WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 1 of "The Lepers' Ordinance, 1901," it is enacted that the said Ordinance shall come into operation on such day as the Governor shall, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, appoint:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Proclamation appoint that the said Ordinance No. 4 of 1901, intituled "An Ordinance to provide for the Segregation and Treatment of Lepers," shall come into operation as from and after the 1st day of January, 1902.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and One.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 34 of "The Forest Ordinance, 1885," it is enacted that the Governor may, by Proclamation in the *Gazette*, constitute any portion of forest a village forest for the benefit of any village community or group of village communities, and may in like manner vary or cancel any such Proclamation:

And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the 2nd day of February, 1893, the forest specified in the schedule thereto, was [under the provisions of section 34 of the said Ordinance], constituted a village forest for the benefit of the Village Community of Madampe Gabadagama in the Mada pattu of Atakalan korale, Province of Sabaragamuwa; and whereas it is expedient to exclude from the said Proclamation portions of the said forest specified in the schedule hereto, and to that extent to vary the said Proclamation:

Now, therefore, know Ye that We, the said Governor, do hereby vary the said Proclamation and declare that from and after the 25th day of October, 1901, the portions of the said village forest specified in the schedule hereto shall be excluded from, and deemed to form no part of, the village forest constituted by the aforesaid Proclamation of the 2nd February, 1893, and We do in all other respects confirm the said Proclamation:

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Eighth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and One.
