*Japan—Alteration in Sectors of Lights.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 263 of 1900) that the following alterations would be made in the arcs of the under-mentioned lights on March 15, 1900:—

1. Kamimate Jima light will exhibit in future a fixed red sector between the bearings S. 50° W. and S. 56° W. (6°) over Osone reef.

Approximate position: lat. 32° 15' 50" N., long. 130° 8' 50" E.

Variation, 4° westerly in 1900.

2. Tobaseshima light will exhibit a fixed red sector between the bearings S. 60° E. and S. 22° E. (38°) over Amitori shoal.

Approximate position: lat. 32° 34' 35" N., long. 130° 29' 0" E.

Variation, 4° westerly in 1900.

3. Kosaki (Koo Saki) Light.—The fixed red sector shown from this light has been extended to show between the bearings of east and S. 63° E. (27°) over Tsuzusaki sunken rock and Komatsu shoal.

Approximate position: lat. 34° 5' 15" N., long. 129° 12' 15" E.

Variation, 4° westerly in 1900.

4. Sakibaru Light, Liu Kiu Islands.—The flashing green sector shown from this light has been extended to show between the bearings of S. 10° E. and S. 29° W. (39°) over Monnanse, Kannose, and Inannsonoga dangers.

Approximate position: lat. 26° 12' 25" N., long. 127° 39' 40" E.

Variation, 2° westerly in 1900.

*Bay of Bengal—Burma Coast—Rangoon River—  
Leading Lights.*

The Bombay Government has given notice (No. 49 of 1900) that information has been received from the Deputy Conservator of the Port of Rangoon, dated May 19, 1900, that two white fixed leading lights have been exhibited from a little above the Deserters Creek, west bank of the Rangoon river.

The above two lights are masthead lights, and are shown from posts 106 yards apart.

The front light bears N. 71° W. (mag.), distance 2 miles and 3 cables from the extreme of the Elephant Point and is 20 ft. high, and the back light 40 ft. high above high water ordinary spring tides.

These two lights in line S. 74° W. are intended as a guide to vessels passing Elephant Point inward and outward.

*Eastern Archipelago, Sumatra—North-east Coast—Deli  
River—Light discontinued.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 273 of 1900) that on May 1, 1900, the light (white fixed) exhibited on the south side of the entrance to the Deli river was discontinued ; it has therefore been erased from the Chart.

Approximate position : lat. 3° 46½' N., long. 98° 42½' E.
