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PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 3 of the Ordinance No. 19 of 1896, intituled "An Ordinance to declare certain By-laws to be in force within the Municipality of Kandy," it is enacted that the by-laws set forth in the schedule thereto shall be in force within the Municipality of Kandy; provided however that nothing contained in the said Ordinance shall be held or construed to prevent the making,

approval, and publication in respect of the Municipality of Kandy of further by-laws or by-laws in amendment of, or in addition to, such by-laws in the same and the like manner as is empowered to be done by "The Municipal Councils' Ordinances, 1887, 1890, and 1896," or any other Ordinance :

And whereas by section 124 of "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," it is enacted that "no by-law, or alteration, amendment, or cancelment of, or substitution for, any by-law shall have effect until the same is confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council," and that notice of such confirmation shall be given by Proclamation to be made in that behalf, and that such by-laws when so confirmed and published in the *Government Gazette*, shall be as valid and effectual as if they had been in the said Ordinance enacted :

And whereas the further by-laws set forth in the schedule hereto have been made by the Municipal Council of Kandy, under the provisions of section 122 of the said "Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," as amended by "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1896," and the same have, under section 124 of the said "Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," been confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, do hereby proclaim that the by-law set forth in the schedule hereto have been confirmed by Us in the Executive Council, and shall have effect as from and after the First day of February, 1901.

SCHEDULE.

To Chapter XII., Ordinance No. 19 of 1896, shall be added :—

21A. The sums recoverable under either of the two next preceding by-laws shall be recovered in the manner provided by sections 281 and 282 of "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," as if the same were expenses directed to be paid by the said Ordinance.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the 8th day of October, 1900, and published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette*, No. 5,728 of October 19, 1900, a police force has been located in the District of Wattagama, in the Central Province, as required by section 17 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," and whereas by section 22 of the said Ordinance it is amongst other things enacted that for the purpose of discontinuing the police force when introduced into any district under the said Ordinance, the same course shall be taken as is prescribed in the Ordinance for its introduction, and if the demand for its withdrawal be adopted by the proprietors of two-thirds of the acreage, the Government Agent shall forthwith notify to Government that the required majority is in favour of the withdrawal of the said police force from the said district :

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby withdraw from the 1st day of February, 1901, the police force from the said district which consisted of and comprised all lands and high roads included within the external boundaries of the estates specified in the schedule hereto.

RULES.

1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Knuckles and Kelebokka shall slaughter cattle at any place other than the public slaughter-house at Cosgama referred to in the Proclamation dated 28th December, 1900.
2. The building situated 12 yards north-east of the said slaughter-house is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of the planting districts of Knuckles and Kelebokka shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than twenty-four hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
3. No cattle shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Government Agent, notice of which shall be posted at the slaughter-house, nor until after they have been inspected and approved by the District Medical Officer of Kelebokka as fit to be slaughtered for human food.
4. Cattle rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
5. The said District Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal, notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said District Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any cattle which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said District Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.
8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house except under the directions of the said District Medical Officer any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
9. The fee for slaughtering shall be 75 cents for each head of cattle.
10. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house:—

THE next examination will take place at the Ceylon Technical College, Colombo, beginning February 25, 1901, at 10.30 A.M.

Candidates who are not students of the College will make application to the Surveyor-General, and will pay to him the examination fees (Rs. 35) before February 23. Candidates will not be examined if the fees are not paid before that date.

The subjects of the examination are—

Mathematics.—Algebra up to quadratic equation, plane trigonometry, and the mensuration of surfaces and solids.

Field Work.—Chain surveying, theodolite surveying, and levelling, including the adjustments of the theodolite and level, and setting out curves.

CAMBRIDGE LOCAL EXAMINATIONS, 1901.

AN Examination of Senior and Junior Candidates, in accordance with the Regulations of the Revised Code, will be held at Colombo, Kandy, Galle, Jaffna, and Batticaloa on December 16, 1901, and the following days. Forms of entry duly filled up should be sent to the Director of Public Instruction not later than August 5, together with the following fees, which should be paid as follows:—

(1) A Bank draft on England payable to Dr. J. N. Keynes, crossed "Mortlock & Co.," at the rate of £1 for each candidate, as the Cambridge fee.

N.B.—The fees should not under any circumstances be remitted by Money Order. *No cash, or Money order, Bank draft, or cheque in favour of the Director of Public Instruction will be accepted.*

(2) A Post Office order (not Postal order), Bank draft, or crossed cheque in my favour at the rate of Rs. 2.50 for each candidate, as the local expenses fee. *Cash will not be accepted.*

N.B.—Forms of entry will be accepted from August 6 to August 17 inclusive on payment of an extra fee of Rs. 5.

Forms of entry may be had from the Director. It is requested that Managers will only apply for such number of forms as they actually require, and that they will not encourage any student to enter as a candidate unless they are satisfied that he has a fair chance of passing the examination.

Religious Knowledge, as a subject of examination, is not necessary for Colonial Students, and no grant or award under the Revised Code will be made directly or indirectly dependent on marks gained for Religious Knowledge.

Candidates (whether under age or over age) must forward with their entry forms certificates of the registration of their birth, unless such a certificate has been sent to this office for a previous examination. Affidavits will not be accepted.

Fees cannot be returned. If notice of withdrawal is received by the Local Secretary more than sixteen days before the commencement of the examination, a voucher will be sent, which will enable the student to enter in another year without further fee to the University, subject to the usual conditions of age. The Syndicate do not undertake to grant a similar voucher in any case in which the full sixteen days' notice has not been given. Applications made within sixteen days of the examination will, however, be considered, if accompanied by a medical certificate, stating that the candidate is physically unfit to take the examination. No applications received after the commencement of the examination can be considered. Students holding vouchers must apply for fresh forms of entry and return them to Local Secretaries on or before August 17 in the year in which they wish to be examined.

N.B.—The Mathematical Prize will be awarded on the results of the Cambridge Senior Local Examination of December, 1901, to the candidate, under 19 years of age, who passes the best examination in Mathematics.

NOTES.

There is now no limit of age for admission either to the Junior or the Senior Local Examination so far as a Pass Certificate is concerned.

Marks of distinction will not in future be awarded to Junior candidates above the age of sixteen or to Senior candidates above the age of nineteen.

Changes have been made in the conditions for passing in the Natural Science Section in the case both of the Junior and of the Senior Local Examination.

The Natural Science Section of the Junior Local Examination now includes Electricity and Magnetism.

Questions on Commercial Arithmetic will no longer be included in the paper on Bookkeeping in the Junior Local Examination.

The arrangement of the Time Tables has been modified.

EXAMINATION OF JUNIOR STUDENTS.

* * In mentioning certain editions of the subjects selected for examination, the Syndicate have no desire to exclude from use other editions which now exist or may hereafter be prepared.

No one born before December 15, 1885, can be admitted as a Junior Student under the ordinary conditions. Those born before December 15, 1885, may be admitted to the examination, but they can obtain a Pass Certificate only.

PART I.—COMPULSORY.

Every student will be required to satisfy the Examiners in (1) Writing from Dictation, and (2) Arithmetic.

PART II.

The examination will comprise the subjects mentioned in the following thirteen sections. Students will be required to satisfy the Examiners either (a) in three of the ten sections 1—10, or (b) in two of the ten sections 1—10, together with two subjects out of any other two of the sections 1—13. No student may enter for more than seven of the sections 1—10, or for more than eight sections altogether. One at least of the four subjects of section 1 must be taken by all students, unless their parents or guardians object to their examination in that section.

N.B.—No student can take two papers set at the same time in the Time Table.

A certain number of marks will be assigned to Handwriting. Composition will be taken into account.

Section 1.—RELIGIOUS KNOWLEDGE :

Questions will be set on (a) *Joshua* i—xii, xxii, xxii—xxiv, *Judges* i—xii; (b) the Gospel of *St. Matthew*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Greek [or, for Jewish students only, *I Kings* xii—end, *II Kings*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Hebrew]; (c) the *Acts of the Apostles*, i—xvi; (d) the Church Catechism. In New Testament subjects special papers in which the Douay Version is used will be prepared for candidates who have been accustomed to the use of that version.*

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in (b), and in one of the subjects (a), (c), (d), to each of which the same credit is given. No Student will be examined in more than one of the subjects (a), (c), (d).

* Candidates wishing to avail themselves of this arrangement must make a statement to that effect in their forms of entry; if they omit to do so, they cannot be allowed to take the special papers.

SECTION 2.—ENGLISH :

(a) English Grammar, including parsing and the analysis of sentences. Candidates will be required to write a short English Essay.

(b) **Shakespeare, Henry V.* (c) **Scott, Lay of the Last Minstrel.*

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in (a) and either in (b) or in (c). No student will be examined in both (b) and (c).

SECTION 3.—HISTORY and GEOGRAPHY :

(a) Outlines of the History of England, from 1688 A.D. to 1832 A.D.

(b) Outlines of Roman History, from 510 B.C. to 266 B.C.

(c) The Geography of *Great Britain and Ireland and Asia*. An outline map will be given to be filled up by inserting and naming the chief ranges of mountains, the chief towns, the chief lakes and rivers, and the political divisions, and by naming the chief features of the coast line, of some part of these portions of the world. Questions will also be set requiring a general knowledge of Geography. Importance will be attached to a knowledge of the relation between the physical features of a country and its political and commercial geography. (Medal, see p. 86.)

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in either (a) or (b), and also in (c). No student will be examined in both (a) (b).

Section 4.—LATIN (see notes A, B): Papers will be set containing passages from **Cæsar, de Bello Gallico VII.* 1—67, from *Cicero, In Cætilinam I.—III.*, and from **Virgil, Æneid IX.*, for translation into English. No student can take more than one of these three subjects.

Section 5.—GREEK (see note A): Papers will be set containing passages from **Xenophon, Anabasis VI.*, and from **Euripides, Heracleidæ* (omitting lines 353—80, 608—29, 748—83, 892—927), for translation into English. No student can take both these subjects.

Section 6.—FRENCH (see notes A, B, C): Passages will be given for translation into English from **Enault Le Chien du Capitaine*, and from **De Vigny, La Carne de Junc.* No student can take both these subjects.

Section 7.—GERMAN (see notes A, B, C): Passages will be given for translation into English from **Hauff, Der Scheik von Alessandria und seine Sklaven*, and from **Freytag, Die Journalisten*. No student can take both these subjects. In writing German in the examination, students are advised to use the English character, but the use of the German character is not forbidden.

Section 8.—SPANISH (see notes A, B, C): Passages will be given for translation into English from *Galdos, Zaragoza* (obtainable from D. Nutt, Long Acre, London), chapters 1—13.

A.—*In the examination in Latin, Greek, French, German, and Spanish:* (1) Questions will be set on grammar and parsing. Questions may also be set on historical and geographical allusions and on the metre of verse subjects. Without a fair knowledge of Accidence a student cannot pass. (2) One or more easy passages not contained in the books named will be set for translation into English, a vocabulary of the less familiar words being given. Students are required to satisfy the Examiners in this part of the paper; but in cases of failure the translation of the unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty may be taken into account. (3) One or more passages of ordinary difficulty not contained in the books named will be set for translation into English. In order to obtain the mark of distinction students will be expected to do fairly well in this part of the paper.

B.—*In the examination in Latin, French, German, and Spanish:* One or more passages will be set for translation from English into the language. A student cannot obtain the mark of distinction in the language without satisfying the Examiners in this part of the paper.*

C.—*In the examination in French, German, and Spanish:* Alternative questions will be provided for students who prefer to be examined in the language generally and not in any set book.

SECTION 9.—MATHEMATICS.

(a) EUCLID.—Candidates will be required to satisfy the Examiners in Euclid, Books I. and II. Questions will also be set on Euclid, Books III., IV., and VI. Two and a half hours will be allotted to the paper, which will consist of two parts: the first part will contain bookwork questions only, and the answers to this part will be collected at the end of the first hour and a half; the second part will contain easy geometrical exercises.

Proofs other than Euclid's will be admitted, but no proof of any proposition will be accepted which requires the assumption of anything not assumed by Euclid or proved in preceding propositions in Euclid.

(b) ALGEBRA.—Candidates will be required to satisfy the Examiners in definitions and explanations of algebraical signs and terms; addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of algebraical quantities; theory of indices; greatest common measure and least common multiple; extraction of the square root; the solution of easy equations of the first degree and questions producing such equations, and the solution of easy quadratic equations involving one unknown quantity. Questions will also be set on quadratic equations, the elementary rules of ratio and proportion, arithmetical and geometrical progressions, permutations, combinations, and the binomial theorem with positive integral exponents.

(c) PLANE TRIGONOMETRY, including the solution of triangles and the use of logarithms.

(d) ELEMENTARY MECHANICS.—Questions will be set on the composition and resolution of forces acting in one plane at a point, parallel forces, the mechanical powers, the properties of the centre of gravity, the composition and resolution of velocities and accelerations in one plane, rectilinear motion under uniform acceleration, Newton's laws of motion, Atwood's machine.

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in Euclid and in Algebra. Euclid and Algebra, if done well enough, are sufficient for the mark of distinction.

SECTION 10.—NATURAL SCIENCE :

I. (a) ELEMENTARY EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE.—Students will be expected to show that they have acquired a practical acquaintance with the elements of physical and chemical measurement, and with the properties of common substances as ascertained by simple experiments.‡ Three papers will be set, one of which will be a practical examination.

I. (b) ZOOLOGY.—Questions of an elementary nature will be set upon the following groups: Protozoa, Coelenterata, Annelida, Arthropoda, Mollusca, Echinodermata, Pisces, Amphibia, Reptilia, Aves, Mammalia.

Candidates will also be required to show an acquaintance with the external features and habits of the more familiar examples of these groups. Specimens will be provided for description, and special weight will be given to this part of the examination. Students should bring a pocket lens.

I. (c) BOTANY.—Elementary questions will be set upon the general morphology, physiology, and classification of plants, including (i.) the external forms of plants and the relation of the parts of plants to one another and to the

plant as a whole; (ii.) the absorption of food materials, and the various processes which are involved in the life functions of plants; (iii.) the elementary facts of plant structure so far as they are necessary to render intelligible the principles of vegetable physiology; (iv.) the outlines of the classification of the Plant Kingdom, and the classification of flowering plants with special reference to the following Natural Orders: Ranunculaceæ, Papaveraceæ, Cruciferae, Malvaceæ, Caryophyllaceæ, Leguminosæ, Rosaceæ, Umbelliferae, Compositæ, Primulaceæ, Boraginæ, Scrophulariaceæ, Labiatae, Liliaceæ, Amaryllidæ, Iridaceæ, Orchidaceæ.* Specimens (not necessarily confined to the Natural Orders specified above) will be provided for description, and special weight will be given to this part of the examination; arrangements will be made for Colonial centres. Students should bring a pocket lens and a dissecting needle.

I. (d) PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY.—Elementary questions will be set on the present physical condition of the Earth, and on the physical agencies modifying its surface or affecting the conditions of life upon it.† (Medal, see p. 86.)

II. (a) CHEMISTRY.†

II. (b) PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.†—*Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Friday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.*

II. (c) THE EXPERIMENTAL LAWS OF HEAT.

II. (d) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM.—The questions will be principally such as will test the candidates' knowledge of the subject as gained from a course of experimental instruction.†

II. (e) PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.—Candidates will be expected to show (i.) an elementary knowledge of the general build of the Body, and of the structure and functions of the organs and tissues concerned with the following processes: Muscular Movement, Circulation, Respiration, Digestion, Nutrition, and Excretion; and a rudimentary acquaintance with the structure and functions of the Nervous System and of the organs of the Special Senses; (ii.) an elementary acquaintance with the laws of Health, depending directly on the above specified physiological processes. The knowledge required for (i.) may be obtained from Foster's *Primer of Physiology* with Foster and Shore's *Physiology for Beginners*, or from similar elementary books; for (ii.) from Reynolds' *Primer of Hygiene*.

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in one of the subjects marked I. or in two of those marked II.; they may enter for not more than three subjects, not more than two of which may be from the group marked I. Students taking I. (a) may not take any of the other subjects in the section; no student may take two papers set at the same time in the Time Table.

Section 11.—(a) SHORTHAND. The students will take down passages read aloud, and will afterwards transcribe them. Passages will be dictated at the rates of fifty words and eighty words per minute. (Medal, see p. 86.)

(b) BOOKKEEPING. Questions will be set on Bookkeeping by double entry. Ruled forms will be provided for the candidates.

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in one at least of the subjects (a), (b).

Section 12.—(a) FREEHAND DRAWING, (b) MODEL DRAWING, (c) GEOMETRICAL DRAWING. To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in two of these three subjects. *Alternative papers are set in Model Drawing, one on Thursday, the other on Saturday; and in Geometrical Drawing, one on Monday, the other on Friday. Candidates must state in their forms of entry which of the alternatives they will take; only those candidates who are taking either Mechanics or Physiology and Hygiene may take Geometrical Drawing on Friday.*

Section 13.—MUSIC. Questions will be set on Notation; on Scales, Clefs, Keys, Intervals, Time; on the Marks and Terms generally employed in Music; on Cadences.‡ Exercises will be set, in not more than four parts, on Triads and their Inversions, in which the highest or the lowest part or both will be given. *Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Friday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.*

EXAMINATION OF SENIOR STUDENTS.

* In mentioning certain editions of the subjects selected for examination, the Syndicate have no desire to exclude from use other editions which now exist or may hereafter be prepared.

No one born before December 15, 1882, can be admitted as a senior student under the ordinary conditions. Those born before December 15, 1882, may be admitted to the examination, but they can obtain a Pass Certificate only.

PART I.—COMPULSORY.

Every student will be required to satisfy the Examiners in the principles and practice of Arithmetic.

PART II.

The examination will comprise the subjects mentioned in the following eleven sections. Every student will be required to satisfy the Examiners in at least three of the nine sections A—K, or in two of the sections A—K, together with either L or M. No student may enter for more than seven of the eleven sections. One at least of the four subjects of section A must be taken by all students, unless their parents or guardians object to their examination in that section.

[N.B.—No student can take two papers set at the same time in the Time Table.]

Section A.—RELIGIOUS KNOWLEDGE :

The examination will consist of questions on (a) *Joshua* i—xii, xxii—xxiv, *Judges* i—xii; (b) the Gospel of *St. Matthew*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Greek [or, for Jewish students only, *I Kings* xii—end, *II Kings*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Hebrew]; (c) the *Epistles to Timothy and Titus*; (d) the *Offices for Holy Communion, Baptism, and Confirmation* in the Book of Common Prayer: special attention must be paid to the Apostles' Creed. Section B.—ENGLISH :

(a) English Composition.

(b) English Grammar, including parsing and the analysis of sentences. Candidates will be expected to show some knowledge of the history of the English Language.

(c) History of England, from 1688 A.D. to 1832 A.D.

Section C.—LATIN (see notes A, B): Passages will be given for translation into English from **Virgil, Æneid IX.*; **Horace, Odes III.*; *Livy I. 1—41*; *Cicero, In Cutilinam I.—IV.* Students must select one verse and one prose subject from these four.

Section D.—GREEK (see note A): Passages will be given for translation into English from *Homer, Iliad XI.*; **Euripides, Heracleidæ*; *Thucydides VI., 1—51*; **Plato, Crito and Euthyphro.* Students must select one verse and one prose subject from these four.

Section E.—FRENCH (see notes A, B, C): Passages will be given for translation into English from **Molière, Les Précieuses Ridicules* and from **De Vigny, La Courne de Jonc.*

Section F.—GERMAN (see notes A, B, C): Passages will be given for translation into English from **Freytag, Die Journalisten*, and from **Kiehl, Die Gauerben and Die Gerechtigkeit Gottes.* In writing German in the examination, students are advised to use the English character, but the use of the German character is not forbidden.

Section G.—SPANISH (see notes A, B, C): Passages will be given for translation into English from *Galdós, Zaragoza* (obtainable from D. Nutt, Long Acre, London), and from *Cervantes, El Cuatitvo* (Hachette & Co.).

A.—In the examination in Latin, Greek, French, German, and Spanish: (1) Questions will be set on the language and subject-matter. Questions may also be set upon the metre of verse subjects. Without a fair knowledge of Grammar a student cannot pass. (2) One or more easy passages not contained in the books named will be set for translation into English, a vocabulary of unfamiliar words being given. Students are required to satisfy the Examiners in this part of the paper; but in cases of failure the translation of the unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty will be taken into account. (3) One or more passages of ordinary difficulty not contained in the books named will be set for translation into English. In order to obtain the mark of distinction students will be expected to do fairly well in this part of the paper.

B.—In the examination in Latin, French, German, and Spanish: One or more passages will be set for translation from English into the language. A student cannot obtain the mark of distinction in the language without satisfying the Examiners in this part of the paper.

C.—In the examination in French, German, and Spanish: Alternative questions will be provided for students who prefer to be examined in the language generally and not in any set book.

Section H.—MATHEMATICS. Every student who is examined in this section will be required to satisfy the Examiners in 1, Plane Geometry, viz., EUCLID, Book I, II, III, IV, VI, and XI to Prop. 21 inclusive; and in 2, ALGEBRA, viz., definitions and explanations of algebraical signs and terms, addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, theory of indices, greatest common measure and least common multiple, extraction of the square root, the solution of simple and quadratic equations, and of problems producing such equations, the elementary rules of ratio and proportion, arithmetical, geometrical, and harmonical progressions, permutations, combinations, the binomial theorem, elementary theorems on convergency of series, and the theory of logarithms. Some easy questions will also be set on the more advanced parts of Algebra. Proofs other than Euclid's will be admitted, but no proof of any proposition will be accepted which requires the assumption of anything not assumed by Euclid or proved in preceding propositions in Euclid. Euclid and Algebra, if done well enough, are sufficient for the mark of distinction.

Questions will also be set in the following subjects: 3, PLANE TRIGONOMETRY, inclusive of the use of the Exponential Theorem, De Moivre's Theorem, and the expansions of $\sin \theta$ and $\cos \theta$ in powers of θ . 4, CONIC SECTIONS treated both geometrically and by easy analytical geometry. 5, APPLIED MATHEMATICS, including ELEMENTARY STATICS, viz., the fundamental ideas of mass, weight, and density, the equilibrium or forces acting in one plane, the properties of the centre of gravity, the laws of friction, the mechanical powers, and the principle of virtual work; and ELEMENTARY DYNAMICS, viz., the laws of motion and simple applications of them, uniform and uniformly accelerated motion in a straight line, Atwood's machine, projectiles, impact of smooth bodies.

Section K.—NATURAL SCIENCE:

I. (a) ZOOLOGY.—Questions will be set in the subject as defined for Junior Students, but a knowledge of the characteristics of the main subdivisions of the groups mentioned will be required.

Candidates will also be expected to show a knowledge of the life-history of the following organisms and a practical acquaintance with their structure: Amoeba, Vorticella (Bell animalcule), Hydra, Earthworm, Crayfish, Frog. Specimens will be provided for description, and special weight will be given to this part of the examination. Students should bring a pocket lens.

I. (b) BOTANY.—Questions will be set in the subject as defined for Junior Students, with the addition of the following Natural Orders: Violaceæ, Geraniaceæ, Rubiaceæ, Dipsacæ, Campanulacæ, Ericaceæ, Solanaceæ, Euphorbiaceæ, Corylaceæ, Cyperaceæ, Gramineæ, and also the life-history of a typical Moss and Fern and of Pinus.† For distinction students will be expected to show also a practical acquaintance with the physiology, the life-history (including development), and the structure (morphology and minute anatomy) of the following organisms:—Saccharomyces (Yeast); Pleurococcus; Mucor (a Mould); Spirogyra; Fucus (Brown Seaweed); Fern; Flowering plant (Conifer, Monocotyledon, Dicotyledon). Students should bring a pocket lens and a dissecting needle.

I. (c) PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY.—Questions will be set on the present physical condition of the earth, and the physical agencies modifying it or affecting the conditions of life upon it.‡ (Medal, see page 6).

II. (a) CHEMISTRY.†

II. (b) PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.†—Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Friday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.

The examination in Senior Practical Chemistry can be held only at centres at which a properly equipped laboratory is available for the purpose.

- II. (c) The elementary principles of STATICS, DYNAMICS, AND HYDROSTATICS, as illustrated by simple experiments, common observation, or the action of well known machines.
- II. (d) The fundamental laws of HEAT and the experiments which illustrate them.
- II. (e) The fundamental laws of LIGHT and the experiments which illustrate them.
- II. (f) The fundamental laws of ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM and the experiments which illustrate them.
- II. (g) PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.—Questions will be set in the subject as defined for junior students, but a fuller and more detailed knowledge will be required. In addition to a knowledge of the subject as treated of in the books mentioned for Junior Students, a fuller acquaintance with the subject as treated in Huxley's *Elementary Physiology* or in any similar work, and in the more elementary parts of Willoughby's *Public Health* or Notter and Firth's *Hygiene* will be required.

To pass in the section students must pass in one of the subjects marked I. or in two of the subjects marked II.; they may enter for not more than three subjects, not more than two of which may be from the group marked I.; they may not take two papers set at the same time in the Time Table.

Section L.—DRAWING, (a) FREEHAND, (b) from MODELS, (c) in PERSPECTIVE, and (d) IMITATIVE COLOURING (water-colour). To pass in the section students must satisfy the Examiners in (a) and in one at least of the other divisions. *Alternative papers are set in Model Drawing, one on Thursday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.* No student may enter for both (c) and (d).

Section M.—MUSIC. Questions will be set on Notation; on Scales, Clefs, Keys, Intervals, Time; on the marks and terms generally employed in Music; on Cadences; on Triads and Chords of the Dominant Seventh and their Inversions; Single Suspensions; rhythmical Phrasing. Exercises will be set (on the above Chords) in not more than four parts, in which the highest or the lowest part or both will be given.

CLASS LIST AND CERTIFICATES.

The names of the boys who pass with credit will be arranged in three honour classes, the first class of juniors being further subdivided into two divisions. In each of these classes and divisions, and also in the list of those who pass to the satisfaction of the Examiners, yet not so as to deserve honours, the candidates will be arranged in alphabetical order under the several centres. After the name of every boy will be added the school (if any) from which he comes to attend the examination, and the name of his schoolmaster. *The names of those who pass the examination for juniors above the age of 16, and of those who pass the examination for seniors above the age of 19, will be placed in lists by themselves, in alphabetical order, not in any class of honours.* Similar classes and lists will be drawn up for girls, but the names of those who request that their names shall not appear will not be given.

Separate lists will also be given of those junior candidates under the age of 16, and of those senior candidates under the age of 19, who may specially distinguish themselves in particular parts of the examination, and in these lists the candidates will be arranged in order of merit.

The classes of honours are determined solely by the total number of marks obtained by the student. No marks are counted for any subject unless the student passes in that subject. Regard is paid to handwriting and spelling.

The students who pass with credit or satisfy the Examiners will receive certificates to that effect, which will be sent to them through the Local Secretaries. Every certificate will specify the subjects in which the student has passed with credit or satisfied the Examiners, and the class obtained, if any.

DETAILED REPORTS.

After the class lists have been issued in each year, the Syndicate will be prepared to inform the Principals of Schools, on receipt of a payment of one shilling for each student, of the manner in which their pupils have acquitted themselves in the several subjects in which they have been examined, describing each as *good, moderately good, &c.*; and also to place their pupils in order of merit among themselves in each subject and on the whole examination. If in any year applications are made by a school on behalf of more than fifty students, the fee payable for each student at that school after the first fifty will be sixpence.

EXEMPTIONS FROM VARIOUS EXAMINATIONS, &c.

[The Syndicate do not hold themselves responsible for any error caused by changes in requirements with which they have not been made acquainted. Students are referred to the published regulations of the respective institutions.]

A. UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE: PREVIOUS EXAMINATION.—The following are the conditions under which a candidate in the Senior Local Examination is entitled to exemption from parts or the whole of the previous examination (see^o on the following page):—

(1) From Part I. if the candidate has at one and the same examination shown a sufficient degree of merit in the Gospel (including the Greek text), in Latin, and in Greek.*

(2) From Part II. if the candidate has at one and the same examination shown a sufficient degree of merit in Arithmetic, in Euclid, in Algebra, in Religious Knowledge or Logic, and in English Composition.†

(3) From the additional subjects if the candidate has shown a sufficient degree of merit either in Applied Mathematics or in French or in German.

B. THE SCOTTISH UNIVERSITIES.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is under certain conditions entitled to exemption from portions of the Preliminary Examinations in Arts and Science and in Medicine of the Scottish Universities.

C. THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT.—The Code for day schools (1900) sanctions the engagement of holders of the Junior Certificate as pupil teachers for a shortened engagement (Article 40), and the recognition of holders of the Senior Certificate, who are over 18 years of age, as assistant teachers (Article 51 b).

D. GENERAL MEDICAL COUNCIL.—A Senior Certificate qualifies the holder for registration as a Medical or Dental Student if it includes English Grammar and Composition, Latin, Mathematics, and one of the following: Greek, French, German, Spanish; and a Junior Certificate if it includes English Grammar, Latin, Euclid, Books I., II., III., Algebra, and one of the following: Greek, French, German, Spanish.‡

* Exemption from Part I. is granted to a candidate who, being a native of Asia and not of European parentage, has at one and the same examination shown a sufficient degree of merit in Latin, in English Composition, in an English Author, and either in one of the Gospels in the authorized English Version or in English History; provided that it has been stated in the form of entry that the candidate claims exemption under this clause, and provided further that evidence satisfactory to the Syndicate is offered showing that the required conditions as to birth and parentage are fulfilled.

† A student who has attained the required standard in Arithmetic, in Euclid, in Algebra, and in Religious Knowledge or Logic, but not in English Composition, is entitled to exemption from Part II. of the previous examination, with the exception of the Essay paper.

‡ The General Medical Council announce that they will not accept any Junior Certificate unless the whole of the necessary subjects have been taken at the same time. This rule does not apply to Senior Certificates.

If Junior Students who wish to qualify for medical registration pass in Euclid, Books I., II., III., this will be entered on their certificates.

E. INCORPORATED LAW SOCIETY.—Persons who have obtained a Senior or a Junior Certificate are excused the Preliminary Examination before entering into Articles of Clerkship with solicitors.

F. ROYAL INSTITUTE OF BRITISH ARCHITECTS.—A Senior Certificate exempts the holder from such of the following subjects of the Preliminary Examination as are included in the Certificate:—English Composition, Arithmetic, Euclid, Algebra, Geography, English History, Latin, French, German, Applied Mathematics.

G. INSTITUTE OF CHARTERED ACCOUNTANTS.—Persons who have obtained a Senior or a Junior Certificate under certain conditions are exempted from the preliminary examination. For further information application may be made to the Secretary of the Institute.

H. THE PHARMACEUTICAL SOCIETY OF GREAT BRITAIN.—The Senior or the Junior Certificate entitles the holder to registration as a Pharmaceutical Student, provided that it includes English Grammar and Composition, Latin, French, or German, or Spanish, Euclid, and Algebra, passed at the same or at not more than two examinations.

I. THE ROYAL COLLEGE OF VETERINARY SURGEONS.—The requirements for admission to the Professional Examination are the same as those for registration as a Medical Student. (See D on page 85.)

J. LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL.—(a) Junior County Scholars vacating their Scholarships in December are allowed six months' extension of their Scholarships if they pass the Junior Local Examination during the tenure of their Scholarships. (b) Exemption from the preliminary parts of the examination for Intermediate County, Swanly Horticultural, and Domestic Economy Training Scholarships offered by the County Council may be secured in some cases by the Senior and in some cases by the Junior Certificate; particulars may be obtained from the Secretary of the Technical Education Board of the London County Council, 116, St. Martin's Lane, W.C.

Students desirous of obtaining exemption from Part I., Part II., or the additional subjects of the previous examination may, whether they already hold the certificate of the Syndicate or not, enter for those subjects alone that are required for the purpose. Students who already hold the certificate of the Syndicate and desire to add some one or more subjects in order to obtain exemption from a preliminary examination can enter for such subject or subjects alone.* In all such cases the ordinary fee for entrance must be paid.

PRIZES AND MEDALS.

The Syndicate will give prizes to the four candidates who pass the best examination among the senior and junior boys and the senior and junior girls, £12 to each of the two seniors and £8 to each of the two juniors.

The Council of the Royal Geographical Society offer four silver medals, one for the best senior in Geography (section B), one for the best Senior in Physical Geography (section K), one for the best junior in Geography (section 3), and one for the best junior in Physical Geography (section 10), if of sufficient merit.

Sir Isaac Pitman & Sons offer two medals, one silver and one bronze, to be awarded to the junior candidates who stand first and second in Shorthand. These medals are open for competition irrespective of the particular systems of Shorthand adopted by the candidates.

The above prizes and medals are not open to juniors above the age of 16 or to seniors above the age of 19.

THE ENGLISH UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP, 1902.

ONE Scholarship of the value of £200 per annum, tenable for four years, and an outfit allowance of £50, will be awarded by the Government of Ceylon on the results of a special examination, to be conducted by the Oxford and Cambridge School Examination Board, and which will be held at the Colombo School of Agriculture, commencing on the third Monday in March, 1902, and following days.

No candidate will be admitted to this examination who has not been resident in the Island for the five years next before the examination, or who was born on or before the 31st day of May, 1882, or who has not previously passed the "London Matriculation Examination" or the "Cambridge Senior Local Examination" with honours, or the "First in Arts Examination" of the Calcutta University. A certificate of birth must be furnished by candidates whose birth certificates are not already filed at the Office of Public Instruction.

N.B.—(1) Managers of Schools and Principals of Colleges should notify to the Director of Public Instruction on or before October 1, 1901, the number of candidates they intend to present for the examination, together with the particulars mentioned in the preceding paragraph.

(2) In future the certificate of a Medical Officer appointed by Government as to physical fitness to prosecute studies in the British Isles will be an essential condition of the English University Scholarship. For such a certificate the candidate should pay a fee of Rs. 10-50.

The subjects for the examination are as follows:—

1. (a) The English language.
- (b) English Essay.
2. In English History the special period in 1902 will be 1485–1603.
3. English Literature.—In 1902 the period will be 1760–1830. The subjects will be—Shakespeare: Twelfth Night; † Cymbelene; † Richard III. † Chaucer's Prologue and the Knight's Tale. Pope's Satires and Epistles (Clarendon Press Edition). Bacon's Essays.
4. Mathematics.
Arithmetic.—Plane Geometry, including the subjects treated in Euclid, Books I., II., III., IV., VI., and XI., to proposition 21 inclusive.
Algebra, as far as, but not including, the Theory of Numbers.
Plane Trigonometry, including De Moivre's Theorem and its simpler applications.
Elementary Geometrical Conic Sections.
Analytical Geometry: (a) Equations in rectangular and Polar Co-ordinates of (1) the straight line; (2) the Circle; (3) the Parabola; (4) the Ellipse; (5) the Hyperbola, and the properties of the same; (b) Change of Axes.
5. Applied Mathematics.
Statics.—Composition, Resolution, and Equilibrium of Forces: (1) acting at a point; (2) acting in a plane; (3) acting in parallel lines. The properties of the Centre of Gravity; the Laws of Friction; the Mechanical Powers; and the Principle of Virtual Work.

* The General Medical Council will not accept any Junior Certificate unless the whole of the necessary subjects have been taken at the same time. This rule does not apply to Senior Certificates.

† These subjects will be repeated in the Examination of 1903. In the Examination of 1903 an easy passage will be set for translation from English into Greek.

Dynamics.—Definition and Measurement of Mass, Force, Velocity, Acceleration, Momentum, Work, and Energy, Composition and Resolution of Velocities and Accelerations. Laws of Motion. Uniform and uniformly accelerated motion in a straight line. Free motion of projectiles under the action of gravity. Circular motion of particles. Simple cases of impact.

Hydrostatics.—Nature, intensity, and transmission of pressure in Liquids. Pressure of Liquids in equilibrium under the action of gravity. Equilibrium of Solids floating or immersed in gravitating Liquids. Specific gravities of substances. Solid and Liquid. The Laws of Elastic Fluids and the principle of the barometer, thermometer, siphon, diving bell, manometer, and the various pumps.

6. Science.—Not more than two of the following sections:—

(a) Inorganic Chemistry, Theoretical.

The chief chemical and physical properties of the atmosphere, and its relation to animal and vegetable life. Combustion, flame.

The chief chemical and physical properties of water, natural waters, their principal impurities, hardness. Hydrogen Peroxide.

The chief sources and properties of hydrogen and oxygen, and of carbon, sulphur, phosphorus, nitrogen. Chlorine, bromine, and iodine, and their chief compounds with hydrogen and oxygen.

Allotropy of elements.

Combining proportions by weight and volume. Atomic theory. Avogadro's law symbols, equations, nomenclature. Simple chemical calculations relating to weight and volume.

Nature of salts.

The general characteristics of metals as a class. The chief sources and properties of silver, copper, mercury, lead, aluminium, iron, zinc, calcium, and sodium; and of their principal oxides, carbonate, sulphates, chlorides, and nitrates.

(b) Inorganic Chemistry, Practical, including Analysis (qualitative only) of mixtures of not more than two Acids and two Bases. Simple problems or exercises on the subjects of the syllabus in theoretical chemistry.

(c) Heat.—Expansion of Solids, Liquids, and Gases. Laws relating thereto. Thermometry, Calorimetry, Specific Heat, Liquefaction, and Solidification, Vaporization and Condensation, Ebullition, Properties of Vapour (saturated and unsaturated), Latent Heat, Change of state, transmission of Heat by Conduction, Convection, and Radiation. The mechanical equivalent of Heat.

Light.—Propagation of Light in straight lines in uniform media. Velocity of Light and modes of determining it. Intensity of Light, its variation with distance. Shadows. Photometry, Reflection, and Refraction at plane surfaces. Formation of images by plane and spherical mirrors and by simple lenses (excluding aberration). Decomposition of white light by a prism. The prismatic spectrum.

(d) Electricity.—The two electrical states and their mutual relations. Attraction and Repulsion, Conduction and Insulation. Electrostatic Induction. The common plate and cylinder electrical machines. Electrical condensers. Distribution of electricity upon conductors. Current electricity. Common forms of battery. Ohm's Law and its simple applications. Heating. Chemical and magnetic effects of electric currents. Simple experimental methods of generating currents by relative motion of conductors and magnets. The simple laws of magneto-electric induction.

Magnetism.—Simple experimental properties of magnets. Effect of a magnet on a neighbouring piece of soft iron or of hard steel. Terrestrial magnetism; behaviour of a declination needle and of a dipping needle at different parts of the earth's surface.

(e) Botany.—The elements of the Morphology and Physiology of the flowering plant. The parts of the flower and their functions with special reference to fertilization. Fruits and seeds, with their provisions for preservation and dispersion. Elementary facts in the nutrition of the flowering plant. Classification of flowering plants with special reference to the principal natural orders. The structure and properties of the cell treated from an elementary point of view. The description of the flowering plant in technical language. The paper will include questions on the Flora of Ceylon.
