WHEREAS by section 6 of "The Masters Attendant's Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that the Governor may from time to time, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, frame and establish such port rules, not inconsistent with the said Ordinance, as he may think necessary for any of the purposes in the several sub-sections of the said section specified, provided that such port rules shall be promulgated by Proclamation in the Government Gazette at least one month before the same shall take effect:

And whereas the port of Colombo was brought within the operation of the said Ordinance by a Proclamation dated the Sixth day of January, One thousand Eight hundred and Sixty-six, and certain port rules were duly framed, established, and formulated for the said port of Colombo, for the pnrposes of the said Ordinance by a Proclamation dated the Fifteenth day of June, One thousand and Nine hundred:

And whereas it is expedient to frame and establish additional port rules for the said port of Colombo:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, have framed and established the additional port rules set forth in the schedule hereto for the said port of Colombo.

Schedule.

SECTION II.

2. No vessel liable to be placed in quarantine shall come within the harbour without the permission of the Port Surgeon.

Such vessel shall cast anchor in the outer roads in the place appointed by the Master

Attendant for quarantine anchorage.

Any vessel within the harbour placed in quarantine shall immediately be removed to the quarantine anchorage in the outer roads aforesaid.

All vessels in quarantine shall display the following signals: by day the quarantine flag at the fore, and by night two white lights six feet apart hoisted vertically well up at the fore.

All vessels arriving within the port shall display the quarantine signal until the Port Surgeon has given pratique.

SECTION IV.

- 2. No vessel within the port shall fire guns or rockets or burn blue lights between the hours of sunset and sunrise, excepting the mail steamers on arrival, which may make such signals only as may be authorized by the Master Attendant, and vessels in distress which may make any of the Board of Trade distress signals. This rule does not apply to men-of-war firing salutes.

 Section VI.
- 9. Every vessel conveying passengers from a foreign port arriving in the Harbour of Colombo shall, as soon as possible after she is moored, unless she be placed in quarantine, put down at least two accommodation ladders. If the ladders be on each side of the ship, the starboard ladder shall be reserved for persons leaving the ship, and the port ladder for persons coming on board. If the ladders be on the same side of the ship, the after ladder shall be reserved for persons leaving the ship and the forward ladder for persons coming on board. If the vessel be placed in quarantine, the ladders shall be put down as soon as she is released from quarantine.

SECTION VII.

16. No cargo boat or coal boat, whether laden or empty, shall lie alongside of vessels in the port until the vessel has been moored or, if she has been placed in quarantine, until an hour and a half at least after she has been released from quarantine, and thereafter only with the permission of the chief officer.

SCHEDULE

Boundaries.

North.—The outer Circular road from the 2nd milepost to the north-eastern corner of Jetawanarama, and thence a line drawn eastwards across the Malwatn-oya to the junction of the Rambewa and the MacBride roads.

East.—From the junction of the Rambewa and the MacBride roads, along the MacBride road to its junction with the Anuradhapura-Matale road, thence along the Anuradhapura-Matale road to the point where it intersects the Nuwarawewa bund, and thence along the Nuwarawewa bund as far as the ancient spill of Nuwarawewa, thence a line drawn due west to the Malwatu-oya, thence along the Malwatn-oya to a point due east of the eastern extremity of the bund of Alankulama tank.

South.—From the southern extremity of the eastern boundary on the Malwatn-oya, a line drawn due west to the eastern extremity of the bund of Alankulama tank, thence along the bund of Alankulama tank, and thence a line due west from the western extremity of that bund to the Anuradhapura-Kurunegala road, thence a line north-west to the southern extremity of the bund of Potanegama tank.

West.—The bund of Potanegama tank, thence a line due north from the northern extremity of the bund of Potanegama tank to the bund of Tissawewa, thence along the Tissawewa bund to its junction with the Anuradhapura-Puttalam road, thence along the Anuradhapura-Puttalam road to the 45th milepost, thence a line due north to meet the outer Circular road, thence along the outer Circular road as far as the 2nd milepost.

WHEREAS by section 4 of "The Toll Ordinance, 1896," it is enacted that, subject to the provisions and limitations in the said Ordinance contained, tolls shall be levied upon all horses, elephants, oxen, vehicles, and boats in respect of the roads, bridges, ferries, and canals specified in schedules B, C, D, and E respectively to the said Ordinance annexed, at such rates as the Governor from time to time by Proclamation in the Government Gazette shall be pleased to appoint, provided that the same shall in no case exceed the rates thereinafter specified:

And whereas by a resolution passed by the Legislative Council of Ceylon, under the powers in them vested by section 9 of Ordinance No 3 of 189 ℓ , a toll was established in respect of the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa minor road at Nattandiya in the District of Chilaw, North-Western Province, as from and after the 15th day of May, 1901, and the Governor, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, has by a resolution notified in the Government Gazette of the 2nd day of May, 1901, determined the place at which the said toll shall be collected:

And whereas it is expedient to appoint the rates at which the said toll so established in respect of the said road shall be levied:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, under and by virtue of the powers in that behalf on Us conferred as aforesaid, do hereby appoint that the rates at which the toll so established in respect of the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa minor road at Nattandiya in the District of Chilaw, North-Western Province aforesaid, shall not exceed the rates set out in the schedule hereto.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

HE following rules made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in terms of section 4 of the Ordinance No. 2 of 1896, are re-published for general information:-

In these rules, unless the context otherwise requires-

"Child" means a person under the age of 14 years.

"Young person" means a person of the age of 14 years and under the age of 18 years. "Woman" means a woman of 18 years of age and upwards.

"Machinery" includes any driving strap or band.

- "Mill-gearing" comprehends every shaft, whether upright, oblique, or horizontal, and every wheel, drum, or pulley by which the motion of the first moving power is communicated to any machine.
- Every hoist or tackle, near to which any person is liable to pass or to be employed, and every wheel, if within a distance of 3 ft. 6 in. from the floor, directly connected with steam, water, electrical, or other mechanical power, whether in the engine-house or not, and every part of a steam, gas, or oil engine, electrical motor, dynamo, or water-wheel, shall be securely fenced; and
- 2. Every wheel race not otherwise secured shall be securely fenced close to the edge of the mill-race; and
- Every part of the mill-gearing belting, ropes, or chains driven in any way whatever within a distance of 3 ft. 6 in. from the floor conveying motive power from the driving to the driven machine, shall either be securely fenced or be in such position or of such construction as to be equally safe to every person employed in the factory as it would be if it was securely fenced; and
- 4. All fencing shall be of wood 3 ft. 6 in. high, posts 3 in. by 3 in., top rail 3 in. by 2 in., intermediate rails, two in number, 2 in. by $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. If iron is used for rails it must be not less than 1 in. in diameter, and shall be maintained in an efficient state while the parts required to be fenced are in motion.
- All wires conveying electrical current from the dynamo to the motors or lamps shall have highly insulated covering and be safe to every person employed in the factory; and
- 6. Every main switchboard shall be under lock and key and bear clear instructions for its use by the experienced.
- 7. A child shall not be allowed to clean any part of the machinery in the factory while the same is in motion by the aid of steam, gas, oil, electrical current, water, or other mechanical power.
- A young person or woman shall not be allowed to clean such part of the machinery in a factory as mill-gearing belts, ropes, or chains conveying motive power from the driving to the driven machine while the same is in motion.
- A child, young person, or woman shall not be allowed to work between fixed and traversing parts of any self-acting machine while the machine is in motion by the action of steam, water, electrical current, gas, oil, or other mechanical power.
- No person shall have control over a boiler in which steam is generated for the purpose of driving machinery, unless he can produce a certificate of competency from the Inspecting Engineer appointed by Government, or from an Engineer specially licensed for the purpose by the Government.

THE following rules made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under sub-section (e) of Ordinance No. 2 of 1896, are published for general information.

Rules for the Appointment of Inspectors under section 4, sub-section (e), Ordinance No. 2 of 1896.

1. All officers of the Public Works Department duly appointed from time to time to act as Provincial Engineers or District Engineers, and especially authorized in writing hereto by the Government, shall be Inspectors for the purposes of Ordinance No. 2 of 1896 in respect of such factories as shall be enumerated upon such written authority, and shall at all reasonable hours of the day have free access to such factories for the purposes of inspecting machinery in use therein, or any part thereof, referred to in rules 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 of the rules dated October 27, 1897, appearing in the Gazette No. 5,507 of October 29, 1897 (Part I., page 685), and shall report to the Government Agent any failure to comply with the provisions of the said rules.

Provided always that inspections of any factory, the machinery situated in which shall have been certified in writing by a duly authorized Inspector as complying with the aforesaid rules, shall not be made more than once in any one year. For the purposes of this rule the year shall be con-

sidered to commence on the 1st day of January and to terminate on the 31st day of December.

- 2. The Government Agent shall furnish the Provincial Engineer during the month of January in each year with a complete list including the name and nature of each factory within his Province, and the name and address of the owner thereof or his local representative.
- 3. The Provincial Engineer shall, upon receipt of such list, in the event of it containing factories not enumerated in the written authority referred to in the foregoing rule No. 1, report the same to the Director of Public Works.
- 4. For the purposes of rule 10 the Superintendent of every factory containing a boiler or' boilers in which steam is generated for the purpose of driving machinery shall forward to the Government Agent of the Province in which such factory is situated, within one month of the publication of these rules, a certificate of competency regarding the person or persons having control of such boiler or boilers.

In the case of a person or persons appointed to such control in a factory on or after 2nd May, 1901, the Superintendent of such factory shall forward to the Government Agent of the Province in which such factory is situated, within one month of such appointment, a true copy of the certificate of competency obtained by the person or persons having control of such boiler or boilers.

Such certificate shall be signed by the Engineer in charge of such boiler or boilers and connected machinery, or other Engineer nominated by the owner of such factory and specially licensed

for the purpose by the Government.

The certificate shall be in the following form:—

- 5. Upon receipt of the certificate referred to in the foregoing rule, the Government Agent shall forward to each of the persons named therein a copy, such copy being duly countersigned by the Government Agent.
- 6. For the purposes of rules Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8, the Government will accept a certificate signed by the Engineer referred to in rule 4 in lieu of the report of an Inspector specially appointed for the purpose. The certificate shall be made annually, and shall be sent to the Government Agent of the Province in which the factory is situated not later than the 31st day of January. Such certificate shall be in the following form:—
 - I, the undersigned, being an Engineer specially licensed for the purpose by Government, hereby certify to the best of my knowledge and belief that rules Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9, under section 4 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1896, and published in the *Gazette* No. 5,507 of October 29, 1897 (Part I., page 685) have been duly complied with during the period commencing on the 1st day of January, —, and terminating on the 3lst day of December,—.
- 7. Nothing in these rules shall be read and construed to preclude a special inspection being made of any factory at any time within reasonable hours by any person duly and specially authorized by the Government to make such special inspection.
 - 8. The rules of 3rd February, 1898, are cancelled.

IT is hereby notified for general information that the Governor has been pleased to approve of an exchange of parcels between Ceylon and the United Kingdom (including countries served through the medium of the British Post Office) by the overland route via Brindisi or Naples, the service to commence on May 15th, 1901, and that by virtue of the power in him vested under the 37th section of "The Ceylon Post and Telegraph Ordinance, No. 14 of 1892," the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to determine that the rate of postage on parcels forwarded by this route shall be 75 cents per parcel in addition to the ordinary postage via Gibraltar.
