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PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS, by section 34 of "The Colombo Waterworks Ordinance, 1886," it is enacted that the regulations in the schedule thereto annexed shall be observed by all consumers of water within the Municipality; and that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council to make from time to time such further regulations as may appear expedient for any of the purposes mentioned in the said section of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is also enacted that such further regulations shall be published by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, and that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council by like Proclamation to alter, vary, amend, or repeal any regulation so proclaimed, and if necessary to substitute other regulations in place thereof:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the Twenty-second day of February, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-nine, certain regulations set out in the schedule thereto were made and published:

And whereas it appears to us expedient to repeal Regulation 43 of the regulations set out in the said schedule, and to substitute another regulation in place thereof:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor in Executive Council do hereby repeal the said Regulation 43 of the regulations set out in the schedule to the said Proclamation of the Twenty-

second day of February, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-nine, and do hereby substitute in place thereof the following regulation, namely:—

43. The value of the amount of water consumed during the quarter shall be ascertained and calculated in accordance with the foregoing regulations. From the sum thus obtained a deduction will be made equal to $\frac{2}{3}$ per cent. on the annual value of the premises as ascertained under the provisions of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887, in all cases in which the premises are used wholly for residential purposes. In all other cases, except where the water is supplied for shipping, a deduction will be made equal to $\frac{2}{3}$ per cent. on the annual value of the premises as ascertained under the provisions of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887. Each quarter's account shall be final, and no surplus shall be carried forward from one quarter to the next.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the 10th day of April, 1901, the town of Anuradhapura, in the North-Central Province, as described in the said Proclamation, was brought under the operation of the Local Board of Health and Improvement Ordinance, No. 13 of 1898:

And whereas by the 54th section of the said Ordinance it is enacted that all public streets and bridges and public markets and lands used as such within each town brought under the operation of the said Ordinance (except such streets and bridges as shall be specially exempted by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose from time to time, issued), and the pavements, stones, and other materials thereof, and also all erections, materials, implements, and other things provided for such streets, shall be vested in the Board of such town for the purpose of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is expedient specially to exempt from the provisions of the above recited section of the said Ordinance the under-mentioned roads situate within the limits of the said town of Anuradhapura:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the authority in Us vested by the said Local Board of Health and Improvement Ordinance, No. 13 of 1898, do hereby proclaim that the main roads from Anuradhapura to Matale, Trincomalee, Jaffna, Puttalam, and Kurunegala, and the MacBride road, the bridge over the Malwatu-oya on the Anuradhapura-Matale main road, and the bridge over Tissaewewa spill on the Puttalam road shall, from the date hereinafter mentioned be no longer vested in the Local Board of Health and Improvement of the said town of Anuradhapura, but the same shall be and are hereby declared to be specially exempted from the operation of the said 54th section of the said Ordinance from and after the date hereof.

SIR,—IT is with the deepest regret that I have to communicate to you the melancholy intelligence of the death of Her Imperial Majesty the Dowager Empress and Queen Frederick of Germany and Prussia, Princess Royal of Great Britain and Ireland, Sister of His Majesty the King.

Her Imperial Majesty expired at the Castle of Friedrichshof, near Kronberg, at six o'clock in the evening on the 5th instant, to the great grief of His Majesty and of all the Royal Family.

CEYLON TECHNICAL COLLEGE.

DEPARTMENT OF DRAWING AND ART.

(A)—Classes for Training Teachers of Drawing.

Applications are invited from persons who wish to become teachers of drawing for admission to a special course of training at the Ceylon Technical College. The course will be for one year at least. Certificates of qualification to teach drawing will be granted to those who satisfy the examiners. Persons of both sexes will be admitted.

N.B.—It must be understood that in this course the student will be trained, not only in the individual performance of practical drawing, but also in the faculty and method of teaching others, in the organization and conduct of classes, and in the preparation and selection of appropriate models and diagrams.

[His Excellency the Governor has directed that after the year 1901 the Code for Aided Schools shall provide for drawing being a separate subject in an additional schedule (marked schedule U in the Code for 1902) of six stages, and grants will not be paid for drawing as a "specific subject." Grants will be paid for passes in drawing at the rates specified in the Schedule of the Code for 1902, viz., ordinary grants will be paid for passes in drawing if none of the masters or mistresses teaching that subject in the school holds a qualifying certificate, and enhanced grants will be paid for passes in drawing in each stage if one of the masters or mistresses holds the drawing certificate of the Ceylon Technical College, or other qualifying certificate or diploma to teach drawing. Drawing will be a special subject for the Teachers' Certificate Examination, and a special certificate for passing in that subject will be issued, which will entitle the holder to earn enhanced grants for the school where he or she is teaching drawing.]

The course of training at the Ceylon Technical College will consist of both the theory and practice of drawing, and also the methods of teaching, and will include the following:—

First Year's Course.

1. Practice and teaching of freehand drawing from flat examples, and the design and preparation of such patterns (including elementary brushwork).
2. Practice and teaching of drawing from models and objects in outline and in light and shade.
3. Practice and teaching of geometrical drawing and instruction in the use of instruments and scales.
4. Practice and the proper use in teaching of drawing in chalk on the blackboard.

Second Year's Course.
