WEST RIDGEWAY.

W HEREAS by a Proclamation dated the Eighth day of January, One thousand Nine hundred and One, We, the Governor of the Island of Ceylon, by virtue of the powers in Us vested, did proclaim and declare that from that day forth and until We should make further order in that behalf Martial Law should prevail and be administered to all persons within the Camp situated in the village of Ragama in the Ragam pattu of the Alutkuru korale south, in the Western Province, the limits whereof were defined by the said Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said limits:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, by virtue of the powers in Us vested, do hereby amend the limits of the said Camp as defined by the said Proclamation of the Eighth day of January, One thousand Nine hundred and One, by adding to the said limits the section of the Railway line between Veyangoda and Kelaniya stations as being a place in which Martial Law shall prevail and be administered.

Given at Trincomalee, in the said Island, this Nineteenth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and One.

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said limits:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, by virtue of the powers in Us vested, do hereby further amend the limits of the said Camp as defined in the schedule to the said Proclamation of the Twenty-first day of January, One thousand Nine hundred and One, by adding to the said limits the section of railway line between Diyatalawa and Haputale stations as being a place in which Martial Law shall prevail and be administered.

CIVIL ENGINEERING TELEGRAPHY AND ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING. DEPARTMENTS OF SURVEYING AND LEVELLING, ( MECHANICAL ENGINEERING.

1. Age and Conditions of Admission .- Candidates for admission to any of the departments of the College must fill in and present to the Superintendent of the College the "Form of Application," giving in their own handwriting the particulars required therein, and the signatures of two persons who have personal knowledge of them and who are prepared to answer inquiries as to their character. They must be not less than 16 years of age on the first day of the year they propose to enter. They must present a certificate from the Principal of the School or College they attended last, and such other certificates of educations of the proposes. tional attainments from public examining bodies as they may possess. They must pass a medical examination for physical fitness and an entrance examination for sufficient general knowledge. Candidates who hold certificates of having passed the Senior Cambridge or London University Examinations will be exempted from the entrance examinations in all subjects except the prescribed vernacular subjects, if their certificates show that they have passed in mathematics. The applications of those who show that they possess the necessary qualifications will be submitted to His Excellency the Governor, who will nominate a sufficient number to be admitted as students of the College in the department they select.

number to be admitted as students of the College in the department they select.

2. Free and Deposits, &c.—The fees will be paid in all cases for one year in advance, and a deposit in addition to cover the cost of instruments and books will be made on admission. Fees for the year and the deposit on admission must be paid before the student joins any of the classes.

3. Instruments and Books, &c.—Certain instruments, tools, books, &c., which the students are required to possess (see the schedule attached to syllabus of each department) will be supplied to them at economical rates and the cost debited accounts but they may purphase elsewhere so long as the articles are of approved. to deposit, but they may purchase elsewhere so long as the articles are of approved

kind. The balance of the deposit, after providing what is necessary, and after deducting the cost of damage to College property through culpable negligence or malice, will be refunded at the end of the course. Students are not to borrow from or lend to one another in class any of the instruments, tools, books, &c., which are enumerated and prescribed for their own possession.

4. Hours of Study.—The registers will be marked at the commencement of

every class, and at other times if necessary, and every student must be in his place then. The hours of study are from 10.30 A.M. to 12.30 P.M., and from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. every week-day, except Saturday. There will be surveying classes for engineering students on Saturday mornings during certain terms of the course.

5. Note Books.—Every student is required to prepare in books of the prescribed kind the laboratory and lecture notes and home exercises with regularity, fulness, neatness, and accuracy. Special attention is to be paid to the note book work. All note books are to be brought to the College daily, and be ready for

work. All note books are to be brought to the College daily, and be ready for reference or examination at any time during working hours.

6. Care of Students' Property.—Instruments, books, and other personal property when not in immediate use may be given in care of the College Sergeant at his office during working hours. But no responsibility will be taken for safe custody of such property after working hours; articles left over night will lie at risk of the owner. Students are recommended to provide themselves with locked handbags marked with their names. Every student should also provide himself with towel and soap.

7. Drill.—Every student must attend drill at the prescribed times. Those students who elect to join the College detachment of the Ceylon Volunteers and make themselves efficient each year will not be required to attend the other drills

in order to qualify for the diploma.

8. Vacation.—The usual vacations will be observed at Easter, in August, and at Christmas. Students whose course includes surveying and levelling will attend for a fortnight at camp in one of the August vacations.

- 9. Examinations.—Examinations will be held three times a year, and the place of the student in order of merit determined accordingly. But due account will be taken besides, in determining the order of merit, of the thoroughness of the home work as shown by the note books, regularity of attendance and general
- 10. Diplomas.—Diplomas will be granted to those students in each department of the College who take the full course and who satisfy the Examiners at the term and final examinations.

11. Irregularities.—Reports of absence or irregularity of any kind will be made to parents or guardians.

#### Regulations for the Admission of Ceylonese to certain Appointments.

#### (1.)-THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

1. All appointments will be made in the first instance to the Head Overseer Grade, without exception.

Candidates will be selected in the first instance by a competitive examination (viz., the entrance examination of the Ceylon Technical College, unless they hold certificates which exempt them), and having been pronounced physically fit and having gained the nomination of His Excellency the Governor will become students at the Technical College in a special course of training in Civil Engineering, and will become subject to the regulations of that Institution for not less than two years. They must gain the diploma of the College duly attested by the officer appointed to represent the Public Works Department at the final examination of the course. They will be required to serve a further two years in the Government Factory or Railway Works, or other approved engineering works in Ceylon, and after completing that term of service satisfactorily selection will be made from among them for posts as vacancies may occur in the Head

will be made from among them for posts as vacancies may occur in the Head Overseer Grade.

\*Students of the Technical College who have gained the diploma of the College will, during their service of two years in the Government Factory or Railway Works or other approved engineering works in Ceylon, be paid during the first year of such service at the rate of 75 cents per diem, and during the second year at the rate of Re. 1.25 per diem, provided they pursue their studies with due diligence and their conduct is satisfactory.

3. Candidates must not be less than 16 years nor more than 18 years of age on the first day of the year in which the entrance examination for admission to the College is held, and must satisfy the Examiners that they are duly qualified in respect of health and character. They must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight, and be otherwise physically qualified for service, and they will be called on to undergo a medical examination to test these points.

4. No Candidate will be admitted to the competition who has not previously satisfied the Examiners in a preliminary examination in handwriting, ortho-

satisfied the Examiners in a preliminary examination in handwriting, ortho

graphy, and arithmetic (including vulgar and decimal fractions), and in colloquial Tamillor, Sinhalese. The subjects of the entrance examination are:—

(a) English Composition; English History; Geography.
 (b) Mathematics: Algebra (up to and including quadratic equations)
 Geometry (the first two books of Euclid).

Candidates who hold certificates of having passed the Senior Cambridge or London University Examinations will be exempted from this examination in all subjects except colloquial Tamil and Sinhalese, if their certificates show that

they have passed in mathematics.

6. To enter the higher grades of Inspector or Third Grade District Engineer a qualifying examination must be passed, which will be known as the "Junior Examination," in the following subjects:—

Arithmetic.—Up to decimal fractions. Algebra.—To quadratics inclusive. Geometry.—Four books of Euclid and deductions.

Mensuration.—Taking out quantities and estimating.

Surveying and Levelling.—Chain surveying only.

Drawing.—Plan drawing and tracing.

The examination in the last three subjects will be held at the Provincial Headquarters of the Province in which the candidate may happen to be stationed. 7. To rise from the third grade into the second and qualify for the first grade, a final examination must be passed, which will be known as the "Senior Examination," in the following subjects:—

Appointments to the third grade of Surveyors in the Surveyor-General's Department, who are paid at the rate of Rs. 1,200 per annum, will be made by selection as vacancies occur from holders of the diploma in Civil Engineering of the Technical College gained in the College course immediately preceding the year such vacancies occur; but of the actual vacancies in that grade such holders are to be eligible only for every alternate one in rotation with those candidates in the Department at the time who can qualify by examination and seniority of service for promotion to that grade; that is to say, of two vacancies in the third grade, one is to be filled by selection from among outside candidates from the Technical College, and the other from among candidates in the ranks of the Department who can qualify for such premotion, and so on alternately with every vacancy which may occur in that grade.

Appointments directly to the third grade from among the eligible candidates

from the Technical College will be made without further examination, and they will be eligible for promotion from grade to grade, according to merit, along with the other officers of the Department of the same grades; but to qualify for promotion out of the first grade Surveyors, who are paid at the rate of Rs. 3,200 per annum, into the senior grades, they as well as all other officers of the same standing must pass the departmental qualifying examination instituted

for that purpose.

Candidates from the Technical College for appointment to such vacancies are eligible for selection if they gain the diploma in Civil Engineering in the College course immediately before such vacancies occur, and if their diploma bear the signature of the officer appointed to represent the Surveyor-General at the examinations affecting the award of them.

Candidates for these appointments must be not more than 18 years of age on the first day of the year they enter the College. They must pass a medical examination for physical fitness and an entrance examination the following

Their course of training at the Technical College will extend over two years, and they will be subject to the regulations of that Institution for that period.

All officers of the Department who have passed the departmental qualifying examination are eligible for appointments in the senior grades up to the rank of Superintendent of Surveys on Rs. 6,500 per annum, but vacancies in the senior grades will be filled up alternately from the Department and from Cooper's Hill College.

#### (3.)-THE TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE DEPARTMENTS OF THE POSTMASTER-GENERAL

All Ceylonese candidates for admission to the Telegraph and Telephone Departments of the Postmaster-General are required to present the diploma of the Ceylon Technical College gained in the department of Telegraphy of that College and bearing the signature of the officer appointed to represent the Postmaster-General at the final examination of that course, or other diploma or certificate showing at least equal proficiency in the holder.

Appointments will be made as vacancies may occur by selection from among candidates possessing such diplomas or certificates, and who have gained the nomination of His Excellency the Governor.

The commencing salary will be Rs. 360, but this will be followed by promotion

to a class of Rs. 500 rising by annual increments to Rs. 900, with allowances, in less than ten years. There will be 23 more fixed appointments of this kind than there were before, making in all 97 posts to be recruited in this way. Then, by promotion to the next class a salary of Rs. 1,100 is attained, with annual increments thereafter until Rs. 1,500 is reached. The highest posts to which present candidates will be eligible as the result of merit and efficiency carry with them salaries rising to Rs. 2,400, and there will be 8 such posts. Two special appointments carry salaries of Rs. 2,500 to Rs. 3,000.

All appointments will be made in the first instance to the lowest grade. Promotion to the higher grades will be subject to merit and seniority of service in the Department.

Candidates who hold certificates of having passed the Senior Cambridge or London University Examinations will be exempted, if their certificates show that they have passed in mathematics.

The training at the Technical College shall extend over two years, and the candidates will be subject to the regulations of that institution during that period.

The commencing salary will be Rs. 360, but there will be fixed annual increments which will increase the salary to Rs. 720 in less than six years. There will be 155 fixed appointments of this kind in the Department to be recruited in this way. Then, by promotion a salary of Rs. 800 is attained, with annual increments thereafter until Rs. 1,100 is reached, and further promotion to a class of Rs. 1,100 by annual increments to Rs. 1,600. The highest posts to which present candidates may aspire to attain by efficiency and merit carry with them salaries rising to Rs. 2,500; there will probably be 12 such posts with salaries of Rs. 1,700 to Rs. 2,200, and 5 with salaries of Rs. 2,000 to Rs. 2,500. they have passed in mathematics.

No candidate will be admitted to the examination who has not previously satisfied the Examiners in handwriting, orthography, arithmetic including vulgar and decimal fractions, and in colloquial Tamil or Sinhalese.

Candidates who hold certificates of having passed the Senior Cambridge or

London University Examinations will be exempted from this examination in all subjects except colloquial Tamil or Sinhalese, if their certificates show that they have passed in mathematics.

The training at the Technical College shall extend over two years, and the candidates will be subject to the regulations of that institution during that period.

Third Grade at Rs. D٥. Do. Second Grade at Rs.

First Grade (after two years' apprenticeship) at Rs. Do.

N.B.—The number of appointments and the salaries will be notified later.

#### Regulations for Granting the License of the Surveyor-General to Students of the course in Surveying and Levelling at the Ceylon Technical College.

Students in the department of Surveying and Levelling of the Technical College, who pass the prescribed course and gain the diploma at the final examination of the course held at the Technical College, and satisfy as well the officer appointed to represent the Surveyor-General at that examination, shall be eligible for the license and for registration as Surveyors or as Surveyors and Levellers without further examination and payment of the fees prescribed in section 5 of the without further examination and payment of the fees prescribed in section 5 of the Ordinance No. 15 of 1889. Such candidates for the license must be more than 21 years of age when they apply, and they must pay the registration fee and the stamp duty on the license as provided for in sections 2 and 7 of the Ordinance. The following addition to the Regulations, dated 31st May, 1897, published in the Gazette of the 4th June, 1897, regarding the admission of Ceylonese to the Public Works Department, has been approved by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, and is published for general information:—

Ceylonese who have qualified by (a) serving three years as articled pupils to a member of the Institute of Civil Engineers, or (b) by obtaining a certificate from the governing body of any of the numerous recognized colleges for instruction in Civil Engineering, that they have satisfactorily and diligently attended a two years' course of lectures and thereafter served as articled pupils to a Member of the Institute of Civil Engineers for one year, and in each case after the completion of their articles had from 11 to 2 years' experience in work of construction. tion of their articles had from 12 to 2 years' experience in work of construction, may be appointed, on vacancies occurring, on satisfying the Consulting Engineers for the Colony of their proficiency and suitability.
