PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most

Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief

in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 8 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to establish a Police Force in any place other than large towns, though such force be not maintained in the manner prescribed by the said Ordinance, and to declare that certain of the provisions of the said Ordinance shall come into operation at such place:

And whereas it is expedient to establish under the provisions of the said section of the said Ordinance a Police Force at Haputale, in the Province of Uva, being a place other than a large town, within the limits hereinafter specified, and to declare that certain of the provisions of the said Ordinance shall come into operation therein :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby, under the provisions of the said section of the said Ordinance, establish a Police Force from and after the 20th day of August, 1900, at Haputale, in the Province of Uva aforesaid, the limits of which place shall, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, be those specified in the schedule hereto, and do hereby declare that the following sections of the said Ordinance, save where they or any of

them shall have been by any subsequent Ordinance in anywise amended or in part repealed, shall thereafter come into operation in the said place, namely, sections 51, 53, 54, 55, 57, 58, 59, 61, 62, 63, 65, 67, 69, 70, 72, 73, 74, 78, 79, 80, 85, 87, 90, 91, 94, 95, and 98.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Eighteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred.

SCHEDULE.

West.—The western boundary of lot No. 2,085 in preliminary plan No. 320 prolonged southwards to a distance of one chain to the south of the main Badulla-Haldummulla road, and prolonged northwards across the railway to the boundary of the Haputale estate.

South.—Commencing at the southern extremity of the western boundary as described above, a line running eastward along the south side and one chain distant from the edge of the said road up to the plateau on which carts are halted, where the Lemastota minor road diverges; thence a line skirting the said halting place at the same distance back to the main road; thence a line at the same distance from the road as far as the Crown reserve lot No. 612 in preliminary plan No. 239; thence along the boundary of the said lot to a distance of 20 chains from the road; thence a line in an easterly direction, at the last named distance from the road, to a point where it will intersect a line drawn north and south through the 24th milepost.

East.-A line running north and south through the 24th milepost.

North.—The northern edge of the Badulla-Haldummulla road from the 24th milepost to a distance of 150 yards short of the railway crossing; thence at a distance of two chains from the road as far as the railway crossing; thence the boundary of the Haputale estate to where the above described western limit intersects it.
