Tenderers who cannot speak English and wish to communicate with the Board must bring their own interpreters.

No tender will be considered unless the tenderer is present in person or by his authorized agent at the Council Chamber, and is prepared to deposit forthwith the amount of one month's rent as tendered by him.

In the event of two or more tenders being for an equal amount the Board shall have the option of forthwith offering the rent for sale by public auction—the bidding to be restricted to the tenderers in question—or of calling for fresh tenders.

Various alterations have been introduced in the new conditions of sale, and intending purchasers are advised to obtain copies before putting in their tenders.

Purchasers of these rents will be allowed to sell arrack at any price not below Rs. 4.50 per gallon.

 Extradition Convention.—America.

At the Court at Saint James's, the 26th day of June, 1901.

Present.  
 The KING'S Most Excellent Majesty. Lord President. Lord Privy Seal. Duke of Norfolk. Duke of Portland. Marquess of Dufferin and Ava. Lord Steward. Lord Chamberlain. Lord Suffield. Mr. Ritchie.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1895, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who

are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient :

And whereas a Convention was concluded on the Thirteenth day of December, One thousand Nine hundred, between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the President of the United States of America for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, which Convention is in the terms following:—

Her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland and the President of the United States of America, being desirous of enlarging the list of crimes on account of which extradition may be granted under the Convention concluded between Her Britannic Majesty and the United States on the Twelfth July, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-nine, with a view to the better administration of justice and the prevention of crime in their respective territories and jurisdictions, have resolved to conclude a Supplementary Convention for this purpose, and have appointed as their Plenipotentiaries, to wit:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, His Excellency the Right Honourable Lord Pauncefote, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, and Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the United States; and

The President of the United States, the Honourable John Hay, Secretary of State of the United States;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, which were found to be in due and proper form, have agreed to and concluded the following Articles:—

#### ARTICLE I.

The following crimes are added to the list of crimes numbered one to ten in the first Article of the said Convention of July Twelfth, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-nine, on account of which extradition may be granted, that is to say:

11. Obtaining money, valuable securities, or other property by false pretences.
12. Wilful and unlawful destruction or obstruction of railroads which endangers human life.
13. Procuring abortion.

#### ARTICLE II.

The present Convention shall be considered as an integral part of the said Extradition Convention of July Twelfth, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-nine, and the first Article of the last-mentioned Convention shall be read as if the list of crimes therein contained had originally comprised the additional crimes specified, and numbered eleven to thirteen in the first Article of the present Convention.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged either at London or Washington as soon as possible.

It shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the laws of the High Contracting Parties, and it shall continue and terminate in the same manner as the said Convention of July Twelfth, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-nine.

In testimony whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the present Convention in duplicate, and have thereunto affixed their seals.

Done at Washington, this Thirteenth day of December, One thousand Nine hundred.

And whereas the ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged at Washington on the Twenty-second day of April, One thousand Nine hundred and one:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Thirteenth day of July, One thousand Nine hundred and One, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the United States and of the said Convention with the President of the United States of America.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-six, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

### CEYLON TECHNICAL COLLEGE.

#### DEPARTMENT OF DRAWING AND ART.

##### (A)—Classes for Training Teachers of Drawing.

Applications are invited from persons who wish to become teachers of drawing for admission to a special course of training at the Ceylon Technical College. The course will be for one year at least. Certificates of qualification to teach drawing will be granted to those who satisfy the examiners. Persons of both sexes will be admitted.

N.B.—It must be understood that in this course the student will be trained, not only in the individual performance of practical drawing, but also in the faculty and method of teaching others, in the organization and conduct of classes, and in the preparation and selection of appropriate models and diagrams.

[His Excellency the Governor has directed that after the year 1901 the Code for Aided Schools shall provide for drawing being a separate subject in an additional schedule (marked schedule U in the Code for 1902) of six stages, and grants will not be paid for drawing as a "specific subject." Grants will be paid for passes in drawing at the rates specified in the Schedule of the Code for 1902, viz., ordinary grants will be paid for passes in drawing if none of the masters or mistresses teaching that subject in the school holds a qualifying certificate, and enhanced grants will be paid for passes in drawing in each stage if one of the masters or mistresses holds the drawing certificate of the Ceylon Technical College, or other qualifying certificate or diploma to teach drawing. Drawing will be a special subject for the Teachers' Certificate Examination, and a special certificate for passing in that subject will be issued, which will entitle the holder to earn enhanced grants for the school where he or she is teaching drawing.]

The course of training at the Ceylon Technical College will consist of both the theory and practice of drawing, and also the methods of teaching, and will include the following:—

##### *First Year's Course.*

1. Practice and teaching of freehand drawing from flat examples, and the design and preparation of such patterns (including elementary brushwork).
2. Practice and teaching of drawing from models and objects in outline and in light and shade.
3. Practice and teaching of geometrical drawing and instruction in the use of instruments and scales.
4. Practice and the proper use in teaching of drawing in chalk on the blackboard.

##### *Second Year's Course.*

1. Practice and teaching of freehand drawing from casts of ornament.
2. Practice and teaching of drawing from models and objects in outline and in light and shade, the proper arrangements of such groups, and of classes for drawing the same.
3. Practice and the preparation of designs and patterns for the use of teaching freehand drawing (including the elementary principles of ornament).
4. The theory and practice of perspective.

The first class certificate to teach drawing will be granted to those who are successful at the examinations in at least six of the above subjects. Second class certificates will also be granted, which will qualify the holder to earn enhanced grants, and may be obtained by the work of the first year's course.

No fees will be charged to teachers, pupil teachers, and students of training schools. A deposit fee of Rs. 10 will be charged to cover cost of materials. The balance will be refunded at the end of the course.

The classes will be held on Tuesdays from 10 30 A.M. to 4 P.M. and on Saturdays from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M.

Application forms may be obtained from the Superintendent of the College.

The next term begins on September 9, and application forms properly filled in must be sent to the Superintendent before that date.

##### (B)—Drawing Class for Students of the Normal School.

Instruction will be given to the students of the Colombo Normal School in the following subjects:—

1. Practice and teaching of freehand drawing from flat examples and from casts of ornament.
2. Practice and teaching of drawing from models and objects in outline and in light and shade.
3. Practice and teaching of geometrical drawing and the use of instruments and scales.
4. Drawing in chalk on the blackboard.
5. The elementary principles of ornament.
6. The theory and practice of perspective.
