday, even as data showed China's economy grew far more than expected in the first quarter after activity resumed following three years of painful zero-Covid

The blockbuster 4.5 percent expansion, helped by aboveforecast retail sales last month, revived optimism for an economic recovery in the country after its worst performance in decades last

The figures are the first snapshot since 2019 of a Chinese economy unencumbered by public health restrictions, which included months-long city-wide lockdowns that brought large parts of the country to a standstill.

The readings bode well for the world's second-biggest economy, and soothed some worries after inflation data last week indicated consumer activity remained

The iPhone is still an aspirational product in the price-sensitive Indian market, where more than 95 percent of smartphones run on Google's Android platform.

India is also rising as a manufacturing base for the iPhone as Apple diversifies its supply chains away from China. India now accounts for 5 percent of total iPhone production.

But experts say that while the stores are an important branding strategy, they won't have an immediate impact on Apple's sales in India. Others, however, have pointed out that it's a good time for Apple to invest in India's growing "premium smartphone" market

- which refers to mobiles that cost 40,000 rupees (£451; \$558) or more.

"When you launch an Apple store you're basically giving a premium experience to your premium consumers. It might not pull up sales but it definitely pulls more people into the Apple ecosystem," technology analyst Navkendar Singh told the BBC.

Apple has long tried to open physical retail stores in India. Its original plans for 2021 were derailed because of the Covid-19 pandemic.

This is Cook's first trip to India in seven years - the Apple CEO last visited in 2016 when the tech giant was just beginning to scale up operations in the country.

On Monday, he shared a picture of himself eating a vada pav - a popular Indian snack - with Bollywood actress Madhuri Dixit.

Reports say Cook is also expected to meet Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Deputy IT Minister Rajeev Chandrasekhar as part of his visit. There was no official announcement from Modi's office regarding this.

Tourist arrivals...

Moving down to second place is the Russian Federation which accounted for 14 percent of the total arrivals.

In third place is the United Kingdom which contributed to 9 percent of the total arrivals. The contribution from Germany (9 percent) to Sri Lanka tourism is similar to that of the UK, but only slightly lower

in numbers. Other key source markets include France, Australia, the United States, Canada, China, and Israel.

Govt. plans...

Around 3.1 million low-income families are expected to receive welfare benefits under this programme.

Multilateral agencies such as the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank have come on board to provide funding for this programme.

The government last year started establishing a new information system of welfare applicants in order to identify those who truly deserve benefits.

Further, the Government Information Department revealed that plans are underway to provide welfare benefits to the disabled, kidney patients and senior citizens under different programmes.

Having secured the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers, the proposed programme is to be tabled in parliament for approval in order to implement it from July 1, this year.

China's economy...

China Civil Aviation Administration data showed that more than 45 million air passenger trips were taken last month, an almost threefold increase on the same time last year.

The country resumed processing visa applications in March after announcing a major easing of restrictions.

Investors had been eagerly waiting for the figures to get clues on the strength of China's recovery after the government lifted coronavirus measures.

Beijing has also eased a three-year-long crackdown on big technology companies and property developers.

However, one analyst told the BBC that, while the latest figures are strong, that pace of growth is unlikely to continue.

"What's more likely to happen in the coming months is that people might get over the initial high after the reopening,' Dan Wang, chief economist at Hang Seng Bank (China) said.

"Manufacturing demand might decline, which cannot sustain a boom in exports because the global economy is slowing down rather than speeding up," she added.

Authorities, including the People's Bank of China, have promised to increase support for the pledged to step up support for China's economy to help curb unemployment but are limited in what measures they can take.

Last year, China's GDP growth slumped to one of the lowest levels in nearly half a century due to coronavirus measures.

GDP is one of the most important tools for looking at how well, or badly, an economy is doing. It helps businesses judge when to expand and hire more people, and lets governments work out how much to tax and spend.

Asian markets...

However, below-forecast readings on industrial output and fixed asset investment suggested weaknesses remained in the economy and the recovery could be uneven.

"We expect to see higher GDP growth rate in upcoming quarters as a result of the low base from last year, and the annual growth target of five percent should be achievable,' said Chaoping Zhu, at JP Morgan Asset Management.

"That said, some challenges still exist in the economy.

The Chinese economy remains beset by a series of problems including a debt-laden property sector, global inflation and the threat of recession elsewhere, and geopolitical tensions with the United States.

Craig Erlam at OANDA said: "It's not just the pandemic that the country is bouncing back from, confidence in the property market has been severely undermined and it will take time to recover."

Investors also continue to fret over Federal Reserve plans to hike interest rates as officials try to rein in US inflation, with top policymakers seeming to be split over how many more increases are needed.
