#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the

Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

#### WEST RIDGEWAY.

W HEREAS by section 12 of "The Customs Duties Amendment Ordinance, 1898," it is enacted that the said Ordinance shall come into operation at such time as the Governor shall, by  $\checkmark$ Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, appoint :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Proclamation appoint that the said Ordinance No. 20 of 1898, initialed "An Ordinance to consolidate and re-adjust the Customs Duties leviable on Imports," shall come into operation as from and after the First day of January, 1899.

Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

W HEREAS by section'6 of "The Masters Attendant's Ordinance, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may from time to time, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, frame and establish such port rules not inconsistent with the said Ordinance as he may think necessary for any of the purposes in the several sub-sections of the said section specified, provided that such port rules shall be promulgated by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* at least one month before the same shall take effect:

And whereas the port of Galle was brought within the operation of the said Ordinance by a Proclamation dated the sixth day of January, 1866, and certain port rules were duly framed, established, and promulgated for the said port of Galle :

And whereas it is expedient to frame and establish additional port rules for the said port of Galle:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, have framed and established and do hereby promulgate the port rules set forth in the schedule hereto to be additional port rules for the said port of Galle.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### Rules.

25. All boats, canoes, and kattamarams shall keep out of the course of steamers and sailing vessels entering or leaving the harbour and of the mooring boats employed in passing lines, so as not to impede or obstruct their movements.

26. Cargo boats shall not lie contiguously alongside of any vessel in the harbour in tiers of more than two boats abreast. The tindal or person in charge of any boat or boats found lying contiguously outside of the second boat from the vessel's side shall be liable ---- to prosecution for breach of this rule.

27. No cargo boat or coal boat, whether laden or empty, shall lie alongside of vessels in the port in such a way as to obstruct or block the approaches to or from any of the gangway ladders, unless with the permission of the commander.

Quarantine regulations framed under the Ordinance No. 3 of 1897, and cited as "The Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance of 1897," provides under section 7 (1): If any person is guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, he shall be liable on conviction before a Police Magistrate to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding one thousand rupees, or to both.

Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 7 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, from time to time as occasion may require, to establish, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, a Police Force for the effectual protection of person and property within such towns as to them shall appear to require the same :

And whereas by the 13th section of the said Ordinance it is further enacted that the Proclamation establishing a Police Force in any town shall also specify and define the limits of such town, and it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time as occasion may require, by Proclamation, to alter or vary such limits :

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the Eighth day of March, 1886, a Police Force was established by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council at Nuwara Eliya, under the provisions of section 7 of the said "Police Ordinance, 1865," and the limits of the said town were specified and re-defined by Proclamation dated the Twenty-fifth day of November, 1898: And whereas by the 8th section of the Ordinance No. 27 of 1890, intituled "An Ordinance relating to Local Boards," it is enacted that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, exempt the inhabitants of any town from payment of the police tax and order the withdrawal of the whole or any part of the Police Force therein; and may, with the like advice, revoke such exemption and order of withdrawal; and that after such revocation the liability of the inhabitants to pay the police tax shall be revived:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the Thirtieth day of January, 1891, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by the said section of the said Ordinance, did order the withdrawal of the Police Force from Nuwara Eliya as from and after the First day of January, 1891:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the Twenty-second day of December, 1896, such exemption of the inhabitants of the town of Nuwara Eliya from payment of the police tax, and the said order of withdrawal of the Police Force from Nuwara Eliya have been revoked, and the liability of the inhabitants of the town of Nuwara Eliya to pay the police tax has been thereby revised :

And whereas by section 34 of the said "Police Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that for the purposes of creating a fund from which the expenses of the Police Force payable by each town not created a Municipality are to be defrayed, a tax shall be payable on the 31st day March, 30th day of June, 30th day of September, and on the 31st day of December in every year, for the quarter ending on the said days respectively, on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever within every such town to an amount equal to such percentage on the *bond fide* annual value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements, as the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, shall by Proclamation from time to time appoint, except in cases where such amount shall fall below the sum of 25 cents per quarter, in all which excepted cases 25 cents per quarter shall be assessed and payable : Provided that such tax shall not in the aggregate exceed the sum necessary for the maintenance of the force in such town except as aforesaid, and which sum it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time to determine and appoint : Provided further that buildings appropriated to religious worship and such as are placed in charge of military sentries shall be exempted from the payment of such tax :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint that for the purpose aforesaid the tax payable on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever in the town of Nuwara Eliya aforesaid, within the limits specified in the schedule to the Proclamation dated the Twenty-fifth day of November, 1898, aforesaid, shall, save in such excepted cases as aforesaid and in the case of such buildings which are exempted from the payment of such tax as aforesaid, from and after the First day of January, 1899, be at the rate of 2 per centum on the *bond fide* annual value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements aforesaid. The Proclamation dated the Twenty-ninth day of December, 1896, is hereby cancelled.

#### WEST RIDGEWAY,

W HEREAS by the 4th section of "The Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the *Government Gazette*, to bring any town or towns under the operation of the said Ordinance, and to define the limits of such town or towns respectively for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and such Proclamation to amend, alter, or revoke as and whenever the Governor shall, with like advice, determine : Provided that no Proclamation shall be necessary to bring under the operation of the said Ordinance any-town which has already been brought under the operation of the Ordinance No. 7 of 1876, in which town the said "Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898," shall come into operation on the day in section (1) thereof mentioned; that is to say, on the First day of September, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-eight:

And whereas by Proclamation dated the Second day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-eight, the town of Matale, in the Central Province, was brought under the operation of the Ordinance No. 7 of 1876, and the limits of the said town were defined therein for the purposes of the said Ordinance :

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And whereas by subsequent Proclamations dated, respectively, the Third day of October, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four, and the Sixteenth day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-six, the limits of the said town were re-defined for the purposes of the said Ordinance :

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the Proclamations dated, respectively, the Third day of October, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four, and Sixteenth day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-six, aforesaid, and so much of the said Proclamation dated the Second day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-eight, as respects the limits of the said town of Matale, and to re-define the limits of the said town for the purposes of "The Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898 ":

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamations dated, respectively, the Third day of October, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four, and the Sixteenth day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-six, and so much of the said Proclamation dated the Second day of June, One thousand Eight h undred and Eighty-eight, as defines the limits of the said town of Matale by further extending the limits of the said town as defined therein, and We do hereby define, for the purposes of the said "Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898," the limits of the said town of Matale to be those set out in the schedule hereto, as from and after the First day of January, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-nine.

A line beginning at a point on the Sudu-ganga river, 200 ft. east of the North road, near the Diyabubula bridge, and running 200 ft. east of and parallel to the North road till it meets the Brachmana-ela; thence along the ela eastwards to a point where it touches the boundary of the land belonging to the Ceylon Government Railway; thence north-wards along the boundary of the said railway land to a point where it touches the Braidear the draw the draw the draw to a point where it touches the Malundarity Periadewatta drain; thence along the drain to a point where it meets the Malundapitiya path; thence along the path to a point where it turns eastward; thence along the eastern boundary of the garden called Makulgahagedarawatta belonging to Kana Runa Marikkar till it meets the southern boundary of the garden called Gedarawatta belonging to K. From this point a line running 200 ft. east of and parallel to the North road and the Rattota road to a point 17; miles from Kandy; thence crossing the Rattota road to a point 200 ft. north-westof it; thence south-westwards along the Rattota mead (narallel and to the north of it 200 ft from it) to a point 200 ft. east of the North groad (parallel and to the north of it, 200 ft. from it) to a point 200 ft. east of the North road; thence parallel to and 200 ft. to the east of the North road to a point 171 miles from Kandy: thence crossing the North road to a point 200 ft. west of it; thence southwards parallel to and west of the North road, King street, and the Esplanade road, and 200 ft. from them till it joins the Brachmana-ela; thence westwards along the Brachmana-ela to and including the Pannagama bathing-place; thence to a point 200 ft. west of the District Road Committee Office; thence southwards parallel to and west of the road past the Kachcheri, and 200 ft. from it to a point 200 ft. from the Hulangamuwa the foad past the Kachcheri, and 200 ft. from it to a point 200 ft. from the Hulangamuwa road; thence 200 ft. from and parallel to the Hulangamuwa road, and north and west of it to the Kumbiyangoda-oya; thence along the Kumbiyangoda-oya to a point 200 ft. south of the Nagolla road; thence south and east of the Nagolla road, parallel to and 200 ft. from it to a point where it meets the northern boundary of lot 3,782 on preliminary plan 982; thence eastwards along the said northern boundary and the northern boundary of title plan 72,867, the southern boundaries of title plan 124,224, 124,297, 124,292 to the south each the approximation for the approximation of the approximat 124,227, 124,229, to the south-eastern corner of the cemetery; thence in a line east-south-east till it reaches the Moysey Crescent road; thence across that road and along the eastern boundary of lot 5,936 on preliminary plan 1,841 till it reaches the Sudu-ganga river; thence along the Sudu-ganga river to the point whence the line started, excluding all the land which does not lie within 200 ft. of the circle formed by the Hulangamuwa, Nagolla, and Layard roads.

Extradition Treaty.--Republic of Bolivia.

Balmoral, 20th October, 1898.

At the Court at Balmoral, the 20th day of October, 1898.

Present:-The QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

#### Duke of Fife; Earl of Kintore; Lord George Hamilton.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1895, it was amongst other things enacted that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall ` apply in the case of such foreign State ; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient :

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the Twenty-second day of February, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-two, between Her Majesty and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Bolivia for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following :--

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Bolivia having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty (that is to say) :---

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Her Charge d'Affaires ad interim Mr. George Jenner; and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Bolivia, Sener Don José Manuel Braun, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in Peru; who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles :--

#### "ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under certain circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II., committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

#### "ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences :---

1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.

2. Manslaughter.

3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.

4. Rape.

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5. Carnal knowledge or any attempt to have carnal knowledge of a girl under 16 years of age. if the evidence produced justifies committal for those crimes according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties.

Indecent assault. 6.

7 Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child stealing.

8. Abduction.

9. Bigamy.

10. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.

Assault occasioning actual bodily harm. 11.

12. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.

Perjury, or subornation of perjury. 13.

Arson. 14.

Arson.
 Burglary or house-breaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.

16. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company, punishable with imprisonment for not less than one year by any law for the time being in force.

Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.

18. (a) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.

(b) Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm.

(c) Forgery or uttering what is forged.

19. Crimes against Bankruptcy Law.

20. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person travelling or being upon a railway. 21. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

22. Piracy and other crimes or offences committed at sea against persons or things which, according to the laws of the High Contracting Parties, are extradition offences, and are punishable by more than one year's imprisonment.

23. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

#### ABTICLE III.

Either Government reserves the right to refuse or grant the surrender of its own subjects or citizens to the other Government.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Bolivia, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of the Republic of Bolivia or in the United Kingdom respectively for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or on the part of the Government of Bolivia, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of the Republic of Bolivia or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial, and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

#### ARTICLE $\nabla$ .

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punish-

ment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applying or applied to. It shall likewise not take place when, according to the laws of either country, the maximum punishment for the offence is imprisonment for less than one year.

#### ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

#### ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed *in contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

#### ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

#### ARTICLE X.

A fugitive criminal may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings, as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises jurisdiction; provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged, as well in the Republic of Bolivia as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of sixty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent of his country in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty. The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences. specified in this Treaty and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

#### ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

#### ARTICLE XII.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating, the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows :---

. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

2. Depositions, or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified, under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of, or judicial document stating, the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the country where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper Tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

#### ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has

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ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

#### ARTICLE XVI.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

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#### • ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in such Colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal, who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions, shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by the chief Consular officer of the Republic of Bolivia in such Colony or possession.

Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Brittanic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Bolivian criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months. The Treaty, after receiving the approval of the Congress of the Republic of Bolivia, shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Lima as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Done at Lima, on the Twenty-second day of February, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-two.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-six, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

The Royal Indian Engineering College is primarily maintained, under the orders of the Secretary of State for India in Council, for the education of candidates for the service of Government in the India Public Works, Telegraph, and Forest Departments; but it is open, to the extent of the accommodation available, to all persons desirous of following the course of study pursued in it.

#### INDIA FOREST DEPARTMENT APPOINTMENTS.

2. The examination, which will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, will be simultaneous with, and (except that German must be taken as an obligatory subject) in the same subjects and papers as, the examination for the Indian Police Department, † which is usually held in June.

Candidates may undergo the written part of their examination in London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, or at any of the provincial centres at which the simultaneous examination of candidates for admission to the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, is to be held. A list of the probable centres may be obtained from the Civil Service Commis-sioners at any time after March, 1899. The oral and practical parts of the examination will be held in London only. A fee of £2 is required from candidates examined in London, but when the written examination is conducted elsewhore than in London the fee is f8.

elsewhere than in London the fee is £3. Candidates examined at a college or school will probably be required to pay a local fee in addition to the fee of £3 (in order to defray the expenses of superintendence), as to which they should obtain early information from the college or school authorities. The fee payable to the Civil Service Commissioners must be paid by means of stamps of the specified amount. Instructions on this point will be issued to candidates about ten days before the examination.

\* The staff of the College is only given in so far as it concerns the Forest Branch. † Candidates may, if qualified, enter for both the Police and the Forest Department. They will, in such case, have to pay the fee due in respect of each examination.

- (5) The Secretary of State will nominate as probationers such competitors as attain the highest aggregate of marks (provided they obtain the minimum in the obligatory subjects and satisfy the requisite conditions in other respects). These probationers will then enter the College, where they will be further trained for the Forest Service of India. (6) If the full number of competent probationers required in any year cannot be obtained from the persons
- so examined, the Secretary of State reserves a discretion to fill up the deficiency by selecting any other person or persons whom, after consulting the authorities of the College, he may consider properly qualified to become probationers for the Forest Service.

5. The course of study for candidates for the India Forest Service extends over about three years. For about seven terms the candidates will prosecute their studies mainly at the College, and during the period of foreign study, which will occupy the remainder of the course, they will visit, under suitable supervision, such Continental forests as may be selected for the purpose. Excursions may also be made for purposes of instruction, both during term time and during part of the vacations. 6. Each annual session begins in September, and is divided into three terms, with vacations of about four

weeks at Christmas, two weeks at Easter, and eight weeks in the summer.

7. A charge of £61 is made for each of the seven terms spent at the College ; for the period of foreign study the charge is £150; the amounts must be paid terminally in advance to the Bank of England for the first seven terms, and the amount due for the period of foreign study must be paid before the period begins. Receivable orders, with full directions as to the mode of payment, will be forwarded from the India Office to the parents or guardians shortly before the fees fall due. A student will not be allowed to come into residence or to start for his study of foreign forests until his fee has been paid.

study of foreign forests until his fee has been paid.
8. A deposit of £5 is required to be paid by each student on admission to the College, as caution money, to cover charges incurred by him for damage to books, instruments, &c., or any College bills outstanding on leaving the College. Any balance over and above such charges will be repaid. This deposit is to be paid with the fee for the first term, making the total payment on that occasion £66.
9. The foregoing payments cover all charges for tuition, board according to the College. When students are on tour, and during the course of practical instruction, whether in Great Britain or on the Continent, the Secretary of State will defray the expenses of (1) board, lodging, and washing (the aggregate maximum expenditure under these heads being 10s. per diem); (2) travelling expenses; and (3) fees to local Forest officers, &c. Students are required to provide their own class books and drawing instruments. Drawing paper, drawing boards, and surveying instruments are provided by the College.

#### II.-FORESTRY, THEORETICAL AND PRACTICAL, IN ALL ITS BRANCHES.

11. Every student is required to conform to the College rules, to exhibit due diligence in his studies through-Invery suddent is required to conform to the College rules, to exhibit due diligence in his studies throughout the course, and to give evidence of satisfactory progress in such manner as may be required, failing which, or in study, which may entail the loss of his appointment.
 12. During the course of study, the proficiency of the students will be tested by periodical examinations, and on the termination of their studies there will be a final examination. Each student may also, at the discretion of the Secretary of State for India, be required from time to appear before the Medical Board, and should the result be unsatisfactory he course.

be unsatisfactory he cannot claim to be allowed to complete the course.

13. The subjects enumerated in paragraph 10 are grouped in certain main branches of study,<sup>o</sup> and a fixed minimum of qualification is required in each branch and in the subjects taught during the forest tours, as well as a certain minimum for all branches taken together. Students who obtain these minima will receive the College diploma in forestry.

14. Candidates who have obtained this diploma and are found to be of sound constitution and free from physical defects which would render them unsuitable for employment in the Forest Department (the final decision on which points will rest with the Secretary of State for India) will be appointed Assistant Conservators in the Forest Department of India in the order of their standing at the end of the final examination. They will be allowed before leaving the College to state their preference in respect to the provinces to which they desire to be allotted; but the distribution will be made to the several Provinces according to the needs of the public service, at the discretion of the Secretary of State for India after consulting the President of the College. Officers are, however, at all times liable to be transferred from one province to another at the pleasure of the Government of India.

15. Within a month of his nomination as Assistant Conservator, each nominee must sign articles of agreement

15. Within a month of his nomination as Assistant Conservator, each nominee must sign articles of agreement describing the terms and conditions of his appointment; he must embark for India when required to do so by the Secretary of State, and will be provided with a free passage. Failure to embark at the stated time will, in the absence of satisfactory explanation, lead to forfeiture of appointment.
16. The pay of an Assistant Conservator of Forests will begin from the date of reporting arrival in India. Probationers who acquit themselves creditably during their course at Cooper's Hill College will begin on a salary of Rs. 350 a month. It will, however, rest with the President of the College to decide whether any of the probationers, though they have obtained the College Diploma in Forestry, have failed to deserve that rate of initial salary. Such probationers, if any, will begin on a salary of Rs. 250 a month; and this difference of salary will continue until the first denartmental examination is passed in India. first departmental examination is passed in India. Officers entering the Forest Service will be required to contribute a subscription ranging from a compulsory minimum of 5 per cent. up to a voluntary maximum of 10 per cent. of their salary to the Forest Officers' Provident Fund. Such contributions, with compound interest, will accumulate till the date of retirement, when the total sum will be paid to the contributor, or in the event of death before retirement to his legal representative.

17. Promotion, leave, and pension will be governed by the regulations laid down by the Government of India and made applicable to forest officers, such regulations being subject to any modifications or alterations which may be made in them from time to time by the Government of India, and their interpretation in case of any doubt arising being left to that Government. The pension rules applicable to Public Works and Telegraph officers appointed from Cooper's Hill College have been extended to Forest officers appointed from England; and the Inspector-General of Forests and Conservators of the first grade are now eligible for the extra pension of Rs. 1,000 per annum admissible to an officer after at least three years of approved service as a head of a department in any province, if considered deserving of the special concession. A copy of the regulations relative to these matters can be seen on application either at the Library or the Record Department of the India Office; the principal rules are contained in the Abstract of the Civil Service Regulations, as given in the "India List and India Office List" published by Messrs. Harrison and Sons, 59, Pall Mall, London, which can be procured through any bookseller.

18. Every candidate, before proceeding to India, will be required to furnish to the President of the College satisfactory evidence of his competency in riding.

#### GENERAL RULES.

19. Chemical, physical, and botanical laboratories, a forestry museum, a forest nursery, a library, and gymnasium are attached to the College. Means are also provided for the practice of photography. Students making use of the laboratories are supplied with the needful apparatus.

20. The responsibility for the discipline and management of the College and for the superintendence of the studies is vested in the President, under the control of the Secretary of State for India.

21. The students are distributed in divisions, under personal charge of one of the Professors or Instructors selected by the President; such tutor being responsible for exercising the proper degree of personal supervision over each student in his division, and for conducting necessary correspondence with the student's parents or guardians.

22. Each student residing in the College is provided with a separate room, and with fuel and light, also with the necessary attendance. Furniture and bedding are supplied by the College, but students are required to provide their own towels and bed linen. Meals are taken in hall. Wine and beer are not included in the ordinary fare, but

can be obtained from the College cellar at fixed prices. 23. A chapel is attached to the College, which the students residing in the College are expected to attend, unless specially exempted.

24. Every student will be required to go through a course of gymnastics and also of military exercises, including the use of the rifle.

25. Students are required to wear academical dress, under such regulations as may be prescribed from time to time.

#### STUDENTS NOT NOMINATED FOR THE INDIAN FOREST SERVICE, BUT DESIROUS OF OBTAINING A DIPLOMA IN FORESTRY FROM COOPER'S HILL COLLEGE.

26. Students not nominated for the Indian Forest Service may be received into the College, as far as the available accommodation permits. Such students may pass through the course of instruction prescribed for the nominees of the Indian Forest Service, as detailed above, or they may be permitted to participate in the instruction given in certain subjects only. On attaining the prescribed minima of marks in the several branches of study and in totals as laid down above, they will receive, as the case may require, either the College Diploma in Forestry or special

certificates showing in what subjects they have followed the instruction, and with what result. 27. Candidates who desire to be admitted under paragraph 26 may submit the necessary application at any time, but not later than the 15th day of June of the year named for admission, except with the special permission of the President. The application must be made on the prescribed forms, which can be obtained from the Secretary of

the College. 28. Candidates whose applications are found satisfactory as to character and in other respects will be required The last week in June of the year for admission. The to undergo an examination, to be held at the College, about the last week in June of the year for admission. The object of the examination will be to ascertain whether the candidate is qualified to follow the course of instruction with advantage (or certain parts of it, as the case may be). Candidates who do not come up to the required standard will not be admitted to the College.

The President may dispense with the whole or any portion of this examination in the case of a candidate who produces an University diploma, or other similar certificate granted by a recognized examining body. 29. Candidates admitted to the College under paragraph 26, who propose to pass through the full prescribed course of study, will be required to pay the same fees in every respect as those paid by the nominees for the India Example. Forest Service. Candidates who do not become resident, and are admitted only to certain subjects of study. will be required to pay the fees which may be fixed in each special case in consideration of the extent of their studies. The candidates of both classes will be required to abide by the general rules of the College.

#### FOREST EXAMINATION.

#### SYLLABUS.

#### Class I.

Mathematics .- The extent of the Examination will be as follows :-

(a) Arithmetic;

(b) Algebra, up to and including the binomial theorem, the theory and use of logarithms; (c) Euclid, Books I. to IV and VI;

(d) Plane Trigonometry up to and including solution of triangles and mensuration.

English Composition .- The standard of positive merit will be looked for in logical arrangement of thought, and in accuracy and propriety of expression, but large deductions of marks will be made for faults of writing and

spelling. Candidates are also warned that, for similar faults in the use of the English language, similar deductions will be made from the marks obtained in the German papers in Class I.

German.-There will be translations of unseen passages from German into English, and from English into German ; the passages for translation will be taken, mainly, from standard authors, and a few simple questions may be asked on the passages set, as to the structure and character of the language, and allusions of obvious and general interest. The viva voce examination will include Dictation.

#### Class 11.

#### Any two subjects may be taken up.

Higher Mathematics.-

oo In all the following subjects great importance will be attached to accuracy in numerical results. Further questions and problems on the subjects of the examination in Mathematics, Class I.

And in addition :--

- Statics: The equilibrium of forces acting in one plane and of parallel forces, the centre of gravity, the mechanical powers, and friction. (The graphical or geometrical method of treating such problems should be studied as well as the analytical. No application of the differential calculus to Statics will be required.)
- Dynamics : Uniform, uniformly accelerated, and uniform circular motion, falling bodies and projectiles in vacuo, collisions and work. (Analytical methods of solution, but not the use of the differential calculus, will be involved.)

Analytical Geometry : Problems on straight line and circle. Conic Sections : Elementary properties, with easy problems both on the analytical and geometrical methods. French.--The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and in other respects the examination will proceed on the same lines as in German.

Latin.-Passages selected from the authors usually read in schools will be set for translation into English. Passages from English authors will be given for translation into Latin prose and verse, but candidates will be allowed,

Passages from English authors will be given for translation into Latin prose and verse, but candidates will be allowed, in the place of verse composition, to answer questions of a simple character, which will test whether they possess a fundamental knowledge of the grammar of the language, and such an elementary acquaintance with Roman History as is required for the intelligent study of the books they have read. Greek. - Passages will be set for translation into English from the authors usually read in schools, and in other respects the examination will proceed on the same lines as in Latin. English History.--The General Paper in this subject will test whether the candidates are accurately acquainted with the facts of English History, and also possess an intelligent knowledge of the meaning of the facts. The paper on the fixed period will, of course, require from the candidates more minute knowledge than the General Paper Batany, Chemistry, Physics, Physical Geography, and Geology.--The standard of examination in these subjects will be such as may be reasonably expected from the education given at schools possessing appliances for practical instruction, such as a laboratory, &c. A considerable portion of the marks will be allotted for the proficiency shown in the practical part of the examination. in the practical part of the examination.

Chemistry will be limited to elements of inorganic chemistry. Heat will be limited to the elementary portion of the subject. Physics will include elementary properties of electricity, magnetism, light, and sound. Geology, chiefly economic, including the recognition of the more familiar minerals and rocks, and their properties and uses.

#### Class III.

Both subjects may be taken up.

Drawing, Freehand. Drawing, Geometrical. Geography.—Simple questions in descriptive and general geography.
