#### WEST RIDGEWAY.

HEREAS by section 8 of "The Road Ordinance, 1861," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to declare that any road, canal, or river shall be deemed to be a principal thoroughfare for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and that such road, canal, or river, shall from the time specified in such Proclamation, be deemed to be a principal thoroughfare accordingly:

And whereas it is expedient to declare the minor road leading from Achchankulam to Arippu, in the District of Mannar, Northern Province, a principal thoroughfare for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Our Proclamation declare that the said minor road leading from Achchankulam to Arippu, in the District of Mannar, Northern Province, shall, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, be deemed to be a principal thoroughfare, as from and after the First day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Two.

#### WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is by the said Ordinance divided for the purposes of the administration of justice for the hearing, trying, and determining of all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence—

For the Southern Circuit, twice at least at Galle, and such other places in such Circuit, as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Galle on April 25 and September 15 in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court should on the day hereinafter mentioned, be holden at Matara, a place within the said Southern Circuit, in the said Ordinance mentioned:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do hereby direct and appoint that Sessions of the Supreme Court in its Criminal Jurisdiction, shall be holden at Matara, on or about Friday, the 1st day of November, :901.

WHEREAS by section 17 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted that whenever the Government Agent shall forward an application of the nature described in sections 15 and 16 of the said Ordinance to Government, together with his report as to the necessity for locating a police force in any district, and as to the number of men to compose such force, and the amount in money required for its upkeep, it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to establish a police force in such district from such time as shall be therein named, and to introduce therein such of the clauses of the said Ordinance as the Governor and Council shall consider expedient:

And whereas the Government Agent of the Central Province did forward to Government an application of the nature described in sections 15 and 16 of the said Ordinance, together with his report as to the necessity for locating a police force in the District of Pallekelle in the Central Province, and as to the number of men to compose such force, and the amount in money required for its upkeep, as required by the said section 17 of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby establish a police force in the said district of Pallekelle in the Central Province, as from and after the 1st day of November, 1901, and We do hereby introduce the following clauses of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," in the said District: viz., all the clauses of Ordinance No. 16 of 1865, except 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 49, 80, and the following up to 97 inclusive:

And the said District shall, for the purpose of the said Police Ordinance, 1865, consist of and comprise all lands and high roads included within the external boundaries of the estates specified in the schedule hereto.

RULES REFERRED TO.

Removal of Dangerous Trees.

If it appears to the Gansabhawa Committee that any tree standing near any house or other occupied building is likely to cause danger to such building or to the inmates thereof, the Committee shall have power to give notice in writing to the owner of the ree, or in his absence any person residing in or occupying the land on which it stands, to cut down and remove such tree within the time specified in the notice.

In case such owner or occupat delays to carry out such order, the said Committee shall take steps to remove such tree at his expense. Provided that if the Committee considers proper it may direct the party complaining to pay a certain amount to the owner of the tree by way of compensation, as well as a portion of the expenses incurred in removing

Removal of Trees along Public Thoroughfares.

The Committee may in like manner direct the removal of any tree dangerous to the safety of passengers along any public road or street.

SIR,—In continuation of my circular despatches of the 4th August, 1899, and the 4th August, 1900, I have the honour to transmit to you, for the information of your Government, a translation of a further law passed in Germany authorizing the Bundesrath to prolong most-favoured-nation treatment to the British Empire until 31st December, 1903, together with a translation of an official notification issued under that law, according the most-favoured treatment to British and Colonial products, with the exception of those of Canada, until further notice.

Law relating to Commercial Relations with the British Empire of the 29th May, 1901.

We, William, by the grace of God, German Emperor, King of Prussia, &c., ordain the following in the name of the Empire, with the assent of the Bundesrath and of the Reichstag, for the period beginning on the 30th July:-

The Bundesrath is authorized to grant to the nationals and products of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as well as to those of British Colonies and Foreign Possessions, until the 31st December, 1903, the advantages conceded by the Empire to the nationals and products of the most-favoured-nation country.

Given at Berlin, under Our Own Hand and Seal, at the Schloss, 29th May, 1901.

Notification respecting the Commercial Relations with the British Empire, dated June 11, 1901. (Translation.)

In virtue of the law respecting the commercial relations with the British Empire, dated the 29th May, 1901, the Council of the Empire has determined, for the period after the 30th July, 1901, to accord until further notice to subjects and products of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as well as to those of British Colonies and Foreign Possessions, with the exception of Canada, the same privileges as are granted to the subjects and products of the most-favoured-nation.
