## PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

### NOTIFICATION ESTABLISHING TOLL.

WHEREAS by section 9 of "The Toll Ordinance, 1896," it is enacted that the Legislative Council may by means of any resolution duly passed at any public session of the said Council establish tolls in respect of any public road, bridge, ferry, or canal in this Island, in addition to the tolls set out in the several schedules to the said Ordinance annexed, and that the provisions of the said Ordinance shall apply to the tolls so established as fully and effectually as if such tolls had been enumerated in the said schedules or in some or one of them :

It is hereby notified that in pursuance of the powers in that behalf by the said section 9 of the said Ordinance conferred, the Legislative Council, at a public session thereof held on the 27th day of November, 1901, did by resolution establish a toll on the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, in the District of Chilaw, North-Western Province, as from and after the First day of January, 1902.

### NOTIFICATION DETERMINING PLACE OF COLLECTION.

WHEREAS by section 10 of "The Toll Ordinance, 1896," it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, may by resolution to be notified determine at what places tolls shall be collected, and alter such places and other places appoint for the collection thereof :

And whereas by a resolution of the 27th day of November, 1901, the Legislative Council established a toll in respect of the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, in the District of Chilaw, North-Western Province, as from and after the First day of January, 1902 :

And whereas it is expedient to determine at what place the toll in respect of the said Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, shall be collected :

It is hereby notified that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has by a resolution of the 2nd day of December, 1901, determined that such toll so established as aforesaid in respect of the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, shall be collected near the said junction of the said Tabbowa village road, to wit :—At a point on the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road to the east of the junction of the Tabbowa village road with the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, the said point being about 1,550 yards from the canal-bridge foot, as from and after the First day of January, 1902, at Nattandiya.

#### WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 4 of "The Tolls Ordinance, 1896," it is enacted that, subject to the provisions and limitations in the said Ordinance contained, tolls shall be levied upon all horses, elephants, oxen, vehicles, and boats in respect of the roads, bridges, ferries, and canals specified in schedules B, C, D, and E, respectively to the said Ordinance annexed, at such rates as the Governor from time to time, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, shall be pleased to appoint, provided that the same shall in no case exceed the rates thereinafter specified :

And whereas by a resolution passed by the Legislative Council of Ceylon, under the powers in them vested by section 9 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1896, a toll was established in respect of the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, in the District of Chilaw, North-Western Province, as from and after the 1st day of January, 1902, and the Governor, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, has by a resolution notified in the *Government Gazette* of the 13th day of December, 1901, determined the place at which the said toll shall be collected :

And whereas it is expedient to appoint the rates at which the said toll so established in respect of the said public road shall be levied :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, under and by virtue of the powers in that behalf on Us conferred as aforesaid, do hereby appoint that the rates at which the toll so established in respect of the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, in the District of Chilaw, North-Western Province, shall not exceed the rates set out in the schedule hereto.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 15 of "The Toll Ordinance, 1896," it is enacted that every person having once paid toll in respect of himself or of any vehicle, animal, or boat at any place, payment at which shall have been declared by the Governor, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, to clear any other place, shall on the production at such other place of a ticket denoting such payment to have been made, pass the same without any further payment of toll, except where such person, vehicle, animal, or boat shall at such latter place have become liable to a different rate of toll:

And whereas it is expedient to declare that every toll paid in respect of the Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, shall clear the toll on the said road at Nattandiya, and *vice versa* :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor do hereby proclaim and declare that from and after the First day of January, 1902, payment of toll in respect of one of the said two tolls on the said Nattandiya-Dunkannawa road, in the District of Chilaw, North-Western Province (1) near the junction of the Tabbowa village road, and (2) at Nattandiya, within the same day, shall clear the other toll.

THE following regulation for the Ceylon Volunteers made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under the authority of Ordinance No. 9 of 1881, is published for general information.

This regulation should be read in conjunction with the under-mentioned existing regulation on the subject of deferred pay to Volunteer Drill Instructors.

### *Existing Regulation.*

A Non-Commissioned Officer who shall complete 12 years' total service while in Colonial employment, shall not receive deferred pay for any period in excess of 12 years, unless he returns to the Imperial Army 3 years before he has completed 21 years' service.

### *New Regulation.*

The deferred pay, however, for such period over 12 years' total service mentioned in preceding paragraph, shall be paid by the Ceylon Government to a Non-Commissioned Officer, whose service is retained by the Colonial Government, and who does not in consequence return to the Imperial Army 3 years before he has completed 21 years' service.

IT is hereby notified that the Board of Health of the Eastern Province has, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor and Executive Council, in terms of section 7 of "The Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance, 1892," made and assessed a rate of 4 per cent. per annum for the year 1902 on the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description and all lands and tenements whatsoever within the villages of Kattankudiyiruppu, Eravur, Chayntamarutu, Kalmunai, and Chammanthurai in the District of Batticaloa, Eastern Province, save such as are by the said section of the said Ordinance exempted from the payment of such rate.

**N**OTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Monday, January 27, 1902, and following days.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10 with the words "Ceylon Stamp Duty," only, without the words "Judicial" or "Warehouse Warrant" printed thereon, and must be in the form (Schedule A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on the 1st January, 1902, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,\* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted.

3. Clerks belonging to the Fourth Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and those employed by Provincial and District Road Committees, whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the heads of their Departments. When forwarding the application forms of Clerks who are employed under them in the Fourth Class of the Clerical Service, Heads of Departments are requested to note the following particulars on the back of the application forms of the candidates:—

- (1) The appointments held by the candidates and salaries.
- (2) Whether the appointments were permanent or temporary.
- (3) Whether the salary was paid from vote for Personal Emoluments or Other Charges or from certain fees.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 12 noon on Monday, January 6, 1902; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination at the station at which they present themselves their forms of application, approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. Examinations will be held at Colombo and Jaffna only, in the places and under the supervision of the officers specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the most conveniently situated station at which the examination is to be held.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition shall be thirty.

8. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts: the first part, a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting and half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-fourth marks in any of the subjects other than Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, or, if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than two-thirds marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

9. Officers who have served continuously in the Fourth Class of the Clerical Service for over six years will be allowed to compete amongst themselves and be eligible if they obtain a minimum of 33 per cent. in the compulsory subjects for two-ninths of the appointments offered for competition. One-ninth of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving officers of the Fourth Class of not less than ten years' service to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

2. Tenders must be sealed and endorsed on the envelopes "Tender for Works, Western Province, 1902." A separate tender for each work.

3. Tenders must be submitted in duplicate, the original being forwarded to the Provincial Engineer and the duplicate direct to the Hon. the Auditor-General, both being required to be forwarded at the same time.

4. Tenders must be on forms which may be obtained at the office of the Provincial Engineer, Western Province, and no tender will be considered unless it is furnished on the recognized form thus obtained.

5. Parties applying for form of tender will be required to deposit the sum of Rs. 50 either at the Treasury or the Kachcheri and produce a receipt for the same.
