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## BOARD OF TRADE NOTICES.

THE following notices of the Board of Trade (Fisheries and Harbour Department) are published for general information:—

(F. & H. 13,352.) London, October 2, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Brussels, intimating that the Sanitary Commission of the Scheldt has withdrawn the measures which it had provisionally imposed on arrivals from Greenock, and that vessels arriving at Antwerp from that port will only be required in future to produce a bill of health and to undergo a sanitary visit.

(F. & H. 13,360.) London, October 2, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Representative at St. Petersburg, intimating that vessels from Glasgow bound to Finnish ports will be subjected to quarantine at Kansos, and vessels from other United Kingdom ports to medical inspection, and that quarantine measures reported in Telegram of 20th September and in *Gazette* notice F. and H. 13,105, 21st September, apply equally to all ports in White Sea.

(F. & H. 13,421.) London, October 2, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Representative at Buenos Ayres, intimating that Glasgow has been declared infected, and other ports of Glasgow suspected.

(F. & H. 13,432.) London, October 2, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Representative at Rio de Janeiro, intimating that the quarantine imposed on ships leaving Rio for National ports is abolished, but disinfection is continued.

(F. & H. 13,445.) London, October 2, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, a copy of a Despatch from the Governor of Barbados, intimating that Glasgow and its suburbs has been declared to be a place infected with plague.

(F. & H. 13,544.) London, October 5, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Calais, intimating that vessels proceeding from any port in the United Kingdom to that port must bring a clean bill of health with the visa of a French Consular officer, failing production of which they would be liable to detention outside the port for 24 hours for inspection, and, if deemed necessary, disinfection, and that vessels from Glasgow will not be admitted, but will have to proceed to Dunkirk and undergo quarantine there.

(F. & H. 13,751.) London, October 9, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Representative at Rome, intimating that the Plague Regulations are applied to arrivals from Osaka.

(F. and H. 13,577.) London, October 4, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Representative at Constantinople, intimating that quarantine against Port Said has been abolished and replaced by medical visit, and that quarantine against Alexandria has been reduced to 48 hours' observation, with medical visit and disinfection.

(F. & H. 13,623.) London, October 5, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs the following copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Representative at Bucharest, viz.:—"Six days' quarantine at Sulina imposed on arrivals by sea from Glasgow, neighbouring districts, and ports, arrivals from England subjected at ports only to medical inspection. Importation of following articles prohibited:—Firstly, used clothes, body linen, and bedding, if as luggage subjected to special treatment. Effects of deceased soldiers and sailors when returned to country of origin will be assimilated to above-mentioned articles; secondly, rags and old clothes, including rags in bales compressed by hydraulic pressure and imported as merchandise; thirdly, fresh *débris* of animals, horns, hoofs, hair of horses and other animals, raw silks, and wools; fourthly, hair; fifthly, used sacks, carpets, and embroideries; sixthly, raw, untanned, and green hides."

(F. & H. 13,650.) London, October 6, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, the following copies of Telegrams from the Governor of Newfoundland respecting quarantine on arrivals from Glasgow, viz.:—

"Quarantine authorities issue notice that all vessels arriving in any port in this Colony from Glasgow will be subject to quarantine regulations published in *Royal Gazette Extraordinary*, August 31, 1892.

"Referring to your Telegram of 3rd October.

"According to regulations vessels on arrival in port less than fourteen days from Glasgow may be detained in quarantine, but as period incubation bubonic is short, Quarantine authorities grant free pratique to vessels arriving in less time, provided that on examination no trace can be found of sickness on board and no dead rats. Sending home by mail Quarantine Regulations."

(F. & H. 13,682.) London, October 9, 1900.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Paris, enclosing the following Decree respecting quarantine, viz.:—

Journal Officiel du 3 Octobre, 1900.

Le Président de la République française,

Sur le rapport du président du conseil, ministre de l'intérieur et des cultes, et du ministre des finances,

Vu l'Article 1er de la loi du 3 Mars, 1822, sur la police sanitaire;

Vu le décret du 4 Janvier, 1896, portant règlement de police sanitaire maritime;

Vu les décrets des 15 Avril, 1897, et 15 Juin, 1899, relatifs aux provenances des ports contaminés de peste,

Décète :

Art. 1er.—Les navires provenant des localités reconnues contaminées de peste ou portant des objets énumérés à l'Article 3 du décret du 15 Avril, 1897, ne peuvent pénétrer en France ou en Algérie que par les ports de Dunkerque, le Havre, Saint-Nazaire, Pauillac, Marseille et Alger.

Le ministre de l'intérieur déterminera les autres ports qui pourraient également être ouverts à ces provenances par exception ou sous réserve de conditions spéciales résultant de l'état sanitaire des navires à leur arrivée ou de la nature de leur chargement.

Art. 2.—L'Article 4 du décret du 15 Avril, 1897, et l'Article 1er du décret du 15 June, 1899, sont abrogés.

Art. 3.—Le président du conseil, ministre de l'intérieur et des cultes, et le ministre des finances sont chargés, chacun en ce qui le concerne, de l'exécution du présent décret, qui sera publié au Journal officiel et inséré au Bulletin des lois.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Stockholm, intimating that he has been informed by the Sanitary authorities that ships arriving from ports in Great Britain, in addition to the Custom House officer who always goes on board upon their arrival, will be also visited by a physician ; but ships will not be detained for any length of time unless some suspicious case should be discovered on board.
