WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 1 of "The Youthful Offenders' Ordinance, 1886," it is enacted that the said Ordinance shall come into operation only in such circuits, districts, or divisions of the Island defined for the purposes of the administration of Justice, and at such time or respective times as the Governor in Executive Council shall by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* from time to time or at any time appoint:

### RULES.

1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Deltota shall slaughter cattle at any place other than the public slaughter-house on Vedehetta estate, Galaha, referred to in the Proclamation dated January 6, 1901.
2. The building situated 175 ft. to the south-east of the said slaughter-house is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of the planting district of Deltota shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than twenty-four hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
3. No cattle shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Government Agent, notice of which shall be posted at the slaughter-house, nor until after they have been inspected and approved by the District Medical Officer of Deltota as fit to be slaughtered for human food.
4. Cattle rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
5. The said District Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said District Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any cattle which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said District Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.
8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house except under the directions of the said District Medical Officer any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.

9. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house :—

HIS Excellency the Governor, acting with the advice of the Executive Council under section 9 of Ordinance No. 24 of 1889, has been pleased to cancel the rules made under the provisions of the Village Communities' Ordinances No. 26 of 1871, No. 12 of 1880, No. 8 of 1882, and No. 34 of 1884, respectively, for the several divisions of Nawadun, Atakalan, Kolonna, Kuruwiti, Kadawata, Meda, and Kukul korales of the District of Ratnapura in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, and published in the *Government Gazette* No. 4,743 of 27th August, 1886, No. 4,757 of 12th November, 1886, No. 4,758 of 19th November, 1886, and No. 4,814 of 7th October, 1887, respectively.

And the following rules made under section 6 of the Ordinance No. 24 of 1889 as amended by Ordinance No. 9 of 1894 by the Village Committees duly elected under section 16 of the said Ordinance No. 24 of 1889, by the inhabitants of the sub-divisions of Nawadun, Atakalan, Kolonna, Kuruwiti, Kadawatu, Meda, and Kukul korales of the chief headmen's divisions called the District of Ratnapura, in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, have been approved by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and are published for general information under section 7 of the said Ordinance.

1. The works mentioned in sub-section 1 of section 6 of Ordinance No. 24 of 1889 shall be effected and maintained within the sub-division by the joint labour of the inhabitants of the sub-division and of those interested as hereinafter provided.

2. The Committee shall decide whether a person is an inhabitant within the meaning of the Ordinance or whether he is interested in the work.



3. The Committee shall determine the number of days' labour which each person liable to contribute shall contribute towards the work either in person or by substitute or by a money payment. Provided that no person shall under this rule be required to give more than ten days' labour in each year.

4. The Chairman and Committee of the sub-division shall frame a list of works intended to be constructed, maintained, regulated, and protected under sub-section 1 of section 6 of the Village Communities' Ordinance, 1889, showing (a) those works in which the whole sub-division is interested and (b) those works in which particular villages only of the sub-division are interested. The Committee may amend this list at their discretion.

5. The Chairman and Committee of the sub-division shall decide the nature and extent of the work to be performed under the preceding rules, the time when such works shall be performed, and the number of days' labour that each person liable shall contribute to it. The Chairman shall also decide in which way the supervision of the labourers working thereon shall be arranged for, and shall appoint and authorize persons to supervise them.

6. Any person liable to contribute labour under these rules may commute the same by a money payment of 32 cents for each day's labour which he is liable to contribute.

7. Priests of all religions, immigrant agricultural labourers employed on estates, pioneers employed under the Public Works Department, paupers and persons physically incapable of work shall be exempted from contributing labour under these rules.

8. All persons liable to work under this Ordinance shall be given not less than eight days' notice, and such notice may be published by beat of tom-tom or by putting up a list of names in a conspicuous place in the village.

9. Before the 31st day of January in each year the Arachchi shall make a list of the names of all the inhabitants living in his wasama at the time, as also a list of the names of all the males between the ages of 18 and 55 years, and submit the same to the Committee. The Arachchi shall also ask every male resident between the ages of 18 and 55 whether he elects to perform labour or commute the same by a money payment, and make an entry to that effect in the list. The Committee shall issue a form to be adopted by the Arachchi for his list.

10. The Arachchi shall, not later than the 15th of January, issue notices to those who elect to pay calling upon them to pay before the 30th of April. No payment should be received after that date without the written order of the Committee.

11. No person shall be allowed to commute labour by a money payment after the 30th April. The Arachchi shall notice him to work on the days and at places fixed by the Committee.

12. Any person who may be ill for more than nine months in the year will be entitled to exemption, but no one shall claim exemption on the ground of illness when noticed. In that case he shall report his illness to the Arachchi and shall perform labour as soon as he recovers.

13. The name of any person whom the Committee shall decide to be an inhabitant may be added at any time to the list, provided that he has not discharged his liability elsewhere.

14. The Chairman of a Village Committee shall issue orders to the village headman to notice for work all persons liable to contribute labour in accordance with rule 4 residing within his division. It shall be the duty of the headman to deliver into the charge of the person authorized by the Chairman to supervise the work, the labourers ordered by the Village Committee to work. The person so appointed to supervise shall report to the village headman, at the completion of the work, the names of contributors of labour who have deserted or who have failed to show due diligence at the work. It shall be the duty of the village headman to prosecute before the Village Committee all persons liable to contribute to the work who have failed to attend the work or to pay the commuted value of their labour or to show proper diligence and due regard to the orders given to them respecting the work.

15. The due and regular discharge by the Chairman and members of the Village Committee appointed under section 16 of the Ordinance, and the due discharge by the village headman of noticing for work persons liable to contribute labour as required by rule 14, the due performance of their legitimate duty by the vel-vidane, and the regular publication when required of notices by the village tom-tom beater, shall be held and considered to be a sufficient contribution on their part of labour under these rules, and no further contribution of labour shall be required from them.

16. All village paths, edandu, ambalam, bridges, wells, bathing places, and other village properties shall be in charge of the village headman of the wasama, and it shall be the duty of the headman to report to the Committee any obstruction that may be made or repair that may be required in respect of the same. In failure of duty in connection therewith, a headman shall, on conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding five rupees.

#### *Education.*

17. The headman of each village shall prepare a statement showing what schools, if any, the children, male or female, of each village in the sub-division should attend.

18. If at the request of the Chairman and the Village Committee of a sub-division, or on the application of 25 or more inhabitants of any village or adjacent villages, the Government Agent is satisfied that all conditions necessary for the proper carrying on of the school exist, it shall be the duty of the Committee to open a school in a suitable place and to maintain it and the buildings required therefor in good order.

19. All children between the ages of 7 and 14 years within villages for which a school is specified as above described shall be sent by their parents or guardians to the school so specified. No parent or guardian shall fail, without sufficient excuse, to send any such child to the school with reasonable frequency and regularity.

#### *Cattle.*

20. The word "cattle" in these rules shall include both black cattle and buffaloes, and the word "beast" also shall refer to both species.

21. If the Government shall, on the application of the Chairman and Village Committee or of the inhabitants, set apart for the grazing of the village cattle any waste Crown lands as communal pasture lands, it shall be the duty of the Chairman and Village Committee to (a) contribute labour for the effectual clearing of the land of all jungle growth, with the exception of trees of one cubit and upwards in circumference; (b) to dig a ditch or make a fence around the land so set apart, and to keep the ditch or fence so made in proper order; (c) to keep the communal pasture properly cleared and weeded; and (d) to dig one or more water holes for the use of the cattle when required.

22. The Chairman and the Village Committee shall frame and publish a list for the sub-division of all communal pasture lands so set apart and cared for, specifying which pasture lands are for the use of the cattle of each village, and may amend the list at their discretion, in which case due notice of such amendment shall be given.

23. No inhabitant shall permit his cattle to trespass on a communal pasture land not assigned by such list for the use of his village.

24. It shall be left to the Committee to decide in cases of cattle trespass whether local custom prescribes that the land in question should be fenced or not.

25. No cattle shall be tethered upon any cart road, or bridle, road, or village path, or in such a manner as to allow them to stray on such roads or paths.

#### *Cattle Disease.*

26. Every owner of cattle or herdsman who has a case of contagious or infectious disease among his cattle, shall report the same to the village headman without delay, and such headman shall report the same forthwith to the Ratemahatmaya.

27. The owner or person in charge of any animal attacked with any contagious or infectious disease shall give immediate notice to the headman of the village in which the animal may then be.

28. The village headman shall at once have the diseased animal removed to a well-ventilated hospital shed, and shall appoint a person to tend, feed, and treat it.

29. The village headman shall at once apply to the Chairman of the Committee for a supply of disinfectants and medicines.

30. The keeper of the hospital shed shall clean it twice daily, and shall carefully remove all excreta, which shall be buried or burnt immediately after removal.

31. No animal shall be removed from the hospital shed until the Chairman of the Committee shall have certified that it is free from disease.

32. The village headman shall cause diseased animals which die in the hospital shed, and all animals which shall be found dead in his division, the owners or persons in charge of such animals being unknown, to be buried at least 6 ft. below the surface of the ground.

33. The village headman may, within the limits of the jurisdiction, seize any animal suffering from a contagious or infectious disease, and may enter any premises in which he suspects an animal affected with such disease to be, and may cause such animal to be removed to the hospital shed.

34. The owner or person in charge of any animal shall not let it loose while it is suffering from any infectious disease.

35. The owner or person in charge of healthy animals shall not suffer such animals to approach the hospital shed.

36. No person shall remove or cause to be removed any animal suffering from a contagious or infectious disease from the village in which such animal was, when first attacked by such disease, to any other village.

37. It shall be the duty of the village headman to cause the hospital shed and all appliances used in treating or feeding diseased animals therein to be burnt as soon as the Chairman of the Committee shall be satisfied that the contagious or infectious disease no longer prevails in the village.

38. The cost of erecting hospital sheds, the wages of keepers, the fees to headmen, and the cost of supplying medicines and disinfectants, food and straw for the use of the diseased animals, shall be paid from the communal fund upon the order of the Village Committee.

39. No person shall disinter the carcase of any animal which has died of any infectious or contagious disease or remove the flesh or hide or horns of any such animal.

40. It shall be the duty of all persons in charge of cattle which may die of disease in an infected area to burn or bury or cause to be burned or buried, within 6 hours after death, the carcasses of the cattle so dying, the grave in cases of burial being at least 6 ft. deep from the surface and the carcase being covered with quicklime, when procurable, before the grave is filled in.

(a) Every person who finds the carcase of any cattle lying dead and unburied shall report the same to the nearest headman, who shall cause such carcase to be forthwith burned or buried in manner aforesaid.

(b) The dung of all diseased cattle found on any land shall be collected and buried by the possessor or occupier thereof.

(c) It shall not be lawful for any person to preserve the hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of the carcase of any cattle dying of disease.

41. No person shall expose diseased or suspected cattle in any market, gala, garden, or other public or private places.

42. No person shall carry or cause to be carried along any line of road or river, or in any truck, vessel, or boat, cart or otherwise any diseased or suspected cattle, or the dung, hide, or horns of such cattle.

43. No person shall carry, drive, or lead, or cause to be carried, driven, or led along any thoroughfare, road, or highway any diseased or suspected cattle.

(a) It shall not be lawful for any person in charge of diseased or suspected cattle to allow them to drink or bathe at any running stream or at any pond or reservoir.



*Miscellaneous.*

44. The boundaries of all private gardens shall be marked by fences, ditches, stones, or posts.
45. It shall be the duty of every inhabitant to keep clear of jungle a space of ten fathoms round his house, provided that trees more than a cubit in girth, and trees or plants of any size planted for use or ornament, need not be cut down. Likewise they shall drain the gardens when ordered so to do by the Chairman of the Village Committee and keep those gardens clean and tidy.
46. No person who has the right of fishing in any waters of the sub-division shall kill fish by means of poison, dynamite, or any other means not in accordance with local custom.
47. No person shall befoul an ela, well, or spring of water used for drinking purposes.
48. No person affected with a contagious disease shall bathe at a public well or place at which the inhabitants draw water or bathe.
49. Wherever by ancient custom the width of a public path across a paddy field is not less than 3 ft., no person shall cut such path with the intention of narrowing it to a less width.
50. No person shall obstruct any village path, road, river, water-course or ela, or through carelessness or malice injure any village path, road, river, water-course, ela, or other village property.
51. No person shall set spring-guns or traps in places frequented by people or in the neighbourhood of footpaths.
52. It shall be the duty of any person through whose land a public path other than a Village Committee road passes to keep such path free from overgrowth of jungle.
53. No person shall set one cock to fight with another cock, or aid and abet any other person in so doing.
54. No person shall be voluntarily present in any house, office, room, or building, or boat, vessel, or vehicle, or in or upon any public street, or road, or in any tavern, drinkshop, or distillery, or in any common gaming place, where betting or playing a game of chance for a stake is carried on, or is known to be about to begin.
55. No person found in any such house, office, room, building, boat, vessel, vehicle, tavern, liquorshop, distillery, or place, shall be in possession of cards, dice, balls, counters, tables, boards, or other instruments or appliances of gaming.
56. No person shall race with carts on public thoroughfares.
57. A fund shall be created, to be called the communal fund, and shall consist of all fines recovered under Ordinance No. 24 of 1889, and under the foregoing rules, of the proceeds of sale of any property under these rules, and of donations and subscriptions from Government or private persons.
58. The moneys of this fund shall be deposited in the Ratnapura Kachcheri, with the Government Agent, to the credit separately of the Committee of each sub-division.
59. Such moneys shall be applied to the necessary expenses of carrying out these rules or to any other purposes in furtherance of purely village interests as the Committee concerned may determine.
60. The Committee shall hold meetings in places to be determined by them.
61. The Ratamahatmaya may at any time convene a meeting, but the Committee shall meet regularly once every quarter on a day to be appointed by them.

THE following rules of procedure to be observed by the Village Committees in the trial of breaches of rules have been made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under section 50 of Ordinance No. 24 of 1889, and are published for general information.

1. Complaints with respect to breaches of rules may be made verbally or in writing by a private party or a local headman to the Chairman of the Village Committee.
2. On receipt of a complaint the date of trial shall be fixed and a list of witnesses filed in the case.
3. A separate charge shall be instituted for each offence.
4. If attendance of parties can be secured cases should be tried forthwith.
5. The Committee may postpone the hearing of cases to any place or date without unreasonable delay.
6. It shall be competent for the Chairman to hold meetings of the Committee whenever and at whatever place he considers necessary for the convenience of the parties concerned.
7. If on the day appointed the complainant is absent without due cause shown the case may be struck off the list of pending cases.
8. If a defendant without due cause contumaciously refuses to attend after service of summons, the Chairman and Village Committee may hear and decide the case in his absence, or such Chairman may issue a warrant, upon which it shall be lawful for the village headman to cause the defendant to be arrested and brought before the Village Committee. The Chairman shall have like power to issue a warrant against a complainant or witness failing to attend when summoned.
9. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to administer oaths according to law.
10. If the Committee, after hearing evidence, is of opinion that the case is a frivolous and vexatious one, the complainant may be fined as provided in section 32 of the Ordinance and part of the fine paid to the accused to defray his expenses.

11. The Committee may appoint three or more members to inspect any land, irrigation work, or thing in dispute and make their report to the Committee, which will be recorded by the Chairman as a part of the evidence upon proof of such report.

12. When a person is arrested on a warrant issued under rule 8, such person shall be forthwith taken before the Chairman who issued the warrant, and the Chairman may in his discretion admit him to bail to appear before the Village Committee at its next sitting. Such bail may be with or without security, but the amount thereof shall not exceed Rs. 50.

13. When the party apprehended is unable to give bail, he shall not be detained in custody for a longer period than forty-eight hours.

14. When the Chairman of a Village Committee has passed sentence of fine only, in pursuance of the powers in him vested by Ordinance No. 24 of 1889, the party accused shall pay such fine forthwith, and in default of his making such payment the Chairman may issue his warrant of commitment for a term not exceeding fourteen days, or in his discretion may allow the accused to perform labour on any Village Committee work for a number of days not exceeding twice that for which sentence of imprisonment may be passed.

15. In case of any difference of opinion between the Chairman and the Committeemen or any of them, the opinion of the Chairman shall prevail and shall be taken as the decision in the case, but in every such case a record shall be made of such difference of opinion.

16. When a complaint is made, if the attendance of the defendant can be easily procured, the Chairman shall forthwith inquire into and decide the matter summarily, provided the complainant and defendant both consent to abide by such decision of the Chairman, and provided that no fine is imposed on such summary inquiry.

17. Not less than three Members of the Committee shall be associated with the Chairman in the trial of breaches of these rules.
